# Young entrepreneurs helping to make downtown Wayne a destination

Years with minimal use had left the old city hall building at Second and Pearl streets in dire need of more than just a facelift.

The building had been gifted to the Wayne Community Theater group, some years ago, but with the construction of the Majestic Theater and the immense amount of upkeep required for such a large building, it slowly started

For years, Mark Kanitz and Lukas Rix drove past the building, hating that it wasn't being used for something more than storage. Finally, the entrepreneurs decided to take matters into their own hands — putting feelers out and eventually putting an offer in on the building that hadn't been listed for sale.

One thing led to another and, viola, the two were the proud, albeit overwhelmed, owners of one of Wayne's most prominent buildings with a history steeped in the community.

When the city purchased its first fire engine in 1910, it didn't take long to realize that the previous buildings the police and firemen were operating out of weren't sufficient. The need for a central location for those entities and their equipment to be located in was crucial, so plans were made for the facility's construction, but in the midst of the planning, the location was changed.

"This building was not supposed to be built here," Rix said of the Pearl and Second street location. "The architecture actually matches the Baptist church. It was supposed to sit right across the street from that."

Thanks to a forward-thinking mayor, the location proposed was scraped and the city went forward with construction

where the building sits currently.

His reasoning for doing so? Revital-

At the time, Wayne's railroad system was the lifeblood of the community, but Wayne State College on the hill was a major draw. There was a definite divide in the community -- the further from the tracks, the better off you must be.

"With some of the crowd that came off the trains at the time, this area was considered the lower part of town. [The building] was slated to be built further up there," Rix said of the proposed Main Street location. "But the mayor at the time said the city wasn't going to flee

the areas that needed to be revitalized." So instead of being the divider in the

city, the facility was built just a block from the tracks with room for the fire department, police department, mayor's office, city council chambers and a ball-







# Anderson selected as 'Reader of the Week'

This week's Reader of the Week at the Wayne Public Library is Bonnie Andersen.

What is the last book you read? I recently enjoyed March by Congressman John Lewis, a 3 volume memoir of the Civil Rights Movement in the form of a graphic novel, co-written with Andrew Avdin and illustrated by Nate Powell. It was the first book in a graphic format I've read and engaged me throughout with its vivid depiction and passionate narration of this long struggle for human rights. And it was all the more meaningful for me personally in being donated by Char Rasmussen in memory of my late husband, Sayre.

Who is your favorite author?

I have several: Toni Morrison (especially her novel, Beloved), Louise Erdrich (The Master Butcher's Singing Club), Lahiri Jhumpa (The Namesake) Ian McEwan (Nutshell), Margaret Atwood, (The Handmaid's Tale) Haruki Murakami (Kafka on the Shore) Abraham Verghese (Cutting for Stone). I could go on but won't.

Why do you read?

I read for both enjoyment and to learn something new about the world (or, increasingly, to remind myself of what I've forgotten!) the enjoyment comes from the satisfying vicarious experiences well-written books give. Though this offers an escape from ordinary, life, it can also offer new insights into one's own mundane life. As long as something is well written, whether fiction or non-fiction, it's not a waste of time. So I guess I read mainly because of my lifelong love of language. Oh yes. The older I get, the less likely I am to finish a book if I'm not getting much from it. I used to finish it if I'd already read at least a third, but that's no longer true. Now I figure such self-punishment more a waste of time than proof of selfdiscipline. Life is just too short not to ditch one book for another. Confession: I do still hope before I die to finish War And Peace after getting through it. But I'm probably kidding myself. A long hospital stay would be involved in order to start from scratch again after 30 some years.

And who would wish for that? I did finish Moby Dick 40 some years ago but admit to skipping over a few of the whaling craft details to do so!

Name a book you would recommend and tell everyone why they should read it.

I'd have to nominate Marcus Zusak's The Book Thief. Its masterful prose and the uncompromisingly honest and direct voice of its young narrator would appeal to readers of all ages and tastes in reading. I wanted it never to end and will certainly read it again both for the story and language.

Is there anything else you'd like to comment on about your passion for reading?

Like Thomas Jefferson, I have to say, "I cannot live without books." I feel so much more fortunate than him in the choice and number of books available in our times. However, this makes for today's dilemma of "So Many Books, So Little Time." I have kept too many books, remembering them as friends in good times and bad and am trying to weed them out, a few at a time, knowing they are usually available for loan or online. Marie Kondo's The Life-Changing Magic of Tidying Up helps in that task to free up some space and send these friends out in the world to be enjoyed by other readers. with friends and family for the most part, and the entrepreneurs were able to secure some financial assistance for the restoration from the Wayne City Council because the building is a historic one.

"We remodeled with one 100-watt light bulb — there was no heating or cooling, there was no plumbing that worked," Rix said.

From the original tin ceilings on the first floor to the ballroom floor on the second level, both Rix and Kanitz kept as much original as possible -- even recycling the lath pulled from the walls to use in constructing a statement wall on the

As they delved into the major project, several surprises were in store - including finding the original jail cell and one of the first pike poles used by the fire department, as well as the original cast iron sink from the second-story kitchen and original cabinetry that artfully conceal the passthrough for the kitchen out to the ballroom when it's not in use.

But one of the best finds in the building is the solid wood table on the second floor that sat through hundreds of city council meetings with members bellied-up to it as decisions were made for the city. The table, and several other pieces of furniture, was purchased thanks to a dance held at the newly-constructed city auditorium the day after it opened.

The city used the dance as a fundraiser to purchase furniture since the money raised through taxes totaled just enough to build the facility, not furnish it.

"They held a firemen's ball on Nov. 8 of 1912 to help pay for all the furniture." Rix said. "So this table would have been purchased with that money."

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



## WSC men third with two champs at NSIC Indoors

MANKATO, Minn. - The Wayne State men's indoor track and field team finished third with 69 points at the 2017 Northern Sun Conference Indoor Championships that concluded Saturday at Myers Fieldhouse in Mankato, Minn.

The Wildcats had two conference champions while three finished as All-NSIC performers.

Antoine Bardou was the individual champion in the 1,000-meter run with a time of 2:28.95 and placed fourth in the mile run at 4:13.69. Wayne State's other conference champion was Robert Sullivan in the heptathlon with a new school record point total of 5,141 points. He also placed eighth in the 60-meter hurdles with a time of 8.57 seconds.

Braxton Adams earned All-NSIC honors with a second-place finish in the 60-meter dash finals with a season-best time of 6.93

Brady Metz collected All-NSIC accolades, taking third in the triple jump (48-0 1/2) to go with a seventh-place finish in the long jump at 22-11 3/4.

Derek Lahm scored points in three events, earning All-NSIC honors with a third in the heptathlon (4,970 points), placing fourth in the long jump (23-6 3/4) and taking fifth in the triple jump (47-3 3/4).

Clay Kramper collected a sixth in the 200-meter dash (22.38) while Nick Fly came in seventh in the 1,000-meter run finals at

Two Wildcat throwers recorded personal best marks in the weight throw to score points in the event. Matt Nemec came in sixth with a throw of 56-1 3/4, more than two feet better than his previous personal mark; and Cade Kalkowski was right behind in seventh at 55-6 1/2, over three feet ahead of his previous

The distance medley relay team of Nick Schmit, Brandon Marker, Kak Ayaj and Nick Fly came in eighth place with a time of 10:45.61 while the 1,600-meter relay team of Lahm, Kramper, Travis Eller and Habib Jallow also placed eighth with a time of

In women's action, Michaela Dendinger picked up a pair of All-NSIC honors, placing second in the weight throw and third in the shot put, to lead the Wayne State women to an 11th place finish with 17 points.

Dendinger earned All-NSIC honors Friday with a secondplace finish in the weight throw, a personal-best mark of 63-4 1/4, which was also an NCAA provisional mark that now ranks ninth in NCAA Div. II. She followed that performance on Saturday by placing third in the shot put with a top throw of  $46-0\ 3/4$ to earn All-NSIC honors in that event as well.

Other Wildcats that scored points included senior Melissa Kroll taking seventh in the 600-meter run at 1:43.55 while sophomore Tia Jones recorded a seventh in the weight throw with a top mark of 43-4 1/2.

Minnesota State swept the team titles. The men won a sixth straight NSIC indoor title with 183.5 points, finishing ahead of runner-up Sioux Falls (154). The Minnesota State women scored 171 points to easily outdistance runner-up University of Mary's 103 points.

# Blue Devils see state title hopes crushed by O'Neill

NORFOLK - Sixty seconds.

When Wayne High senior Grayson McBride threw down a dunk after receiving a press-breaking pass, Wayne held a 48-38 lead with 1:00 left in the C1-4 district championship game Monday at Northeast Community College and looked to be headed back to the state basketball tourna ment next week in Lincoln.

What happened in the final 60 seconds of the game, though, sent the Blue Devils from the euphoria of being on the verge of winning a district title to the shock and despair of seeing that opportunity slip away.

O'Neill mounted an amazing comeback, capped by a Justin Appleby basket with 4.8 seconds left, and came away with a 50-49 shocker over the Blue Devils to claim the district title, earn the trip to state and send Wayne home with about as tough a loss as a team could possibly experience.

Even in the aftermath of the stunning loss, coach Rob Sweetland was left with little to say.

"I can't think of any worse way," he said of the heartbreaking defeat. "It's like ripping your heart out when you're trying to hold it together for a few minutes."

For the first 30 minutes of the game, and especially for all but the final 60 seconds of the second half, Wayne appeared to be the better team. Despite having three starters with two fouls in the first period, Wayne managed a 17-16 halftime advantage, then held O'Neill to a single free throw, keeping them off the scoreboard the final 6:09 of the third period to take a 27-17 lead into the fourth quarter.

Wayne struggled on its own offensively through the first 2 1/2 quarters against a physical O'Neill defense, yet never trailed until the final seconds. They seemed to finally crack the code in the final 90 seconds of the third quarter, going on an 8-0 run to end the third period with baskets by Will Anderson, Mason Lee, Ryan Jaixen and Jack Evetovich to take a 10-point lead into the final period.

"We played great defense throughout the first 30 minutes of the game," Sweetland said. "We just had some dumb fouls and some calls go against us, and then we couldn't convert free throws and they made plays down the stretch."

O'Neill got within six early in the fourth quarter, but Lee scored a pair of baskets to get the lead back to 10 points with 6:36 to go.

The second of Lee's back-to-back hoops was part of a potential three-point play opportunity, but Lee missed the free throw, which would become part of a 10-for-23 effort by the Blue Devils at the charity stripe in the final period that would come back to haunt them later.

Even with Wayne's woes at the foul line, O'Neill couldn't seem to get any closer than five points with 2:55 to go. McBride, Evetovich and Beau Bowers combined to go 5-for-8 at the foul line in a 57-second stretch to get the lead back to 10 at 44-34. The teams traded baskets, with McBride's dunk making it 48-38 with 60 seconds to play.

"Maybe we were thinking that it was over (at that point) and didn't keep playing," Sweetland said. "They were shoving us a lot underneath and we couldn't hold our own, and we just need to be stronger underneath.'

Wayne committed four fouls in the final minute that O'Neill was able to convert into points, and they whittled that 10-point deficit down to one point on two Wyatt LIewer free throws after Payten Gamble was whistled for his fifth foul with:19 remaining.

O'Neill fouled McBride with :17 left, but he was unable to convert on two free throws and the Eagles rebounded and moved the ball to midcourt before calling time out with 11.8 seconds left to set up Appleby's floater in the lane, giving O'Neill the lead for the first time with 4.8

Wayne had one last chance and got the ball up the court to Anderson, who had a good look at a 15-footer from the right wing. The ball hit the back of the rim and fell away as the buzzer

sounded, leaving the Wayne boys to fall to the floor in disappointment as the Eagles celebrated the come-from-behind win.

McBride led the 19-8 Blue Devils with 17points and had four blocked shots. Lee had 11 points, seven rebounds and two blocks, Anderson finished with seven points, Evetovich had six points and five rebounds, and Jaixen and Bowers each had four points. Gamble, who was held scoreless by the O'Neill defense, finished with three steals defensively.

Wayne used a game-ending 17-0 run to break a 39-39 tie and win the C1-7 subdistrict title Thursday with a 56-39 win over West Point-Beemer in action Thursday at Norfolk High

The win was the third of the season for the Blue Devils over West Point-Beemer and was close throughout, with neither team leading by more than six points through the first three

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## Three Wildcats earn All-NSIC honors

Three Wayne State basketball players were tabbed by coaches in the Northern Sun Conference on this year's All-Northern Sun Conference men's and women's basketball teams.

For the second straight season, Paige Ballinger and Maggie Schulte represent Wayne State College on the All-NSIC women's team. Ballinger was a repeat selection on the All-NSIC First Team, while Schulte made the All-NSIC Second Team for the second straight year.

Ballinger, a 6-foot-1 junior center from Pender, collected First Team All-NSIC honors for a second straight season after leading Wayne State in scoring at 14.5 points per game overall. She ranked 11th in the league in scoring, was seventh in field goal percentage (.498) and led the NSIC in blocked shots per contest at 2.6. She scored her 1,000th career point Wednesday in the first round of the NSIC Sanford Health Tournament with a gamehigh 22 points in the Wildcats' 85-61 win over Bemidji State.

In 22 NSIC games this season, Ballinger accounted for 14.8 points and 4.5 rebounds per game, shooting 49.8 percent from the field and 77 percent at the charity stripe. She ranked 11th in NSIC play in scoring, 10th in field goal percentage and first in blocked shots per game.

from Wynot, earned Second Team All-NSIC honors for a second straight season after averaging 12.0points and a team-high 6.3 rebounds per game this season. She ranked fifth in the NSIC in free throw percentage (.855), making 100 of 117 this season, eighth in defensive rebounds per game (5.4) and 16th in overall rebounding (6.3 per game). Schulte recorded her 1,000th career point on Saturday with 24 points and 10 rebounds in a 67-63 home win over Winona State.

In 22 NSIC games this season, Schulte averaged 12.4 points and 6.5 rebounds a contest. She was third in NSIC games in free throw percentage (.903), ninth in defensive rebounds per game (5.5) and 16th in

rebounding. Kendall Jacks was named to Second Team All-NSIC honors. He is the first Wildcat player since Amry Shelby in 2012-13 to collect All-NSIC honors in men's basketball.

Jacks, a 6-foot-4 sophomore guard

forward from Bettendorf, Iowa, led Schulte, a 6-foot junior forward the Wildcats this season in scoring at 16.1 points per game. He scored double figures in 21 straight games and produced 10 or more points in 27 of 29 games for the Wildcats. Jacks ranked ninth in the NSIC in scoring this season and was ninth in field goal percentage (.562), making 178 of 317 shots from the field. 
Three Wayne State indoor track and field athletes were named to the U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association) All-Region Team.

# WSC women's postseason hopes slim after NSIC semis loss

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. – Hopes for the Wayne State women's basketball team to get back to the NCAA tournament looked to be on thin ice after Monday afternoon's 58-49 loss to Sioux Falls in the semifinals of the Northern Sun Conference Tournament.

The loss put the Wildcats at 23-7 on the season, but they were sitting in ninth place in the last Central Region rankings and coach Chris Kielsmeier felt the team would need to reach the conference finals to be able to move up to the No. 8 spot and get an invite to the NCAA tournament when the field of 64 is announced next weekend.

The Cougars outscored Wayne State 21-9 in the fourth quarter to come from behind for the nine-point win in Monday's semifinals matchup, moving them into Tuesday's championship game against Northern State, who defeated Winona State 69-64 in overtime in the second semifinal.

The Wildcats started slow in the contest, making just 1-of-7 from the field to start the game and trailed 7-2 early. Wayne State used a Kacie O'Connor 3-pointer to tie the score at 7-7 at the 4:55 mark and later took its first lead of the game at 12-11 on a Paige Ballinger three-point play with 2:13 to go in the quarter. Wayne State led 14-13 after one as Ballinger made 4-of-6 shots for nine first-quarter points while the rest of the team was 2-of-11 shooting in the quarter.

The second quarter saw both defenses continue to control play. The Wildcats used back-to-back baskets from senior forward Anna Martensen, with the second one turning into a three-point play as Wayne State took its biggest lead of the first half at 23-19 with 4:18 to go before halftime.

The Cougars battled back and tied the score at 23-23 with 2:24 to go in the second quarter, but Wayne State scored the last three points of the half, thanks to senior forward Katie Hoskins going 3-for-4 at the foul line, to give the Wildcats a 26-23 advantage at intermission.

The Wildcats built a pair of five-point leads in the third quarter at 31-26 and 33-28, but the Cougars scored seven straight points and took a 35-33 lead on a three-point play by Madi Robson with 3:26 left third quarter. Wayne State countered with a Ballinger layup, one free throw by Kacie O'Connor and Hoskins 3-pointer to regain the lead at 39-35 at the 1:09 mark before finishing the third quarter with a 40-37 lead.

The fourth quarter was dominated by the Cougars as USF made 7-of-13 shots from the field while Wayne State went cold, making just 4-of-16 as Sioux Falls put an end to Wayne State's

The two teams traded baskets early in the fourth quarter, but the turning point came when Wayne State went scoreless for almost half of the fourth quarter, allowing the Cougars to take control of the game. Martensen made a layup at the 7:40 mark to even the score at 44-44, but the Cougars scored the next seven points and Wayne State never scored again until a Maggie Schulte jumper with 2:56 left that got the Wildcats within five at 51-46. That's as close as Wayne State would get the rest of the way.

O'Connor later added a 3-pointer that gave the Wildcats its first double digit lead of the game at 15-5 with 4:40 to play in the first quarter.

Ballinger then carried the scoring load for Wayne State, scoring eight of the next 10 points for the Wildcats over a span of 2:13 that put the Wildcats up 27-9 before finishing the quarter advantage in points in the paint.



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

# Happy Birthday Nebraska

BUDGET CUTS ..

I was a bit disappointed when I realized the Nebraska 150 Express wasn't going to be an opportunity for regular Nebraskans to take a once-in-a-lifetime train trip across the state to celebrate the Sesquicentennial. I think that would be a great idea and could easily be a sold-out excursion.

But no, it is to be a celebrity event featuring some state officials and assorted celebrities in a style reminiscent of the "whistle-stop tours" of the early 19th Century. Invitations have been sent to "a select group of Nebraska native celebrities and notable figures," according to a news release from Governor Pete Ricketts office. The release says the individuals will disembark to give speeches, take photos, and/or sign autographs for audiences.

Research indicates that a whistle-stop tour is a style of political campaigning where the politician makes a series of brief appearances or speeches at a number of small towns over a short period of time. Originally, such appearances were made from the open platform of an observation car or a private railroad car.

The event is scheduled for August 4-6. Promoters say the train will start in Omaha and travel to Columbus, North Platte, Ogallala, Sidney, Gering, Kearney and Grand Island where each community will host a rally or festival to welcome the passengers. They'll be traveling in cars pulled by a Union Pacific Streamliner locomotive.

Yes, this will be a grand opportunity for each community to show off for the governor and his friends. No doubt there will be some really special events and Ricketts and his invitees will have a chance to be impressed by and perhaps impress folks in those cities.

One has to wonder if the governor will take advantage of this throwback political activity to announce his 2018 re-election campaign. Or maybe he'll dub this the Property Tax Express and continue his promise of lowering every Nebraskan's property taxes. I can't see him letting this opportunity go to waste.

I can't be too jealous of those folks who get to ride the train. One of the opportunities of being a firstyear Baby Boomer is that I am old enough to have traveled across the state by train. I was five when my mother took my older sister and me from Gering to Chicago on the Union Pacific. I have vivid memories of the mailbags dangling from posts alongside the tracks where they were snagged by workers on the train. The same with occasional stops to pick up or drop off cream

My freshman year at the University of Nebraska started with an all-night train ride from Scottsbluff to Alliance to Lincoln. I repeated that trip several times, both ways, at holidays and once when the snow was so heavy that roads were closed. But the train was running. A lot of people don't get that

experience any more. Yes, there are short excursion train rides offered in conjunction with festivals in some Nebraska communities and adults in Lincoln can ride the train at the Children's Zoo as long as they have a child or grandchild with them. But train travel for the masses – unless they are brave enough to try the loosely scheduled AMTRAK service that goes from Omaha to McCook and points beyond in either direction - is a thing

And that's a shame. Railroading has a grand history in Nebraska. My grandpa worked in the Havelock (Burlington) shops and at the Hastings (Burlington) round house. My father-in-law and two brothersin-law worked for the Union Pacific. As a little girl, my wife used to ride the train from North Platte to Chapman to spend time with her grandma. When we lived in Illinois, she rode AMTRAK from Peoria to Lincoln to defend her master's thesis at the University of Nebraska.

The Union Pacific main line has a rich history in Nebraska. In addition to the hanging mailbags I mentioned earlier, legend has it that there was another hanging attraction at Sidney. The gallows were right next to the tracks and often times the executed were left to hang until the next train came to town, apparently so anyone with criminal intent would know the city took its law enforcement seri-

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING WAYNE MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 78, ARTICLE VI. SNOW PLOW ALERT BY **AMENDING SECTION 78-282 PARKING** ON CITY STREETS. BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and

Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska: Section 1. That Chapter 78. Article VI.. Section 78-282 of the Wayne Municipal Code of Wayne. Nebraska, shall be amended to

#### Sec. 78-282. PARKING ON CITY STREETS (a) Whenever the City Administrator or

- designate finds, on the basis of falling snow, sleet or freezing rain, or on the basis of a forecast by a weather service, of snow, sleet or freezing rain, that weather conditions will make it necessary that motor vehicle traffic will be expedited and that parking on city streets be prohibited or restricted for snow plowing and other purposes, the City Administrator or designate shall put into effect a parking prohibition on all city streets as necessary by declaring a snow plow alert or weather emergency. (b) Notwithstanding the provisions of
- subsection (a) of this section, a parking prohibition shall automatically go into effect on any part of any city street until terminated pursuant to section 78-285, upon which there has been an accumulation of snow and ice of three inches or more for one hour or more between the hours of 7 am and 10 pm of any day. (c) Once in effect, a prohibition unde
- this section shall remain in effect until terminated by announcement of the City Administrator or designate in accordance with this chapter. except any street area which has become substantially clear of snow and ice from curb to curb for the length of the entire block shall be automatically excluded from this prohibition. While the prohibition is in effect, no person shall park or allow to remain parked any vehicle on any portion of a city street to which it applies. This prohibition shall remain in effect for the duration of the storm and/or until removed.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed. Section 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect after the passage, approval and publication as provided by law
