Following a public hearing, the Wayne Community Schools' Board of Education approved the budget for the coming school

Superintendent Mark Lenihan presented numbers for the total budget, General Fund, tax asking and district levy.

Lenihan said that there is an increase of \$459,00 in the tax asking, mainly due to an increase in the amount the district is putting into the Building Fund.

This past Sunday marked the 15th year since the attack of 9/11 on

At Wayne State College an event was held at the Willow Bowl to commemorate and educate about the events that took place and people that were lost on 9/11. The event was held at 4 p.m. and ended around 4 p.m. with around 50 individuals filling the Willow Bowl for the 9/11 Memorial

Lisa Nelson, Director of Service Learning began the service by welcoming all individuals to the Willow Bowl, welcoming the Wayne Boy Scouts to present the flag, and afterwards introducing WSC president Marysz Rames to present the opening comments.

"It's important for our country, our state, our community and our college to come together to remember, and never forget the tragedy of 9/11," Rames said. "What I think is most important however, is to reflect on the feelings and emotions one felt as that day progressed and the following days went on."

Rames spoke about what she remembers about that day, and how

that day impacted so many people in our country.

Once Rames was done speaking, the Wayne State College Madrigals and Philip Pfaltzgraff sang "America the Beautiful."

Dr. Eric Colvard then explained the history of 9/11 followed by Dr.

Susan Ellis explaining the cultural clarity of this event. Quinneka Lee then gave a poetry reading entitled "List of 'Don't Forgets' and 'Remembers' which was written by students in New York. Colvard and Ellis next played "This Land is Your Land" as a guitar

duo, singing the lyrics and asking for audience participation.

Afterwards, Nelson took the stage one more time for some closing comments and recognitions. Some of these comments included asking students to write down what they remembered about that day so they could be displayed in the Student Center.

After these final comments there was a moment of silence, then ended with two trumpeters playing taps.

Emma Anna Selma Willers was born to Frank and Friedericke (Wurster) Dangberg on Oct. 5, 1917 on the family farm 1 1/2 miles south of Winside. She was baptized Oct. 27, 1917 at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Winside by Pastor Julius Frick. She was confirmed at St. Paul's on Palm Sunday, May 29, 1931 by Pastor H. M. Hilpert. Emma was a 1936 graduate of Winside High School and attended Wayne State College and Norfolk Junior College. She taught in rural schools in Stanton and Wayne counties, and also at Grant Elementary School

in Norfolk. On March 23, 1939 she married Louis Willers of Pilger at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Winside. They made their home on the Dangberg family farm where she was born, and were involved in farming and cattle feeding. In 1979 they retired and moved to Winside. They wintered in McAllen, Texas, for many years and following her husband's death in 1993, Emma spent several winters in Phoenix, Ariz.

Emma previously resided at The Oaks Senior Living Community at Wayne for eight years and most recently at Heritage of Bel Air in Norfolk, since 2012. She was a past member of the Wayne Country Club bridge group, past president of the St. Paul's Ladies Aid, and taught Sunday school for some 30 years.

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
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NDA announces winners in poultry calendar photo contest

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
Prepare for Veterinary Feed Directive

You will have heard and will likely hear more of this before January 1st, but Nebraska beef cattle producers should begin preparing for the Jan. 1, 2017, implementation of the Veterinary Feed Directive regulations, according to Rob Eirich, Nebraska beef quality assurance director with Nebraska Extension. The regulations will be implemented by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and will require producers to work directly with their veterinarian when they use feed-grade antibiotics with all food-producing

A Veterinary Feed Directive is a paper or electronic written order by a licensed veterinarian approving the use of a feed-grade antibiotic for the prevention, treatment or control of a diagnosed disease. The regulations will apply only to antibiotics in livestock feed and will not affect feed-use medications such as ionophores, coccidia, other parasite and insect control drugs, or reproductive control medications. They also will not apply to antibiotics administered by injection.

The first step producers should complete before January is to develop a valid Veterinarian Client Patient Relationship, which includes an operation site visit and discussion about herd health. A complete herd health plan should be created for vaccination and treatment protocols during this discussion.

Producers must look at their operation production calendar to de-



termine what health risks they may encounter over the course of the year, how to prevent the risks look at alternatives to help reduce animal health risk, such as mineral programs or probiotic additives.

Another key point for producers to understand is that the regulations allow no extra-label use of medicated feeds. These regulations will also be enforced more within the livestock industry. Directive products can only be used for prevention, treatment or control of diseases indicated on the FDA Approved Labels.

All feed manufacturers have submitted new labels removing all performance improvement claims and adding the new regulation requirements. 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
