

Renovations finished, doors open at Wayne State's Conn Library

After years of planning and eventually breaking ground on the project, Conn Library on Wayne State College's campus is finished and ready for the 2017-2018 year.

While the student center stays busy, Conn Library has the reputation on campus of being the hub. It's where the resources are, it's where study space is available and it's where the coffee flows.

"Being the hub of campus is especially true at night," Conn Library Director Dave Graber said. "The student center quiets after supper but this place picks up steam about 6:30 to 7 o'clock at night. I feel like we hit our peak about 8 o'clock."

With those things, and many others, in mind, planning began on the complete overhaul of the facility a decade ago. While the original building dates back to the '50s, since the addition in the '70's, it hadn't seen much for changes, which meant materials used and the layout no longer functioned the way they should.

The complete renovation allowed for much needed updates both to the building's infrastructure -- the technology used now for everyday life requires a lot more outlets than it used to -- and to the design of the space.

"It's areally a social gathering point as well as being a study point, and we had to incorporate that in the space. We try to provide all the amenities students want. Historically this acted more as a warehouse -- that's the way it was designed in 1970. And most libraries, ourselves included, are trying to move away from that warehouse design."

That meant rethinking the entire building, moving more toward open spaces with a significant amount of seating and private study rooms of all sizes. It meant relocating the Nordstrand Visual Arts Gallery and designating more space to Jitters and Red Mango. The design added floor to ceiling windows, allowing much needed natural light in.

Because of the magnitude of the renovation, the college decided doing it in four phases would be in the best interest of the students and the staff of the library. But phase renovations mean moving. Moving of people, of offices, of items. Some of those moves were brief, while others weren't.

"We have everyone back in place at this point. We had people who had to leave the building temporarily, Eddie (Elfers) and Jennifer (Johnson) with the technology center had to move over to Connell Hall for three years. Marcus Schlichter our archivist moved out for three years."

Last year the event provided breast cancer awareness, education and support, as well as a fun evening out, for over 300 people in northeast Nebraska.





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






The plans I have for you

an article for our church newsletter on a pretty familiar Bible passage and since it has still been weighing heavily on my mind, I want to share some thoughts.

You see, my wife and I have been having to make some hard decisions here lately and through the course of it we have asked ourselves numerous times ... "God, what do you have in store for us? What is it that you want us to do?" Now I know we are not the only one asking this question. It's a pretty common one.

Well as I was thinking about this question again in my office, my attention was drawn again to a wall hanging which I have above one of my bookcases. I happened to look up at it because it was just over the edge of my coffee cup that I was drinking from. The familiar verse on it is from Jeremiah 29:11 which says, "I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." This passage is a common one, it is a reassuring one, but ... it is also one of the most misquoted passages within the Bible.

Usually when people use this passage it is to uplift themselves



when they have lost a job, are in the midst of a tragedy, or find something else hard happening in their life and they want a way out, they want hope. So when people turn to this passage, it is often taken as, 'God has a plan for me and He is going to make everything okay and will eventually bless me and make me prosper." If that is how the passage is taken and understood ... then it is being taken wrongly, it is being understood wrongly because that is not what God is saying.

In this passage, Jeremiah is writing a letter to the Israelites who were kicked out of their homes and are currently exiled in Babylon. The point of this letter is to tell them what God says. Right before this most popular verse God

exile for seventy years. Did you catch that? They will be in exile for seventy years, a definite set time. When those years are complete, God will visit His people, fulfill the promise He made to them, and bring them back to Jerusalem. It is when they are back in Jerusalem when God will bless His people and they will seek Him out. Their blessing will be physical but more than that, their blessing will be spiritual.

When I reflect on my life, I see many times where God has blessed me. But I also see many times of hardship and pain. I know that God has not left me, I know that God is with me wherever it is I go. I have my baptism to look back on and I

have His holy Word which tells me that too. Do I know what the future holds for me or my family? No. But I know these words from Job hold true for me, I know that "my Redeemer lives, and at the last he will stand upon the earth. And after my skin has been thus destroyed, yet in my flesh I shall see God" (Job 19:25-26). It is then, it is when I am standing before my Redeemer, before Christ, the plan God has for me will be revealed. It is then when I am standing before my Savior on the last day that God's plans to prosper me will come true. And that same promise is true for you

Going back to my original question, "What does God have in store for me?" Here's the answer. God has in store for me His grace, His love, His mercy, His forgiveness, and His eternal presence.

All these are given to me freely by the love He has for me shown through Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. Through these, God gives me comfort and strength to meet the days ahead knowing that someday I will stand before my Redeemer in my flesh and will prosper in His eternal plans. All this He also freely gives to you!

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





State Fair, soybean diseases discussed



I have attended the state fair in Grand Island the last few years and it has been a great experience. It's almost hard to believe that this is the eighth year already for the fair to be held in Grand Island.

This year I will be helping with the Entomology identification contest and the swine show. I will also be at the Raising Nebraska building to help people become more aware of the resistance issues we have in agriculture. I hope you will be able to attend sometime this coming week, as the fair runs from Friday, Aug. 25 through Labor Day.

The fairgrounds are well laid out with large livestock buildings close to each other and with an air conditioned main arena. The 4H/FFA exhibit building is on the north end of the grounds — it is large and is air conditioned. There are many more exhibits in the 4H/FFA building every year, including commercial exhibits.

If you haven't been there in the last few years, there are a lot more food stands available, and a large midway with plenty of rides means there really is something for everyone. There is also entertainment scattered throughout the fairgrounds every day.

The University now has a perma-you will see small pockets of dead or nent year-round exhibit called Raising Nebraska. It is a great area where lots of information and interactive exhibits highlight the importance of agriculture to the state of Nebraska.

I recommend the birthing area near the livestock arena to people who don't understand where animals come from; kids will love seeing the new born animals there. If you are lucky, you may witness the birth of a calf, lamb or piglet.

There is a really good lineup of evening concerts and shows available and of course all the 4-H exhibits will be there for everyone to see.

We have seen some soybean diseases in the area. The main culprits are white mold (sclerotinia), phytopthora root and stem rot, brown stem rot, and a little bit of sudden death syndrome (SDS). Most of the samples brought in appear to be phytophthora.

Many of these diseases have similar symptoms in the beginning. Usually

dying plants, or dead leaves on some plants that slowly spread. The diseases differentiate a bit and to tell the difference, you often need to split or observe the stem at ground level and above. SDS is fairly easy to recognize because the leaf symptoms are fairly dramatic although sometimes it is mistaken for brown stem rot.

White mold infested plants usually have black sclerotia embedded in the stem. Go to cropwatch.unl.edu for more information on how to diagnose soybean diseases. The best way to manage diseases is

to select resistant varieties. These diseases infect plants fairly early in the season and often don't show symptoms until later in the year.

This makes it hard to determine if a fungicide is necessary. Once diseases are established in the plant there is rarely a cure. So scout and determine which diseases are present, and use the information when you select your varieties in the future.

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NSF grant to boost graduate education in ag resilience

The University of Nebraska–Lincoln has earned a five-year, \$3 million National Science Foundation Research Traineeship award to launch an interdisciplinary graduate training program focused on understanding resilience and vulnerability in agricultural landscapes.

The goal of the program is to help students and professionals make informed decisions about how to best use limited natural resources as global demands for food, energy and water increase. About 20 trainees will study resilience in the Platte River Basin, where agricultural systems are among the most efficient and productive in the world. But this success — and the economic livelihood of many Nebraskans — is threatened by water shortages, demographic shifts, climate

variability and changing land use patterns. Because landscapes worldwide face similar challenges, a better understanding of how systems respond to these stresses, and how to bolster their resilience, is key to enhancing food security for a global population that is expected to grow from 7.5 billion today to more than 9.6 billion by 2050. The new training program will be led by Craig Allen, a research professor and director of the

Nebraska Cooperative Fish and Wildlife Research Unit. "The basin is an area of tremendous agricultural innovation," Allen said. "Understanding the resilience of that system should help us maintain it for the long term and replicate it globally to help ensure local and global food security."

Nebraska's research traineeship program is one of the nation's first to fully embrace panarchy theory, a social-ecological approach focused on scale-specific distribution of functions in a system. The theory accounts for situations where small-scale events may have systemwide impacts — for example, tiny insects causing forest dieback.

"Our approach is innovative because it exposes students to cutting-edge theories of panarchy and resilience, teams students with professionals and links seemingly disparate disciplines," Allen said.

Nebraska is one of 17 institutions to receive the NSF research traineeship award this year. The awards support development of transformative models of graduate education in science, technology, engineering and mathematics. The program funds graduate student training that includes international and professional components and is focused on preparing students to meet changing workforce and research needs.

The Nebraska graduate training program, to be housed in the School of Natural Resources, combines research on agricultural resilience and food, energy and water systems. The curriculum bridges the university's existing graduate programs in water and agricultural sciences, aiming to lay the foundation for a permanent graduate program at Nebraska focused on resilience.

The international training taps into an existing collaboration between the university and the IHE Delft Institute for Water Education in the Netherlands. Students will learn field, measurement and laboratory skills in an environment with Nebraska-like river systems but different climate, economic and social factors.

The first cohort of students is expected to begin training in January 2018.



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
