Generosity abounds

Haven House Christmas Adopt-A-Family program participants all paired up

The joyful sounds of children opening up long-anticipated gifts on Christmas morning is music to parents' ears. But for some families in the area, Christmas presents are low on the list of priorities, not for any reason other than a dollar can only be stretched so far.

For some families who have removed themselves from domestic violence situations, the list of things that have to come out of a paycheck is lengthy. Unfortunately, that makes purchasing gifts nearly impossible, especially when it's not just one child, but several, in the household.

This is where Haven House steps in.

"For many of our clients, Christmas day can be depressing for them, instead of a time of joy. As they are transitioning out of abusive situations, they can have a hard time providing Christmas presents for their children. That's where the Adopt-A-Family program comes in. We are so thankful for the community members who have stepped forward to make Christmas a special time for these families." Josh Sievers, the Outreach Coordinator for Haven House, said.

For the last at least 15 years, Haven House has helped to bridge the gap some face during the holidays by implementing the Adopt-A-Family program.

Anyone, a single individual or family, utilizing Haven House's services throughout the entire year is eligible for the program, though it's usually those who have used its services on multiple occasions through the year who chose to participate.

This year, eight families are participating in the program in Wayne's office and each was quickly "adopted" by a church or community member. The South Sioux City office had between 20 and 25 adoptable families.

"As of now, all our participating families have been



adopted," Denise Tello, Bilingual Advocate said. "If someone new were to come in, we'd reach out to businesses and community to step in."

The adopter and adoptees never have contact with one another, nor are they given names on either side.

The person or family up for adoption fills out a questionnaire for each person. The questions include the person's favorite color and hobbies, what size of clothing and shoes they wear along with what needs and wishes they have.

The adopter uses that information to purchase at least one gift for each family member, but often times numerous gifts for each family member are purchased.

This year the deadline to drop the gifts off is Dec. 20. This allows for Haven House to wrap anything that may not already be wrapped and for the family member to come pick up the gifts a couple days prior

Wayne State College will hold a commencement ceremony for graduate and undergraduate students at 1:30 p.m. Friday, Dec. 16 in Rice Auditorium.

A total of 228 degrees will be conferred by President Marysz Rames. Those students receiving their degrees include 174 undergraduates and 54 graduate students of the college's Master of Science in Education, Master of Organizational Management, Master of Business Administration, and Education Specialist programs.

Jeanette (Schmeits) Snyder will receive the Alumni Achievement Award from the Wayne State Foundation at the graduation ceremony. She graduated with honors from Wayne State College in 1990 with a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration with accounting and finance concentrations. As a WSC student, she served as a Wayne State ambassador, was a member of Phi Beta Lambda, and was elected to the Cardinal Key Club.

Ellen C. Wulf of Nebraska City will deliver the invocation during the graduation ceremony. She is the daughter of Robert and Patrice Wulf of Nebraska City. Wulf majored in Natural Science Education with a

Coaching Endorsement. She was a Nebraska State College System Board of Trustees Scholar and Presidential Scholar Athlete. While competing in indoor and outdoor track and field and cross country for the college, she was named to the All-Academic Team and was a Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference medalist. She plans to teach high school sciences, coach track and field, and continue her education in pursuit of a master's and a doctorate in science education after graduation.

Camron Groenke of Lindsay will deliver the undergraduate commencement address. Groenke is the son of Cory and Wendy Groenke of Lindsay. He is married to McKenzie Groenke. He majored in Natural Science Education with a Coaching Endorsement. He was a Nebraska State College System Board of Trustees scholar and was awarded the Gary and Janice Small Scholarship and Robert and Elayne Jacobsen Scholarship. Groenke was the founder and past president of the WSC Curling Club, a member of the Science Education Club, and a volunteer with the Wayne State science fair. He served an educational internship with Omaha's Henry Doorly Zoo and Aquarium. He has accepted a 9-12 Science

Education position at Viborg-Hurley Schools in Viborg, S.D., which he will start in January.

Rachel Jane Sweeney of Blair will deliver the undergraduate commencement address. Sweeney is the daughter of Rick and Beth Sweeney of Blair. Early retirement granted to long-time school employees

The early retirements of three Wayne Public Schools employees, with a combined 91 years of service to the district were approved during Monday's meeting of the Wayne Community School's Board of Education.

Junior High Principal/Athletic Director Rocky Ruhl, high school English teacher Sylvia Ruhl and Business teacher Annette Rasmussen have all indicated their desire to take advantage of the early leave incentive and will retire after the current school year. Rocky's retirement will be effective June 15, 2017 while Sylvia and Annette's retirement will be effective at the end of the 2016-2017 school year.

Rocky has been employed with the school system for 30 years, first as a Math teacher and later as principal/athletic director.

Sylvia has been employed as a high school English teacher for 33 years.

Annette has served in several capacities within the district for 28 years.

All the resignations were accepted with regrets.

The board approved the hiring of Toni Rasmussen as an Ag/FFA instructor for the 2017-2018 school

year with a 30 day transition contract.

Rasmussen will be responsible for implementing an Ag program at the school as there has not been one in recent history.

In other action, the board listened to a presentation from Jon Carlson with Carlson, West, Provonda Architects. Carlson told the board that the plan is to complete the drawings for the locker rooms/Ag room renovation project within the next month and go out for bids in January.

A bid would be awarded in February and construction could start before end of the school year. It is anticipated that all the work would be finished before the start of the 2017-2018 school year.

Carlson explained what the completed project will look like and told the board that a number of issues with the locker rooms and the area that connects to the Ag/computer area of the school will be addressed.

He said that the completed project will result in the boys and girls locker rooms being nearly identical in size.

Projected cost for the project is \$1.2 million with the majority of that already in the district's building fund. Carlson said the district may have to take out a two-year, low interest loan to pay for the remain-





Memorials may be directed to the Backstrom family for later designation.



WSC professor and archaeologist publishes book from Jordan excavation

Years after conducting her research, a book coauthored by Wayne State College sociology and anthropology professor Dr. Susan Ellis, "Excavations at Tall Jawa, Jordan, Volume 5," has finally been published.

The book contains excavation reports from Tall Jawa, focusing on several special studies conducted in the area. Ellis' contribution to this volume was an ethnoarchaeological study of Ottoman houses in the village of Jawa. Other authors of the book include Drs. Michele Daviau, James Battenfield, and Peter Popkin.

Ellis explained her work at the excavation site.

"In 1995, I was an area director at Tall Jawa and given the additional opportunity to document crumbling Ottoman period structures in the village of Jawa," she said. "I measured, photographed, drew illustrations, and interviewed people from the village in order to record these houses."

The work was part of the Madaba Plains Project survey, which fortunately was conducted before the structures were destroyed for use of the "good land."

"It was evident that these structures were doomed for destruction," Ellis said. "Villagers stated that they needed the land for building new houses for their sons, and could see no reason to waste good land with old buildings."

"Several years after I finished my research, the Ottoman Period houses were demolished to make room for new roads and buildings," she added.

Dr. Daviau of Wilfrid Laurier University in Waterloo, Ontario, was site

director for the excavations conducted in 1992, 1994, and 1995. The Iron Age settlements discovered dated from 1100 to 600 B.C.

The Ottoman Period in Jordan dates to 1516-1918 C.E., Ellis said. These houses were important because they illustrated not only building techniques but family and village structures. In a land where a man might have multiple wives, the houses showed how people adapted to these family affiliations: One man might divide his house into two or three sections (one for each wife) while another man might build additional rooms onto a house. The secondary rooms might also be additions for sons as they married.

"Through studying these traditional building techniques, archaeologists can also extrapolate these methods back in time," Ellis said. "For example, roof construction consisting of tree branches, reeds, mud brick, and plaster seen at Ottoman Jawa are found as far back as the Bronze Age in Jordan (around 3200 B.C.)."

Ellis has been an active excavator since 1983, including projects in Syria, Egypt, and Jordan. Her sites have included Tall Qarqur, Abila of the Decapolis, Tall Jawa, and Khirbet Iskander (an Early Bronze walled city).

"I have had the opportunity of living in Egypt and Jordan multiple times, and taking students to Israel and Turkey several times," Ellis said. "I love the people, the culture, and the archaeological sites of the area and think of the Middle East as my second home."

to Christmas.

"Most people wrap them ahead of time," said Sievers. "That alleviates some of the holiday stress."

Along with those gifts, Haven House also puts together a basket of household supplies for each family to take.

But it's not just the holidays when Haven House is able to aid families with gifts and household items.

All year round, Haven House accepts donations of toys for all ages, household items like cleaning supplies and even furniture.

This allows anyone utilizing the services Haven House offers to be able to "shop" for a birthday gift or much needed supplies after starting over in a new home.

"The only thing we don't really take is clothing, only because we don't have storage," Connie Reyes, Shelter Manager said. "We suggest giving that to Micah's Closet because we give people vouchers for shopping there."

Brand new undergarments are accepted donations to Haven House, as well as gift cards and

gas cards. Because some of Haven House's funding comes from grants, there are restrictions in how it can be used. That's when members of the community fill in those holes.

The Partners Program is how those holes get filled. When there are needs, but funding restrictions prevent Haven House from directly covering them, Haven House reaches out on their Partners Program Facebook page. Members of the group are able to bring in those items if they have the ability to, ensuring needs are met.

Items like football cleats and basketball shoes aren't covered by Haven House's funding, but are needs for some families with students in athletics. By posting it to Facebook, community members are able to see the needs and respond the best way they can.

On top of the Partners program, Haven House also receives donations from drives that area businesses host.

"We have two toy drives, another drive that's paper products, another with miscellaneous needs," said Tello. "Ameritas,

Great Dane, local churches, Dollar General — they've all done drives."


But even with the drives and donations, some needs, such as clothing and large furniture, aren't covered, which is why Haven House partners with Micah's Closet, a local family thrift store that carries clothing. Rustic Treasures has helped with various awareness displays and negotiated furniture prices for those needing household furniture.

Not only does Haven House depend on donations, volunteers are also a necessary part of its operations.

"Volunteers this year have been awesome," Tello said. "We can't do things without our volunteers, and we're always looking for more."

Not only does Haven House offer aid to survivors of domestic violence, presentations are also available to area groups.

All of Haven House's services are free and confidential. Office hours run 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. but the crisis line, 1-800-440-4633, is a 24-hour service.

der of the project.

Superintendent Mark Lenihan showed the board and those in attendance at the meeting a Nebraska Association of School Board video entitled "Public Education in Nebraska," which focused on the positive aspects of education in Nebraska and several famous Nebraskans who spoke highly of the quality of education they received in the state.

During the meeting Lindsay McLaughlin, Director of the Wayne Community Schools Foundation updated the board on donations the Foundation has received since her hiring and shared information on the

history of the foundation. She told the board that the faculty/staff giving has been on the increase and this year set a record.

McLaughlin also talked about projects completed with assistance from the foundation, including a curtain in the elementary school gym, choir robes, a grant for a student at the Early Learning Center and a grant for a chrome cart.

The board authorized Superintendent Lenihan to enter into a contract with Providence Medical Center for athletic training services.

The contract, which is for the 2017-2018 school year not to exceed \$80,000.

Board member Jeryl Nelson expressed his thanks to Providence Medical Center for providing athletic training services to the district for a number of years at no cost.

Board members got a first look at the 2017-2018 school calendar, which includes a start day for students on Wednesday, Aug. 16 for a half day of school and includes combined parent-teacher conferences in September.

The board did enter into executive session for the purpose of discussing collective bargaining.

The board will next meet in regular session on Monday, Jan. 9 at 5 p.m. in the junior-senior high school library.



It was a good week for the Wayne High wrestlers, as they won a home dual and ran the table for a first-place finish at the West Point-Beemer Dual Invitational.

On Thursday, Wayne won five of the last six contested matches to come from behind for a 45-36 win over Norfolk Catholic at Wayne High School.

each had two and Meyer and Jamie Gamble both had a free throw.





ORDINANCE NO. 2016-15 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 54 LIBRARY, ARTICLE I IN GENERAL, BY ADDING SECTION 54-8 UNLAWFUL LIBRARY CONDUCT AND SECTION 54-9 PENALTIES IMPOSED; RECOVERY IN CIVIL ACTION; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska:

Section 1. That Chapter 54, Article I, of the Wayne Municipal Code is hereby amended to add the following sections:

54-8 UNLAWFUL LIBRARY CONDUCT. It shall be unlawful for any person to take or retain possession beyond the due date of, or to remove from the public library building, in violation of any bylaw, rule or regulation adopted by the Library Board or City Council for the protection and government of the public library or in violation of any agreement entered into by any person concerning utilization of the public library, or to willfully and maliciously write upon, deface, injure or destroy any book, periodical, record, film or other property owned by, or in custody of, the public library. Any person who shall violate the terms of any agreement concerning utilization of the public library, or who unlawfully takes or retains possession beyond the due date of, or removes from the public library building, writes upon, defaces, injures or destroys any book, periodical, record, film or other property owned by or in the custody of the public library, shall be guilty of an offense.

54-9 PENALTIES IMPOSED; RECOVERY IN CIVIL ACTION. Penalties imposed or accruing under any bylaw, rule or regulation adopted by the Library Board or City Council may be recovered in a civil action before any court having jurisdiction thereof. Such action shall be instituted and maintained in the name of the city. This remedy shall be in addition to that provided in section 54-8.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby amended and repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage, approval, and publication or posting as required by law.







Northeast Nebraska has the highest levels of radon in state

Radon is an odorless, tasteless, invisible gas that is present in some types of soil.

The types of soil in Northeast Nebraska contain very high levels of radon. According to the Nebraska

Department of Health and Human Services, the highest level among all radon test results in Nebraska was in Cedar County and measured over 200 picocuries per liter (pCi/L).

The EPA's action level of radon is 4 pCi/L. This means that any result over this level is considered dangerous to your health and steps should be taken to minimize radon exposure.

Northeast Nebraska Public Health Department (NNPHD) is offering residents of Cedar, Dixon, Thurston and Wayne Counties radon test kits. This year NNPHD is asking \$5 per test kit. Half of these proceeds will go back into the program so that more test kits can be purchased. The other half of the proceeds will be used in a prize drawing for residents who mitigate their homes of radon.







Hop Growers Conference scheduled for Lincoln

Craft beers continue to skyrocket in popularity, and Nebraska brewers are looking to use local ingredients for their concoctions.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln has announced the dates for the First Annual Nebraska Grower and Brewer Conference and Trade Show.

The two-day conference will be held Thursday and Friday, Jan. 5-6, 2017, at Nebraska Innovation Campus, 2021 Transformation Drive in Lincoln.

The conference will feature separate basic and advanced sessions for hop growers as well as a craft brewers sessions and is designed for both growers and brewers.

The growers' sessions will include several prominent speakers

from around the country discussing market outlook, horticultural practices, pest and disease control, harvest and post-harvest practices.

The brewers' sessions (held in conjunction with the Nebraska Craft Brewers Guild's Annual Meeting) will address best brewing practices, brewery safety, input management, and water science, and will offer an up-to-date overview of legal and regulatory topics.

There will also be a brewer/grower networking session that focuses on procuring local ingredients and hop quality.

The session will provide growers with a better idea of quality requirements and help align the

supply of Nebraska grown hops with brewer needs.

The conference is sponsored in part by Midwest Hop Producers LLC, Nebraska Craft Brewers Guild, Nebraska Hop Growers Association, the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources at UNL, the UNL Food Processing Center, the UNL Department of Agronomy and Horticulture, the Agricultural Research Division at IANR and Nebraska Extension, among others.

Nebraska specialty crop projects receive funding from USDA grant

From popcorn and peas to honey and hops, specialty crops are an important part of Nebraska's agriculture industry. Sixteen specialty crop projects are set to receive more than \$620,000 in funding as part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Specialty Crop Block Grant Program (SCBGP). Administered by the Nebraska Department of Agriculture (NDA), the state's program supports research, development and marketing of specialty crops.

"Specialty crops are important to Nebraska's ag industry because they create economic diversity for the state," said NDA Director Greg Ibach. "By focusing on critical areas like research, production and the environment, these new projects will help specialty crop producers stay competitive and grow their businesses."

Specialty crops include fruits, vegetables, tree nuts, horticulture and nursery crops. Two of the 16 projects in Nebraska are related to dry bean production. Nebraska ranks number five in the nation for all dry edible bean production. The state is number one in Great Northern bean production and number two in pinto bean production.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln will receive funding to: evaluate the sustainability of adding dry beans to dryland cropping systems in western Nebraska; and, identify sources of common blight in dry bean crops.

A description of the other specialty crop projects being funded in Nebraska and the grant recipients are as follows:

- Expanding hop production with local growers by providing educational resources and promoting a conference focused on growing, harvesting and processing hops—UNL;
- Reducing losses to sunflower growers due to Phomopsis stem canker disease—UNL;
- Identifying pea varieties and production practices for high seed protein content in western Nebraska—UNL;
- Inter-seeding cover crops into popcorn fields to help with the popcorn plant's health and reduce weed population in popcorn fields—Hilger Agri-Natural Popcorn;
- Identifying the best peppermint and spearmint varieties for production in western Nebraska—UNL;
- Reducing the use of herbicides in

vineyards by replacing groundcovers beneath grapevines—UNL;

- Using ozonated water to control disease, reduce pesticide use and enhance plant growth—Mac's Creek Vineyards and Winery;

- Extending the growing season of table grapes by growing them in high tunnels—UNL;

- Enhancing sustainable landscapes to promote honey production in bee colonies near agricultural fields in Nebraska—UNL.

NDA will also receive funding for specialty crop projects for the inspection of plants for pests and diseases.

Projects will have up to three years to complete their work. For more information about the grants or this year's recipients, go to the USDA's website at <http://www.ams.usda.gov/services/grants/scbcp/awards> and click on "FY2016 pdf."

NDA administered a two-phase competitive grant application process. Phase I involved the submission of concept proposals, which allowed applicants to explain the main points of their project. The concept proposals were independently and competitively scored by a field review panel. Projects with the highest combined scores were asked to complete Phase II of the application process. NDA funds projects that produce the highest degree of measurable benefits to Nebraska specialty crop producers in relation to each dollar spent.

RC&D project results

The Northeast Nebraska Resource Conservation & Development (RC&D) Council held their regularly scheduled meeting recently. Dawn Kimmel, Coordinator of Keep Northeast Nebraska Beautiful (KNNB), shared information about her role and her willingness to assist communities with litter reduction and recycling. KNNB is an eleven-county area which includes the six served by the RC&D Council.

The Council completed the following projects – Pork 'n Cork – an event held at Nissen Winery to introduce people to that facility and to learn from Humanities Nebraska speaker Marla Matkin about the 20-year history of the boom days of cattle towns and the soiled doves who worked the saloons to make a living; Ghost Walk – a living history event built around the Millerboro Cemetery and ghost town of Mars; Farmers Market 2016 – twelve vendors and many shoppers took advantage of the open-air fresh food market; Heritage Museum Passport Program – a pilot project involving 10 local museums working together to increase visitor traffic to their respective museums.

A third Grant Writing Workshop will be held in Plainview at the public library on December 14th. Speakers will be from USDA Rural Development on federal grants and loans available to communities, Nebraska Game & Parks on their wildlife grants offered and tips on being successful with those, the Shickley Story of philanthropic success and more, and there will be informa-

tion on writing grant proposals so they speak to the potential funder by putting "your best foot forward". Contact the RC&D office to register.

Three new projects were accepted which include hosting the Farmers Market again in 2017 with added items to entice more participants, an expansion of the Heritage Museum Network's Passport Program, and being part of the Nebraska Sesquicentennial Storytelling Conference to be held at Ponca State Park in August of 2017.

The RC&D Council looks forward to continuing their service to citizens through projects that will make life better for people in Antelope, Cedar, Dixon, Knox, Pierce, and Wayne counties.




