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

Ameritas challenges others in giving to United Way this year

Cold weather took its toll on the event last year, but this year the United Wayne Kickoff BBQ will take place in

August rather than October. "Chele (Misenbach) got with me about a month ago to get this started," said United Way President Mike Varley. "We moved it to August and that works for us so now we'll fundraise for the next year."

The United Way is unique in that nearly every penny of the dollar donated goes toward local non-profits. There aren't high overhead costs to be accounted for and the yearly dues are less than \$1,000 for the chapter, so more money is going toward the organizations in need of the funds rather than toward a salary or expenses of the United Way.

"What's raised here stays here," said Chele Misenbach, a manager at Ameritas. "If you want to write a check for \$50, I'd say about \$49.75 stays right here in the community."

"They come to us, pitch their ideas and tell us what they'd like, then we get together as a board and come up with a goal," Varley said.

Organizations can ask for as little as \$1,000 up to \$6,000 from United Way. The goal is set based on all the requests added up and from there a year of fundraising occurs before funds are dispersed in July.

"Last year our goal was \$31,900, this year I'm guessing will be \$34-\$35,000 since we added a new group."

And what are the charities that utilize United Way funding? There are 16 to be

It's a simple process for the charities wood Cemetery, Wayne Boy Scouts, Wayne Cub Scouts, Northeast Nebraska Community Action Partnership and the Wayne Community Theatre all benefitted from United Way funds last year.

> "One of the great things about it is that it would be hard to find someone in town not affected. There's kids, teachers. WEB, the Historical Society has been on the list before. It would be very hard to not include someone from the help United Way offers," Misenbach said.

> It's because of that inclusion that Ameritas has jumped head-first into fundraising and being an encourager to other businesses in the community to do

"It really started back with the t-shirts we had made after the tornado. We sold the shirts and gave the money directly to United Way who handled it all." Misenbach said of Ameritas' involvement with United Way. "We've always been a donor but we recommitted ourselves.'

Commissioners approve 2017 prelim requests from entities

In Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners, several tax requests were brought forth by entities across the county.

Carroll, Wayne, Hoskins, Winside and Wakefield's fire districts all submitted numbers to the board, as well as the ag society and the libraries.

The Hoskins Fire District was the only fire district not to request an increase in funding, but that comes thanks to the full payment of a bond issued for \$45,000 to help pay for much-needed equipment in years past.

Each of the other fire districts gave reasoning behind their increases, including future equipment purchases or bond prin-

cipal kicking in. The library requested no changes from last year's amount of \$13,000. That sum is divided amongst the three libraries in the

county in Wayne, Winside and Carroll.

While the Ag Society's request only moved up \$39.01, members of the Wayne County Fair Board were on hand to explain some of the future plans for the fair

cussed the need for a new grandstand, stating that the concrete issues were becoming more and more hazardous as the trees along the backside of the grandstand push further and further forward.

He also said that having more handicapaccessible seating was a major hindrance with the current set up as the space allotted when the structure was built is no lon-

ger sufficient. The current grandstand holds approximately 1,400 guests and the fair board is forced to rent portable bleachers to help im-

prove seating. With the new grandstand, over 2,300 people will have seating. The board hopes to cut back or eliminate the rentals all together. The new structure will be covered offering shade even with the trees being re-

moved and the berm taken out. Another big ticket item on the fair's todo comes from a growing attendance and climbing 4-H exhibit numbers.

The remedy for the numbers problem, Davis said, was to build a new facility on the grounds to house both the 4-H Food Stand and St. Mary's Food Stand. Pulling the food stand out of the 4-H building will free up a significant amount of space to be



LCC boys cross country should be competitive

With just about everybody back from last year, Laurel-Concord-Coleridge cross country coach Sue Brandow is optimistic about her teams' hopes for the upcoming season.

"We'll have a strong competitive boy's team this year," she said. "We were a pretty young team last year, so a year's growth and speed should

Talent and experience should make Blue Devils contenders once again

Wayne High softball coach Rob Sweetland had a lot of holes to fill from last year's state tournament softball team, but a mix of experience and solid young talent should make the Blue Devils a contender for its 15th trip to state in the 16-year history of the program.

Only four starters are back from a team that went 27-6 and advanced to the Class B state tournament last year, and seniors Jenna Trenhaile, Kennedy Maly and Jamie Gamble, along with junior Sidney Biggerstaff, will be the leaders for this year's squad.

"They're going to be our anchors and we'll put them where we need them the most," Sweetland said in a preseason interview. "We'll need to be sound up the middle, and that's where we're got them at right now."

Maly, who led the team last year with seven homers and 40 RBI's while batting .406, will move from left field to center. Trenhaile, a .432 batter last year with three homers and 52 runs scored, will come in from right field to help anchor the infield at shortstop.

Gamble, who hit .333 last year, will play first base and step in as a relief pitcher, while BIggerstaff will quarterback the infield from the catcher position, where she hit .370 with 33 RBI's a year ago. "We're looking at Jenna to come in and play

shortstop because she's a solid fielder with a great arm," Sweetland said of the move. "Kennedy will anchor the outfield for us and we have a lot of kids who have played and are ready to

One of Wayne's biggest questions is in the circle, but sophomore Tori Kniesche saw some action last season and will be counted on to carry the load at the pitching slot.

"She got some innings last year and pitched most of the JV games and has some varsity ex-

perience, so I think she's ready to go," Sweetland said. "Jamie has been working with Tori and will get some innings in those situations such as tournaments where we're playing 3-4 games in a day. We're confident Jamie can come in and eat some of those innings up."

Biggerstaff could also see time in the infield this season, depending on situations, which will open the door for junior Annie Kniesche to step in behind the plate when she's not in the infield. She hit the ball well last year, batting .368 with three homers and 35 RBI's, which will give Wayne another solid bat in the lineup.

Sweetland is also looking for juniors Abby Ankeny and Maysn Dorey to play key roles this season. Ankeny showed promise with the bat in the outfield over the summer, and Dorey can play a variety of positions and is one of the fastest runners on the team, meaning she could also be utilized as a pinch-runner.

WIth only 12 players on the roster, depth will be something of a concern for this year's team, Sweetland said.

"Obviously, everybody is going to get to play and we just need to keep an eye on how hard we're working them and make sure we keep everybody healthy," he said.

The Blue Devils open the season this week with a road trip to Blair before hosting their own Wayne Invitational on Saturday at the Summer Sports Complex. Add in a road doubleheader at O'Neill and the Lincoln Public Schools tournament at the end of the month, and it will provide a good barometer at where the team will be heading this season.

"Blair is a formidable opponent every year and it's a good test right away to see where we're at," Sweetland said. "We'll see defending Class B champion Elkhorn South, along with Fremont and Grand Island Northwest, at the Lincoln tournament, so we'll see where we stack up pretty early."

Wayne looks to be an early favorite in the Mid State Conference and in the district that will be played in Wisner in early October.

"I think a lot of schools (in the district) are like us in that they are Class C-type schools or co-ops that got pushed up into B, so it's a pretty level playing field for our district," he said. "But then whoever wins has to go to Hastings and play with schools whose enrollment is at 900 or so, so it will be tough to compete. I think our path to Hastings is reasonable and we've had success in Wisner before, and that's where we'll have to do it again."

Challenges and depth issues aside, Sweetland sees potential for success with this year's

"I really like our team," he said. "It comes down to playing well and if we can play well and execute, I think we can compete.'

New coaches look to keep Wayne cross country teams moving forward

Courtney Maas and Terry Beair are serving as cross country coaches this fall. Maas, who worked under retired coach Rocy Ruhl as an assistant for seven years, will lead the girls squad while Beair moves over from his job as head football coach to lead the boys team this year.

Both teams return some good talent from last year and have some good young runners that both coaches expect to contribute and improve this season.

For the girls, Maas will have four starters back from a team that finished fifth at last year's state meet, but doesn't have a lot in the way of depth "We only have eight runners and

only two seniors, so we are a young team," she said. "But these girls have put in a lot of miles over the summer to set a good foundation for the season."

Seniors Andrea Torres and Molly Hoskins will lead the Blue Devils girls squad, while two returning underclassmen starters in junior Gabi Meyer and sophomore Maddie Beair are also back.

Maas is seeing some good potential with some younger runners, including junior Madison Jenkins and freshmen Emily Chamberlain and Andi Belt.

Maas said the team has some big goals they hope to achieve this year, including another trip to the state meet in Kearney this October.

"They are looking for a successful season, placing in the top three in every meet and qualifying for state," she


The boys cross country team has two starters back from last season and a good group of young runners who should improve this season.

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

ing is reflection which occurs before, during, and following the project. They are able to reflect on the experience to discuss the "What", "So What", and "Now What". Youth are able to make the connections of the service project and how it will influence lifelong learning. Here are the five steps to implement a service learning project:

- · Assess and identify the need · Plan and prepare
- Experience meaningful service
- Analysis and evaluation



"It's important for people exposed to rabies and need preventhe 1920s. to be careful around bats and other wild animals like skunks, foxes, coyotes and raccoons or domestic stray animals like cats and dogs which are less likely to be vaccinated. These animals could potentially have rabies and transmit it to people.

Rabies is caused by a virus that affects the nervous system and is transmitted by the bite of an infected animal or if saliva from a rabid animal gets directly into an open wound or a person's eyes, nose, or mouth. Rabies is generally fatal without preventive treatment.

Help prevent the spread of rabies by following these recommendations:

 Be a responsible animal owner. Keep rabies vaccinations up-to-date for all dogs, cats, ferrets, and other animals you own.

· Seek immediate veterinary assistance for your pet if it's bitten by a wild animal or exposed to a

·Call your local animal control agency about removing stray animals in your neighborhood.

·Do not touch, feed, or unintentionally attract wild animals with open garbage cans or litter. Never adopt wild animals or bring them into your home. Do not try to nurse sick, wild animals to health. Call animal control or an animal rescue agency for assistance.

·Teach children never to handle unfamiliar animals, wild or domestic, even if they appear friendly. "Love your own, leave other animals alone" is a good principle for children to reduce the risk of contact with rabid animals

Maintain homes and other buildings so bats can't get inside.

If a bat is in your house, don't let it outside until you talk to animal control or public health officials. If you can do it without putting yourself at risk for physical contact or being bitten, try to cover the bat with a large can or bucket, and close the door to the room.



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

Candidates meet with community members in open interviews

Four qualified candidates sat before community members last Thursday to discuss their backgrounds and answer questions.

Each of the Wayne Area Economic Development (WAED) director candidates received a 30 minute time slot at The Majestic Theatre in a rotation that included tours of town and an executive interview in front of the

The candidates were given two questions that they could prepare for but the rest of the time would be taken by community questions. Former director Wes Blecke was on hand to moderate the interviews.

Garry Delano Clark, Jr. kicked things off at 10 a.m. giving a brief synopsis of his experiences before answering Blecke's first two questions.

"I think there's a combination of opportunities because of the location of Wayne to other communities. I think there is an opportunity for regionalism here. Wayne has the capacity and foundation to transform."

That transformation he spoke of was focused on becoming the hub for the area, pushing toward being a regional center and pooling resources from other communities to make things happen in the area.

Clark spoke on a youth program he had a hand in setting up called Bright Lights to help retain youth in the community and was asked to further expand on the program. The program, set up in his time at a county position, asked for four stu-

dents from each of the school districts in that county to participate in a 'shark tank"-like business pitch concept. From start to finish, the students were given real-world business experience including pitching the ideas to investors and presenting to an audience and receiving financial support. Among other things, Clark discussed how the growth of Wayne would

affect the area towns like Laurel and Wakefield, so if Wayne grows, those towns will also see a benefit from that. He stated that proximity was more important than a "turf war."

He also discussed building a strong relationship with Wayne State College and building upon the manufacturing capabilities in Wayne.

After Clark, an area native interviewed. Luke Virgil, Laurel's current economic development director, spoke of how Wayne has been a measur-

"Wayne has always been the 'big brother' to Laurel," Virgil said. "I've watched Wayne. I've seen its challenges and its successes."

Virgil underlined the stability the community has between its major institutions. He named education, financial, government and healthcare entities, calling them the "anchors" of the community. Virgil also discussed Wayne's progressive attitude and entrepreneurial spirit.

"Every town is proud of something they have and you build on those anchor institutions to create a hub.

He discussed opportunities Wayne has, including the property that once housed Pacific Coast Feather Company, stating that such things as a solar farm or an advanced manufacturing company have the ability to utilize that large piece of property.

Virgil discussed how there is a necessary level of trust between business owners and the director's position. He highlighted that last year Laurel saw 13 grand openings throughout the year and while the work of many was done heavily in 2015 and that he wasn't directly involved in each one, it was still an impressive feat to see that many new businesses open doors in such a relatively short time span.

Virgil stressed the importance of planning, stating that Laurel was moving forward to planning a community center thanks to a grant secured specifically for planning such large projects.

When asked about the biggest concern he has regarding economic development, Virgil answered with the volatility of ag commodities, commenting on the yo-yo effect the ag community deals with as prices rise and fall during each year and overall year-to-year.

The third candidate was Max Kathol, who touched on the importance of business retention including succession planning.

Kathol has served a number of communities, including Kearney in his career and in doing so had a considerable amount of experience in numerous situations, he told the audience.

One of those situations was handling a changing demographic and also how to push to make a city's main street or down town area a destination.

He discussed the demographic changing throughout the state, stating there is no short term plan to integrate other cultures into communities and continued with saying that any incoming demographic is looking for the same high quality of life as any other is.

Kathol also highlighted keeping a strong relationship between the city and Wayne State, and recalled an event he had helped plan to combine the destination downtown and college relationship in a previous location.

A street fair of sorts, the event offered vendors and business booths as well as a street dance to welcome new and returning college students to Businesses would have the opportunity to hand out applications for

open positions and vendors could sell their goods, everything from college apparel to massage gift certificates. The event, he claimed, would work He stressed the importance of thinking local first and also to define

Wayne. His slogan of 'Where's Wayne? What's Wayne? Why Wayne' was what he would like to see marketed in the community and further out to the region, but answering those questions would have to come first.

Rounding out the four candidates was Mark Buschkamp, the economic development director in Cherokee, Iowa.

Buschkamp, a WSC graduate, has previously served as both a city administrator and in economic development and had done his research on Wayne prior to the interviews.

His compiled data told him something that Wayne, like many other communities, is facing: a slowly declining population and lack of workforce.

He highlighted the need for skilled labor workers, not just Bachelor degree holders, in a community and said it starts at a junior and senior high school level. He discussed how students should be shown all options for career paths and also for entrepreneurship, and that it would be fostered throughout the community.

Buschkamp also discussed business retention, but he focused on how naving a place that people want to live is necessary for a business to be

House inspections and nuisance properties deteriorate the quality of the town, and it's easier in college towns for that to happen, but Buschkamp warned not to let slum lords hold rentals.

"It doesn't make friends but people want their town to look good," he said of nuisance properties

He had ideas on hosting small business workshops, educating on all facets of business from customer service to accounting, stating that the position requires helping the existing businesses in town to be successful.

Buschkamp touched on needing to address affordable housing in town and when asked, he said that his plan would be to work fairly closely with the city, meeting once a month or quarterly.

The board will select the candidate it sees fit in the near future.

Wayne resident sought in connection with burglary

The Stanton County Sheriff's office has arrested a 38 year-old Wayne man and his 28 year-old wife in connection to a residential burglary on several occasions at a rural farm place about 10 miles southeast of Stanton.

Jacob Mahnke faces charges of burglary and being a felon in possession of a firearm. He remains in custody at this time with a scheduled court appearance for next month. Kayla Salmons faces charges of aiding in the consumption of a felony and aiding and abetting a felon in possession of a firearm. They were arrested

earlier this month following an investigation in-

to the burglary by the Sheriff's office, with assistance from the Wayne Police Department.

A search warrant was served by the Sheriff's office at a rural Stanton residence two weeks ago. Seven stolen firearms and a stolen 4-wheeler were recovered. Several other stolen items have also been recovered at a Wayne res-

Stanton County arrest warrants were issued for two Wayne residents, Benton "Benny" Giffrow, 26, and Sawyer Giffrow, 22, in connection to their alleged involvement in the burglary and being felons in possession of firearms.

Benton "Benny" Giffrow, was apprehended on Saturday in Dixon, but Sawyer Giffrow remains at large.

Anyone with knowledge of Giffrow's whereabouts is asked to call the Stanton County Sheriff's office at (402) 439-2212 or their local law enforcement agency.

Additional charges and arrests are possible as the investigation continues into the loss of an estimated \$20,000 in guns and other personal property taken during the burglary. The residence belonged to a longtime area resident who had recently died.



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HEALTH & SAFETY CHECKLIST It's just about that time again: Time to switch from swimsuits to school clothes and from beach bags to backpacks. That's the easy part. What about preparing your child to have the

healthiest and safest school year possible? Here's a handy checklist to help. **1. Schedule medical, eye, and dental checkups.** Before school starts, check with the pediatrician to see if your child needs any immunizations. Vision and hearing tests are also a good idea, although schools perform hearing tests during certain grades. 1 If your child is playing sports, ask the pediatrician whether a special checkup is needed. With certain sports, concussions can be a serious problem. Talk to the doctor about ways to protect your child.²

2. Organize your child's medical history records. Provide copies to your child's school or daycare providers. I can help you pull some of this together, but the list should include your

Prescription medications

·Medical problems such as asthma or allergies ·Previous surgeries

Emergency contacts²

3. **Communicate about transportation.** Some kids get dropped up and picked up by parents. Others carpool. Still others walk, bike, or take the bus. And, of course, teens may have their own wheels. Regardless, it's important that your kids be—and feel—safe getting to and

 \cdot If you or another adult picks up your child, agree on a time and place for pickups. Explain what to do if the driver is running late.

·If your child walks or bikes, do a dry run and explain any potential traffic hazards.

·If your child or teen takes the bus, find a safe route and agree on a visible pick-up and dropoff spot. Ideally, this is a place where other kids are around and adults can clearly see them.

·If your teen drives to school, be crystal clear about safe driving—including ditching that teen temptation: texting while driving. Create an emergency plan in case anything goes awry. In fact, make sure your child knows

what to do in an emergency—whether at home or at school or anywhere in between.² **4. Remember that there's more to school than hitting the books.** For example,

good nutrition and exercise are essential for brain health. Here are a few other reminders:

·Be consistent about bedtime and wake-up times. Growing kids need at least 8 hours of sleep—and teens need even more. ·Make homework a habit by having clear routines. But don't overlook free time and friend

·Explain ways to prevent infection such as by regularly washing hands and by not sharing

hats or other clothing. That's one way lice get around! ·Keep lines of communication open. Listen for signs of bullying or other concerns. Many

parents find that car rides are a great time to have nonthreatening conversations with their kids. Contact the school if a problem like bullying does arise.^{3,4}



Council members first gave approval to change the traffic flow on West Third Street for an electronics recycling event.

Sandy Brown, representing the Wayne Green Team, asked for permission to make the street one-way, with traffic headed east, for a three hour time frame on Saturday, Sept. 23 for the event. She said this is the sixth an-

nual recycling event of this nature and last year the traffic was routed in one direction, making drop off much more ef-

Council members also gave their approval to a lease agreement between the City of Wayne and the Wayne Country Club. The agreement finalizes work that has been done by the Country Club and the city in recent

In a related item, the council approved a list of people to serve on the "Design-Build Selection Committee" for the Wayne Country Club Clubhouse remodel project. They include Joel Hansen, Jill Brodersen,

A block of 10th Street will be closed for several hours on Sunday, Sept. 10 as the result of a request by Grace Lutheran Church. The street will be closed from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. for the church's Sunday School Rally Day festival and meal. Affected will be the area from Main Street to Logan Street. This has been an annual request for several years.

Considerable time was spent discussing a Use by Exception request from State Nebraska Bank. The bank plans to expand its current drive-thru location at 1002 Main Street. Joel Hansen, City Planner,

told the council that the Planning Commission had approved the request. He noted that they did discuss the paving of the alley to the west of the bank. Council members questioned

who would pay for the paving and also discussed the location of the driveway into the bank.

Following considerable debate

on implications of the driveway being in a certain location, the council voted 7-0-1 to allow the use by exception. Council member Cale Giese abstained due to having property in the area.

Several items on the agenda involved work by the Northeast Nebraska Economic Development District (NNEDD) in regard to grant funds for several projects in the city.

Jan Merrill of the NNEDD explained the process her office has gone through in determining neighborhood needs in the city. Areas in the northwest, southwest and southeast quadrants of the city were identified as needing improvements and making curbs ADA accessible will be the first priority.

Council members voted to approve the final plats for Southview II Addition and Grace Acres Addition.

Also approved at Tuesday's meeting was bid alternate #3 for the Fourth Street Paving Project.

Council members debated the need to pave the street all the way to Centennial Road and how paving would affect the Wayne Rugby fields.

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, Sept. 5 at 5:30 p.m. in council

alerting the public that the first pool of mosquitoes testing positive for West Nile Virus (WNV) have been found within the health district of Cedar, Dixon, Thurston and Wayne Counties for the 2017 season. West Nile Virus is present in

northeast Nebraska. Prevent mosquito bites by

taking the proper precautions below: ·Apply a mosquito repellent

approved by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) whenever you go outdoors. This includes repellants with Deet, picardin, oil of eucalyptus, IR3535, and para-menthane-diol. Follow directions when applying repellent on children. Oil of lemon eucalyptus should NOT be used on children under 3 years of age. ·Wear long sleeves and

pants when outdoors to limit skin exposure: ·Remove standing water

where mosquitoes breed: birdbaths, old tires, clogged roof gutters or wading pools. · Vaccinate horses.

Mosquitoes are most active between dusk and dawn when the air is calm, but some will feed at any time of day.

Mild cases of West Nile Virus (WNV) infection may include a slight fever and/or headache. In some instances a skin rash and swollen lymph nodes are possible.

Severe cases include a rapid onset of a high fever, head and body aches, and usually occur 5 - 15 days after being bitten by a mosquito infected with WNV. Stiff neck, sleepiness,

disorientation, coma, tremors, convulsions and even paralysis are also potential symptoms.

Go to your doctor if you have these symptoms during mosquito season which starts in June and runs through September. Most cases of West Nile virus infection are mild and go unreported. ATTENTION: Persons at





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Written ag lease agreements are valuable

It is that time of year to remind our farm landowners and tenants about verbal or hand shake lease agreements. Some farm leases are not written, but are verbal or "handshake" agreements. Because nothing is in writing, the parties may have different recollections of their agreement, making lease disputes more difficult to resolve.

The most common legal issue associated with verbal farm leases is how a lease may legally be terminated. For both year-to-year leases and holdover leases, six months advance notice must be given to legally terminate the lease. However, the lease date (the date from which the six months is counted) is different. In contrast, the termination of a written lease is obviously determined in writing

For year-to-year oral leases, the Nebraska Supreme Court has ruled that the lease year begins March 1. Notice to a tenant to vacate under



ly referred to as a "notice to quit") must be given six months in advance of the end of the lease, or no

the lease year beginning March 1, have sample written lease forms 2017, and ending Feb. 28, 2018, notice from the landlord that the lease will be terminated would have to be given to (and received by) the tenant no later than Aug. 31, 2017. If, however, the notice to quit were given (or received) after Aug. 31, 2017, the existing tenant would have the lease until Feb. 28, 2019. It is recommended that the farm-

land lease be terminated by Registered Letter. This means that the person receiving the letter signs for it, therefore providing evidence that the termination notice was re-

Regardless of the type of lease (written, verbal, or even multiple year), it is best to have clear communications by all parties. By sending a termination notice before Aug. 31, even for written leases, you can avoid any miscommunication or pit-

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

Wayne Boy Scouts Isaac Davis, Nathan Kufner, Silas Mark, Zach Schenk and Ethan Sebade were among those attending the National Scout Jamboree recently.

They were accompanied by Wayne Adult Leader Stacy Schenk and Norfolk Scouts Laikon Ames, Riley Ingrebritson and Ryan Yost.

These scouters joined 12 other scouts and other three adult leaders from the Columbus/Schuyler area to form Jamboree Troop 2333 of the Mid America BSA Council.

The group departed for Omaha July 14 and flew out of Omaha for Washington D. C. on July 15.

They toured Washington D.C. from July 15- 18.

During this time they saw the U.S. Capitol, met with Congressman Adrian Smith, saw the Vietnam Memorial, Boy Scout Memorial, World War Memorials, Washington Monu-

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ment, Lincoln Memorial, Martin Luther King Jr. Monument, Franklin D. Roosevelt Memorial, Thomas Jefferson Memorial, Mount Vernon, Ford's Theater, International Spy Museum (did a mission there), Holocaust Museum, National Archives, Smithsonian American History Museum, Smithsonian Air and Space Museum and it's Annex, Kennedy Center, Pentagon 9/11 Memorial, Kennedy's grave site, Washington's grave site, Arlington Cemetery, Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, National Cathedral, Union Station, Library of Congress (Outside), Trump Tower (outside), and many of other sites from the streets of Washington

"We even shared our bus one night with a local Venturing Scout Crew from Omaha while traveling back to the hotel after touring. The two groups meshed as one as they ar-

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rived at the bus meeting point in a downpour, both singing "Singing in the rain." The camp songs, show tunes, and many other chants continued between the two groups on the drive back to the hotel we were all staying at while in Washington D. C. It was a memorable night," Stacy said.

On July 19 the group traveled by bus to the Summit Bechtel Reserve in Glen Jean, W.V. to where over 10,000 acres were available to explore and over 14,000 acres comprise the property. The scouts participated in the 2017 Boy Scout National Jamboree from July 19 - 28 with approximately 40,000 other individuals not only from the United States, but from around the world.

Adventures the scouts participated in were: zip lines, scuba diving, BMX bikes, mountain biking, skateboarding, rock climbing, rappelling, shooting shot guns/pistols/rifles, hiking, white water rafting on the New Gorge National River in the Appalachian Mountains, stand up paddle boarding, kayaking, fishing, and many other adventures.

"We crossed the Consol Energy Bridge (a triple walkway pedestrian suspension bridge) daily. We hiked up Grand Garden Mountain to the peak where it was dedicated that day as Mount Jack in honor of Jack Furst (who make the Summit experience possible with his vision). The Summit has an elevation difference of approximately 1,300 feet from its lowest to its highest point. The scouts hiked approximately 1,000 feet in elevation to reach the summit the day of the hike. At the top they also participated in activities such as the Spartan Challenge Race," Stacy

Throughout the week each troop at Jamboree participated in a Messengers of Peace Day of Service throughout the West Virginia/Vir-

ginia area. Troop 2333 members spent their day helping a local Community Center clean up the grounds where wedding receptions, family reunions, and other social events are held. The troop joined a troop from Florida in raking up decomposing leaves, pulling weeds, cutting limbs, pruning bushes, and removing old debris from the grounds. Approximately 220 projects were completed in 45 West Virginia counties for our Messengers of Peace day of service. It was a way for the Scouts to give back to those in the area of the Jamboree event.

The Scouts had an opportunity, if they chose, to see President Trump speak. Some also helped set a world record for the most dreidels spun at once. They also enjoyed several concerts, shows, and an amazing fireworks display for the closing cer-

The Scouts also had the opportunity to trade patches, scarves, Boy Scout leadership trading cards, and other mementos with scouts from across the nation and across the world.

Some of the trades made were with Scouts from California, Ohio, New York, Aruba, Philippines, Puerto Rico, and many, many other locations.

"Many of the scouts are proud of their collections and would be happy to share the stories of how they obtained them and who they traded with," Stacy said.

The tour bus returned to Washington D. C. on July 28 and then the group flew back to Omaha.
