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Commissioners set town hall informational meeting for Sholes wind project

A recent meeting of the Wayne County Commissioners led to the official scheduling of an informational meeting.

The meeting, centered on the NextEra wind energy facility being constructed outside of Sholes, will take place Dec. 6 at the fire hall in Wayne from 6 p.m. until 7:30 p.m.

The meeting will be an informational session for those interested in learning more about the Sholes project. Representatives from NextEra will be on hand to answer questions regarding the project.

Also in conjunction to the NextEra project, the commissioners discussed the details of the road haul agreement or roads contract.

Taking a look at other counties with wind energy facilities, the commissioners are researching the fees imposed on the developers during construction, including a fee per tower that covers overweight and over sized loads as well as road access.

Highway superintendent Mark Casey discussed various numbers with the board, but stated that he wasn't prepared to recommend any numbers yet, nor was he prepared to sign any contract until a preliminary

map was established by NextEra to see what roads and bridges would be affected.

Webster, Dixon and Holt counties all have road use agreements with various fees attached, but the commissioners will also be researching what those and other counties have done for any engineering and surveying fees.

"I've said it from the beginning," commissioner Randy Larson said, "I don't think we should pay a dime for this. The county shouldn't pay anything for this to be here."

One thing the commissioners reiterated during the discussion was the fact that, due to no zoning in Wayne County, there is no way to stop private land owners from having towers constructed on their property. What the board of commissioners can do, however, is ensure that the roads and bridges are left in as good if not better condition than when NextEra came in and also work with NextEra to ensure the county is being held financially responsible for any cost incurred during the course of construction.

Casey told the board that Dixon County was in the same boat having no zoning and that they are working with the wind energy company developing over there rather than making enemies to ensure the ma-

majority of their constituents aren't adversely affected by the construction of the facility.

Another point brought up during the course of that discussion was the need to update the utility line application to include a fee schedule.

The size of the pipe and conduit being utilized will determine the cost. The board voted unanimously to adopt a fee schedule that imposed a \$100 fee for pipe under four inches, a \$500 fee for pipe four to eight inches and a \$1,000 fee for pipe over eight inches.

"I'll get a new form made up to get it on the website," Casey said.

Other agenda items included an update by health director Julie Rother with Northeast Nebraska Department of Public Health.

Rother provided the board with several handouts that contained data regarding the health of Wayne County.

She broke her data down into three parts: assessment, policy development and assurance.

Rother said that many of the things public health works on overlap in those categories but that those are the areas the public health department works in.

In her data, she shared that Wayne County was ranked sixth in the state out of the 78 counties who had enough data to use.

"Wayne County is a pretty healthy place to live," Rother said. "The formula looks at length of life and quality of life which includes social, economical, environmental and clinic-care factors."

Something the public health department is working on is monitoring the status of veterans in the state and in Wayne County.

Rother's data showed that compared to the national statistics for the rate of veteran suicide at all ages, Nebraska's rate was higher. Nationally, veteran suicide is at a rate of 38.4 percent while in Nebraska, that rate is 47.8 percent.

That doesn't necessarily reflect Wayne County but there is data from Wayne showing that education wise, veterans here in Wayne County are higher than the national average when it comes to having a bachelor's degree or higher.

Other data Rother showed included that 99.2 percent of veterans in Wayne County are living above the poverty level, which is obviously a very good thing.

She showed the commissioners the public health website, which includes a page of contacts.

The resource directory is a list of entities compiled for easy access for those who are in need of assistance.

Council denies change for event center, appoints finance director

After considerable discussion and input from several council members, the Wayne City Council voted to deny a request for a change from a loan to a grant for the Wayne Area Event Center.

Josie Broders spoke to the council on the changes that have taken place with the project since it started 13 months ago. She asked the council to consider changing the \$350,000 LB840 loan given to the project to a grant to allow for more flexibility in getting bank financing for the remainder of the money needed to complete the project.

She said the request was similar to that given to the group that built the Cobblestone Hotel.

City Finance Director Nancy Braden said that the hotel was originally given a loan, which was later changed to a grant that is now being repaid.

Broders said she feels the project, which has now been expanded to include a restaurant, will bring "a lot to the community."

She also said she would be willing to repay the money as the original loan indicated and willing to have that in writing.

Mayor Ken Chamberlain said that while he has heard many positive comments on the project, there may be other alternatives available, including the deferral of payments on the loan for five years.

After weighing options, council members voted 5-3 to act on the LB840 Committee's recommendation to deny the request. Council members Jon Haase, Terri Buck and Jason Karsky voted against the recommendation.

The evening's meeting began with the appointment of Mary Beth Porter to the position of City Treasurer-Finance Director.

Porter will begin her duties with the city on Dec. 4.

Council members also took action to terminate the city of Wayne's group health care insurance with Blue Cross Blue Shield and enroll with United Health Care.

Gary Boehle with the Elkhorn Agency spoke to the council on the proposed 40 percent increase in premiums from Blue Cross Blue Shield. He cited a number of reasons for the increase, including a large number of claims from city employees for over \$50,000.

The premium quote from United Healthcare will include a four percent increase in premium to the city with coverage very similar to that of Blue Cross Blue Shield.

In other action, the council approved a resolution for the purchase of a Bobcat 5600 for use by the city's street department.

Lowell Heggemeyer explained to the council that the Bobcat would allow for use of equipment that the city currently owns.

Council members gave second reading to two ordinances that will change parking regulations in the southeast quadrant section of the city.

Approval was also given to payment for the Beaumont First Addition Water & Sewer Extension Project in the amount of \$130,807.41 to Penro Construction, Inc. and \$185,548.48 to A&R Construction for the Fourth Street Paving Project.

A change order decreasing the cost of the Wayne Country Club Clubhouse Addition and Remodel Project was approved. It will amount to a \$50,785 change on the total cost of the project.

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, Dec. 5 at 5:30 p.m. in council chambers.

Firefighters respond to house fire

When they arrived on scene, firefighters found heavy smoke coming from the manufactured home.

Wayne Fire Chief Phil Monahan requested mutual assistance from the Carroll and Winside Volunteer Fire Departments.

According to Monahan, the fire started underneath the home when a propane heater that was being used to thaw pipes caught the floor on fire.

Firefighters remained on scene until approximately 4:15 p.m.

The home has been red tagged and is not liveable at this time.

The family living in the trailer was home at the time the fire broke out but was able to escape without injury.

Monahan said there were no working smoke detectors in the home.

A total of 20 Wayne fire fighters were in-

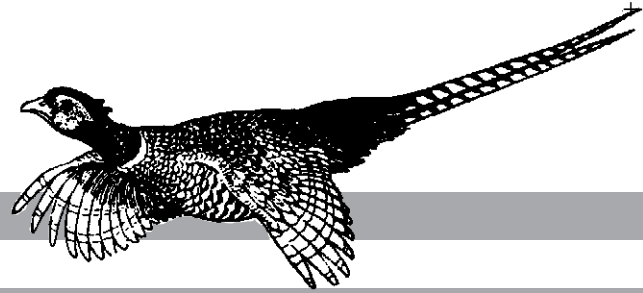

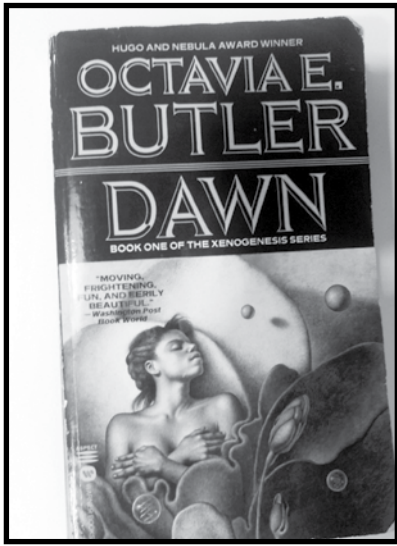

tance. This list includes entries for everything from food assistance and preschools to medical clinics and legal assistance.

In addition to a dozen other options, there is a veterans resources entry that includes the contact information for area county veteran service officers and VA clinics and hospitals among other things.

Rother told the board that the department had passed their audit with no issues. She also discussed that the department was working with numerous organizations and with county emergency management director Nick Kemnitz to help set up emergency preparedness plans.

Another agenda item the commissioners worked through was the signing of the contract with Berggren Architects.

Berggren will be assisting the county in determining what needs to be done to the exterior of the courthouse before sending it out for bids for tuck pointing. During the inspection, there were some additional issues found besides the need for tuck pointing, and those were accounted for.

The board voted unanimously to hire Berggren, a company the county has worked with on prior project at the courthouse, to oversee the bid process and restoration work.

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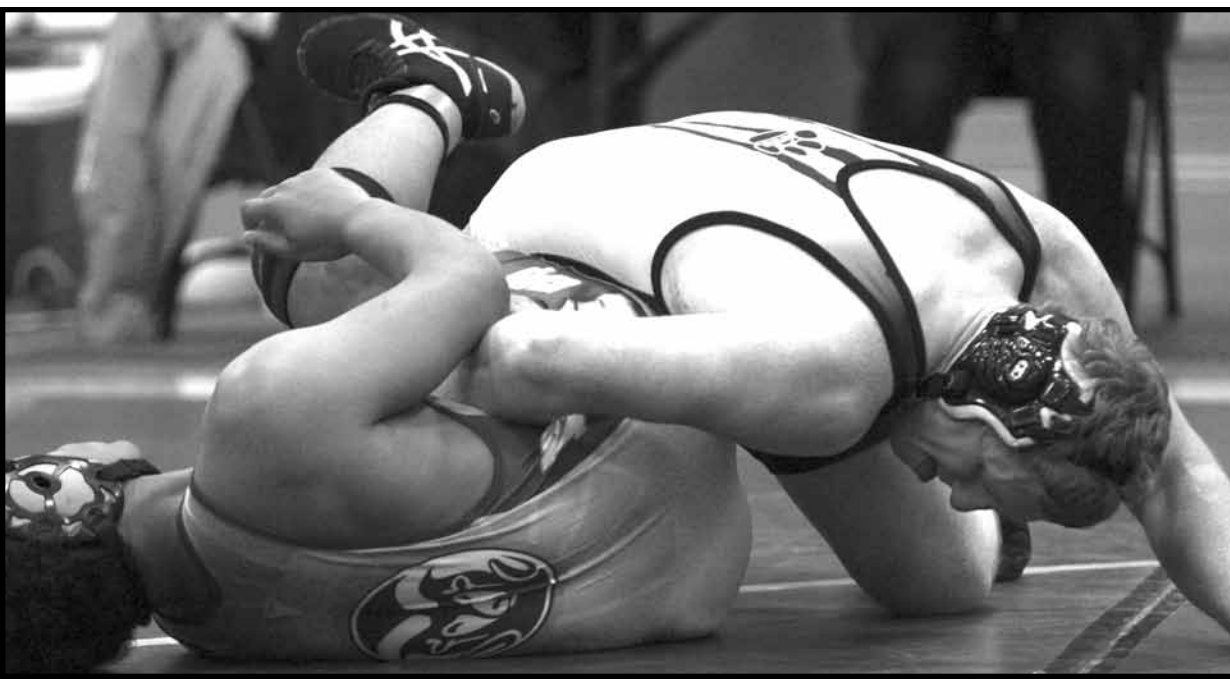
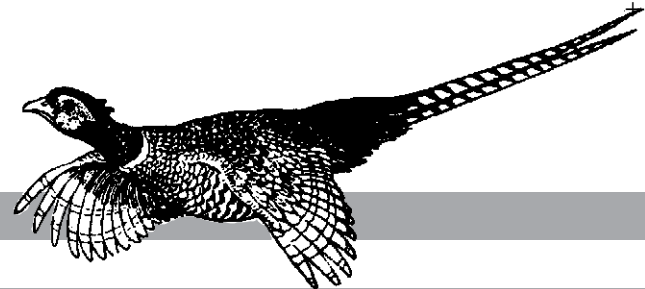

Wildcat fall in overtime in NSIC opener after win over Graceland

After posting an easy win over Graceland College, the Wayne State women's basketball team dropped a tough Northern Sun Conference opener in overtime to rival Augustana.

Augustana forced 29 turnovers on Wayne State, resulting in a 35-8 advantage in points off turnovers, as the visiting Vikings held off the Wildcats 83-78 in overtime Monday in the Northern Sun Conference women's basketball opener for both teams at Rice Auditorium.

The game featured 15 ties and 16 lead changes after Augustana scored the opening 10 points on the first 3:48 of the game. Wayne State answered with a nine-point run of their own and led 13-12 after the first period.

The second quarter featured five ties and seven lead changes. Wayne State held a 20-16 lead at the 7:50 mark following a Maggie Schulte jumper, but the Vikings rallied to take a 33-31 lead at intermission.

The Wildcats built an eight-point lead late in the third quarter at 52-44 following a Paige Ballinger free throw with 1:23 to play in the quarter and finished with a 55-50 lead after three.

Augustana scored the first seven



points of the fourth quarter to take a 57-55 lead and neither team led by more than two points with Ballinger making a layup with :25 to play in regulation for the game's 14th tie, sending the game into overtime tied at 69-69.

After Augustana took the lead in overtime on a Presley O'Farrell 3-pointer for a 72-69 lead, Wayne State scored the next five points on a Kacie O'Connor layup and 3-pointer to take their only lead at 74-72. The Vikings scored eight straight points to take the lead for good at 80-75. The Wildcats got as close as three at 81-78 on a Ballinger three-point play, but the Vikings sealed the win with a Presley O'Farrell basket.

Ballinger led Wayne State with 22 points followed by O'Connor

with 14 and Erin Norling 11. Logan O'Farrell led Augustana with 21 points and 11 rebounds followed by Paige Peterson with 20 off the bench. Presley O'Farrell and Shelby Selland added 15 and 14 points respectively.

Wayne State outrebounded Augustana 45-40 with Maggie Schulte grabbing 10 boards for the Wildcats. Norling had four of Wayne State's 13 assists and two of the team's six blocks.

On Thursday, Evelyn Knox poured in a career-high 15 points to lead Wayne State in a 89-52 non-conference win over Graceland University of Iowa at Rice Auditorium.

Wayne State never trailed in the contest, taking a 17-7 lead just under eight minutes into the contest before finishing the first quarter with a 22-11 advantage.

The Wildcats outscored the Yellowjackets 25-9 in the second quarter to take a 47-20 lead at intermission, capping 5-of-10 3-pointers to help increase the lead.

The third quarter saw the Wildcats take a 73-29 lead after producing a 26-point third quarter. Reserves dominated the play in the fourth quarter as the Wildcats

Wildcats take Golden Bears to limit in five-set marathon loss

Wayne State College battled No. 1 Concordia-St. Paul in a five-set marathon Wednesday before the host Golden Bears finished with a 18-25, 25-13, 23-25, 25-20, 15-12 win over the 21st ranked Wildcats in the opening round of the NSIC Volleyball Tournament at the Gangelhoff Center in St. Paul, Minn.

The first set saw the Wildcats trail early, then pull away late to take the opening set. After Wayne State was down 8-6, the Wildcats scored seven of the next eight points to take the lead at 13-9. Concordia-St. Paul battled back to knot the set at 13-13, but WSC went on a 8-2 run to take the lead for good thanks to three straight blocks and a Maddie Duffy service ace to highlight the run.

Senior Erin Gross had a hot hand in the first set for the Wildcats with six kills on seven attacks while Jaci Brahmmer and Katie Stephens each had three blocks.

The host Golden Bears stormed back in the second set and had 17 kills with a .500 attack percentage to even the match at 1-1, but Wayne State rebounded in the third set, never trailing while holding back a late charge by the Golden Bears to take a 2-1 lead.

Tied at 7-7, the Wildcats scored six of the next seven points for their biggest lead in the set at 13-8. Later in the set with Wayne State leading 21-18, the Golden Bears battled back and forced a 23-23 tie. But the Wildcats closed the set with a Concordia service error and kill from Tarrin Beller. Gross paced Wayne State with four kills in the set followed by Stephens and Brahmmer with three apiece.

Wayne State took an early lead in the fourth set at 9-5 to force a Concordia-St. Paul timeout, but the Golden Bears used 20 kills in the set to slowly chip away at the lead and take the fourth set to force a fifth and deciding set.

The fifth set saw Concordia-St. Paul lead from start to finish, but Wayne State rallied within one at 12-11 before the Golden Bears scored the last four points to take the match.

The Wildcats trailed early 5-1 to take their first timeout. After getting within two at 9-7, the Golden Bears scored back-to-back points to force another Wayne State timeout, trailing 11-7.

The Wildcats made one last charge at Concordia-St. Paul scoring four of the next five points with the final three coming on consecutive kills from Stephens, Alyssa Ballenger and Gross to get within one at 12-11. However, the Golden Bears stopped the Wildcat run with back-to-back kills from Brooklyn Lewis and used a kill from Hope Schiller on match point to win 15-12.

Gross led Wayne State in hitting with 17 kills and four blocks while Stephens finished with 13 kills and 15 digs along with four blocks. Megan Gebhardt produced 46 set assists with 17 digs while libero Haley Kauth was credited with a team-best 19 digs. Brahmmer notched a team-best five blocks.

Wayne State ends the year with a 19-12 record while Concordia-St. Paul will host the semifinals and finals of the NSIC Tournament this weekend while advancing with a 27-2 mark.

Wayne State ended an eight-game losing streak to Augustana with an impressive home win in the Northern Sun Conference opener for both teams Monday at Rice Auditorium.

Wayne State led for nearly the entire game, then held off a late Augustana comeback to fend off the Vikings, 80-75. The win snapped an eight-game losing streak to Augustana dating back to Jan. 15, 2013 and give the Wildcats a 3-1 record overall and 1-0 mark in the NSIC.

Augustana's Jordan Spencer opened the game with a 3-pointer for the lone Viking lead of the contest. The Wildcats made 7 of their first 11 shots of the contest and took a 17-8 lead at the 12:25 mark following an Austin Esters jumper.

The Vikings got as close as three at 20-17, but the Wildcats pushed the lead back to eight several times before finishing the first half with a 36-29 lead.

Following an Augustana missed shot, Brian Goodwin was fouled and made one of two free throws with nine seconds to play to preserve the victory.

Jacks paced Wayne State in scoring with 20 points on 7-of-13 shooting from the field and 6-for-6 at the charity stripe. Trevin Joseph added 18 points off the bench with Cornelius finishing with 13. Jordan Spencer led Augustana with a game-high 23 points followed by John Warren with 17.

The Vikings held a 38-31 advantage in rebounding over the Wildcats with Matt Cartwright grabbing eight boards for Augustana while Cornelius hauled in seven

"Our main focus in this class was to find arms that could help us right away and not only did we find arms, we found athletic kids that have a chance of playing on both sides for us."

Koch added, "We like getting the best kids out of the Omaha metro area and we feel we accomplished that. These kids work hard both in the classroom and on the field and they fit well with our program so that we can continue to try and obtain our goals every year."

Carl is a 5-foot-11, 155-pound right-handed pitcher/outfielder from Bennington High School where he is a three-year starter in baseball. Last summer in American Legion ball, he posted a 6-1 record with a 1.87 ERA and 51 strikeouts while working 45 innings and was selected to the All-Star Team in the Eastern Nebraska Baseball League. At the plate, he produced

30 RBI with one homer, six doubles and three triples. Carl has played on state runner up teams in American Legion ball in 2015 and 2016.

Herrmann is a 5-foot-11, 170-pound third baseman/right-handed pitcher from Gretna High School. He has helped Gretna win back-to-back district titles the last two seasons and in American Legion ball last summer hit .326.

Obrecht, a 6-foot-3, 170-pound right-handed pitcher/utility player from Millard North High School, is a two-year starter in baseball. Last spring, he recorded a .356 batting average while helping his team to a district title and earned Class A All-State honorable mention from the Omaha World Herald and Lincoln Journal Star.

Sailors is a 6-foot-1, 175-foot-pound right-handed pitcher/shortstop from Ralston High School where he is a four-year starter in baseball and three-year starter in football. Sailors helped Ralston to a 15-9 record last spring and a No. 8 ranking in Class B and tied for second in the state in Class B with two saves with a 3-3 record and 2.60 ERA. Quarterback Zach Osborn and wide receiver Nate Rogers were voted by league coaches to the NSIC South Division All-Conference First Team Offense, defensive back Glenn Harris was named First Team Defense, offensive lineman Mike Milenkovich received Second Team Offense honors while defensive lineman Xavier Graham, running back Rashad Trimble, wide receiver Layne Sullivan and linebacker Tyler Thomsen were each named to the Honorable Mention Team.

Osborn, a 6-foot-1, 180 pound senior quarterback from Harlan, Iowa, was a First Team selection on offense after completing 108 of 192 passes for 1,480 yards and 14 TD's with just five interceptions in a season limited to just seven games due to injury. At the time of his season-ending injury at Winona State, Osborn led the NSIC in passing yards per game, was second in passing TD's, fourth in total offense and fifth in pass efficiency. He finished his WSC career as the all-time leader in touchdown passes (86) while ranking second in passing yards (9,866) and total offense yards (10,569).

Rogers, a 6-foot-5, 190 pound senior wide receiver from South Sioux City, was a First Team honoree on offense after recording 44 catches for 577 yards (13.1 avg) with 12 touchdowns. He ranked second in the league in TD catches and was tied for eighth in receptions per game (4.0). This season, Rogers had at least one catch in every game and had a touchdown reception in nine of 11 games. He is tied with Jim Strahan (1947-49) with 27 career touchdown receptions at Wayne State.

Harris, a 6-foot-1, 180 pound senior defensive back from Kansas

City, Mo., is a First Team selection on defense after leading WSC and the NSIC with eight interceptions this season, which was tied for second in NCAA Division II. His eight interceptions also tied a single season school record that dates back to 1984. Harris also tied a single game school record with three interceptions at Augustana and had interceptions in six games this season. He tied for third in the NSIC in passes defended (12) and had 34 tackles including 27 solo stops.

Milenkovich, a 6-foot-5, 305 pound junior offensive lineman from Omaha, received Second Team honors on offense after being an Honorable Mention selection last season. He started 10 games this season at left tackle on the Wildcat offensive line and is a three-year starter for WSC.

Graham, a 5-foot-10, 285 pound junior from Omaha, was an Honorable Mention selection after recording 31 tackles this season. He led the team in sacks (3.5-foot-14) and tied for the team lead in tackles for loss (7.5-foot-25) while playing all 11 games at nose guard. Graham had a season-best six tackles with one tackle for loss at No. 1 Minnesota State and was credited with two tackles for loss and one sack vs. No. 18 Sioux Falls. He also had two quarterback hurries and one blocked kick on special teams.

Trimble, a 6-foot-0, 225 pound senior running back from Bellevue, collected Honorable Mention recognition after leading the Wildcats in rushing for a second straight season. He accounted for 833 yards on 165 carries (5.0 avg) with six touchdowns this season and ranked sixth in the NSIC in rushing yards per game (75.7). Trimble had two 100-yard games this season, highlighted by a career-best 185 yards and one TD at Minnesota Crookston. He also recorded 159 yards on 25 carries and one score vs. Southwest Minnesota State.

Sullivan, a 6-foot-1, 190-pound junior wide receiver from Cedar Rapids, Iowa, was an Honorable Mention selection after leading the Wildcats in receiving this season with 55 catches for 603 yards and four touchdowns. He ranked fifth in the NSIC in receptions per game (5.00), highlighted by career-highs of 14 catches for 151 yards vs. Minnesota Duluth.

Thomsen, a 6-foot-1, 220-pound sophomore linebacker from Fremont, was leading Wayne State in tackles and ranked sixth in the NSIC in tackles per game until suffering a season-ending injury in the Sioux Falls game Oct. 12. He produced 59 tackles (31 solo) with six tackles for loss (22 yds) and two sacks for 16 yards with one forced fumble, one interception, three quarterback hurries and three pass breakups.

Wayne State finished the season at 6-5 overall and fourth in the NSIC South with a 4-3 divisional mark. It was the first winning season for the Wildcats since 2012.

Mathews recorded averages of .432 as a sophomore and .393 in her freshman season.

"Parker is a very strong, disciplined infielder with a big bat," stated Manson. "She is very versatile and will have the opportunity to contribute in many different positions for us."

Smith is a 5-foot-10 third baseman/outfielder from Linn-Mar High School in Iowa and plays club ball for the Iowa Premier Gold Team. She played on the Iowa USSSA National Championship 15-foot-under team and was se-

1. Have family members update their personal family history information for the historian in the family and remember to take some photos.
2. Have the youth interview a family member to share a childhood memory, family tradition, fun vacation, etc.
3. Pass on a special tradition as a

gift such as a family making copies of all the stories, poems, and songs that were part of their family's holiday history for the next generation to continue the traditions.

4. Write stories about your childhood or your children's growing up years.
5. Give a small heirloom with a written history as a gift.
6. Choose a few old photos and accompany them with a story about the events and people shown.
7. Organize your family's favorite recipes into a cookbook and then share with others. Maybe even scan some that are handwritten by loved ones.

There are several activities based on the six qualities identified through the American Family Strengths Inventory by Dr. DeFraim and Dr. Nick Stinnett.

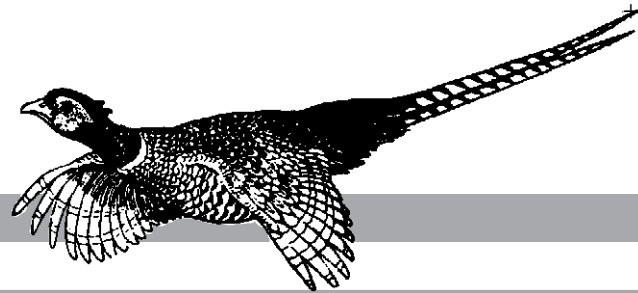

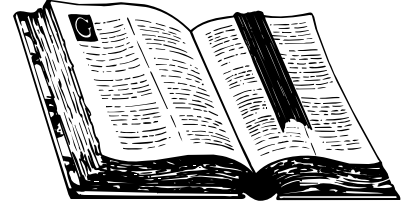

The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, Feb. 13 at 4:30 p.m.

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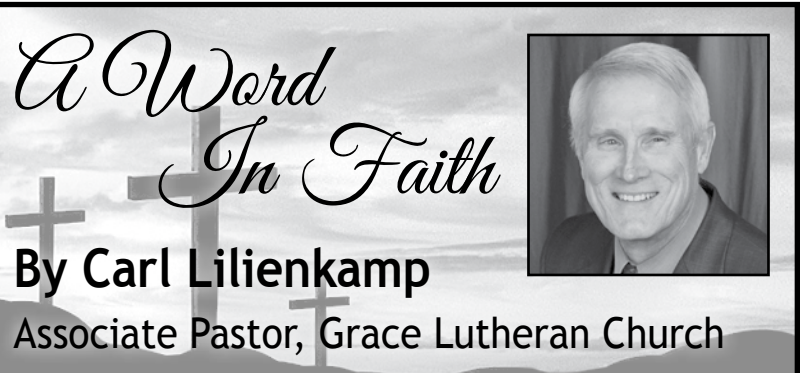
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Obey God during the 'between' time

Some time ago, The New York Post reported that a 23-year-old man was struck by an oncoming subway train. Why? He leaned over the 34th Street Station track to watch for the oncoming train, not comprehending that the train was in fact coming from the other direction! The result: Subway Train-1; Hapless Critically Injured Man--0. Subway systems are generally safe except for those careless individuals who drop purses and cell phones on tracks and jump in harm's way to retrieve them. A few hundred pounds of flesh and blood is no match against a few hundred tons of moving glass and steel. To ride safely you need to observe the signs and be consciously aware of your surroundings. So it is in the Last Days.

Actually as next Sunday will be the Last Sunday of the Church Year, the Church turns its attention of the End of Time and Judgment Day. Christ bore our sin on the cross and rose on the third day as proof of the Father's acceptance of His work. Jesus' return on Judgment Day completes the Redemption cycle of Jesus' ministry. We now live in the time "between" Jesus' earthly ministry and His return on the Last Day.

Living in the time "between", it is important that we know the



facts concerning His return. Is knowing the signs of the times important? According to Jesus, Yes. Matthew 16:2-3, "He answered and said to them, 'When it is evening you say, 'It will be fair weather, for the sky is red'; in the morning, 'It will be foul weather today, for the sky is red and threatening.' Hypocrites! You know how to discern the face of the sky, but you cannot discern the signs of the times!'"

For Christians the blessing of the Last Day is the fulfillment of God's promises. The Apostle Paul wrote, in Titus 4:8, "Finally, there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will give to me on that Day, and not to me only but also to all who have loved His appearing." Acts 1:7-10, "And He (Jesus) said to them, 'It is not for you to know times or seasons which the Father has put in His own authority. But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the

earth.' Now when He had spoken these things, while they watched, He was taken up, and a cloud received Him out of their sight. And (while they were looking) steadfastly toward heaven... He went up..."

If we are to obey God during this time "in between", then we need to pay attention to this neglected admonition, "It is not for you to know times or seasons," and refocus on the task at hand, namely, "and you shall be witnesses to Me." God loved the world so that all could know Jesus as their personal Savior from sin. During this time "in between" we must be witnesses of Jesus, because those who keep looking down the wrong tracks are going to be pulverized unaware when the end arrives. Start living for the appearing of Christ the King by believing in Him as your Lord and Savior and witnessing of Him to others.

To be preoccupied with looking down any other track is an invitation to sure personal disaster. Matthew 24:30, "Then the sign of the Son of Man will appear in heaven, and then all the tribes of the earth will mourn, and they will see the Son of Man coming on the clouds of heaven with power and great glory!"

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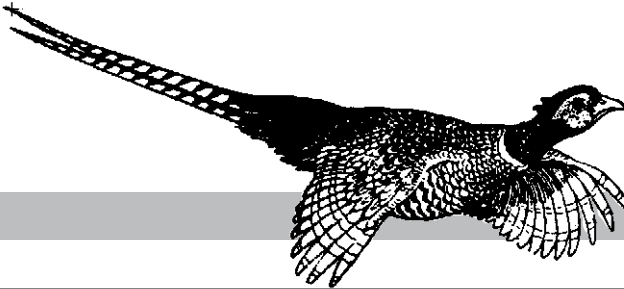
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Plenty to be thankful for this Thanksgiving

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Time again to prepare for winter bird feeding, mulching

Here is my annual column on winter bird feeding and mulching. I hope it is still useful.

If you're like me, you enjoy feeding birds during the winter. When feeding birds during winter, bird watching can be done from the warmth of the home. Hopefully this will increase interest and encourage outdoor bird watching during the warmer months.

Common winter birds likely to visit feeders in Nebraska include chickadees, blue jays, cardinals, goldfinches, dark eyed juncos, tree sparrows, mourning doves and several kinds of woodpeckers. Place bird feeding stations where they are protected from strong winter winds. Locations where trees and shrubs are growing nearby are good, especially if the plants are evergreens. Plants provide protective cover and perching sites.

Use different types of feeders to increase the chance of attracting a variety of birds. Each type of feeder attracts certain birds. For instance, goldfinches are easier to attract if

fed niger thistle seed in a sock or plexiglass tube feeder. Suet feeders, usually made from plastic-coated wire, are used to hold chunks of suet. Woodpeckers and nuthatches love suet. Many people like to make

and design their own feeders.

There are many kinds of bird seed, but some are much better than others for attracting birds. For general purposes, a mixture of equal parts sunflower seed, millet and cracked corn is an excellent seed mix. Local hardware stores have good birdseed mixes available to buy by the bag. Almost all birds will utilize sunflower seeds, even small birds like chickadees, and sunflower seeds pack plenty of energy so I tend to add more sunflowers to my mix. I buy a bag of sunflower seeds and add some to my bird mix to bring the level of sunflowers to about 75 to 85 percent.

Some seeds are common in bird feed mixes, but are not especially good for attracting birds. Avoid seed mixes with high proportions of milo, wheat, oats, rice and rapped seed. Birds won't eat most of these undesirable seeds making the bargain price not such a great deal.

Erratic winter temperatures can cause soil to freeze and thaw. As

soil alternates between freezing and thawing, the ground contracts and expands. This is referred to as soil heaving and it can create problems for plant roots; especially newly planted trees, shrubs and perennials that do not have well-established roots.

Contraction and expansion of soil shifts plant roots, tearing or leaving them without good soil contact so they can dry out and die. Some plants have even been heaved up out of the soil so roots, which are not very hardy, are exposed to cold temperatures and plants are killed.

To prevent this, winter mulching is recommended for fall planted or recently divided perennial flowers. A six to 12 inch layer of mulch, such as coarse leaves or wood chips, placed over plants after the soil freezes, will help prevent alternate freezing and thawing of soil, and damage to newly planted or divided plants. Now is the time to put on your mulch, if you haven't already.

NWCA Fall Training was the third opportunity of 2017 to obtain required continuing education, as defined in the Nebraska Noxious Weed Act. Each superintendent must answer roll call twice a day, complete and pass the exam at the end of each day to receive his or her 10 hours of continuing education credit.

The final opportunity for 2017 is the Nebraska Association of County Officials (NACO) Conference in Kearney Wednesday and Thursday, Dec. 13-14.

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LENRD now receiving applications for new irrigated acres

Farmers within the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) boundaries, will have an opportunity to apply for new irrigated acres for 2018.

LENRD Assistant General Manager, Brian Bruckner, said, "After much debate during their October meeting, the board discussed allowing for the approval of standard variances district-wide, utilizing a map entitled "Classification 4" provided by the Flatwater Group, and only allow consideration for approval of parcels that fall within the top five categories from the Potential for Development map legend."

The board voted to allow up to 2,500 acres of new groundwater irrigation development in the Hydrologically Connected or 10/50 Area, and to allow up to 2,500 acres of new groundwater irrigation development in the Non-Hydrologically Connected or Non 10/50 Area under the district's standard variance process for 2018.

Bruckner added, "The board suggested an annual limit on the amount of groundwater withdrawal from wells associated with approved variances, determined by board policy, which is subject to future modification if conditions warrant. In addition, a minimum soil score of 90 must be met for any standard variance to be considered for approval."

The board established a sign-up period to receive applications for Standard Variances. The district will receive applications for standard variances until Dec. 15.

Standard variance requests will only be considered for approval from areas within the district that fall within the top five Potential for Development categories on the Classification 4 Map, as provided by Flatwater Group. Standard variances will not be available in the Quantity Subareas already defined. To view the map, visit www.lenrd.org/latest-news/

American Broadband provides basic and enhanced telecommunications services within its service area. Basic services are offered at the following rates:

Single Party Residence Service	\$19.95/month
Single Party Business Service	\$30.00/month

Local residence and business service includes voice grade access to the public telephone network; minutes of use for local service provided at no additional charge; access to 911 emergency services; and toll limitation for qualifying low-income consumers.

The Nebraska Telephone Assistance Program (NTAP) is available for qualifying customers. This program provides for monthly service discounts on telephone service. NTAP reduces the cost of local phone service by up to \$12.75 per month. Toll blocking at no charge and reduced deposits are also available through NTAP. NTAP is administered by the Nebraska Public Service Commission.

NTAP and Toll Blocking support is available from American Broadband. These programs provide discounts to eligible low-income consumers to help them establish and maintain telephone service.

NTAP assistance lowers the cost of basic, monthly local telephone service. Eligible consumers can receive up to \$12.75 per month in discounts. In addition, the Federal Universal Service Charge is not assessed to consumers participating in Lifeline.

Toll Blocking prevents the placement of all long distance calls for which a subscriber would be charged. Toll blocking is available to eligible consumers at no cost. Also, by choosing this option, consumers are usually not charged a deposit.

To qualify for NTAP, subscribers must either have an income that is at or below 135% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines, or the subscriber, one or more of the subscriber's dependents, or the subscriber's household must receive benefits from one of the following assistance programs:

- Federal Public Housing Assistance (Section 8);
- Medicaid;
- Children's Health Insurance Program/Kids Connection (SAM, MAC or EMAC);

Tribal Link Up reduces the cost of initiating new telephone service by providing a \$30 credit. Eligible consumers also qualify for a deferred payment schedule for remaining costs of up to \$200.

American Broadband's voice service is a Lifeline-supported service. Only eligible consumers may enroll in the Lifeline program.
