Making good on promises

When Jan Harrison's husband fell ill over a decade ago and his surgery went awry leaving him with serious complications, Harrison struck a deal with the Lord.

"He had an ostomy and through that whole process, he got abscesses and wounds," Harrison said.
"He had to undergo 12 surgeries in two years."

Harrison, previously a trauma and emergency room nurse, was her husband's caretaker, and that meant paying strict attention when the wound care nurses explained to her how to dress his wounds for optimal results.

Having experienced some the worst case scenarios with her own husband, those wound care nurses encouraged Harrison to consider doing the additional schooling necessary to become a certified wound nurse.

"So I made a pact with God. I said if he let my husband live, I'd stay in Northeast Nebraska to do wound care and ostomy care. So I'm in Northeast

And while some may think it's a waste to see such a specialized practice run in Northeast Nebraska, Harrison feels very strongly about it.

"I have no desire to go to a big hospital. They have people there, avenues they can go to. The little hospitals and rural clinics don't have access to this around here."

Harrison went on to explain that the doctors around here have to know so much about so many things because of the fact that they are a general practitioner, she said it really shows why it's so important for her to practice in the area.

"Only someone who is trained knows all the different dressings. The doctors here know the basics with wet to dry dressings, so I'm here to help the physicians."

Schooling for her certification to be a wound ostomy continence nurse would normally take an additional three semesters, but because of the number

of patients she was seeing with diabetic foot ulcers, Harrison decided to add a certification in foot and nail care which took another semester of schooling.

She completed it mostly online, but did drive up to St. Paul, Minn. for the immersion part of the program as well as making a trip to Wisconsin to finish the foot and nail certification.

Harrison practices out of Providence Medical Center for half the week and spends the remainder in another hospital or traveling a one hundred mile radius.

Harrison makes the decisions about how to best treat a wound, and three nurses at PMC, who have taken the wound treatment associate class which allows them to assist with Harrison's wound care patients, follow those instructions and call if someone new comes in the door while she's traveling.

And her travels aren't just around Nebraska.

Because of her extensive knowledge and first hand experiences and continuing education re-

quirements, Harrison visits wound care conferences each year.

Those conferences, which could be a mini vacation for some, are hard work for Harrison. Not only is she sitting in on educational sessions to keep her certification valid, she's working too.

Harrison is asked regularly to test dressing products for numerous companies. She doesn't say yes to just everyone, but if she does and she likes the product, she gives presentations every five minutes for hours a day during those conferences.

"You have to present to everyone walking by in five minute intervals. I get asked all the time to do trials," Harrison said."

While Harrison is required to keep up 30 hours of continuing education every two years for her RN degree, she is also required to keep up 80 hours of continuing education every five years for her additional contifications. And that is not 80 hours total

Community provides input during townhall meeting

Community members were invited to take part in one of two public meetings to share ideas on the best use of funds should the city be awarded a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG).

Tom Higginbotham and Jan Merrill with the Northeast Nebraska Economic Development District (NNEDD) facilitated the meetings.

The two shared the results of a recent Comprehensive Development Survey in which residents were asked to share information on projects they felt the city should undertake.

The city had earlier received CDBG funding for Phase I of the project, which included the survey.

The survey is necessary to determine the needs of the community and needs to be completed before the city can submit an application for Phase II of the grant, which could be worth \$600,000. The areas targeted for the grant include the southeast portion of the city and the northwest portion, with a small portion of the southwest portion also included.

Previous grants to the city have been used to demolish structures, build a tornado shelter and provide assistance for rehabilitation of single family, owner occupied homes

Higginbotham shared with those in attendance the history of the Comprehensive Development program and said communities with a population between 5,000 and 20,000 are eligible to apply for the federal grants.

"We need to look at what we have done, what we are doing and what we plan on doing as we move through this process," he said.

He went on to explain that because the money is in the form of a federal grant, there are restrictions on what projects are eligible for funding. The money would be given to the state, which would in turn determine which projects are

worthy of funding.
Survey results indicated that residents feel streets, sidewalks, property upkeep and neighborhood parks were among the

areas residents felt there is a need for improvement.

Attendees at the meeting said that there are a number of streets that are old and need of repair. They also said there are a number of areas in the city where there are not sidewalks, or where there are sidewalks that do not connect to anything.

Rental property rehab seemed to be a major need in the community, along with the need for affordable rent.

The next step in the process is to put the information gathered from the survey and the community meetings into a study to be presented to the Wayne City Council.

The information provided to the council will highlight the priorities for use of grant funding.

The council will then approve or amend the information and the grant will be submitted. The city would be required to provide a 25 percent match and 25 percent leverage for the money.

"Grants are then scored to determined who gets the funding. The communities involved need to be ready to use the grant money. Those who have a definite plan and are ready to move forward will be looked at more favorably," Higginbotham said.

The grants will be awarded in September, and information gathered by the NNEDD will be submitted to the city council in coming weeks for consideration

Blecke hired as Wayne's new city administrator

A different face will be found in the Wayne City Administrator's office in coming weeks. However, the face is not new to Wayne.

During Tuesday's meeting of Wayne City Council, Wes Blecke was hired as the Assistant City Administrator from July 1 to July 31. He was also hired as the City Administrator, effective Aug. 1.

Blecke, a native of Wakefield, has served several roles in the Wayne Area Economic Development Office for the past 11 years and told the council he is anxious to get started in his position as City Administrator.

In a related matter, Matt Ley, President of the Wayne Area Economic Development Board of Directors, spoke to the council and asked for two council members to serve on a committee to find a replacement for Blecke as the director of Wayne Area Economic Development.

A considerable portion of Tuesday's council meeting revolved around the recommendation from Bryce Meyer, Recreation Director and Cassie Gubbels, Pool Manager, in regard to children at the pool being accompanied by an adult or

Gubbels told the council there is no formal policy on children coming to the pool without any supervision. She said she and Meyer had suggested that children be eight years old to be able to come to the pool without supervision and those seven years old and younger would need to be accompanied by someone who was at least 16 years of age. She said those ages were presented as a starting point for discussion and also listed the regulations at pools in other towns in Nebraska.

Council member Jennifer Sievers said she had received comments from several residents, voicing their concerns about the proposed changes. She questioned why there was a need for the change and what was different from last year. She did say that with the new pool, there is "more stuff to do."

Mayor Ken Chamberlain said that he felt the age requirements for the pool should match those in place at the Community Activity Center. That requirement is that those children ages seven years and younger need to be accompanied by someone who is 13 years or older and those who are eight years old can be alone.

Holly Doring spoke to the council and asked whether the policy was being implemented because of the level of swimming abilities or because of behavior.

"We love the new pool and my kids beg to be able to stay. At the old pool, they were bored after 40 minutes and wanted to go home. I agree that there needs to be some type of policy, but don't punish everybody."

Discussion was held on whether the city needed to implement the policy immediately, or if the changes could be made at the beginning of the next swim-

Following considerable debate, along with the possibility of allowing for a dis-

counted rate for babysitters, the council voted to implement the policy, effective July 1. Until that time, pool employees will be educating the pool users on the new regulations.

In other action, the council approved a redevelopment plan for the Crown II Housing Project.

The project would be awarded \$400,000 in TIF funding to Crown Homes for the purchase of property, water, street and sewer improvements for 15 workforce housing rent-to-own homes, six market rate homes, a market rate apartment project with garages and a privately operated daycare.

Council member Cale Giese said he feels a percentage of the TIF funds needs to be set aside for improvements

to the city's parks.

After discussion on whether that

needs to be a specific dollar amount or a percentage, the council voted to approve the redevelopment plan with a requirement that five percent of the money be used for park development.

Council members also approved a resolution which will provide funding to Providence Medical Center for ambulance services.

The agreement calls for the city to provide \$51,000 in the next fiscal year and increase that amount by 12 percent in each of the next three years. After that, there would be a two percent increase through year 10 of the agreement.

Jim Frank, CEO of Providence Medical Center said the numbers were "better than originally presented. The agreement also assumes the Rural (Fire) Board agrees to participate."





Mark Tietz informed the Board members of a problem with the Lagoon generator running continuously. He had the 3E Electrical Engineering and Equipment company repair a faulty switch.

There had been several concerning the appearance of several residents' water. Some residents have a brown color to the water. Mark Tietz asked Rich Koenig from the State of Nebraska to the meeting to discuss the Village's options for treating the water system. Mr. Koenig explained to the Board and public present of the reason for the brown colored wate is actually the oxidation of the iron and manganese in the water when exposed to the chlorine. The water is safe for consumption the quality is aesthetic only.

The Village Board decided several years ago to voluntarily treat the water after failing multiple tests. Because of the upgrades to the system, the new water storage tower and new municipal well, the Village can inform the State of Nebraska of its intent to discontinue the treatment of the water system each month. However, if the addition of chlorine to the system is discontinued, the Village wil begin more rigorous water sample testing. If the Village cannot pass the required testing the result is mandatory treatment per the State of Nebraska requirements, which will result in a higher amount of chlorine used.

Mr. Koenig suggested a directional flush of all the water mains in the Village, which requires a day of turning mains off and flushing hydrants. This is done with the help of the State of Nebraska and Nebraska Rural Water Association. This should help to scour the mains and restore clearer water to residents He then suggested testing each well that feeds the water storage tank for an accurate measurement of the minerals in the water

wells and will set up a day to perform th directional flushing of water mains in late June or early July. The decision to discontinue treatment will be made later after the test







County Commissioners hear concerns, talk insurance

Two area residents voiced concerns about the incoming wind farm projects at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne County Commissioners.

Troy McCormick of Hoskins, grabbed everyone's attention as he told the board he was looking to put a nuclear waste dump on his property. After a good laugh, he went on to explain his real reason for coming before the board, and that was to discuss the construction of wind farms in Wayne County.

He cited numerous sources and studies when discussing the ill effects of the farms, with everything from infrasound that is detrimental to livestock to the difficulty of flying and landing aircraft for emergencies near a wind farm. Health concerns and property depreciation were also topics he touched on.

A second Wayne County resident, Doug Nelson, brought forth more concerns with the wind turbines, complete with his own experience with a windmill he wanted to buy to power an irrigation pivot on his ground.

Everything from costs and subsidies to the physics and environmental effects on wind patterns and the water cycle was brought up.

In both instances the board of commissioners explained how without zoning, the hands of the board members are nearly completely tied.







Wayne State track teams add recruits

Wavne State College track and field coach Marlon Brink announced the recent signing of several athletes to the men's and women's track and field teams for the 2017-18 school year.

McKayla Hanson from Cedar Bluffs and Joan Jelimo of Gillette, Wyo. have signed national letters of intent to attend Wayne State College and compete for the Wildcat women's team. They join eight others, including Hanna Lazure of Fort Calhoun, Molly McCartney from Nelson, Sophie Noecker from Hartington, Sabrina Sack of Waverly, McKenzie Scheil from Fairmont, Sarah Stang from Herman, Kenzie Sullivan from Laurens, Iowa and Jadin Wagner from Lawton, Iowa.

Hanson is a three-sport standout (volleyball, basketball and track and field) from Cedar Bluffs High School. She was a four-year letterwinner competing in sprints on the track and field team and was a four-year Class D state qualifier in the 400-meter relay. Hanson helped Cedar Bluffs to a second-place finish and new school record time of 50.47 seconds as a junior. She also earned an eighth-place medal as a freshman and just missed medals the other two years with ninth-place finishes. Hanson earned Academic All-State honors in basketball and received the Academic All-Conference Award in 2017 from the Frontier Con-

"McKayla will help our team in the sprints and relays areas where we are trying to build our numbers and quality," remarked Brink, "She has had much experience through her high school teams running on some relays that have had good success at the State Meet level. We will try to use her experiences with those to help strengthen our squad."

She helped Gillette College to a sixth-place finish at nationals in 2016 and fifth in 2015. In track and field, Jelimo earned a pair of fifth-place finishes at the Region 11 Championships with times of 2:23.15 in the 800-meter run and 5:08.90 in the 1,500-meter run.

"Joan will be an immediate impact to our cross country and distance running squad," said Coach Brink, "She has had good success with her running at Gillette College for two years of cross country and one year of track before they dropped the program. She will be a runner that can help us in the middle and long distances races in track as well."

Allen signed a tender to attend Wayne State College after competing in football and track and field this past school year at Nebraska Wesleyan. He placed second in the shot put at the Iowa Conference Outdoor Championships last month with a top mark of 50 feet, 2 3/4 inches, and was second at the Nebraska Invitational with a season-best throw of 51-8 1/2.

In high school at Ainsworth, Allen was a Class C state qualifier in the shot put all four years and three years in the discus, collecting five state medals. As a senior in 2016, he was fifth in the shot put (53-8 1/2) and seventh in the discus (150-0). Allen was fifth in the shot put as a junior (50-7 1/2) and was third during his sophomore season (53-1 1/2) while also placing eighth in the discus as a sophomore. Allen helped Ainsworth win four straight district titles in high school and placed no worse than eighth at state in Class C as a team.

"Ben is a thrower that we have known about since his high school days at Ainsworth," commented Brink. "He has decided to focus on just track and field and I think he will be able to make an immediate impact competing in the NSIC throwing events. Ben will also throw the weight, hammer and discus at WSC."

Decker is a sprinter from Glenwood High School in Iowa where he is a three-sport standout in football, track and field and baseball. In track and field this season, Decker medaled in four events, including a fifth place finish in the Class 3A 200-meter dash (22.88). He also ran legs on the first place sprint medley relay team that set a new Iowa state record with a time of 1:33.68 and helped Glenwood to a third place finish in the 4 x 400 meter relay and fourth place medal in the 800-meter relay. SEWER CLEANING NOTICE

Beginning July 11 and over the next three to four weeks, the City of Wayne Sewer Department will be having sewer mains cleaned in various parts of the City. City Sewer Department staff will be placing notices on doors of those areas where the cleaning will be taking place.

In the cleaning process, high pressure water is forced through the sewer main line, which pushes the air from the sewer main into the service lines of homes and businesses. If this happens, it can result in the air exiting through the toilet, causing the water to shoot out of the toilet bowl. This air should exit through the sewer vent of the building, but inadequate venting or location of toilets can cause the air to exit through the toilet.

This is a rare occurrence but can be remedied by covering the toilet bowl with a towel and keeping the lid closed. This will keep most of the water in the bowl rather than on the floor.

Again, during the next several weeks, when the toilets are not in use, cover them with a towel and keep the lid down.

If you have any questions about the sewer cleaning process or the areas the sewer main cleaning will take place, you can call the Wastewater Treatment Plant at 375-5250 or City Hall at 375-1733.

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
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Sharp Shooters to compete at Nationals

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Weed control, nitrogen rescue discussed

Most farmers are in the field spraying for weeds now and with good reason.

Research data from UNL Haskell Ag Lab Weed Scientist Dr. Steve Knezevic and his colleagues indicate that yield losses due to competition may already be occurring in soybeans and will be aggravated if growers don't eliminate these undesired plants from their fields in the near future. Therefore, weed control should be on the top priority of growers "to-do" list.

Post emergence herbicides, such as glyphosate in Roundup Ready soybeans (Group 9), ALS-inhibitors (Group 2), PPO inhibitors (Group 14), and Liberty (Group 10) in Liberty Link soybeans, are now the main options for weed control. In fields where glyphosate resistance is a problem, rescue herbicides, such as Cobra and Flexstar (Group 14), should be included at this point in tank-mixes. These rescue herbicides should preferably be applied to weeds smaller than 4 inches tall.

In fields where Roundup Ready volunteer corn is present, ACCaseinhibitors (Group 1), such as Select Max and Post Plus, should also be considered.

Keep in mind that the use of multiple effective herbicides will result in excellent weed control and assist cide-resistant weeds.

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in or below the root zone. Q: Do rescue treatments work?

A: Sidedress N has been a standard practice for years. The difference between it and a rescue treatment is that it goes on before plants are yellow. While much research has shown that sidedress is effective, new research is studying "realtime N application," which means applying N during the season to meet plant needs. Corn needing a rescue treatment is past the point of "hidden hunger" used for realtime applications.

Research in Missouri shows that visibly yellow corn will respond to N when applied up to tassel. Across a number of tests, the average yield increase in corn from the nitrogen rescue treatment was 34 bu/ac. The vield increase from the rescue treatment for various stress categories was: high stress - 57 bu/ac; medium stress - 42 bu/ac; low stress - 14 bu/ ac. (For more details see Nitrogen Loss and Late-Season N Application for Corn by Peter Scharf of the University of Missouri.)

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New maps, new website highlight drought effects on agriculture

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Maps highlighting the effects of drought on six agricultural commodities across the continental U.S. became available in late May on a website hosted by the National Drought Mitigation Center at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. The maps are a collaboration between the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Office of the Chief Economist and the drought center.

The maps, produced at the drought center in cooperation with the USDA World Agriculture Outlook Board and OCE meteorologists, are based on the weekly U.S. Drought Monitor and show the locations and percentages of drought-affected areas that produce crops or livestock. They are released Thursdays and can be found at agindrought.unl.edu. In addition to the maps, the website offers data tables, time series graphs and animations.

The new maps show drought's effects on cattle, hogs and pigs, sheep and lambs, hay, and alfalfa. In the near future, the partners will make available six field crop maps, one each for corn, cotton, soybeans, winter wheat, spring wheat and durum wheat.

"The Agriculture in Drought website is dynamic in nature, enabling users to interactively explore how drought is impacting agriculture across the United States," said Harlan Shannon, OCE meteorologist. "Significantly, behind the scenes, NDMC's geospatial and database capabilities have enabled USDA to more quickly and efficiently estimate — for select agricultural commodities the percent of acreage or inventory located in drought."

The Ag in Drought maps are created by overlaying the most recent U.S. Drought Monitor on maps of major crop and livestock producing areas, based on the most current Ag Census data from the National Agricultural Statistics Service. The result highlights agricultural areas affected by any level of drought.

The U.S. Drought Monitor, produced weekly since 1999, is a collaborative effort among federal and academic partners, including the drought center, US-DA and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. The drought center also hosts the monitor: droughtmonitor.unl.edu/

Educators team up with towns to create new career training facility

WEST POINT — Representatives of the City of West Point and several area educational institutions have formalized a collaborative effort to expand career and technical education in east central Nebraska.

At the conclusion of a special meeting of the West Point City Council today, Mayor Marlene Johnson and others signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to create a new partnership that will provide career and technical education opportunities for area high school students, adult learners and business and industry training. As a result of this demonstrated level of collaboration between the educational partners, a Career and Technical Training Facility will be constructed near the city's Nielsen Community Center, 200 Anna Stalp

In addition, two area foundations have announced major gifts to assist in financing the project.

"This is a significant day for West Point and the surrounding region,"

Johnson said. "This facility will help retain and attract residents to the area, allow high school students to enroll in career pathways, provide additional undergraduate and graduate educational opportunities for local residents, and offer workforce training to businesses and industries in the region. We are grateful for this collaborative effort in order to execute this endeav-

The proposed 15,000 square foot facility is a joint venture between the City of West Point, Northeast Community College, Wayne State College, Educational Service Unit 2 and Pathways 2 Tomorrow (P2T), a consortium of six school districts consisting of Bancroft-Rosalie, Lyons-Decatur Northeast, Oakland-Craig, Pender, West Point-Beemer and Wisner-Pilger.

Based on a report by the National Skills Coalition, Nebraska continues to experience a shortage of middle-skill and high-skill workers making career and technical education even more important. By 2022, 59-percent of all occupations in Nebraska will be middleskill jobs that will require some form of education beyond high school. Additionally, another 22-percent of jobs will be high-skill and require education beyond an associate degree.

Johnson said, "Without dedicated space, equipment and faculty resources, programming and training will not be available to meet the needs of local employers in the region. We are committed to working with our partners to design the building to accommodate the latest technology for enhanced

learning to include welding, manufacturing, and technical education to train and retrain employees from area business and industry."

During the Council meeting, a representative of the Donald E. Nielsen Foundation announced it would contribute \$1 million to the project, while a representative of the Henry A. Stalp and the Ramona A. Stalp Foundation pledged \$500,000.

"We believe this is an extraordinary project and it's an example of what communities, like West Point and the surrounding area, can do to help themselves to preserve the future and the kind of life that we all want to have for our children and the communities where we live," said Clarence Mock of the Nielsen Foundation. "It's just such a shining example of what can be accomplished when nobody cares who gets the credit. It's really been a pleasure for me to talk with the partners working on this project who think that this is going to be a wonderful thing for West Point and the surrounding com-


But one of the other things I got



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


