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Three components to new ag program offered at Wayne

Meet the incoming ag instructor and ITE instructor at the Farmers Breakfast Aug. 1

Before she had even graduated college, Toni Rasmussen was offered a job as an ag program instructor. "I was student teaching in Humphrey when I heard

rumors that Wayne was going to start an ag program so I reached out to Mr. Hanson and he said yes so I went ahead with the formal application process," Ras-

Rasmussen, an Albion native, grew up on a farm that is about as diverse as they come. Her family grows the typical row crops corn and soybeans and raises cattle but they also have hogs, alfalfa, wheat and her personal addition to the farm, goats.

"Those were kind of my projects and no one was ex-

cited about it but they like them now," Rasmussen said with a laugh. "I come from a very diverse farm and I think that helps when coming into a classroom with that experience.

The experience Rasmussen gained from working her family's farm and while attending UNL's agriculture education program made her the perfect fit for Wayne's newly established ag program. "It's new and I get to make it my own, which is

daunting but exciting," she said. "There are already kids signed up for it and are interested in it." Rasmussen discussed the curriculum for the pro-

gram as being one part of the "three-component sys-

The classes will range from Intro to Agriculture to Ag Business and Plant and Animal Science. Each course plays an important role in the program and offers students the chance to find their niche inside the agricultural field as well.

With those classes, come labs and demonstrations in a newly renovated space. The classrooms and locker rooms in that area of the school have been completely gutted and are in the process of being rebuilt, giving a better layout to the area and more usable space for

Rasmussen listed some of the labs and demonstrations that will take place in the Ag Lab: soil and water testing, dissections, taste and smell labs, animal health injection labs, soil ribboning and small animal examinations as well as welding and precision ag dem-

The second part of the agriculture education pro-

gram is Supervised Ag Experience (SAE). Traditionally, Rasmussen said, this would come from hours working in an ag environment like the family farm or a summer job at a hog operation, but more recently other options have become available.

"SAEs are there for students to gain experience for life in more than just the classroom," she said. "Kids can personalize it. Work at a grocery store, learn how to change a lawn mower blade or give cattle a vaccination. It's based on them learning a new skill and that's how I'll grade it. They'll get points and be graded on personal growth."

The final component of an ag ed program is the National FFA Organization, formerly known as Future Farmers of America.

Wayne Business Center aids entrepreneurship

With available office space and a goal in mind, George Phelps along with other organizations have made an opportunity available to those just starting out in the business world.

When office space became available in the Mineshaft Mall, Phelps approached the building's owner as well as a group he is part of (SCORE) to present an idea he's had for a number of years.

"There are three parts of business -you have to have an idea, you have to be able to market it and then there is the financing involved. Very few people have all three," he said. "Since I've been here I have seen businesses that lack in one area or another so I've had this idea for some

The space, consisting of half a dozen offices, open areas, conference room and a break room, is next to Phelps' own office, making it a convenient spot for him.

The goal, Phelps said, is to make the resources SCORE has and the space he's found available, to entrepreneurs who need guidance and are in need of a work space without the hefty rent costs of a full

"These offices will be available to anyone who wants to come to town to start a business, is a professional or just needs a desk and a chair," he said. "Rent is \$200-250 per month depending on which office they choose and that includes the utilities

The space itself is already set up to accommodate numerous professionals with fully constructed offices that vary in sizes as well as numerous options for storage in several places throughout. Those renting would have access to the conference room to use but so would the community,

Phelps discussed the possibility of a part time receptionist at the door to field traffic and calls once the offices were filled.

But the space is only part of the deal with the Wayne Business Center. The other, and possibly most important part, is the free business counseling services offered primarily through SCORE.

SCORE is a Small Business Association supported non-profit group that offers business counseling for those just starting or thinking of starting their own business.

Thousands of volunteer business counselors make up the network, including dozens in the area. Phelps is one and regularly counsels entrepreneurs through SCORE.

"SCORE is a confidential group," Phelps said. "We have certain training we go through to help these entrepreneurs."

SCORE makes face-to-face consultations an option for business owners as well as an on-site evaluation of the business and access to a team of SCORE counselors that are of varying backgrounds to help provide specialized assistance in any area of business.

Each year SCORE offers workshops by the thousands, some even in this area, that are low-cost and cover important small business issues.

Phelps has facilitated some of those counseling sessions and participated in many workshops with the goal of Wayne

The 95th annual Wayne County Fair kicks off this week and includes a myriad of options for entertainment, no matter the age.

Thursday night the fairgrounds will be teeming with cowboys and cowgirls alike while the sounds of jostling cattle in the chutes will compete with the whirl of carnival rides.

Starting at 5 p.m. Thursday, the new River City Carnival Midway will open to fairgoers for fun before the Ultimate Bullriding Tour and LJ Jenkins Invitational Bullriding Tour kick off at 7:30 p.m. that night. During the bull riding intermission, children are invited to take part in mutton bustin' for a little fun of their own.

With 30 riders and an added \$4,000 in prizes and a buckle to the champion, the riding tour is guaranteed to be buzzing with

Friday the midway opens again at 5 p.m. and the annual free BBQ starts serving at 6 p.m. Those ready for a little dust, a bit of smoke and a lot of noise should claim their seats in the grandstand early to get the best view of the Lucas Oil PPL/Nebraska Bush Pullers Tractor Pull, which starts at 6:30 on Friday night.


from the radio," Nichols said. "We always try to make the show as fun, interesting and country as possible. We like to laugh and hope


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

Blood shortage continues

responded to the emergency call for blood and platelet donations issued by the American Red Cross in early July, but there continues to be a critical summer blood shortage. Eligible donors of all types are urgently needed.

After issuing the emergency call, the Red Cross has experienced a 30 percent increase in blood donation appointments through mid-July. About half of the appointments were scheduled by donors using the free Blood Donor App or at redcrossblood.org. Despite this improvement, blood products are still being distributed to hospitals as fast as donations are coming in,

of people have so more donations are needed to meet patient needs and replenish the blood supply.

"The blood supply is like a cell phone battery, it constantly needs recharging," said Nick Gehrig, communications director, Red Cross Blood Services. "We sincerely appreciate those who have responded to the call to help save lives and encourage those who haven't to consider rolling up a sleeve and give the gift of life. It only takes about an hour but can mean a lifetime for patients."





Seniors just miss on chance to play for area title with 5-4 loss

The Wayne American Legion Post 43 Seniors made it to the final four of the Class B Area 5 tournament and were frustratingly close to having a chance to play for all the marbles.

The Wayne Seniors were 90 feet away from tying the game Monday night, but were unable to get the tying run home as a seventh-inning comeback fell short in a 5-4 loss to Lakeview that eliminated the Post 43 Seniors from the Class B Area 5 tournament Monday at Hank Overin Field.

Nebraska labor leaders call for civility and the "rule of law" during deliberations on Keystone XL Pipeline Permit

The Nebraska Public Service Commission will hold hearings on the permit for the Keystone XL pipeline in early August. These hearings will draw attention, potentially undesirable attention, from around the nation. In fact, groups who represent themselves as "anarchists" have issued a statement (see below) encouraging rabble-rousing on August 6 in Lincoln and instructed protestors to "Protect your identity from police and private security by wearing a mask, nondescript clothing and hiding visible marks and tattoos." This portends actions that will violate the law.

The members of the Nebraska Building Trades are preparing to participate in a civil process to support approval of the KXL permit. Unfortunately, our preparation now involves a concern for public safety and the violation of the rule of law by anarchists, many from out of state, seeking to harm the process and maybe citizens of Nebraska.

"We want to put pressure on all concerned parties to adhere to the Nebraska way of civility and due process." stated Jim Waugh, President. "That is why the Building Trades want to declare that we will not conduct demonstrations or public events in the streets that could inflame the situation; cost taxpayers; make citizens fearful;

and, cause harm."

tatives from the Omaha and Southwest Iowa Building and Construction Trades Council hand-delivered a letter to Jane Kleeb, leader of the KXL opposition, to make a public statement calling on all KXL opponents to support civility, open discourse and the rule of law in the interest of public safety. "While it is unfortunate that she has not responded to our heartfelt request.' Jim Waugh added, "It is our understanding that Ms. Kleeb, has met with Lincoln Police Chief Jeff Bliemeister to discuss protest activities. We hope that she made a commitment to Chief Bliemeister to follow our lead and not the path

of anarchy Note: Tax payers in North Dakota spent over \$33 million on protecting the public from pipeline protests in 2016. According to officials in North Dakota over 700 arrests were made with 92 percent of people from out-of-state.







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Is it OK for a Christian to

I recently read an article by a pastor who was preparing to preach a sermon series titled, Is it OK for a Christian to listed about eight subjects that he would address in this sermon series which included watch R rated movies, gamble, drink wine, get a tattoo, practice yoga and others. These are the kind of questions that many people who profess to be

Christians are asking. In our culture there are many attractions and temptations that we Christian face every day. There are many things that we hear at church about right and wrong. It can be confusing to know what is OK or permissible and what is not. Without going into any specific issue, I would like to share a few questions that a Christian may ask before answering such questions.


1. Why am I asking this question in the first place? In other words, what is the intention behind the question? Am I asking this because I really don't know and I want to know what God has to say about it? Or am I asking this question in order to find a reason to do what I already have decided to do? Sometimes we want to do something that we know is wrong but we are just looking for an excuse to go ahead and do it. It is important to identify our motives when addressing questionable issues. This may be difficult to do but attempting to make an honest assessment of our intentions, desires, and motives can be very revealing.

2. Will it truly bring glory to God and Jesus Christ? In 1 Corinthians 10: 31 Paul summarizes a passage regarding permissible things by stating, "So whether you eat or drink or whatever ever you do, do it all for the glory of God." Also, in Colossians 3:17 Paul says that the believer should do all things in "the name of the Lord Jesus." To do something in the name of Jesus means to do it for his glory and his benefit. The true follower of Jesus must consider whether his or her actions will actually bring glory to God and Jesus Christ

But what if we don't know the answer to that question? Then it is better not to engage in that activity until one can truly answer this question. Clearly we have liberty in Jesus Christ but that is not liberty to sin or live any way we please. There is a higher standard than just doing what one pleases for the Christ follower.

3. What does the Bible really say about the matter? I emphasize the word "really" because it is very easy to make the Bible say what we want it to say. People often us a method called "proof texting" where they look for verses or even half verses to prove what they have already decided to believe. One can prove almost anything they want with proof texting.

This method is an unacceptable method for attempting to understand what God has said about a particular matter. For the true Christ follower, he or she must approach the Bible with a desire to know what God has said even if it disagrees with their preconceived notions. The person who truly wants to know God's opinion on the subject will approach the Bible with an open mind and a teachable spirit. They will allow the Word of God to speak to them and shape their beliefs rather than vice versa.



4. Is it helpful and beneficial for me in my Christian walk? A Christ follower must not just look for permission to do something but must evaluate whether this action will actually help or hurt their Christian experience. Paul says in 1 Corinthians 10:23, "Everything is permissible, but not everything is beneficial. Everything is permissible, but not everything is constructive." Paul is referring to matters that are not clearly addressed in Scripture. He uses the example of food sacrificed to idols in this passage. This is not an issue for us today but the example lays down some very important principles for approaching disputable matters.

Our freedom in Christ allows us to do many things but not everything is actually helpful or beneficial. Each Christ follower must ask themselves whether the action will actually help them walk closer with Jesus or draw them away from their relationship with Christ.

5. Is it helpful or beneficial to others? Paul continues in 1 Corinthians 10:24 by stating, "Nobody should seek his own good, but the good of others." Clearly our actions have an influence and impact upon other people especially other believers. The true Christ follower must be concerned about how his or her actions will affect other believers. Will it encourage and build them up or will it cause them to doubt the Lord and fall into sin? We cannot allow another person's legalisms to control our lives but

we must take into consideration how our actions affect other people. In Romans 14 Paul addresses the issue of "disputable matters" and uses food sacrificed to idols and religious celebrations as examples. Paul is concerned about how our actions may affect a believer who is weak in the faith.

In conclusion, if a Christian truly wants to know what to do about a disputable matter, he or she may prayerfully consider each of the above questions as they seek to know what God would have them do. The answer may not always be easy to find, but the diligent Christ follower will continue to seek God's answers to life's difficult ques-

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
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Programs available for Nebraska ag in drought

The Nebraska Department of Agriculture (NDA) is providing information to Nebraska's farmers and ranchers in need of assistance due to prolonged dry conditions in the state.

"The U.S. Drought Monitor has updated its drought status. In Nebraska, abnormally dry conditions in parts of the state have intensified. The Department is receiving reports of rapidly deteriorating pasture and field conditions," said NDA Director Greg Ibach. "In response to the worsening conditions, we are outlining several tools that are available for farmers and ranchers to utilize."

Emergency use of CRP

Several counties in Nebraska are authorized for emergency having or grazing on Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres. This is a result of U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue making the authorization available for counties in Montana, North Dakota and South Dakota in D2 or greater stages of drought on the U.S. Drought Monitor. Any county in Nebraska with a border that falls within 150 miles of those D2 or greater designated drought areas in those three states are eligible for the emergency having or grazing. A map of those counties can be found at www.fsa.usda.gov/ne. Landowners interested in emer-

gency haying or grazing of CRP acres must contact their local FSA office for details on eligibility requirements and prior to taking any action on CRP acres. To find a local FSA office, go to offices.usda.gov. Haying of Roadside

Right-of-Ways

The Nebraska Department of Transportation (NDOT) authorizes permitted having of roadside right-ofways. Permitted haying is allowed by abutting land owners until July 31st,

and open to the public for permitted haying beginning August 1st. For details on having roadside right-of-ways and to obtain permits contact the NDOT Maintenance Office in your district.

NDA Hay Hotline

The Nebraska Department of Agriculture offers a resource for farmers and ranchers looking to buy or sell hay. The Hay & Forage Hotline can be found on the NDA website. Sellers can post their information on the site themselves or contact NDA at 800-422-6692. The list of sellers is posted on the website and is updated on a regular basis.

Fire Suppression Efforts

On July 18, Governor Ricketts authorized the issuance of an Emergency Proclamation relating to fire retardant materials. This proclamation will allow the Nebraska Emergency Management Agency to replenish fire retardant materials which have been partially depleted by fire suppression efforts in Nebraska and by assisting other states with wildfires which have been aided by drought conditions. The proclamation will allow the Adjutant General greater flexibility for wildfire suppression efforts. The NDA Drought Central Web-

site contains information on all these programs and will be continually updated with valuable resources. It can be found at droughtcentral.nebraska.

"My agency and I appreciate the proactive response by U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue, Governor Ricketts and the resources being made available through various agencies of the State of Nebraska," said Ibach. "NDA will continue to monitor the states drought conditions closely and provide further assistance when appropriate."

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better packing and storage qualities. Plants with brown leaves and small ears with little or no grain may still be too wet because most of the moisture is in the stalks. We have area fields in all stages of development, primarily depending on variety and planting date, so don't assume your corn is too dry or too wet to take as silage.

A quick way to determine if the plant contains too much moisture is to hand-squeeze a representative sample collected from the forage chopper for about 30 seconds. If water drips from the squeezed sample, the corn is too wet for ideal fermentation. If it holds its shape but doesn't easily fall apart, you will be close. If it crumbles, moisture may need to be added.

Harvesting with a silage chopper and feeding it fresh to cattle instead of first ensiling it is known as greenchop. Feeding greenchop requires a lot of care because of high nitrate problems. Nitrates accumulate in the lower 8 - 10 inches of the stalk in drought corn. Set the cutter height to avoid harvesting the lower part of the stalk. It should be fed immediately after harvesting (no more than two hours' worth of feeding, because heat in the truck or feed bunk will convert nitrate to nitrite, which is

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10 times more toxic). Have plenty of bunk space available so "boss" cows don't overeat. Baling the crop as hay will not reduce nitrate levels.

Before making any decisions about drought-damaged corn, check with crop insurance agents so the crop can be appraised for damage prior to harvest. Also, pay close attention to herbicide and insecticide labels and be in touch with chemical suppliers to make sure the crop is harvested and fed safely.

The original 24 NRDs' boundaries were organized based on Nebraska's major river basins which allows for better management practices to be applied to similar topography. In 1989, the Middle Missouri NRD and the Papio NRD were merged into one, becoming the Papio-Missouri River NRD which resulted in the current 23-NRD system.

"Nebraska's 23 NRDs have been addressing natural resources issues and concerns with local solutions for 45 years," said Mike Sousek, General Manager of the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) in Norfolk.

Nebraska's NRDs are involved in a wide variety of projects and programs to conserve and protect the state's natural resources. Sousek added, "NRDs are charged under state law with 12 areas of responsibility including flood control, soil erosion, and groundwater management. While all NRDs share the 12 main responsibilities, each district sets its own priorities and develops programs to best serve local needs and to protect Nebraska's natural resources for future generations."

NRDs are local government entities with broad responsibilities to protect our natural resources. Major Nebraska river basins form the boundaries of the 23 NRDs, enabling districts to respond best to local conservation and resource management needs. 
