## City's new pool almost ready for opening day

While construction finishes up, the old city pool has seen a lot of action, especially during last week's hot and humid conditions.

The final touches are being made, the gushing fire hose is pouring in fresh water and all appears ready to go for the new aquatic center at the Wayne Community Activity Center.

Wayne city activity director Bryce Meyer told The Wayne Herald on Wednesday morning that he is cautiously optimistic the new pool could see its first swimmers within the next week or so.

"The state health inspector is scheduled to be here Friday, so we're hoping to get everything wrapped up this week before they get here," he said. "If we get the green light (on Friday), we'll need to move things down from the old pool so we could open up the first part of next week."

Original plans to open the pool for the start of the 2016 summer season were off by a few months as weather and construction delays pushed things back. Now, all that appeared left to do was to tie up a few loose ends and fill up the nearly 300,000-gallon pool to get it ready for swimmers to enjoy for a couple of weeks before the end of the summer season.

"The construction guys said they were hoping to be done with their stuff by the end of this week, and the pool inspector is scheduled to be here Friday, but if they can't make it then we'll probably see them early the following week," Meyer said. "With the fair going on this weekend, it would be tough for us to get help to move things down right away, so the earliest we'll open is the first part of next week."

Once the new pool is open, the old pool will remain for the time being. Meyer said he wanted to make sure everything checks out with the new pool before closing up shop in the 60-year old city pool for good.

"We're going to have the dog dive at the end of the year up there, so we won't fully drain it yet," he said. "If something were to happen here (at the new pool) then we'd have to keep that open."

Once the new pool is open to the public, current memberships will transfer to the new facility. Swimmers will walk down the hallway at the Wayne Community Activity Center to their respective locker rooms and check in and enter the pool through there.

"It will be nice to see the project finally completed," Meyer said. "We're looking forward to it."

## Opponents of death penalty hoping to educate voters here

Stating that "killing someone to show that killing is wrong doesn't make sense," Shujaa Graham shared his story of being on California's death row with approximately 25 people in attendance at a "Journey of Hope . . . from Violence to Healing" presentation in Wayne on Friday.

Journey of Hope, an organization led by murder victims' family members, death row exonerees, and the family members of death row inmates, was on a 10-day, 20-city caravan from July 15-24. Local stops included the Spirituality Center at Immaculata Monastery in Norfolk, First United Methodist Church in Wayne and Dakota City United Methodist Church in Dakota City.

Along with sharing their stories, Journey of Hope members are working to educate Nebraska voters on the death penalty issue that will be on the November general election ballot.

"Voters need to be informed and vote to retain the state's current repeal of the death penalty," said Bradley Christian, a UNO student who is working with Journey of Hope to educate Nebraskans on the death penalty issue.

"Growing up, I was told to 'leave a place better than I found it.' As I have gained knowledge on the death penalty, I realized it is a broken system and we could use the money for something else, such as law enforcement or making prisons safer. The death penalty has been used arbitrarily and there is the risk to the innocent," Christian said.

"Instead of the death penalty, make a life sentence mean life with no chance of parole. Life without parole is cheaper than the death penalty," he added.

He noted that voters need to be made aware that a vote to 'retain' will keep the

state's ban on the death penalty, while a vote to 'repeal' would do away with the ban on the death penalty and again allow the court system the option of ordering a criminal be put to death.

Shujaa Graham's biography states that the death row exoneree "grew up in the segregated South of the 1950s and later lived in southern California during the Watts Riots and an era of police occupation in his community. He spent his adolescence in

## Nitty Gritty Dirt Band continues 50 years of touring at County Fair

Few country or rock bands stay together for very long. And you can probably count, on two hands, the number that last more than 25 years.

The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band is celebrating their 50-year anniversary this year, and they'll be featured this Saturday evening at the 94th annual Wayne County Fair as part of their 50th Anniversary Tour.

Few bands have had success in different musical genres, but the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band has made a name for itself in pop, rock and country circles, starting with its formation in the spring of 1966 at a California gui-

tar shop as an effort to "figure out how not to have to work for a living."

Rock and Roll Hall of Fame member Jackson Browne was part of the original six-man band, and original members Jeff Hanna and Jimmie Fadden are still with the band all these years later.

The band first hit the Top 40 pop charts in 1967 with "Buy For Me The Rain" and made their first big national appearance later that year on The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson. They also served as an opening act for everybody from The Doors to legendary comedians Jack Benny and Bill Cosby, and had a part in the 1968 Clint Eastwood movie "Paint Your Wagon."

The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band is probably

best known for its 1970 Top 10 smash "Mr. Bojangles," a song that stayed on the Billboard Hot 100 charts for 36 consecutive weeks, a rarity at that point in the history of rock and roll music. They received their first Grammy nomination the following year with the recording of their classic three-album set, "Will The Circle Be Unbroken," which featured their first big country classic song, "I Saw The Light."

By the mid-1970's, the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band was one of the most popular music acts in the United States. They played at a rock festival in Missouri that drew more than a quarter-million fans, and also served as Aerosmith's opening act in 1974.

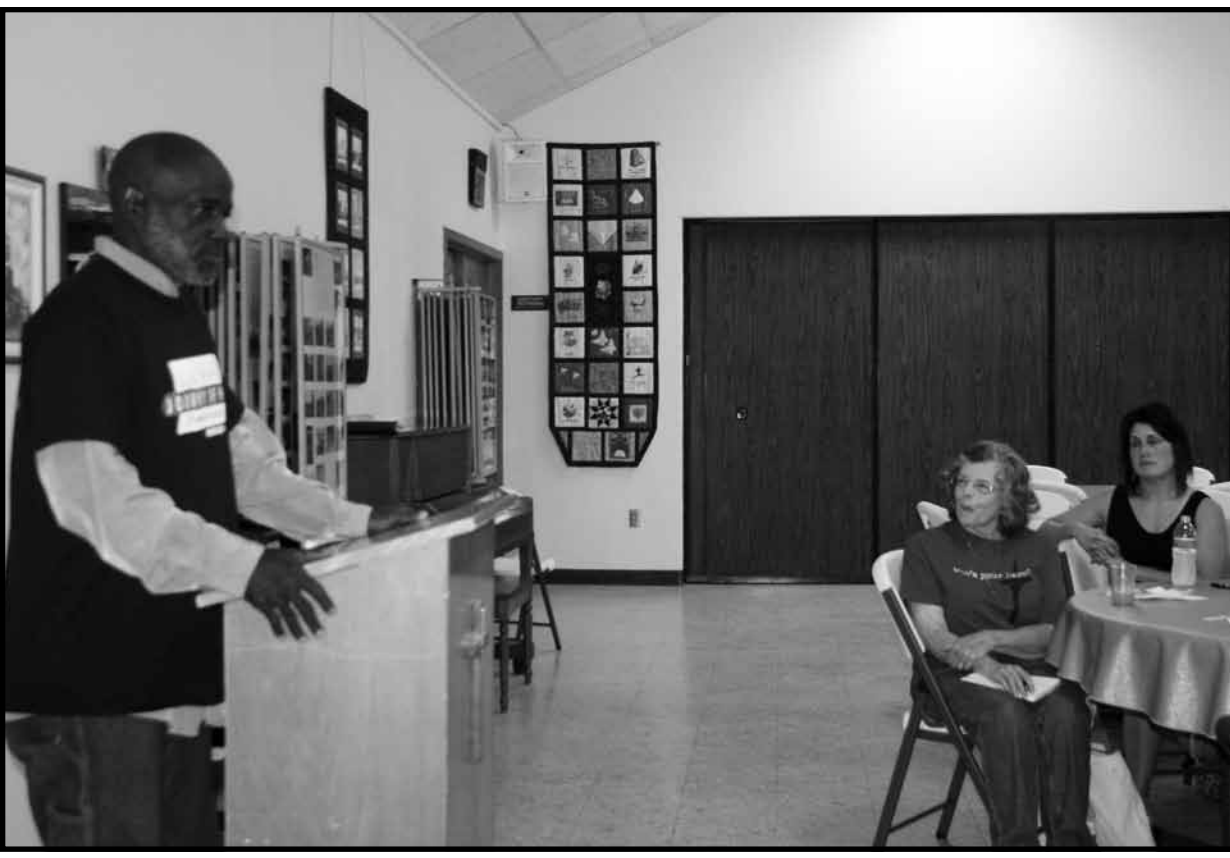

and out of trouble (arrested 30 times), and educated himself on how to read and write, as well as on history and world affairs, while in prison. After becoming a prominent prison leader and Black Panther activist, Shujaa was framed for the 1973 murder of a prison guard and was sentenced to die. His death sentence was overturned in 1979 and he was found innocent in 1981, but a recognition of racial biases that still permeate the justice system have motivated him to fight the death penalty and advocate for reform of the criminal justice system, declaring that, "I may never enjoy the fruits of this labor, but our children will."

"Even if a person is guilty, they are still a human being. Every day that I was in prison, I thought about capital punishment. I really can't explain what death row is like. I promised the other prisoners I would work to make it right. I worked to educate myself and worked to respect everyone's human rights," Graham said.

Graham said he also went to prison for "a good thing - I was arrested for protesting the death penalty. I believe we can have a secure society without vowing to kill it."

Accompanying Graham was SueZann Bosler, whose father was murdered by a robber on Dec. 22, 1986. She spent 10 1/2 years working to see that his murderer was sentenced to life in prison rather than being executed.

SueZann is a co-founder of Journey of Hope from Violence to Healing and has traveled all over the world since 1993. She noted that the organization is made up of people of all backgrounds, ages and beliefs. She told her Wayne audience her story of watching

her father, Rev. Billy Bosler, die in front of her after they were both stabbed by an intruder in their Florida home.

"My father was a minister in the Church of the Brethren, a 'peace church.' I was a pastor's kid and my dad and I had had a conversation about the death penalty and he told me that if something ever happened, he would not want his killer to be put to death," SueZann said.

In honor of her father and his moral opposition to capital punishment, SueZann spent years fighting against a death penalty sentence for James Bernard Campbell, her father's killer. She said that the court system would not listen to her family's wishes that her father's killer not be put to death. She nearly went to jail after expressing her views during the sentencing.

She spoke of forgiving her father's killer and said that until July 13, 1997 when he was sentenced to four consecutive life terms in prison, she could not move on with the healing process.

"People asked me if I forgave my father's killer and I said 'yes' for a long time. I said it with my mouth, but not with my heart. Forgiveness is not for the other person, it is for me."

"We all know the initials WWJD - What Would Jesus Do - but my question is Who Would Jesus execute?" SueZann said.

She encouraged her audience to learn as much as possible about both sides of the issue, including the five methods of execution, and offered suggestions on how to promote against the death penalty.

As she goes throughout the world sharing her story, she strives to live by the words of favorite lyric is "let there be peace on Earth, and let it begin with me."

Their music drew the interest of representatives of the old Soviet government, which selected them as the first American musical act to be allowed to tour the USSR. They spent a month in Russia and played to a television audience of 145 million while on the first of two trips to the Soviet Union (they would return there again in 1990).

The band continued to have success on the pop charts, hitting No. 13 on the Top 100 with "American Dream," a song they recorded with Linda Ronstadt on vocals. They also hit the Top 20 with their collaboration with Nicolette Larson on "Make A Little Magic," and also made a unique appearance on Saturday Night Live as the backing band for comedian Steve Martin's classic "King Tut." They played that

skit under the stage name The Toot Uncommons.

The band continued to have success in the 1980's and 1990's, with 17 consecutive songs reaching the Top 10 on the Billboard Country singles chart. They were part of the first Live Aid concert in 1984 and have received two Grammy Awards, collaborating with Irish folk band The Chieftans on "Another Country" and earning the Best Country Instrumental award in 2005 for "Earl's Breakdown."

The band's recording of "Will The Circle Be Unbroken" album has been recorded in the U.S. Library of Congress and the Grammy Hall of Fame, and the song "Mr. Bojangles" was registered in the Grammy Hall of Fame in 2010.

While the band has sold millions of albums and had countless hits

over the years, they are one of the few longtime bands that still tour relentlessly. Last fall, they recorded a sold-out concert at the Ryman Auditorium as part of a 50th anniversary special that aired on PBS earlier this spring, and their influence in country, rock and American Roots music is evident, even all these years later.

Saturday's concert is part of a variety of fun events that will take place in the grandstand at the Wayne County Fair. Grandstand activities start Thursday at 7:30 p.m. with the L.J. Jenkins Invitational Bullriding Tour, followed by the Lucas Oil Pro Pulling League tractor pull on Friday at 7 p.m. The fair concludes Sunday with the annual Demolition Derby at 5 p.m.

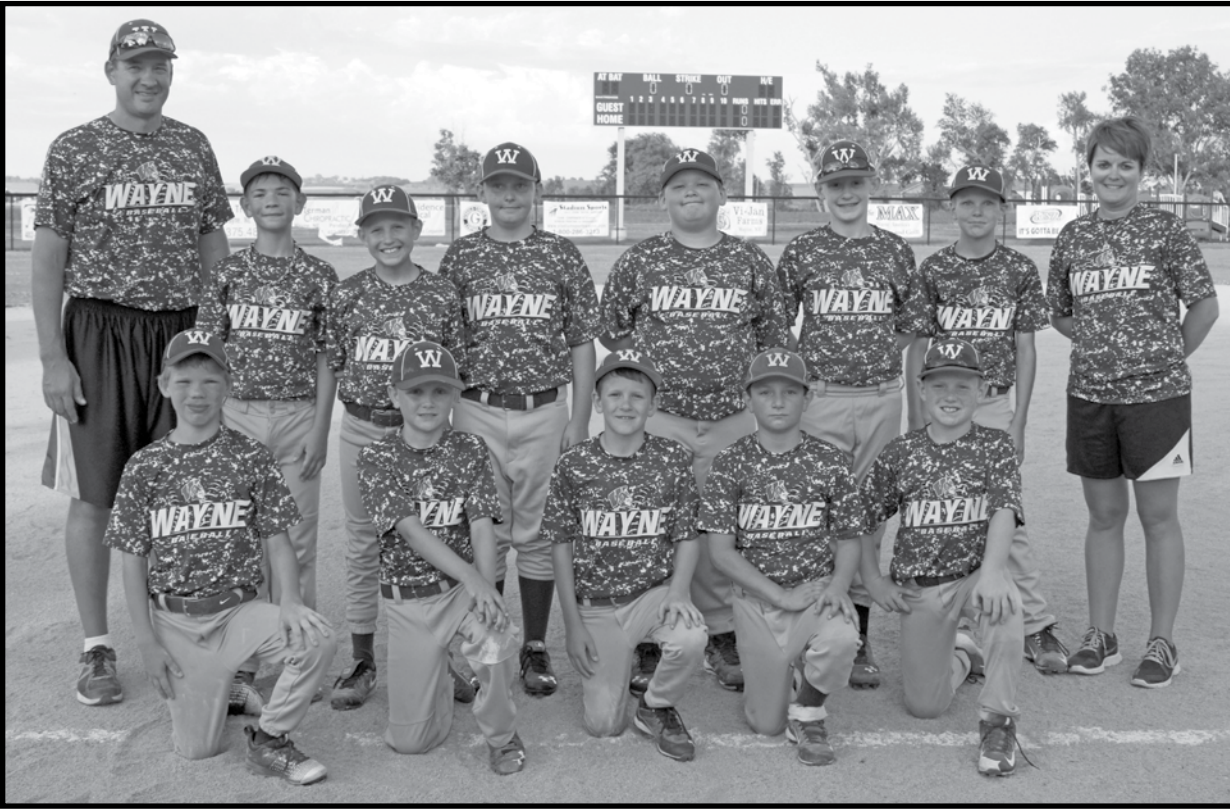

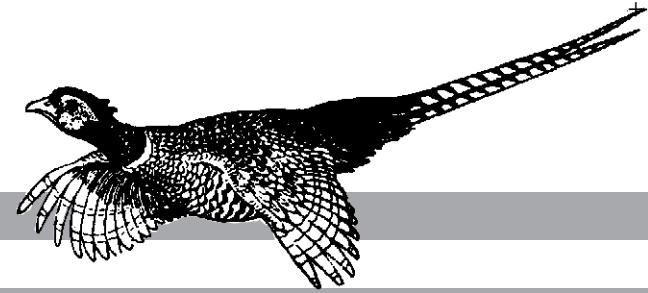

Among the locations were Park Haven Care Center and Embers Assisted Living in Coleridge, Hillcrest Care Center in Laurel and the Senior Citizen Center in Wayne.

At each location the students presented solos, duets and two groups performed two piano eight hands (Quartet) arrangements.

## Cost-share on flow meters are available

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) received a grant from Nebraska's Water Sustainability Fund (WSF) and has cost-share available for producers who have yet to install flow meters on their irrigation wells. All irrigation wells in the LENRD will need a district approved flow meter installed by Jan. 1, 2018.

To assist landowners with the expense of this requirement, the LENRD will provide financial support of \$500 per flow meter. It is important to note that landowners must first apply and be approved for reimbursement, prior to purchase and installation of the meter. Application for the flow meter cost-share can be completed by visiting your local Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) office and filling out the appropriate application forms. These requests are then forwarded to the LENRD for processing.

In addition, the LENRD will offer incentive payments of \$250 per flow meter to producers who are approved for the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) funding. The EQIP program is administered by NRCS and offers a host of incentives for irrigation water management.

LENRD water resources manager, Brian Bruckner, said, "The deadline to have flow meters installed on all irrigation wells is Jan. 1, 2018. These incentives are available for producers who get signed up for the cost-share by June 30, 2017. The maximum payment that a producer can receive is \$5,000 per year for irrigation practices."

Nebraska's Natural Resources Commission approved nearly \$11.5 million in projects through the WSF, with \$900,000 being awarded to the LENRD for water and soil conservation. The LENRD will provide a match of \$600,000. This will allow the district to have \$1.5 million available for cost-share assistance on irrigation flow meters.

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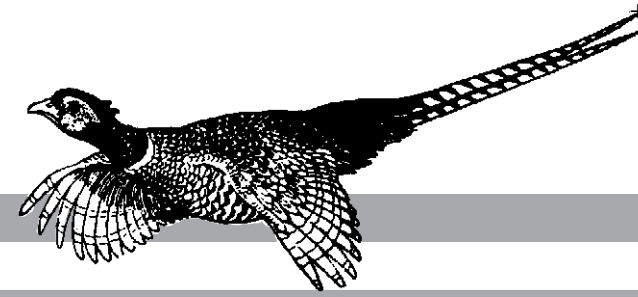

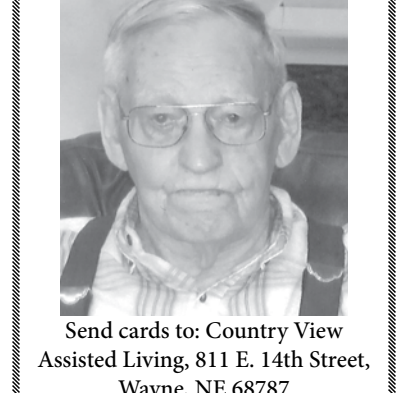

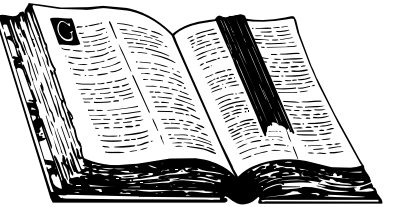

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# You don't know which way the wind blows

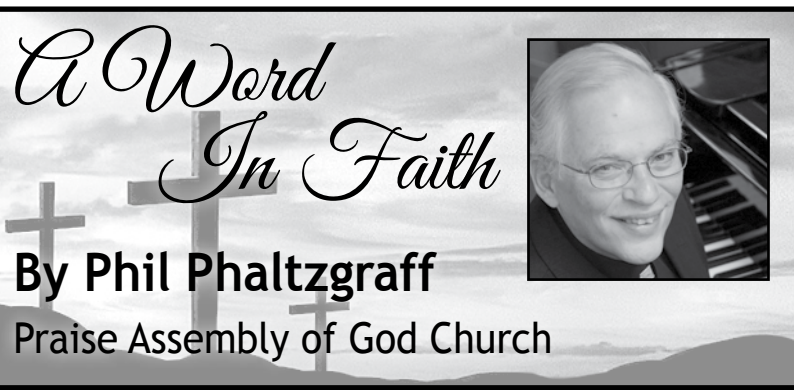
Those who know me are aware that I am "directionally challenged." I remember the early days after my Sherry and I moved here from Michigan (August, 2008), and I got confused by the intersection of highway 35 and 15. It's going to sound goofy, but I used to head NORTH on 15 to find Pac 'n Save (which is west on 35). Get the picture? Sherry just seems to have a built-in GPS (maybe I should find a way to clone her voice instead of "Siri" on my phone). What a hoot!

I even find it difficult to determine the direction of a summer breeze. Looking at the clouds or the flags makes no sense to me. As I am writing this, we are in Oregon City, OR, visiting our son and his family (which now includes six-week-old Henrik, the newest "Pfaltzgraff" to join the ranks). We visited Multnomah Falls yesterday (Sunday) along the Willamette River - and felt the strong winds as we got out of the car to take in the sights.

We don't need to have multiple collegiate degrees in order to ascertain that a stiff wind is blowing in these times.

And - just like Jesus said to Nicodemus (in John 3) in their evening Q & A conversation together - spiritually-speaking, we don't readily know how the wind of God (called the Holy Spirit) blows in our lives. But we need to be attentive to discern that something's going on.

Our families need this. Our churches need this. Our co-workers need this. Our nation needs this. We need to see clearly.



Things are always demanding adjustments in our senses as we live this side of heaven. On the way over to the Falls Sunday, I thought of some scriptures as I took in the grand beauty of the Pacific Northwest. Psalm 19 says that "the heavens declare the glory of God and the firmament shows His handiwork"; Romans 1:20-22 tells us that people who want to deny God are without excuse because all nature points to the fact that "God is!"; and Psalm 8 speaks of a man who takes note of the wonders of creation and asks a very serious question: "What is man that Thou art mindful of him?" This is an interesting question for progressive, contemporary thinkers to ponder, because we are coached at every point to affirm "how great I am" when actually the exclamation should be to echo - in the words of the Stuart Hine classic - "How Great Thou Art!"

We just need to see clearly.

As I write this article, we are bracing for another week of politi-

cal convention coverage. And by the time it is printed in the paper, we will have either had enough or will be clamoring for "More! More!" One observation (I'm trying to be a political right now) is that I'm aware that some of the same phrases are being used in the preparations for this convention as we heard last week. The same warnings and prognostications are being declared. Makes me wonder if we will be any wiser by Thursday evening.

We just need to see clearly. Barbra Streisand used to sing "On a clear day you can see forever . . ." I wish it was that easy. All we would need would be a cloudless sky. But in the hour in which we live, it's going to take a lot more than a good weather report to help us determine the winds that are blowing in the lives of people - no matter where we live.

Proverbs 3:5 warns us not to lean on our own understanding - but to trust in the Lord with ALL our hearts. One of the tenets of the old

Jewish Law (cited also by Jesus) was to "love the Lord thy God with all your heart and soul and mind and strength" (Matthew 22:37). Psalm 119:165 assures us that "Great peace have they which love Thy law; and nothing will offend them or make them stumble."

If it required volume or education to find out what's really going on, what would that say about scriptures that say just the opposite? "Night unto night pours forth knowledge" (Psalm 19:2) Or Jesus' admonition (Matthew 6:28) to "consider the lilies . . . or the sparrows . . . because they toil not nor spin."

There is much to be gained from listening, waiting and watching. Psalm 37:7: "Be still before the LORD and wait patiently for him; fret not yourself over the one who prospers in his way, over the man who carries out evil devices!"

We need to just be still. Why? Because answers don't necessarily come from the loudest voice, the most articulate speaker, nor the complexity of the narrative.

Nancy Honeytree (a "contemporary" Christian singer from a generation ago) had a wonderfully imaginative and gentle song that went like this: "I will sing a simple song; it's meaning will be clear, and you'll never have to wonder when I'm far away from here just where I am coming from and where I take my stand: beneath the cross of Jesus, holding to the nail-scarred hands."

I think that's the place where we can most clearly see and hear.

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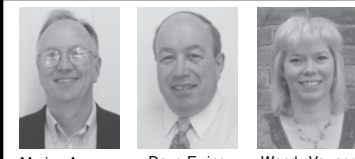
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# Dixon County 4-Hers take part in horse shows

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# FSA County Committee nomination period in Wayne County now open

The nomination period for the Wayne FSA county committee began on June 15, and nomination forms must be postmarked or received in the Wayne County FSA Office by close of business on Monday, Aug. 1.

County Committees are unique to FSA and allow producers to have a voice on federal farm program implementation at the local level.

To be eligible to serve on the FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in an agency administered program, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the Local Administrative Area (LAA) where they are nominated. All producers, including women, minority and beginning farmers and ranchers are encouraged to participate in the nomination and election process.

This year, nominations and elections will be held in LAA 1, which includes Sherman, Deer Creek, Wilber and Strahan townships.

Producers may nominate them-

selves or others as candidates. Organizations representing minority and women farmers and ranchers may also nominate candidates. To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign form FSA-669A. The form and more information about county committee elections is available online at: www.fsa.usda.gov/elections or at the FSA office.

Elected county committee members serve a three-year term and are responsible for making decisions on FSA disaster, conservation, commodity and price support programs, as well as other important federal farm program issues. The Wayne County committee consists of three members.

FSA will mail election ballots to eligible voters beginning Nov. 7. Ballots are due back in the Wayne County Office by mail or in person no later than Dec. 5, 2016. All newly elected county committee members and alternates will take office January 1, 2017.

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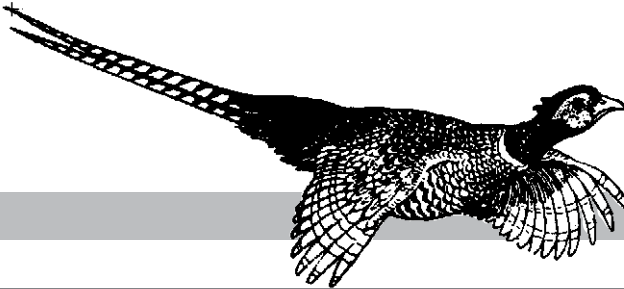
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## Musical weekend is enjoyable

### Groundwater levels continue to recover from drought of 2012

Each year, the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) collects static water levels from the irrigation wells in their observation well network. Conducted every year since the mid 1970's, the measurement of these wells provides a wealth of important data utilized by the LENRD to manage groundwater in northeast Nebraska. LENRD Water Resources Technician, Josh Schnitzler, said, "When we collect the water elevation data each spring, it allows us to determine the amount of recovery in the aquifer system from the previous year's irrigation season."

The spring 2016 groundwater level report shows that 84 percent of the wells measured rose from last year. In fact, 5 percent of the wells recorded their highest ever spring reading. One percent of the wells (2 of 234) recorded their lowest ever spring reading.

The LENRD's data shows that from 1975 to the present, groundwater elevation levels have generally remained fairly constant throughout the district. However, there have been several periods (typically following periods of drought) where groundwater levels have developed downward linear trends. Fortunately, those drought periods eased and we returned to more normal, or above normal, periods of precipitation. Groundwater elevations responded positively and supplies have improved.

LENRD Water Resources Manager Brian Bruckner, explains, "Yet while all of this information is important and valuable, it can sometimes be misleading. While it does offer us data to verify the amount of groundwater in storage it doesn't necessarily mean that all groundwater users will have sufficient amounts of groundwater if and when the demand peaks." Depending upon the location, the amount of recovery is somewhat delayed due to the physical properties that exist within the aquifer.

Schnitzler added, "When looking at the data that has been collected over the past four decades, the in-season demands that cause the water levels to drop substantially is what we are most concerned about. The geology of our district is very challenging."

LENRD General Manager Mike Sousek, said, "The groundwater resources that lie beneath our State are vast, but also vulnerable. Even small changes in groundwater levels can have profound impacts. Our water levels tend to bounce back in the spring, but that doesn't give us the full picture. There are in-season trends that need to be addressed, especially after the drought of 2012."

The LENRD currently has an observation well network of 240 wells across 15-counties in Northeast Nebraska.

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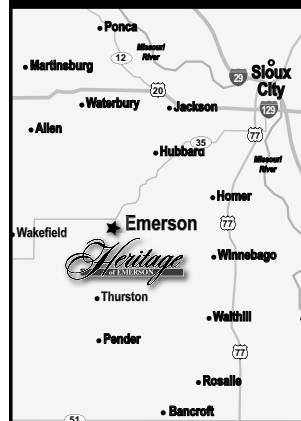
