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Budget, land exchange on school board agenda

Following a public hearing, the Wayne Community Schools' Board of Education approved the budget for the coming school year.

Superintendent Mark Lenihan presented numbers for the total budget, General Fund, tax asking and district levy.

Lenihan said that there is an increase of \$459,00 in the tax asking, mainly due to an increase in the amount the district is putting into the Building Fund.

"The General Fund asking is actually lower than it was last year. However, because we need to make improvements in several areas within the school, we needed

to add money to the building fund," Lenihan said.

He went on to explain the amount of money earmarked for cash reserves and the fact that the district has approximately eight years left to pay on construction bonds from previous building projects.

The total levy for the district for the coming year is \$1.1273, which includes the General Fund, Bond Fund, Building Fund and Qualified Capitol Projects Fund.

Board members extended a thank you to Lenihan, Rochelle Nelson and Diane Peters for their work over the last four months on the budget.

In other action, the board discussed a land exchange between the City of Wayne

and Wayne Community Schools.

The land is located on Fifth Street, near where the former Elementary School was located and in the vicinity of the Community Activity Center.

Discussion was held, with board members noting they would prefer the traffic in the area being one-way.

Superintendent Lenihan and Eric Knutsen, the school's attorney, will continue to work with the city on the details of the exchange.

The board approved several changes in the bus route stops.

It was noted that the present stop at

Northeast named among ten finalists for Aspen Prize for community college excellence

Dr. Michael Chipps often says that Northeast Community College is one of the best rural community colleges in the United States. Now the president of the institution based in Norfolk, has additional documentation to support that claim.

Northeast was named this week as one of ten finalists for the 2017 Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence, the nation's preeminent recognition of high achievement and performance in America's community colleges.

Northeast now enters the last stage of the competition for the \$1 million prize fund that will be awarded in March 2017, in Washington, D.C. to the winner and up to four finalists with distinction.

"We were so pleased to be included in Aspen's Top 150," Chipps said. "Now to be included in the Top Ten is outstanding, not just for the college, but most importantly for our amazing students and outstanding faculty and staff! This recognition is reflective of the incredible work that goes on at Northeast each and every day."

The Prize has been awarded every two years since 2011 by the Aspen Institute, a Washington, DC-based educational and policy studies organization which recognizes

outstanding institutions selected from an original pool of more than 1,000 public community colleges nationwide.

The focus of the Prize is assessing community colleges' achievements in terms of student success in four areas: student learning, certificate and degree completion, employment and earnings for graduates, and access and success for minority and low-income students.

"Northeast Community College utilizes data in some truly innovative ways, particularly to shape its curriculum to reflect job market needs," said Joshua Wyner, executive director of the Aspen Institute's College Excellence Program in Washington, D.C. "By using labor market statistics to inform new and existing programs, they're responding to the needs of the region and training students with the skills needed for well-paying, in-demand jobs."

The Aspen Institute selected Northeast as of the nation's top community colleges for many reasons, including:

- A 60 percent three-year graduation/transfer rate, well above the national average of 39 percent

In response to student feedback, a complete redesign of its academic advising pro-

gram, including intensive faculty training and plans to shift to a team advising structure comprised of both first-year advisors and program faculty with mandatory advising;

- 99 percent of its students are employed or continuing their education within six months after graduation;

- 85 percent of surveyed employers are satisfied with the skills of graduates they have employed

Chipps said, "There are so many community colleges who serve a diverse student body very well. However, there are definitive measures that the Top Ten community colleges have in common to better assure student success. Northeast Community College, in particular, is so intent, so passionate inside and outside of the classroom to create an environment where students don't have a choice but to succeed."

This fall, the Aspen Institute will conduct site visits to each of the ten finalist institutions. Following a rigorous review process, a distinguished Prize Jury of higher education experts will select a grand prize winner and finalists with distinction.

Memorial held to remember the events of Sept. 11, 2001

This past Sunday marked the 15th year since the attack of 9/11 on the twin towers.

At Wayne State College an event was held at the Willow Bowl to commemorate and educate about the events that took place and people that were lost on 9/11. The event was held at 4 p.m. and ended around 4 p.m. with around 50 individuals filling the Willow Bowl for the 9/11 Memorial.

Lisa Nelson, Director of Service Learning began the service by welcoming all individuals to the Willow Bowl, welcoming the Wayne Boy Scouts to present the flag, and afterwards introducing WSC president Marysz Rames to present the opening comments.

"It's important for our country, our state, our community and our college to come together to remember, and never forget the tragedy of 9/11," Rames said. "What I think is most important however, is to reflect on the feelings and emotions one felt as that day progressed and the following days went on."

Rames spoke about what she remembers about that day, and how

that day impacted so many people in our country.

Once Rames was done speaking, the Wayne State College Madrigals and Philip Pfaltzgraff sang "America the Beautiful."

Dr. Eric Colvard then explained the history of 9/11 followed by Dr. Susan Ellis explaining the cultural clarity of this event.

Quinneke Lee then gave a poetry reading entitled "List of 'Don't Forgets' and 'Remembers' which was written by students in New York."

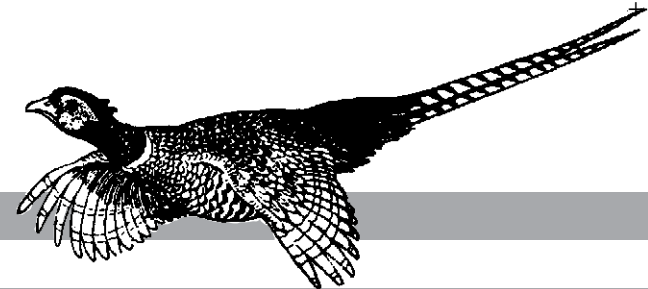
Colvard and Ellis next played "This Land is Your Land" as a guitar duo, singing the lyrics and asking for audience participation.

Afterwards, Nelson took the stage one more time for some closing comments and recognitions. Some of these comments included asking students to write down what they remembered about that day so they could be displayed in the Student Center.

After these final comments there was a moment of silence, then ended with two trumpeters playing taps.

Emma Willers, 98, of Norfolk, formerly of Wayne, died Sunday, Sept. 11, 2016 at Heritage of Bel Air in Norfolk.

Services were held Wednesday, Sept. 14 at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Winside. The Rev. Harrison Goodman officiated. Burial was in Pleasant View Cemetery in Winside.

Emma Anna Selma Willers was born to Frank and Friederike (Wurster) Dangberg on Oct. 5, 1917 on the family farm 1 1/2 miles south of Winside. She was baptized Oct. 27, 1917 at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Winside by Pastor Julius Frick. She was confirmed at St. Paul's on Palm Sunday, May 29, 1931 by Pastor H. M. Hilpert. Emma was a 1936 graduate of Winside High School and attended Wayne State College and Norfolk Junior College. She taught in rural schools



in Stanton and Wayne counties, and also at Grant Elementary School in Norfolk. On March 23, 1939 she married Louis Willers of Pilger at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Winside. They made their home on the Dangberg family farm where she was born, and were involved in farming and cattle feeding. In 1979 they retired and moved to Winside. They wintered in McAllen, Texas, for many years and following her husband's death in 1993, Emma spent several winters in Phoenix, Ariz.

Emma previously resided at The Oaks Senior Living Community at Wayne for eight years and most recently at Heritage of Bel Air in Norfolk, since 2012. She was a past member of the Wayne Country Club bridge group, past president of the St. Paul's Ladies Aid, and taught Sunday school for some 30 years.

Survivors include son, Bill and Miriam Willers of Norfolk, daughter, Yvonne and Richard Stone of Land O'Lakes, Wisc., and daughter-in-law, Norma (Pat) Willers of Maben, Miss; sisters, Marian Hubble of Sun City West, Ariz., and Elsie Good of Surprise, Ariz.; eight grandchildren; 13 great-grandchildren; nieces, nephews and friends.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Louis Willers; her son, Dwayne Willers; parents; sisters, Freda Herren, Anna Friedrich and Irene Kant; and three brothers in infancy.

Chris White discusses water project at WSC

Chris White, WSC alumnus, discussed how he provided clean drinking water for people across the world during his presentation, "Quenching Thirst in Arizona and Building Water Towers in Cambodia."

The presentation was in Gardner Auditorium on the WSC campus on Sept. 12.

White '96 majored in geo-studies and minored in biology at Wayne State. He talked about how Wayne State gave him the leadership tools, well-rounded education and communication skills needed to achieve his goals. His talk included an exploration of how he grew White Water from one employee to 50 and transferred a home-based business to an operation with six lines and more than 10 delivery trucks.

White also discussed his trip to Cambodia and the importance of philanthropy.

White is the founder and owner of White Water bottled water in Phoenix. He started White Water in December 2001 out of a guest bedroom with only one employee. White Water occupies 50,000 square feet of warehouse, six bottling lines and nearly 50 employees. It is one of the largest privately-owned bottled water companies in the Southwest.

White Water partnered with one of its clients, Planet Water, to install water towers in remote villages that had never had clean drinking water. White was accompanied to Cambodia by his wife and said it was "an incredible experience."

NENCAP's Immunization Program provides childhood immunizations to VFC eligible children. Immunizations are needed at ages 2 months, 4 months, 6 months, & 12-15 months. School required immunizations are needed prior to entry into kindergarten (ages 4-6) and seventh grade. Lead screening is also available by appointment only to children ages 12 months to 5 years of age.

Each child should be accompanied by the parent or guardian. Past immunization records are required. Proxy forms are needed when a parent or legal guardian is unable to accompany the child to clinic. Proxy forms may be obtained by contacting the Pender office at (402) 385-6300. No one will be denied immunizations for inability to make a donation.

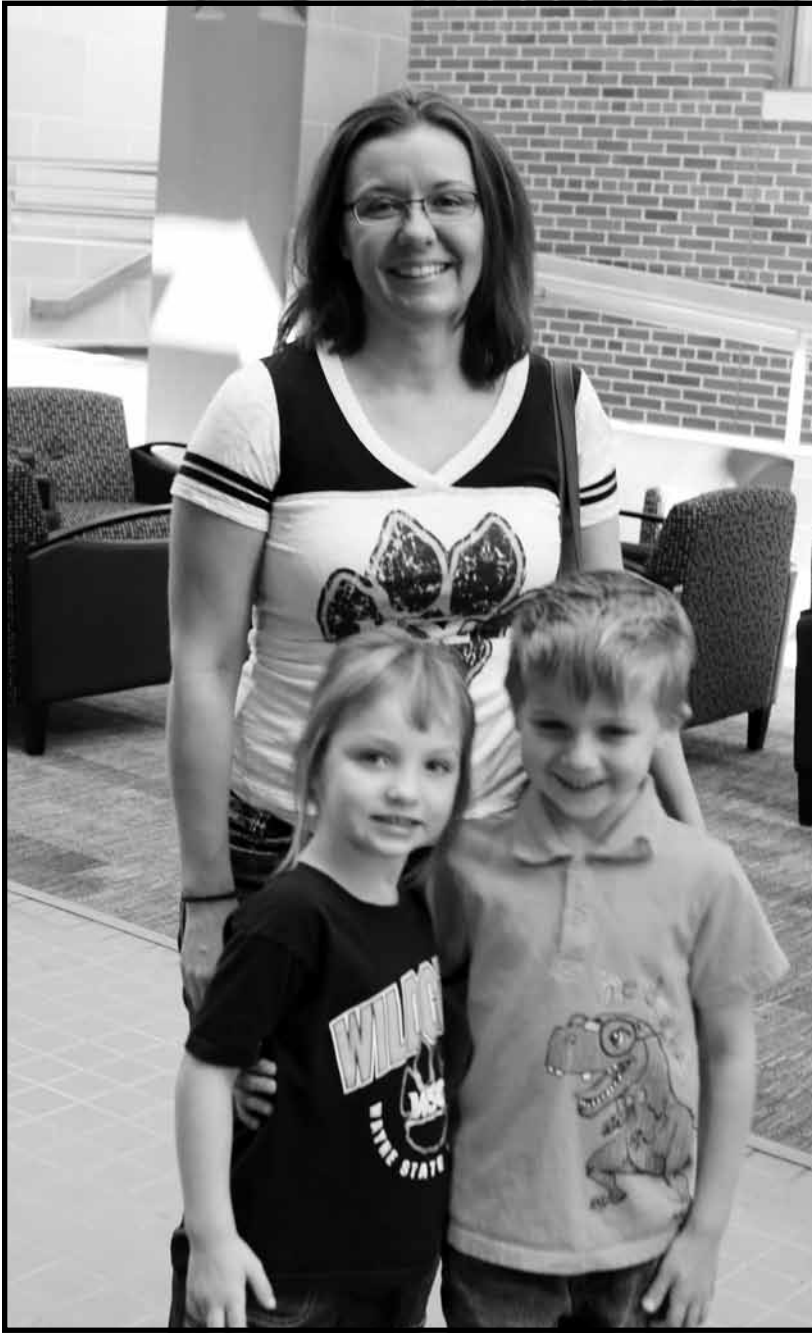


Pet of the Week

the Bus Barn on Lincoln Street is not being used and will be eliminated. It was also noted that two stops will be made along Providence Road - one on the west side of the street and the other at the Sunnyview Park Shelter.

Superintendent Lenihan presented enrollment numbers for the district. He noted that at the present time there are 911 students enrolled pre-K through 12th grade.

Dr. Lindsay McLaughlin, Wayne Community Schools Foundation Director, told the board that the recent Gift-A-Thon raised just over \$25,000 for the district. She said the Blitz Night went well, with students enjoying the evening. Donations are still coming in toward the

event.

Board member Dr. Jeryl Nelson, representing the Negotiations Committee, told the board that the district comparability study has been received, with the Wayne Community Schools significantly above average. Nelson said the main reason for this was due to increases in the cost of health insurance for the teachers.

"Insurance is a big issue for the district. It costs over \$1 million per year for teachers alone in our district," Nelson said.

The district has switched to a two-year negotiation system and will continue to do traditional negotiations. A meeting between the district and the teachers will need to take place by Nov. 1.

During Monday's meeting, the district accepted a check for \$3,000 from the Wayne Rotary Club.

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Strong defense helps Wildcats tie Vikings

Two Northern Sun Conference Women's Soccer Players of the Week help the Wildcat soccer team tie top ranked Augustana University 1-1 in last Friday's contest.

Wayne State College seniors Kylie Comba and Kelsey Engstrom were awarded Players of the Week on Monday afternoon after the players defense helped the Lady 'Cats improve its record to 3-0-1, the best record the soccer department has had since 2001.

Comba, a senior goalkeeper from Millard South High School, was also named NSIC Goalkeeper of the Week after helping the Wildcats to two shutouts last week. Comba's 11 saves against the Vikings helped her post an impressive 0.31 goals against average for the start of the season.

Comba was also credited with 20 saves in the past three matches, earning her a .952 save percentage.

"Receiving NSIC Goalkeeper of the Week made me feel blessed," Comba said. "To be recognized for my hard work is an honor."

Engstrom is a defender and midfielder for the Wildcats. She anchored WSC's defense last week, which allowed one goal while facing 50 shots. In the first games of the season, Engstrom ranks second on the team in shots (7) and shots on goal (5) and has one assist.

In last week's game, WSC's tough defense held last year's NSIC tournament champions to a single goal. The Wildcats are now 0-0-1 in the league play while the Vikings are now 0-0-1.

The Vikings scored first against the Wildcats, scoring at the 19:00 mark from Samantha Tymkowitz to put Augustana in front 1-0.

Wayne State tied the score up at the 30:24 mark when sophomore Carys Hund with an assist from Hannah Knight to make the score 1-1 to end an action packed first half.

The Wildcats were outshot by Augustana 12-4 in the second period, as well as 3-0 in the first overtime, but both teams had three shots in the second overtime.

"[Winning the first games of the season] definitely puts pressure on the team to hold that standard, and

motivates us to keep upholding it," Comba said. "But we mostly push that out of our minds so we can stay focused."

After the tie with the Vikings, WSC is now ranked ninth in this week's NSCAA (National Soccer Coaches Association of America) Division II Central Region poll, which was released Tuesday afternoon. The poll is voted on by the coaches in the Central Region.

Central Missouri, Fort Hays State and Winona State all remain the top three teams in the region. Bemidji

State and Wayne State are eighth and ninth and were previously not ranked in the region, while after the tie, Augustana dropped from fourth to 10th in this week's rankings.

"I have positive vibes for the rest of the season," Comba said. "It's going to be a great season, as well as a battle to achieve our goals for the year."

The Wildcats travel to North Dakota to go head-to-head against the University of Mary on Saturday and Minot State on Sunday. Both games will be played at 1 p.m.

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
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Wayne County 4-H projects judged at State Fair Legal

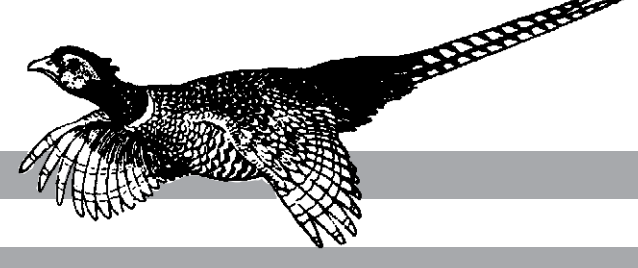

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners meeting was called to order by Chairman Larson at 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday, September 6, 2016, in the upstairs conference room of the Courthouse. Chairman Larson, Members Burbach and Rabe, Attorney Pieper, Sheriff Dwinell, and Clerk Finn were present. Notice of this meeting was published in the Wayne Herald, a legal newspaper, on August 18, 2016. A current copy of the Open Meetings Act was in the meeting room and accessible to the public.

Larson presented the following consent agenda items:

- Approve minutes of August 16, 2016, meeting as printed in the Commissioners Record
- Approve fee reports
- Approve payroll
- Accept and place on file the Personal Taxes to be Stricken from Tax List report
- Accept and place on file the Distress Warrant Certification Return dated Aug 31, 2016. Forty-eight warrants were issued totaling \$28,400.45; twenty-one warrants totaling \$11,617.29 were returned paid
- Approve Deano's Drive-in's application for a Special Designated Liquor License for a dance on October 8th at the Fairgrounds Commercial Building
- Accept and place on file personal property inventories submitted by county officials

A motion to approve the consent agenda was made by Burbach and seconded by Rabe. Roll call vote: Burbach, Rabe, Larson - aye; motion carried.

A motion to approve the regular agenda was made by Rabe and seconded by Burbach. Roll call vote: Rabe, Burbach, Larson - aye; motion carried.

Ray and Jody Kingsley expressed concerns that the county maintainer continues to cut into the end of their driveway instead of lifting the blade when maintaining past their place. Kingsley stated he used asphalt grindings to fill a 6" deep cut between his drive and the road, and in less than a year at least 1/3 of that material has been cut away. The cause was disputed, but Kingsley and Burbach agreed the road needs to be built up, and ditches cleaned out so the water would run down the ditch. Kingsley encouraged Burbach to work with the landowners.

Road/Bridge Project Manager Mark Casey updated the board on projects. Bids will be opened on September 20th for Hoskins North Project C-90(589) and Carroll Northwest Project C-90(629).

Gene Lutt expressed his concerns with the proposed budget stating the increase is minor, but is still not justified at this time. Lutt noted that the state is reducing their spending and the county should also.

Representatives of In God We Trust - America, Inc. are traveling the United States encouraging counties to post the country's national motto, "In God We Trust," in their courthouses. Barb Otto explained that the motto was adopted by the US Congress in 1956, and reaffirmed in 2011. Otto reported she had already visited twenty-three counties in Nebraska and all boards had agreed to post the motto. A motion was made by Rabe and second by Burbach to approve Resolution No. 2016-24. Roll call vote: Rabe, Burbach, Larson - aye; motion carried.

Resolution No. 16-24: "A Resolution of the County of Wayne, NE, supporting the display of the national motto "In God We Trust" in a prominent location in the Wayne County Courthouse.

Whereas, "In God We Trust" became the United States national motto on July 30, 1956, shortly after our nation led the world through the trauma of World War II; and

Whereas, the words have been used on U.S. currency since 1864; and

Whereas, the same inspiring slogan is engraved above the entrance to the Senate Chamber as well above the Speaker's dais in the House of Representatives; and

Whereas, in both war and peace, these words have been a profound source of strength and guidance to many generations of Americans; and

Whereas, the County desires to display this patriotic motto in the Court House as a way to solemnize public occasions and express confidence in our society.

Now, therefore, be it resolved the Commissioners of Wayne County do hereby resolve as follows:

Section 1. That the County of Wayne, NE does hereby determine that the historic and patriotic words of our national motto, "In God We Trust," shall be permanently and prominently displayed in the Wayne County Courthouse.

Section 2. The County Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this resolution and enter it into the book of original resolutions.

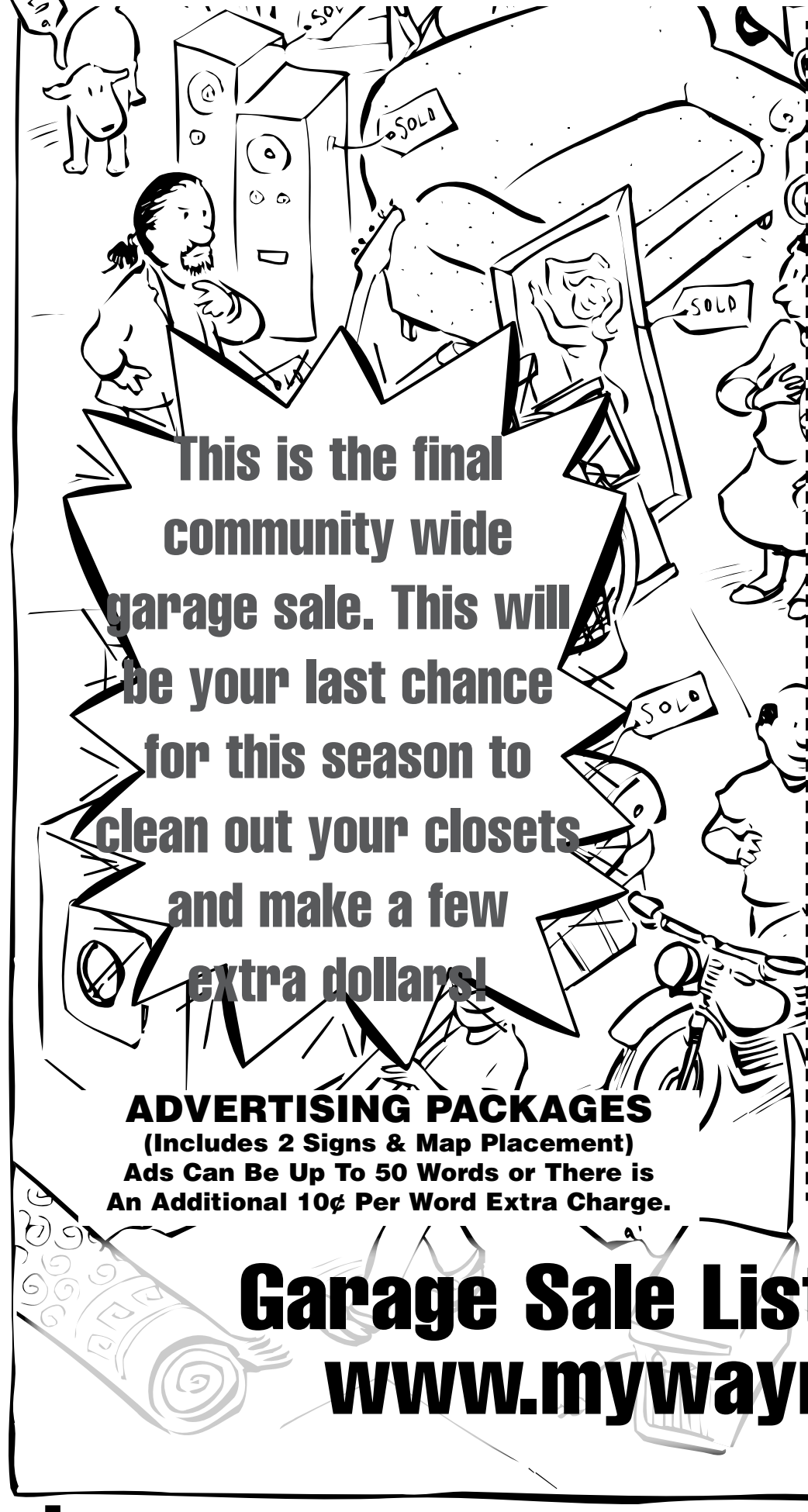

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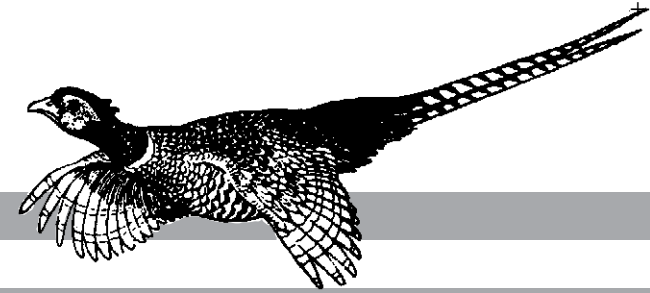

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Inspiring young scientists through 4-H Engagements

Youth are actively engaged in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) through Nebraska 4-H and across the United States.

There are two opportunities for families to get involved this fall with 4-H STEM.

First Lego League is a special interest club for youth 9 to 14 years-old to explore the field of robotics

through real-world engineering challenges. Helpful Hydrogels: explore a new superabsorbent polymer - called hydrogels.

A recent longitudinal study conducted by Tufts University, The Positive Development of Youth: Comprehensive Findings from the 4-H Study of Positive Youth Development, revealed 4-H programming does indeed get young people more connected to science. According to the study, 4-Hers are two times more likely to participate in science, engineering and computer technology programs during out-of-school time (Grades 10-12) and 4-H girls are two times more likely (Grade 10) and nearly three times more likely (Grade 12) to take part in science programs compared to girls in other out-of-school time activities.

Every year, youth complete more than 5 million 4-H Science projects in robotics, agricultural science, rocketry, wind power, environmental science, etc.

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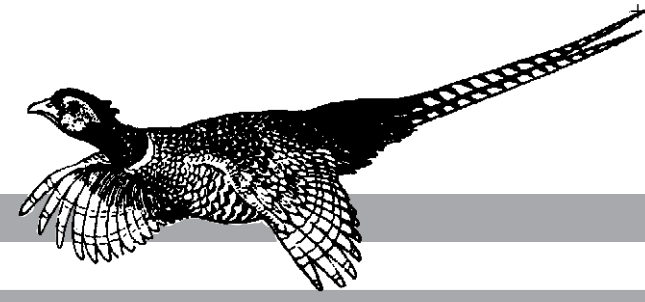

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Names important in Bible and now

We all love to hear our names mentioned. When we are talking with someone we want them to know our name. When we meet someone for the first time and they remember our name on the next meeting, it makes us feel special. On the other hand, when someone can't remember our name it makes us feel unimportant to that person.

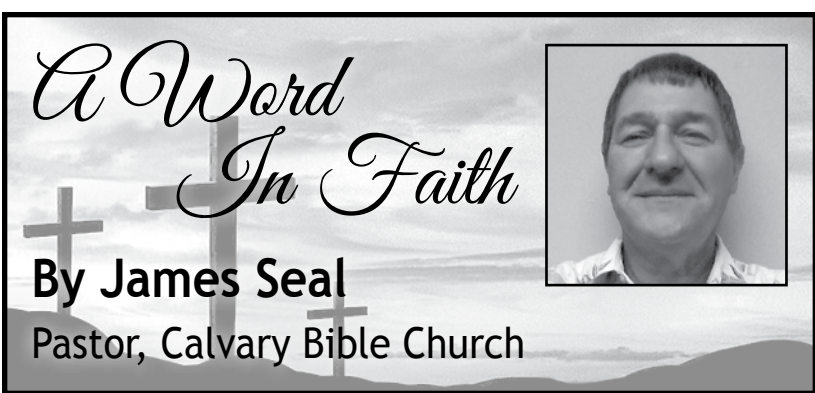
I work at remembering names but I have a difficult time remembering names when I have no time to get to know the person. A brief encounter with another person usually results in me forgetting their name. Yet, I hate to use the excuse, "Oh, I am just terrible with names."

Our names are very important to us because they are part of our identity. Sometimes our names have special meaning because we have been named for a family member.

In biblical times, emphasis was placed on the meaning of a person's name more so than today. Parents often did not just select names that they liked but they chose names that had a special meaning for their child.

The most significant names in the Bible are the names of God in both the Old and New Testaments. It is not my intent to mention all those names as that would take far more space than this article allows. I would like to mention the name that every church and every Christian receives their identity: the Lord Jesus Christ.

The word for Lord, relates to the Old Testament name of God, Yahweh, and to the title, Adonai. Jesus

Christ is called Lord in the New Testament, thus affirming his identity as the Yahweh of the Old Testament and the Lord over all of creation.

The name Jesus is our English rendering of the Hebrew name Yeshua which means salvation or Savior. Jesus is not only named the Savior, his death and resurrection provide the way of salvation for anyone who will place their faith and trust in him. Jesus is truly the Savior for all the world. He has come to save us from the penalty and guilt of our sin and give us a new life.

Christ is the English word for Messiah. Jesus came as the Messiah of Israel. He proved his identity through his many miracles and the words he taught. Rejected by the religious leaders of his day, Jesus stood firm on the truth of God. He came to bring deliverance to Israel, but his people rejected him. Yet, Jesus is the Messiah and deliverer for anyone who will receive him.

Thus the name of this most significant person, the Lord Jesus Christ, is a name filled with mean-

ing and hope. Jesus said to his followers, "Whatever you ask in my name, that will I do, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If you ask me anything in my name, I will do it. To ask in the name of Jesus is to ask that your request be fulfilled for God's purposes and his glory. This is not just something we tack onto the end of a prayer. It is an attitude that we are truly asking that God and Jesus receive glory through the answer to the prayer."

In Philippians 2 Paul said, For this reason also, God highly exalted Him, and bestowed on Him the name which is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee will bow, of those who are in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and that every tongue will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. Jesus' name is not just any ordinary name. It is the name of the Lord of the universe and every person will one day bow to his name: either willingly in this life or by force at the judgment.

Many people today scoff at the

name of Jesus presuming him to be only some dead religious leader. Many people abuse his name by using it as a form of profanity. Others simply disregard his name as insignificant.

Others are ashamed of the name of Jesus. It amazes me that people who claim to be Christians will have trouble mentioning the name of Jesus Christ. They are not afraid of the word God because it is a very generic term these days. Most people in the world believe in some kind of god. Indeed, there are other names for the gods of this world. However, many Christians are afraid to mention the name of Jesus for fear of persecution or for fear of offending someone.

The name of Jesus is not a football to be disrespectfully tossed around. Nor is his name just a good luck charm that we mention in hopes of gaining God's favor. The Lord Jesus Christ is the full name of the God of the universe who created all things yet who humbly gave himself to provide salvation for all mankind.

Those who claim to know Jesus Christ cannot be afraid or ashamed of his name. He is our Lord, our God, our Savior, and our Deliverer. He is the one who has redeemed us as his very own and who have promised us eternal life with him in glory. There is power in the name of Jesus.

May those of us who claim Jesus as Savior, reverently speak his name without fear and without shame. May those who don't know Jesus, consider the life that he offers through faith in his name.

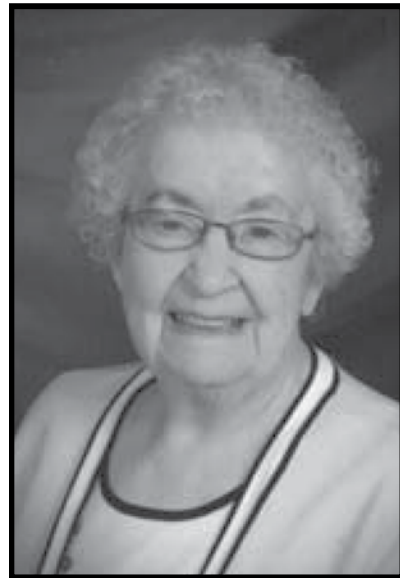

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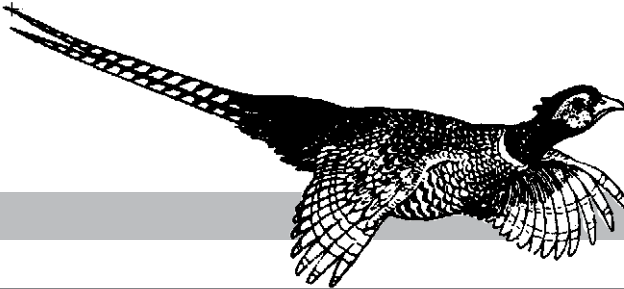
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So many books, so little time

Prepare for Veterinary Feed Directive

You will have heard and will likely hear more of this before January 1st, but Nebraska beef cattle producers should begin preparing for the Jan. 1, 2017, implementation of the Veterinary Feed Directive regulations, according to Rob Eirich, Nebraska beef quality assurance director with Nebraska Extension.

The regulations will be implemented by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and will require producers to work directly with their veterinarian when they use feed-grade antibiotics with all food-producing livestock.

A Veterinary Feed Directive is a paper or electronic written order by a licensed veterinarian approving the use of a feed-grade antibiotic for the prevention, treatment or control of a diagnosed disease. The regulations will apply only to antibiotics in livestock feed and will not affect feed-use medications such as ionophores, coccidia, other parasite and insect control drugs, or reproductive control medications. They also will not apply to antibiotics administered by injection.

The first step producers should complete before January is to develop a valid Veterinarian Client Patient Relationship, which includes an operation site visit and discussion about herd health. A complete herd health plan should be created for vaccination and treatment protocols during this discussion.

Producers must look at their operation production calendar to de-

termine what health risks they may encounter over the course of the year, how to prevent the risks through vaccinations and how to treat diagnosed diseases with antibiotics. This is an opportunity to look at alternatives to help reduce animal health risk, such as mineral programs or probiotic additives.

If a treatment protocol calls for using a feed-grade antibiotic, producers will be required to obtain a Veterinary Feed Directive from their veterinarian prior to purchasing and feeding the product. The veterinarian must provide signed written or electronic copies to the feed distributor and producer before

the directive product is delivered to the producer. The directive must state what is being treated, the product used, rate of inclusion, duration of treatment, number of head being treated and at what location or operation. Each directive must also include an expiration date, which is the last date the product can be fed.

Another key point for producers to understand is that the regulations allow no extra-label use of medicated feeds. These regulations will also be enforced more within the livestock industry. Directive products can only be used for prevention, treatment or control of diseases indicated on the FDA Approved Labels.

All feed manufacturers have submitted new labels removing all performance improvement claims and adding the new regulation requirements. The new labels will help veterinarians determine how directive products can be used and how the directive is to be implemented for that specific product. All labels will be approved by January 2017 for implementation of this new FDA regulation. A list of common beef cattle products can be found at: <http://bqa.unl.edu/veterinary-feed-directive>.

As usual, new regulations will involve documentation and record keeping. Veterinarians will be required to keep a record of the diagnosis and the original directive document. Feed distributors will

keep a copy of the directive with the purchase or delivery receipts. Producers also must hold a copy of the directive, purchase or delivery receipts, and feeding records. All documents must be filed and kept for two years from the directory issue date. For more information on Veterinary Feed Directive regulations, visit the Nebraska Beef Quality Assurance website or contact Rob Eirich at 308-632-1230 or reirich2@unl.edu.

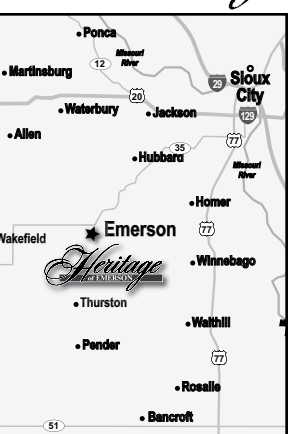

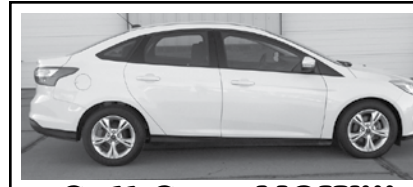
