Husker legend Tom Osborne speaks to hundreds in Ramsey

Nearly 400 people were on hand Sunday evening to listen to famed leadership expert, mentor, and former national championship University of Nebraska football coach Dr. Tom Osborne.

Osborne's presentation, "Tom Osborne: On Leadership,"focused on character and he related the aspects of character to the 42 years he was involved with Nebraska football.

"Character is a choice. It is what you do if no one will find out," he said.

Osborne spoke at length about Brook Berringer, who took over at the quarterback position for the Nebraska Cornhuskers and led the team to a national championship following the 1994 season.

"Even though Brook did not get to play much after Tommy Frazier got healthy again, he always did and said the right thing. Brook held things together. He had the greatest impact on any team during my career," Osborne said.

"In 42 years, Nebraska won 82 percent of their games. This was the most of any college football team. People often asked what made this program successful and there were a number of answers," Osborne said.

He listed making the players feel they were cared for as a person, integrity -telling the truth and keeping promises, a positive environment and the way the team, players and coaches dealt with adversity as the reason for the success of the program.

Osborne said he felt post modernism, focusing on the fact that "if enough people are doing something, it is acceptable" as one of the challenges facing young people today.

"However, there are moral absolutes, such as telling the truth," he said.

He then explained that while he was a

member of the U.S. House of Representatives for the state of Nebraska, lots of people lost their entire savings during the Enron scandal. The corporation was selling stocks based on profits that weren't real and eventually led to the company going bankrupt.

"You have to decide what's important to you and you have to have something solid to stand on in your life," he said.

Osborne also told his audience, which was made up of college students and members of the community that they needed to find a balance in their lives to make it a happy one.

This included physical, intellectual and spiritual areas and "making something in your life more important than you."

Osborne concluded his presentation by challenging his audience to answer the question "Did I make a difference with the things I did in my life?"

PMC FULFILLS NEEDS



As patient needs and medical practices have evolved, so has Providence Medical Center

As Providence Medical Center pushes forward in its impressive construction and renovation project, we will publish a series of five articles centered around various aspects of PMC. This week focuses on the shortcomings and necessary improvements over the years and next week's will highlight from 2013 through the present.

Throughout the years, construction projects have taken the original Starting with that simple -- or notso-simple -- need, meetings can be conducted for brainstorming and discussing the best possible solution to the issue. From there plans are drawn up and looked over extensively, with suggestions voiced and changes made before the final product is approved.

While the hospital was a modern, state-of-the-art facility when it's doors opened in 1975, it didn't take long before changes needed to be made to keep that status.

The initial plans included two patient wings, surgical suite, kitchen and

footprint for Providence Medical Center and expanded it, built upon it and changed it to keep up with quickly evolving medical practices and evergrowing patient needs.

Whether it be based in medicine or rooted in patient care, a need must be addressed or the risk of falling behind begins to grow. It's much easier to keep up with changes as they arise, rather than ignore them and hope that in the future someone else can handle it.

This is something administration, physicians and other staff at PMC haven't just allowed but embraced, knowing full well the benefit of offering modern facilities and practices. dining area, laboratory and radiography room as well as a chapel and housing for several Missionary Benedictine Sisters.

By 1980, changes were already occurring at PMC with the addition of the Providence Fitness Center in the basement of the hospital.

The facility was available for use by members and hospital employees and seniors received a membership at half the normal cost.

A "C" wing had been constructed by 1988. It was home to the education room and a dirty/clean utility was moved to accommodate an additional See Evolve, Page 4A

Future City team takes first place at regionals

The Wayne Junior High Future City team won first place in the Nebraska Regional contest on Jan. 13. Three representatives from the team will be competing in the National Future City competition in Washington, DC, Feb. 17 - 22. The three presenters representing the Wayne team are Isaac Davis, Abby Wieseler and Christopher Woerdemann.

"The Future City Team opportunity is open to all seventh and eighth graders. I have a meeting in September to see who is interested in the challenge and then we go from there. They just sign up for it after the information meeting," said Sonya Tompkins, High Abilities (HAL) Coordinator and team sponsor.

Future City has five components to it. The team starts by preparing a project plan, similar to what engineers do. Then the team builds a city on SimCity software. Each team member builds their own city and completes progress checks on a powerpoint. The team then votes for the best city that they would like to submit for competition.

The third component is the research and innovation challenge.

This year's challenge was to create two innovative public spaces using an old street and a grey or brownfield. Everyone on the team does the research and then a smaller research team writes the paper.

"This paper also describes aspects of our future city. Our city has to be at least 100 years in the future. Our city, Corriendo Rio Ciudad, is in the year 2552," Tompkins said.

The fourth component is building a 50" x 25" x 20" model of the city to scale. The team must use recyclables to create the city. The team plans the design for the city and then everyone works on various parts to complete the project.

The fifth component is the presentation. Only three team members can present to the judges. The three students write the skit and present the project to the judges. This includes city information and describes the city's public spaces and the engineering concepts behind it. The team works on this from Sep-

tember until competition in January.

What is the last book you read?

Currently I am reading The Nightingale by Kristin Hannah. Several people told me it was a great read so I put it on my list and finally had time to start it this oast weekend.

Who is your favorite author? Truly, I don't believe I have one. I loved all of Robert Fulghum's books, the most famous of which was, All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten. The only author I remember seeking out to read repeatedly was Dick Francis, a British steeplechase jockey turned mystery crime writer. In the summers of my early twenties I worked at Aksarben and later at Jubilee Farms in Omaha as a hot-walker, then horse groom. On route to show, the farm manager lent me his copy and I read it cover to cover before we arrived. I loved racing, and Francis' books are all set in the horse-racing world, so I was hooked. You are lured into that world once you get the smell in your nose. It invites you, "to run away with the circus," as my mother once put it. Dick Francis, was the author that brought me back to reading books for pleasure, after assigned reading had burned me out in high school and college.

Why do you read?

I read to gain insight, for enjoyment and to better myself. When I was young, a very impressive Air Force Commander gave a lecture at my school. He told us he was always reading two books, one to better himself and one for enjoyment; that stuck with me. I love

stories about real people in real situations no matter what those may have been, war, peace, of just people getting through their day to day in different walks of life.

Have you ever given up on a book?

Sure. Not every book written has been well written.

Name a book you would recommend and tell everyone why they should read it.

I always recommend The Book Thief by Marcus Zusak. I couldn't read anything for a very long time after reading it, because I knew other books would be a letdown after its poignantly haunting beauty.

Is there anything else you'd like to comment on about your passion for reading?

People think I read all the time, I am a librarian after all, but really I don't. Doing this job requires lots of reading, but that is reading reviews, articles, web pages, summaries, and parts of books. In actuality, I probably read less than 10-12 books in a year. And, I actu-

ally read very slowly, often making notations. I savor stories and writing. Finding a well written phrase, or thought that strikes a chord, brings me delight.

I read books with book clubs and things that peak my interest. Blame it on the day job! 

critical care room

Then came the clinic in 1995, where physicians under the Northeast Nebraska Family Practice, Inc. umbrella would practice in Wayne, rather than being split between two locations in town like they had been previously.

Just a year after the clinic opened it's doors, a CT Scan room was added to the hospital.

A full outpatient addition was completed in 2000, which added seven exam rooms, a nurses station, doctor's dictation area and a new ambulance garage, director of plant operations Mark Tietz said.

"It was the big drive-through ambulance garage," Tietz said. "That was all added on during 1999-2000."

An in-house MRI was added in 2009 to further PMC's diagnostic capabilities.

"We became aware in about 2011-12 that our Wellness Center - which was in the basement, very small, cramped area - and Physical Therapy was growing and running out of room," Tietz said. "That's when it was decided that they would add on the Wellness Center and Physical Therapy area."

Tietz said during that time, expansion was also done on the Outpatient wing to include an Oncology area.

In addition to the therapy and wellness areas, a shell space was also constructed with the thought of future expansion in mind, which is where a multipurpose room, administration suite and student health reside now, in their new permanent spaces.

"We no longer have that space, but that was what happened prior to this project," Tietz said of the former shell space.

Student Health now has an exterior door for students to utilize. The door sits right off the walking trail on the west side of the building and has the Wildcat logo on it to help it stand out to students wishing to utilize the services.

"It's a lot handier for (the students)," Tietz said. "It took a little while to get everyone to figure out how to gain access - they were coming in the old way or through the ER, now they're a little more familiar with how to get there."

But it wasn't just space that needed updated or expanded on.

Thanks to the ever-growing world of medical practice and technology changes, Providence Medical Center like every other hospital - was forced to keep up with those changes in order to offer the best care possible.

Equipment such as the 1968 Pontiac ambulance saw it's end of life at PMC by 1982 when it was replaced.

In 1987, Providence Medical Center added its very first Ultrasound machine to the list of state-of-the-art technology. It was replaced in 1995 with a price tag of \$154,000.

Sister Kevin Hermsen was quoted saying "When you need it, it's worth every penny.'

By 1996, Providence acquired its first CAT scan.

The millennium proved to be a year of change at PMC with the expansion of pharmacy services and the addition of vital signs monitors.

2006 saw a complete upgrade for the radiology department including another new ultrasound machine, and an upgraded CT scanner.

2008 and 2009 brought about a new C-Arm for the surgical department and an auto-pulse cardiac support pump as well as an in-house MRI.

The Life Flight service, a helicopter ambulance based at St. Joseph's Hospital in Omaha, was made available in 1984

In 1986, PMC began offering a Cardiology Clinic additionally to the other services offered in the outpatient clinics.

Providence Medical Center began participating in the tissue donor program in December of 1989.

By 1997, PMC was able to provide teleradiography thanks to a grant from the Gardner Foundation and began conducting ACL reconstruction surgeries.

A new osteoporosis diagnostic technology was made available on a mobile basis monthly in 1998.

changes included massage therapy, lymphadema treatment, a wound ostomy continence nurse, body warming gowns and a fully automated pharmacy with three new dispensing cabinets were staples at PMC among many other additions.

And one big change came in 2009 as Providence Medical Center purchased the hospital from the Missionary Benedictine Sisters of Norfolk, becoming a non-profit community hospital.

Looking ahead, more changes will be made as technology and practices evolve, but also as health care dictates patient care.

Providence Medical Center's Chief Executive Officer Jim Frank discussed the future of health care and how it would affect services and practices offered at PMC, starting with a simple fact: technology advances.

Additional equipment and increased diagnostic and therapeutic capabilities will grow as technology advances, Frank said. Pieces of equipment that aren't available today will be around in the future.

And along with that, the use of telemedicine will likely go up for the sake of convenience. It's much more convenient to visit PMC and visit with a specialist via video feed than it is to drive to Omaha or Lincoln. Providence Medical Center already offers psychiatry through Tele-Health.

Another aspect of future health care Frank discussed was that of regulation.

When the government is responsible for paying for medical care, regulations become more strict and increase in numbers, but one-size-fits-all regulations are difficult to manage for a smaller community hospital such as PMC.

Because of that regulation, integrated healthcare systems are becoming more common around the country.

The trend incorporates physicians, small hospitals and tertiary hospitals under one umbrella. Nebraska hasn't been affected the way states like Iowa or Minnesota have, but it's becoming an influence in the state.

Frank believes with programs such as Medicare and Medicaid as well as private insurance, there will be decreased reimbursement in future years.

"They're all looking for ways to reduce their burden and their cuts affect us," Frank said. "We're in a healthcare crisis and we anticipate changes to be made to that,

WSC track team offering Feb. 18 camp

The one-day camp will be held at the WSC Rec Center and will include sprints, long jump, triple jump, high jump, shot put, and discus. Check-in is from 8:15-8:45 a.m., with the camp starting at 9 a.m.

His impact on Division II ran deep by implementing an identity campaign and a strategic-positioning platform tied to specific divisional attributes. He challenged Division II to continue its game environment and community engagement focus, and improve academic success rates.

But if we are quiet, we can find the only place where all things make sense: in the presence of the Lord. As the Children of Israel were wandering in the wilderness, en route to their land of promise, they carried with them a large structure called the "Tabernacle", an elaborate combination of pillars, fabric, utensils, relics, and liturgy with a special place in the center, called "The Holy of Holies". It was the most sacred place because God dwelt there. And it was from that place that the people heard from the Lord, via the prophets and other leaders.

But with the ordination of the "New Covenant" in the blood of Christ, the presence of God now dwells - by the Holy Spirit - with people. What this means is that "somewhere" is now right here, among us: wherever two or three are gathered together (Matthew 18:20; Matthew 28:20), God is there. We have His invitation to "come unto Me, all ye who are weary and heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28-30). And in Isaiah 1:18 we are summoned to "come, let us reason together -- though your sins are as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow."

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



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Private pesticide applicator trainings scheduled

Private pesticide applicators whose licenses expire in 2017 and those seeking first-time certification can find information on pesticide safety education programs at their local University of Nebraska Extension offices.

Licensing as a private applicator allows farmers to purchase and use pesticides classified as restricted use by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in their own farming operations. Extension provides the educational program,

while the agriculture department is responsible for licensing. The training fee is \$30. An applicator may also certify by self-study or online training for a \$60 training fee.

In 2001, the Nebraska Legislature created a state pesticide license fee of \$25 for private applicators. The fee covers a three-year license period.

Wayne County training sessions are scheduled as follows:
