Vavra claims record 12th title in National Cluck-Off competition

There is no longer a question who the biggest rooster in the barnyard is.

Joel Vavra strutted his stuff on the stage at Bressler Park Saturday and won his record 12th title in the National Cluck-Off to highlight the 36th annual Wayne Chicken Show.

Vavra and four-time youth champ J.T. Hobbs of Hoskins squared off after each won their respective division on a clear summer's afternoon, and Vavra was judged the clear winner of the 35 chicken and rooster wannabes who strutted their stuff in the park.

"It's just another day out in the barnyard," Vavra said after winning. "I'm pretty much a natural at it."

Dressed in his trademark overalls with colorful plumage attached to his backside, Vavra let loose with his trademark rooster's crow and slapped his chest with both hands before parading around in a chicken-like manner.

He threw in a little prop this year, get-

ting his granddaughter, Kalina, in on the act as a hen who gets chased off the stage.

"I'd use my wife for that in the past, but she had enough courage to get up there and do it this year," Vavra said of his granddaughter. "She was acting like a hen when I started scratching the corn, and I was supposed to dance around her like a rooster does."

Vavra, who broke the tie with 11-time champion Del Hampton with Saturday's win, said the Wayne Chicken Show has been a family event for a long time.

"We have six kids ourselves and it was a fun family event for us to come to back then," he said. "It still is, but now we have our grandchildren coming along."

Hobbs won the youth title for the fourth year. See CHICKEN COOP, Page 4A

Computer upgrade highlights meeting

New Chromebook computers will be made available to students at Wayne Community Schools following action taken during Monday's regular meeting of the Board of Education.

A bid of \$25,547.33 from GovConnections was accepted for the purchase of 116 Chromebooks and a Chromebook cart.

A portion of the Chromebooks and the cart will be placed in the elementary school and the remainder given to students at Wayne High School.

Superintendent Mark Lenihan explained to the board the system the school plans to use for replacing the computers. He told the board the devices generally have a life of four years. The district charges students \$25 per year for the Chromebooks and plans to give them to the students upon graduation from Wayne Community Schools.

The majority of the items on Monday's agenda involved routine review of several school policies, including the authority and responsibility of the superintendent, parental involvement, anti-bullying and student fees.

The board also gave first reading approval of the 2016-2017 Teacher Handbook. Included in the handbook will be information on the changes in fundraising through the upcoming Gift-A-Thon.

During the board committee reports portion of the meeting, Lindsay McLaughlin, director of the Wayne Community Schools Foundation, presented information on the All School Reunion activities that took place in conjunction with this year's Chicken Show. She told the board there was "a great turnout" at the Golf Tournament and a number of people toured both schools following the Chicken Show Parade.


"Thank you to everyone who helped in any way during any of the events," McLaughlin told the board.

Travis Meyer, head of the Facility/Safety Committee, told the board of projects taking place over the summer and noted that the new lockers at Wayne High School are scheduled to be installed this week.

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education will next meet in regular session on Monday, Aug. 8 at 5 p.m. in the junior-senior high school library.

A board retreat will be held Monday, July 18 at 5 p.m. at the Early Learning Center with no formal action taken at this meeting.

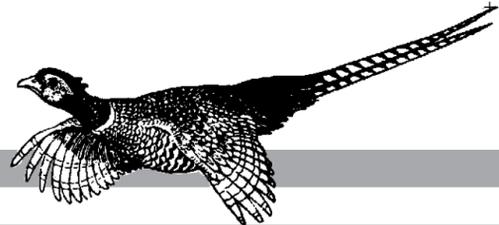

Regular Wayne City Council meetings are at 5:30 p.m. on the first and third Tuesdays of each month in city hall at Third and Pearl Streets.

City Budget Schedule
The city's fiscal year is from Oct. 1 to Sept. 30. We expect our public hearing on the budget to be Tuesday, Sept. 6 at 5:30 p.m. in city hall.

We haven't finished drafting our budget for next year but here are some city government budget numbers (Our water, sewer, electrical and transfer station utility budgets are separate from the government budget.) from our current fiscal year:

- Major Government Revenues (estimated total from all sources is about \$3.5 million per year);
- Real estate taxes: \$664,000;
- State of Nebraska Equalization Fund: \$446,000;
- State of Nebraska Streets and Roads Fund: \$450,000;
- Wayne County dispatch fees for Sheriff: \$73,000;

Franchise Fees from water and sewer departments to city government: \$131,000;

Franchise Fee from electric utility department: \$700,000;

Franchise Fee from Cable TV: \$43,000;

Franchise Fee from land line telephone company: \$19,000;

Franchise Fee from cell phones: \$66,000;

State Funding for Sr. Center meals and handivan: \$107,000;

CAC memberships: \$80,000;

Rec fees: \$19,000;

Swimming Pool fees: \$40,000.

Chasing Pikachu while driving could cause a shocking crash

Pokémon Go has become one of the most popular app-based games over the past few days. Those playing the game - identified as "Pokémon trainers" - can be found staring at their phones while walking along city streets throughout the U.S.; but there is danger if those "trainers" decide to play while behind the wheel.

"Trying to catch a Pokémon while behind the wheel is a major distraction and increases your risk of causing a crash," said Rose White, spokesperson, AAA - The Auto Club Group. "Put your phone down while driving. Just one quick text or glance to see the next Pokéstop could end up costing you or someone else their life."

It is estimated at any given daylight hour there are 660,000 motorists using a cell phone while driving in the United States. Distracted driving killed 3,179 people and is responsible for 1 out of every 10 deaths on our nation's roadways, according to a report by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

"Playing games like 'Pokémon Go' while driving is a distraction just like sending or receiving a text while behind the wheel," said White. "Unfortunately, it's hard for law enforcement officers to crack down on distracted drivers. Texting while driving is only a secondary offense in Nebraska. This means officers must witness you committing another offense in order to cite you for texting. Strengthening the law to primary enforcement will send a clear message that distracted driving is a dangerous behavior."

Drivers engaging in an activity such as texting can

remain mentally distracted for up to 27 seconds. According to research from the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety, updating social media on your mobile device is just slightly less cognitively challenging than solving a complicated math problem while driving.


Here are AAA's top five tips to avoid texting while driving:

1. Silence your cell phone and turn off the vibration mechanism: Airplane mode is a setting available on many mobile phones. When activated, it suspends many of the device's signal transmitting functions, thereby disabling the phone's capacity to place or receive calls or use text messaging.
2. Ask for help: Remind the people in your vehicle to be a good passenger and enlist their help. Ask your passengers to handle tasks such as texting, placing a call or re-programming your GPS.
3. Ask family, friends and colleagues to respect your commute: Set mobile boundaries and politely ask them not to contact you during the hours of your commute.
4. Place your phone in the glove compartment or trunk: The old adage, 'out of sight, out of mind' can be applied here. Wait until you're at your destination or safely pull into a gas station or rest area to check messages.
5. Download a safety app: Get some technological help. Many mobile safety apps can help discourage texting while driving.

NECC graduate pursues interest in water science to help native country

The African nation of Burkina Faso may not have much in common with Nebraska, but to Northeast Community College graduate Kobi Benao, Nebraska is teeming with information and knowledge he hopes to one day take back to his native country.

Benao, Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso, graduated from Northeast in May. This fall, he will begin his studies at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL) as a Water Studies major.

And between his time at Northeast and UNL, Benao is working as an Irrigation Technician intern at Green Line Equipment, Inc. in Norfolk, where he goes out on service calls to help with repairs and diagnose problems with irrigation pivots. "I'm learning just the basics," he said. "Later, I can learn more about how the pivots really work."

Benao says he grew interested in irrigation and water studies because "water is a main issue worldwide" but most especially in Burkina Faso, which is plagued with droughts and ranks among the world's poorest countries. Benao says many residents must walk four or five miles for water, and a scarcity of wells means many resort to gathering water from creeks and collecting rainwater.

Benao says he started at Northeast to learn about agricultural management, how crops are produced in the United States and more about the agricultural process in general.

When his interest began to grow from farming and into improving water safety, providing safe drinking water and working with irrigation, Benao says his Northeast instructors supported him in a number of ways. He credits ag instructor Michael Lechner with helping him arrange a visit to the UNL campus, and his Northeast advisor, Ted Myers, with helping him transition from the ag transfer to academic transfer major, which was a better fit for the Water Studies program at UNL.

Benao first learned about Northeast from a friend who was also studying there. At the time, Benao was living in New York City, but "New York City is not the best place to go for agriculture (studies)." He

knew Nebraska and its abundance of farmland would be more beneficial to his interests, and by August, 2014, he was attending classes at Northeast.

Benao, whose native language is French, says one of the biggest challenges of being an international student is communicating in English. He took several courses at New York's American Language Communication Center and "I could barely understand what they were talking about," mainly because of pronunciation. He says that while English was part of the curriculum at school in Burkina Faso, learning a language in a classroom and in the real world are two very different things.

In fact, Benao's philosophy about language learning could easily be applied to his education in agriculture and irrigation: "You have to be among the people so you can learn more."

"One of the highlights for the last four years was when we got to re-fuel a British warship," Trenhaile said.

Of his school, Luke said the first year was very regimented with lots of rules. He did have a "buddy" with him the entire time he was at sea.

Now that his schooling is completed, Trenhaile is allowed to live anywhere he chooses. He will be a civil employee with the firm Military Sea Lift Command and will be a part of the Naval Reserve.

He said that his classmates were from all over the world, but did include one other person from Nebraska and coincidentally, he lived in the same dorm as Luke.

"I really did miss everything about Nebraska. New York has a lot of activity, but I plan to just rest and relax while I am back in Nebraska and visit family and friends," Trenhaile said.

At the end of July Luke will return to the east coast for training with Military Sea Lift Command and then be assigned to wherever in the world he is needed.

They only get 10 minutes to shoot each position. A perfect possible score for each position is 100 points or 400 for all four positions. Also included in the final scoring is a written test. Due to technical

difficulties this year, that score was nullified by the management. All the competitors received 100 points toward their final score. The Wayne County Sharp Shooters finished the match scoring 2,230 points, tied for 44th out of 59 teams, only 144 points out of first place.

"In going down, we knew that we were a young, inexperienced team. So we set three goals: To shoot the best we could for the weekend, to learn more about the sport, and to have fun!" Gruenke said. "I feel we accomplished all three. Not only that, but the Rogers area is rich in historical value. The shooting times format allowed time for the families to visit many very interesting sights while there."



It was almost like deja vu in reverse for the Wayne Juniors.

Last year, Wayne had to travel to O'Neill and win two games on the road to earn a trip to state, and they were able to get the job done and earn a spot in the state tournament.

O'Neill tried to return the favor Tuesday and won the first game 8-2, forcing a second game that saw Wayne break a 2-2 tie with a key RBI single by Edgar Ficke-Anderson to earn a 3-2 win and claim their second straight Class B, Area 5 title in an exciting finale at Hank Overin Field.

Manganaro elected to NSIC HOF

Former Wayne State baseball coach John Manganaro was one of six individuals inducted into the Northern Sun Conference Hall of Fame during the league's 17th annual summer kickoff event Tuesday in Burnsville, Minn.

Manganaro is the fourth individual from Wayne State to join the Hall of Fame, joining Sarah (Herrick) Wagenfuhr (soccer/softball) in 2015, Brady Borner (baseball) in 2012 and the late Pete Chapman (athletic director) in 2006.

Manganaro coached baseball at Wayne State College for 20 years, including the last 17 (1993-2009) as head coach. He built Wayne State into one of the top programs in NCAA Div. II under his tenure, producing a 506-309-1 record (.620) that included a 198-54 mark (.785) in NSIC play. The Wildcats won six NSIC regular-season titles under Manganaro from 2004-2009 while advancing to the NCAA Tournament all six seasons with two trips to the regional championship game (2004, 2009).

Under Manganaro, WSC qualified for the NCAA Tournament seven times in nine years and was the 12th winningest program in NCAA Div. II during the 2000's with a 368-157-1 record (.701). Manganaro was a four-time NSIC Coach of the Year (2001, 2006, 2007, 2009) and led the Wildcats to five NSIC Tournament titles. Wayne State produced six All-Americans in the last seven seasons under Manganaro with two players selected in the Major League baseball draft. (Travis Mortimore, 21st

round Seattle Mariners, 2001; and Nick Schumacher, 28th round San Diego Padres, 2008).

Manganaro is also credited with developing the Pete Chapman Baseball Complex, one of the finest baseball facilities in the Midwest. Following his retirement from Wayne State in 2009, Manganaro moved to Omaha where he served as director of the Ultimate Baseball Academy indoor complex from 2009-13. He remains active as an instructor/consultant and has served as the Dean of Coaches for the Pacesetter, Gladiator and Bandit youth baseball organizations in Omaha since 2012.

Other 2016 NSIC Hall of Fame inductees include Jane Dusich of Bemidji State (cross country/track and field), Sara Lee from MSU Moorhead (volleyball/basketball/softball), Bob Olson of Northern State (coach/administrator), Alvin Ashley of Southwest Minnesota State (football/basketball) and Larry Holstad from Winona State (athletic director).

Six years of work worth it for Fehring

WHS, WSC grad throws in U.S. Olympic trials recently

When she graduated from Wayne High School back in 2010, Carly Fehring would have laughed at you if said she'd be competing in the 2016 U.S. Olympic Track and Field Trials.

For an athlete who earned a seventh-place medal in the Nebraska state track meet in the shot put, the idea of competing in the hammer throw was something that wasn't on her radar when she accepted a scholarship to compete at Wayne State College.

Yet there she was, standing in the middle of Hayward Field on the campus of the University of Oregon in Eugene, Ore., one of 24 of the top women's hammer throw competitors in the nation, competing for one of three spots on the U.S. Olympic team that will compete in Brazil later this summer.

"There was no hope going into my freshman year," the daughter of Dan and Shelly Fehring told The

Wayne Herald a week after finishing 17th in the women's hammer throw competition, where she threw in front of a crowd of more than 4,000 - almost the size of her hometown.

To say the experience was amazing would be an understatement for the former All-American and 2014 Wayne State graduate.

"I threw against the best in the United States, and one of those three could win the gold medal at the Olympics," she said. "The atmosphere was just awesome. It was definitely a different experience."

Fehring worked extremely hard to get what is a rare opportunity to compete for a spot on the U.S. Olympic team. From having never competed in the hammer throw to having a 1-in-8 chance at competing in the Olympics was quite a stretch for her.

"When I was getting recruited in high school, I didn't know what the event was until I picked it up the first day," she said. "I was fortunate to have had a great coach (Brett Suckstorf) who knows how to teach the event."

Fehring went on to have a lot of success in the event in college, earning numerous All-American honors

during the indoor and outdoor campaigns. She trained with Suckstorf the last two years, throwing almost every day and lifting 3-4 times a week for a chance to compete in the Olympic Trials.

Fehringer was able to sneak in right before the Olympic Trials started in Oregon. She threw in a competition in Lincoln on June 17, entered her best mark the following Monday – and then waited.

"I found out the Monday before the Fourth of July, and the event was on July 6, so there wasn't a lot of time to get ready," she said.

Having to fund the trip on her own without any support from Team Nebraska, the team she represented at the Olympic Trials, she was grateful to have received support from the community through a week-long raffle for Wayne Chamber Bucks sponsored by State Nebraska Bank and Elkhorn Valley Bank.

"It cost about \$3,000 just for the flight and hotel for the three of us, and we got a lot of great responses from people here in town. That was really awesome," she said.

Once in the competition, Fehringer threw in the first of three flights and was able to get one mark in three attempts. Her second throw measured at 62.44 meters (204 feet, 10 inches), far short of qualifying as one of the eight finalists who battled for the three spots on the Olympic team.

But there was no disappointment with her 17th place finish. Quite the contrary – it was one she was grateful to have experienced.

"I threw against the best in the U.S. and I'm just grateful to have had the opportunity to compete," she said. "I couldn't have done it without my coach, and there aren't many people out there who can say they've competed in the Olympic Trials, so it was just a very special experience."

Now, the 24-year-old teacher's aide at Rainbow World said she has retired – well, sort of.

"After six years of continuous training between this and college, as of Friday I'm on partial retirement," she said. "But I'll probably get back into it again down the road."





ORDINANCE NO. 2016-12
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING WAYNE MUNICIPAL CODE, CHAPTER 78, ARTICLE III, SECTION 78-134 RELATING TO PARKING TIME LIMITS OF 15 MINUTES, 30 MINUTES AND ONE HOUR; LOCATION; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.
BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska.
Section 1. That Chapter 78, Article III, Section 78-134 of the Municipal Code of Wayne, Nebraska, is hereby amended to read as follows:
78-134 Parking time limits of 15 minutes, 30 minutes and one hour; location
(a) No person shall, at any time, park a vehicle between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, for more than one hour upon the following locations:
1. The west side of Pearl Street from 140 feet 8 inches south of the centerline of Third Street to 200 feet 8 inches south of the centerline of Third Street.
2. The north side of East 2nd Street from 130 feet west of the centerline of Logan Street to 173 feet west of the centerline of Logan Street.
3. The south side of East 3rd Street from 70 feet east of the centerline of Main Street to 109 feet east of the centerline of Main Street.
(b) No person shall, at any time, park a vehicle between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, for more than 15 minutes upon the following locations:
1. The west side of Pearl Street from 40 feet north of the centerline of West 3rd Street to 129 feet north of the centerline of West 3rd Street.
(c) Appropriate signs shall be placed to advise the public of these restricted parking regulations.
Section 2. The original Section and any other sections in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEWER CLEANING NOTICE

Beginning July 11 and over the next three to four weeks, the City of Wayne Sewer Department will be having sewer mains cleaned in various parts of the City. City Sewer Department staff will be placing notices on doors of those areas where the cleaning will be taking place.
In the cleaning process, high pressure water is forced through the sewer main line, which pushes the air from the sewer44r main into the service lines of homes and businesses. If this happens, it can result in the air exiting through the toilet, causing the water to shoot out of the toilet bowl. This air should exit through the sewer vent of the building, but inadequate venting or location of toilets can cause the air to exit through the toilet.
This is a rare occurrence but can be remedied by covering the toilet bowl with a towel and keeping the lid closed. This will keep most of the water in the bowl rather than on the floor.
Again, during the next several weeks, when the toilets are not in use, cover them with a towel and keep the lid down.
If you have any questions about the sewer cleaning process or the areas the sewer main cleaning will take place, you can call the Wastewater Treatment Plant at 375-5250.

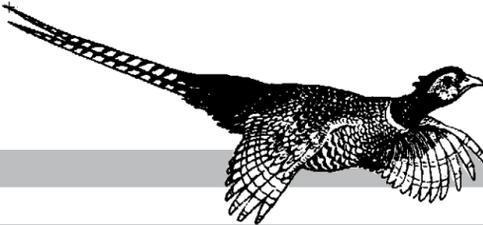
NOTICE to IRRIGATORS

Capitol View Panhandle fracking battle continues

Fracking, a decades old practice in the oil and gas industry that was once featured on an episode of "The Simpsons," is back in the news in Nebraska.


A controversial decision by the Nebraska Oil and Gas Commission last year to allow a Colorado company to dispose of salty groundwater and chemical-laden wastewater in a well north of Mitchell has been overturned by a judge in Sidney.

Hydraulic fracturing, or fracking, is the process of injecting fluid - mostly water and sand, but with additional chemicals - into the ground at a high pressure to fracture shale rocks and to release crude oil and natural gas inside. It's a process that has been in use in Nebraska for more than 65 years. Environmentalists have challenged the practice as a matter of public health.

Cheyenne County Judge Derek Weimer ruled recently that the Nebraska Oil and Gas Conservation Commission exceeded its authority in April, 2015, when it approved the request by Terex Energy Corp. to dispose of the water. That approval, made after a lengthy and sometimes acrimonious public hearing, led to legislative attempts to abolish the commission or at least more closely regulate its activities.

During that hearing, farmer James Osborne challenged commission members to drink glasses of water tainted by fracking. He said it was a visual explanation of what fracking waste can do to the water table. The group BoldNebraska has circulated video copies of Osborne's challenge.

Apparently unmoved by the demonstration, the commission signed off on Terex Energy Corporations proposal to convert an inactive oil well into a commercial fracking wastewater disposal site. The approval rejected objections from local officials, landowners and environmentalists and allowed the compa-



ny to inject 5,000 barrels of oil field production water a day in the Sioux County well.

In March, 2016, the governor signed a bill creating a monitoring system for fracking wastewater transportation and requiring annual sampling of fracking fluids. The measure also adjusted the Nebraska Oil and Gas Commission's mission to focus on "promoting health, safety and protection of natural resources." The bill (LB1082) also requires public forums for injection well permit applications.

In the case before Judge Weimer, landowners, Jane Grove and Hughson Flying A Ranch Inc., asked for a review of the commission's authority. They contended there is no Nebraska statute that gives the

commission authority to authorize disposal of the wastewater from other states. The judge agreed.

In the Simpsons' episode, "Opposites A-Frack" (season 26, Episode 5), Marge's twin sisters Patty and Selma start a fire when the tap water in a downstairs bathroom ignites as they are trying to smoke cigarettes. Lisa Simpson informs her mother, Marge, that this is possibly a result of fracking, which she discovers is happening at a local factory. Marge successfully calls on Assemblywoman Maxine Lombard to stop the fracking.

Back in the real world, opponents of fracking argue that negative environmental and human health impacts could be significant. Although wells have been fracked for over 65 years in the United States, concerns

have been raised about whether federal, state, and local regulatory agencies can keep up with the recent rapid increase in fracking activity and adequately protect the environment and human health.

Nebraska's new law is a step in that direction. It's unclear at this writing whether the Colorado company will challenge the judge's ruling or what, if any, action the Oil and Gas Commission might take.

One thing is certain, the industry that generates the waste and the folks who are responsible for monitoring that activity should be aware that Nebraskans are watching.


Legislative Update Update on recent Supreme Court rulings

Each year during the last few weeks of June, the United States Supreme Court issues rulings on a variety of issues. This year was slightly different with the court being short one justice and being a divided court.

The first ruling of interest was in the case of Fisher v. University of Texas at Austin. In this case, the court voted to uphold a college admissions program that takes race into consideration. It was decided with a 4-3 ruling with Justices Kennedy, Ginsburg, Breyer and Sotomayor deciding to uphold the program.

Chief Justice Roberts and Justices Thomas and Alito in dissent. Justice Kagan had dealt with this case when she was solicitor general so she recused herself from the case.

This ruling surprised those who watch the court - the thought was that they took this case to reverse the ruling of the lower courts. While the ruling is very narrow in nature and directed at the University of Texas program, it will provide guidance for those schools that want

to consider race for the purpose of admissions. Currently, Nebraska is one of eight states that ban the use of race as a factor in admissions.

The second ruling, and the one I was most interested in, was the case of the United States v. Texas. This case dealt with President Obama's executive orders regarding immigration. The ruling was one line saying that the Court was divided.

What does this mean? This means that the programs will not be allowed to go into effect and the issue will return to the lower court. It is unlikely that the programs will be allowed to take effect during the remainder of the Obama administration.

This ruling will likely keep more than 4 million undocumented (illegal) immigrants from coming out and applying for these programs which would have allowed them to stay in the United States without concerns of being

deported. This ruling does not mean the immediate deportation of those that had applied for deferred action but it does keep them in a holding pattern of undecided status.

What concerns me is the fact that in the last two years the Legislature voted to give these individuals (the DREAMERS) drivers' licenses and professional licenses. The arguments were made that we had to do this because it was federal policy and some of my colleagues could not see the value in waiting until we had a ruling in this case.

In yet another case coming from Texas, the courts struck down a Texas law providing strict regulations for abortion clinics, which became known as "clinic shutdown" laws. Justices Breyer, Kennedy, Ginsburg, Sotomayor, and Kagan delivered the opinion with Chief Justice Roberts and Justices Thomas and Alito wanting to uphold the law.

The decision struck down a 2013 Texas law stating that all abortion providers had to meet ambulatory surgical standards and the physicians performing the abortion has to have admitting privileges at a nearby hospital. Advocates of the law argued that it protected the health of women. The law closed the majority of facilities that provided abortions and made it so only six cities in the state had facilities that could perform abortions. Justices said there was evidence that the restrictive rules actually protected the health of women.

One of the most important considerations when you go to vote for president this fall should be the make-up of the Supreme Court. The next president will likely appoint at least three people to the court.



Summer foods require special care

Foodborne illness increase in the summer partly due to the warmer temperatures. Because no one wants to get sick from eating food, follow these tips to keep your picnic or grill out safe from a foodborne illness.

When bringing food to a picnic or cookout:

- Use an insulated cooler filled with ice or frozen gel packs. Frozen food can also be used as a cold source.

- Foods that need to be kept cold include raw meat, poultry, and seafood; deli and luncheon meats or sandwiches; summer salads (tuna, chicken, egg, pasta, or seafood); cut up fruit and vegetables; and perishable dairy products.

- A full cooler will maintain its cold temperature longer than a partially filled one. When using a cooler, keep it out of the direct sun by placing it in the shade or shelter.

- Avoid opening the cooler repeatedly so that your food stays colder longer.

When cooking on the grill:

- Use separate cutting boards and utensils for raw meat and ready-to-eat items like vegetables or bread.

- Keep perishable food cold until

it is ready to cook.

- Use a food thermometer to make sure meat and poultry are cooked thoroughly to their safe minimum internal temperatures

- Beef, Pork, Lamb, & Veal (steaks, roasts, and chops): 145 °F with a 3 minute rest time

- Ground meats: 160 °F

- Whole poultry, poultry breasts, & ground poultry: 165 °F

- Always use a fresh, clean plate and tongs for serving cooked food. Never reuse items that touched raw meat or poultry to serve the food once it is cooked.

When serving food outdoors:

- Perishable food should not sit

out for more than two hours. In hot weather (above 90 °F), food should NEVER sit out for more than one hour.

- Serve cold food in small portions, and keep the rest in the cooler. After cooking meat and poultry on the grill, keep it hot until served - at 140 °F or warmer.

- Keep hot food hot by setting it to the side of the grill rack, not directly over the coals where they could overcook.

High-ability students at Hastings scholars academy

More than 50 gifted and talented students entering eighth and ninth grades challenged their minds over summer vacation at the 30th annual Hastings College Scholars Academy (HCSA).

Among those participating was Treyton Blecke of Wayne, who was involved in the Math portion of the program.

From June 26 to July 1, these young scholars lived on campus and experienced hands-on learning in one of four areas—mathematics, communications, robotics or science—taught by highly-regarded teachers from across Nebraska and Hastings College professors.

During the weeklong program, students enrolled in the mathematics section integrated math and creativity to create geometric works of art in multiple mediums such as tessellations, perspective drawings and origami. The class was also introduced to the basics of computer programming, with each scholar building a web page.

Students in the speech section honed their communication and acting skills while learning how to use their voices and unique talents to enrich their communities. They practiced the process of building an oral performance from script to delivery.

The robotics class spent the week constructing varieties of remote-controlled robots, combining elements of science, technology, engineering and mathematics. In addition, each student personalized a wind-up scribble robot with a plastic cup, googly eyes and markers released onto paper to create an abstract work of art.

Science students went on-location to explore a local farm and a U.S. Department of Agriculture research center to learn the importance of nutrition and where food comes from, as well as studying genetics, using polymerase chain reaction machine and isolating their own DNA.

Aside from their classes, students had opportunities to make new friends with fun social and cultural activities. Students got a preview of college life by staying in a campus residence hall, eating in the cafeteria and interacting with college students who served as their resident advisors and social group leaders.





Landlord-tenant cash lease workshops set

Area farmers and landlords have two opportunities to attend a Landlord - Tenant Cash Lease Workshop on Wednesday, July 27.

Nebraska Extension will be offering programs at 1:30 p.m. at the Fire Hall in Pender or at 6:30 p.m. at the First National Bank Northeast in Tekamah.

These come at a critical time of year as Sept. 1 is the deadline for landlords or tenants in a verbal

lease to notify the other of intentions to change or renegotiate provisions of the current lease or to terminate the lease for the following crop year.

Arriving at a fair cash rental rate is difficult when land and commodity prices are stable. However, throw in volatility for either of these variables... or for production costs... and the challenge just got even greater. Rising crop prices lead many land-

owners to seek higher cash rents while falling crop prices lead tenants to seek lower cash rents. Cash rental rates are probably one of the most cussed and discussed topics in crop production.

This program will help landlords and tenants establish and maintain a positive farm leasing relationship and deal with the volatility of their cash rental rates. Landlords try to be loyal to their tenants, yet want a fair return for the land asset. Tenants want to stay in business, yet feel the pressure to bid to keep the land base that they have been farming.

It is very helpful if both the tenant and landlord can attend together. Topics for discussion include:

- Trends in Farmland Values and Cash Rental Rates;
- Types of Leases;
- Flexible Cash Rental Arrangements;
- Good Landlord-Tenant Communications;
- Developing a Fair Lease;
- Modification to or Termination of Verbal and Written Leases;
- Importance of Leases for Government Programs;
- Other Topics: Pasture Rental, Grain Bin Rental, Farm Building Rental, Etc.

Putting together the right lease isn't about what's being discussed at the coffee shop, or what a survey of cash lease rates says. It's about what fits both the landlord and tenant for their circumstance and situation. Attending this presentation will provide a set of ideas to work from as those specifics are discussed.

The free workshop is sponsored by Nebraska Extension, the Nebraska Soybean Board, and the North Central Extension Risk Management Education Center. Refreshments and handouts will be provided. Registration is requested by Friday, July 22. To register for the session in Pender, contact the Nebraska Extension office in Thurston County at (402) 385-6041. To register for the session in Tekamah, contact the Nebraska Extension office in Burt County at (402) 374-2929.

The workshops have been held extensively across Nebraska for several years with over 3,300 attending. The vast majority of both landlords and tenants find the information to be very helpful in improving communications, setting rental terms, and learning about the use of flexible lease provisions. As crop budgets tighten, it is more important than ever to attend and hear the latest discussion about leasing issues.

Groundwater report notes rise in well levels

Each year, the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) collects static water levels from the irrigation wells in their observation well network.

Conducted every year since the mid 1970's, the measurement of these wells provides a wealth of important data utilized by the LENRD to manage groundwater in northeast Nebraska. LENRD Water Resources Technician, Josh Schnitzler, said, "When we collect the water elevation data each spring, it allows us to determine the amount of recovery in the aquifer system from the previous year's irrigation season."

The spring 2016 groundwater level report shows that 84% of the wells measured rose from last year. In fact, 5 percent of the wells recorded their highest ever spring reading. One percent of the wells (2 of 234) recorded their lowest ever spring reading.

The LENRD's data shows that from 1975 to the present, groundwater elevation levels have generally remained fairly constant throughout the district. However, there have been several periods (typically following periods of drought) where groundwater levels have developed downward linear trends. Fortunately, those drought periods eased and we returned to more normal, or above normal, periods of precipitation. Groundwater elevations responded positively and supplies have improved.

LENRD Water Resources Manager, Brian Bruckner, explains, "Yet while all of this information is important and valuable, it can sometimes be misleading. While it does offer us data to verify the amount of groundwater in storage it doesn't necessarily mean that all groundwater users will have sufficient amounts of groundwater if and when the demand peaks."

Schnitzler added, "When looking at the data that has been collected over the past four decades, the in-season demands that cause the water levels to drop substantially is what we are most concerned about. The geology of our district is very challenging."

LENRD General Manager, Mike Sousek, said, "The groundwater resources that lie beneath our State are vast, but also vulnerable. Even small changes in groundwater levels can have profound impacts. Our water levels tend to bounce back in the spring, but that doesn't give us the full picture. There are in-season trends that need to be addressed, especially after the drought of 2012."

The LENRD currently has an observation well network of 240 wells across 15-counties in Northeast Nebraska. The wells were measured this spring and the report can be found at www.lenrd.org/latest-news.



Touting the value of one-room schools

Betty Stukenoltz did something I had always wanted to do. She bought a one room school house. It was even the school house she attended. The one I had my eye on was east of the Farm House on Church Road, and someone finally bought it to make a home out of it. I wanted to buy it and move it to the acreage and use it like a bunk house for overflow guests. Never happened.

Well, Betty bought her school house and restored it; it has desks and black boards and flags and pictures of Washington and Lincoln in it, just like the olden days! I wrote about visiting the one at the Wessels farm south of York last summer. They all had the same basic floor plan; that is, one big room. Many did have an entry hall, where coats and lunch buckets were stored. Most had a big wood and coal burning stove somewhere; and a stone crock with a spigot for drinking water.

There were two outhouses out back. Shoot, I can remember a

church on the highway north of Lincoln with two outhouses; I actually stopped to use one a long time ago. It was a life saver!

The Big Farmer spent all eight grades at Apex school, which is now

the shop building at Winside High. I attended District 51 north of Waco for two years, until the good folks of Peace Lutheran congregation decided to have a parochial school in town. But it was still a one room school, all eight grades. As Betty tells it, "We were one big family. You looked out for each other. If you were done with your studies and someone in a lower grade was having problems, you helped them."

The four years I served as Wayne county rural school nurse were so fun. I met some very special ladies, and one gentleman. One had just five girls as students; the teacher called it her convent. One had a boy I knew from Vacation Bible School, hyperactive if I ever saw one, and she taught him to read! I asked her how she did it, and she said it just took patience.

Anyway, Mrs. Stukenoltz convened a sort of reunion of teachers from one room schools last week, in Peru, the first Teacher's College in Nebraska. I remember a move about twenty years ago to close that

college and possibly move it to Nebraska City. Didn't happen. Way too much history there, I think. Betty had no idea how many would come, and she was pleased to have ninety turn out; she had to close reservations. The governor declared July 8 as One Room School Heroes Day and presenters talked about the history of our one room schools.

On Saturday, they toured some, including the afore mentioned Harmony school and the old Center School, a red brick schoolhouse that had stood on Highway 75 for many years. It has been moved to the Peru State College campus. That's fitting, as most of the teachers in southeast Nebraska attended Peru. The conference was such a success, they are already planning to do it again. Before all these teachers in one room schools are gone. I'm in favor of that. They really were heroes. And it's fun to remember those days. I know one thing, the students in those schools learned lots. I can vouch for it.

Cash lease workshops available in the area


Workshops in Pender, Tekamah

leasing relations. Putting together the right lease isn't about what's being discussed at the coffee shop,

or what a survey of cash lease rates says. It's about what fits both the landlord and tenant for their circumstance and situation. Attending this presentation will provide a set of ideas to work from as those specifics are discussed.

Topics for discussion include the latest information about land values and cash rental rates for the area and state; a review of typical leases used for crop share, cash rent, and variable cash rent arrangements; lease termination, including terminating handshake or verbal leases; lease communication, determining appropriate information sharing for both the tenant and landlord; alternative cash lease arrangements, flexible provision considerations for your situation; and other topics, like irrigation systems, hay rent, pasture rental agreements, and grain bin rental that will be covered as time allows.

UNL Extension Educators will

present this workshop. It is very helpful if both the tenant and landlord can attend together. It is also helpful if the spouse attends. Everyone is welcome to the workshop.
