Luke Virgil will lead WAED as new director

Out of an original pool of five applicants, Luke Virgil was selected to succeed Wes Blecke in the director's position at Wayne Area Economic Development (WAED).

Virgil, the current Economic Development Director at Laurel, was offered the position last week.

"We made the offer last week," said WAED board president Matt Ley. "He talked it over with his family and accepted. It always takes longer than you think it will."

Ley spoke on the "unbelievably qualified" applicants the hiring committee had to choose from.

One applicant dropped out just before the community interviews took place on Aug. 10, however the remaining four proved to be difficult to choose between.

"The hiring board was made of six people but we had many people chime in and help us," Ley said.

While Blecke has moved into his new position as City Administrator, he and the assistant director Irene Fletcher are both ready to help Virgil get settled, Ley said.

"Wes and Irene have already reached out," Virgil said. "They are committed to helping with my transition. Matt has offered us some leeway as a family to get settled into Wayne as well."

In his community interview, Virgil spoke on the level of trust required between his position and the area business owners and he underlined the stability that Wayne's community has with what he called "anchor institutions" such as Wayne State College, Providence Medical Center and the number of solid banking options here.

That, he said, helps to encourage the progressive attitude in the community as well as the entrepreneurial spirit seen here.

Virgil's career as an economic director started in Laurel, so he said

the decision was a hard one and it's bittersweet for him.

"Laurel has been very good to our family and they gave me the opportunity to start my career," Virgil said. "The whole community has been really good about my departure. They see why we chose it."

Virgil's estimated start date is Sept. 11, but the family will have up to a year to move from Laurel into Wayne to allow them to ease into things.

He commented on how people make commuting work all the time, but that he and his wife Megan, a science teacher at Wakefield, are looking forward to having little to no commute.

"I'm excited to be coming to Wayne and I feel very fortunate to have the opportunity," Virgil said.

"We are glad to have Luke and his family coming to Wayne," Ley said. "We are very excited to move forward in this new chapter."

Chippis among North America's top community college CEOs

The president of Northeast Community College has been named one of the top chief executive officers of community colleges in North America.

Dr. Terry F. Nelson of West Point, chair of the Northeast Community College Board of Governors, nominated Chipps for the CEO award. School store moves to Thrift Warehouse for convenience

Many folks flocked to the school store at Christmas time, and various sports kick off nights, but not having a consistent place with hours each week to view and purchase Wayne High School apparel and school spirit items was often inconvenient.

"The school store was open only a few times a year in years past," said Wayne Community Schools Superintendent Mark Lenihan. "We talked about it last year with Lukas and Mark and they approached the school with the idea. They were willing to have it at their location for more visibility and convenience."

Lenihan explained that the school apparel is sold at Thrift Warehouse, but that the majority of the proceeds go back to the school.

"We do reimburse them a percentage to cover their costs at Thrift Warehouse, like the credit card fee they are charged and their employees doing the work," Lenihan said.

Having sold close to 150 items over the summer made this fall look promising.

"We're doing this to help the community, to make things more convenient for people," Rix said. "We did really well over Chicken Days weekend with the alumni in town."

Lenihan commented that sales over the summer were a first, and that everyone was optimistic looking forward.

Currently, Thrift Warehouse is handling all sales and storing the inventory, which is a considerable amount of items according to Lenihan.

The hope is to include the school store with the business classes offered at Wayne High School.

"The plan is to have the business classes and somewhat the athletic department have a hand in ordering and make it part of their learning experience," Lenihan said. "The school is benefitting, not only financially, but also educationally."

As inventory moves out, new items will be added with the idea of keeping costs low.

"We were looking for a better way to market the apparel and items we had and we thought this was a good option," Lenihan said. "It gives more opportunity to purchase items because they are available any time Thrift Warehouse is open."

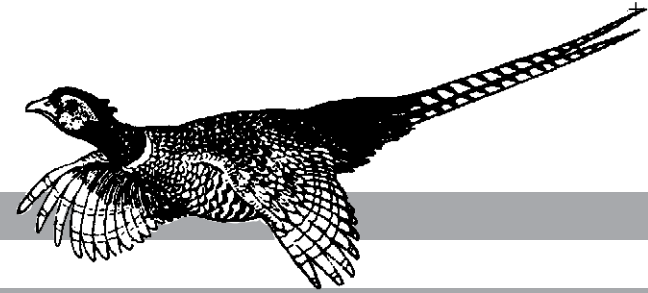
Car Seat Check

A number of instructors from Wayne State College were on hand to share their expertise in various areas such as rocks and fossils and using a telescope.

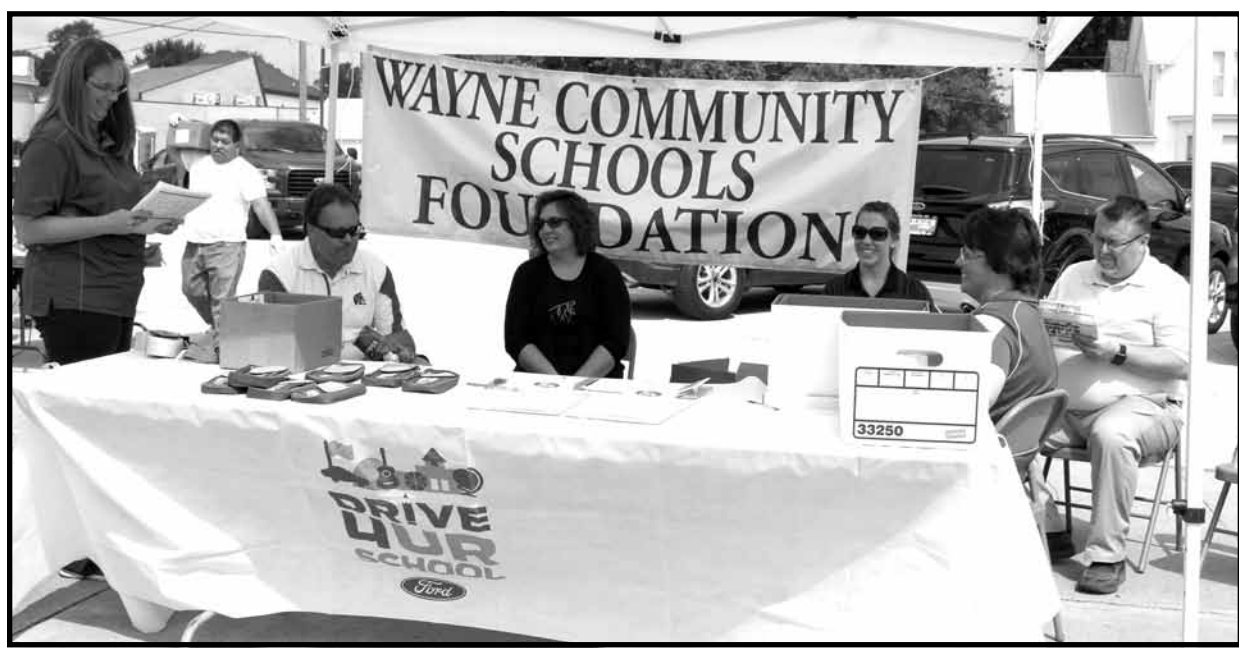
A number of community members were on hand to assist at several stations including fishing.

Technology upgrades take place at St. Mary's Elementary School

Students at St. Mary's Elementary School in Wayne are benefiting from an Ignite the Faith grant received by the school from the Archdiocese of Omaha.

During the summer the infrastructure at the school was upgraded to allow for more consistent wireless internet service. The upgrades will allow students to all be on devices at the same time.

In addition, the grant allowed for the purchase of 20 new Chromebooks and 24 new iPads. New projectors, screens, speakers, and document cameras have been installed in each classroom.

The technology grant has totaled \$74,000.

The school received another grant of nearly \$10,000 to purchase books and materials to implement a Blended Literacy program which includes Guided Reading. This program is part of a balanced literacy program and teachers have been able to attend professional development classes

to assist in implementing it.

Books and other materials were purchased with the grant money for the program which blends phonics and literature in learning.

"The main focus of all the upgrades is for individualized learning. We want to be able to meet the students where they are and help them with their learning," said Stacy Uttecht, Principal at St. Mary's Catholic School.

"The projectors in each classroom will be used as teaching tools in various ways and allow our teachers to expand our learning beyond the four walls of the building," Uttecht said.

As part of the upgrades at the school, several of the classroom teachers switched rooms and painting was done in both the classrooms and hallways.

"Here at St. Mary's, we feel that doing right for the students is the right thing to do," Uttecht said.

 competitive workforce.
 "Dr. Chipps understands the mission that a trained workforce is necessary to sustain and grow this region in order for it to survive," Nelson said. "He is pointing Northeast in a direction to do its part to contribute to the economic development dynamic of its 20-county service area and beyond. Under Dr. Chipps' direction, Northeast Community College is not only positioning itself as a leader both within the region and state, but also as a shining example of what community colleges nationwide can aspire to become."

- An estimated 40,450 women in the US died from the disease in 2016.

- Breast cancer death rates decreased by 36 percent between 1989 and 2012 (the most recent year for which data are available).

- Between the early 1990s - when breast cancer death rates started dropping - and 2012, approximate-

ly 249,000 deaths were prevented.

As of Aug. 1, 2016, the American Cancer Society was supporting 160 grants with more than \$62 million to create a world free from the pain and suffering of breast cancer.

Information provided by the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services in June of this year includes the following:

In 2014, 9,514 Nebraska residents were diagnosed with an invasive cancer, and 3,443 Nebraska residents died from cancer.

Cancer was Nebraska's leading cause of death in 2014, for the sixth year in a row.

Cancer incidence and mortality rates in Nebraska and the United States began to trend downward during the past decade.

Between 2010 and 2014, cancers of the prostate, breast, lung, and colon and rectum accounted for 23,292 diagnoses among Nebraska residents, which is almost half of all invasive cancers diagnosed in Nebraska during these years.

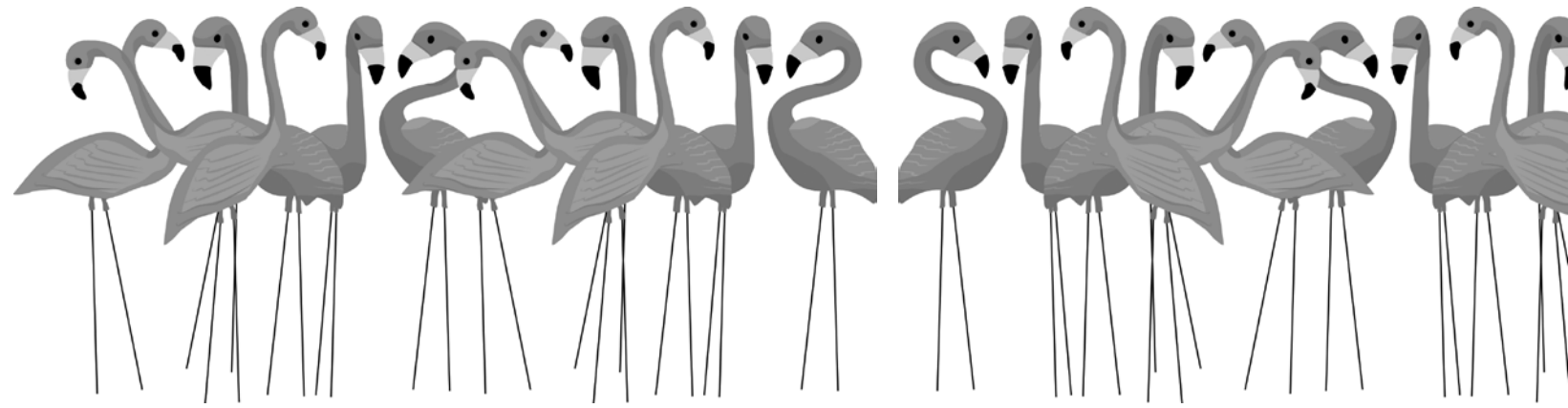
Among women, breast cancer is the most common cancer diagnosis in Nebraska, followed by cancers of the lung, colon and rectum, and endometrium.

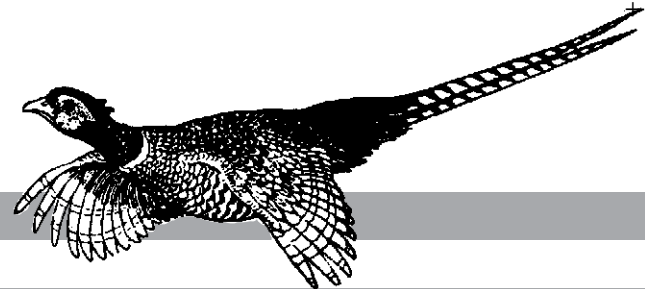

Blue Devils debut with road upset over Scotus

COLUMBUS — Preparing to open the season against a ranked opponent turned out to be a lot of fun for the Wayne High football team.

First-year coach Russ Plager got his first win as the Blue Devils' mentor with an exciting finish as the Blue Devils pulled off an upset on the road, hanging on for a 43-33 shootout win over preseason-No. 6 Columbus Scotus in the 2017 debut for both teams Friday at Pawnee Park.

"It was a lot of fun," the coach said after Wayne's first win over a ranked opponent in several years. "It was great to see the kids put in a lot of work (in the preseason) and see the results of that hard work. It was exciting to see them enjoy the fruits of their labor."

Wayne never trailed in avenging last year's season-opening loss to the Shamrocks, opening the game with a one-yard touchdown run by Casey Koenig on the Blue Devils' opening drive.

Scotus answered with an eight-yard pass from Caden Pelan to Tyler Palmer to tie the game, but Wayne took the lead for good with a pair of long touchdown plays. Juan Vergara broke the tie with a 77-yard sprint,

and Mason Lee followed by finishing off a 72-yard pitch-and-catch from Beau Bowers to give Wayne a 19-7 advantage.

Scotus pulled within six on Pelan's second scoring pass, a 12-yarder to Dalton Borchers, but Vergara closed the half with a 30-yard field goal to give Wayne a 22-13 halftime advantage.

"It was huge to get that first touchdown," Plager said of Wayne's start. "We wanted the ball when we won the coin flip and wanted to put the ball in our offense's hands, and we had a couple of big plays and were able to run the ball well."

While the offense played well in the opening half, Wayne's special teams helped put Scotus in a deeper hole early in the second half when Lee returned a Shamrocks punt 80 yards to make it a 29-13 lead, Wayne's biggest of the night.

Scotus would not go away, however. They scored early in the fourth quarter on a five-yard run to make it 29-20, and after Bowers connected with Ryan Jaixen on a 34-yard pass to put the lead back to 16 points, the Shamrocks answered with two quick scores to get the deficit down to three at 36-33.

"The kids really reacted well," Plager said of Scotus' comeback attempt. "We had talked about handling adversity and there were no negative vibes at all after Scotus got within three. The kids encouraged each other and then we popped off that big run and that was the difference."

The big run came on Wayne's next play, as Vergara went over the 200-yard night with his second long run of the game, an 80-yarder with less than three minutes to go that put the game out of reach.

Wayne's offense racked up 494 yards in total offense, with Vergara accounting for 223 yards on 19 carries with two scores, and Bowers going 10-of-17 for 197 yards and two touchdowns.

"It was a very good game for our offense," Plager said. "Coach (Adam) Hoffman did a great job calling the game on offense. Juan isn't a big kid, but he ran so hard and our line played well and (Bowers) connected with our receivers on some big plays. I can't say enough about what they did."

Bowers also accounted for 67 yards on 10 carries in the win. Lee caught four passes for 93 yards, Jaixen had three catches for 55 yards and Brennan O'Reilly accounted

for 33 yards on two receptions.

Defensively, O'Reilly and Garrett Schaffer each had six tackles, Vergara and Justin Dean each had five and Koenig and Drew Buck each had four to lead the defensive effort.

The win vaulted Wayne into the Class C-1 Top 10 in both the Lincoln Journal Star and Omaha World-Herald rankings this week, which makes Friday's 7 p.m. home opener with Boone Central/Newman Grove a rare matchup of ranked teams at Memorial Stadium, as the 1-0 Cardinals enter the game ranked sixth in the Lincoln paper and ninth in the Omaha rankings.

"It's one game at a time for us, so we'll work this week to get better and correct the mistakes we see on film," Plager said. "Boone Central has a great team and they're going to be a handful for us, but if the kids play their tails off like they did tonight it should be a good game."

Wildcats get season started right with 40-20 win

WINSIDE — Winside may be outmanned this season, but they proved to be the better team in their 2017 season opener.

Winside scored on the first play of the game and broke a 20-20 tie in the second half with three unanswered touchdowns to come away with a 40-20 win over Elkhorn Valley in the first game of the season for both teams Thursday at Winch Memorial Field.

The Wildcats wasted no time getting on the board, as Brandon Watters found Koby Ellis for a 26-yard touchdown pass to give the hosts the early advantage.

Elkhorn Valley came back to tie the game, but Winside scored a pair of touchdowns to take the lead for good. Watters hit Colton Jensen on a five-yard score, and the duo hooked up again on a 10-yard strike that made it 20-6.

Elkhorn Valley scored late in the first half and scored again midway through the third quarter

to tie the game at 20-20, but Winside answered quickly when Watters hit William Bullard for a 36-yard scoring strike to make it 26-20.

Winside extended their lead to 14 early in the fourth when Watters called his own number on a three-yard plunge with 8:44 to go, and the defense finished off the night when Bullard recovered a fumble and took it to the house in the final minute.

Winside had 332 yards in total offense, led by the passing of Watters, who completed 14-of-21 passes for 194 yards and four touchdowns. He also rushed for 128 yards on 24 carries with another score.

Ellis was the Wildcats' leading receiver with 82 yards on seven catches, adding three yards on five rushes. Jensen caught four balls for 35 yards. Bullard had two catches for 66 yards and Matthew Frederick caught one pass for 11 yards and had seven yards on six carries.

Defensively, Watters led the way with 22 total tackles, with Michael Jensen adding seven and Frederick and Colton Jensen each adding 6.5 stops. Bullard had six, Ellis had four and Dominic Reed added one.

Wildcat football returns experienced lineup

With one of the most experienced returning lineups coming back in the Northern Sun Conference this season, 13th-year Wayne State College football coach Dan McLaughlin is looking for the Wildcats to improve on last year's records of 3-8 overall and 2-5 in the NSIC South Division.

With just five seniors on last year's roster, Wayne State returns 17 starters this season, tied with Augustana and Concordia-St. Paul for the most returning starters of any school in the 16-team Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference.

McLaughlin, who is Wayne State's all-time wins leader with a 66-68 (.493) overall mark and 62-57 record (.521) in NSIC games, hopes that returning experience gets the Wildcats back over the .500 mark for the first time since 2012.

"It's comforting having all that experience returning, especially with all the new coaches (six) we have on our staff this season," remarked McLaughlin. "That will be an interesting dynamic — how are new coaches work with all of our returners — and I'm looking forward to see what we do."

The Wildcats bring back nine starters on offense and eight on defense along with a loaded special teams unit that brings back an All-NSIC South Division punter and one of the top three placekickers in the league last season.

WSC returns a three-year starter at quarterback, the top three rushers and top four receivers from last season on offense. Last year's top tackler, All-NSIC South Division and second-team Super Region 3 defensive back Cam Montgomery, graduated, but the Wildcats bring back a solid group of returners that has Coach McLaughlin excited for this season.

Headlining the returners on offense is senior quarterback Zach Osborn. The Harlan, Iowa native threw for 25 TD's and 2,666 yards last season and is on track to break many of Silas Fluellen's school records this season. Osborn completed 224 of 405 passes (55.3 percent) last season and ranked sixth in the NSIC last season in total offense per game (279.6) and ninth in passing yards per game (242.4). He also ranked second on the team in rushing last season with 410 yards on the ground.

McLaughlin sees a spirited battle for the



backup spots at quarterback with three players battling for the second and third positions on the depth chart.

Junior Taylor Reedy started seven games two years ago and is coming off a solid spring along with sophomore Aaron Bleil. McLaughlin is also curious to see what true freshman Brady Bransfield brings to the mix in fall practice.

At running back, Wayne State returns its top two rushers in seniors Rashad Trimble and Arelious Burns. Trimble accounted for a team-high 610 yards last season on 139 carries, averaging 4.4 yards per attempt with three 100-yard games. Burns added another 321 yards in nine games, averaging 3.5 yards per attempt.

McLaughlin sees true freshmen Maliki Wilson and Cole Deskin as players who will also contend for carries in the backfield this season. Wayne State's new offense this season hopes to utilize the fullback and tight end position more as junior Houston Huss returns at fullback. Nick Tarney is expected to contend for fullback playing time also this season.

Laurel senior Justin Saunders is the top returner at tight end. Stuart redshirt freshman Conner Paxton is coming off a great spring and was named the Scout Team Offensive Player of the Year last year. The Wildcats are talented at the wide receiver position with the top four re-

turning from last season.

Senior Nate Rogers is the team's go-to receiver after hauling in a team-high 56 catches last season for 740 yards and single season school-record tying 12 touchdowns. Junior Shymere Williams had a tremendous sophomore campaign and was the Wildcats' big play receiver with 41 grabs for 687 yards and 5 TD's, averaging a team-high 16.8 yards per reception.

Sophomore Willie Walton added 24 receptions for 231 yards as a true freshman last year while sophomore Sam Wegner produced 21 receptions for 244 yards last season as a redshirt freshman.

The offensive line features four returners from last season, led by junior left tackle Mike Milenkovich, an All-NSIC South honorable mention honoree last season that McLaughlin called "as good as we've had since I've been at WSC". Senior DaQuan Samuel made a successful switch last year from defensive to offense and returns as the team's starting right tackle.

Senior Kevin Camacho started at center last year, but missed spring drills. Juniors Austin Gubbels and Austin Pelc both had great springs and will battle for the starting center spot along with Camacho.

Junior Tyler Garrett made nine starts last year at right guard. Sophomore Marquise Jones (6-2, 375) appeared in eight games and made a pair of starts last year at guard as well. McLaughlin sees a great battle for the guard spots at 6-6, 300 pound junior Trevor Carstens moved from the defensive line to offense and had a strong spring. True freshmen Garrett Richter, Dallan Taylor and Nick Gray are also expected to contend for playing time at the guard positions.

McLaughlin sees Wayne State's punter and placekicker as the best in the league. Junior Cody Netusil was All-NSIC South Division First Team last year after ranking second in the NSIC with an average of 40.5 yards per punt. Younger brother Chase, named Iowa Class 2A first-team All-State punter as a senior last fall, averaged 41 yards per punt and will provide a friendly, family battle for the punting position.

Sophomore Ethan Knudsen had a stellar freshman season for the Wildcats, making 9 of 12 field goals and 31 of 35 PAT kicks last season. His nine field goals ranked third in the NSIC

Cleary looking for success in first season as Wayne State College soccer coach

The Wayne State women's soccer team has made significant improvement in the last two years, but the team hopes to accomplish even more under new head coach Joe Cleary in 2017.

Cleary has served as an assistant the past two seasons, helping Wayne State go from 4-11-3 in 2015 to a 9-6-3 record last season. It was the most wins for a Wildcat women's soccer team since 2006 and they were just one tiebreaker away from reaching the NSIC tournament for the first time in a decade.

Cleary says he sees just a small transition for the team with him going from assistant coach to head coach this season.

"Coach Erickson and I have slightly different coaching styles that complimented each other, so the culture and ideas will stay the same but normal to any coaching change the message may be delivered a little differently."

The Wildcats return six starters and 15 letter winners from last season when Wayne State started 3-0 for the first time since 2001 and was ranked in the Central Region coaches' poll for the first time ever. Wayne State's 23-player roster this season has just two seniors.

"We return not only talent but also players that have experience," added Cleary. "Maybe in the past we didn't have players that had been in situations of must-win games that had playoff implications, but now we have that experience. Some of them will be asked to play different positions from their first two or three years but that will only allow us to get our strongest groups on the field as often as possible."

The Wildcats return seven of its top eight scorers from last season offensively and has made dramatic improvements on the defensive side under Cleary the previous two years. The team's goals against average has declined from 2.39 to 1.28 in the last two years while the team produced 10 more goals last year.

Junior midfielder Brooke Buzzell led the Wildcats in scoring last year with 11 points on five goals and one assist. Another junior, Natalie Rech, produced four goals and two assists for 10 points.

"Brooke will be a staple for us in the midfield," commented Cleary. "She won't be alone as are lucky to return most of our midfield from last season. Natalie Rech, an All-NSIC honorable mention selection last season."

Other regular season meets include premier Division I events at the UNL Woody Greeno Invitational in Lincoln and the Roy Griak Invite at the University of Minnesota. WSC also competes in the Briar Cliff Invitational at McCook Lake, South Dakota on Oct. 7 to culminate the regular season.

This year's Northern Sun Conference Championship will be hosted by MSU Moorhead and held in Glyndon, Minnesota on Oct. 21 with the NCAA Central Regional Championship in Kearney on Nov. 4.

 and Knudson also averaged 59.4 yards on kickoffs with 12 touchbacks and just one kick out of bounds. Wahoo freshman Blake Kaiser will serve as backup to Knudson.

Defensively, the Wildcats return eight starters that include all players at linebacker and three of four interior linemen.

Seniors Logan Weinandt (23 tackles, two sacks) and Jonathan Bland (team high seven tackles for loss) return on the interior front. Expect junior college transfer Xavier Graham and Richard Stevenson to also battle for playing time in the trenches.

At defensive end, junior Randy Bryan is back (30 tackles, 2.5 sacks) while sophomore Jacob Protzman (26 tackles) made eight starts last season. Sophomore Alain DeVoe and redshirt freshman Kory Fitch add depth for the Wildcats at defensive end.

NSIC Player to Watch Tyler Thomsen headlines a group of all returning starters at linebacker. Thomsen ranked second on the team in tackles last season (66, 42 solo) as a redshirt freshman. Also back in the middle are seniors DeWayne Scott and Taylor Hoffman at Mike and Sam positions respectively.

Sophomore Kolbie Foster came on strong last season and is "really good" according to McLaughlin along with younger brother Corbin. Senior Emeka Etta ranked fifth on the team in tackles last season (39) despite missing three games and will add depth to the linebacker position. Redshirt freshmen Ben Elznic and Dorian Welch will also contend for playing time.

The secondary loses two-year starter Cam Montgomery to graduation, an All-NSIC South Division First Team and All-Super Region 3 Second Team selection that had six interceptions and a team-high 74 tackles last season. But a talented group of young players and promising incoming players will give the Wildcat defensive backfield plenty to choose from this season.

At cornerback, sophomore Shaq Paddy had as great of a

freshman season as any player McLaughlin can remember last season with a team-high six pass breakups and three interceptions to go with 34 tackles (29 solo). Junior Aaron Wright had a solid spring and will contend for the other cornerback spot along with sophomore Cole Tirrel, who returns following ACL surgery last season, and senior Reggie Holt.

Sophomore Kevin Ransom and Ian Ailts had strong springs and are top contenders to start at the safety positions to open the season. But three true freshmen - Zion Williams, Tyler McLaughlin and Nate Jackson - along with senior Glenn Harris - will battle for considerable playing time.

At kick returner, sophomore Willie Walton was the team's top returner last season averaging 13.2 yards per return. Junior wide receiver Shymere Williams and true freshman Zion Williams will also battle for time returning punts and kickoffs for the Wildcats this season.

McLaughlin said there is motivation for the team to finish better than the 12th place prediction WSC was given in the Preseason NSIC Coaches' Poll released on July 31.

"Absolutely we should have been better than the 3-8 record we had last season," said McLaughlin. If one or two plays from several games are different we were close to a 7-4 mark. Our goals for this season are to have a winning record, go unbeaten at home, contend for a division title and it would be great to get a 12th game."

Wayne State opens the 2017 season on Thursday, Aug. 31 with a 6 p.m. game at Northern State. The home opener for the Wildcats is Saturday, Sept. 9 when Wayne State welcomes the University of Mary to Cunningham Field for a 6 p.m. matchup.

"With all games being conference contests, we don't have the luxury of scheduling an easy non-conference game or two," added McLaughlin. "Our league has become so balanced, every game is a battle and you have to be ready to play. Even more interesting with this year's schedule are the Thursday night games that will be televised in our region, so that's a new thing we have to deal with on having some short weeks of preparation."

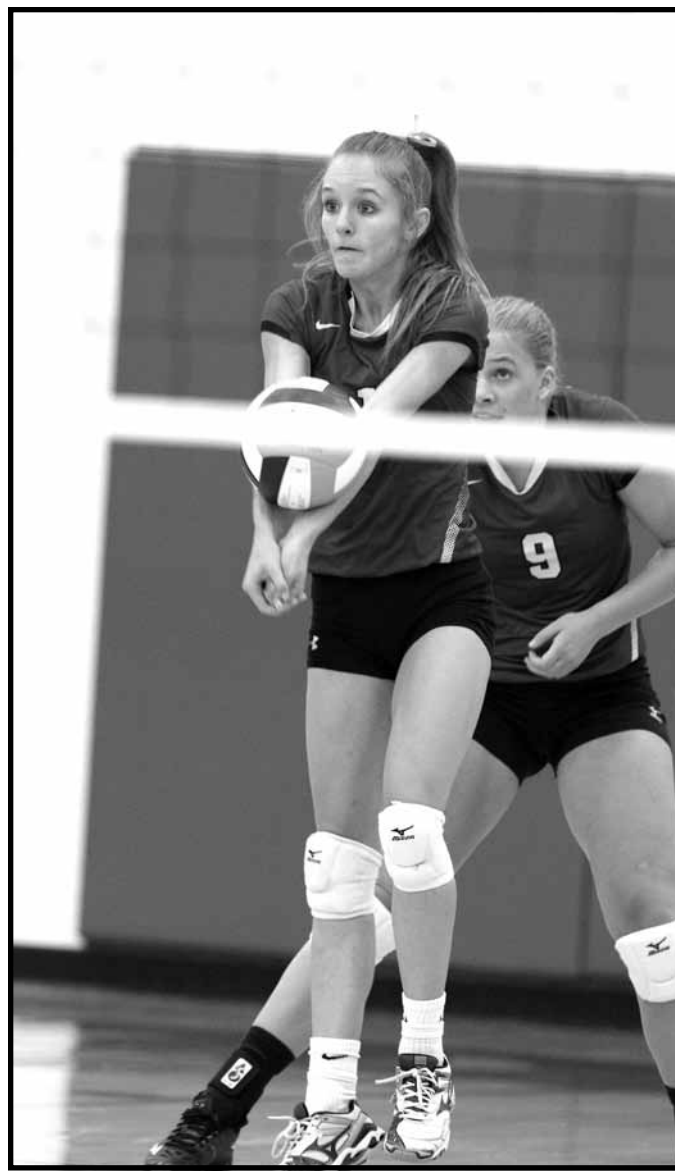
Road loss to open season

For the 11th time in 12 years under head coach Scott Kneifl, the Wayne State volleyball team advanced to the NCAA Div. II National Tournament while playing in arguably the toughest conference (Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference) and region (NCAA Central Region) in NCAA Div. II volleyball.

For the Wildcats to make it back to NCAA post season play this year, they will have to do it with one of its youngest ever rosters.

Wayne State was 24-8 last season and finished sixth in the rugged NSIC with a 14-6 league mark. Gone from last year's team are four-time first-team All-NSIC selection Alyssa Frauendorfer (career leader in hitting percentage), second-team All-NSIC outside hitter Michaela Mestl (career leader in service aces and third in career digs) and middle hitter Alex Opperman, who ranked third last season in the NSIC in blocks per set (1.09).

This year's Wildcat roster of 17 players features just two seniors, three juniors and four sophomores with one redshirt freshman and seven true freshmen.

"To say we are young is an un-

derstatement," said Kneifl, who is Wayne State's all-time winningest coach with a 303-103 record (.746) entering his 13th year as head coach of the Wildcats. "We are young, but talented, and we are excited to get this group together to see what they can accomplish."

Leadership for this year's team will come from seniors Erin Gross and Bree Ackermann. Gross was a second-team All-NSIC selection for WSC last season after averaging 2.50 kills and 0.75 blocks per set with a .288 attack percentage.

"Erin had a breakout junior season and has worked extremely hard in the offseason," commented Kneifl. "She will be a go-to player this season for us as we look for her to have a great year."

Ackermann played a significant role last season as a defensive specialist, averaging 1.56 digs per set while tied for second on the team in service aces with 31.

"Bree's serve has been as consistent and as good as any we've had here at Wayne State," Kneifl remarked. "The young players will be able to learn a lot from her as she has played in some of the biggest

matches you can play in. She will be a great leader for us this season."

A trio of juniors on this year's team is led by setter Megan Gebhardt, who ranked ninth in the NSIC in assists per set last season at 10.13. She also averaged 1.97 digs and 0.43 blocks per set.

"Megan had a great year for us last season and we are hoping for more of the same," said Kneifl. "She is an extremely athletic setter whose decision making will only continue to get better as the season goes on."

Rounding out the junior class are middle hitter Maria Wortmann and defensive specialist Payton Ruhl.

"We are looking for Maria to step up and fill the void of missing both middles off last year's team," boasted Kneifl. "She had a great offseason on the court and in the weight room and we believe she is ready to make a difference on the court."

Kneifl added, "Payton was one of our most improved players last season. She has a great serve that we are hoping we can utilize this season."

Sophomores Haley Kauth and

Tarrin Beller were significant contributors last season, and Kneifl expects the two players to play key roles on the success of this year's team. Kauth, a libero, ranked ninth in the NSIC in digs per set last season at 4.17 while Beller started 13 matches at the end of the season and accounted for 1.53 kills and 1.48 digs per set.

"Haley had a great season last year and we look for another great season," stated Kneifl. "She is as consistent of a serve receiver as we have had here and her defense continues to improve."

Kneifl said Beller is the player with the most experience returning at the outside hitter position for the Wildcats.

Other sophomores on the Wildcat roster include setter and defensive specialist Morgan Alexander and outside hitter Katie Stephens, who averaged 1.90 digs per set in 16 matches as a back row specialist last season.

Rounding out this year's team are redshirt freshman Jaci Brahmmer and seven true freshmen who will give Kneifl his biggest roster in years. Brahmmer will contend for

playing time at middle hitter.

The freshmen class of seven is Coach Kneifl's biggest recruiting class ever. They include 5-foot-10 outside hitter Alyssa Ballenger, 6-foot-1 rightside hitter Allison Timmermans, 5-foot-9 setter Hope Carter, 5-foot-8 defensive specialist Jacee Weber, 6-foot-1 middle hitter Maddie Knobbe, 5-foot-9 defensive specialist Maddie Duffy and 5-foot-10 outside hitter/middle hitter Elise Zajicek.

This year's Wildcat team will be much different than past teams according to Kneifl.

"We are much bigger so we are looking to attack at a high percentage and block well at the net. The serve receive and ball control aspect is going to be the key to this season. If we are able to have multiple options when attacking we will be hard to stop at the net."

Playing in the Northern Sun Conference that has produced the Div. II national champion eight of the past 10 years, Wayne State faces a challenging regular-season schedule combined with two challenging non-conference tournaments in Colorado to open the sea-

son.

"We are playing some Top 25 teams and conference powers early in the season which will hopefully prepare us for our brutal conference schedule," remarked Kneifl. "We want to push this group early to see what we need to work on so we can continue to get better."

Wayne State was picked to finish sixth in the preseason NSIC Volleyball Coaches' Poll on Aug. 3. The Wildcats were also ranked 13th in the AVCA Preseason Div. II Top 25 Coaches' Poll released on Aug. 14, marking the 103rd consecutive national ranking for the Wildcat program dating back to September, 2009.

The NSIC features six of the Top 13 teams in the country and seven teams ranked in the Top 25 while 11 teams from the NCAA Central Region are ranked in the Top 25 to start the season.

Wayne State opens the 2017 season on Friday, Sept. 1 at the Colorado School of Mines Oregidger Classic, facing Rollins (Fla.) in the opener. The Wildcats play 11 games at home in Rice Auditorium, where WSC has ranked in the top 10 in NCAA Div. II home attendance for eight straight years. WSC battles Sioux Falls in the home opener on Thursday, Sept. 14 against Sioux Falls.

Kneifl says the goal for this season is the same as previous ones.

"We want to become the best volleyball team we can become in the time we have together. With this young squad there will be a lot of teaching going on. We are excited for this group and we feel we have the capability of being a very good team by the end of the season."

son, may see time in both midfield and backline this season."

Cleary says this year's forward group has the potential to be the most dangerous groups since he's been at WSC.

"Christina Stasi struggled with injury a little bit last year but I expect her to pick up from her standout freshman year," Cleary said. "I think Hannah Knight learned a lot last season after switching to forward and will be even more involved in the attack this season." Junior Samantha Phillips returns at forward after producing two goals and one assist last season.

The defender position saw the graduation of two year captain and All-NSIC Second Team selection Kelsey Engstrom, but the Wildcats return a solid group of players in the backline according to Cleary.

"Our defense will have some new faces – both from the current roster and from incoming players – but I am confident we can continue our solid defensive efforts from the past season."

Alexis Strothers played the third-most minutes of any player last season and will be the team's leader this season according to Cleary. Carys Hund was third on the team in scoring last season with four goals and nine points while playing both forward and defender last season.

At goalkeeper, Wayne State lost three-year starter Kylie Comba to graduation after playing all but 30 minutes in goal last season posting a 9-6-3 record with five shut-outs and a 1.25 goals against average. Columbus sophomore Rachel Grisham and freshman Sydney Rogers from Wyoming, Minn., will both have a chance to earn the starting goalkeeper position this season.

Besides the 16 returning players, seven newcomers also join the Wildcat roster this season and Coach Cleary says he is excited to see the group of incoming players.

"They are talented, but they also have a true desire to be successful and they love the game," said Cleary. "We want players in this program that want to be at Wayne State College and this incoming group certainly checks that box. I have no question that they will make an impact even with our experienced roster."

Wayne State opens the 2017 season on Thursday, Aug. 31 with a Northern Sun Conference contest at Augustana. The Wildcats then play three non-conference matchups before returning to NSIC play as WSC hosts Colorado Christian on Sunday, Sept. 3, and Black Hills State the following day, followed by a road contest at St. Ambrose in Iowa.

LENRD approves a lower tax levy for fiscal year 2018 budget

NORFOLK - The 2018 fiscal year budget for the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) once again calls for a lower tax levy.

The operating budget was approved by the board of directors at their August 24th meeting with a tax request of \$4,270,002. The budget of all expenditures shows a 5.52% decrease of \$477,863 from last year.

The estimated levy based on the property tax request is 2.327 cents per \$100 of valuation, which is a 2.74% decrease from the fiscal year 2017 levy of 2.401 cents per \$100 of valuation. For example, if a person owns a \$100,000 house, the taxes owed to the LENRD would have been \$24.01 in 2017, and will be approximately \$23.27 in 2018.

LENRD General Manager, Mike Sousek, said, "It's becoming more difficult to continue decreasing the tax levy year after year. This is the 6th year in a row for a decrease in property tax asking. This year valuations flat-lined, and our levy asking decreased 2.74%, which is a historic low for the district, the lowest tax levy in 45 years."

The funds received by the LENRD are returned to the citizens of the district, through projects, programs, and studies across all or parts of 15-counties in northeast Nebraska.

Sousek, added, "We are working together to create a budget that not only addresses our 12 responsibilities, but that also focuses on improving the quality of life for the citizens across our district. We are doing more with less, by focusing on efficiencies and streamlining processes to protect our natural resources."

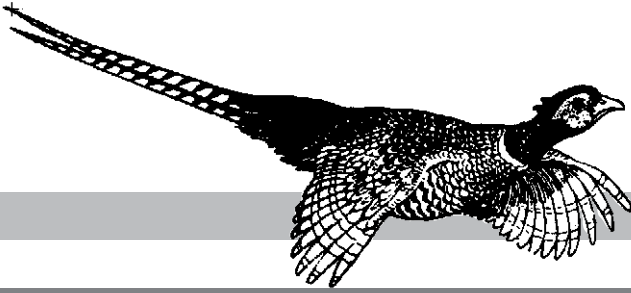

State Fair, Irrigation Field Day, Fall Lawn Improvement

Just a reminder that the state fair continues through Labor Day. I was at the fair last weekend helping with the Entomology ID contest and I will be helping with the Hog Show on Labor Day.

Once again, many things have been added to the fairgrounds, most notably there are an absolute glut of food stands so whatever you want to eat it is there at the fair. The huge new Nebraska building is finished and in it is now open all year. It features an outdoor theme by the Nebraska Game and Parks, and in Raising Nebraska you have an entire building dedicated to showing people how agriculture works. It is a great educational experience and I will hope that you stop by.

Of course there are the outstanding 4H exhibits and later this week the 4H livestock shows are being held.

The August rain has really brought new life back to our lawns. The best time to improve a lawn is in the fall. It's September and we don't normally think of doing too much with lawns in the fall other than mowing them when we have

to. However, now is actually the best time to improve your cool season fescue/bluegrass lawn, which 99 percent of us have.

The information in this article comes from a recent on-line publication from UNL with the title Improving Turf in the Fall. This can be found on the website turf.unl.edu.

Go to Turf Factsheets and Neb-Guides to find it. Also available at the Backyard Farmer website, byf.unl.edu/turf are links to tube videos to watch.

Almost all high maintenance cool-season lawns do well with fall fertilization as well as broadleaf weed control, and many slightly thinned lawns can be improved during this time. September is the most important time to encourage rooting for next year and increasing density this fall. In our area fertilizing can take place at any time from here on at a rate of 1.0 lb. nitrogen per 1000 square ft of lawn. Most fertilizers are found in bags with a ration similar to 24-6-12 (Nitrogen-Phosphorous-Potassium) or 20-0-10 and this will be fine.

Local fertilizer dealers will have other combination-, some that include iron which may help with the yellowing of the grass. Follow the directions on the label. A second application at or just after the last mowing, while the turf is still green will really help. You can even apply a third application in October if your lawn was especially thin. However, this last application can

increase the chance of snow mold if we have a high snowfall year.

An application from mid-September to mid-October of a broadleaf herbicide with 2 or more active ingredients (such as 2,4 D and dicamba) will control most common weeds like dandelions, plantain, and black medic, among others. Apply the herbicide preferably on a sunny day when no rain is forecast and temperatures and above 50 degrees.

For more recommendations on specific weeds, refer to the herbicide ratings on the web page at http://turf.unl.edu.

Don't lower your mowing height. Keep it at 3 to 3 1/2 inches for a thicker looking lawn and to keep out stresses.

You can also overseed a lawn if it is significantly thin but it requires core aeration with a special machine that you can rent. Or, you can hire a lawn care firm to do it. Much more information is available on the publication and I encourage you to download it, or come to the extension office where it can be printed out. Here's to a thicker lawn.

Producers encouraged to sign up for LENRD cover crop program

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) is partnering with the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to encourage landowners to participate in the Cover Crop Incentive Program, for land that is currently in a continuous no-till cropping system.

NRCS No-till Specialist, Dan Gillespie, said, "Cover crops enhance rainfall infiltration, drastically reduce soil erosion, and help prevent the development of ephemeral gully erosion in cropland." He added, "Cover crops may be planted into corn, soybean or small grain fields. Highly Erodible Land (HEL) fields where corn has been cut for silage are not eligible."

Each participant is eligible to

enroll up to 80 acres with a \$200 contract minimum.

Participants in this practice should apply at their local NRCS office each year, for up to three consecutive years. Applicants may pick from three cover crop seeding options and three cover crop seed mixture options.

Aerial application or ground application by hi-boy (system that can be used in standing crops) will be performed starting in the last week of August to third week of September. The optimum timing will be at or shortly before soybean and corn plant senescence or yellowing of the lower leaves.

Gillespie continued, "If the producer is not able to get the aerial seeding performed by the third

week in September they must no-till drill the cover crop immediately following harvest (by Oct. 25)."

LENRD Projects Manager, Curt Becker, said "Participants may change seed mix alternatives and options during the three year period, but must have approval from the LENRD prior to planting the cover crop." Becker added, "The producer is responsible for obtaining their own seed according to NRCS specifications and

arranging for seeding either by pilot or ground application. Producers also must kill the cover crop per NRCS Cover Crop Termination Guidelines, without inversion tillage."

Funding is limited, and anyone interested in applying for the Cover Crop Program should contact their local NRCS office for more details. A copy of the program guidelines is available on the LENRD website: www.lenrd.org/conservation/

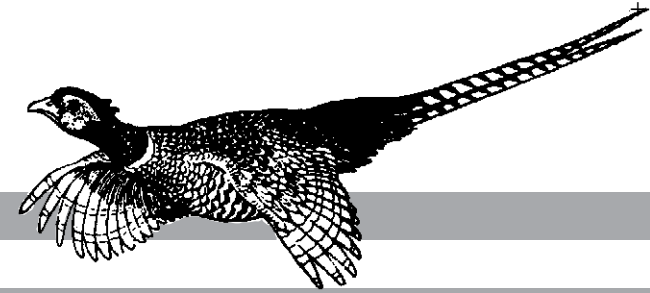

The Nebraska State Fair is August 25 - September 4, 2017 at the Nebraska State Fairgrounds in Grand Island, Nebraska.

In classes where presence of the 4-Her is required for judging purposes, such as animal exhibits, judging contest, presentations, and fashion show, a 4-H member must be 10 before Jan. 1 of the current year, or become 11 years of age during the current year. The last year of eligibility is the calendar year the member becomes 19.

For classes where presence of the 4-Her is not required (Static Exhibit), a 4-H member must be 8 before Jan. 1, of the current year, or become 9 years of age during the current year.

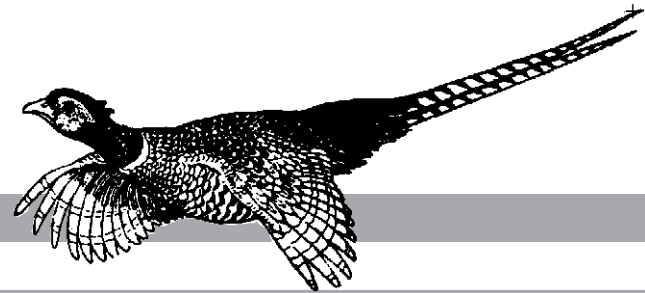

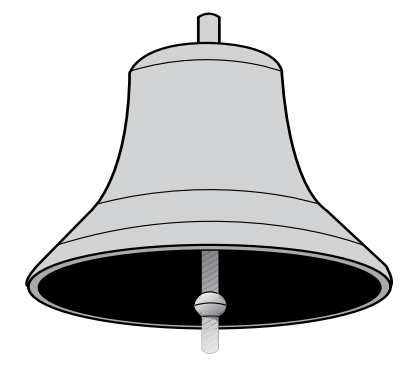

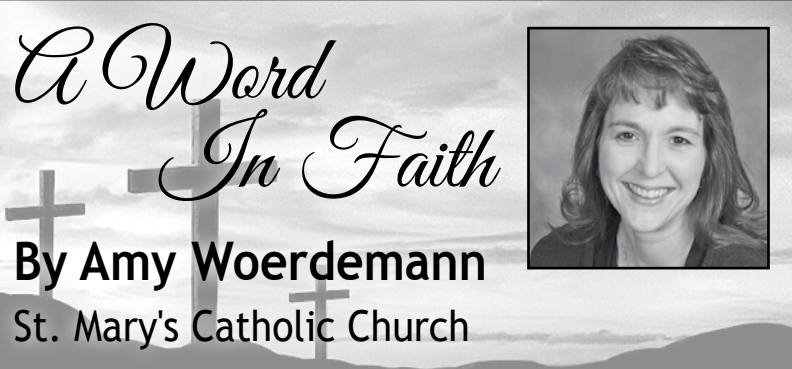

I have probably written this before but I do struggle with writing this column. I probably put too much pressure on myself but I always want to know that what I write will touch the heart of at least one person.

Today is Aug. 28 and I am struggling to write more than usual. Thirteen years ago our family said "hello" and then "goodbye" to our beautiful son, Jacob. I don't know if a day has gone by where I haven't thought of him. I no longer feel the intense pain of losing him like I did 13 years ago but....on his birthday it is like I'm reliving the day.

I remember the intense joy I felt when I saw his beautiful face for the first time. I also remember the intense pain I felt as Mike and I held him when his heart finally stopped beating. Although I have shed many tears today, one idea has kept me going.....Jacob never felt anything but love. He never felt hatred, doubt, despair or darkness. All that precious little boy ever felt was intense love from his parents, family and friends.

As I have been thinking about this article and also about Jacob's



birthday, I have been singing the "Prayer of St. Francis" for several days. This is absolutely one of my favorite hymns. I remember hearing this a lot as I was growing up because it was also a favorite of my Grandma Amy. We sang it at her funeral and we sang it at Jacob's funeral. You might think that this song would make me sad but it doesn't because it is based upon a prayer of peace. It is a very simple prayer but the words are extremely powerful. Mother Teresa recited the following version of this prayer when she accepted the Nobel Peace Prize in 1979.

"Lord, make me a channel of your

peace, that where there is hatred, I may bring love; that where there is wrong, I may bring the spirit of forgiveness; that where there is discord, I may bring harmony; that where there is error, I may bring truth; that where there is doubt, I may bring faith; that where there is despair, I may bring hope; that where there are shadows, I may bring light; that where there is sadness, I may bring joy.

Lord, grant that I may seek rather to comfort than to be comforted; to understand, than to be understood; to love, than to be loved. For it is by forgetting self, that one finds. It is by forgiving that one is forgiven.

It is by dying, that one awakens to eternal life. Amen."

I find myself wondering what the world would be like if we all tried to live out this prayer in our daily lives. I know that it might seem difficult to be an instrument of peace in a world that seems so full of hatred but we still have to try. I was once told that "ordinary people can change the world one heart at a time". I realize that we can't change the world overnight but we have to start somewhere.

The "Prayer of St. Francis" offers us a chance to pause, pray and reflect on who it is that we are and what it is that we are created to do. God didn't create us to hurt others. He created us to love and help one another. I know that I will fail constantly but I am going to try harder to live out this prayer in my daily life in honor of Jacob who never felt anything but love. I want more people in my life to feel love and light instead of despair and darkness. Will you join me?

Lord, let me be a light for you in the world today.

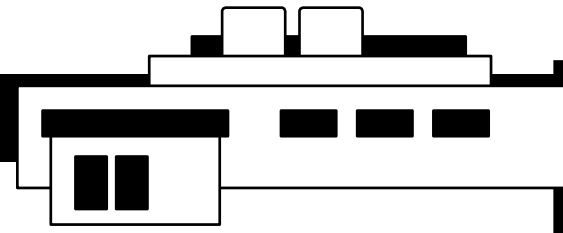

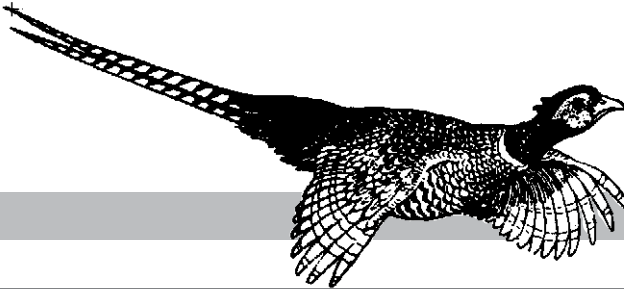

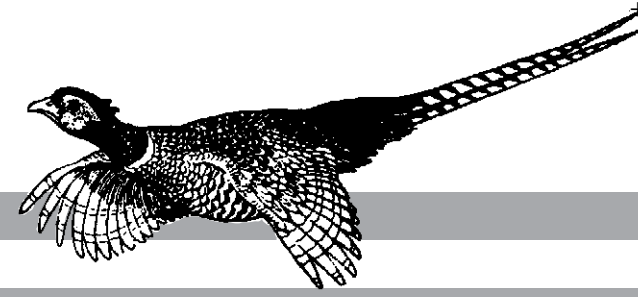
