During Monday's meeting, the board received some good news in regard to the district's health and dental insurance.

There will be no increase in either the district's health or dental insurance.

Steve Muir with Elkhorn Valley Agency, told the board that this was something he "is not sure has ever happened before." He said the zero percent increase will involve the district's coverage from Sept. 1, 2018 through Aug. 31, 2019.

The board thanked Muir for the work he has done in past years and the support he offers to the district.

Wayne State students spend time abroad over Christmas break to spread the gospel

For most, spending their Christmas break relatively undisturbed is idyllic. Dividing days between work and time with family or time with the television remote is as eventful as many prefer it

That's not the case for some students at Wayne State College. Eight WSC students spent their Christmas holiday overseas performing and dancing or were they working as missionaries? The answer is both.

WSC students joined others from Youth With a Mission (YWAM) in Hong Kong for two weeks. While there, the group went through training for three days prior to going out into the streets.

Those three days of training included intense sessions of dance and performance routines intermixed with praying and preparing for what the students might come into contact with.

"The training really was learning dances and dramas because we were 'professional international dancers and actors' which with only three days of training we really weren't," said WSC student Ethan Berck. "We spent a lot of hours practicing during our training. And some of the other training was how to show your faith and some cultural differences that we would come in contact with."

Hong Kong, once a British colony, is now part of China. While the city is fairly autonomous at this point, the integration of communism can be seen. It isn't at the levels of mainland China yet, however, that will likely change.

"I never felt unsafe while I was there," said Berck. "In 50 years I don't know what will happen because China is really changing things in Hong Kong.'

Hong Kong was peaceably handed over to China on July 1, 1997 after years of negotiations between Britain and China following the 1898 decision to allow Britain another 99 years of ruling.

Berck was one of eight WSC students who visited Hong Kong as a performer and dancer with an ulterior motive - to spread the gospel.

"We went into these dark places and we saw people's lives change. Jesus is so faithful. He cares about all these people, all the broken people."

The group Berck went to Hong Kong with spent their time in a 900 year old village.

Applications can be submitted for early ballots by mail

on voting in the 2018 primary will soon be able to request an early ballot by mail. Secretary of State John Gale says Jan. 14 is the first day that applications will be accepted at county offices. The first round of ballots will be mailed out on April 9.

"Counties receiving early voting requests will start to accumulate a list," Gale explained. "Those ballots will be among the first out the door come April."

Gale noted that a few counties also maintain what is known as a permanent absentee list, which the case of Lancaster County, each voter on the list is mailed a postcard, which can be returned by the voter, indicating that he or she would like to receive a ballot by

Only in precincts that are designated as all-mail will voters automatically receive a ballot by mail for the primary. To date, there are 83 all-mail precincts in 15 counties. That includes 10 new mail-only precincts approved ahead of the primary in Boone, Dawes, Harlan, Knox, Phelps and Stanton counties. By law, by mail precincts are located in counties that have a population

Those who wish to get a jump of less than 10,000.

"The county election official must make an application to my office explaining the reasons for having a precinct converted from a polling place to mail," said Gale. "Some are approved and others are not. Precincts that have made the switch are those that are located in rural areas, not easily accessible by paved roads, may have limited access for people with disabilities and are not within a convenient travel distance for voters.'

Gale noted that voter registration is again on a steady climb leading allows them to reach out to voters up to the primary election. "It is not who have indicated a preference at the level reached in last year's to vote by mail. "For example, in presidential election, but we have received more than 8,000 new reg istrations since March 2017."

Currently, voter registration is at 1,195,069.

Anyone wishing to complete an early ballot application can find one on the Secretary of State's website: www.sos.ne.gov. They are available in English and Spanish. Applications must be returned to the county election office in which the voter is registered, either by mail or in person. In addition to voting early by mail, voters will be able to vote early, in person at their county election office starting April

"It's one of the original villages in Hong Kong and it was the closest thing to Nebraska as you could get to in Hong Kong. And there were still people everywhere but it was the country side."

While serving Berck and his counterparts encountered some amazing things. One story Berck shared was that

of a homeless man they hoped to speak with.

"In one of the districts there's this massive bridge and under this bridge there's a bunch of makeshift houses that the homeless people have constructed using things out of the garbage." Berck went on to say, "We were

going to do a performance in this area for the homeless people and the refugees and we were handing out cookies and inviting them. We were just knocking on their houses telling them to come watch us perform and hear the meaning of Christmas and people were very excited."

"There was a home with two older gentlemen and one of them said he couldn't go because of his knee. We asked if we could pray for him and he say yes. So we're praying and praying and we get done and our translator said he says it feels a little bit better so we decided we were going to pray one more time and this time – it was amazing. He was healed. He was able to stand up, he was able to come to our performance and it was witnessed by

all these people around." That was just one of the numerous stories the students got to be a part of and witness while they were in Hong Kong.

Berck has many stories from his time serving in mainland China which he did last year over Christmas break, or from his time in India, Qatar and Haiti to name a few places. During his time abroad what he's seen has left a serious impact on him.

"I've seen too many people's lives change to not be convinced."

Which is why he chose the major of international business at WSC. Berck plans to continue working with missions in countries that many have no desire to go to.

"The Lord has done amazing work in my life and I'm intentional about sharing the gospel," he said. "I really feel called to serve in the Middle East or in North Korea.

When asked if the thought of what could happen to him scared him, Berck's response leaves no doubt about his devotion to Christ.

"Once upon a time I would have said yes but the Lord is more powerful than the oppression and I want to bring that light to the darkness."





Sports Winside boys on fire after claiming tourney title

Don't look now, but the Winside boys basketball team is on a roll.

After dropping a tough road game at Walthill earlier in the week, the Wildcats turned things around and posted big wins over conference rivals Wynot and Hartington-Newcastle to take the first-place trophy in the Hartington Post-Holiday Tourna-

Winside opened the tournament Friday with an exciting overtime win over Wynot, breaking a long losing streak to the Blue Devils with a 54-53 overtime decision at Wynot High School.

The Blue Devils got out to an early sevenpoint advantage, but the Wildcats responded to take a 25-23 lead into the locker room.

The game was tight after that and the Blue Devils were able to force the extra session, but two late foul shots gave Winside the exciting win.

In Saturday's finals at Hartington, Billy Chappell returned to the lineup and had three points off the bench, which proved to be the margin of victory as Winside beat the host Wildcats, 46-43.

Winside built an eight-point halftime advantage, only to see the hosts bounce back to cut the deficit to a single point going to the final period. Winside's defense came through and the visiting Wildcats hung on for the exciting win and the first-place tro-

Vyborny led the Winside netters with 17 points and Watters added 12 points. Brogren put in nine, Chappel and Kampa each had three and Colton Jensen scored two

In action Tuesday, Winside dropped a 60-49 decision at Walthill.

The Wildcats trailed by double digits at the half, but came back to make a game of it before Walthill regained control and claimed the 11-point win.

Watters and Brogren both had 14 points, Jensen had 10, Vyborny scored eight and Kampa had three.

Wildcat women pick up two home wins The Wayne State women's basketball team improved to 14-4

overall and 8-2 in the NSIC after winning a pair of games at home over the weekend. On Friday, the Wildcats pulled

away in the second half for a 72-47 win over Concordia-St. Paul at Rice Auditorium.

Both teams' leading scorer spent the night in foul trouble, resulting in other players to contribute for both teams. Wayne State's Paige Ballinger picked up two fouls at the 6:37 mark of the first quarter, sending her to the bench for the rest of the half, while Concordia-St. Paul's Anna Schmitt recorded her third foul at the 7:58 mark of the second quarter, sending her to the bench for the remainder of the

Wayne State jumped out to an early 8-2 lead, but then went cold from the floor as the Golden Bears finished the quarter on a 12-2 run to give Concordia-St. Paul a 14-10 first quarter lead.

The Wildcats then opened the second quarter on a 19-0 run, giving Wayne State a 29-14 lead on their way to a 34-23 halftime advantage.

After the Wildcats opened the second half with a basket from Ballinger to take a 36-23 lead, Concordia-St. Paul scored the next seven points and got within six at 36-30. The Wildcats then closed the quarter strong and took a 49-

36 lead before using a 10-1 run to start the fourth quarter that put the game out of reach.

Erin Norling finished with a game-high 17 points to lead Wayne State in scoring, going 8-of-14 from the field. Halley Busse also hit double digits with 12 points. Anna Schmitt paced Concordia-St. Paul with 13 points followed by Kayla Miller and Brianna Miller with 12 and 10, respectively. Ballinger grabbed seven boards for the Wild-

On Saturday, Wayne State made a season-high 30 free throws while Paige Ballinger and Andrea Larson led the Wildcats to a 92-73 victory over Minnesota State.

The first half was a high-scoring contest as Wayne State scored its second-highest total in a quarter this season in the opening stanza to take a 31-25 lead thanks to 12of-22 shooting.

After Minnesota State scored the first six points of the second quarter to even the score at 31-31, Wayne STate went on a 13-3 run and took their first double-digit lead of the night at 44-34 on a layup from Evelyn Knox at the 3:06 mark of the second quarter.

The Wildcats used a Maggie Lowe 3-pointer with :53 left to take their biggest lead of the first half into the locker room at 51-40. It was the second-most points scored in a half this season by WSC, one short of the 52 scored against Wisconsin-Parkside on Nov. 5.

Both teams started sluggish in the third quarter, but Wayne State still outscored the Mayericks 20-12 to take a 71-52 lead after three quarters. A Haley Vesey trey at the 2:33 mark gave the Wildcats their biggest lead of the quarter at

Wayne State took their biggest lead of the game at 76-52 with 9:25 remaining on a pair of free throws and cruised to the win over the

Ballinger and Larson each had 21 points to lead the Wildcats in the win. Larson was 5-of-7 from the field and 11-for-15 at the charity stripe while Ballinger was 6-of-12 from the floor and a perfect 12of-12 at the free throw line. Maggie Schulte also hit double digits with 13 points, while Vesey added 11 points without missing a shot, going 3-for-3 from the field with two 3-pointers, and also 3-for-3 at the

Ballinger hauled in eight boards and blocked three shots to lead the Wildcats, while Schulte had five







The Wildcats never trailed in the contest, taking a 15-4 lead just 4:30 into the contest. Wayne State pushed the lead to 18 at 28-10 following a pair of Austin Esters free throws at the 8:34 mark and finished the opening half with a 38-23

After the Wildcats took their biggest lead of the game early in the second half at 46-27, Concordia-St. Paul chipped away at the Wildcat lead and got as close as six at 50-44 with 10:59 to play.

Wayne State responded and increased the lead to 15 points at 63-48 with eight minutes to play. Concordia-St. Paul crept within nine at 68-59 before Wayne State pushed the lead back to double digits and went on to post the win, matching their 10-win total of last season.

Brian Goodwin led a balanced Wildcat scoring effort with 16 points to go with a team-high eight rebounds. Vance Janssen and Trevin Joseph both scored 14 points with Austin Esters adding a season-high 12 points. Ahmad Newsome poured in a game-high 20 points for Concordia-St. Paul. Avan Ward added 16 points with Max Keefe scoring 12.





NSP continues education programs aimed at teen drivers

State Patrol (NSP) continue their efforts to reduce teen crashes in Nebraska. Working in conjunction with partners at the Nebraska Department of Transportation - Highway Safety Office (NDOT-HSO), troopers give hundreds of safety presentations to youth across Nebraska.

From October through December, troopers throughout Nebraska gave more than 250 safety presentations. 71 of those events were funded through grants from NDOT-HSO, including presentations at schools, businesses, churches, community centers, and Friday Night Lights high school football games. Those presentations reached roughly 35,000 people. For all of 2017, Troopers reached an estimated 210,000 people with safety presentations.

Troopers will continue offering safety presentations from January through March of 2018, deliv-

Troopers with the Nebraska ering the message that seat belts save lives. The presentations include the Rollover Simulator, the Seat Belt Convincer, the Persuader, and the Driving Simulator.

"Our Community Service Officers and other Troopers who give these presentations deliver an important message to people who need to hear it," said Colonel John Bolduc, Superintendent of the Nebraska State Patrol. "If we can instill safe-driving habits in these new drivers, it will positively affect how they drive for decades to

According to the Nebraska Strategic Highway Safety Plan, teen drivers ages 16-20 represent the highest number of unbelted fatalities. Those interested in scheduling a safety presentation can visit the Community Policing/Safety for information.



Budget and taxes, sound familiar?

You can't have it both ways. Our parents told us that. We learned it from sometimes-painful experience. Yet, we often forget and think maybe this time it will be

The 2018 Legislature is back at work and the Governor is saying that he wants to provide meaningful tax relief for all Nebraskans while closing a \$200 million gap in the state budget. Pardon me while Lask, again, what is the largest source of state revenue? Taxes? Do you see my confusion here?

Perhaps there is a magic pill. Maybe a magic wand that is yet to be waved. Or maybe it's just the Kansas way, keep cutting the budget until it hurts really bad.

With his own tax plan trapped by a legislative filibuster last session – and still awaiting floor action -Governor Pete Ricketts said he'll be pushing for a revised version of that tax reduction package that would combine corporate and personal income tax cuts with reductions in the valuation of ag land for local property tax pur-

Some state senators, frustrated by last year's less than successful effort, are sponsoring a bill to provide an estimated \$1.1 billion in annual property tax relief by reducing the local school property tax load by up to 50 percent. If that fails, they are mounting a petition drive to put the question to voters in November.

Ricketts has raised a warning flag about that, noting the cuts that would have to be made to cover the \$1.1 billion reduction. But proponent Sen. Steve Erdman of Bayard said state budget reductions could be accompanied by elimination of some sales tax exemptions. Erdman has suggested that state budget reductions could potentially

be accompanied by elimination of some exemptions to the state sales tax as a dual means of supplying revenue needed to help fill the gap in tax support for schools.

The Governor doesn't like the potential option of attempting to increase revenue without hiking tax rates, a pathway that could be opened by elimination of some sales tax exemptions or business tax incentives. He said Nebraska is already a high-tax state. His option? Creating an environment that will cut red tape and create more job opportunities while controlling

In his New Year's message to the state – it was a press release that you may have seen – the Governor said, "In good times and in bad,

Nebraskans work together to get things done and move our state forward. When we see a need, we go out and meet that need."

That sounds like teamwork. Here's hoping that spirit will prevail in the weeks ahead because the tax and budget concerns, while the biggest the state faces, aren't all the problems that need to be addressed. Ricketts said he has been in

extensive negotiations with tax reduction proponents along with Revenue Committee Chairman Sen. Jim Smith of Papillion. But he has vowed to work with all senators on the priorities Nebraskans want. It will be interesting to see how many of those "other" priorities can be addressed in a short session.

He spoke of the teamwork experienced in the 2017 session and said, "Working together, we can accomplish great things."







A leper came to him begging him, and kneeling he said to him, If you choose, you can make me clean. Moved with pity, Jesus stretched out his hand and touched him, and said to him, 'I do choose. Be made clean!' Immediately the leprosy left him, and he was made clean. After sternly warning him he sent him away at once, saying to him, 'See that you say nothing to anyone; but go, show yourself to the priest, and offer for your cleansing what Moses commanded, as a testimony to them.'But he went out and began to proclaim it freely, and to spread the word, so that Jesus could no longer go into a town openly, but stayed out in the country; and people came to him from every quarter. Mark

It's probable that we are all familiar enough with this story to know the ending – we know that the man is healed and we tend to not think that much about it. Look at it again. Because even though the man being healed is truly a miracle there are other miracles present - smaller perhaps - but miracles nonetheless.

I have always thought that it was a miracle that Jesus reached



out his hand in the first place and touched the leper. No one touches a leper! No one willingly touches a person that we see as unclean or infected even in our day. We'll move to the other side of the room or avoid those people in any way we can. In Jesus' day it was even worse as people who suffered from leprosy were forcefully quarantined from the rest of society. Leprosy is a contagious, infectious disease and those who were not even allowed to enter the synagogue or temple to worship. Notice that leprosy was even segregated from

other diseases – all people were not

lumped together. No, leprosy was

the worst of the worst and those people were kept completely alone. Note also that people in those days were healed of other diseases but they were cleansed from leprosy. A leper was not only sick they were impure as well.

On one level we understand contagious diseases and we certainly take proper precautions. If visiting a person, we wear masks or gloves. We use antibacterial wipes. We learn how to sneeze properly. We understand all of that. We understand bacteria and viruses.

However what about those times when we put people in quarantine because of what we consider impurity? We say, "Oh, don't want to mix with those people - they (and you fill in the blank here)." Maybe they don't think like we do or look like we do or vote like we do or believe like we do or express their faith like we do. And often we put them in a category and we don't interact with them.

To interact would mean to step out, to risk but isn't that what we are called to do? Jesus says in Mark 12: 30-31 you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these."

Sometimes compassion looks a lot like bravery or a foolish risk. However if we are to follow Jesus, we must be willing to take some bold risks. We have to be willing to associate with those that we see as the outcasts and untouchables in our opinions. And like Jesus, as we are moved by compassion we have to stretch out our hands and touch them. To perform a small miracle and love them as we love ourselves.

NEST 'Why I Want to Go to College' writing contest announced

The 16th annual "Why I Want to Go to College" writing contest, sponsored by the Nebraska State Treasurer's Office and the Omaha Storm Chasers, is getting underway with entries due March 2, 2018. The writing contest is open to seventh and eighth graders.

Twelve winners will receive contributions to Nebraska Educational Savings Trust (NEST) college savings accounts including \$2,000 for first place, \$1,000 for second place, and \$500 for third place. Three winners will be chosen from each of Nebraska's three Congressional districts, and thee winners will be chosen from outside Nebraska.

Nebraska winners will be recognized at home plate on May 6 at the Storm Chasers game at Werner Park in Papillion. Each Nebraska winner will receive four

"Congratulating contest winners with a ceremony at Werner Park is one of the highlights of the year," said State Treasurer Don Stenberg, Trustee of NEST. "I enjoy meeting the young people and hearing about their plans for their future, and I also enjoy meeting the parents, grandparents, and siblings who provide enormous support, encouragement, and inspiration to


these young people. The writing contest provides an opportunity for young people to learn about saving for higher education and, at the same time, polish their writing skills for high school and later.'

Families can save for college for their children and grandchildren through NEST, the state-sponsored 529 college savings program that allows for tax-free investments and tax-free qualified withdrawals. Nebraska account owners qualify for up to \$10,000 a year in state income tax deductions.

Students are asked to reflect in their written entries on the value of education and what they hope to achieve through higher education. Entries are limited to 750 words and must be typed, double-spaced on 8 1/2 x 11-inch paper. They will be judged by students and faculty at Midland University in Fremont.



Make health your resolution & ditch tobacco in 2018

Is a new, healthier you part of your 2018 plan? Quitting tobacco is a great starting point for your New Year's resolution. The Nebraska Tobacco Quitline is here to help reach that goal.

Nearly 70 percent of tobacco users want to quit according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. During the month of January, the Nebraska Tobacco Quitline is providing extra assistance for those who are ready to kick the habit. The Quitline is offering a two-

week supply of no-cost nicotine replacement therapy to any Nebraska resident who is 18 years of age "The health benefits begin almost

immediately when you stop using tobacco," said Dr. Tom Williams, Director of Public Health and Chief Medical Officer for the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services. "Your heart rate and blood pressure drop within 20 minutes of smoking your last cigarette. Lung function increases within two to three months, and after a year of living tobacco free, the excess risk of coronary heart disease is half that of a continuing smoker."

Call the Nebraska Tobacco Quitline (available 24/7) and ask about the no-cost nicotine patches, gum or lozenges, available through Jan. 31, while supplies last. 


