Luke Virgil will lead WAED as new director

Out of an original pool of five applicants, Luke Virgil was selected to succeed Wes Blecke in the director's position at Wayne Area Economic Development (WAED).

Virgil, the current Economic Development Director at Laurel, was offered the position last week.

"We made the offer last week," said WAED board president Matt Ley. "He talked it over with his family and accepted. It always takes longer than you think it will."

Ley spoke on the "unbelievably qualified" applicants the hiring committee had to choose from.

One applicant dropped out just before the community interviews took place on Aug. 10, however the remaining four proved to be difficult to choose between.

"The hiring board was made of six people but we had many people chime in and help us," Ley said.

"Wes and Irene have already reached out," Virgil said. "They are committed to helping with my transition. Matt has offered us some leeway as a family to get settled into Wayne as well."

In his community interview, Virgil spoke on the level of trust required between his position and the area business owners and he underlined the stability that Wayne's community has with what he called "anchor institutions" such as Wayne State College, Providence Medical Center and the number of solid banking options here.

School store moves to Thrift Warehouse for convenience

Many folks flocked to the school store at Christmas time, and various sports kick off nights, but not having a consistent place with hours each week to view and purchase Wayne High School apparel and school spirit items was often inconvenient.

"The school store was open only a few times a year in years past," said Wayne Community Schools Superintendent Mark Lenihan. "We talked about it last year with Lukas and Mark and they approached the school with the idea. They were willing to have it at their location for more visibility and convenience."

Lenihan explained that the school apparel is sold at Thrift Warehouse, but that the majority of the proceeds go

back to the school. "We do reimburse them a percentage to cover their costs at Thrift Warehouse, like the credit card fee they are charged and their employees doing the work," Lenihan

Having sold close to 150 items over the summer made this fall look promising.

"We're doing this to help the community, to make things more convenient for people," Rix said. "We did really well over Chicken Days weekend with the alumni in town."

Lenihan commented that sales over the summer were a first, and that everyone was optimistic looking forward. Currently, Thrift Warehouse is handling all sales and storing the inventory, which is a considerable amount of items according to Lenihan.

The hope is to include the school store with the business classes offered at Wayne High School.

"The plan is to have the business classes and somewhat the athletic department have a hand in ordering and make it part of their learning experience," Lenihan said. "The school is benefitting, not only financially, but also educationally."

As inventory moves out, new items will be added with the idea of keeping costs low.

"We were looking for a better way to market the apparel and items we had and we thought this was a good option," Lenihan said. "It gives more opportunity to purchase items because they are available any time Thrift Warehouse is

A number of instructors from Wayne State College were on hand to share their expertise in various areas such as rocks and fossils and using a telescope.



Technology upgrades take place at St. Mary's Elementary School

tary School in Wayne are benefiting from an Ignite the Faith grant received by the school from the Archdiocese of Omaha.

During the summer the infrastructure at the school was upgraded to allow for more consistent wireless internet service. The upgrades will allow students to all be on devices at the same time.

In addition, the grant allowed for the purchase of 20 new Chromebooks and 24 new iPads. New projectors, screens, speakers, and document cameras have been installed in each classroom.

The technology grant has totaled \$74,000.

The school received another grant of nearly \$10,000 to purchase books and materials to implement a Blended Literacy program which includes Guided Reading. This program is part of a balanced literacy program and teachers have been able to attend professional development classes

Students at St. Mary's Elemento assist in implementing it.

Books and other materials were purchased with the grant money for the program which blends phonics and literature in learning. "The main focus of all the up-

grades is for individualized learning. We want to be able to meet the students where they are and help them with their learning,' said Stacy Uttecht, Principal at St. Mary's Catholic School.

"The projectors in each classroom will be used as teaching tools in various ways and allow our teachers to expand our learning beyond the four walls of the building," Uttecht said.

As part of the upgrades at the school, several of the classroom teachers switched rooms and painting was done in both the classrooms and hallways.

"Here at St. Mary's, we feel that doing right for the students is the right thing to do," Uttecht said.

"Dr. Chipps understands the mission that a trained workforce is necessary to sustain and grow this region in order for it to survive," Nelson said. "He is pointing Northeast in a direction to do its part to contribute to the economic development dynamic of its 20-county service area and beyond. Under Dr. Chipps' direction, Northeast Community College is not only positioning itself as a leader both within the region and state, but also as a shining example of what community colleges nationwide can aspire to be-

Chipps has served Nebraska's community colleges for 37-years; the past five as president of Northeast.

He holds a Doctorate of Philosophy Degree from the University of Nebraska at Lincoln in Educational Administration, Curriculum and Instruction with a Specialization in Management of Colleges and Universities.

Chipps completed a counseling internship at the Nebraska Psychiatric Institute at the University of Nebraska Medical Center in Omaha and holds a Master of

Science in Education Degree with a Specialization in Counseling from the University of Nebraska at Kearney.

He also holds a Bachelor of Science in Education Degree with a major in Sociology and minor in Psychology from the University of Nebraska at Kearney. Chipps also served 21 years in the United States Army Reserve and retired as a Major in 1995.

As ACCT's Western Region CEO, Chipps and the four other regional award recipients will contend for national-level recognition with the 2017 Marie Y. Martin Chief Executive Officer Award.

The award will be presented during the 48th Annual ACCT Leadership Congress in Las Vegas in September.

This is the second ACCT regional award that has been presented to a representative of Northeast Community College in the past three-years.

The late John Davies of Pilger was recognized with the ACCT Western Region Trustee Leadership Award in 2015.



Blue Devils debut with road upset over Scotus

COLUMBUS — Preparing to open the and Mason Lee followed by finishing off a season against a ranked opponent turned out to be a lot of fun for the Wayne High

First-year coach Russ Plager got his first win as the Blue Devils' mentor with an exciting finish as the Blue Devils pulled off an upset on the road, hanging on for a 43-33 shootout win over preseason-No. 6 Columbus Scotus in the 2017 debut for both teams Friday at Pawnee Park.

"It was a lot of fun," the coach said after Wayne's first win over a ranked opponent in several years. "It was great to see the kids put in a lot of work (in the preseason) and see the results of that hard work. It was exciting to see them enjoy the fruits of

Wayne never trailed in avenging last year's season-opening loss to the Shamrocks, opening the game with a one-yard touchdown run by Casey Koenig on the Blue Devils' opening drive.

Scotus answered with an eight-yard pass from Caden Pelan to Tyler Palmer to tie the game, but Wayne took the lead for good with a pair of long touchdown plays. Juan Vergara broke the tie with a 77-yard sprint, 72-yard pitch-and-catch from Beau Bowers to give Wayne a 19-7 advantage.

Scotus pulled within six on Pelan's second scoring pass, a 12-yarder to Dalton Borchers, but Vergara closed the half with a 30-yard field goal to give Wayne a 22-13 halftime advantage.

"It was huge to get that first touchdown," Plager said of Wayne's start. "We wanted the ball when we won the coin flip and wanted to put the ball in our offense's hands, and we had a couple of big plays and were able to run the ball well.

While the offense played well in the opening half, Wayne's special teams helped put Scotus in a deeper hole early in the second half when Lee returned a Shamrocks punt 80 yards to make it a 29-13 lead, Wayne's biggest of the night.

Scotus would not go away, however. They scored early in the fourth quarter on a five-yard run to make it 29-20, and after Bowers connected with Ryan Jaixen on a 34-yard pass to put the lead back to 16 points, the Shamrocks answered with two quick scores to get the deficit down to three

"The kids really reacted well," Plager said of Scotus' comeback attempt. "We had talked about handling adversity and there were no negative vibes at all after Scotus got within three. The kids encouraged each other and then we popped off that big run and that was the difference."

The big run came on Wayne's next play, as Vergara went over the 200-yard night with his second long run of the game, an 80-yarder with less than three minutes to go that put the game out of reach.

Wayne's offense racked up 494 yards in total offense, with Vergara accounting for 223 yards on 19 carries with two scores, and Bowers going 10-of-17 for 197 yards and two touchdowns.

"It was a very good game for our offense," Plager said. "Coach (Adam) Hoffman did a great job calling the game on offense. Juan isn't a big kid, but he ran so hard and our line played well and (Bowers) connected with our receivers on some big plays. I can't say enough about what they did."

Bowers also accounted for 67 yards on 10 carries in the win. Lee caught four passes for 93 yards. Jaixen had three catches for 55 yards and Brennen O'Reilly accounted

Defensively, O'Reilly and Garrett Schafer each had six tackles, Vergara and Justin Dean each had five and Koenig and Drew Buck each had four to lead the de-

The win vaulted Wayne into the Class C-1 Top 10 in both the Lincoln Journal Star and Omaha World-Herald rankings this week, which makes Friday's 7 p.m. home opener with Boone Central/Newman Grove a rare matchup of ranked teams at Memorial Stadium, as the 1-0 Cardinals enter the game ranked sixth in the Lincoln paper and ninth in the Omaha rankings.

"It's one game at a time for us, so we'll work this week to get better and correct the mistakes we see on film," Plager said. 

Wildcats get season started right with 40-20 win

WINSIDE — Winside may be outmanned this season, but they proved to be the better team in their 2017 season opener.

Winside scored on the first play of the game and broke a 20-20 tie in the second half with three unanswered touchdowns to come away with a 40-20 win over Elkhorn Valley in the first game of the season for both teams Thursday at Winch Memorial Field.

The Wildcats wasted no time getting on the board, as Brandon Watters found Koby Ellis for a 26-yard touchdown pass to give the hosts the

Elkhorn Valley came back to tie the game, but Winside scored a pair of touchdowns to take the lead for good. Watters hit Colton Jensen on a five-vard score, and the duo hooked up again on a 10-yard strike that made it 20-6. Elkhorn Valley scored late in the first half and

scored again midway through the third quarter

to tie the game at 20-20, but Winside answered quickly when Watters hit William Bullard for a 36-yard scoring strike to make it 26-20.

Winside extended their lead to 14 early in the fourth when Watters called his own number on a three-yard plunge with 8:44 to go, and the defense finished off the night when Bullard recovered a fumble and took it to the house in the final minute.

Winside had 332 yards in total offense, led by the passing of Watters, who completed 14-of-21 passes for 194 yards and four touchdowns. He also rushed for 128 yards on 24 carries with an-

Ellis was the Wildcats' leading receiver with 82 yards on seven catches, adding three yards on five rushes. Jensen caught four balls for 35 yards, Bullard had two catches for 66 yards and Matthew Frederick caught one pass for 11 yards and had seven yards on six carries.

Defensively, Watters led the way with 22 total tackles, with Michael Jensen adding seven and Frederick and Colton Jensen each adding 6.5 stops. Bullard had six, Ellis had four and Dominic Reed added one.

Wildcat football returns experienced lineup

With one of the most experienced returning lineups coming back in the Northern Sun Conference this season, 13th-year Wayne State College football coach Dan McLaughlin is looking for the Wildcats to improve on last year's records of 3-8 overall and 2-5 in the NSIC South

With just five seniors on last year's roster, Wayne State returns 17 starters this season, tied with Augustana and Concordia-St. Paul for the most returning starters of any school in the 16-team Northern Sun Intercollegiate Confer-

McLaughlin, who is Wayne State's all-time wins leader with a 66-68 (.493) overall mark and 62-57 record (.521) in NSIC games, hopes that returning experience gets the Wildcats back over the .500 mark for the first time since 2012.

"It's comforting having all that experience returning, especially with all the new coaches (six) we have on our staff this season," remarked McLaughlin. "That will be an interesting dynamic - how are new coaches work with all of our returners – and I'm looking forward to see

The Wildcats bring back nine starters on offense and eight on defense along with a loaded special teams unit that brings back an All-NSIC South Division punter and one of the top three placekickers in the league last season.

WSC returns a three-year starter at quarterback, the top three rushers and top four receivers from last season on offense. Last year's top tackler, All-NSIC South Division and second-team Super Region 3 defensive back Cam Montgomery, graduated, but the Wildcats bring back a solid group of returners that has Coach McLaughlin excited for this season.

Headlining the returners on offense is senior quarterback Zach Osborn. The Harlan, Iowa native threw for 25 TD's and 2,666 yards last season and is on track to break many of Silas Fluellen's school records this season. Osborn completed 224 of 405 passes (55.3 percent) last season and ranked sixth in the NSIC last season in total offense per game (279.6) and ninth in passing yards per game (242.4). He also ranked second on the team in rushing last season with 410 yards on the ground.

McLaughlin sees a spirited battle for the

backup spots at quarterback with three players battling for the second and third positions on the depth chart.

Junior Taylor Reedy started seven games two years ago and is coming off a solid spring along with sophomore Aaron Bleil, McLaughlin is also curious to see what true freshman Brady Bransfield brings to the mix in fall practice.

At running back, Wayne State returns its top two rushers in seniors Rashad Trimble and Arelious Burns. Trimble accounted for a team-high 610 yards last season on 139 carries, averaging 4.4 yards per attempt with three 100-yard games. Burns added another 321 yards in nine games, averaging 3.5 yards per attempt.

McLaughlin sees true freshmen Maliki Wilson and Cole Deskin as players who will also contend for carries in the backfield this season. Wayne State's new offense this season hopes to utilize the fullback and tight end position more as junior Houston Huss returns at fullback. Nick Tarney is expected to contend for fullback playing time also this season.

Laurel senior Justin Saunders is the top returner at tight end. Stuart redshirt freshman Conner Paxton is coming off a great spring and was named the Scout Team Offensive Player of the Year last year. The Wildcats are talented at the wide receiver position with the top four returning from last season.

Senior Nate Rogers is the team's go-to receiver after hauling in a team-high 56 catches last season for 740 yards and single season schoolrecord tying 12 touchdowns. Junior Shymere Williams had a tremendous sophomore campaign and was the Wildcats' big play receiver with 41 grabs for 687 yards and 5 TD's, averaging a team-high 16.8 yards per reception.

Sophomore Willie Walton added 24 receptions for 231 yards as a true freshman last year while sophomore Sam Wegner produced 21 receptions for 244 vards last season as a redshirt freshman.

The offensive line features four returners from last season, led by junior left tackle Mike Milenkovich, an All-NSIC South honorable mention honoree last season that McLaughlin called "as good as we've had since I've been at WSC". Senior DaQuan Samuel made a successful switch last year from defensive to offense and returns as the team's starting right tackle.

Senior Kevin Camacho started at center last year, but missed spring drills. Juniors Austin Gubbels and Austin Pelc both had great springs and will battle for the starting center spot along with Camacho.

Junior Tyler Garrett made nine starts last year at right guard. Sophomore Marquise Jones (6-2, 375) appeared in eight games and made a pair of starts last year at guard as well. McLaughlin sees a great battle for the guard spots at 6-6, 300 pound junior Trevor Carstens moved from the defensive line to offense and had a strong spring. True freshmen Garrett Richter, Dallan Taylor and Nick Gray are also expected to contend for playing time at the guard positions.

McLaughlin sees Wayne State's punter and placekicker as the best in the league. Junior Cody Netusil was All-NSIC South Division First Team last year after ranking second in the NSIC with an average of 40.5 yards per punt. Younger brother Chase, named Iowa Class 2A first-team All-State punter as a senior last fall, averaged 41 yards per punt and will provide a friendly, family battle for the punting position.

Sophomore Ethan Knudson had a stellar freshman season for the Wildcats, making 9 of 12 field goals and 31 of 35 PAT kicks last season. His nine field goals ranked third in the NSIC

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Cleary looking for success in first season as Wayne State College soccer coach

The Wayne State women's soccer team has made significant improvement in the last two years, but the team hopes to accomplish even more under new head coach Joe Cleary in 2017. Cleary has served as an assistant the past two seasons, helping

Wayne State go from 4-11-3 in 2015 to a 9-6-3 record last season. It was the most wins for a Wildcat women's soccer team since 2006 and they were just one tiebreaker away from reaching the NSIC tournament for the first time in a decade.

Cleary says he sees just a small transition for the team with him going from assistant coach to head coach this season.

Wayne State's 23-player roster this season has just two seniors. "We return not only talent but also players that have experience," added Cleary. "Maybe in the past we didn't have players that had been in situations of must-win games that had playoff implications, but now



Wayne State volleyball team made of young players for 2017

For the 11th time in 12 years under head coach Scott Kneifl, the Wayne State volleyball team advanced to the NCAA Div. II National Tournament while playing in arguably the toughest conference (Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference) and region (NCAA Central Region) in NCAA Div. II volleyball.

For the Wildcats to make it back to NCAA post season play this year, they will have to do it with one of its youngest ever rosters.

Wayne State was 24-8 last season and finished sixth in the rugged NSIC with a 14-6 league mark. Gone from last year's team are four-time first-team All-NSIC selection Alyssa Frauendorfer (career leader in hitting percentage), second-team All-NSIC outside hitter Michaela Mestl (career leader in service aces and third in career digs) and middle hitter Alex Opperman, who ranked third last season in the NSIC in blocks per set (1.09). This year's Wildcat roster of 17

players features just two seniors, three juniors and four sophomores with one redshirt freshman and seven true freshmen.

"To say we are young is an un-

derstatement," said Kneifl, who is Wayne State's all-time winningest coach with a 303-103 record (.746) entering his 13th year as head coach of the Wildcats. "We are young, but talented, and we are excited to get this group together to see what they can accomplish."

Leadership for this year's team will come from seniors Erin Gross and Bree Ackermann. Gross was a second-team All-NSIC selection for WSC last season after averaging 2.50 kills and 0.75 blocks per set with a .288 attack percentage.

"Erin had a breakout junior season and has worked extremely hard in the offseason," commented Kneifl. "She will be a go-to player this season for us as we look for her to have a great year.'

Ackermann played a significant role last season as a defensive specialist, averaging 1.56 digs per set while tied for second on the team in service aces with 31.

"Bree's serve has been as consistent and as good as any we've had here at Wayne State," Kneifl remarked. "The young players will be able to learn a lot from her as she has played in some of the biggest

matches you can play in. She will be a great leader for us this sea-

A trio of juniors on this year's team is led by setter Megan Gebhardt, who ranked ninth in the NSIC in assists per set last season at 10.13. She also averaged 1.97 digs and 0.43 blocks per set. "Megan had a great year for us

last season and we are hoping for more of the same," said Kneifl. "She is an extremely athletic setter whose decision making will only continue to get better as the season

Rounding out the junior class are middle hitter Maria Wortmann and defensive specialist Payton Ruhl. "We are looking for Maria to step

up and fill the void of missing both middles off last year's team," boasted Kneifl. "She had a great offseason on the court and in the weight room and we believe she is ready to make a difference on the court."

Kneifl added, "Payton was one of our most improved players last season. She has a great serve that we are hoping we can utilize this season."

Sophomores Haley Kauth and

Tarrin Beller were significant contributors last season, and Kneifl expects the two players to play key roles on the success of this year's team. Kauth, a libero, ranked ninth in the NSIC in digs per set last season at 4.17 while Beller started 13 matches at the end of the season and accounted for 1.53 kills and 1.48 digs per set.

"Haley had a great season last year and we look for another great season," stated Kneifl. "She is as consistent of a serve receiver as we have had here and her defense continues to improve." Kneifl said Beller is the player

with the most experience returning at the outside hitter position for the Wildcats.

Other sophomores on the Wildcat roster include setter and defensive specialist Morgan Alexander and outside hitter Katie Stephens, who averaged 1.90 digs per set in 16 matches as a back row specialist last season. Rounding out this year's team

are redshirt freshman Jaci Brahmer and seven true freshmen who will give Kneifl his biggest roster in years. Brahmer will contend for

playing time at middle hitter. The freshmen class of seven is

Coach Kneifl's biggest recruiting class ever. They include 5-foot-10 outside hitter Alyssa Ballenger, 6-foot-1 rightside hitter Allison Timmermans, 5-foot-9 setter Hope Carter, 5-foot-8 defensive specialist Jacee Weber, 6-foot-1 middle hitter Maddie Knobbe, 5-foot-9 defensive specialist Maddie Duffy and 5-foot-10 outside hitter/middle hitter Elise Zajicek.

This year's Wildcat team will be much different than past teams according to Kneifl. "We are much bigger so we are

looking to attack at a high percentage and block well at the net. The serve receive and ball control aspect is going to be the key to this season. If we are able to have multiple options when attacking we will be hard to stop at the net.' Playing in the Northern Sun

Conference that has produced the Div. II national champion eight of the past 10 years, Wayne State faces a challenging regular-season schedule combined with two challenging non-conference tournaments in Colorado to open the sea-

"We are playing some Top 25 teams and conference powers early in the season which will hopefully prepare us for our brutal conference schedule," remarked Kneifl. "We want to push this group early to see what we need to work on so we can continue to get better."

Wayne State was picked to finish sixth in the preseason NSIC Volleyball Coaches' Poll on Aug. 3. The Wildcats were also ranked 13th in the AVCA Preseason Div. II Top 25 Coaches' Poll released on Aug. 14, marking the 103rd consecutive national ranking for the Wildcat program dating back to September,

The NSIC features six of the Top 13 teams in the country and seven teams ranked in the Top 25 while 11 teams from the NCAA Central Region are ranked in the Top 25 to start the season.

Wayne State opens the 2017 season on Friday, Sept. 1 at the Colorado School of Mines Oredigger Classic, facing Rollins (Fla.) in the opener. The Wildcats play 11 games at home in Rice Auditorium, where WSC has ranked in the top 10 in NCAA Div. II home attendance for eight straight years. WSC battles Sioux Falls in the home opener on Thursday, Sept. 14 against Sioux

Kneifl says the goal for this season is the same as previous ones.

"We want to become the best volleyball team we can become in the time we have together. With this young squad there will be a lot of teaching going on. We are excited for this group and we feel we have the capability of being a very good team by the end of the season."

Almost all high maintenance coolseason lawns do well with fall fertilization as well as broadleaf weed control, and many slightly thinned lawns can be improved during this time. September is the most important time to encourage rooting for next year and increasing density this fall. In our area fertilizing can take place at any time from here on at a rate of 1.0 lb. nitrogen per 1000 square ft of lawn. Most fertilizers are found in bags with a ration similar to 24-6-12 (Nitrogen-Phosphorous-Potassium) or 20-0-10 and this will be fine.

Local fertilizer dealers will have other combination-, some that include iron which may help with the yellowing of the grass. Follow the directions on the label. A second application at or just after the last mowing, while the turf is still green will really help. You can even much with lawns in the fall other proving Turf in the Fall. This can be if your lawn was especially thin.

An application from mid-September to mid-October of a broadleaf herbicide with 2 or more active ingredients (such as 2,4 D and dicamba) will control most common weeds like dandelions, plantain, and black medic, among others. 



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
Focus your life on peace
