If your little lady uses the reflection of herself from the freezer doors in the grocery store to critique her dancing or your little man busts out moves you've never seen before on the dance floor, you may be looking for an outlet.

Taryn Winter happens to have that outlet.

Winter, a Wayne State grad, returned from a brief hiatus in the corporate world following her spring graduation after missing Wayne and her life here. When she returned she was approached by some moms who had previously seen her talents being utilized by the Wayne High School She-Devil Dance Squad about opening a dance studio.

They had broached the subject in months prior, but with her heart set on an office in a high-rise, she had brushed the offers aside at that time. This time, however, Winter took the questions seriously and began to think about what it would take to open a studio.

"I got a job in Minnesota as a recruiter for a large company which sounded great, but I worked there a few months and I was really unhappy," Winter said. "I missed Wayne and the people there."

Winter isn't new to dance or even teaching dance, having started dancing in her home state of Minnesota when she was young and continuing that competitively in school.

She was selected to dance with the Varsity High Kick squad when she was just an eighth grader and as she continued into high school, Winter's life was eat, sleep and breathing dance. Three hours of practice per day for the teams she was on, weekly competitions to take part in and weekends full of clinics and special classes to push her further in the sport made up her life through high school.

While the shop itself has only been open for a few weeks now, the Tiedtke's have owned the building and rented it out to a nail salon for some time before Hwy. 15 Salvage Company came to fruition.

"Dan and I bought the building two years ago and we knew at some point that at some point in our lives we wanted to open some sort of antique-repurposing shop. But then we had the building and it was like, 'oh let's do it.'"

With all three of their children in school and Dan already utilizing part of the building as a shop for his carpentry work, things fell into place with the businesses.

The couple handled the renovations themselves, from the flooring to the creation of a large built-in that was part new (the front counter built by Dan) and part old (the glass display cases behind the counter that came from a business in Norfolk).

The name of the business speaks to its purpose: salvaging items -- saving them, repurposing them and giving them new life.

"Dan has a carpentry background and I have an art background so we can pretty much do any project."

The selection of items in the store is second to none, and that's only because the Tiedtke's have been busy amassing them.

"Knowing we wanted to do something like this, Dan and I have been collecting things for years, so here and there we've just picked up stuff and we have

After being laid off from a biotech firm, Angela McLaughlin began working for a research department in a Lincoln cancer center and she loved it. She got to talk with the doctors and interact with the patients and after a while she started to think that she could do medicine.

"I applied to med school and got accepted. I went to Kansas City for four years," McLaughlin said. "And I went to Clarkson Family Medicine in Omaha for my residency."

While attending college in Kansas City, McLaughlin said that she couldn't pick just one specialty for a couple of reasons.

"I loved every rotation I was on," said McLaughlin. "So you have to pick family medicine. It's the one where you do it all."

The other reason was knowing the size of community her husband and she wanted to be in, it would be too much strain to have a speciality and be on call 24/7.

So she selected full scope family medicine. From obstetric care through final years, McLaughlin said a huge part of her deciding on family medicine was due to the variation she gets in her day with it.

She went on to explain that even the seemingly insignificant appointments bring her a lot of joy, talking to folks about their lives and their hobbies

and just getting to know them.

She discussed how knowing the patient will ensure they get the best care possible and gave an example that is a real occurrence in the rural com-

munities she will be serving in: farmers at harvest. McLaughlin went on to say that a doctor visit for a busy farmer during harvest isn't a priority of theirs so getting them in before and after for the bum knee they have is the best way to make sure they stay healthy and safe during their busy season.

But why Wayne?

"We fell in love with Wayne. We like that it's a college town with a younger feel and my family is more in Lincoln and (my husband's) family is in the Sutton area, so it all seemed to work out pretty well."

The McLaughlins have already gotten settled into Wayne, having moved in the week of Chicken Days.

"We moved in on Friday and got up on Saturday to run in the 5K actually," she said. "We were hoping to make it to the petting zoo but after the parade our daughter fell asleep."

She will begin practicing at Faith Regional Physician Services' Family Medicine Clinic in Wayne as well as some time in Laurel and in Wisner, though exact hours at each place have yet to be determined. McLaughlin has been finishing paperwork and is set to take patients as a FRPS physician this week and is excited for her time in Wayne and the other clinics.

"I want to thank the community because we have been very welcomed and everyone has been very helpful."

gan teaching young girls ages 3-13 at the YMCA, Winter said. When she transferred to Wayne State College, she was determined to stay involved in the sport she loved so dearly

"I had an opportunity to co-coach the Wayne She-Devils and then I was the head coach last year," Winter said.

And that involvement began to open doors to Winter, helping her make community connections that have become invaluable.

"I got to know the dancers and their parents," she said. "I finally decided to go forward and make some calls asking for support from people and it worked."

Winter's connections helped her to secure a location for the Wayne Dance Company studio: the back room of Miss Molly's Coffee Shop.

"I couldn't find a space on it's own that was the right kind of space and rentable. The owners are even considering opening the shop portion while classes are happening so parents can grab a cup of coffee and have a place to wait."

Currently, Miss Molly's is open only to parties and events. The WDC studio will offer an array of types of dance classes to numerous age groups throughout the week, from tap to jazz to lyrical and ballet. New to Wayne thanks to this new studio will be the addition of hip-hop and contemporary dancing. There will be a spring recital in mid-May for the dancers to showcase their talent and handwork to the public at a local theater.

Several assistant teachers will be helping Winter, especially in the beginner classes, but for the most part Winter says she plans to be the sole teacher.

Winter has a company coming to install mirrors in the back room and has ordered equipment, so the tentative start date for classes is the week of Sept. 11.

Visit the Wayne Dance Company's Facebook page for specific class details such as pricing as well as to find the registration form or you can visit her in person at the studio's open house on Aug. 14 and 15. Winter will be in the back room at Miss Molly's from 11 a.m. until 1 p.m. and from 4 p.m. until 6 p.m. both days to answer questions and discuss the studio's classes with any who are interested.

Winter has aligned the dance studio schedule with that of the schools to ensure parents aren't forced to pick between family gatherings and dance class.

She has big plans for the future of the studio, with competition team and adult dance exercise class ideas, but to begin with she plans to focus on the fundamentals and give students an environment that helps them to grow both as people and as dancers.

"If they (her students) learn at least a couple of things while they're in my classes like the core things, I'll be happy with that."

She credits the community with the overnight success she's seen in enrollment and with the support for the studio in general.

"The Wayne community really took me in and guided me through the right doors and, honestly, if it weren't for the connections I made while I was coaching, it wouldn't have happened."

Numerous county employees were in attendance to share concerns and ask questions but ultimately to see what changes would be made. While the topic is an unsavory one, the rising cost of health care is becoming a problem to the county where 100 percent insurance is offered. In other words, if the employee went off county insurance in favor of the stipend to be used to pay for Medicare or to go toward paying for them to be on their spouse's insurance, their spouse would not also qualify for that stipend. However, if the employee wishes to keep their insurance through the county but their spouse has the option to get on insurance through their employer or switch to Medicare, the stipend is available. After a brief budget work session, minimum setback from structures two representatives from NextEra and their attorney came before the board to discuss the large wind project that is in the works in western Wayne County. 

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

Wayne State representatives lead U.S. team to 4-0 Brazil trip

Two Wayne State basketball players, along with head coach Chris Kielsmeier and assistant Kelly Kielsmeier, were part of a 10-player team from the United States that completed a week-long trip to South America with a 4-0 mark in a Brazil Tour basketball exhibition.

The Kielsmeiers were joined by seniors Paige Ballinger and Maggie Schulte as part of an all-star team made up of players from the NSIC and MIAA during the first week of August. Other team members were Cassidy Thorson and Jacky Volkert of MSU Moorhead and Miranda Ristau of Northern State from the NSIC, along with MIAA representatives Chelsey Henry of Missouri Southern, Tanya Meyer of Northwest Missouri State, Paige Redmond of Central Missouri, and Paige Imhoff and Brenlee McPherson of Pittsburg State.

The USA team started their four-game tour last Tuesday, Aug. 1, with a 100-22 win over Itupvera and a 70-59 win over Osasco the following day.

After visits to sites like Copacabana Beach and the Christ Statue, the USA team traveled to Rio de Janerio and posted a 56-38 win over Celso Lisboa, a university team. They closed the trip Sunday with a 78-44 win over Fluminense, marking the first time a USA team went 4-0 on the Brazil trip.

After enjoying some shopping and time on the beach after the games, the team returned to the United States on Wednesday.

Wildcat women's soccer picked 11th in NSIC preseason poll

Wayne State was picked 11th in the 2017 NSIC Preseason women's soccer coaches' Poll released Monday.

The Wildcats collected 78 points in voting conducted by league coaches in this year's poll. Wayne State returns six starters from last year's team that was 9-6-3 overall and tied for eighth in the NSIC with a 6-6-3 league mark. It was the most wins for a Wildcat soccer team since 2006 and the six league wins were the most for Wayne State since the 2005 season.

Minnesota State is the preseason favorite to win the NSIC with 217 points and 11 first-place votes followed by Augustana in second with 210 points and the remaining five first-place votes. Bemidji State came in third at 188 points with Minot State fourth (187) and St. Cloud State fifth with 165 points. Minnesota Duluth was sixth with 160 points, followed by Northern State (134), Concordia-St. Paul (119), Upper Iowa (107) and Winona State (94) rounding out the top 10.

Wildcats Brooke Buzzell and Alexis Storthers were named the team's Players to Watch for the upcoming season.

Buzzell, a 5-foot-4 midfielder, is listed as Wayne State's offensive player to watch. The Monument, Colo. native led the Wildcats in scoring last season with five goals and one assist for 11 points while playing in 17 games with 10 starts.

Strothers, a 5-foot-4 defender from Gurnee, Ill., was selected as the team's defensive player to watch. She appeared in all 18 matches last season and recorded one goal while ranking second on the team in minutes played (1,609)

Wayne State opens the 2017 season on Thursday, Aug. 31 at Augustana in a 5 p.m. match, followed by the home opener on Sunday, Sept. 3 against Colorado Christian at 11 a.m.

Athletic Director looking forward to filling big shoes

Dennis Dolliver once tried to lure longtime Wayne High athletic director Rocky Ruhl to Norfolk to take over the Norfolk High boys basketball program.

Years later, he's now filling the shoes Ruhl left behind when he retired earlier this year after more than 30 years as a teacher and coach at Wayne Community Schools.

Dolliver began his duties earlier this month as the new athletic director and junior high principal at Wayne Junior-Senior High School, and while he wasn't able to lure him to the big city, Dolliver is looking forward to picking up where Ruhl left off at the end of last school year. "I have a lot of respect for Rocky Ruhl," he said in his office Monday. "I'd asked him several times to come over and take a look at Norfolk and move to the Class A level, but he¹s loyal and he bleeds blue and had no desire to move. I've worked with him on a number of things over the years and he¹s a class act, so I knew coming over that things were going to be in good shape." Dolliver comes to Wayne after a one-year break from a career in education that started as a teacher and coach in Blair. After six years there, he took on his first administrator job in Maywood before moving to Stanton a year later to be the principal and athletic director there. Eventually, Dolliver made his way to Norfolk High School, where he served as an assistant principal and activities director for 18 years. He retired after the 2015-16 school year and spent a year working for News Channel Nebraska and Custom Sports before decid-

Wayne State Volleyball listed sixth in NSIC preseason poll

The Wayne State College volleyball team was selected to finish sixth in the 2017 Preseason NSIC Volleyball Coaches' Poll announced Thursday.

The Wildcats collected 157 points in voting conducted by league coaches. Wayne State returns four starters from last year's team that was 24-8 overall and sixth in the NSIC with a 14-6 league mark while advancing to the NCAA Div. II national tournament for the 11th time in the last 12 vears.

Concordia-St. Paul was tabbed the team to beat in the NSIC this season receiving 218 points and 10 first-place votes. Southwest Minnesota State came in second at 202 points with three first-place votes, just edging third place Minnesota Duluth with 201 points and two first-place votes. Augustana was one point better than Winona State for fourth place, receiving the final first-place vote and 172 points with Winona State right behind at 171.

Wildcat rightside hitter Erin Gross was listed as the team's player to watch in the NSIC this season. The 6-foot1 senior form Tekamah was a second-team All-NSIC selection last season after averaging 2.50 kills and 0.75 blocks per set while posting a .288 percentage. She was named NSIC Offensive Player of the Week twice last season.

Puerto Rico trip highlights WSC men's hoops schedule

A trip to Puerto Rico highlights a 2017-18 schedule for the Wayne State men's basketball team, coach Jeff Kaminsky announced Monday. Wayne State begins the season

with an exhibition game at Div. I Wright State of Ohio on Friday, Nov. 3 in Dayton, Ohio. Wright State is coached by Scott Nagy, father of Wayne State senior Tyler Nagy.

The regular season opens on Friday, Nov. 10 at in-state rival Nebraska-Kearney, with the Lopers returning to Wayne two days later to face the Wildcats in the home opener on Sunday, Nov. 12. Wayne State hosts Barclay College of Kansas on Friday, Nov. 17, three days before its Nov. 20 NSIC opener against Augustana in Rice Auditorium.

The Wildcats close out the November slate with a trip to Puerto Rico to play two games on Friday and Saturday, Nov. 24-25, against Div. II opponents who will be named at a later date.

"We have an exciting and challenging schedule in 2017-18," remarked Kaminsky. "The highlight of our preseason is our trip to Dayton, Ohio to face Division I Wright State. We start the regular season with two important in-region games against Nebraska-Kearney and one of the highlights of our non-conference schedule will be our trip to Puerto Rico and the opportunity to play in the Robert Clemente Coliseum in San Juan."

The December slate boasts 10 games, with five at home in a stretch of 11 days. Wayne State opens the month of December with conference road games at Minnesota State and Concordia-St. Paul on December 1-2. The Wildcats then return to Rice Auditorium for a five-game home stand, starting on Tuesday, Dec. 5 against Nebraska Christian College, with NSIC home games set for Friday and Saturday, Dec. 8-9 against University of Mary and Minot State.

The Wildcats conclude the non-

conference slate on Monday, Dec. 11 at home against Mount Marty and Friday, Dec. 15 against Grace Bible University.

"We will have an opportunity to play five non-conference home games this season compared to one last season," added Kaminsky.

Wayne State wraps up the December portion of the schedule with road contests at Augustana on Tuesday, Dec. 19, followed by games at Sioux Falls and Southwest Minnesota State Dec. 30-31.

Six of Wayne State's eight games in January will be played at Rice Auditorium, starting Jan. 5-6 with NSIC home games against Concordia-St.

Paul and Minnesota State. The lone road trip for Wayne State in January comes on the 12th and 13th, visiting Northern State and MSU Moorhead. Home games to close out the month of January find the Wildcats hosting Winona State and Upper Iowa Jan. 19-20, and St. Cloud State and Minnesota Duluth coming to Wayne Jan. 26-27.

The Feburary schedule of six games starts with the Wildcats on the road at Bemidji State Feb. 2 and Minnesota Crookston Feb. 3. The final home regular season games are Feb. 9-10 against Southwest Minnesota State and Sioux Falls. Wayne State ends the regular season on the road with visits to Upper Iowa Feb. 16 and Winona State Feb. 17.

The opening round of the NSIC Sanford Health Men's Basketball Tournament is set for Wednesday, Feb. 21, with the quarterfinals, semifinals and finals held at the Sanford Pentagon in Sioux Falls, South Dakota Feb. 24-27.

Wayne State ended the 2016-17 season with a 10-19 record, placing sixth in the NSIC South Division at 8-14 in league play. The Wildcats doubled last year's win total in Kaminsky's first year and returns all players for next season since last year's roster had no seniors.

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





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Time to check for soybean aphids

Soybean aphids have been showing up in some fields in low numbers over the last several weeks, so now is the time to be doing some thorough scouting. The weather has been less than ideal for them up un-90's slow their reproduction, and may even kill them.

However, as temperatures have moderated, populations may increase. So don't stop looking until the beans hit the R6 stage. If you have already treated earlier this summer, it doesn't mean that the aphids will stay out. Early treatments will have worn off by now, so soybean aphids may actually have a greater chance of infesting those be made for soybean aphid manage-

Speaking of soybean aphids, in be aware that we have one coming an age when farming continues to go high tech, it was only a matter of time before scouting for soybean aphids went digital. That means you won't have to make use of paper sheets or keep track of your writing utensil in the field. Two recent offerings from UNL provide that opportunity. The first is Aphid Speed Scout. It is an app for your mobile til last week as temperatures in the device. The second is the spreadsheet EC1582: Soybean Aphid Speed Scouting Spreadsheet. Both are available free of charge.

> Any mobile device that is capable of running an Excel spreadsheet can make use of the spreadsheet. That means you keep track of what is going on with soybean aphids in your fields on your smart phone or tablet. The spreadsheet and app will allow for in-field decisions to ment.

Both the spreadsheet and app utilize the speed scouting method for determining whether soybean aphids have reached the treatment threshold of 250 aphids per plant. Scouting this way relies on the number of "infested" plants rather than estimating the number of aphids on each plant. Plants are considered "infested" if there are 40 or more aphids on the plant. When using the spreadsheet or app they will let you know whether you need to "Resample in 7-10 days," "Resample in 3-4 days," "Sample 5 more plants," or "Treat, confirm in 3-4 davs.'

The app Aphid Speed Scout can be found at iTunes for your Apple device and Google Play for your android device. The spreadsheet EC1582: Sovbean Aphid Speed Scouting Spreadsheet can be downloaded at: http://www.ianrpubs.unl. edu/sendIt/ec1582.html.

That dorm became the Independence Center when the school closed in 1976. I knew some guys who were housed there to detox, and sometimes, I could figure out whose room they were in.


Eventually, the building did not meet code. A new Center was built. There was talk of tearing down Sophie Teeters. There was usually outcry about it; it may have merited historical designation.

> Mindful eating is simply defined as being conscious of why you are eating. This simple concept has helped people struggling with weight issues, eating disorders, body image and even self esteem. It is not about following recipes or counting calories. It's about learning HOW and WHY you eat, and less about WHAT you eat. Mindful eating helps us to move away from the diet mentality and it puts us in touch with our inner self. The more you are in touch with your hunger

Eat. drink & be mindful Mindfulness is being diligently attentive to your body, mind, thoughts and feelings as you eat.

Mindfulness of the body.

This involves listening to your body and being in touch with your inner self. How does your body tell you when it's hungry or full? Does your stomach rumble? Do you experience low energy levels or hunger pains? Do you ignore your body's feedback? A good rule of thumb is to eat when your hunger scale is between 3 and 6 (on a scale of 1-10). At level 1 you are beyond hungry.

Eat your food slowly and pay attention to every single bite. People ished off that entire bag of chips in one sitting." Pay attention to the quantity of food that you consume instead of eating or snacking mindlessly.

Mindfulness of feelings.

What emotions do you experience that may trigger you either to start or stop eating? Sometimes the strongest longings for food happen when you are at your weakest point emotionally. Many people turn to food for comfort — consciously or unconsciously — when they're facing a difficult problem or looking to keep themselves occupied.

Pay attention to how you are feeling when you eat and how hun-

gry you are. Sometimes coping with your feelings is more important than changing the type of foods you eat.

Mindfulness of thoughts.

Be mindful of your thoughts in regards to your body weight or eating habits. Negative thoughts may trigger mindless eating. Pay careful attention to "should" and "should not" thoughts, critical thoughts (I'm so fat!), food rules, and "good" and "bad" food categories.

If you make a mistake, learn to forgive yourself and focus on the positive changes you are making in your eating habits. Give yourself credit for making changes that ensure better health.







ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE AN LAND USAGE, CHAPTER 152 ZONING, SPECIFICALLY SECTION 152.063 R-3 RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT AND SECTION 152.132 ACCESSORY USES; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska: Section 1. That Title XV, Chapter 152,

Section 152.063 of the Wayne Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows § 152.063 R-3 RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT. (C) Permitted accessory uses and struc-

tures. The following are permitted accessory uses and structures in an R 3 District:

(1) Accessory uses and structures normally appurtenant to the permitted uses and structures: provided that:

(a)Collectively the area(s) occupied by all existing and proposed structures, do not exceed 50% of the entire lot area:

(b)Collectively the area of all accessory structures shall not exceed 1,064 square feet or 7% of the lot area up to 3,000 square feet, whichever is greater. For multi-family dwellings, the area may exceed these limits, provided the area above these limits is for tenant use only. The total area of accessory structures for multi-family dwellings shall not exceed 300 square feet per sleeping room; and (c) Shall be in conformance with the

provisions of § 152.132 of this chap-

Section 2. That the Planning Commission held a public hearing on July 10, 2017, regarding this matter, and have recommended approval thereof subject to the following "Finding of Fact:

Staff's recommendation Section 3. That Title XV, Chapter 152, Section 152.132 (E) of the Wayne Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows: § 152.132 ACCESSORY USES

(E) Unattached accessory use. Any unattached accessory building(s) in combination with the principal or primary structure, in any R designated zoning district, shall not exceed a combined area greater than 50% of the lot area, provided the combined total area of all unattached accessory structures shall not exceed 1,064 square feet or 7% of the lot area up to 3,000 square feet, whichever is greater, except as allowed in § 152.064(C) for multifamily uses in an R-3 or R-4 District.

ORDINANCE NO. 2017-22

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE XV LAND USAGE, CHAPTER 152 ZONING (SUPPLEMENTARY DISTRICT REGULATIONS), SECTION 152.139 PARKING REGULATIONS; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE. BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska

Section 1. That Title XV, Chapter 152, Section 152.139 of the Wayne Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows

§ 152.139 PARKING REGULATIONS.

(A) Parking, storage or use of recreational equipment.

(1) All recreational equipment shall be parked behind the building line except for a period not to exceed 72 consecutive hours for purposes of loading and unloading. The building line of a residential dwelling on a corner lot fronts the street that the dwelling is addressed to. No recreational equipment shall be used for living, sleeping or housekeeping purposes in excess of 30 days in a 60 day period when parked or stored on a residential lot or on any location not approved for such use.

(2) Council may consider granting a waiver upon individual application for recreational equipment in parking spaces existing prior to the passage and approval of this section and based upon the parking surface and the distance from the street in connection with traffic hazards.

(B) Minimum off street parking and loading requirements.

(1) Off street motor vehicle parking and loading space shall be provided on any lot, or the errace adjacent to the lot, on which any of the indicated structures and uses are hereafter established. These requirements are thus only applicable to construction of a new structure (regardless of whether or not another building previously existed on the property), when a structure's use changes from one use (as listed in the schedule of minimum off street parking and loading requirements in this chapter) to another, or to any existing multiple family structure to which an addition is constructed that results in more dwelling units than existed prior to the addition. Such space, as defined in § 152.010 of this chapter, shall be provided with vehicular access to a street or an alley. A required loading space shall include a ten foot by 50 foot space with a minimum of 14 feet of height clearance. The loading space shall be so located as to avoid undue interference with public use of streets, alleys and walkways. Minimum off street parking and loading requirements, which shall be applicable in all zoning districts to the structures and uses indicated, shall be set forth in the following schedule of minimum off street parking and loading requirements. If minimum off street parking required in the schedule cannot be reasonably provided on the same lot, or the terrace adjacent to the lot, on which the principal structure or use is conducted in the opinion of the Board of Adjustment, the Board may permit such space to be provided on other off street property, provided that such space lies within 400 feet or the entrance to such principal structure or use. Non-residential uses in the B-2 District shall be exempt from these parking and loading requirements.

For purposes of this division, terrace parking shall be considered off street parking. (2)

Any corner lot located in a residential zoning district shall only use the terrace adjacent (3) to one of the lot's front yards for terrace parking. Terrace parking constructed before May 1, 2013 or designed through a building permit approved by May 1, 2013 shall be exempt from this restriction on a corner lot.

(4) Shared Parking. In meeting the requirements of the Schedule of minimum offstreet parking and loading requirements, adjacent land uses, lots or sites, as well as uses on the same property may share parking under the following conditions and standards:

All landowners participating in the shared parking shall execute the necessary a) cross-access easements which shall exist for the duration of the grantee's use to facilitate shared parking and record all documents for the easements with the County unless the uses are on the same property under common ownership.

A written agreement for the joint use of parking facilities shall be executed by the parties and approved by the City unless the uses are on the same property under common ownership.

All shared parking spaces shall be within a reasonable proximity of the main C) entrance of any building sharing the parking and provide direct pedestrian access to the entrance either by way of pedestrian alleys and passes, or by way of public sidewalks in the streetscape. In general, locations greater than 600' shall not qualify unless exceptional circumstances justify.

Other type barriers may be located at the edge of the parking lot.

(4) Parking layout and markings

(a) The developer shall submit to the city for review and approval, a detailed and accurately scaled parking lot layout, clearly showing the location of parking spaces and aisles, all conforming to city standards. Upon construction of the parking lot, the parking spaces must be marked on the park-

Any surface other than bare dirt, grass or weeds, but is aggregate in nature (i.e., crushed limestone, red granite, crushed concrete, slag or other material that cannot be displaced or easily moved by storm water run off) and shall be conditionally approved for a specified time period by the Zoning Administrator.

PERMANENT PARKING SURFACES. Any of the four surfaces allowed in division (F)(4)(b) below. (2) Drainage. (a) All permanent parking lots shall be designed to develop proper site drainage. Proper site drain-

(b) If a new permanent parking lot containing 6,000 square feet or more is located within 150 feet

or reasonably accessible to a storm sewer or other drainageway, including open channels and

The following table is a base guide for shared parking. Each use should provide a percentage of parking required by these regulations according to the Shared Parking Schedule below. Whichever time period requires the highest total parking spaces among the various uses should be the amount of parking provided subject to the shared parking agreement. Alternative parking allocations may be approved by the City Council based on industry data or other sufficient evidence and analysis of peak parking demands for specific uses.

(5) Parking Credits. A credit may be given to the parking requirements in the schedule of minimum off-street parking and loading requirements under the following conditions. The credits may be cumulative.

On-street Parking Credit. On-street parking within 300 feet of any lot line may a) be credited to the parking requirement at a rate of one parking credit for every two onstreet parking spaces. On-street parking spaces within the distance parameters may be counted more than once by multiple users. On-street parking on the same side of the street of any residentially zoned property shall not count towards non-residential uses.

b) Public Parking Credit. Public parking within 600 feet of any lot line may be credited at a rate of one parking credit for every three public parking spaces. Any space eligible towards the credit shall not be leased and must be generally available to the public. The City, or other public entity in charge of management of the public parking facilities reserves the right to restructure the eligibility for parking credits through a parking district management program, subject to approval of the City Council.

(C) Parking or driveway surfaces. This code section shall only apply within the corporate limits of the city. Parking or driveway surfaces on the city terrace or front yard interior of the lot in all residential zoning districts and all residential uses in all other zoning districts, except A 1 and A 2, shall be material other than dirt, grass or weeds. All residential type dwellings shall use no more than 50% of the front yard including terrace area for parking. All lots with more than one frontage (i.e., corner lots) shall conform to the above 50% requirement to be determined by front yard area as identified by street address. Existing hard surfaced parking areas exceeding 50% of the front yard area on 6 15 2006 shall be exempt from the 50% area limitation provided they comply herewith.

(1) Terrace.

(a) Parking or driveway surface shall only be on concrete or hot mix asphalt.

Parking or driveway surface shall be a minimum of five and one-half inches thick and shall include the intersecting sidewalks to the same depth.

(c) Parking or driveway surface shall have the curb ground or sawed out the entire parking or drive way width. Exception: when proposed parking is parallel to the curb and there are two approach or driveway curb inlet and outlet ramps.

Parking surfaces located in the terrace shall be large enough and shall be required to have a parking barrier to prevent vehicles from overhanging the curb or sidewalk. The minimum size of a parking stall surface shall be a nine-foot by 20-foot rectangle.

Terrace parking shall not interfere with the intersection site triangle of this code. (e)

Driveway surfaces shall include all of the terrace right of way from the street back of (f) curb to the property line.

Terrace parking and driveway surfaces shall be excavated a minimum of four inches (g) deeper than the surrounding terrain or unpaved surface.

(h) Parking or driveway surfaces at the back of curb line shall be excavated to the same depth as the abutting street depth a minimum of 12 inches wide the entire width of the parking surface or driveway.

Parking or driveway surfaces shall be placed on a minimum of two inches of com-(i) pacted sand or gravel material.

(b) All permanent parking lots shall be surfaced with one of the following minimum cross sections

- 1. Five inches of Class A portland cement concrete;
- 2 Six inches of asphaltic concrete:

3. Four inches of aggregate (i.e., crushed rock, crushed concrete, slag or other material that cannot be displaced or easily moved by storm water run off); and

Paving bricks or blocks, subject to approval of the city.

(5) Surfacing. The non permanent parking lot may be surfaced as approved by the city, and shall be maintained in a dust free condition. It should be noted that the above alternatives are designed only to serve as minimum standards. In situations where moderate to heavy truck loads are anticipated, the structural load capacity of the surfacing should be analyzed and designed accordingly. In such instances, a thicker or reinforced section may be desirable


