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# Opportunities are brewing at Wayne State College

Fermentation Science program recently added as Chemistry degree concentration

How often does a person think about what goes into brewing their favorite beer? Or fermenting their favorite wine? How many people know the steps taken to get from raw ingredients to a drinkable end product?

Betting isn't legal in the state, but it's probably safe to say that most don't know or haven't ever thought about those things. That's all about to change on campus at Wayne State

Recently, WSC added Fermentation Science, a program offered as a concentration under the chemistry degree umbrella, to the lengthy list of options already offered at the college.

According to WSC, others offer courses in fermentation sciences, however WSC is the only one in the state to offer a full

"We are always looking for new areas to expand chemistry as a small program, so the more options we offer the better," said chemistry professor Dr. David Peitz.

Peitz said there were multiple reasons WSC moved forward with such a program and the growing popularity of craft brews and local wines certainly helped cement things.

"There is a need for breweries and wineries in Nebraska, we are a little behind in numbers compared to other states," Peitz said. "And we're an agricultural state, so we need to make use of our own commodities.'

Peitz said the program hopes to work with area wineries and breweries such Johnnie Byrd Brewing Company right here in Wayne, to show students different operations.

"We don't want to bother him yet," Peitz said of Greg Ptacek, owner of Johnnie Byrd. "We definitely want to be down there working with him though.'

Curriculum was developed with the help of 2010 WSC alumi Jacob Mattson who works as the technical brewing manager at Mike's Hard Lemonade and previously held the senior microbiologist/chemist position at MillerCoors. Who better to aid in designing coursework and setting up a lab than an industry professional familiar with WSC?

Mattson stated WSC gave him the necessary tools to be successful in the industry, starting with the "superb lab structure and priceless teacher-student interaction."

That lab-based education will continue with this program.

Paired with course work, students taking the Fermentation Science classes will not only work at perfecting their own beverages, but they will also be required to intern with a business in the industry, be it a craft brewer, local winery or multinational corporation. But before any of that happens, students have to meet some requirements.

Students wanting to enroll in the program's classes must have several hours of general education requirements finished as well as numerous chemistry and biology classes prior to being eligible to enroll in the upper-level courses.

Part of that is simply because of the knowledge needed to successfully navigate the courses but that isn't the only rea-

The elephant in the room: Legal age to drink is 21.

"We are doing the 'sip and spit' method because Wayne State is a dry campus, but for now only those who are 21 can be in the classes.'

There have been further discussions regarding the subject because as a restaurant server, a 16-year-old can handle alcohol which is the majority of the lab work -- not drinking the product -- so it's not necessarily a resolved topic. For now however, Peitz said, the program isn't going to get into that

The core classes for the program include Principals of Fermentation, Wine and Beer Production and Analysis and Sensory Analysis of Beer and Wine. Following the completion of those core classes as well as the other classes required for a chemistry major, the student caps off their education with a semester-long internship.

The courses will allow students to work through real situations, preparing them for a career in the industry.

"We're going to do small batch -- gallon and less than a gallon batches -- with lots of variables in each."

Those variables include the type of grains or grapes used, the amount of yeast and hops and dozens of others, to ensure students can see the science behind it.

"We're hoping we can split batches into five to ten gallons and do different variables including just doing different procedures in general."

The most challenging obstacle for Dr. Peitz has been the See Opportunities, Page 3A

# Council debates location of privacy fence

An item on Tuesday's Wayne City Council agenda resulted in considerable debate and failed to receive

any action from the council. At issue was whether the city would grant Brian Hass permission to waive the requirements for a privacy fence he has installed on his

Hass told the council he had called the city before installing the fence in May of this year. He was told he did not need a building permit for the fence and could put the fence on his property as long as it was less than six feet in height.

"I thought I was doing the right thing. There is no sidewalk on my side of the street and the fence is not obstructing traffic," Hass said.

Council member Jill Brodersen said the request is no different than one granted to a property owner near the bowling alley.

"How can we say yes to one person and no to another?" Brodersen

Joel Hansen, City Planner/Inspector told the council that fences are allowed in front yards, but not

Council members told Hass that changing his address from West Third Street to Blaine Street would help move the request forward.

#### Commissioners accept bid on new semis

In a recent meeting, the Wayne County Board of Commissioners took action on the previously tabled

Due to the number of bids that were received by the board at the last meeting, commissioners tabled the decision until a spread-sheet could be made to compare each piece of equipment.

After extensively reviewing the bids, commissioner Jim Rabe determined the lowest responsible bid belonged to RDO Truck Center in Norfolk.

RDO submitted several options, but the bid the commissioners accepted totaling \$98,426.48 was on a 2018 Mack with a delivery date of January 2018.

This was actually the second lowest bid, but due to proximity in the event of a break-down and an issue with axel weight not being heavy enough, the board unanimously accepted the RDO bid.

Commissioner Dean Burbach had been looking to purchase a semi as well, however after seeing the prices of used trucks with a reasonable amount of miles on it, the board felt it was a smarter buy to purchase a second truck from RDO rather than spend nearly \$80,000 on a truck with questionable maintenance costs coming up, so a second semi identical to the one Commissioner Rabe would be purchasing for his district was also purchased for Burbach's district.

In other news, Highway Superintendent Mark Casey gave a brief rundown of the bridge and road projects. including the Carroll bridge which is slated to open the end of September.

Another item discussed at length was the cash-in-

lieu insurance option. Jim Daubert of First Concord Benefits Group answered questions and explained how the county could go about setting up such an option. First Concord currently works with the City of Wayne and Wayne Community Schools for insurance options available to their


Daubert thoroughly explained how the plan would work and how employees could take better advantage of it. Both the commissioners and Daubert agreed that informational meetings for the employees would be



setup of the lab. Taking into account new equipment and new processes, Peitz worked to set up the lab in the most ideal way possible to ensure efficiency and functionality.

"We are still putting it all to-

gether," Peitz said with a laugh. " Another challenge was the scale on which the program will be brewing. As a "basement brewer" himself, Peitz had used kits before to make his own, but it's different in a lab, he said.

"Just trying to scale it back from even five gallons, which is small, to putting the science behind it -correlating the instruments and looking at what the students can test for -- was a challenge.'

The program isn't just benefitting chemistry majors, though. Peitz said the biology majors will be experimenting with the yeast, including identifying the different varieties for the fermentation pro-

Peitz is optimistic that the program will be fully functional by the time January rolls around so students are able to sign up for it.

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





# Blue Devils make it to 4-0 with 47-7 blowout

The Wayne High offense cranked out 427 yards in total offense and the Blue Devils ran their record to 4-0 for the first time since 2002 with a 47-7 blowout of David City on the road Friday.

The Blue Devils wasted no time in taking control of the Scouts, scoring four touchdowns in the opening period.

Mason Lee got things going on a 37-yard run to make it 6-0. Juan Vergara scored the first of two touchdowns on a one-yard run, then added another after Brennen O'Reilly scored on a seven yard gallop. Vergara's 21-yard score late in the opening period made it 26-0 and the route was

Quarterback Beau Bowers, who was a perfect 10-for-10 in passing, hit Ryan Jaixen with a pair of scoring passes in the second period. That gave Wayne a 40-0 halftime advantage and they cruised from their, closing out the scoring on Blake Bartos' first varsity touchdown, a five-yard run.

The Blue Devil defense limited David City to just 140 yards in total offense while racking up 427 yards, including 239 on the ground. Vergara led the ground attack with 59 yards on five carries, Bartos added 50 yards on 10 tries, O'Reilly had 44 yards on three attempts and Casey Koenig had 34 vards in seven carries.

Wayne's quarterbacks were a perfect 12-for-12 in passing attempts on the night. Bowers was 10-for-10 for 173 yards and two scores, while backup Tyler Gilliland was 2-for-2 for 15 yards. Jaixen led the receiving effort with 78 yards on five catches, Lee had 73 yards on two receptions, Shea Sweetland had 22 yards on three catches, and Kaleb Anderson caught two balls for 15 yards.

Defensively, Cade Janke had nine tackles to lead the Blue Devils defense. Koenig and Tyrus Eischeid each had five tackles, O'Reilly, Jaixen, Tristan Landanger, Nate Burrows and Mike Leatherdale each had four, and Lee, Drew Buck, Victor Kniesche and Aaron Reynolds each had three

Helping out in the ground attack was Frederick with 26 yards on eight carries, while Ellis added 10 yards on two tries.



## Eagles down Falcons for 46-20 homecoming win

Allen overcame a sluggish start and pulled away for a 46-20 win over Elkhorn Valley on homecoming at Isom-Hill Field in Allen.

The Eagles struck first, recovering and returning a Falcon punt snap error to the Falcons' one-yard line. Kyle Smith took it the final yard for the score and Blake McCorkindale added the point-after run to make it 8-0.

Allen scored again later in the period when McCorkindale hit the end zone on a 12-yard score. Smith and Jacob Williams converted the two-point play to make it 16-0 after one period.

Allen's offense sputtered in the second period with a three turnovers, and Elkhorn Valley was able to get back in the game late in the half on a 14-yard pass play to make it 16-6 with :16 to go in the half.

Allen rebounded quickly, though, scoring on the final play of the half on a 58-yard run by Smith. He found Devin Twohig for the two-point conversion to make it 24-6, and that seemed to give the Eagles the momentum for the second half.

Allen scored two quick touchdowns in the third quarter on a 35-yard run by Smith and a three-yard surge by McCorkindale to make it 38-6, and they would add another score early in the fourth on a 24-yard pass from Smith to O.T. Roth. Elkhorn Valley tacked on two late touchdowns, but it was not enoug as Allen came away

Offensively, the Eagles cranked out 363 yards in total offense, highlighted by Smith's 191 yards on 15 carries. McCorkindale added 84 yards on 14 tries and Kobe

Kumm had 61 yards on eight attempts.

Defensively, the Eagles took the ball away five times from Elkhorn Valley. Brogan Jones led the tacklers with 13, Anthony Isom had 10, and Isaac Verzani added nine. Jacob Williams led the takeaway charge with a fumble recovery and interception.

"We did not have a very good first half offensive football, allowing Elkhorn Valley to stay in the game. Three turnovers during the second period had us all frustrated," coach Dave Uldrich said. "We can not do those things and expect to continue to win games. Defensively, the five takeaways were key in not allowing Elkhorn Valley a chance to stay close. The team will need to really focus their efforts this week, as Wynot is a very athletic and huge team."

# Providence Medical Center celebrates completion of Capital Campaign

Providence Medical Center in Wayne recently celebrated the completion of its Capital Campaign to raise \$2.5 million to complete hospital renovations. The announcement was made at a news conference held recently at the hospital.

Providence Medical Center was originally

Providence Medical Center was originally dedicated on August 24, 1975. Current construction and renovations to the 42-year old facility have been underway for nearly two years, and today there is light at the end of the tunnel with the \$15 million dollar project. A tentative completion date is set for March of 2018.

The Providence Medical Center Foundation officially kicked off its Capital Campaign in February of this year, however there were months of pre-planning. "The steering committee for this campaign has been working hard for nearly a year. This was quite a process," said hospital CEO, Jim Frank.

"Our first goal was to get the right people involved, and once we did that those individ-

uals dedicated themselves to the campaign. There was a lot of work on the part of a lot of people," said Campaign Chair, Galen Wiser.

Numerous donations have been received over the course of the past six months, and several 'naming opportunity' donors were announced at the recent news conference including Kent and Jodi Pulfer, Rod Tompkins and Don and Nancy Endicott, all of Wayne.

In addition to the generosity of all the donors to the hospital's Capital Campaign, Jim Frank announced that the Gardner Foundation had awarded Providence Medical Center a grant totaling \$1 million, which pushed the total funds raised in the capital campaign over the \$2.5 million.

Leslie Bebee, Gardner Foundation board member, commented that the financial commitment the Gardner Foundation made was to honor the care that the hospital's employees provide and to acknowledge the importance of having a quality hospital located right in Wayne. "I'd like to thank everyone

who has been part of this project – it is great to partner with good people."

"On behalf of the Board of Directors and staff of Providence Medical Center and the PMC Foundation Board of Directors, I want to thank the entire northeast Nebraska area for the generous support we have received for our capital campaign," said Frank. "We look forward to completing our construction in the spring and celebrating the completion of our construction and renovation project. I cannot thank you all enough for your patience and understanding as we have navigated through this process."

# College kicks off another year of its Fridays @ Northeast program

Several area students who have yet to graduate high school are already considered college students. "You're college students now," said Lyle Kathol, vice president of educational services at Northeast Community College, as he spoke to approximately 70 seniors from 16 high schools who are enrolled in the College's Fridays @ Northeast program.

Fridays @ Northeast allows the seniors to spend the final day of the school week on campus as college students. This semester, classes are held from  $8\ a.m. \cdot 2\ p.m.$ , on the main campus in Norfolk and at the extended campus in South Sioux City.

Classes offered through the program introduce the students to a variety of career and technical education program areas. The number of students and schools taking part in the second year of the program has doubled from the inaugural year in 2016-17.

Makala Williams, director of early college at Northeast, said Fridays @ Northeast takes place when full-time Northeast students are not in class on the final day of the week.

"Northeast students who are in

many of the programs in which these seniors are enrolled have classes Monday through Thursday, so they are not using the classrooms and labs on Fridays, which allows us to have the high school students on campus." In October 2015, the Northeast Ne-

braska Career Academy Partnership (NENCAP), made up of several school districts and educational service units (ESU's) across the region, agreed to join together to have their students participate in the program.

Williams said the districts realized they did not have the space or technology to offer programs such as welding, animal science, or nursing.

"They said "Let's do this for our students...we want our students to have the best and most opportunities that they can (through Fridays @ Northeast)."

The students are truly college students in that they are registered and have a Northeast student identification. The grades they earn will go on a Northeast transcript which will lead into a program of study at the College or they can be transferred to another

postsecondary institution. Because all faculty have completed the dual credit permit process through the Nebraska Department of Education, a student's high school can elect to give high school credit for the courses

NENCAP is paying for items such as the students' books, tools, personal protective equipment, shirts and other supplies. Tuition and fees for students enrolled in Fridays @ Northeast is \$69 per credit hour, which is reduced from the full-time rate.

Dr. Michael Chipps, president, told the students during an orientation session recently that the Fridays @ Northeast model will likely be replicated at institutions across the country.

"I have never seen anything like this. It just makes good sense to offer a program like this," he said. "Fridays @ Northeast allows you to have an opportunity during your senior year to discover what you like or dislike in pursuing a particular career pathway. We want you to feel free to be able to figure out 'is there something here for me?"

Chipps said the program would not be possible without Northeast's dual credit permitted certified faculty and its staff members.

Classes offered this fall on the Norfolk campus include animal science in agriculture; suspension, steering and brake systems in automotive technology, machine fundamentals in diversified manufacturing; introduction to early childhood education and infant and toddler development as part the early childhood education program;

comprehensive medical terminology, lifetime wellness and certified nurse aide (CNA) as part of the health and wellness program; and welding.

Lifetime wellness and welding are courses offered this semester at the South Sioux City extended campus. In addition to Norfolk and South Sioux City, classes for the spring term will be held at Northeast's extended campus in O'Neill.

Each of the students enrolled in Fridays @ Northeast are easy to spot while they are on campus. All of them have received program-specific shirts. For example, welding students wear industry certified shirts that they may wear in any welding situation, CNA students wear scrubs while they are in their classes and in labs, while others wear polo shirts.

Schools that have students enrolled in Fridays @ Northeast programming this year are located in Allen, Bancroft-Rosalie, Battle Creek, Bloomfield, Elgin, Humphrey, Madison, Norfolk (including Lutheran High Northeast and Norfolk Senior High), Omaha Nation, Osmond, South Sioux City, Stanton, Tekamah-Herman, Winside, and a home school.

The NENCAP Board is made up of representatives from ESUs #1, #2, #8, #17, Norfolk Public Schools, South Sioux City Public Schools and Northeast Community College.





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

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#### In 1 Peter 5:8, there is a very familiar and important Bible verse: "Be sober-minded; be watchful. Your adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking

someone to devour." I first learned this Bible verse as a memory passage going to a Lutheran Day School in my hometown of Lockwood, Mo. Since that time as a child, I, as a pastor, have used that Bible verse hundreds, if not thousands of times. I have used it as a sermon text, in Bible studies, in devotional articles, in counseling, and in personal testimony. It is a wonderful passage that calls every Christian to be on guard. Why?

The devil, as a cunning lion, wants to attack and devour us. Christians know this passage to be true. The devil is so cunning in the ways he brings temptation to us. The devil makes sin look so attractive. The devil makes it look like giving in to temptation won't bring any harm at all. And, finally, the devil very craftily appeals to our human weakness at verv vulnerable times to lead us into sin.

While I have known this passage

to be true, I hadn't really taken it that seriously. But the meaning of watchfulness became more real this summer as my wife, Darlene, and I lived in Anchorage, Alaska, doing volunteer work for Alaska Missions for Christ.

Take the words of the verse seriously, "Sober up!" Spiritual apathy is grave!



## Norfolk Tree Advisory Board to host Community Tree information meeting

The Norfolk Tree Advisory Board will host a Community Tree Information Meeting that is open to all tree board members and anyone interested in promoting tree projects within their community.

The meeting will be held on Wednesday, Sept. 27 at the Elkhorn Lodge at Ta-Ha-Zouka Park in Norfolk from 1-4:30 p.m. The afternoon meeting will be divided into three sessions that will cover "Getting Your Community Ready for Emerald Ash Borer (EAB)", the Norfolk Tree Bud Program, tree board duties and activities, and community tree inventory along with an air spade demonstration to showcase what roots look like under the surface.

The first session will have members of the Norfolk Tree Advisory Board and Steve Rasmussen, District Forester with the Nebraska Forest Service, talking about what their EAB preparedness plan looks like. The Norfolk Tree Advisory Board will also go into their Tree Bud Program where citizens of Norfolk add extra money to their water bills to go towards planting new trees within the city of Norfolk.

The second session will focus on tree boards. Pam Bergstrom, Forester with the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District, will talk about the function of tree boards and have some assistance from local tree boards on what they do, what projects they have done in the past, and what they have planned in the future.

The third part of the presentation will be on community inventories and finish up with an air spade demonstration of removing soil from around roots to see what is going on under the ground. Graham Herbst, Community Forestry Specialist with the Nebraska Forest Service, will talk about the inventory that took place in West Point this summer. Herbst will use an air spade to remove soil from around a tree to showcase what the roots look like underneath and talk about the importance of root health.

"This is a great opportunity for those who are caring for our publicly owned trees to learn how to promote them, care for them and find the funds to make it all possible," said Dr. Tom Surber, chairman of the City of Norfolk Tree Advisory Board.

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
