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# Buck sworn in as new council member

The Wayne City Council is now back to full capacity following the swearing in of Terri Buck as a Ward 1 representative.

The action took place during Thurs-

day's meeting of the Wayne City Council. The meeting was moved from its normal first Tuesday of the month due to the 4th of July holiday falling on Tuesday.

During Thursday's meeting the council spent a considerable amount of time discussing whether a portion of a street near the Summer Sports Complex should be

Mayor Ken Chamberlain told the council it would cost the city nearly \$500,000 to pave Fourth Street and Rugby Road.

It was noted that there are unknowns on what will become of the lagoon and that could be a determining factor in whether Rugby Road should be paved or graveled. In addition, discussion was held on the amount of traffic using the road.

Following debate, council voted to accept a bid and award a contract to A&R Construction for \$712,528.27. Three alternates to the bid were not acted upon.

In other action, the council voted to move forward on amending the city code in regard to parking on West Clark Street.

Garek Bebee, owner of Rezurrected Rod & Kustom, told the council semi trucks are parking on the street near his business. He cited safety concerns and increased traffic to his business as the reasons for his request for time limits on parking.

Wayne Police Chief Marlen Chinn told the council that if the area were to be rezoned, other ordinances would have to be amended also. He said the area is currently designated for semi parking.

Following discussion, the council voted to move forward to have the area zoned as a no parking from midnight to 5 a.m.

A bid of \$259,922.60 was accepted from Penro Construction for the Beaumont First Addition Water and Sewer Extension Project.

Council members also rescinded a resolution in regard to a redevelopment plan for Benscoter, Inc. - Crown II Housing Project. The resolution included language that required a portion of the TIF funding connected to the project be used for park upgrades. However, it was determined that TIF funds must be used for something that is specifically part of the area receiving TIF money.

The council then approved a new resolution for the redevelopment of the Benscoter, Inc. - Crown II Housing Project that did not include money for park upgrades.

Council member Cale Giese noted that the city parks are in dire need of upgrades and the council needs to find a way to finance these upgrades.

Mayor Chamberlain presented names for re-appointments to a number of commissions and boards.

All were unanimously approved. They

Matt Jones to the Planning Commission. A budget work session date of Tuesday, Aug. 1 was set, following the regular council meeting. A second work session will be held Tuesday, Aug. 8 if needed.

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, July 18 at 5:30 p.m.

floats in an array of shapes, sizes and subjects, there was something for every taste cruising the streets of Wayne. Integrated Life Choices took home the Best Theme Related







## Looking Ahead in Wayne

#### **Long Term Power Outage** On Wednesday, July 26, the

Nebraska Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) is conducting a day long workshop at the Nebraska National Guard Headquarters on how to manage long term regional electrical outages. Wayne will have two participants at the workshop.

The good news is the U.S. electrical grid has become one of the most efficient and interconnected in the world. The bad news is that the system efficiencies come from highly interconnected computer controls that make large regions vulnerable to damage from hackers. The Ukraine is the most active

area in the world for Russian and freelancing hackers at this time. They're using CrashOverride, KillDisk, Sandworm, BlackEnergy and new malware to invade electrical grid and generation plant controls and successfully shut down large areas for longer periods of The U.S. has been watching and

learning. Hackers are also working in the US and European countries. So far we are able to thwart each attack but the stakes are high and FEMA, NEMA and NERC (the federal National Electric Reliability Council) are concerned that we may not be able to thwart every new attempt and are beginning to plan with state and local agencies for long term outages.

To assess our own responsibility ask yourself these questions? Are the government and the power industry capable of outwitting every hacking attempt? They prob-

ably are but there's no guarantee. Will the government take care

of me if there is a regional 30 day power outage? Remember their response to Hurricane Katrina? In the hot summer? In the winter? Do I have a place to get water for 30 days? Do I have a place to get food for 30 days?

Government will always have a long term fix, but we're on our own for the short term. We'll fill you in on more details after the 26th.

## Policies, handbooks discussed by Wayne **Community Schools Board of Education**

Policies dealing with construction, internal board policies and by-laws of the board were reviewed during Monday's meeting of the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education.

The board is in the process of reviewing all of its policies and working with the Perry Law firm to review and update the school's policies.

The policies received first reading approval at Monday's meeting and will be brought to the board again at the August meeting for final approval. At that time, the board will have completed its review of all current policies.

The board also approved several policies that require annual review. These include the district's acknowledgment of the Superintendent as CEO of the district, Parental Involvement, Anti-Bullying and A policy in regard to the Homeless Student was ta-

bled until a later meeting due to updates being made. Second reading of the K-6 Handbook was held with changes made as requested at the last meeting.

Board members also listened to information in regard to the 2017-2018 Teacher Handbook.

Superintendent Mark Lenihan told the board that changes were made in regard to the hours of duty for teachers in an attempt to keep all times consistent.

He had originally suggested teachers be on duty from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., but after consideration, determined that 7:45 a.m. to 4 p.m. would be more ap-

"Most of our teachers are here early and stay late. We just want to make sure teachers are available for students, both before and after school," Lenihan said.

In other agenda items, the board received an update from Superintendent Lenihan on the renovation project at the high school. He told the board that the project has been going well and he has been impressed with the project manager, who has been on site at all

hours of the day to make sure the project is going according to schedule.

Lenihan explained to the board a number of changes that have taken place as part of the project. Some of these have resulted in additional costs, while others have meant a deduction. The end result of the changes have resulted in an additional \$215 for the project.

Lenihan said that the locker room portion of the project should be completed before the start of the fall sports practices

# Total Eclipse of Sun Forever Stamp now for sale at Wayne Post Office

rating the upcoming Aug. 21 solar eclipse by issuing the first-of-itskind Forever Stamp which transforms the solar eclipse image into the Moon from the heat of a finger. Once cooled, the image reverts back to the eclipse.

The stamps are sold in panes of 16 Forever stamps available now at the Wayne Post Office, Post Offices nationwide, and online at usps.com/shop.

With the release of these amazing stamps using thermochromic ink, we've provided an opportunity for people to experience their own personal solar eclipse every time they touch the stamps," said Postmaster Beth Pasold. Thermochromic inks are vul-

nerable to UV light and should be kept out of direct sunlight as much as possible to preserve this special effect. To help ensure longevity, the Postal Service is offering a special protective sleeve to hold and protect the stamp pane for a nominal fee. The back of the stamp pane provides a map of the Aug. 21 eclipse path and times it may appear in some locations.

A total eclipse of the sun occurs when the moon completely blocks the visible solar disk from view, casting a shadow on Earth. The 70-mile-wide shadow path of the eclipse, known as the "path of totality," will traverse the country diagonally, appearing first in Oregon (mid-morning local time) and



exiting some 2,500 miles east and 90 minutes later off the coast of South Carolina (mid-afternoon local time) passing through portions of 14 states.

This stamp image is a photograph taken by retired NASA astrophysicist Fred Espenak of Portal, Ariz, who is considered by many to be the world's leading authority on total solar eclipses with 27 under his belt. The photograph shows a total solar eclipse seen from Jalu, Libya, on March 29,

"A total eclipse of the Sun is simply the most beautiful, stunning and awe-inspiring astronomical event you can see with the naked eye — but you've got to be in the 70-mile-wide path of totality," said Espenak.

"The Postal Service printed 60 million of these stamps and once they're sold, that's it," said Pasold. "We're not going to produce any more. I recommend getting those stamps as soon as you can."

# Defense and pitching lead Juniors to Area 5 title

O'NEILL - Like the old saying goes . . . offense wins games, but defense wins championships.

The Wayne American Legion Juiors put on a defensive showcase in the Class B Area 5 tournament over the weekend at Letheby Field, capping their run to the area title with a 5-3 win over Lakeview to advance to this weekend's state tournament in Nebraska City.

The Juniors' defensive effort in the tournament was outstanding, capping it with a spotless effort behind starter Josh Lutt and reliever Jacob Kneifl, who combined for just one strikeout but relied on their teammates to hold off a late Lakeview rally.

"It's easy pitch when you have a defense that plays that well," Lutt said after the win. "You just put the ball in there and if they don't hit a bomb it's probably an out because our defense was just

Lutt's older brother, coach Jake Lutt, said he had confidence in his pitching staff and his de-

"Our pitching has been solid of late and I had these guys last year (in Ponies) and Josh and Trevor DeBoer really threw well and Jacob Kneifl came on in relief and is a great closer, so we did a great job and the fielders knocked the ball down

Wayne broke the deadlock in the third when Kneifl singled and scored on a sacrifice fly by Gunnar Jorgensen, but Lakeview got a run in the fourth inning to tie the game at 1-1.

Wayne broke the game open in the fifth, as Ty-

ler Gilliland came through with the bases loaded by knocking a two-run single, and Brock Hopkins and Gilliland came home on wild pitches to make it a 5-1 game.

Lutt had some problems early, but he and his defense worked out of trouble through the first six innings. Lakeview strung together three hits off Kneifl in the bottom of the seventh and had the tying run at the plate, but Kaleb Anderson hauled in the final out on a fly ball to center field to give the 17-11 Juniors the championship.

Reid Korth, who went 3-for-4 to highlight an eight-hit attack in the championship, said the Wayne team wanted to take care of business and not chance a winner-take-all second game.

"I knew we needed to come out and win that first one. We would have been feeling down if we didn't and didn't want to have to play a second game, so we came out and got this one," he said.

Kneifl also had three hits in the win for Wayne, its eighth straight since taking a 9-11 record into the season-ending league and area tournaments.

"We were young and it took a while to get going," said Lutt, who got a post-game cooler full of ice water as an early 21st birthday present after the game. "The pitching we've had makes our team confident they can go out and get a run, and our hitters have been getting it done and were really clutch in this tournament."

Wayne opened the area tournament with an exciting 2-0 shutout of Lakeview. The game was scoreless until the sixth, when Wayne broke the deadlock with a two-run single by Gilliland, scoring Korth and Lutt.

Gilliland had two of Wayne's seven hits in the opener. Lutt pitched 4 2/3 innings and struck out three to get the win, while Kneifl picked up the first of his two saves in the tournament.

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



Entering the summer months, cattlemen need to understand and deal with heat and humidity. We need to consider some guidelines to help us reduce additional stress on cattle during these events and incorporate some of the following practices into our management practices.

It is first important to understand the relationship between temperature and humidity in respects to the Temperature Humidity Index (THI) or Heat Index (http://go.unl.edu/9gr4). It will help to determine the risk level in planning cattle handling during the summer months. Cattlemen need to be aware of the risk based on weather forecast of the heat stress.


Handling cattle early in the mornings before temperatures get too high is always recommended. Plan to handle cattle before 8 a.m. and never after 10 a.m. during summer months.

Remember that the animal's core temperature peaks approximately two hours after the environmental temperature peaks and takes four to six hours to lower back to normal temperature. With this in mind, you shouldn't believe that handling cattle in the evening will reduce the risk of heat stress.

When processing cattle during high heat seasons, work cattle in smaller groups, so cattle are not standing in the holding area much longer than 30 minutes. Cattlemen should consider facilities that are shaded with good air flow to help reduce the heat. A sprinkler system may assist in cooling the area, if the water droplet size is large. Never over-crowd working facilities, work cattle slowly, and use low-stress handling techniques. Remember that



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processing cattle in any temperature elevates the animal's core tempera-

Cattle movements should be short distances during hot seasons. Strategic planning on pen movements can assist in reducing unnecessary movements and potential heat stress. Moving heavier cattle closer to loading facilities throughout the feeding period can benefit in managing heat effects.

When planning or improving cattle handling and feeding facilities, cattlemen need to take into consideration air flow, shade, and sprinkler systems for cooling livestock. These considerations can help the danger of heat stress on livestock and improve feeding efficiencies during hot temperature periods.

Another important thing to remember is that compromised animals are at higher risk for heat stress. Those animals that are sick or lame are usually running higher temperatures than normal (average temperature for a beef animal is 101.5 degrees Fahrenheit), combined with hot temperature and high humidity raises their risk of heat stress. Producers will need to take extra precautions with these animals to provide additional resources like shade and cooling.

The Nebraska Beef Quality Assurance website, bga.unl.edu, has additional resources on heat stress including the Nebraska Extension publication "Feedlot Heat Stress Information and Management Guide". 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

month, the summer heat is upon us. That's nature in Nebraska. We could think of all kinds of reasons to be negative about the weather, but I say, "Bring on the heat!"

I remember as a child the many fond memories of playing in the creek with my family, and it was something to look forward to each summer season. Wading, swimming and making sand (mud) castles and exploring the different types of creek animals allows children to connect with nature and the outdoors, while at the same time building their sense of creativity, problem solving, motor skills, and so-

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Last month I delivered a program to childcare center directors where we focused on spaces to learn and grow and the importance of designing outdoor spaces for children in our care to experience nature. No matter what season it is, research indicates that children who have opportunities to experience their natural environments have the ability sustain and cope with stressors in their lives. Research done in the Netherlands demonstrated the distance one lives from the nearest green space and the prevalence of many major illnesses including Anxiety disorder and depression in children under age 12. According to Louise Chawla, Professor of Planning and Urban Design from the University of Colorado, "Adults in many studies report that memories of a special place in nature experience in their childhood gives them a pool of calm on which they can draw in dif-

When designing spaces for children, I advise childcare providers to include a balance of natural spaces and play equipment. Include areas with small trees, and perhaps a water feature and patches of soil to explore as well as to garden in. Play equipinterspersed within the outdoor space and the natural additions of plants and pathways can create natural barriers to define the purpose of these areas. Check out Benefits of Connecting Children with Nature for some great before and after outdoor spaces designs in childcare settings as well as a detailed explanation to the many benefits of natural environments. Bringing the outdoors in to the

classroom or center is also essential in early childhood curriculum. Consider the many classroom centers and the possible items from nature that could inspire and challenge children's exploration. Classrooms can add sticks and rocks or tree cookies to the building area, or introduce seeds and leaves to the science center. Could these items be used in the art area? If you have small group experiences, you might explore the seeds inside of a pomegranate or pumpkin.

NAEYC shows how early childhood settings can introduce nature in the classrooms and allow children to take the lead in exploring these materials by Connecting Young Children With Children spend a good majority of

their time in childcare, and therefore it is essential that we include natural outdoor learning environments and experiences to enhance their overall growth in development in all do-

# Tolerance:

## Nebraska?Capitol View

soon break out in Nebraska." Those words from Charles Kuralt on a Dateline America piece about the Nebraska Interstate 80 Bicentennial Sculpture Project in 1976. Still haunting. Sadly true. Kuralt was standing in front of Er-

ma's Desire, a piece that still stands, almost forgotten, at the western edge of the eastbound I-80 rest stop at Grand Island. The project raised eyebrows and controversy since none of the artists were from Nebraska and the artwork was abstract. A series of statewide public hearings were held to discuss the project ... and not everybody liked it.

Four decades later we're still strug gling with intolerance in Nebraska. Attorney General Doug Peterson announced that he is joining nine other Republican state attorneys general in asking that the Trump administration reverse its earlier decision to allow so-called DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) youth to retain legal presence in the United States. That would impact more than 3,000 young immigrants in Nebraska. Until this session, Nebraska

lawmakers have consistently supported the DACA youth who were brought to the country when they were babies or young children. Passed over gubernatorial vetoes (one during the Dave Heineman administration and two under the Pete Ricketts administration), lawmakers granted resident college tuition rates driver's licenses and professional and commercial licenses.

But, the wheels came off the tolerance wagon this year when state senators narrowly approved a resolution (LR26) opposing any federal action to rescind protections for DACA youth. The resolution was approved on a 24 1 vote with 17 senators present but declining to vote. There were seven senators excused and not voting.

Of those present and not voting, 16 were Republicans and one Democrat Burk Harr from Omaha. So, when is a senator's "present and not voting" the same as a "no" vote. It's often just a safe way to appease both the constituents who elected them and the governor who keeps track.

Peterson admits that he struggles with the issue on a personal level, but his duty is "fidelity to the Constitution" and that the executive branch has exceeded its authority in the mat ter and must be reined in (my words. not his). The Trump administration has vacillated on the issue thus far.

What if part of Peterson's position is based on the big R behind his name? Given the votes in the Legislature and the history of vetoes by Republican governors, fighting DACA just seems to be the Republican thing to do. Just as much as voting for the proposals seems to be the Democrat thing to do. Or so we would deduce based on our understanding of the

The post-session action is a fitting end to the 2017 Session of Our Discontent. Never has the nonpartisan Nebraska Legislature been this polarized. Peterson's action doesn't do anything to ease the situation.



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
