City's new pool almost ready for opening day

The final touches are being made, the gushing fire hose is pouring in fresh water and all appears ready to go for the new aquatic center at the Wayne Community Activity Center.

Meyer told The Wayne Herald on Wednesday morning that he is cautiously optimiswithin the next week or so.

"The state health inspector is scheduled to be here Friday, so we're hoping to get in the 60-year old city pool for good. everything wrapped up this week before light (on Friday), we'll need to move things down from the old pool so we could open up the first part of next week."

Original plans to open the pool for the start of the 2016 summer season were off by a few months as weather and construction delays pushed things back. Now, all that appeared left to do was to tie up a few loose ends and fill up the nearly 300,000-gallon pool to get it ready for swimmers to enjoy

"The construction guys said they were hoping to be done with their stuff by the end of this week, and the pool inspector is scheduled to be here Friday, but if they can't make it then we'll probably see them early the following week," Meyer said. "With the fair going on this weekend, it would be tough for us to get help to move Wayne city activity director Bryce things down right away, so the earliest we'll open is the first part of next week."

Once the new pool is open, the old pool tic the new pool could see its first swimmers will remain for the time being. Meyer said he wanted to make sure everything checks out with the new pool before closing up shop

"We're going to have the dog dive at the they get here," he said. "If we get the green end of the year up there, so we won't fully drain it yet," he said. "If something were to happen here (at the new pool) then we'd have to keep that open.'

Once the new pool is open to the public, current memberships will transfer to the new facility. Swimmers will walk down the hallway at the Wayne Community Activity Center to their respective locker rooms and check in and enter the pool through there.

"It will be nice to see the project finally for a couple of weeks before the end of the completed," Meyer said. "We're looking for-

Nitty Gritty Dirt Band continues 50 years of touring at County Fair

Few country or rock bands stay together for very long. And you can probably count, on two hands, the number that last more

The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band is celebrating their 50-year anniversary this year, and they'll be featured this Saturday evening at the 94th annual Wayne County Fair as part

of their 50th Anniversary Tour. Few bands have had success in different Band has made a name for itself in pop, rock and country circles, starting with its formation in the spring of 1966 at a California gui-

tar shop as an effort to "figure out how not to" best known for its 1970 Top 10 smash "Mr. have to work for a living."

Rock and Roll Hall of Fame member Jackson Browne was part of the original six-man band, and original members Jeff Hanna and Jimmie Fadden are still with the band all these years later.

The band first hit the Top 40 pop charts in 1967 with "Buy For Me The Rain" and made their first big national appearance later that year on The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson. They also served as an opening act for everybody from The Doors to legendary comusical genres, but the Nitty Gritty Dirt medians Jack Benny and Bill Cosby, and had a part in the 1968 Clint Eastwood movie

"Paint Your Wagon." The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band is probably

Bojangles," a song that stayed on the Billboard Hot 100 charts for 36 consecutive weeks, a rarity at that point in the history of rock and roll music. They received their first Grammy nomination the following year with the recording of their classic threealbum set, "Will The Circle Be Unbroken," which featured their first big country classic song, "I Saw The Light."

By the mid-1970's, the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band was one of the most popular music acts in the United States. They played at a rock festival in Missouri that drew more than a quarter-million fans, and also served as Aerosmith's opening act in 1974.

Opponents of death penalty hoping to educate voters here

Stating that "killing someone to show that killing is wrong doesn't make sense,' Shujaa Graham shared his story of being on California's death row with approximately 25 people in attendance at a "Journey of Hope . . . from Violence to Healing" presentation in Wayne on Friday.

Journey of Hope, an organization led by murder victims' family members, death row exonerees, and the family members of death row inmates, was on a 10-day, 20-city caravan from July 15-24. Local stops included the Spirituality Center at Immaculata Monastery in Norfolk, First United Methodist Church in Wayne and Dakota City United Methodist Church in Dakota City.

Along with sharing their stories, Journey of Hope members are working to educate Nebraska voters on the death penalty issue that will be on the November general elec-

"Voters need to be informed and vote to retain the state's current repeal of the death penalty," said Bradley Christian, a UNO student who is working with Journev of Hope to educate Nebraskans on the death penalty issue.

"Growing up, I was told to 'leave a place better than I found it.' As I have gained knowledge on the death penalty, I realized it is a broken system and we could use the money for something else, such as law enforcement or making prisons safer. The death penalty has been used arbitrarily and there is the risk to the innocent," Chris-

"Instead of the death penalty, make a life sentence mean life with no chance of parole. Life without parole is cheaper than the death penalty," he added.

He noted that voters need to be made aware that a vote to 'retain' will keep the


state's ban on the death penalty, while a vote to 'repeal' would do away with the ban on the death penalty and again allow the court system the option of ordering a criminal be put to death.

Shujaa Graham's biography states that the death row exoneree "grew up in the segregated South of the 1950s and later lived in southern California during the Watts Riots and an era of police occupation in his community. He spent his adolescence in

Library guardians are therapeutic for volunteers

When Linda Anderson first came to Wayne, she was looking for something to do to become connected to the community.

"Someone then told me 'bloom where you are planted' so I have been working with flowers ever since," she said.

Charlene Rasmussen has been a plant lover all her life. Her interest grew after her retirement.

The two women now can be seen

on a daily basis outside the Wayne Public Library, tending the hundreds of flowers that are in bloom throughout the year.

A landscape plan was part of the original design when the library was built in 1996.

"It was planted and left. It didn't get taken care of properly and was looking sad. We asked the Library Foundation if we could fix up the gardens and asked for some money to assist with the projects. At that time, the concern was who would take care of the gardens if we couldn't do it anymore," Anderson

The women started working on the gardens in 2009 by dealing with the soil. They had loads of compost hauled in from the dairy west of

Her husband, Russ, died in 2010 and Rasmussen decided to create something in his memory.

contains a variety of plants and a butterfly sculpture. The sculpture was created by Mike Fluent of Wayne and was his first paid commission in the community. The women also obtained permission to build a retaining wall as part of the butterfly garden.

"I called the work here at the library my 'Gardening Grief Support' because it allowed me to connect with others and get fresh air while I worked," she said.







and out of trouble (arrested 30 times), and educated himself on how to read and write, as well as on history and world affairs, while in prison. After becoming a prominent prison leader and Black Panther activist, Shujaa was framed for the 1973 murder of a prison guard and was sentenced to die. His death sentence was overturned in 1979 and he was found innocent in 1981, but a recognition of racial biases that still permeate the justice system have motivated him to fight the death penalty and advocate for reform of the criminal justice system, declaring that, "I may never enjoy the fruits of this labor, but our children will."

"Even if a person is guilty, they are still a human being. Every day that I was in prison, I thought about capital punishment. I really can't explain what death row is like. I promised the other prisoners I would work to make it right. I worked to educate myself and worked to respect everyone's human rights," Graham

Graham said he also went to prison for "a good thing - I was arrested for protesting the death penalty. I believe we can have a secure society without vowing to

Accompanying Graham was SueZann Bosler, whose father was murdered by a robber on Dec. 22, 1986. She spent 10 1/2 years working to see that his murderer was sentenced to life in prison rather than being ex-

SueZann is a co-founder of Journey of Hope from Violence to Healing and has traveled all over the world since 1993. She noted that the organization is made up of people of all backgrounds, ages and beliefs.

She told her Wayne audience her story of watching

her father, Rev. Billy Bosler, die in front of her after they were both stabbed by an intruder in their Florida

"My father was a minister in the Church of the Brethren, a 'peace church.' I was a pastor's kid and my dad and I had had a conversation about the death penalty and he told me that if something ever happened, he would not want his killer to be put to death," Sue-Zann said.

In honor of her father and his moral opposition to capital punishment, SueZann spent years fighting against a death penalty sentence for James Bernard Campbell, her father's killer. She said that the court system would not listen to her family's wishes that her father's killer not be put to death. She nearly went to jail after expressing her views during the sentencing.

She spoke of forgiving her father's killer and said that until July 13, 1997 when he was sentenced to four consecutive life terms in prison, she could not move on with the healing process. "People asked me if I forgave my father's killer and I

said 'yes' for a long time. I said it with my mouth, but not with my heart. Forgiveness is not for the other person, it is for me.' "We all know the initials WWJD - What Would Je-

sus Do – but my question is Who Would Jesus execute?" SueZann said.

She encouraged her audience to learn as much as possible about both sides of the issue, including the five methods of execution, and offered suggestions on how to promote against the death penalty.

As she goes throughout the world sharing her story, she strives to live by the words of favorite lyric is "let there be peace on Earth, and let it begin with me.'

Eaton still enjoys time with youth

Every once in a while, somebody asks me how long Paul Eaton has coached baseball in Wakefield?

It's easy for me to remember that number – because it's the same as

Monday's 9-1 loss to West Point in the Class C, Area 2 American Legion Seniors tournament marked the end of 50 years of coaching for the man who has been part of Wakefield baseball for so long, one must wonder if he helped Abner Doubleday invent the game.

It's been about 20 years since I first attended a Wakefield baseball game. I remember covering a state tournament there when I worked at the Norfolk Daily News, and interviewing Eaton after each game was like talking to a well-worn veteran of the game who loved what he was doing and enjoyed molding young men into solid athletes and good community-minded kids.

That might be the only thing that hasn't changed in his half-century of coaching – the kids.

"That's the whole fun of it, working with the kids and hopefully you're doing a little bit of good," he said after the game. "I've been able to see my grandson grow by playing in a program in Lincoln and working hard and showing some discipline, and it's those little things that you hope will help them grow up. That's why you coach, to help those kids out, and that's been my goal and the goal of these coaches. We enjoy working with kids and hope to help them out a bit."

Of course, you can't talk baseball with Eaton without mentioning the classic rivalries between Wayne and Wakefield. He still speaks fondly of his battles with Hank Overin, even though some of those cross-county battles were real dogfights.

"Hank was always a nice guy, but when the game started he wasn't quite as nice," Eaton said, smiling. "But we knew if we ever wanted to be any good we had to be able to beat Wayne and we'd have to work our fannies off to get there."

Coaching today doesn't seem as time-consuming as it was back in the day when coaches like Eaton and Overin would literally be at the ball park from sunrise to sunset with games and practices.

"Back then, when you coached, you coached every team from the 8-year olds on up," Eaton said. "The school would charge us a dollar to use a bus, and we'd drive kids to places like Wayne or Wisner, and you'd play the 8-10 year old game, then the 11-12's and then the 13-14's. And after that, you'd have to hustle back home to coach the Legion games that evening.'

Baseball was pretty much the only thing for young boys to do in the summertime. Lifting weights for school sports wasn't a concept back then. There weren't the vast array of sports camps for kids to attend. Outside of the Shrine Bowl, Boys State and the occasional Boy Scout camp, there wasn't a lot to keep a young man's attention without getting him into trouble.

"In 1969 when we were state runner-up, we had 10 kids who played 40 games and didn't have a kid gone," he said. "Now you don't have a week that goes by where a kid isn't gone, but they have a good reason to be gone. There's a lot more happening in the summer today, so it's changed. it's not better or worse, just different."

Baseball was also a big community draw back in the day. With cable television still decades away from infiltrating our TV sets, town-team ball and Legion ball were must-see events in these parts, and Eaton has kept the kids in Wakefield busy and kept the community entertained – for a long, long time.

A lot has changed in the last 50 years, but one thing seems to stay the same: Eaton still enjoys putting on the uniform and helping young kids get better - not only in baseball, but in life.

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Re-Sustainability Fund (WSF) and has cost-share available for producers who have yet to install flow meters on their irrigation wells. All irrigation wells in the LENRD will need a district approved flow meter installed by Jan. 1, 2018.

To assist landowners with the sources District (LENRD) received expense of this requirement, the a grant from Nebraska's Water LENRD will provide financial support of \$500 per flow meter. It is important to note that landowners must first apply and be approved for reimbursement, prior to purchase and installation of the meter. Application for the flow meter cost-share can be completed by visiting your local Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) office and filling out the appropriate application forms. These requests are then forwarded to the LENRD for

> In addition, the LENRD will offer incentive payments of \$250 per flow meter to producers who are approved for the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) funding. The EQIP program is administered by NRCS and offers a host of incentives for irrigation water management.

> LENRD water resources manager, Brian Bruckner, said, "The deadline to have flow meters installed on all irrigation wells is Jan. 1, 2018. These incentives are available for producers who get signed up for the cost-share by June 30, 2017. The maximum payment that a producer can receive is \$5,000 per year for irrigation practices."

Nebraska's Natural Resources Commission approved nearly \$11.5 million in projects through the WSF, with \$900,000 being awarded to the LENRD for water and soil conservation. The LENRD will provide a match of \$600,000. This will allow the district to have \$1.5 million available for cost-share assistance on irrigation flow meters.

Groundwater levels continue to recover from drought of 2012

Each year, the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) collects static water levels from the irrigation wells in their observation well network. Conducted every year since the mid 1970's, the measurement of these wells provides a wealth of important data utilized by the LENRD to manage groundwater in northeast Nebraska. LENRD Water Resources Technician, Josh Schnitzler, said, "When we collect the water elevation data each spring, it allows us to determine the amount of recovery in the aquifer system from the previous year's irrigation season."

The spring 2016 groundwater level report shows that 84 percent of the wells measured rose from last year. In fact, 5 percent of the wells recorded their highest ever spring reading. One percent of the wells (2 of 234) recorded their lowest ever spring reading.

The LENRD's data shows that from 1975 to the present, groundwater elevation levels have generally remained fairly constant throughout the district. However, there have been several periods (typically following periods of drought) where groundwater levels have developed downward linear trends. Fortunately, those drought periods eased and we returned to more normal, or above normal, periods of precipitation. Groundwater elevations responded positively and supplies have improved.

LENRD Water Resources Manager Brian Bruckner, explains, "Yet while all of this information is important and valuable, it can sometimes be misleading. While it does offer us data to verify the amount of groundwater in storage it doesn't necessarily mean that all groundwater users will have sufficient amounts of groundwater if and when the demand peaks." Depending upon the location, the amount of recovery is somewhat delayed due to the physical properties that exist within the aquifer.

Schnitzler added, "When looking at the data that has been collected over the past four decades, the in-season demands that cause the water levels to drop substantially is what we are most concerned about. The geology of our district is very challenging."

LENRD General Manager Mike Sousek, said, "The groundwater resources that lie beneath our State are vast, but also vulnerable. Even small changes in groundwater levels can have profound impacts. Our water levels tend to bounce back in the spring, but that doesn't give us the full picture. There are in-season trends that need to be addressed, especially after the drought of 2012."

The LENRD currently has an observation well network of 240 wells across 15-counties in Northeast Nebraska.


