Insurance, projects were the focus of school board

The cost and coverage of the districts' property and casualty insurance, as well as future projects to be funded by the Wayne Community Schools' Foundation were among the agenda items on Monday's meeting of the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education.

Cap Peterson with Northeast Nebraska Insurance spoke of the district's current coverage and highlighted changes.

He noted that the district currently has coverage for 90 percent of the property value and told board members that there would only be a \$1,400 difference in premium if the district changed that to 100 percent.

Following his presentation, the board did vote to accept the quote, including the increase in coverage. Five projects were among those pre-

sented by the Wayne Community Schools Foundation. The foundation will soon send out an-

nual campaign letters and plans to list projects to be funded by this year's dona-These include technology, a screen

and projector for the high school Lecture

Hall, a scoreboard for the Kern Track, stage curtains for the Lecture Hall and stadium lights for the track. Considerable discussion was held on which of these projects should be com-

pleted and in which order. It was noted that a \$5,000 anonomous donation has been received for the screen and projector. It is estimated the project

would cost \$10,000. The cost to replace the stage curtain is estimated to be between \$25,000 and \$50,000. Board members felt this project should be put on hold until a decision is made about a new performing arts area

The cost estimate for a new score board, which would include a digital portion to record track results, is \$60,000 to \$75,000 with an additional \$25,000 for

in the school.

Stadium lights would allow for the public to use the track for walking. At the present time, all games held at the football field there have to be scheduled earlier in the day because there is no lighting at the track.

The cost estimate for this project is \$175,000.

Following discussion on the merits of each of the projects, the board gave its approval for the Foundation to fund all five projects as they can.

Board members accepted, with regrets, the resignation of Judy Stepp, effective at the end of the 2016-2017 school year. Stepp currently serves as a teacher at the Early Learning Center.

The board also approved a refuse removal bid from Gill Hauling for \$535 per Superintendent Mark Lenihan told

the board there is no change in price from the current year.

A snow removal bid from Sebade Snow Removal was also accepted for the upcoming season. It was noted that the firm has a number of different pieces of equipment that would be used, depending upon the amount of snowfall.



The district is planning to go out for bids on the project in late January or early February.

Cemetery Association to conduct fundraiser

The Greenwood Cemetery Association is preparing to conduct a fundraising campaign for expenses incurred at the cemetery.

The following is a portion of the letter that will be sent to area residents highlighting the general expenses at the cemetery, as well as additional expenses anticipated in coming months.

"Many people do not realize all the work and expense that is involved in taking care of Greenwood Cemetery. Expenses are incurred all year long. The monies to pay for these expenses are limited. A large portion of the income received for grave sales at Greenwood must be put into a perpetual fund and only the interest that is received on these monies can be used. This is a state statute that all cemeteries

"The only other source of income is from donations. With that said, there is little money and usually not enough to go around.

"One expense that Greenwood has are wages that are paid to workers for mowing and trimming the grass, trimming trees, spraying weeds, picking up trash as well as picking up branches after a storm.

"Another expense we incur is having someone with the necessary equipment come in to open a grave when there has been a death. Our grounds crew packs the dirt back over the grave when it is ready to be closed. This is not an easy task and takes time and work. In the fall our workers seed all the graves.

"A never ending expense is tree removal. Disease and age have begun to take many of the trees that have graced Greenwood Cemetery for so many years. With the removal of trees more trees need to be planted. There is continual need to trim up trees from time to time and especially after a wind storm many branches to pick up as well as damaged trees

"Greenwood Cemetery has been around for over 100 years. Many burials have beautiful stones marking them. Weather extremes and time have taken a toll on many of the older stones and many are in need of repairs. We encourage families that have loved ones buried in Greenwood the check the stones at least yearly for any repairs that may be needed. We remind lot owners to check with your home owners insurance if repairs are necessary.

"We have many graves that no longer have family in the area to maintain the upkeep on the stones. When this occurs, it becomes a challenge to determine whose responsibility it is to take care of them. It becomes a very expensive project if Greenwood would have to take this on, but we take pride in the

appearance of our cemetery and with some deteriorated stones and some toppled over this does not look very attractive as one drives through the cemetery.

"In addition to the cost that would be incurred it is also a very risky undertaking as many of the stones have become fragile due to the elements of the weather over the years.

"Another project that seriously needs some attention is the replacement of the driveways. We were able to replace a small portion a few years ago but there are many sections that are in need of serious replacement now. The cost of the section of roadway on the North

end was just under \$41,000. The Cemetery Association used funds that the State paid to the Cemetery when Seventh Street was redone (plus earnings on that money + interest on Perpetual Care). Estimates in excess of \$325,000 have been suggest-

ed to repair the drives throughout. Other than the tree issues, this is the single greatest replacement need at the Cemetery. These drives were originally installed around World War II, and were designed for 1930's and 1940's vehicles and traffic.

"We have been able to cover the cost of tree removal and Cemetery Maintenance with normal inflows and periodic fund raising - United Way provides \$2000 annually - other donations and fund raising would total about \$26295.00 in the last five years. In that same period, we have spent \$42,302 to remove diseased, dying and damaged trees.

The cemetery is not owned by the City and receive no portion of City/County/State taxation. It is reliant solely on funding from burials, lot sales and donations is also critical.

"As you can see there are many expenses and it takes a lot of money to keep up on everything that needs to be done in a cemetery. The Greenwood Cemetery Board members take a lot of pride in our cemetery and are doing our best to keep up with everything but we can only accomplish so much. In order to continue to take care of Greenwood Cemetery it is necessary from time to time to raise the price of grave sales. Another way of receiving money for the ongoing costs is to have a fund drive. We plan to do another fund drive later this year. 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
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High school seniors can attend Northeast with new program

A number of high school seniors are getting an early start on college this fall as part of a new program at Northeast Community College.

Director of Early Entry Programs Makala Williams said Fridays@Northeast offers high school seniors a chance to spend Fridays on campus as college students. The classes offered through the program introduce students to a variety of Career and Technical Education program areas, and classes lead directly into a program of study upon high school graduation.

Students earn college credit for the courses, and because all faculty have completed the dual credit permit process through the Nebraska Department of Education, the student's high school can elect to give high school credit for the courses.

A total of 41 students from 14 schools are participat-

ing in this fall's program, which offers seven sections of five different classes. The classes include animal science, automotive technology, auto body technology, basic nurse aide and welding. Each class is held on the Norfolk campus, and nurse aide and welding are also held on the South Sioux City campus.

"Fridays@Northeast has been a great opportunity

for these high school students to participate in a college level program that actually prepares them for a career in industry and they don't have to spend a lot of money to try a program to see if it is a good fit for them," said Instructor Tom Hoile, who teaches the auto body technology course.

Student Korbin Savick, of Wisner-Pilger High

School, said he is happy with his Fridays@Northeast

experience. "I think the auto body class has been really fun. It is a great opportunity to be able to come up here, instead of going to high school on Fridays. It's a pleasure to come here every Friday because it gives us more of a hands-on training for working on certain parts of vehicles."

Northeast worked with area high schools that had expressed an interest in additional educational opportunities for their students.

"Many of our applied technology areas run Monday through Thursday which allow theses spaces to be available for programming on the last day of the school week," said John Blaylock, vice president of Educational Services. "I spoke with my deans and asked them to look at how we can use our existing spaces that are not being used on Fridays in order to give value to high school students. I then spoke with representatives of area school districts about the concept and they thought it was an outstanding idea and would make it work to get their students to our campuses on Fridays."

Some classes are held only in the fall semester, while others meet for the entire academic year. Students attend class beginning at 8 a.m., and all classes are finished by 2 p.m. "Ending at 2 p.m. will allow students time to head back home in order to participate in any afternoon or evening activities," said Blaylock.



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As farmers, mechanics, or anyone else who works with any sort of machinery knows, if the machine is going to operate smoothly, all the parts need to be there, put together properly, and working together. (My son looks pretty good, but boys are easier to dress and get ready than girls.)

There are certain things which don't get done when my wife is gone, or at least if they get done they are not done properly.

With her being gone, Genesis 2:18 came to mind. "Then the LORD God said, 'It is not good that man should be alone; I will make a helper fit for him."

It isn't that I'm not able to take care of my kids by myself, and I know that some people do it all the time. My mom had to take care of my brother and me by herself at times. I know that it can be done, and it can be done well. My hat goes off to those who are single parents. But that isn't the way in which God had originally designed the family life to be.

God, back in the beginning when He created all things, knew that man would need a helper. Not because God thought man was incompetent or useless, but before man's fall into sin, man would need help in the area of reproduction. Man is not able to have kids all on his own.

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

Response to downturn in market is payments

State's USDA Farm Service Agency issues safety nets Nebraska USDA Farm Service formation used to calculate the fi-

Agency (FSA) Executive Director Dan Steinkruger said today that Nebraska farms enrolled in safetynet programs established by the 2014 Farm Bill will soon receive about \$645 million in financial assistance for the 2015 crop year. The programs, known as Agri-

culture Risk Coverage (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC), are designed to protect against unexpected drops in crop prices or revenues due to market downturns. "These safety-net programs pro-

vide help when price and revenues fall below normal, unlike the previous direct payments program that provided funds even in good years, said SED Steinkruger. "These payments will help provide assistance to Nebraska farm families, who are facing low commodity prices." Statewide, 85,000 farms enrolled

in the ARC-County and PLC programs. Farmers had the option to select which programs to enroll in, by commodity. Nebraska farmers enrolled

roughly 95 percent of corn acres and 97 percent of soybean acres in the ARC-County program. About two-thirds of wheat and grain sorghum acres were enrolled in the ARC-County program. Under the ARC-County program,

SED Steinkruger said, both commodity price and yield play a role in the payment formula. "Payments by county can vary

because average county yields will differ," he said. Details on the price and yield in-

nancing assistance from the safetynet programs are available on the FSA website at www.fsa.usda.gov/ USDA works to strengthen and

support American agriculture, an industry that supports one in 11 American jobs, provides American consumers with more than 80 percent of the food they consume, ensures that Americans spend less of their paychecks at the grocery store than most people in other countries and supports markets for homegrown renewable energy and materials. Technology drives new program at Northeast

Northeast Community College Instructor Jeff Siegried has a straightforward definition of precision agriculture: "using technology for a more intense level of management.'

The precision agriculture program, new this fall at Northeast, offers a two-year associate of applied scince degree that focuses on maximizing yield potenial while developing more resource efficient practices and utilizing technologies and data system to drive decision making on farms.

"We're using as much information as we can practically get to manage in-field variability, or how things change within a field, and inter-field variability, or now things change from one field to a different field," aid Siegfried.

Siegfried joins Northeast from Colorado State Uniersity, where he earned a bachelor of science in soil and crop sciences with a concentration in applied inormation technology as well as a master of science in oil and crop sciences.

Siegfried said many of his students came to Northast's new program with prior hands-on experience vorking on a family farm and are now learning to ntegrate technology into what they've already been

He said he's excited to show students newer techologies and help them understand how to apply hem to their career endeavors, whether they go on to s a technician or on the family farm.

Other students are interested in how precision agiculture can be used on a global scale. "Precision agiculture is using technology to solve the problems of he future," said Siegfried. "We have this rapid inrease in population and other limiting factors, like and usage. We're expected to grow more on less land. t's really cool that (the students) are thinking about eeding the world, that that's on their minds.'

"My hope is that some of them will see how much science is behind precision agriculture, and that (they) will go on to study more."

Students work with an array of technologies in their classes. In Siegfried's data collections class, they study remote sensing using handheld crop canopy sensors that read the response of the plants to infrared and red wavelengths. In another, they work with technologies similar to those found in self-driving cars, using multiple sensors and GPS technology to enable a tractor to steer itself.

Students also learn about different platforms for remote sensing, including unmanned aircraft systems and satellites. Another class is dedicated to geographic information systems (GIS), which focuses on analyzing available data and making maps.

"A lot of (the students) really want to be able to use the technology, but a lot of it's very complicated, so they're hoping to learn about it or to teach others about it," said Siegfried. "A farmer's got enough to deal with just farming versus trying to learn the technology along with it."

"Everyone's basically walking around with a supercomputer in their pocket these days when compared to thirty years ago. So (the students) have a lot of experience with technology; they just need a little bit more learning to be able to apply it."

Study underway to determine factors in top soybean yields

The United States is the largest soybean producer in the world, accounting for 35 percent of total production. The North Central Region accounts for 80 percent of US soybean production. We have started a three-year project, funded by the Nebraska Soybean Board and the North Central Soybean Research Program (NCSRP), to identify the key factors that preclude soybean producers from obtaining top yields that should be possible on their individual farms.

Last winter, we collected data from fields planted with soybean in 2014 and 2015 from 10 states in the north-central region (Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio, Nebraska, North Dakota, and Wisconsin). Producers completed surveys to provide information on 3,500 fields. A summary report, Benchmarking Soybean Production Systems in the North-Central USA, shows soybean yield and management practices in soy-
