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Local business LB840 loan request gets OK

A local business that needs to move is getting some help with the blessing of the Wayne City Council.

On a 7-0 vote Tuesday, the council approved an LB840 loan request of \$35,000 to Josh Hopkins, who intends to purchase land on the west edge of town along Highway 35 to build a new building for his optometry business.

Hopkins told the council that he has a purchase agreement for a 2.25-acre tract of land just east of Dollar General on west Highway 35 and hopes to break ground on construction of a new building within the next two years.

"That's the first domino, and we should be closing in the next 2-3 weeks," Hopkins told the city. "We're working on plans for a specialized building and hope to have ground broken in 18 months to two years."

The current Magnuson Hopkins Eye Care clinic, located on Second Street just west of the post office, is in a landlocked location, and Hopkins said the business has grown to the point where they need a bigger location than what they could build at the present site.

"We need more room for what we have, and we're landlocked where we are right now," Hopkins said, noting that they are hoping to build a facility bigger than 5,000 square feet at the new location.

Hopkins said that the new business site will allow them to offer vision therapy for school-age children, bringing therapy that is currently available only in Sioux Falls or Omaha. The new building would have six exam rooms, two more than at the present location, and would be better designed to maximize the staff that will work at the new location.

"We're going to try to maximize the staff that we'll have, and I'm sure we'll need extra staff," Hopkins said.

When asked about the current location, Hopkins said he was not sure what Larry Magnuson will do with the building.

"He's (retiring) the end of September, and we've talked for years that this is what we need to do," Hopkins said. "Larry has talked about several options, but I'm

not sure what he'll do with the building."

Hopkins will receive a \$35,000 loan at no interest for the first two years. He said he wants to pay the loan off as soon as possible, "so we can turn it around for someone else." If he needs to go a third year on the loan, he agreed to a 3 percent interest rate.

Councilman Matt Eischeid motioned to approve the loan request, adding that the purchase of the land be completed in 12 months and the building be completed within four years.

The Council discussed the use of LB840 funds and discussed Mayor Ken Chamberlain's suggestion that agreements that are not executed within a certain time frame be brought back to the LB840 committee for approval.

"After three years on a project, they've likely changed in some fashion, and they should be sent back through the committee for approval," Chamberlain said. "We should adopt a policy that if there is no activity for a certain number of months, it should come back."

City finance director Nancy Braden thought that a recent decision by the Legislature would require a super-majority of the city council to approve such a policy change, and city attorney Amy Miller said she would look into the legal aspects of the potential change in policy.

The council also discussed a time limit for using funds to purchase land. City administrator Lowell

Johnson said the possibility of a project that works in phases could be used to speculate or flip land purchases to another entity, which is not what the LB840 program is intended for.

"When you have a phased project and you have a situation where they purchase the land and then . . . they change their mind and flip it to someone else. We need to have some kind of poison pill so the money isn't being used for speculation," he said.

In other action, the Council:

- approved final reading of an amendment to municipal code relating to parking time limits on selected parking stalls along Third Street east of Main Street.

- rejected a bid on the Nebraska State water main replacement project.

- approved a request for a six-month extension for a Community Development Block Grant.

- approved change orders on the airport lift station and aquatic center projects.

- approved payment requests for the aquatic center and wastewater treatment facility improvement projects.

- went into executive session to discuss the possible purchase of alley property from Jason Schulz.

The City Council's next meeting is Tuesday, July 19 at 5:30 p.m. at the Council chambers.

County board has reservations on plans for movie

Request to shoot scenes inside courtroom discussed at meeting

A Winside native who is working on an independent film and wants to shoot a scene in the Wayne County Courthouse appeared before the Wayne County Commissioners during Tuesday's meeting.

Tanner Schwedhelm is working with a Sioux Falls-based director on a movie called "Obeisance, Part 1." The movie is a courtroom drama based in the 1930's and 1960's, and Schwedhelm would like to shoot the courtroom scenes in Wayne County's courtroom.

Schwedhelm said the shooting would take about 2-3 days to complete and would include about 40 people, including the actors and crew. Schwedhelm and the film's director are hoping to enter the murder mystery into film festivals in the future.

County board members expressed concern about how the courtroom would be used and whether any equipment or security devices might be compromised, and Schwedhelm was encouraged to contact the judges who use the courtroom to get their blessing first.

"With today's issues about security, there are some concerns," board chair Randy Larson told Schwedhelm. "I know it's a public building, but we're not geared for any kind of security for the unsupervised use of the courtroom. There is some high-priced equipment in there, and I have some reservations about using it."

County Sheriff Jason Dwinell told the board that the county's security committee should meet first and look over the proposal before giving their blessing.

County Attorney Mike Pieper also said it

would be good to know exactly what days filming would take place, making sure those dates don't conflict with scheduled county and district court dates set for the month.

"Even if the board approved it, you would have to get the judges to approve you doing it in their courtroom," he said. "If there is a 2-3 day period available, we'd have to clear that with the courts."

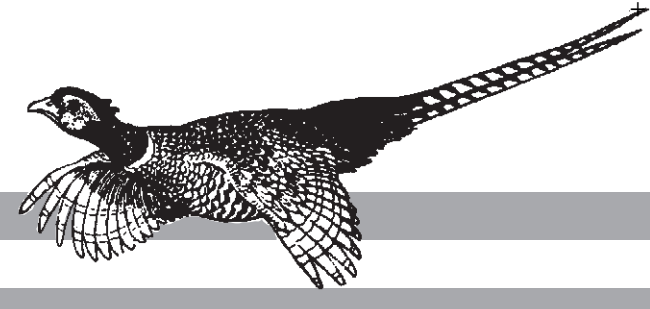
Schwedhelm said they were originally looking at filming during the month of July, but are now looking at possible dates in August that would work. Schwedhelm said they looked at courthouses in Fremont and Omaha, but neither city's courthouses have an old-time look like the courtroom in the Wayne County Courthouse.

In other action, the county:

- heard from Jerad Reimers, community liaison for Congressman Adrian Smith. Reimers updated the board on a number of issues, including pending legislation and review of trade agreements.

- heard from Steve Muir of Elkhorn Valley Insurance on the county's renewal of health insurance for employees for the 2016-17 fiscal year. Muir noted increases in the range of 9-16 percent on two of the three proposals presented to the county with another showing a slight decrease. Larson said that some counties are starting to require employees to pay for a portion of their insurance. Currently, Wayne County pays 100 percent of a county employee's health insurance coverage, but Larson said that could change in the next year or so.

The board recessed their meeting until Thursday to look at health insurance plans. The next regular board meeting is Tuesday, July 19 at 9 a.m.

Looking Ahead in Wayne

City Council meetings
Regular Wayne City Council meetings are at 5:30 p.m. on the first and third Tuesdays of each month in city hall at Third and Pearl Streets.

Project Schedules
Sewer Lagoon and New Sludge Handling System:

The new belt press sludge treatment plant should be operational by summer. The belt press will operate once or twice per month to press the water out of the sludge and store the sludge as a solid to haul out to cropland. We're bidding on the final cleaning of the sludge from the 26 acre lagoon this fall. Then it will be dried out and the land used for something else. That use is still under discussion.

New Swimming Pool:
This project is currently projected by the contractor to open July 21.

Community Activity Center Parking Lot:
Construction of an additional paved parking lot is planned for August.

North Main Street Water Line Replacement:
Replacement of the old water main on Main Street from 8th Street north to the WSC campus should be completed by August.

Fourth Street Paving Project:
This project would extend Fourth Street from the junction with Jaxon Street east past the rugby fields to the fence line. The project is designed but is currently on hold until the funding source is determined.

South Centennial Road and Chief's Way Paving Project:
These are Wayne County projects.

The Chief's Way project would pave the east/west road from South Centennial past Sand Creek Post and Beam to the Grossenburg Implement property. The South Centennial Road project would pave the road from Highway 35 south to the Logan Creek.

Power Plant Engine Replacement:
Our engines range from 30 to 68 years old. We're looking at options to contract with Wind Turbine farms to provide them with back-up power for their customers when the wind doesn't blow. Nebraska is now part of a seven state Regional Transmission Organization that provides us all with a transmission line grid to buy and sell power anywhere in the seven state RTO.

By 2017, Wind Turbine power will make up 60 percent of the total power plant capacity of this seven state RTO. All these new systems need natural gas generation that can start up and be on-line in 10 minutes to follow the wind. There is a 2-3 year window where demand for these new type of engines will generate contracts with towns like Wayne to pay for our new engines if we'll build them and provide the power.

Ashley is the daughter of Jeff and Jennie Sukup and Deitra and Darin Hoelsing and the granddaughter of Dan and Connie Sukup.

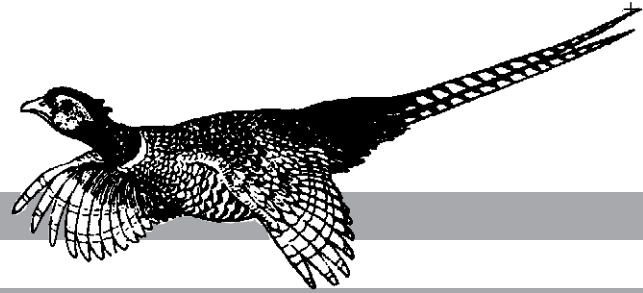
Pender clinic set for July 13

WAKEFIELD - When two teams battling for a league championship have combined for two losses - something's gotta give.

West Point pitcher Bryant Reif helped his cause with a two-run single in the sixth that broke a 1-1 tie, and that proved to be the difference they handed the Wayne Post 43 American Legion Juniors only their second loss of the season in a 3-1 decision to claim the Juniors Division of the Ralph Bishop League Sunday at Eaton Field.

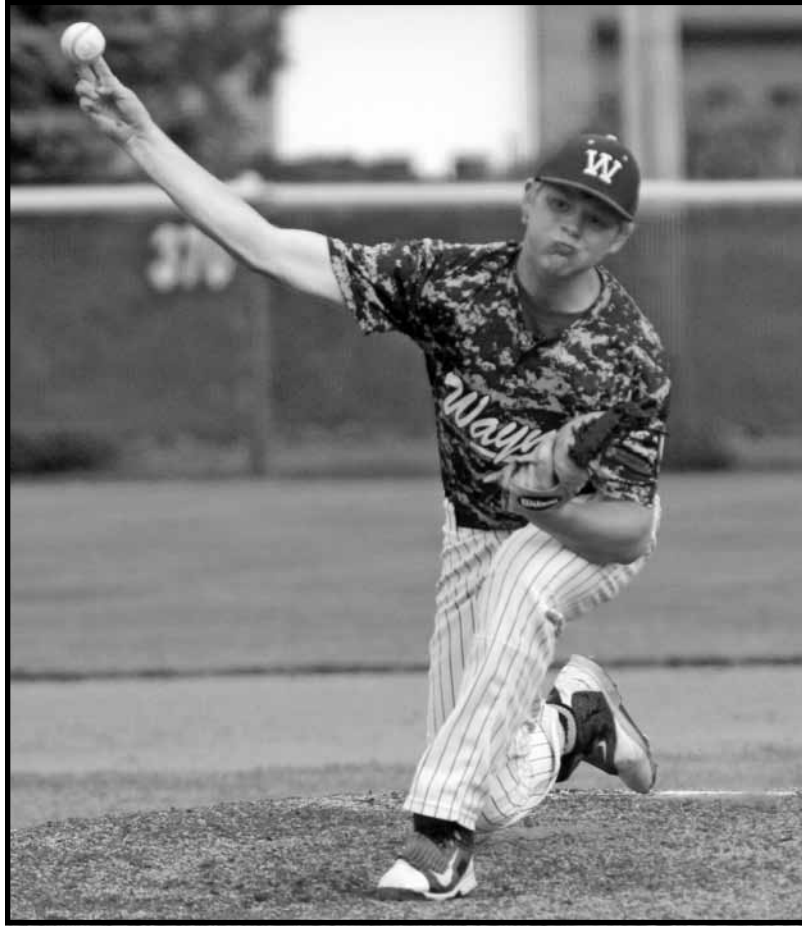

Wayne's pitching has been solid this season. Adam Bentjen owns two of Wayne's three no-hitters (including a rare perfect game in the season opener), Tyler Lutt also has a no-no and has been very dependable on the hill, and Zane Jackson has given Zeiss a great third option in a rare pitcher-catcher combination.

The big question mark for Wayne's pitching, though, will be the 23rd-hour addition of Payten Gamble to the arsenal. Gamble missed almost all of the spring high school season after suffering a broken ankle in a weekend pickup basketball game and has been healing up and looking forward to the opportunity to contribute to this team's success. He got a chance to clear out a few cobwebs with two innings of relief in the first game Tuesday against Pender, and Zeiss said he expects to use Gamble in more of a relief role in the postseason.

Offensively, Wayne has little to complain about this season. They've been pretty solid up and down the lineup and get contributions at every spot in the lineup. Defensively, Wayne plays much cleaner than they did during the spring season. Justin Dean's play at first base has been very impressive. He's cleaned up a lot of off-target throws from his teammates in the infield, turning a number of potential two-base errors into terminations at first base.

Last year, the Wayne Juniors got hot at just the right time, winning two on the road to claim an area title and spark an unlikely third-place finish last year in Bennington. They have a chance to get hot and dominate an area tournament on their home field that, on paper, looks very easy. If they play the way they've played for most of the season, they'll be a tough out come state tournament time.

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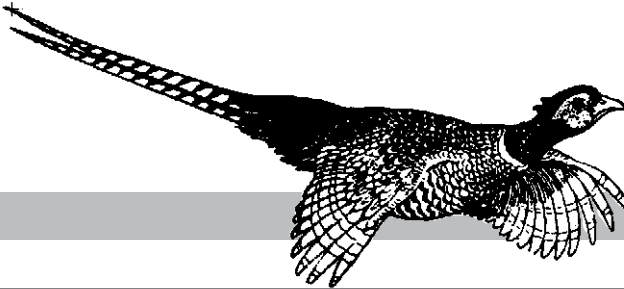
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Eight skills for effective discipline

Kids don't come with a parenting manual and there's no course that teaches the necessary skills to become a parent. And parenting requires a multitude of skills. No parent is proficient with all parenting skills all the time. Instead, it is a work in progress.

Depending on your child's age and behavior, there will likely be times that some skills are easier to use than others. Sharpening those skills over time takes practice. Parenting books, classes and support groups can be excellent resources to help parents sharpen their skills. No matter which of the five main types of discipline a parent uses, there are certain skills that are essential in promoting effective discipline.


1. Recognize Safety Issues. The most effective parents seem to be able to sniff out danger a mile away. They are well versed in internet safety, the latest safety equipment and they recognize a child predator when they see one. They find a balance between overprotecting a child and throwing the child to the wolves. They allow for natural consequences only when it is safe to do so and teach children skills to make healthy decisions.

2. Provide a Positive Example.

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Parents who say, "Do as I say, not as I do," often find this isn't very effective. Parents who yell when they're angry tend to raise children who yell out of anger. However, parents who model how to handle anger by taking a break, tend to have children who do the same. Modeling appropriate behaviors is an essential parenting skill. Kids are watching all the time and they'll learn far more from what they see than what they hear.

3. Set Appropriate Limits. It's essential that parents can set appropriate limits for kids, even when a child protests. Effective parents can tolerate their child being angry with them and they don't try to be their child's friend. Instead, they focus on what is in the best interest of

the child. Setting appropriate limits means the child has clear rules and the parent uses developmentally appropriate discipline strategies.

4. Enforce Consequences Consistently. Effective parents don't just threaten consequences, they follow through with them. Consistency in consequences in a vital skill for parents. If a child only receives negative consequence for his behavior half the time, the behavior isn't likely to stop. It's essential that kids know the consequences and that they know they can't count on the consequences being consistent.

5. Choose Battles Wisely. Effective discipline requires that parents are able to recognize whether a battle is worth the fight. Sometimes behaviors just aren't worth addressing if they are likely to lead to a power struggle. For example, if a six-year-old wants to wear her rain galoshes on a sunny day, allowing her to do so might make more sense than trying to convince her why her sneakers are a better choice if it will likely lead to a major meltdown.

6. Manage Stress Effectively. Parents who manage their stress effectively have much more success when disciplining a child. Stressed out parents are more likely to yell or be inconsistent with discipline.

They are also more likely to use punishment rather than discipline. And when a parent is stressed out, it can lead to more behavioral problems from a child, which leads to more stress on the parent. Healthy stress management includes self-care and having support from friends and family.

7. Provide Positive Attention. Finding time to give kids daily positive attention can make a big difference in the child's life. It makes all other discipline strategies much more effective. Finding time and energy to devote individual attention to each child can be difficult sometimes, especially for single parents or parents with multiple children.

8. Establish Clear Expectations. When kids don't understand what is expected of them, it can be impossible for them to meet a parent's expectations. The most effective parents are able to clearly tell kids what the expectations are in a way that a child can understand. An effective parent just doesn't tell her 10-year-old to clean his room. Instead, she describes what a clean room looks like by saying, "Pick your clothes up off the floor, make your bed and vacuum the rug."

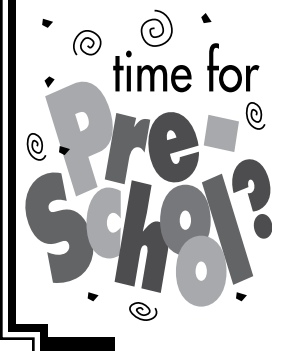

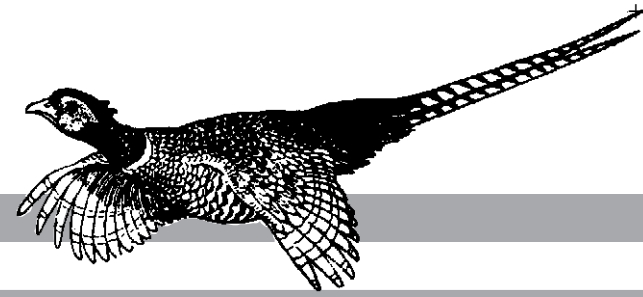

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We sing it, but do we live by 'In God We Trust'?

We all know the "Star-Spangled Banner." As Americans, it is our national anthem. It is sung at the beginning of sporting events, concerts, and different events at our county fairs. It is played when an American has won a gold medal at the Olympic Games. It is our nation's song! But did you know that when we sing the "Star-Spangled Banner" we are only singing the first verse?

When Francis Scott Key wrote the words to what became the "Star-Spangled Banner" in 1812, he wrote the song with four verses. I bet that we are not all that familiar with the other three original verses (a fifth verse was added during the Civil War). Verse four goes as follows:

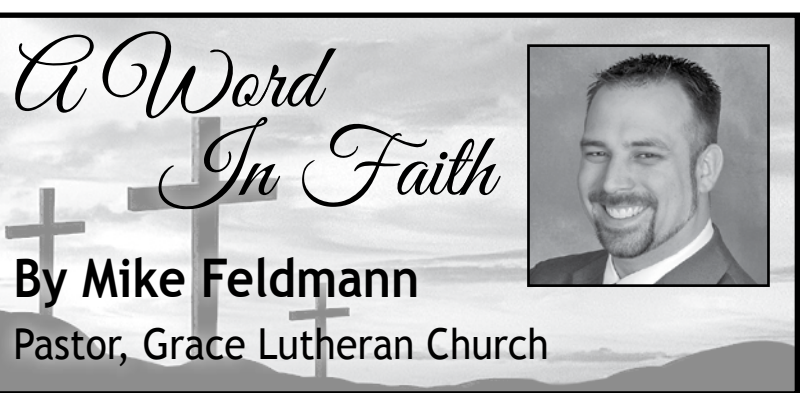
O! thus be it ever when freemen shall stand,

Between their loved home, and their war's desolation,

Blest with vict'ry and peace, may the heav'n-rescued land,

Praise the power that hath made and preserved us a nation!

Then conquer we must, when our cause it is just,



And this be our motto - "In God is our trust;"

And the star-spangled banner in triumph shall wave,

O'er the land of the free, and the home of the brave!

Francis Scott Key includes the words "In God is our trust." As we just celebrated our freedom and independence on July 4th, I wonder how much we hold to these words. I would say for the vast majority of people the words "In God is our trust" mean very little. For the vast majority of our American people,

"In me is our trust" or "In myself is our trust" is the phrase we live by. And because of that, our culture is falling apart and wandering farther and farther away from who God would have us be as a people.

We as Americans are following the path of many in the Bible who thought highly of themselves, who gave into to their own fleshly desires, and who neglected the poor, among many other things. Those people who focused on themselves, who didn't focus on was right and wrong but was thought to be pleas-

ing to the majority, who neglected worship of the Creator and Savior of the world - they found themselves to be in situations where even though they thought they were to be exalted, they were used as slaves. These people felt abandoned and disowned by God and were subject to violence, impartiality, and persecution. In my opinion, this is where we are now as a nation as we witness unnecessary violence, giving into desires of the flesh, and neglecting of the power. If we don't come back to putting our trust and our worship in the one true God, things are going to get even more grim than they already are.

"Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord, the people whom He has chosen as His heritage!" (Psalm 33:12). This verse was written initially to the Israelites, who were God's chosen people before Jesus came into the world. *But God so loved the world that he world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life* (John 3:16). For

those who call upon Jesus as their Savior and believe in Him with all their heart - they are the ones who are redeemed by the blood Christ shed on the cross. They are the ones who are part of the nation of God because they have been washed of their sins. And even though Christians suffer persecution now from every direction, not just from ISIS, their eternal destination is one of a nation who gather around the throne of God worshipping Him and

experiencing true freedom because Christ has destroyed sin, death, and Satan himself by his resurrection. This sacrifice of Christ was for all people, but only the ones who believe are the ones who will experience this freedom.

Psalm 118:8 says that "it is better to take refuge in the Lord than to trust in man." May our trust be in God for safety, salvation, and all things! To God always be the glory and honor.

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Local producers get conservation awards

At the Annual Meeting, and Technical Workshop of the Nebraska Chapter of Soil and Water Conservation Society in Norfolk June 24-25, five awards were presented. Area residents Scott and Pam Heinemann and Gary and Carmen Godbersen received Honor Awards for their conservation practices.

Honor Award

The honor award recognizes non-members for outstanding accomplishments compatible with the objectives of the society. The Soil and Water Conservation Society is a private scientific and educational association dedicated to advancing the science and art of good land use and improvement of natural resources. The awards committee is made up of Anita Nein, Wally Valasek and Doug Garrison.

2016 - Nebraska SWCS Honor Award - Scott and Pam Heinemann. Scott and Pam Heinemann of Winside are Wayne County producers. Scott has been practicing Continuous no-till for many years with a corn-soybean rotation. Scott plants his crops in 20 inch rows

which can present a challenge for some but not for Scott. He effectively handles the residue of the narrow rows. Scott has recently added cover crops to his rotation and expanded his rotation to include perennial forages and small grains such as cereal rye and oats.

The two participate in the Conservation Reserve Program by seeding filter strips, riparian forest buffers, quail buffers, and grassed waterways. They have planted numerous trees, shrubs, and wildlife habitat around their farm.

Scott and Pam have hosted the "No-Till on the Plains Whirlwind Expo" for Eastern Nebraska in June of 2016 their farm.

In addition to all these activities, Scott and Pam continually educate themselves and keep up to date with new and innovative practices in conservation farming. Pam is a big part of the operation keeping the books, hauling seed, operating the grain cart during harvest, and cooking for the crew. They make important financial management decisions together and are a great conservation team.

2016 - Nebraska SWCS Honor Award - Gary and Carmen Godbersen. Gary and Carmen have been leaders in conservation within the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District. They are continuous no-tillers

and have used cover crops extensively over most of their farms. When other farmers might say that they don't have time to get cover crops planted in the fall or look for other reasons why cover crops won't work on their operation, the Godbersens have made it work. According to Marty Marx, Soil Conservation Technician in the Wayne NRCS field office, "One thing that stands out with them is that they have always moved forward with their no-till and cover crops and have never given up. If something doesn't go quite right, they don't blame the system, they look for a solution to make it right the next time and capitalize on the learning experience. They participate in our educational seminars to further their education.

They have hosted a no-till twilight tour at their farm in Wayne County".

The Godbersens have practiced no-till and cover crops in Northeast Nebraska where continuous no-till may not be a popular conservation practice, where disking cornstalks is still common. They do no-till in 20 inch rows. Their conservation doesn't stop with just no-till and cover crops. They have participated in other conservation programs which have helped them improve the efficiency of their fertilization and irrigation water management practices and are currently working on a windbreak renovation with the West Point NRCS office. The Godbersens are very deserving of the conservation recognition.

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NECC drafting program adds new concentration

Northeast Community College has added a new concentration to its Drafting degree program. Structural Drafting will be offered as a concentration in the Associate of Applied Arts (AAS) in Drafting program beginning this fall. It joins Architectural and Industrial Facility drafting as concentrations offered by Northeast's Drafting AAS program.

The new Structural Drafting concentration prepares students to create technical drawings and construction documents used in the construction, maintenance and modernization of industrial and commercial facilities. Students are introduced to the principles of Building Information Management (BIM) using computer-aided design processes to create detailed architectural and structural drawings.

A number of career possibilities are available for successful graduates of the Structural Drafting concentration, including employment with architectural and engineering firms, general contractors, material suppliers, manufacturers and structural fabricators.

Dr. Wade Herley, dean of business and technology at Northeast, says the addition of the Structural Drafting concentration is part of a wider roll-out of a new and im-

proved Drafting program. Other changes include removing four credit hours from students' first semester, introducing more Computer Assisted Drafting (CAD), allowing multiple entry points and providing significantly more flexibility in students' second year of study.

Also new for this fall, students can now earn a one-semester certificate or two-semester diploma in Drafting. All coursework can be applied to the Drafting AAS degree.

"This is an exciting time for Drafting, and a perfect time to be rolling out an improved program," said Herley. "We have more job postings and demand (from employers) for our students than we have students in the program. Momentum is starting to build in the program as opportunities in the Drafting sector grow."

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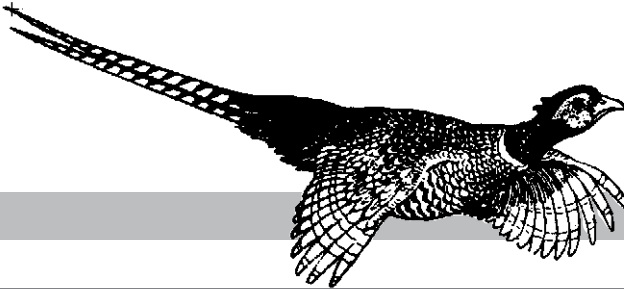
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Remembering past through old photos

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Water management critical during summer

As we all know we are heading into the hot, drier part of the summer. Irrigation systems will be running and we are always looking for ways to manage our water resources more efficiently.

We can't do anything about the weather, but if we have irrigation we can water our crops and yards. In crops, sometimes it might appear pretty simple. Turn the pivots on and don't stop them. In corn, which enters a high water use phase around tasseling, this could be pretty close to the truth. Irrigated corn with its higher plant populations will use over .30 inches of water per day during the early reproductive stages. Since most pivots can put about an inch of water on a field about every three days, the turn on and stay on might be close to reality. However, some water/electric restrictions and occasional rainfall can cause a change in plans. To get more information on corn production, including irrigation management, go to cropwatch.unl.edu.

A relatively new UNL website offers soybean producers an easy-to-use decision aid for optimizing irrigation efficiency and energy use. SoyWater, available at soywater.unl.edu, asks a few, simple questions specific to the field and then provides daily estimates of crop water use and soil water status.

Users log on and after just a few mouse-clicks, SoyWater provides a table of real-time, actual daily weather data for computing daily crop water use from planting (or emergence) to the day before producer log-in. It then uses historical weather data to compute daily crop water use from the day of log-in to the day of expected crop maturity.

The daily weather data is from a weather station of the Automated

Weather Data Network (AWDN) maintained by the High Plains Regional Climate Center (HPRCC). (SoyWater automatically identifies the weather station nearest the producer's field.) During the season, the producer will log in to SoyWater to input the date and amount of local rainfall and any irrigation applications.

Based on this information, SoyWater will highlight the projected date when the first (or next) irrigation should be scheduled and projects the dates of specific soybean

vegetative (V-) and reproductive (R-) growth stages. SoyWater can be useful to both rainfed and irrigated soybean producers interested in predicting the date of a V- or R-stage. This information also can be useful when making other crop management decisions for a particular soybean field, such as when the effectiveness of a herbicide or fungicide depends on application at a specific growth stage. Give it a try.

For lawns without underground sprinklers it might be a losing battle and owners may want to let the lawn go dormant for a month or so, especially in little used and unseen areas. However, many people will still want to water to keep lawns green. Most of our lawns are cool-season, bluegrass dominated. The following are management suggestions from turf.unl.edu to help the cool-season grasses cope with the heat:

The almost immediate response to high temperatures is to increase irrigation, which makes sense and is needed since most water is used for cooling the plant. However, saturated soils from over irrigation limits oxygen leading to root death and thus severely compromises the grass plant over the rest of the season.

Therefore, we still want to keep turf on the dry side to maximize soil oxygen, but at the same time

enough water should be applied to allow the plant to cool itself. We are often questioned about irrigating lightly (syrring) during the day to cool the turf. This effect is very short term, maybe lasting 10-15 minutes depending on the conditions. Water at least one inch at a time and only when necessary, when you see the grass beginning to turn a lighter color. This may happen every 4 to 7 days during the hot part of the summer.

Extreme heat may require more frequent watering. If you have an automated watering system invest in a rain shut-off valve that will turn your system off during a rain. It costs about \$40. There is nothing more aggravating than seeing sprinklers go off during or just after a big rainfall.

Continue mowing as needed, but be sure turf is well-watered to insure no extra damage. Consider mowing in the morning or evenings when temperature and water demand is lowest. Keep the grass length to 2 1/2 to 3 inches for shading of the ground. Grass cut too short will allow the sunlight to reach the ground and raise temperatures much higher. This is still the biggest mistake I see in area lawns. Only golf greens should be short and they require intensive management.

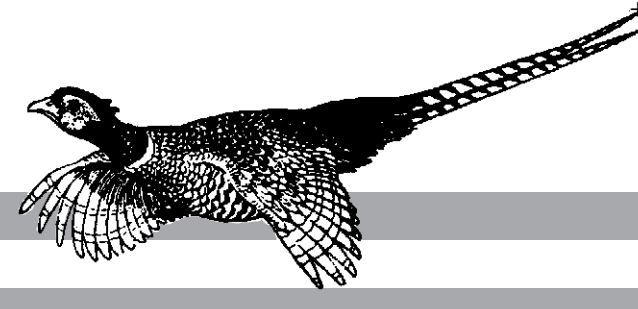
