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Legacy drive attracts over one hundred participants

More than 100 people attended the Wayne Area Legacy Fund launched recently with a Drive 4 UR Community promotion in cooperation with Arnie's Ford this past Saturday.

"The Wayne Area Legacy Fund is a great way for our community to prepare for the future," commented Ken Kwapnioski, of Arnie's Ford. "And we are glad to be a part of their launch."

The Wayne Area Legacy Fund (WALF) is an affiliate of the Nebraska Community Foundation. It is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization and has a goal to reach a one-million-dollar endowment.

Chicken Show still has gaps to fill, committee members say

What many don't realize when it comes to the Chicken Show is that for the weekend of fun, countless hours have been put in by a small committee and the volunteers they can rally.

For many, every aspect of the Chicken Show only occurs during the show, but that couldn't be farther from the truth.

A small committee of less than 10 regular members meets monthly from August through roughly May before moving to meeting every two weeks in order to prepare for each year's show. Everything from the theme down to the generators necessary for vendors to set up gets discussed at these meetings but one thing the committee comes back to more and more frequently is the need for volunteers.

"We're getting burnt out," committee member Irene Fletcher said. "We've been doing this a long time and it's just this small group."

While there are numerous groups, individuals and businesses that offer their help, there are also more and more offerings at each show and less and less volunteers.

For instance, this year the committee is struggling to find a group to man the information booth, something a community group in town had done for a number of years but decided their time was done with it.

Another area needing volunteers is the inflatables. Several businesses around town pooled together to sponsor the inflatables that the kids flock to each year, but without designated chaperones, they become more of a risk than anything.

"You have to have someone watching them or you get kids cutting in lines or moving too fast for littler ones," committee member Nancy Johnson said.

Any group wanting to volunteer for either spot is welcome to break it down into hour long time slots so no one person is stuck covering the area for a lengthy period of time.

To continue to grow the show rather than to have it stay the same or even dwindle, members of the community will need to step up and step in, taking over various roles.

"We need more people, new people, here," Fletcher said of the committee. "We are really struggling."

Little things like moving picnic tables and helping with the Cement Chicken Auction are doable for any person, and a youth group or high school sports team would make great chaperones for the inflatables.

Committee members know it's not out of reach but with just a couple weeks left before the show, it is nerve wracking.

So this is a call to all volunteers in the flock: Show them why Wayne is a great place to roost.

Victim identified in Thursday night fall

At approximately 9:43 p.m. Thursday evening the Wayne 911 Communication Center received a call to 401 Main Street in the city of Wayne for a seriously injured fall victim.

A Providence Medical Center ambulance was dispatched. A responding Wayne Police Officer arrived on scene and located a male victim unresponsive on the sidewalk on the south side of the building. Officers gained information from witnesses that the victim, 24 year-old Clay Block of Wayne, had fallen from a second story egress balcony landing on the concrete below.

Block was transported by ambulance to Providence Medical Center and was pronounced dead shortly after his arrival due to the extent of the injuries sustained by the fall.

The Wayne Police Department is investigating the circumstances of the incident and was assisted by the Wayne County Sheriff's Office at the scene.

On Oct. 4, 2013 a tornado destroyed the business and sheared the roses off at the

ground.

Pat and his employees salvaged the roses and in the spring of 2014 re-planted them on the west side of the newly constructed building.

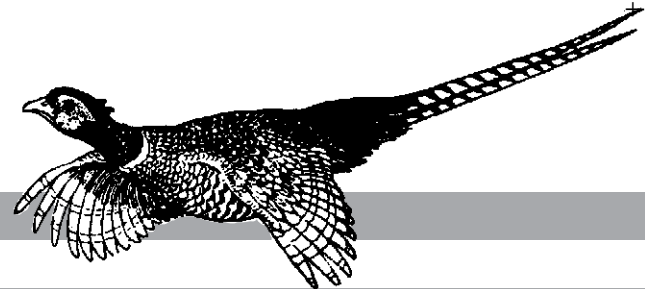
Today, 50 years later, the eight rose bushes have spread and are full of blossoms (and bees).

Seasons change - So do calls to the Poison Center

As the weather and seasons change, so do the types of calls to the Nebraska Regional Poison Center. During the summer months poison centers manage more calls about bites, stings, plants and pesticides than they do at other times of the year.

As the weather warms up so do the calls on bites and stings. The bee population has started to increase and will be at its peak until the first freeze. If you are stung - call the poison center. Close

observation for allergic reaction is important, especially in the first hour after a sting.

Only use insect repellents that are meant to be used on skin. DEET-containing insecticides should be applied sparingly to exposed skin and clothing. Lower concentrations of less than 10 percent DEET have been found to be just as effective as higher concentrations. It is recommended to wash off the product once returning indoors.

Days are longer and children are

out of school spending more time outdoors where they can be exposed to poisons. Hydrocarbons found in gasoline, kerosene, lighter fluids and torch fuels, are among the top ten causes of childhood poisoning deaths in the United States. Be sure to store these up and out of reach after use.

When firing up the grill or heading to a picnic, it's important to take some precautions. Remember to keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. The USDA recommends fully

cooking all meats to ensure bacteria are destroyed to prevent food poisoning. Meats should be cooked to 160 degrees. Always use a food thermometer as you can't tell if meat is fully cooked by looking at it.

Fireworks contain a number of toxic chemicals and can be dangerous if swallowed. Glow sticks are a very common call to the poison center and generally result in only minimal irritation. If an eye exposure occurs the poison center nurses can assist with instructions and follow-up care.

Summer is the busiest time of the year for the poison center and nurses are always available to answer your questions at 1-800-222-1222.

Program the number of the poison center into your phone before you leave for vacation. By calling 1-800-222-1222 anywhere in the country you will reach a poison center. Call the poison center before you head to the emergency room for a poisoning. The call is free to the public and you will be given expert advice and save yourself money.

Pollinator Week to be observed in Nebraska

Gov. Pete Ricketts has proclaimed that June 19-25 is Nebraska Pollinator Week. This special designation reminds Nebraskans of the importance of pollination to ecosystems, businesses, and people's lives, while acknowledging the creatures that pollinate.

In Nebraska, pollination from the animal kingdom can be credited to



species of hummingbirds, butterflies, moths, bees, beetles and flies.

Lt. Gov. Mike Foley presented the signed proclamation to Nebraska Game and Parks Commission biologist Melissa Panella in a recent ceremony at the Nebraska Capitol.

"Pollination is critical to our way of life," Panella said. "Globally, about 1,000 different kinds of plants that humans use for items such as food, spices, medicines and fabrics are pollinated by animals. We can thank pollinators for approximately a third of every bite of food we take because of their role in enabling fertilization of fruits and vegetables. Pollinators also contribute around \$20 billion worth of products to the U.S. economy annually."

In Nebraska, at least 18 insect pollinator species are identified as at-risk, including the iconic monarch butterfly. Learn more about these species and what you can do to help at outdoornebraska.gov/monarch.

The Nebraska Experience for all

NextEra Energy is teaming up with Blue Cross Blue Shield to bring Nebraska fourth graders an opportunity they won't soon forget.

In conjunction with Nebraska's 150th, First Lady Susanne Shore and her husband Gov. Pete Ricketts, helped to organize several different programs centered on Nebraska and all it has to offer. And from that, the Nebraska Experience initiative was brought to life.

The Nebraska Experience aims to offer financial assistance to schools across the state in order to get fourth graders to the state's Capitol or to another historically relevant site.

"We announced it this morning (Monday) as part of the Nebraska 150," said NextEra Project Manager Phil Clement. "We talked to the First Lady about sponsoring a program and she talked about her own experience at the Capitol and we just thought this would be a great thing to sponsor."

Schools can visit the Nebraska 150 website, www.ne150.org and scroll down the homepage to find the winding road icon with "The Nebraska Experience" below to bring them to the application page.

Funds will be dispersed on a first-come, first-serve basis, so schools are encouraged to submit their applications.

In all, roughly \$400,000 will be utilized to cover costs for nearly 80 percent of the schools across the state to get their fourth grade classes to Lincoln.

A partnership with the Nebraska Arts Council, the Nebraska Experience is modeled after the organization's long-time School Bus for the Arts Grant program. The Nebraska 150 Celebration will underwrite the cost of school buses as well as admis-

sion fees to museums and other venues across the state.

In addition to the State Capitol, schools can elect to visit one of the 11 designated sites, which include:

- Buffalo Bill Ranch State Historical Site in North Platte
- Chimney Rock National Historic Site in Bayard
- Durham Museum in Omaha
- Homestead National Monument in Beatrice
- Knight Museum in Alliance
- Mari Sandoz High Plains Heritage Center in Chadron
- Museum of Nebraska Art in Kearney
- Nebraska History Museum in Lincoln
- Neihardt Center in Bancroft
- Stuhr Museum in Grand Island
- Scotts Bluff National Monument in Scottsbluff

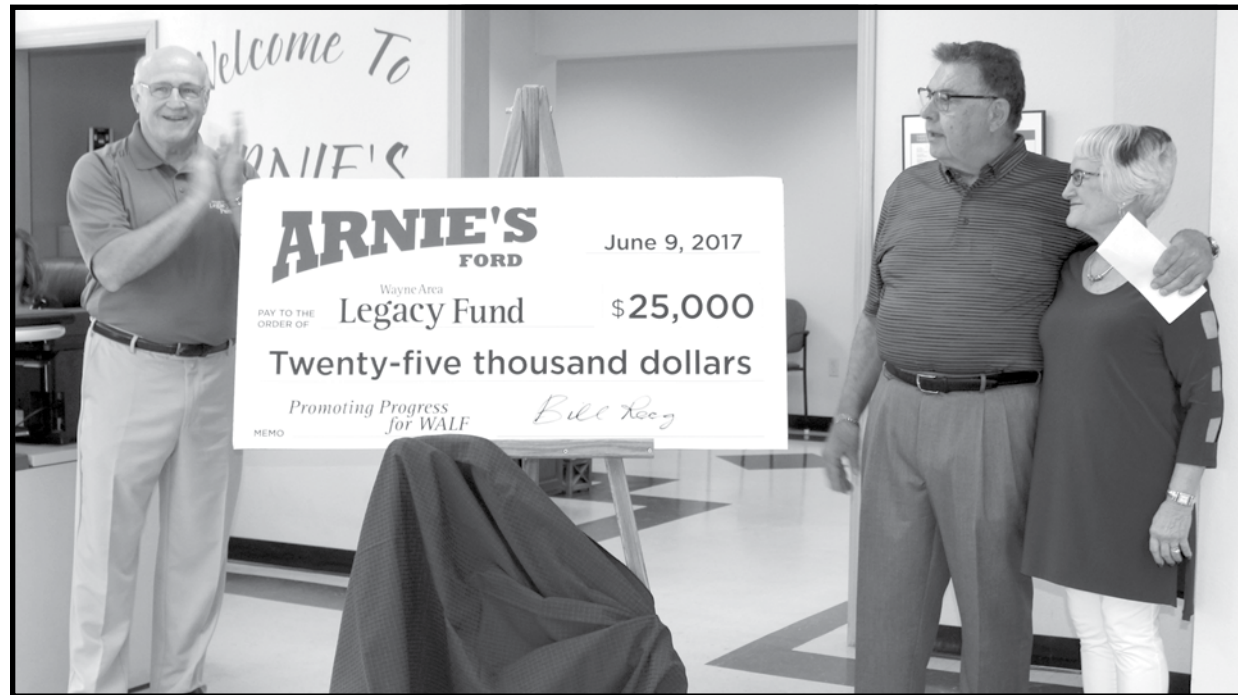
Sites were selected based on their

historic or cultural significance and an effort was also made to select sites throughout the state to make the program accessible to all Nebraska schools.

School superintendents are encouraged to apply for the Nebraska Experience before July 1, 2017, for the upcoming school year.

While this is a one-time commitment on the part of NextEra Energy, the company does have a perk that may soon fall in Wayne County.

"We've made the commitment that any county hosting one of our wind projects will receive the sponsorship for their schools' fourth-grade classes to visit the Capitol for the entirety of the project, so that could be 20 years," Clement said. "And we plan to do that with each county we have projects in. We want to be a good community member."

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Board of Education approves policies, handbook

Policies dealing with administration, business, personnel, students and instruction were all approved during Monday's meeting of the Wayne Community School's Board of Education.

The district is currently updating all of its policies based on suggestions from the Perry Law Firm.

A committee has been working for several months to compare the policies the board already had in place with those offered by the law firm.

Superintendent Mark Lenihan said that the majority of the policies stayed the same and others needed only minor changes.

Lenihan thanked the committee for their efforts and said, "we appreciate the work the Policy Committee has done to get this project completed."

The 2017-2018 Junior-Senior Handbook was approved on second reading.

Mark Hanson, High School Principal, and Rocky Ruhl, Junior High Principal, explained to the board the changes that have been made to the document, including the addition of the updated board policies.

A presentation was given by Judy Poehlman on the district's Wellness Policy.

She noted that schools are required to have an active document on the district's policy, dealing with the entire day, not just meals.

"We have to have something measurable and have to deal with things like physical activity, healthy eating and drinking more water. We also have new challenges in dealing with health concerns such as diabetes, peanut allergies and gluten intolerance," she said.

The 12 page document will be included as a new policy for the district and will be reviewed again next year.

In other action, the board approved a quote from Nevco for \$27,052.41 for a new scoreboard for the high school gym.

The cost will be fully funded by the Athletic Boosters and the Wayne Community Schools Foundation.

A bid of \$13,147.26 was accepted from Midwest Music Center for a sound system for the elementary school gym. A portion of the costs will be paid for by the Wayne Education Boosters.

During reports from the administration, Superintendent Lenihan told the board that the state aid certification will result in the district receiving \$218,522 for the next fiscal year. This is down slightly from this year's allocation.

Lenihan talked to the board about the Wayne/Wakefield Baseball

Coop agreement and said Wakefield Community Schools are discussing options for the coming year. The number of students from Wakefield involved in the program has declined in recent years.

Board members said they were happy with the current agreement and discussed what Wakefield contributes to the program.

During his report, Junior High Principal/Athletic Director Rocky Ruhl thanked the district for the opportunity to be a part of Wayne Community Schools for the last 30 years. Board President Carolyn Linster thanked Ruhl for his service and presented him with lifetime passes to Wayne athletic events.

Information was provided to the board on upcoming activities planned by the Wayne Community Schools Foundation. These include the Alumni Weekend activities in conjunction with the Wayne Chicken Show and the Gift-A-Thon to be held in August.

Superintendent Lenihan told the board that the locker room/CTE renovation project is going well and plans are for the areas to be ready by the start of fall sports practices.

"This will be a really good improvement for the school," he said.

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education will next meet in regular session on Monday, July 10 at 5 p.m.

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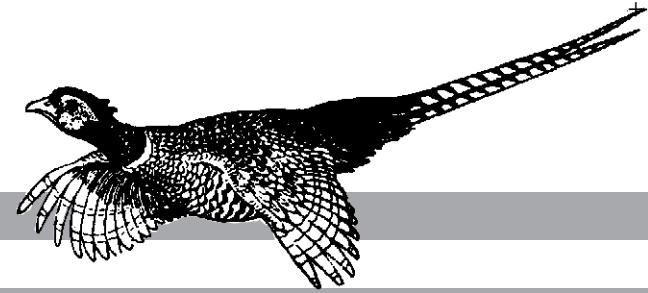

Junior Bri Hingst returned to Burke after a year absence to try her luck at the 300 hurdles. In a down pour, Hingst was clocked in 51.5. She was converted to a hurdler just 45 days ago, and to be in the state elite, was the ultimate compliment to her hard work.

Tayler Kumm completed a very accomplished high school career at the meet. After his thrilling, 2:03 leg of the 4 X 800 relay earlier in the meet, Kumm ran 10:25.7 in the 3,200 to win a silver medal for a strong very strong second place finish. Kumm gave a good run for gold, as he led five of the first eight laps, and then sat on the shoulder of the Boyd County runner until the final straight away of the race, but the magic of the sprint had left Kumm. Tayler then finished the meet Saturday morning with a 2:11.9 time in the 800 meters. They sting of the day before was apparent, and Kumm pulled back saving his energy for his final career run in the 1,600 with a 4:46.3 clocking gathering a sixth place medallion. A three medal meet would be a dream for most track athletes. Tayler ends his career with seven state medals.

The Eagle boys squad scored 21 points, finishing 13th in Class D. The total was the highest boys or

girls team score posted by any Lewis & Clark team regardless class C or D.

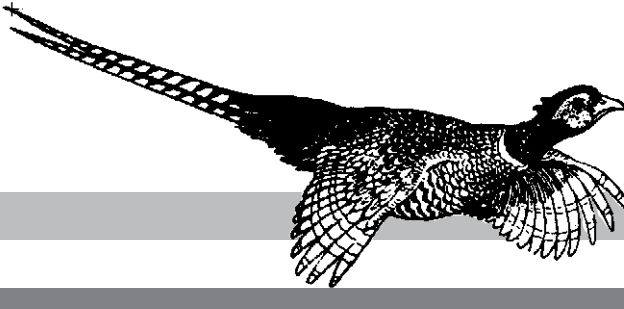

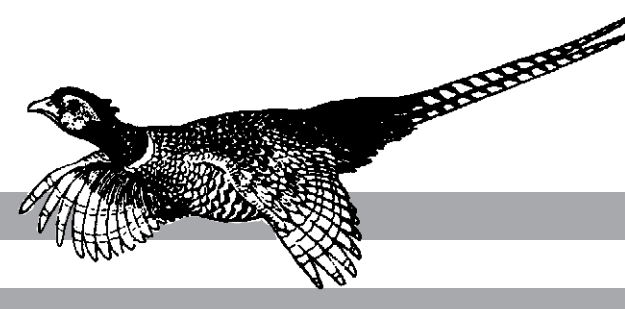

Section 1. That Title VII Traffic Code, Prohibitions and Enforcement, Section 78-13 of the Wayne Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

Oak Drive at the west approach of 3rd Avenue
Oak Drive at the east approach of West 3rd Street

Pearl Street at the east and west approaches of West 6th Street
Pearl Street at the east and west approaches of West 5th Street
Pearl Street at the east and west approaches of West 2nd Street
Pearl Street at the east and west approaches of West 3rd Street
Pearl Street at the east and west approaches of West 4th Street

Pheasant Run at the east and west approaches of Grainland Road
Sherman Street at the east and west approaches of West 6th Street
South Main Street at the west approach of Clark Street
West 1st Street at the north and south approaches of Douglas Street
West 1st Street at the north and south approaches of Lincoln Street
West 1st Street at the north and south approaches of Pearl Street
West 1st Street at the north and south approaches of Sherman Street
West 1st Street at the north approach of Blaine Street
West 3rd Street at the north and south approaches of Douglas Street

(B) Except where directed to proceed by a police officer or traffic-control signal, every driver of a vehicle approaching an intersection where a stop is indicated by a stop sign shall stop, which, for the purpose of this section, shall be a completed cessation or movement, at a clearly marked stop line, but if there is no such line, then before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection or, if no crosswalk as indicated, then at the point nearest the intersecting roadway where the driver has a view of approaching traffic from the intersecting roadway before entering the intersection. After having stopped, such driver shall yield the right of way to any vehicle which has entered the intersection from another street or which is approaching so closely on such street as to constitute an immediate hazard if such driver moved across or into such intersection.

(C) It shall be unlawful for any person to violate the provisions of this section.

Section 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after the passage, approval, and publication or posting as provided by law.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE VII TRAFFIC CODE, PROHIBITIONS AND ENFORCEMENT, SECTION 78-212 SPEED; MAXIMUM; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska:

Section 1. That Title VII Traffic Code, Prohibitions and Enforcement, Section 78-212 of the Wayne Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:
Sec. 78-212 Speed; maximum.

(A) No person shall operate a motor vehicle on the streets of the city at a rate of speed greater than is reasonable and proper, having regard to the traffic, the use of the road and the condition of the road, nor at a rate of speed such as to endanger the life and limb of any person, nor in any case in excess of 25 mph on any street within the corporate limits of the city, except on the following streets:

Main Street	From the south line of 14th Street north to a point 2,100 feet north of Country Club Road	45 mph

7th Street	From a point 700 feet west of the west line of Oak Drive (as extended north) west to the north south county road which is 1 mile west of the intersection of Seventh and Main Streets	45 mph
7th Street	From 800 feet west of the west line of Sherman Street to a point 800 feet east of the east line of Pine Heights Road (as extended south)	30 mph
South Main Street	From the north line of Clark Street (as extended east) south to the corporate limits at Logan Creek	30 mph
West Seventh Street	From 800 feet west of the west line of Sherman Street to a point 700 feet west of the west line of Oak Drive (as extended north)	35 mph

(B) Speed limits shall be plainly indicated by appropriate signs. Unless otherwise posted, the speed limit within the corporate limits of the city shall be 25 mph.

Section 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage, approval, and publication as provided by law.

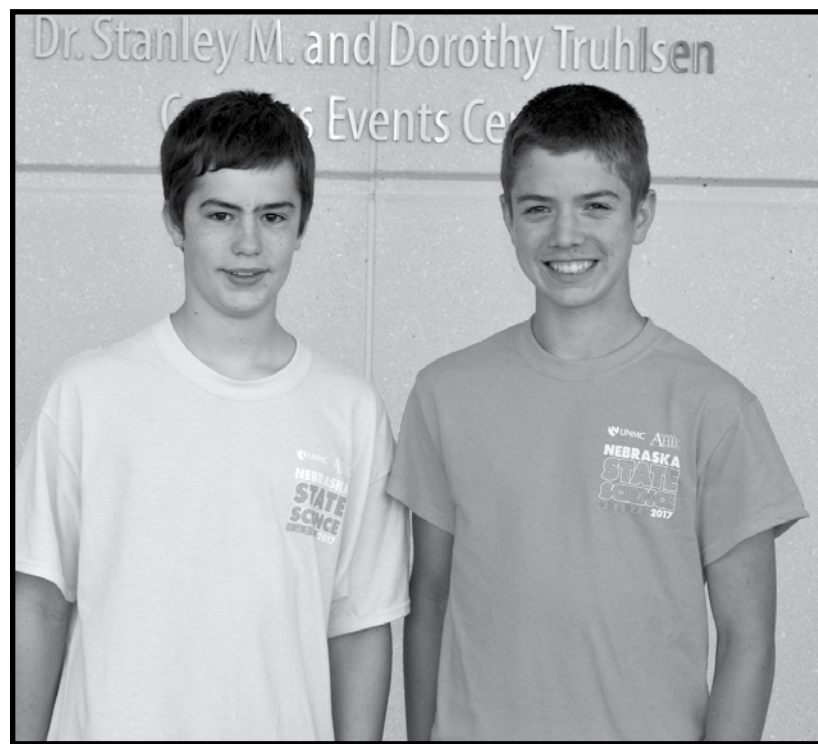

Program's essential elements

The 4-H model, of practical, learn-by-doing experiences, encourages youth to experiment, innovate, and think independently. Studies show that youth who participate in 4-H do better in school, are more motivated to help others, feel safe to try new things, and develop lasting friendships.

These youth also grow up to be the adult leaders in their communities. But why?

National 4-H commissioned a team to determine the critical elements that make up a quality 4-H experience. The team identified eight essential elements that were adopted later by the 4-H program.

These elements are summarized in four key concepts: belonging, mastery, independence, and generosity.

Here's an overview of the essential elements of positive youth development programs and how each contributes to the four concepts.

Belonging: Belonging can be accomplished by any one of three elements. A positive relationship with a caring adult who sets boundaries and expectations. Another element is an environment that supports members with positive and specific feedback. A healthy group also celebrates the successes of all members. The third element that promotes belonging is a safe emotional and physical environment.

Mastery: Mastery as a concept is developed by two essential elements.

The first is providing opportunity for mastery or the building of knowledge and skills and the demonstration of this knowledge. This process takes time. The second element to mastery is engagement in learning. An engaged youth works to understand the subject matter and develops relationships and connections in order to remain engaged. Engaged learners are self-motivated and learn from experience.

Independence: The concept of independence has two essential elements. These youth have an opportunity to see themselves as an active participant in their future. They have hope and are optimistic that they can shape their own life choices. The second element of independence is the opportunity for self-determination. These youth believe that they have impact on the events that shape their lives and aren't just submitting to the wills and whims of others. Youth develop a sense of influence over their own lives in order to become self-directing, autonomous adults.

Generosity: The last concept is generosity. Youth have an opportunity to value and practice service to others. Service is a way for members to gain exposure to the larger community and to the world.

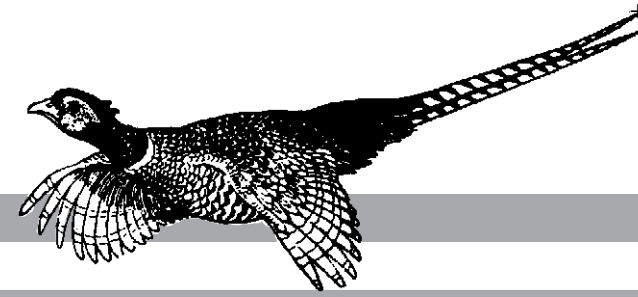

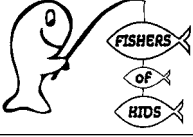

Jon Krakeauer wrote a book called "Into Thin Air". It's a book about the expedition to Mt. Everest during the spring of 1996. That year the attempt to reach the summit resulted in a great loss of life.

One of those whose life was lost was Andy Harris, one of the expedition leaders. Harris had stayed at the peak past the deadline that the leaders themselves had set. On his descent, he became in dire need of oxygen. Harris radioed his predicament to the base camp telling them of his need and that he had come upon a chance of oxygen canisters left by other climbers, all empty.

Those who had already passed by the canisters on their own return from the summit knew they were not empty, but full. Even as they pleaded with him on the radio to make use of them, it was to no avail. Already starved for oxygen, Harris continued to argue that the canisters were empty. The problem was that the lack of what he needed so disoriented his mind that though he was surrounded by a restoring supply, he continued to complain of its absence. The very thing he held

in his hand was absent in his brain and ravaged his capacity to recognize what he was clutching in his grasp.

He was holding in his hands the very thing that would save his life. Life was literally right in front of him, but because his brain was so deprived, he was incapable of recognizing that it was there. I can relate to the frustration of the rest of the team who was already further down the mountain. They begged and pleaded with him over the radio, but no matter what they said he couldn't listen.

I think what he needed was

someone there with him, to show him the life that was in front of him. He needed someone to take the canisters that he thought were empty and show him how to breathe it in and how it saved their life and how he could be saved the same way.

For those of us who know Christ and are followers of Jesus, it's a great picture of evangelism for us. We live in a fallen world, that often times causes our minds to be cloudy, and our eyes to be blinded to the life giving power of Jesus right in front of us. We, like the expedition team, try as hard as we can to convince people from afar what will save

their lives. We post great Facebook testimonies, and we comment on social media, or we blog, or even write a newspaper article, telling people that the very thing that will save their lives is right in front of them.

What Andy Harris needed that day wasn't an instruction or a piece of advice from far away. What he needed was someone right next to him, explaining to him how the oxygen kept them alive and how he could experience the very same thing. What our world needs most is not advice, or instruction from afar, but rather someone who is willing to come alongside of them, right where they are at, and someone who will share how Jesus has changed their life, and how they can experience the very same thing.

Local Lutheran churches hold joint Vacation Bible School

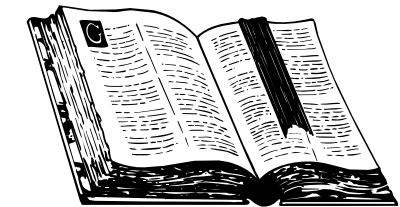
A joint Vacation Bible School was held in the evenings, June 5-9 at St. John's Lutheran Church in Pilger.

SEASONAL ALLERGIES: TRYING TO NIP THEM IN THE BUD

Itchy eyes, runny nose, sneezing, fatigue... These are just a few of the signs of seasonal allergies—also known as hay fever.¹ And get ready: It looks like we may have a real doozy of an allergy season this year.² Milder winter temperatures in places can cause plants to pollinate early. And a rainier spring leads to quick plant growth, as well as an increase in mold.¹

Allergic reactions mostly occur when your body responds to a "false alarm." And, as you well know, there isn't a cure for seasonal allergies. But there's no reason to let this time of year take all the spring out of your step! Arm yourself with information.

Monitor climate factors. When checking the weather and planning your day, keep these things in mind:

- Heat and high humidity promote the growth of molds.
- Cool nights and warm days allow tree, grass, and ragweed pollens to thrive.
- In spring and summer, tree and grass pollen levels tend to peak in the evening.
- In late summer and early fall, ragweed pollen levels tend to peak in the morning.
- Windy and warm days often result in surging pollen counts.
- After a rainfall, pollen counts may go up, even though the rain temporarily washes pollen away.¹

Avoid your triggers. If allergies are making you miserable, you may want to see an allergist. Specializing in allergies, this person can help you figure out what triggers your symptoms. Then you can find ways to cut off those triggers at the pass. During allergy season:

- Keep windows and doors shut in your car and home.
- Monitor pollen and mold counts daily. Weather reporters often provide this information.
- After working or playing outdoors, take a shower, wash your hair, and change your clothes.¹
- When doing chores outside, wear a NIOSH-rated filter mask. Better yet? Delegate!
- Be on the lookout for mold, which can build up in moist months. A deep spring cleaning will help get rid of mold and other allergens. Cleanliness may not be close to godliness. But it sure may help you feel better.
- Clear the air with a HEPA room air cleaner rated with a Clean Air Delivery Rate (CADR). If you have central air, use air filters with a MERV rating of 11 or 12. Change air filters every three months.³

Relieve your symptoms. Corticosteroid nasal sprays, decongestants, antihistamines. These are examples of over-the-counter drugs that can help relieve your symptoms. Come talk to me to make sure you're using them the right way. If side effects are a problem, we can work together to come up with a solution. For example, a few possible side effects of antihistamines are sleepiness, dry mouth, constipation, and light-headedness.⁴

For some people, allergies can lead to or coexist with other health problems such as asthma or sinusitis. Asthma narrows or blocks the airways. Sinusitis is caused by inflammation or infection of cavities behind the nose.⁵ Just one more reason why working with your doctor and me is a good idea.

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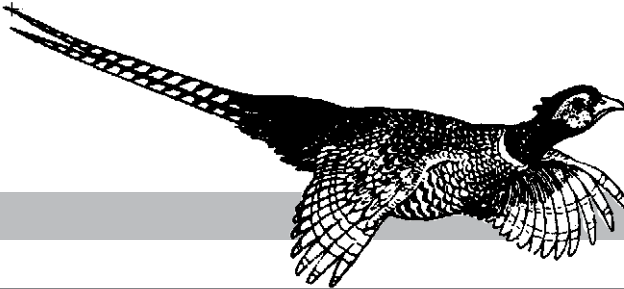
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Get ready for irrigation season earlier than usual

With recent dry weather we are thinking about irrigating a bit earlier than normal. If you haven't already, now is a good time to do a quick evaluation of the pumping plant, well, and center pivot to ensure they are in good working order before we have to rely on them during the heat of the summer. Here are a few quick checks you can do to help ensure a successful irrigation season.

Pumping Plants - Electric motors account for about 55 percent of the pumping plants in Nebraska,

according to 2013 NASS Irrigation Survey. They are relatively maintenance-free, but still need to be looked over. It is a good idea to change the oil in the unit every year. Next, open up the junction box and make sure the connectors are tight and have a good ground. Check for frayed wires and damage from rodents.

Internal combustion engines need quite a bit more attention. Change the engine oil and all filters. Check engine hours and refer to the manufacturer's service interval on valve adjustments and other service that may be needed such as draining, flushing, and refilling the cooling system. Also, grease and adjust the clutch and drive shaft between power unit and gear head.

If you are running a gas, propane,

or natural gas engine, be sure to check the spark plugs and replace as needed.

It's also a good idea to run the Nebraska Extension App IrrigatePump to see how your pumping plant stacks up against the Nebraska Pumping Plant Criteria. This will give you an idea of the efficiency of the power unit and pump. In the current economic climate we want to be as efficient as possible.

The Pump - The pump is sometimes overlooked. Before you start irrigating in the spring make sure you start the dripper to lube the line shaft bearings. It needs one gallon of drip oil for every 100 feet of depth. Set the dripper for one drip every five seconds. The pump can only take oil so fast and you can't over oil it. Also, make

sure the dripper line is attached and the fittings are tight.

Center Pivot - The pivot will take a little more time to go through. Start by checking each tower. Check tire pressure and condition. Check driveline knuckles for wear. Drain water from gearboxes and top off with appropriate gear oil. Inspect the tower box and the alignment system.

Next, start up the pump and center pivot system. Once the system is up to pressure, check the system for leaks and to ensure proper operation of the sprinklers. If you find missing or inoperable sprinklers, refer to the system's sprinkler chart to find the correct replacement. If the system is on rolling or hilly terrain, regulators are also needed for uniform application and defi-

nately should be checked. Check for proper operation by making sure no water is squirting from the side of any regulators. Leaks indicate the rubber diaphragm has failed.

Keep in mind that sprinklers and pressure regulators do have a life span. If your system is approaching 10 years old, you might need to take a closer look at them. Uniformity of water application can suffer greatly if your sprinkler package is out of date.

Taking time now to check your irrigation system and perform these maintenance steps should help ensure the system will perform properly when needed.

Grateful to be living in the 'Land of the Free'



There have been many times in my life I have been reminded to be grateful that I live in the "land of the free". This week, I literally had THREE reminders. I long ago decided that things often happen in threes. Not sure why, they just do.

The first of the week, a college buddy in SD sent a video of his niece delivering a Veteran's day speech in Pennsylvania. This woman and her little sister were evacuated out of Saigon as the city fell, and their mother was left behind. (Their father was an American airman and their parents were married, but he died.)

Our friend's sister and her husband who farm near Central City adopted the two of them and they had a much better childhood than they would have experienced in Viet Nam, simply because they

were Amerasian. She described what the war years were like, and how they longed for the mother who did not come with them. They did actually go back and reunite with her, but they are American citizens and married to Americans now.

The second speech was via YouTube, forwarded by the same fellow. It was of a North Korean woman named Yeonmi Park who describes the closed world she lived in as a child. Her story changes as she matures, but the facts are that the family fled to China and were not well treated there, either. Eventually, they arrived in Seoul, and she is now a student at Columbia University in New York.

And, finally, I was a guest at a Lutheran Family Services Luncheon

when a Yazidi woman, who has only been here for three months, thanked us for bringing her here to safety. They have been brutally oppressed and persecuted in the Far East.

And in the Lincoln paper on Sunday was an article stating there are 2500 Yazidi here in this community; they have purchased twenty acres northwest of the city where they will establish a cemetery and build a community center.

I have been fortunate in that my German ancestors came in the late 1800s. I know they were looked upon with suspicion during the war, but today, we are all American; not German-American. We must never take our freedoms for granted!

We have Flag Day and the Fourth coming up shortly to remind us.

Tractor safety courses for 14- and 15-year-olds

The most common cause of agricultural-related deaths in Nebraska are overturned tractors and all-terrain vehicles (ATVs).

To combat those statistics, two members of the University of Nebraska Medical Center College of Public Health will be providing tractor safety courses for 14- and 15-year olds working on farms.

Aaron Yoder, Ph.D., and Ellen Duysen will conduct the Nebraska Extension Tractor Safety and Hazardous Occupations courses in cooperation with Nebraska Extension and the U.S. Department of Agriculture Safety and Health.

Dr. Yoder is an assistant professor of the UNMC College of Public Health's environmental, agricultural and occupational health section.

Duysen is a community outreach specialist for the Central States Center for Agricultural Safety and Health.

Training will be conducted in nine towns across the state in June and July.

Federal regulations prohibit minors under the age of 16 from working on a farm for anyone other than parents or legal guardians. Certification received through this course grants an exemption, allowing those who are 14 or 15 to drive a tractor and to do field work with specific mechanized equipment.

Extensive training on tractor and ATV safety occurs during in-class lessons with hands-on activities. Instilling an attitude of "safety first" and respect for agricultural equipment are primary goals of the course.

Classes begin at 8 a.m. on June 19 and will take two days and will take place at the fairgrounds.

The course costs \$60 and participants must be registered at least one week prior to their course. The costs covers educational materials and lunches.

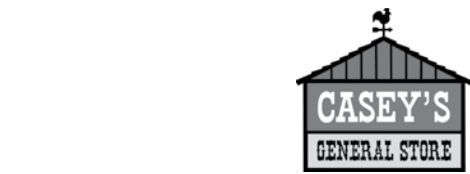

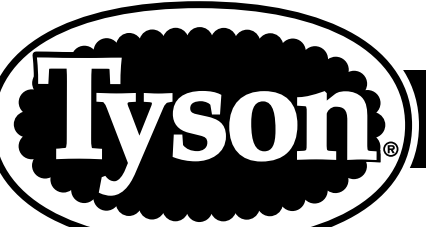

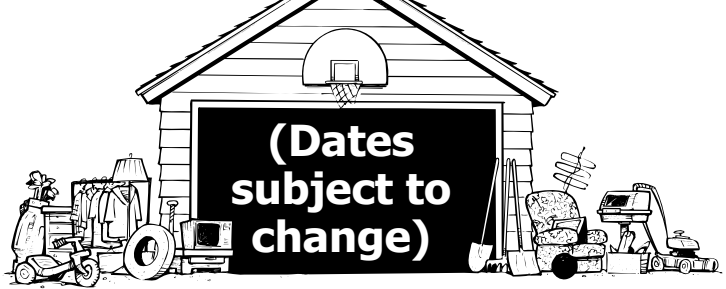
