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Husker legend Tom Osborne speaks to hundreds in Ramsey

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Nearly 400 people were on hand Sunday evening to listen to famed leadership expert, mentor, and former national championship University of Nebraska football coach Dr. Tom Osborne.

Osborne's presentation, "Tom Osborne: On Leadership," focused on character and he related the aspects of character to the 42 years he was involved with Nebraska football.

"Character is a choice. It is what you do if no one will find out," he said.

Osborne spoke at length about Brook Berringer, who took over at the quarterback position for the Nebraska Cornhuskers and led the team to a national championship following the 1994 season.

"Even though Brook did not get to play much after Tommy Frazier got healthy again, he always did and said the right

thing. Brook held things together. He had the greatest impact on any team during my career," Osborne said.

"In 42 years, Nebraska won 82 percent of their games. This was the most of any college football team. People often asked what made this program successful and there were a number of answers," Osborne said.

He listed making the players feel they were cared for as a person, integrity -telling the truth and keeping promises, a positive environment and the way the team, players and coaches dealt with adversity as the reason for the success of the program.

Osborne said he felt post modernism, focusing on the fact that "if enough people are doing something, it is acceptable" as one of the challenges facing young people today.

"However, there are moral absolutes, such as telling the truth," he said.

He then explained that while he was a

member of the U.S. House of Representatives for the state of Nebraska, lots of people lost their entire savings during the Enron scandal. The corporation was selling stocks based on profits that weren't real and eventually led to the company going bankrupt.

"You have to decide what's important to you and you have to have something solid to stand on in your life," he said.

Osborne also told his audience, which was made up of college students and members of the community that they needed to find a balance in their lives to make it a happy one.

This included physical, intellectual and spiritual areas and "making something in your life more important than you."

Osborne concluded his presentation by challenging his audience to answer the question "Did I make a difference with the things I did in my life?"

PMC FULFILLS NEEDS

As patient needs and medical practices have evolved, so has Providence Medical Center

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As Providence Medical Center pushes forward in its impressive construction and renovation project, we will publish a series of five articles centered around various aspects of PMC. This week focuses on the shortcomings and necessary improvements over the years and next week's will highlight from 2013 through the present.

Throughout the years, construction projects have taken the original footprint for Providence Medical Center and expanded it, built upon it and changed it to keep up with quickly evolving medical practices and ever-growing patient needs.

Whether it be based in medicine or rooted in patient care, a need must be addressed or the risk of falling behind begins to grow. It's much easier to keep up with changes as they arise, rather than ignore them and hope that in the future someone else can handle it.

This is something administration, physicians and other staff at PMC haven't just allowed but embraced, knowing full well the benefit of offering modern facilities and practices.

Starting with that simple -- or not-so-simple -- need, meetings can be conducted for brainstorming and discussing the best possible solution to the issue. From there plans are drawn up and looked over extensively, with suggestions voiced and changes made before the final product is approved.

While the hospital was a modern, state-of-the-art facility when it's doors opened in 1975, it didn't take long before changes needed to be made to keep that status.

The initial plans included two patient wings, surgical suite, kitchen and dining area, laboratory and radiography room as well as a chapel and housing for several Missionary Benedictine Sisters.

By 1980, changes were already occurring at PMC with the addition of the Providence Fitness Center in the basement of the hospital.

The facility was available for use by members and hospital employees and seniors received a membership at half the normal cost.

A "C" wing had been constructed by 1988. It was home to the education room and a dirty/clean utility was moved to accommodate an additional

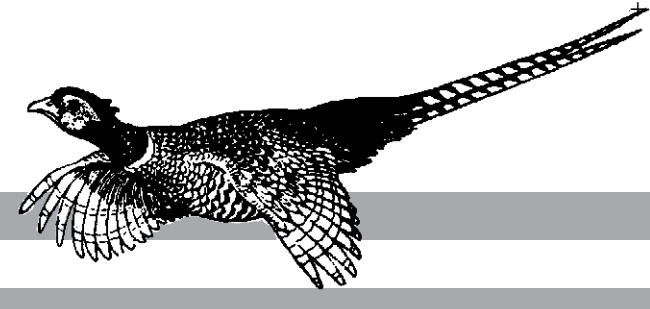

Future City team takes first place at regionals

The Wayne Junior High Future City team won first place in the Nebraska Regional contest on Jan. 13.

Three representatives from the team will be competing in the National Future City competition in Washington, DC, Feb. 17 - 22. The three presenters representing the Wayne team are Isaac Davis, Abby Wieseler and Christopher Woerdemann.

"The Future City Team opportunity is open to all seventh and eighth graders. I have a meeting in September to see who is interested in the challenge and then we go from there. They just sign up for it after the information meeting," said Sonya Tompkins, High Abilities (HAL) Coordinator and team sponsor.

Future City has five components to it. The team starts by preparing a project plan, similar to what engineers do. Then the team builds a city on SimCity software. Each team member builds their own city and completes progress checks on a powerpoint. The team then votes for the best city that they would like to submit for competition.

The third component is the research and innovation challenge.

This year's challenge was to create two innovative public spaces using an old street and a grey or brown-field. Everyone on the team does the research and then a smaller research team writes the paper.

"This paper also describes aspects of our future city. Our city has to be at least 100 years in the future. Our city, Corriendo Rio Ciudad, is in the year 2552," Tompkins said.

The fourth component is building a 50" x 25" x 20" model of the city to scale. The team must use recyclables to create the city. The team plans the design for the city and then everyone works on various parts to complete the project.

The fifth component is the presentation. Only three team members can present to the judges. The three students write the skit and present the project to the judges. This includes city information and describes the city's public spaces and the engineering concepts behind it.

The team works on this from September until competition in January.

"We meet twice a week after school for about two hours each day," Tompkins said.

Wayne High Speech team to host Home Show

The Wayne High Speech Team will host its annual Home Show and Parents' Day at the high school Saturday, Feb. 4, starting at 8:30 a.m. The public is invited.

"With virtually all of our speech contests being held at competitions hosted by other schools in other towns, the Home Show is our way of performing solely for the Wayne community," Head Coach Dwaine Spieker said.

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Osnes named Reader of the Week

This week's Reader of the Week at the Wayne Public Library is Julie Osnes.

What is the last book you read?

Currently I am reading *The Nightingale* by Kristin Hannah. Several people told me it was a great read so I put it on my list and finally had time to start it this past weekend.

Who is your favorite author?

Truly, I don't believe I have one. I loved all of Robert Fulghum's books, the most famous of which was, *All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten*. The only author I remember seeking out to read repeatedly was Dick Francis, a British steeplechase jockey turned mystery crime writer. In the summers of my early twenties I worked at Aksarben and later at Jubilee Farms in Omaha as a hot-walker, then horse groom. On route to show, the farm manager lent me his copy and I read it cover to cover before we arrived. I loved racing, and Francis' books are all set in the horse-racing world, so I was hooked. You are lured into that world once you get the smell in your nose. It invites you, "to run away with the circus," as my mother once put it. Dick Francis, was the author that brought me back to reading books for pleasure, after assigned reading had burned me out in high school and college.

Why do you read?

I read to gain insight, for enjoyment and to better myself. When I was young, a very impressive Air Force Commander gave a lecture at my school. He told us he was always reading two books, one to better himself and one for enjoyment; that stuck with me. I love

stories about real people in real situations no matter what those may have been, war, peace, of just people getting through their day to day in different walks of life.

Have you ever given up on a book?

Sure. Not every book written has been well written.

Name a book you would recommend and tell everyone why they should read it.

I always recommend *The Book Thief* by Marcus Zusak. I couldn't read anything for a very long time after reading it, because I knew other books would be a letdown after its poignantly haunting beauty.

Is there anything else you'd like to comment on about your passion for reading?

People think I read all the time, I am a librarian after all, but really I don't. Doing this job requires lots of reading, but that is reading reviews, articles, web pages, summaries, and parts of books. In actuality, I probably read less than 10-12 books in a year. And, I actu-

ally read very slowly, often making notations. I savor stories and writing. Finding a well written phrase, or thought that strikes a chord, brings me delight.

I read books with book clubs and things that peak my interest. Blame it on the day job! Family, friends, lots of people with different reading styles come to the desk and recommend many varieties of books; so I pick them up and see where they go. Thus my reading style has changed and is much more eclectic now than it was in the past. It has taught me that we must all pass on good stories, or risk their loss to the ocean of noise that accosts us daily.

critical care room.

Then came the clinic in 1995, where physicians under the Northeast Nebraska Family Practice, Inc. umbrella would practice in Wayne, rather than being split between two locations in town like they had been previously.

Just a year after the clinic opened it's doors, a CT Scan room was added to the hospital.

A full outpatient addition was completed in 2000, which added seven exam rooms, a nurses station, doctor's dictation area and a new ambulance garage, director of plant operations Mark Tietz said.

"It was the big drive-through ambulance garage," Tietz said. "That was all added on during 1999-2000."

An in-house MRI was added in 2009 to further PMC's diagnostic capabilities.

"We became aware in about 2011-12 that our Wellness Center — which was in the basement, very small, cramped area — and Physical Therapy was growing and running out of room," Tietz said. "That's when it was decided that they would add on the Wellness Center and Physical Therapy area."

Tietz said during that time, expansion was also done on the Outpatient wing to include an Oncology area.

In addition to the therapy and wellness areas, a shell space was also constructed with the thought of future expansion in mind, which is where a multipurpose room, administration suite and student health reside now, in their new permanent spaces.

"We no longer have that space, but that was what happened prior to this project," Tietz said of the former shell space.

Student Health now has an exterior door for students to utilize. The door sits right off the walking trail on the west side of the building and has the Wildcat logo on it to help it stand out to students wishing to utilize the services.

"It's a lot handier for (the students)," Tietz said. "It took a little while to get everyone to figure out how to gain access — they were coming in the old way or through the ER, now they're a little more familiar with how to get there."

But it wasn't just space that needed updated or expanded on.

Thanks to the ever-growing world of medical practice and technology changes, Providence Medical Center — like every other hospital — was forced to keep up with those changes in order to offer the best care possible.

Equipment such as the 1968 Pontiac ambulance saw its end of life at PMC by 1982 when it was replaced.

In 1987, Providence Medical Center added its very first Ultrasound machine to the list of state-of-the-art technology. It was replaced in 1995 with a price tag of \$154,000.

Sister Kevin Hermesen was quoted saying "When you need it, it's worth every penny."

By 1996, Providence acquired its first CAT scan.

The millennium proved to be a year of change at PMC with the expansion of pharmacy services and the addition of vital signs monitors.

2006 saw a complete upgrade for the radiology department including another new ultrasound machine, and an upgraded CT scanner.

2008 and 2009 brought about a new C-Arm for the surgical department and an auto-pulse cardiac support pump as well as an in-house MRI.

The Life Flight service, a helicopter ambulance based at St. Joseph's Hospital in Omaha, was made available in 1984.

In 1986, PMC began offering a Cardiology Clinic additionally to the other services offered in the outpatient clinics.

Providence Medical Center began participating in the tissue donor program in December of 1989.

By 1997, PMC was able to provide teleradiography thanks to a grant from the Gardner Foundation and began conducting ACL reconstruction surgeries.

A new osteoporosis diagnostic technology was made available on a mobile basis monthly in 1998.

In the following years services, equipment and staffing

changes included massage therapy, lymphedema treatment, a wound ostomy continence nurse, body warming gowns and a fully automated pharmacy with three new dispensing cabinets were staples at PMC among many other additions.

And one big change came in 2009 as Providence Medical Center purchased the hospital from the Missionary Benedictine Sisters of Norfolk, becoming a non-profit community hospital.

Looking ahead, more changes will be made as technology and practices evolve, but also as health care dictates patient care.

Providence Medical Center's Chief Executive Officer Jim Frank discussed the future of health care and how it would affect services and practices offered at PMC, starting with a simple fact: technology advances.

Additional equipment and increased diagnostic and therapeutic capabilities will grow as technology advances, Frank said. Pieces of equipment that aren't available today will be around in the future.

And along with that, the use of telemedicine will likely go up for the sake of convenience. It's much more convenient to visit PMC and visit with a specialist via video feed than it is to drive to Omaha or Lincoln. Providence Medical Center already offers psychiatry through Tele-Health.

Another aspect of future health care Frank discussed was that of regulation.

When the government is responsible for paying for medical care, regulations become more strict and increase in numbers, but one-size-fits-all regulations are difficult to manage for a smaller community hospital such as PMC.

Because of that regulation, integrated healthcare systems are becoming more common around the country.

The trend incorporates physicians, small hospitals and tertiary hospitals under one umbrella. Nebraska hasn't been affected the way states like Iowa or Minnesota have, but it's becoming an influence in the state.

Frank believes with programs such as Medicare and Medicaid as well as private insurance, there will be decreased reimbursement in future years.

"They're all looking for ways to reduce their burden and their cuts affect us," Frank said. "We're in a health-care crisis and we anticipate changes to be made to that, which will ultimately affect us."

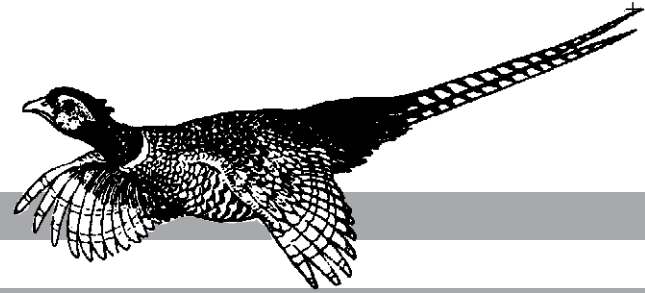

Blue Devils 1-1 in regular season, open tourney with O'Neill win

The Wayne High girls basketball team advanced to the semifinals of the Mid State Conference tournament with a 52-38 win over O'Neill in action Monday at Northeast Community College.

Wayne trailed early in the game, but took the lead for good late in the first quarter on a three-point play by Kylie Hammer. Molly Hoskins hit a 3-pointer with time winding down to give Wayne a 17-12 lead after one period.

O'Neill stayed in the game through the end of the half, cutting Wayne's lead down to three points at the half and scoring the opening basket of the second half to make it a 23-22 game.

Wayne took control after that, outscoring the Lady Eagles 17-5 the rest of the third period, with Frankie Klaussen's 3-pointer capping the run to give Wayne a 40-27 lead going to the fourth period and they cruised from there to the first-round win and improve to 15-5 on the season.

Hammer led the way with 19 points, Kelsey Boyer added seven and Morgan Keating put in six to lead a balanced attack. Lindy Sandoz put in four points, Klaussen and Hoskins each had three and Allison Echtenkamp, Jamie Gamble, Jenna Trenhaile, Ashton Boyer and Gabi Meyer each had two points.

In regular-season action Thursday, the Blue Devils got several key plays down the stretch in

the fourth quarter to hold off a feisty Lady Cadets squad and come away with a 58-53 win.

Wayne trailed 39-38 going to the final period, but took the lead for good in the fourth quarter on a pair of 3-pointers by Hammer. Wayne then finished the night hitting 14-of-18 shots from the free throw line, the final two coming from Echtenkamp, to close out the win.

Wayne got out to an 8-2 lead early in the game, but West Point's offense heated up in the second period and the Lady Cadets took a 28-23 lead into the locker room. Wayne regained the lead late in the third before West Point-Beemer came back to take a one-point lead into the final period.

Hammer scored a game-high 28 points to pace the Blue Devils, while Kelsey Boyer added 11 points and Echtenkamp scored eight. Also scoring were Klausen with four, Gamble with three and Ashton Boyer and Sandoz with two apiece.

On Saturday, the Blue Devils held top-ranked Crofton 21 points under their season average, but couldn't buy a bucket of their own as they dropped a 40-24 decision to the five-time defending Class C2 champions at Wayne High School.

The two teams traded baskets early, with Echtenkamp getting Wayne on the board after a Warriors basket. Crofton would answer with a nine-point run and built a 15-6 lead after one period.

Wayne got within four early in the second with 3-pointers by Boyer and Hammer and a Sandoz free throw, but Crofton rebuilt the lead to nine points at the half and limited Wayne to just 10 second-half points to come away with the win.

Hammer led the Blue Devils with 10 points and Boyer added seven. Klausen had three points, Echtenkamp scored two and Sandoz and Meyer both had one.

Wayne State picked eighth in NSIC baseball poll

The Wayne State baseball team was picked eighth in the 2017 NSIC Preseason Baseball Coaches Poll released earlier this week.

The Wildcats return four starters from last year's team that was 15-28 overall and finished ninth in the NSIC with a 12-16 league mark.

For the seventh time in the last eight years, Minnesota State was selected as the team to beat in the NSIC this season after receiving 10 first place votes. St. Cloud State, last year's NSIC tournament champions, were second with four first place votes. Augustana came in third, followed by Concordia-St. Paul and Minnesota Duluth who received the remaining first place vote.

Senior third baseman Cody Jenkins and senior starting pitcher Bobby St. Pierre have been tabbed as Wildcats to Watch in the NSIC this season.

Jenkins, a 5-foot-11 200-pound

senior from Englewood, Colorado, is Wayne State's position player to watch in the NSIC this season. Last year, Jenkins posted a .337 batting average with five home runs and 29 RBI. He ranked second on the team in hits (55) and doubles (13) and was third on the team with 15 multi-hit games.

St. Pierre is a 6-foot-3, 225-pound senior from Windsor, Ontario listed as Wayne State's pitcher to watch this season. A transfer from Madonna University in Michigan, St. Pierre will move to a starting pitcher for the Wildcats after recording 24 saves, a 4-1 record and 1.48 ERA the last two seasons as a closer. He helped Madonna reach the NAIA World Series last season.

Wayne State is scheduled to open the 2017 baseball season on Saturday, Feb. 18 at Newman University in Kansas for a doubleheader starting at 12 p.m.

WSC track team offering Feb. 18 camp

Wayne State College Track and Field is offering athletes a chance to get a head start on the track and field season and to help them develop their skills for the upcoming season and beyond with a camp for athletes in grades 9-12 on Saturday, Feb. 18.

The one-day camp will be held at the WSC Rec Center and will include sprints, long jump, triple jump, high jump, shot put, and discus. Check-in is from 8:15-8:45 a.m., with the camp starting at 9 a.m.

Pre-registered athletes are \$40 until Feb. 10, then \$50 after that, including day of registrations. Registration is available online at www.wscwildcats.com on the Additional Links link on the Track and Field page. The registration fee covers the cost of camp, lunch in the WSC Cafeteria, and camp T-shirt.

Sprint, hurdle, and jump athletes will spend the first hour doing learning proper warm-up drills, sprint mechanics and acceleration drills. They will then choose which group they want to attend for the 10 a.m. and 11 a.m. sessions. Following that, the campers will get lunch in the WSC cafeteria, a short presentation about "What you need to know to become a college athlete", and conclude with a session in the WSC Varsity Weight Room about weight room basics for track and field development.

Throwers will spend the first hour divided into either shot put or discus groups. The second hour will either be an advanced continuation for those that started in either event or covering the basic fundamentals if they were in the other group. The third hour will be an introduction to the hammer and weight throw events. Following that, will be a session in the WSC Varsity Weight Room to teach some basic lifts to help throwers develop. Finally, they will conclude with a short presentation about "What you need to know to become a collegiate athlete", and conclude with lunch in the WSC cafeteria.

Dr. Myles N. Brand, visionary leader, educator and reformer, served as the President of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) from 2003-2009. He

Brand presided over passage of the most comprehensive academic reform package for intercollegiate athletics in recent history - a package that refocused the attention of student-athletes, coaches and administrators on the education of student-athletes.

His impact on Division II ran deep by implementing an identity campaign and a strategic-positioning platform tied to specific divisional attributes. He challenged Division II to continue its game environment and community engagement focus, and improve academic success rates.

pin at 195 and 220 pounds, respectively, while Stanley lost on a third-period pin.

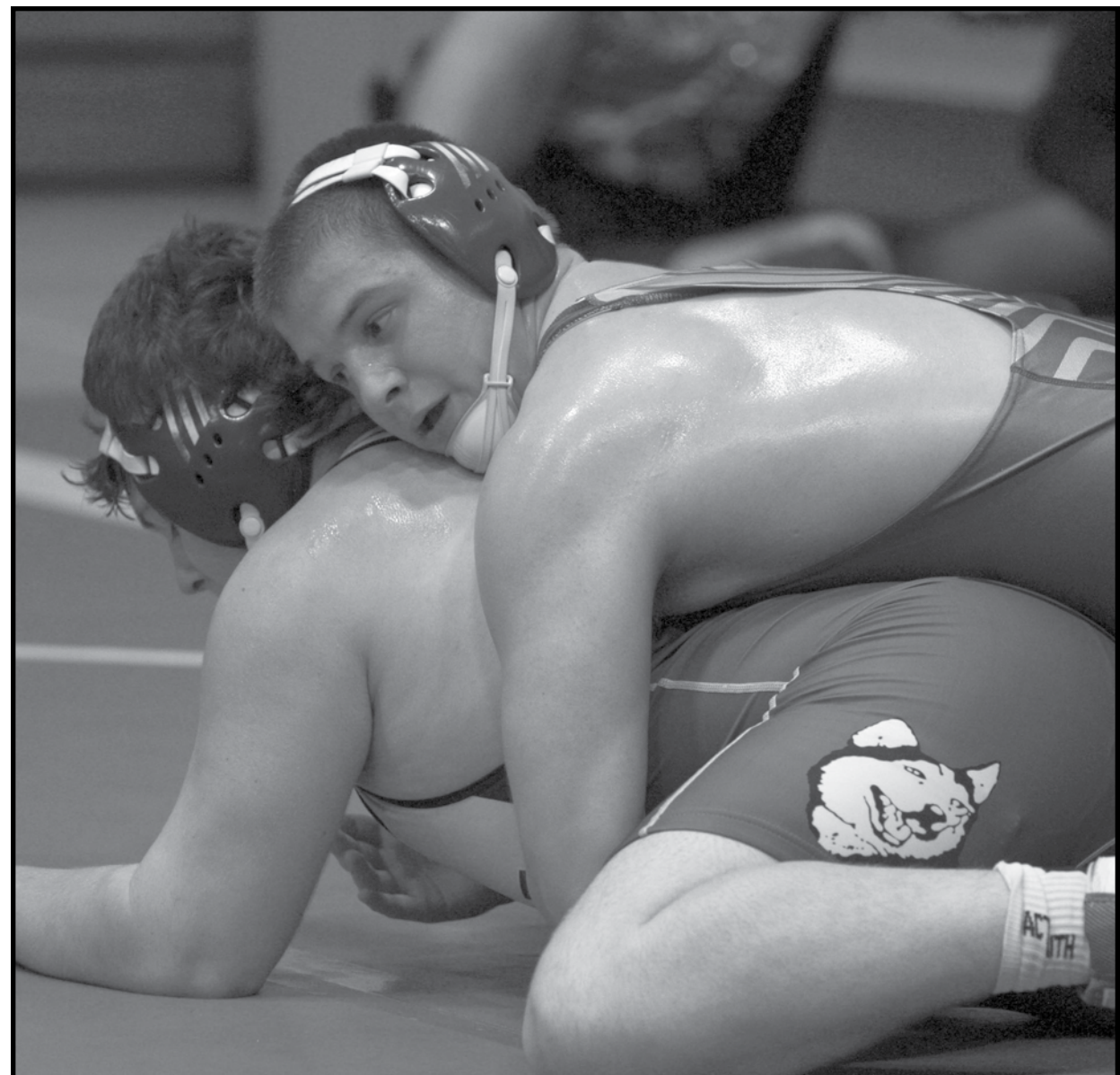

WSC track teams set NCAA marks while in Minnesota

Junior Derek Lahm set a new school record in the heptathlon, placing second with 4,966 points, to lead the Wayne State men's indoor track and field team Friday and Saturday at the Minnesota State Open in Mankato, Minn.

Lahm scored 4,966 points for a second place finish that was an NCAA provisional mark (12th in NCAA Div. II) for the Wildcats. He broke the school record of 4,788 points set last year by Josh Spenner.

Brady Metz captured a first place finish in the triple jump with a top leap of 47 feet, 0 1/4 inches. Braxton Adams recorded a season-best time of 6.93 seconds to place second in the 60-meter dash finals while Corbin Lehn posted a second place finish in the 5,000-meter run with a time of 16:34.58.

In the 600-meter dash, Nathan Pearson was third (1:27.16), Habib Jallow sixth (1:28.26), Brandon Marker seventh (1:29.77), Cody Kralicek ninth (1:30.70) and Allen Arauz 10th (1:33.69).

Wayne State had three runners finish in the top 10 in the 3,000-meter run as Jack Doughty was sixth (9:38.08), Iasias Solorio eighth (9:42.55) and Joey Black 10th at

10:07.50.

Josh Spenner recorded a trio of top 10 placings, taking sixth in the long jump (19-11), seventh in the pole vault (14-5 1/4) and ninth in the 60-meter hurdles (9.12).

In the throws, three Wildcats placed in the top 10 in the weight throw as Richard Sweeney was seventh (52-10), Matt Nemecek eighth (52-5 1/4) and Cade Kalkowski ninth (51-8 1/4).

Clay Kramper was seventh in the 200 meter dash in 23.03 seconds and Kak Ayaj was eighth in the 800 meter run with a time of 2:02.32.

In women's action, Michaela Dendinger hit a pair of NCAA provisional marks in the shot put and weight throw, placing first and second, respectively to lead the Wayne State women's team.

Dendinger won the shot put with an NCAA provisional and season-best mark of 50-3 1/2, more than three feet better than her previous best throw this season. The mark now moves Dendinger into fourth place in NCAA Div. II. She also collected a second-place finish in the

weight throw with a personal best mark of 61-5 3/4, another NCAA provisional mark that now places her ninth in NCAA Div. II.

Shelby Poell came in seventh place in the women's pentathlon with 2,802 points. Riana Noelle was seventh in the triple jump at 33-8 1/2.

Tia Jones earned a ninth-place finish in the shot put (40-3 1/4) while Tessa Ives came in 12th in the weight throw at 47-0 1/4.

Mary Alderson recorded an 11th place finish in the 600-meter dash (1:46.48) while Wakefield native Josephine Peitz was 15th at 1:54.02. The Wildcat 1,600-meter relay team of Melissa Kroll, Rachel Rauner, Alderson and Peitz came in eighth with a time of 4:23.03.

Wayne State will be competing in a pair of meets next weekend, with some Wildcats at the Husker Invite in Lincoln Friday and Saturday while a majority of the team will participate in the South Dakota Invite at the Dakota Dome in Vermillion, S.D.

WSC Wildcat men get buzzer-beater win at Duluth

The Wayne State men's basketball team played a pair of tough outings on the road last week, but salvaged a weekend split with a buzzer-beating win at Minnesota Duluth.

On Saturday, Vance Janssen drove the length of the court with 4.3 seconds left and hit the game-winning lay-in as time expired to give Wayne State a come-from-behind 79-77 win over the Bulldogs, moving the Wildcats record to 7-15 overall and 5-11 in NSIC play.

Wayne State held the lead for most of the first half, building early leads of 11-5 and 18-11 before the hosts would rally. Wayne State led by as many as eight points before Duluth came back to tie the game, and Austin Esters closed the half with a layup to give Wayne State a 41-39 halftime lead.

The game went back and forth in the second half with six ties and six lead changes. Wayne State led 59-53 with 12:10 left

on a three-point play by Kendall Jacks, but Duluth rallied to tie the score at 61-61 with 9:20 left.

Duluth built a 72-66 lead with 2:54 to go before Wayne State rallied with a Matt Thomas 3-pointer sandwiched between two Jacks layups to make it 73-72 with 1:40 to go.

Janssen broke a 73-73 tie with a three-point play with 1:09 to go, but Duluth came back to tie the game with 4.3 seconds to go. Janssen took the inbounds pass and drove the length of the court for a running layup that scored at the buzzer for the two-point win.

Jacks led the Wildcats with 18 points, Janssen added 15, Esters put in 14 and Brian Goodwin had 11. Janssen led the team with five rebounds, four assists and two steals.

On Friday, St. Cloud rallied in the second half to post an 84-80 win over the Wildcats.

Wayne State bounced back from a slow start, erasing an

eight-point deficit with an 11-0 run late in the half to take a 38-29 halftime advantage.

Wayne State took its biggest lead at 41-29 on a Jordan Cornelius 3-pointer to open the second half, but St. Cloud state rallied with a 14-2 run to tie the game at 43-43 with 16:41 to play.

Wayne State kept the game close until the end, getting as close as 62-60 on two Jacks free throws with 7:47 to go. They had a chance to tie the game late, but missed three of four free throws and the Huskies were able to hang on for the win.

Jacks and Cornelius each had 14 points while Goodwin and Janssen had 13 points apiece in the losing effort for the Wildcats. Jacks had six rebounds and Luke TerHark dished out four assists.

Wayne State is home this weekend with a Friday matchup against Bemidji State at 8 p.m. and a Saturday contest against Minnesota Crookston at 6 p.m.

WSC women split road contests

For the second straight weekend, the Wayne State women were on the road and they came away with one win and one loss for their efforts.

On Friday, the Wildcats were out-rebounded 51-32, but shot 50 percent from the field to post a 75-63 win over St. Cloud State.

Wayne State opened with a 7-0 run and never trailed in posting their 11th straight win over the Huskies. Wayne State led 20-12 after one period and led by as many as 11 points before taking a 37-29 halftime advantage.

The Huskies kept things close until late in the third quarter. Wayne State closed the period with an 11-4 run to take a 61-50 lead going to the final period, and never led by less than 10 points after that.

Paige Ballinger led the Wildcats with a game-high 21 points, six rebounds and five assists, and Anna Martensen was 8-of-9 from the field to finish with 17 points. Haley Moore hit four 3-pointers and finished with 14 points and had six assists and four steals.

On Saturday, the Wildcats were

Paige Ballinger had a double-double with 20 points and 11 rebounds to lead the way. Schulte added 14 points.

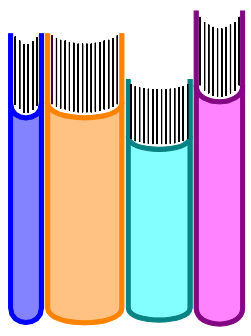

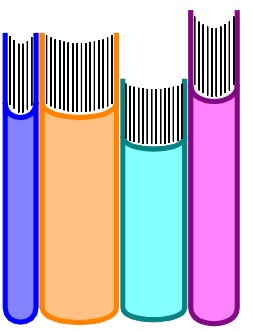

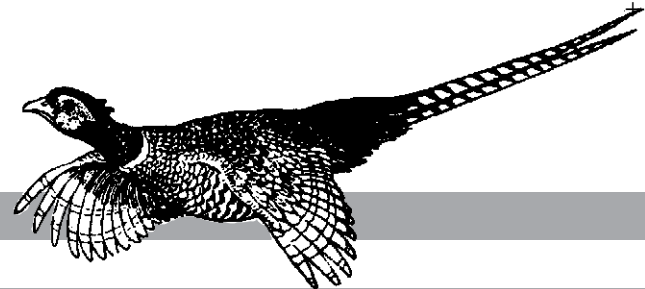

Healthy, hot cereals provide many benefits

What better way to get your day started during these cold Nebraska winter months than with a bowl of steaming hot cereal? Something that will "stick to your ribs" as my grandmother used to say — and she was right! Now there's research to back up her wise advice.


Studies show that people who eat high-fiber cereals for breakfast most mornings are less likely to be overweight, are at less risk for heart disease and some types of cancer, and are less likely to experience wild swings in blood sugar levels.

A high-fiber cereal goes a long way to boost your health, and a hot high-fiber cereal is a great choice! There are many tasty choices available and even more ways to customize it to suit your tastes and your nutrition needs. Spend some time checking out the items in your

grocery aisles.

Hot tips for healthy cereals:

• Choose a cereal that provides at least three grams of fiber per serving; more is even better.

• Basic hot cereals are sugar-free, but some of the new combinations that sound almost like dessert contain as much as 19 grams of sugar per serving — that's almost five teaspoons! Choose a cereal that has no more than eight grams of sugar per serving.

• Flavored and instant hot cereals are typically high in sodium, so choose plain cereals to reduce sodium intake.

• Make your hot cereal with skim

or soy milk instead of water for a creamier texture and added nutrition.

• Spice up plain offerings with cinnamon, allspice or nutmeg.

• Add fruit like raisins, blueberries or bananas for more flavor and better nutrition.

• Top off with chopped walnuts for a boost of vitamin E and omega-3 fats.

• Individual containers of hot cereal are certainly the most convenient, but they also tend to be the choice loaded with calories, fat, sugar and sodium. Plus, they cost

more! Pay close attention to the nutrition label to find a healthy choice. Or look up recipes for "overnight oats" to make your own (the oats soak overnight and then you just have to warm it up in the microwave the next morning).

• It's typically best (in terms of cost and nutrition) to start with plain cereal and add your own healthy additions.

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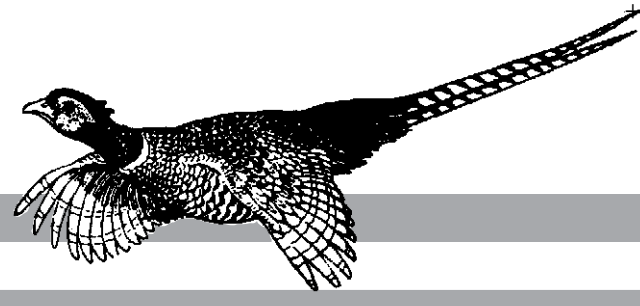

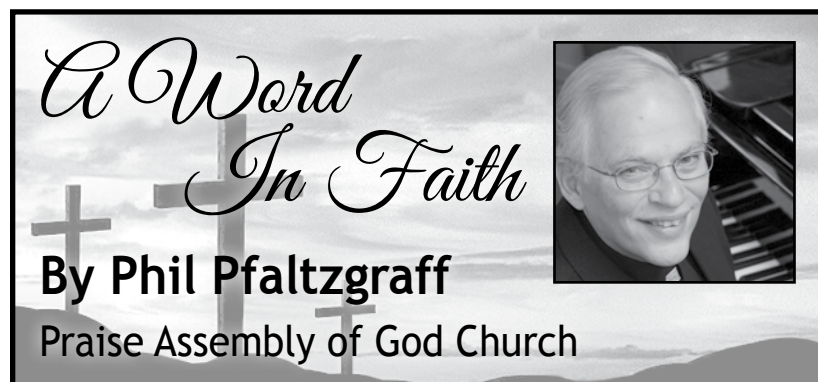
And an endearing - and intriguing - theme.

"Somewhere" is not going to land at our doorstep in the form of a Publisher's Outlet delivery. "Somewhere" is not going to be found as you or I protest this or that, even if it's a good cause. "Somewhere" is going to be missed if we consistently ignore the lonely and elderly in our midst.

"Somewhere" is not a place or a relationship. "Somewhere" is not the absence of trouble and adversity. "Somewhere" is not going to happen whenever "things get better" or when "tomorrow is another day" arrives. "Somewhere" is not dependent on who did or did not treat you or me justly. "Somewhere" is not a result of "getting it right this time." "Somewhere" is definitely not going to happen just because we followed

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a particular set of self-help steps and affirmations.

"Somewhere" is too elusive for all of our human expressions and verbiage. It is too vague for our emotions to articulate.

But if we are quiet, we can find the only place where all things make sense: in the presence of the Lord. As the Children of Israel were wandering in the wilderness, en route to their land of promise, they carried with them a large structure called the "Tabernacle", an elaborate combination of pillars, fabric, utensils, relics, and liturgy with a special place in the center, called "The Holy of Holies". It was the most sacred place because God dwelt there. And it was from that place that the people heard from the Lord, via the prophets and other leaders.

But with the ordination of the "New Covenant" in the blood of Christ, the presence of God now dwells - by the Holy Spirit - with people. What this means is that "somewhere" is now right here, among us: wherever two or three are gathered together (Matthew 18:20; Matthew 28:20), God is there. We have His invitation to "come unto Me, all ye who are weary and heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28-30). And in Isaiah 1:18 we are summoned to "come, let us reason together -- though your sins are as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow."

Things will be "all right" when you come close to the Lord. His Word promises that!

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Private pesticide applicator trainings scheduled

Private pesticide applicators whose licenses expire in 2017 and those seeking first-time certification can find information on pesticide safety education programs at their local University of Nebraska Extension offices.

Licensing as a private applicator allows farmers to purchase and use pesticides classified as restricted use by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in their own farming operations. Extension provides the educational program,

while the agriculture department is responsible for licensing. The training fee is \$30. An applicator may also certify by self-study or online training for a \$60 training fee.

In 2001, the Nebraska Legislature created a state pesticide license fee of \$25 for private applicators. The fee covers a three-year license period.

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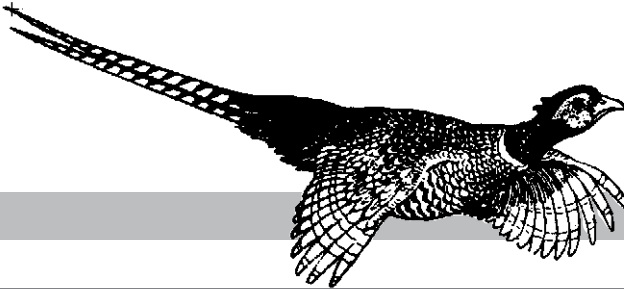
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Basketball, reading highlight January

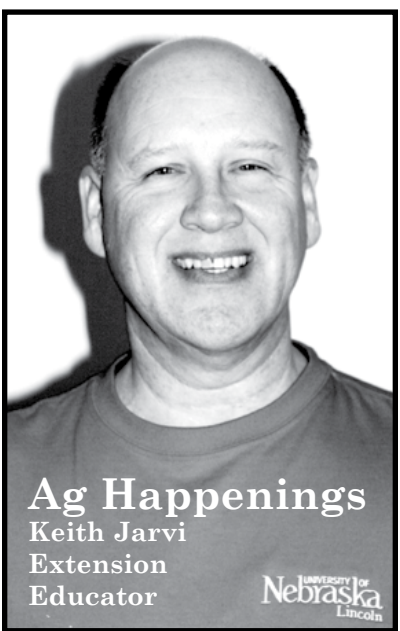

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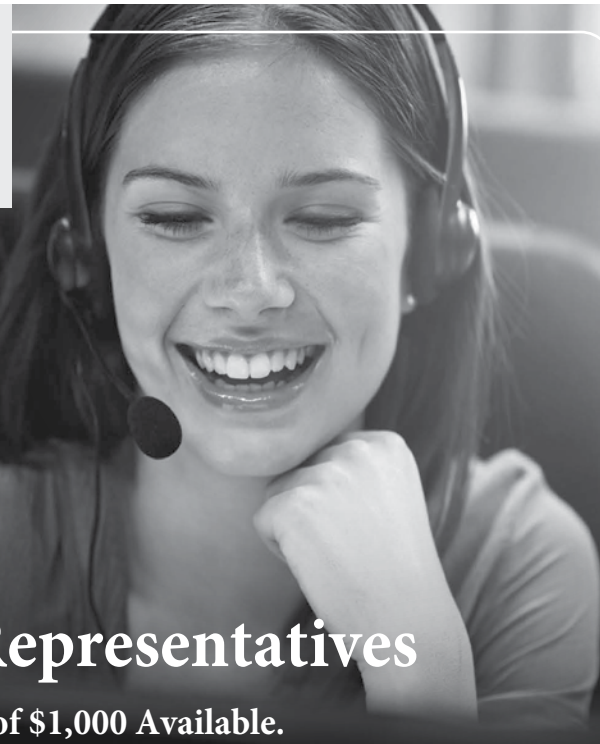
