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Resignations accepted by board of education

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The resignations, with regrets, of three teachers at Wayne Community Schools were accepted during Monday's meeting of the Wayne Community Schools' Board of Education.

Diane Long will retire after 33 years of teaching fifth grade.

Karen Schardt will retire after 40 years of teaching Family and Consumer Science classes. Fourteen of those years have been at Wayne Community Schools.

Doris Meyer will retire at the end of the 2017-2018 school year. She has taught math classes at Wayne High School for 26 years.

The board also approved the second reading of the school's Drone Policy, which has been reviewed by the Perry Law firm.

Superintendent Mark Lenihan updated the board on the district's Rule 10 Safety Audit.

He told the board that audit revolved more around the district's safety plan, rather than actual safety issues in the buildings. (That aspect is handled by the school's insurance company). He said the audit gave the school suggestions on possible changes and focused on "How prepared are you?" Lenihan said the school regularly conducts drills and in addition to the plan for dealing with an emergency at the school, has a plan to be notified if anything happens at Wayne State College.

Board members approved the superintendent's contract for the 2018-2019 school year with a 1.7 percent increase in the total package.

Superintendent Lenihan thanked the board for "allowing me to serve the district."

A first draft of the 2018-2019 school calendar was presented to the board.

Classes are scheduled to begin Wednesday, Aug. 15. Christmas break will take place from Dec. 24 through Jan. 7 and graduation is set for Saturday, May 11. The last day of school for the 2018-2019 school year has tentatively been set for Friday, May 24. The actual date will be set



at the April board meeting.

Each of the administrators presented information to the board on activities that have taken place in the last month.

Athletic Director Dennis Dolliver's report included information on a digital trophy case. The Wayne Athletic Boosters are considering the purchase of this device for the school and benefits of it were discussed.

During committee reports, it was noted that the building renovation is not yet complete. Work will be done over the Christmas break in an effort to complete the work and fix some issues that have been discovered.

Board members also looked at the results of student proficiency in recent tests.

It was noted that while students rankings are lower, Wayne Community Schools' students still achieved higher scores than the state average.

Also discussed was how the district is best able to measure student achievement in regards to grades correlating with ACT scores.

Following Monday's regular meeting and the monthly Honor Coffee, the board conducted a board retreat focusing on board goals, including student achievement, facilities and finance and communication.

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education will next meet in regular session on Monday, Jan. 8 at 5 p.m. in the junior-senior high school library.

Informational meeting provides answers, sparks more questions

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A lengthy informational meeting was held last night at the Wayne Fire Hall from 6 - 7:30 p.m. The public had been invited to come ask questions specific to the NextEra Sholes Wind Energy Center slated for construction during the incoming year.

Set up as a question and answer session, Dr. Chuck Parker, a professor at WSC and seasoned moderator, asked audience members to write their questions on a note card and pass them back to him. This format enabled the most amount of questions to be asked, keeping the answers direct and focused on the topic at hand. The panel of experts were not only NextEra employees but a UNL Extension agent and several independent contractors.

Rich Lampeter of Epsilon Associates, Inc., Chris Ollson of Ollson Environmental Health Management, Phil Clement, NextEra project manager of Sholes Wind Energy Center, Chris Jorgenson with Olsson Associates, John Hay with UNL Extension Office and Rip Leisure with NextEra Energy Resources made up the panel however several other NextEra employees sat in the audience as well.

Doug Nelson, an area farmer who opposes the wind farm introduced the project manager Phil Clement as a person he has had many passionate debates with and also as someone he respects. Nelson asked for a professional and productive discussion to kick off the Q&A session.

Questions such as the impact of the turbines on wildlife, on hunting, on livestock and other agriculture aspects were asked and answered in part by various members of the panel as were questions about the health and safety of those in the immediate vicinity.

According to panel members, livestock and wildlife are undeterred by the towers. Jorgenson, a wildlife biologist, discussed how there are studies conducted, both pre and post construction and while most turbines are going in areas that aren't considered habitat, those that do have been monitored and there has been no impact seen. The same can be said for livestock, in fact panel member Leisure said many areas with cattle have seen the herds follow the shadow cast by the turbine to stay cool in the summer.

Ollson, an environmental health specialist and Lampeter, a representative from an environmental firm with a specialty in light and sound, discussed the health and safety factors brought up regarding the flicker and noise experienced by those immediately closest to the towers.

According to Ollson, the shadow flicker -- what happens when the sun and the tower are aligned in a position that casts a shadow onto a structure as the blades move -- amounts to no more than 30 hours a year for those closest to a tower. This is a self-imposed regulation NextEra is following even though there is no zoning to keep them from doing otherwise. He also assured that the flicker speed is simply not fast enough to cause health problems.

"They don't flicker fast enough to cause seizures or migraines," Ollson said.

Lampeter discussed the sound coming from the turbines, giving ballpark figures for the amount of noise. While there are a lot of factors involved, the noise level at the minimum setback NextEra allows (1,400 ft) is roughly 50 decibels on the high end and gradually drops as distance increases. Sound equivalents

As a part of the annual "Adopt-A-Family" program, Haven House works with local community members, groups, busi-

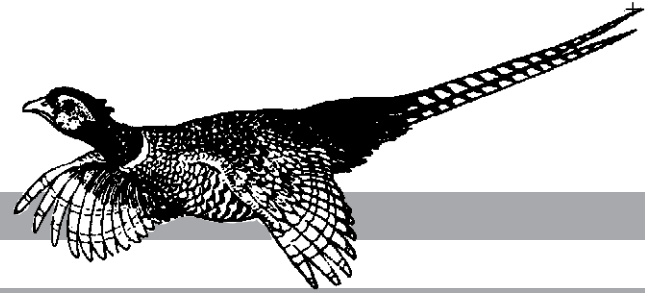
nesses and organizations to provide survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault Christmas gifts to put under their tree.

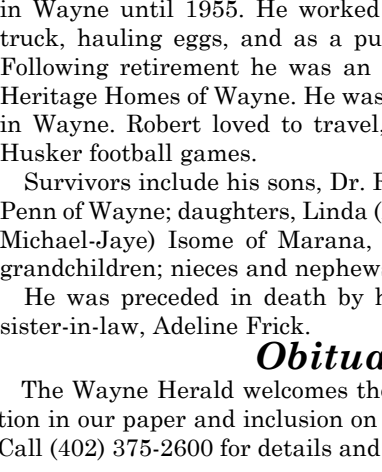
Robert Francis Penn

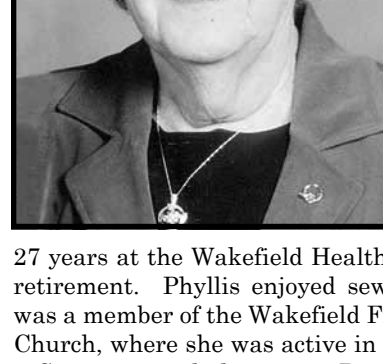
Phyllis I. Salmon, 82, of Wakefield died Friday, Dec. 8, 2017 at Faith Regional Hospital in Norfolk.

to 50 decibels would be similar to having a conversation in your home with someone or your refrigerator running. In comparison, a passing diesel truck or snow blower is roughly 85 decibels and a library setting or bird calls registers around 30 decibels.

Another question posed to the panel was in regards to the lights required by the Federal Aviation Administration.

Clement's answer outlined the steps the company is required to take, which includes submitting a

site plan to the FAA for review. The FAA then sets the guidelines it will require for this specific project.

Several note cards came to Dr. Parker asking about the utilization of the turbines, or how often they would be on versus off.

Clement explained that while there are times of periodic maintenance, unless there is no wind, the majority of the wind turbines would be moving. If the sustained wind is too strong, Clement explained that the turbine's computer shuts it off as a safety precaution.

Clement discussed the employ-

ment of people from the area to work full time on the wind farm after it was constructed and he also brought up that the company was hoping to work with Wayne State College and with Northeast Community College in their respective wind energy projects.

Some audience members argued before the meeting was over that it was one-sided and they weren't being heard, and were reminded that this was intended as an informational meeting regarding the Sholes project, not a debate on wind energy.

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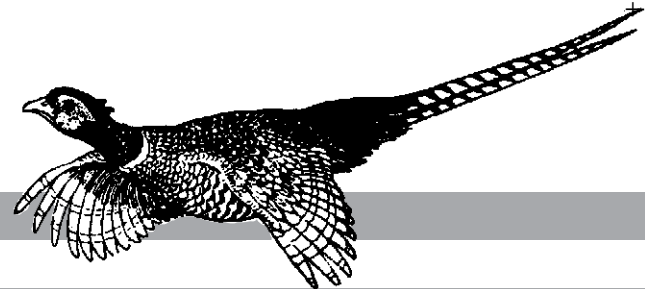

Wayne State used a balanced attack to beat University of Mary on Friday, but saw their upset hopes fall a couple of seconds short the following evening against Minot State.

Jordan Cornelius shot 8-of-10 from the field, including 4-of-6 from 3-point range, to finish with a season-high 20 points and help the Wildcats to the easy win.

Cornelius wasted no time getting the Wildcats going early on, scoring 10 of the team's first 12 points in the first five minutes to help Wayne State to a 12-2 lead and take the lead for good.

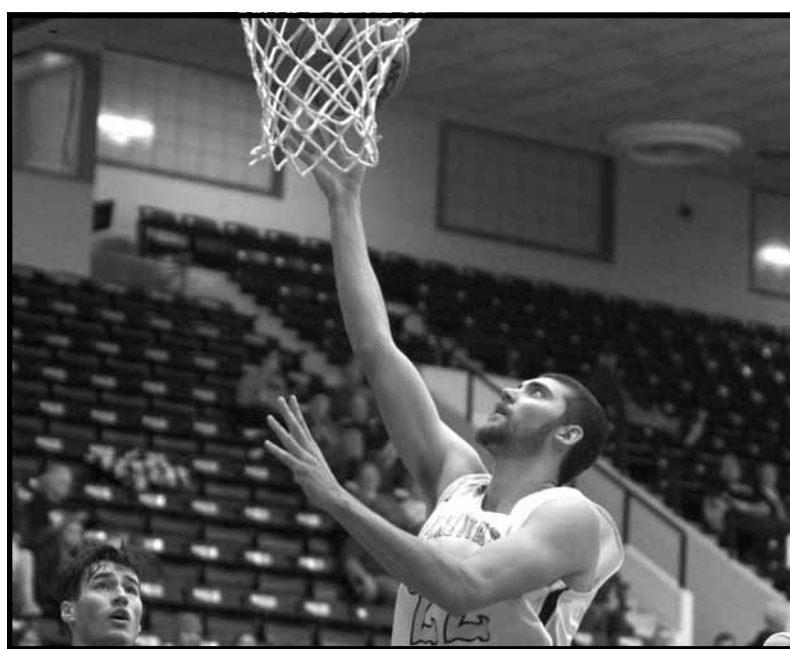
Mary got within six midway through the first half, but a 10-0 run by the Wildcats gave them a 28-12 advantage. Jacks complimented Cornelius' effort with 15 points and Vance Janssen also hit for double digits with 13 points. Brian Goodwin led the team with eight rebounds while Jacks added two. Jacks had six assists and Austin Esters recorded four.

Wayne State came within two seconds of an upset against conference leader Minot State, but the Dragons converted two late free throws to escape Rice Auditorium with a 69-68 win.

Minot State's Tyler Rudolph drained two free throws with 1.8 seconds left to help the 10-1 Dragons escape with the win, dropping Wayne State to 7-4 overall and 3-2 in NSIC play.

The Beavers scored the first 13 points of the game to force the Wildcats to play catchup most of the night. Tony Bonner got Wayne State on the board at the 13:50 mark with a basket, and Minot State would lead 22-8 before the Wildcats got their first run of the game going, capping a 12-0 rally with a Trevin Joseph 3-pointer to make it 22-20 with eight minutes to go in the first half.

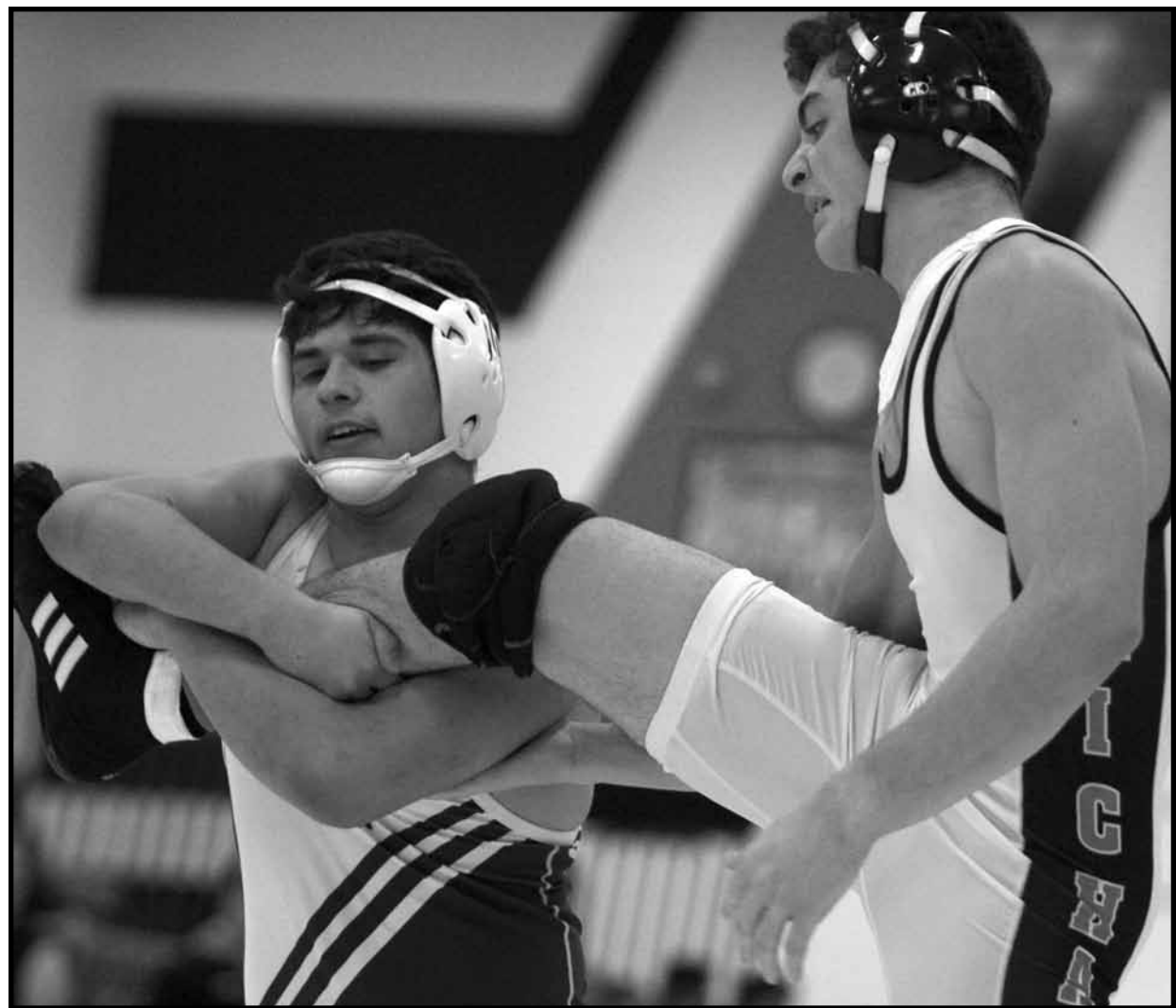
The Wildcats led by as many as 29 in the second half and cruised to the easy win over the Lancers and improve to 8-4 on the season.

The Christian Holiday Calendar explained

According to the authority of retail America, Christmas now officially starts the day after Halloween. Most reasonable adults in this country, however, find this method of marking time annoying, at best. What's the point in celebrating Christmas before Thanksgiving day? In order to help you combat this Christmas creep, I'm including the liturgical calendar of the ancient Christian church, along with my suggestions on how you can put together your own counter-cultural traditions.

After Christ the King Sunday, usually the last Sunday of November, the church prepares for the 25th of December, not with red and green, but with blue or purple for the season of Advent. Advent lasts four weeks and many churches even offer Wednesday night Advent worship. But even if your congregation doesn't gather for mid-week Advent services, you can mark the time at home with an Advent calendar and an Advent wreath. It can be especially meaningful to light a candle and say a prayer for Advent before you eat supper each night.

Another Advent tradition you might want to start at home, is the celebration of Saint Nicholas of Myra, whose feast day is Dec. 6. The inspiration of Santa Claus, Saint Nicholas was a real person, a bishop of Myra in Turkey during the fourth century. He even helped write the Nicene Creed! He was famous for his care and concern for poor people in Myra, especially children. I suggest encouraging your children to pick out a toy to give away or help them empty their piggy bank and donate to a local charity in honor of Saint Nick.

Well there you have it! While retail stores are taking down Christmas decorations on the 26th and putting up hearts for Valentines, you have these suggestions to help you observe the season in a truly traditional way. Happy Advent. Merry Christmas. And a Blessed Epiphany to all!

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5 Financial Steps to Take Before the New Year

December is a great time to review your finances and get ready for a fresh start in the new year. Here are five key financial moves that are worth reviewing before year end:

- 1. Review your goals and financial progress**
If you've laid out a plan to achieve your key goals such as retirement or saving for a child's education, now is a good time to measure your progress. Are you on track or do you need to make adjustments? If you don't have a clear plan, now is a good time to establish one for 2018.
- 2. Take full advantage of your retirement savings opportunities**
If you participate in a workplace savings plan, such as a 401(k) or 403(b), try to maximize your pre-tax contributions. In 2017, you can defer up to \$18,000 per year or \$24,000 per year for those 50 and older, into a retirement plan. Your contribution reduces your pre-tax income, providing an immediate tax savings, while any earnings in the account grow on a tax-deferred (for traditional retirement plans) or tax-free (for Roth retirement plans) basis.
If you have an individual retirement account (IRA), you have until the April 17, 2018 tax filing deadline to make traditional or Roth contributions for 2017. The sooner you do so, the sooner those dollars can be invested and start building for the future on a tax-deferred basis. You can contribute up to \$5,500 per year of your taxable compensation; up to \$6,500 for those 50 and older. Note that contributions for the 2018 tax year can be made as early as January 1, 2018.
- 3. Assess your investment portfolio**
Are you properly positioned in your investments? Given the solid performance delivered by the stock market in 2017, many may discover their portfolios are overweight in equities. Determine whether it may be time to re-balance your portfolio to avoid taking on too much risk for your comfort level.
For your taxable investments, consider the potential tax consequences before making any decisions about selling positions that could generate a capital gain. Similarly, you could sell positions that will generate a capital loss to offset other gains and potentially reduce your tax burden. First consult with your investment and tax advisors to determine the best strategy for your situation.
- 4. Check on mutual fund distributions**
Most mutual funds pay out distributions (reflecting realized capital gains and dividends earned from securities held in the fund) by the end of the year. Check to see what to expect from funds you own, particularly in taxable accounts. If you are considering moving money into a new fund, you may want to wait until the fund has paid its distribution so you don't inherit a taxable gain shortly after you invest.
- 5. Make timely charitable donations**
If you itemize deductions on your taxes, you can generally deduct the cash or the fair market value of goods donated to a qualified nonprofit. The contributions must occur before the end of the year to be included on your 2017 tax return as a qualified deduction. Be sure to maintain proper documentation.

Sylvia's freshman year in high school, Brad Weber was her instrumental music instructor. Weber, his wife, Deb and several members of his family attended the concert.



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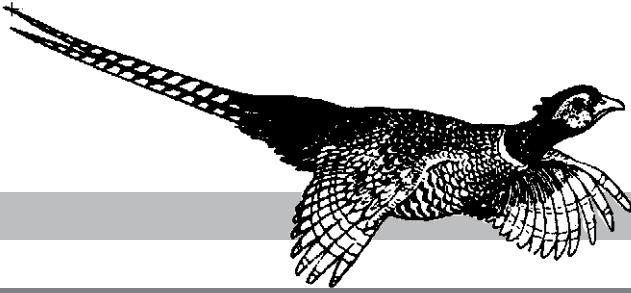
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Grateful for little things this year

LENRD to hold a public hearing

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) will hold a public hearing on Thursday, Dec. 21 at 7:30 p.m.

The purpose of the hearing is to receive public comment on proposed amendments to the LENRD's groundwater management area rules and regulations (Rules). The hearing will be in the LENRD board room in the Lifelong Learning Center on the campus of Northeast Community College in Norfolk.

LENRD Assistant General Manager, Brian Bruckner, said, "With this amendment, the LENRD proposes to adopt a new water transfer rule that would allow the district to consider transfer of certified irrigated acres and other uses of wa-

ter within the district. The proposed changes to the Rules do not include the designation of or a modification to the boundaries of the LENRD's groundwater management area. The entire district will be impacted by these proposed modifications to the LENRD's Rules."

The full text of the proposed amended Rules is available at the district office located at 601 East Benjamin Ave., Suite 101 in Norfolk, as well as on the district's website at www.lenrd.org/latest-news

Any interested person may appear at the hearing and present written or oral testimony concerning this matter. Testimony relevant to the purposes of the hearing may also be submitted in writing to the LENRD.
