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Personnel resignations, hirings highlight board agenda

The resignations of a teacher and staff member, along with the hiring of three teachers and a staff member were on the agenda when the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education met in regular session on Monday.

The resignation of Special Education teacher Stacy Johnson, with regrets was accepted. Johnson and her family will be moving to Palmyra. Also accepted was the resignation of Director of Maintenance Travis Meyer, with regrets. The resignation is effective March 2. Meyer is going into business and will be staying in the Wayne community.

Board members approved the hiring of Jordan Widner to fill the Director of Maintenance position. In discussing the hiring, Superintendent Mark Lenihan told the board that Widner "is excited about the opportunity."

Teachers hired at Monday's meeting included Andi Diediker for fifth grade; Jesse Mayo for 7-12 Special Education and Lauren Gilliland for 7-12 Math. Several of these positions will also include coaching, although the exact arrangement has not yet been made.

In other action, the board approved the design of a playground project at the elementary school and gave the Wayne Basketball Development Association (WB-DA) approval to raise funds for the project.

Board members also listened to a presentation from Diana Davis, a teacher at school, on a program she and several others are implementing titled "No One Eats Alone." Davis told the board the goal is to help eliminate isolation of students. The plan is to organize students into groups, based on the month of their birthday, to eat lunch with during each of the junior senior high school lunch periods.

Superintendent Lenihan updated the board on leg islative bills in the Nebraska Legislature that are be ing watched and those that would impact the district He also commented on early childhood education stating that 86 percent of school districts in the state of Nebraska provide early childhood education.

Mark Hanson, Wayne High Principal, presented in formation on the upcoming Job Shadowing Day, set for Feb. 21. Approximately 40 businesses in Wayne have agreed to have students visit their businesses that day. Juniors from Wayne High will have the opportunity to visit a business in the morning and one in the afternoon. They will then be graded on reports from the day's activities.

Included in the report from the Foundation and Community Relations committee was the fact that the annual Alumni Tournaments will be held Friday and Saturday, March 30-31.

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education will next meet in regular session on Monday, March 12 at 5 p.m. in the junior-senior high school library.

Yoga instructor earns accreditation from Yoga Alliance, promotes practice

around 2004, as a way to counter the affects of a desk job. I had always practiced with a video at home, and only once went to a studio class. It was awful, I didn't go back and it took me a long time to practice outside my home again."

These are the words of Charissa Loftis, on her introduction to yoga

She has come a long way since that time, and recently earned RYT500 certification.

"Shortly after I moved to Wayne (2006) I was able to take a class with Charlene Rasmussen that was offered by the Wayne Public Library. I started teaching yoga in 2008, but never really felt comfortable with teaching. In the beginning I found it difficult to establish my own daily practice. Around 2010 I traveled to Kripalu Center for Yoga in Stockbridge, Mass. for about a week and finally found a style of practice that I felt comfortable with. After I returned home, I found a Kripalu trained teacher that was teaching at a studio in Omaha called Omaha Yoga and Bodywork Center (currently named Yoga Now). I traveled to Omaha as often as I could to practice. With more practice and training I became more comfortable teaching and decided it was time to work on my RYT200 teacher training at Yoga Now with Susi Amendola,"

She noted that while the state of Nebraska does not require yoga teachers to be certified, it helps. The most widely recognized professional organization yoga teachers is Yoga Alliance. Its mission is to "promote and support the integrity and diversity of the teaching of yoga."

"The more I learn, the more I realize there is so much more to learn and that's why I decided to work on my RYT500 (Yoga Alliances second level of teacher registration). This required an additional 300 hours of training. Through the course of all of this, my meditation and posture practice have become a daily part of my life," she said.

Loftis said there are only 31 people in the state of Nebraska who are registered RYT500 of the 196 registered teachers in the state. There are only three or four outside the Omaha/Lincoln metro area.

Loftis, a reference librarian at Wayne State College, said there are many benefits from

"I started practicing yoga in grad school, yoga, including helping students feel better, round 2004, as a way to counter the affects physically, mentally and emotionally.

"Yoga can be modified in any way you want to get benefits you want. By practicing yoga, aches and pains fall away gradually and you may not notice until you are not doing it," she said.

Students range in age from infancy to senior citizens

As to frequency of attending class, Loftis said, "Once a week is good, but you could go every day if you wanted to. I encourage those new to yogo to try a variety of types of classes to find one that fits them. Classes range from relaxing to kinds that would make you sweat."

Ellen Imdieke, who has been a student in Loftis' classes for some time said, "Lower back problems led me to yoga more than 15 years ago. I was surprised how quickly things improved merely by carefully stretching, focusing on under-used muscles, being conscious of proper breathing, and doing various poses to improve strength.

"The interesting part I soon learned was that practicing regular yoga routines made a positive difference in how I felt over all.

"I love yoga. I highly recommend it for any age, male or female. It is not difficult nor competitive. At times you may even wonder if it is doing any good. Well it is. You'll realize that when you miss a weekly class. Another perk is that you can easily practice at home since all you need is a mat.

Wayne is fortunate to have Charissa and the other professional yoga instructors to help meet our health needs." Loftis currently teaches a class for credit at

WSC, group classes at a variety of locations in the community, and works with private clients.

"I prefer to visit with people to see what class would suit them best," she said.

"My training and practice background are therapeutic in nature. I do my best to make my classes accessible to as many people as possible. I also offer a variety of options in my class, so if one thing doesn't work for you, we'll work together to find something similar that does. My classes tend to focus on functional health and keeping bodies and joints feeling good," she said.

Wayne native pursues passion in voice overs, lands bucket list part

While some of us were simply enjoying cartoons on Saturday mornings during our childhoods, Joe Brogie was studying them.

"Ever since I was a kid I was always listening to things and copying them," Brogie said. "I would say I have a natural ability to mimic voices but I took classes to continue developing characters when I moved to LA."

That move happened only a year and a half ago, but this career has been in the works for Brogie since at least 2010, he said.

"I've been doing voice acting since 2010. It's been a passion of mine like magic is but I didn't have the resources to really get into it."

Prior to his move to Los Angeles, Brogie, a Wayne native, lived in Omaha. His "other job" often took him around the country and even further.

"I kind of have two jobs," he said.
"Voice over work is usually during the normal office hours while my shows are almost exclusively nights and week-

If you're from the area, you've likely heard about or seen a Joe Brogie magic and mentalist show. If not, you should. Last week, Brogie was in Omaha for a brief stint before flying back to LA for the week. He'll fly out to Texas this week and have about five hours to sleep between getting back from Texas and

"I travel all the time. I feel like I'm gone doing shows every weekend, but I'd rather be busy than twiddling my thumbs."

doing another event in LA.

So when he's not jet setting to blow the minds of innocent audience attendees, he's auditioning for and working on voice over projects.

"I audition almost once a day. When I first moved out to LA, I did auditions every day and drove myself crazy. It was hard in the beginning because there's a lot of talented people here but at the end of the day it's very subject and you have to learn to throw it away after you audition."

Voice over is a difficult niche to break into in LA. Even though you can do it from all over the world with the help of technology, the hot bed really is LA and that makes it hard to get started with so many others interested in those same parts

According to Brogie, there isn't ever a call to say you didn't get it. You simply turn on the television to see a commercial you auditioned for with someone

else's voice. And some times the call to

say you did get the part is months later. Such is the case for what Brogie describes as his 'hands down' favorite part

Donatello of the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles (TMNT).

For those of you not familiar with the four turtles mutated by radioactive ooze who live in a sewer system fighting crime thanks to being trained by their equally mutated rat ninjistu master, these characters come from a set comics and cartoons that once were common place in households across the nation.

Brogie grew up with those turtles so when the opportunity to audition for Donatello's voice in a popular video game came up, he couldn't pass it up.

"They (TNMT) were a comic before the show and did a couple cross overs with Batman in the comics. This is the first cross over outside of the comics."

The game, Injustice 2, was actually released in May of 2017, but gamers were told there would be downloadable characters coming in the future that they could access.

Those characters included the TMNT, which become available this month to access.

Andria Leigh Cooper was born Nov. 27, 1973 in Alamosa, Colo. to Larry and Sandra (Wood) McNames. She graduated from Beatty High School in Nevada, received her undergraduate studies from Fort Hays State University and graduated law school from Kansas University in Lawrence, Kan. Andria and John were married July 30, 1999 in Colby,

Dr. Andria Cooper was an assistant professor in the Department of Criminal Justice at Wayne State

College. Before teaching at WSC, she sat as a New Mexico state level district court judge after serving as an attorney, primarily in the area of criminal law. She served as a prosecutor and a criminal defense attorney, and also had experience in the areas of civil rights, constitutional law, victim advocacy, and general areas of legal practice. She trained law enforcement and other criminal justice professionals in the areas of arrest, search and seizure, report writing, warrant preparation, juvenile justice, fraud investigation and prevention, domestic violence investigation, and victim advocacy. She also sat on a governor's domestic violence

Dr. Cooper was involved in many activities. She was the advisor of Delta Upsilon, a chapter of the National American Criminal Justice Association, which participates in regional and national competitions on criminal justice knowledge, agility, firearms, and crime scene competitions. She also created mock crime scenes and mock trials for classes, which allowed students to present cases at trial, testify as witnesses, listen to the case as jurors, or assume other criminal justice roles in the courtroom. Dr. Cooper was a member of the American Criminal Justice Association, Justice Clearinghouse, and Pi Gamma Mu (a social sciences honor society). She was also a consultant on Faculty Row, and was involved in several committees on campus and in the Wayne community

Dr. Cooper was honored as an Outstanding Professor (2005) and Outstanding Advisor (2005), as well having received a Faculty Appreciation Award from Sigma Chi (2007). She received service awards from the Kansas Coalition Against Sexual and Domestic Violence (2004) and the Northwest Kansas Family Shelter (2003).

Dr. Cooper earned her Juris Doctorate degree in 2000 from the University of Kansas School of Law and her B.A. from Fort Hays State University. Her teaching interests included criminal law and procedure, criminal evidence, report writing and trial techniques for criminal justice professionals, civil liability in criminal justice, comparative justice systems, and all legal aspects of other criminal justice disciplines. Her research interests included civil rights, especially privacy advocacy, search and seizure, and the 2nd Amendment. She also enjoyed scholarly work in constitutional issues involving federalism and separation of pow-

The Blue Devils earned a pair of district championships in Saturday's final round, as Juan Vergara and Mike Leatherdale both found themselves at the top of the medal stand.


Vergara earned his second trip to state, as the iunior dominated Austin Barnts of Fairbury in a 10-4 decision to take the 132-pound title.

The Wayne State women's basketball team continaed its winning ways with a pair of wins in their final regular-season home games of the season.

On Saturday, Wayne State needed a 23-12 scoring surge in the fourth quarter to finish off a pesky Sioux Falls team in a 64-51 win, running their winning

The Wildcats (22-6, 16-4 NSIC) took an early 13-6 lead in the contest and led 17-12 after one guarter and Wayne State maintained that advantage as they led 29-24 at intermission.

Sioux Falls had a hot start to the third quarter and took a 33-32 lead on Augusta Thramer's jumper with 4:40 to play in the third quarter, but Wayne State took the lead for good at 39-38 on a Brittany Bongartz jumper as the Wildcats finished the quarter with a $41 ext{-}$

The Wildcats made six of seven shots to open the fourth quarter to establish separation from the Cougars. Fueling the run were 3-pointers from Maggie Schulte and Evelyn Knox to give Wayne State their first double-digit lead of the night at 56-45 with 5:43 to play, and they continued that advantage on their way

to the 13-point win. Senior center Paige Ballinger led the Wildcats with 19 points and nine rebounds followed by Bongartz with 12 points. Ballinger and Schulte each grabbed nine re-

bounds for the Wildcats.

On Friday, Ballinger recorded a double-double and

Wayne State outscored Southwest Minnesota State 46-27 in the second half to pull away for a 78-55 win.

The first quarter was tightly contested with four ties and five lead changes, resulting in a 15-15 tie, but Wayne State scored the first five points of the second quarter to take the lead for good at 20-15 and taking a 32-28 lead at the half.

The Wildcats opened the third quarter with an 11-2 run, taking their first double digit lead of the game at 43-30. Southwest got as close as seven at 46-39 with 1:52 to go in the third quarter, but the Wildcats scored the final six points of the third quarter for a 52-39 ad-

The Wildcats made 4 of 7 3-pointers and 8 of 12 free throws in the fourth stanza, outscoring SMSU 26-16, to finish with the 23-point win.

Ballinger led Wayne State with 19 points and 11 rebounds for her second double-double of the season. She was 5-of-10 from the field and 9-for-11 at the charity stripe. Kacie O'Connor also reached double figures

Ballinger had four of Wayne State's 14 assists and also had three blocked shots.

Wayne State will close out the regular season on the road this weekend, visiting Upper Iowa Friday at 6 and 8 p.m. and Winona State Saturday at 4 and 6 p.m. They are projected to host a first-round game in the Northern Sun Conference tournament on Wednesday.


WSC's Sullivan earns NSIC Athlete of the Week honor




His point total of 5,202 currently ranks ninth in NCAA Division II. This is his first athlete of the week honor this season.

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





Cornelius hits 1,000-point mark to highlight weekend split

Jordan Cornelius became the 33rd player in Wayne State history to notch 1,000 career points as the Wildcats split their final two home games of the regular season.

Cornelius scored a game-high 16 points and reached the 1,000-point mark on Senior Night Saturday, leading the Wildcats to a 78-64 win over Sioux Falls at Rice Auditorium. With the exception of the open-

ing basket of the game by Sioux Falls, Wayne State never trailed in the contest. Five different Wildcats scored early as Wayne State (14-14, 9-11 NSIC) took an early 18-7 lead just 6:30 into the game.

Wayne State made 10 of their first 13 shots on the night, but could not shake the Cougars as USF was within three at 22-19 with 8:12 to go in the half.

Leading 27-23, the Wildcats scored seven straight to take a 34-23 lead following a Vance Janssen jumper with 3:16 to go before halftime and finished the first half making 17-of-27 shots from the field to take a 39-29 halftime lead.

Wayne State never gave the Cougars a chance to come back in the second half as the Wildcats pushed the lead to 20 at the 12:38 mark (53-33). Cornelius became the 33rd player in school history to score 1,000 points when he drained a 3-pointer from the right win at the 16:47 mark to put the Wildcats in

Sioux Falls did close the gap to nine points with 2:44 to play at 71-62, but two Austin Esters free throws and a 3-pointer from JJ Zumbrennen pushed the lead back to 14 and Wayne State went on to the 14-point victory.

Cornelius led four Wildcat players in double figures with his 16 points, going 5-of-6 from the field (3of-4 from the 3-point line) and 3-of-4 at the charity stripe, on his milestone scoring night. Trevin Joseph (13), Austin Esters (11) and Kendall Jacks (10) also hit double digits for the Wildcats.

Esters and Brian Goodwin grabbed five boards each for the Wildcats. Janssen handed out five of Wayne State's 12 assists and had two steals.

On Friday, Southwest Minnesota State built an early 16-4 lead and Wayne State could never recover as the Mustangs cruised past the Wild-





Dicamba training available on guidelines for 2108 plicator license, just like you would vice Center. your Private Applicator Training However, the Nebraska Depart-

One of the biggest changes in crop production in the 2017 growing season was the release of dicamba tolerant (DT) soybeans. This technology was great in that it gave farmers a new tool to use in the control of some herbicide resistant and otherwise difficult to control broadleaf weeds. The notso-great results of this technology was it contributed to a problem with dicamba drifting off-site at the time of application or volatilizing and moving off-site after it had

I want to be sure that I emphasize that this contributed to the problem and was not the lone cause of the problem! Dicamba-based products have been used for years to control broadleaf weeds in corn fields, pastures and CRP. Some of the injury seen in fields planted to non-DT soybean varieties could be traced to dicamba applications made in these other adjacent to or nearby areas rather than applications in fields where DT soybeans were planted.

Regardless of the cause, more stringent guidelines are in place in 2018 for the use of the three herbicides (Engenia, ExtendiMax, and FeXapan) that have been labeled for use in DT soybean fields. Application of any other dicamba-based herbicide in DT soybean fields is NOT labeled and is illegal. These three products have been formu-



lated to reduce (but not eliminate) the potential of the herbicide mov-

Because of the problems experienced during the 2017 growing season, the EPA registered the three products listed above for one year, provided by Nebraska Extension. 2018, at which time they will decide if these products will be labeled in 2019 and beyond and if there will be any other changes beyond those that are required to apply these products in 2018.

So if you want to apply one of low: these products... Engenia, Extendi-Max, or FeXapan... you first need to have your private pesticide ap- 2 p.m. — Dakota City, USDA Ser- based products. You MUST have

need to purchase, load, mix, or apply any restricted use pesticide (RUP). BUT you also need to attend an additional training that will cover the new requirements associated with the application of any of these three products.

I'm not going to go into what all of the new requirements are, I don't have room and that's what the training sessions are designed to cover. All I will say is applicators will have to keep many more records than they had to when they applied other RUPs in the past.

So you may be asking yourself, how do I get this dicamba training? There are several alternatives for getting this training and I'm sure some of you have done so already. However, for those that haven't, vou have three options:

- 1 Attend an approved training provided by a commercial company manufacturing and/or marketing these products.
- 2 Attend an approved training
- 3 Take the UNL Pesticide Safetv Education Program Approved Online Dicamba Training.

To help you with the training if you need it, I will provide the dicamba training sessions listed be-

These sessions will meet the dicamba training required for private applicators and commercial applicators as well as for those mixing and or loading these products in a commercial operation.

If you want to know what other options are available, go to the Nebraska Department of Agriculture website (http://www.nda.nebraska.gov). Under the major heading "Featured Programs" about half way down their homepage, there is a link that says "Dicamba Information." Click on that link and it will take you to the NDA's dicamba website which has many links including: training opportunities, sample labels of the three products labeled for use in DT soybeans, record keeping requirements, sample record keeping forms, and a list of the Nebraska applicators who have completed the dicamba training.

A couple of other things you should understand:

 There is a 60-day exemption for private applicators of other RUPs where an uncertified applicator can apply an RUP under the supervision of a certified applicator. This exemption does NOT apply to any-Concord, Haskell Agricultural Lab; one applying one of these dicamba-

·The dicamba training requirements do NOT apply to anyone applying other formulations of dicamba (Banvel, Clarity, Diflexx, etc.) to corn, sorghum, small grains, pasture, CRP or other sites where these products are labeled. These other dicamba-based products are NOT labeled on and it is ILLEGAL to apply them to DT soybeans.





American Heart Month

Patients need to look no further than Providence Medical Center for their cardiac health needs

Cardiac patients need to look no further than their own backyard when searching for the perfect place to see a cardiologist, have a calcium scoring test done or be rehabilitated following a cardiac sur-

The lengthy list of cardiac services available through Providence Medical Center means more care is available close to home, which is often a deciding factor when choosing a doctor and facility.

Some of the options for cardiac care at PMC include the cardiologists themselves. With both the Cardiac Institute out of Norfolk and Mercy out of Sioux City visiting PMC each month, patients are able to receive pre-op cardiac clearances in Wayne, avoiding the extended travel time.

According to Joan West, Director of Outpatient Speciality Services Department at PMC, in a pre-op cardiac clearance, patients are tested to see whether surgery at that time is an option given the results

"We offer pre-op clearances, so for instance if someone has questionable heart problems, they can come to the cardiologist here to be evaluated and get cardiac clearance before surgery. We can do a stress test or a stress-echo or we can do nuclear studies. Most surgeries such as joint replacements require a pre-op cardiac clearance."

The cardiologists can also perform pacemaker checks at Providence.

"They bring over specialized equipment to check the pacers," West said. "That equipment allows them to check the functionality of the pacers to ensure they're working properly."

In addition to the pre-op clearances and pacemaker checks, PMC can also fit patients with a Holter monitor. Using electrodes attached to the chest, a Holter monitor records a patient's cardiac rhythm.

"We can do two different kinds of Holter monitors," West said. "One is a short term, either 24 or 48

that can be four to six weeks long. In the case of the long term monitors, patients push a button when they're experiencing symptoms like shortness of breath, light-headedness or chest pains and the monitor will start to record. If it's a 24-48 [hour monitor] they're constantly recorded. The monitor can help doctors correlate what's happening with the patient's heart as they're feeling those symptoms."

PMC offers electrocardiograms (EKG), West said, which monitors the electrical activity in the heart. Monitoring that can help physicians diagnose heart problems such as checking heart rhythm, checking blood flow, diagnosing a heart attack or even detecting abnormalities such as thickened heart mus-

Vice President of Nursing Services Nicole Haglund discussed how the new 64-slice CT scanner is capable of doing calcium scoring

This test measures the amount of calcium in the walls of the arteries that supply blood to the heart. With this test, the amount of hardening of the artery wall and the risk a patient has to heart attack or stroke can be seen. The more calcium a patient has, the higher their risks

PMC also offers vascular ultrasounds to patients. In the case of cardiac patients, a vascular ultrasound technician would perform a vascular ultrasound to detect narrowing of the arteries, West said.

Cholesterol and lipids play a large part in heart health, which is why PMC offers screenings for them. Simple blood tests allow for the levels of lipids and cholesterol in a patient to be looked at, giving the total cholesterol levels as well



Signs of atrial fibrillation and how to properly treat it

comfortable sensations in the chest can be distressing. Thoughts of heart attack may come to mind, and that anxiety can only exacerbate the situation. While heart attack might be the first thing people think of when experiencing chest discomfort, atrial fibrillation may be to blame for such feelings.

Atrial fibrillation, also called AFib, is a quivering or irregular heartbeat that may lead to heartrelated complications. The American Heart Association says that at least 2.7 million Americans are living with AFib. Although treatable, without proper diagnosis, AFib may lead to blood clots, stroke and even heart failure.

Many people with AFib experience no symptoms at all and are unaware they have it until it is discovered during a physical examination. For those who experience symptoms, The Mayo Clinic lists these as some of the more common:

- Palpitations, which can be sensations of a flip-flopping in the chest or even a racing feeling.
- Fatigue
- · Reduced ability to exercise Lightheadedness





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
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Nebraska Medical Center now able to implant heart device

Nebraska Medical Center is the first hospital in ners while offering equivalent stroke protection." Omaha to offer patients with a type of irregular heartbeat, also known as atrial fibrillation (afib), an alternative to long-term blood thinners with a newly approved device called WATCHMAN.

The WATCHMAN implant reduces the risk of stroke by closing off an area of the heart called the left atrial appendage. Doing that keeps harmful blood clots from forming in the left atrial appendage, entering the bloodstream and potentially causing a stroke. By closing off the left atrial appendage, the risk of stroke is reduced and, over time, patients will be able to stop taking blood thinners. Reasons that someone may be unable to take longterm blood thinners include prior bleeding while on a blood thinner, mediation side effects or interactions or an occupation where long-term blood thinners would be hazardous.

"This new device provides doctors with a breakthrough stroke risk reduction option for patients," said Andrew Goldsweig, MD, interventional cardiologist at Nebraska Medicine. "For patients with non-valvular atrial fibrillation, the WATCHMAN implant offers a potentially life-changing remedy which could free them from long-term blood thinPeople with atrial fibrillation are five times more

likely to have a stroke than the general population. Atrial fibrillation can cause blood to pool and form clots in the left atrial appendage. If a clot forms there, it can increase stroke risk. Blood clots can break loose and travel in the blood stream to the brain, lungs, and other parts of the body. "We are extremely happy to be able to provide

this option," said Jessica Delaney, MD, cardiac electrophysiologist at Nebraska Medicine. "We have already implanted our first three devices and have a specialized clinic established to evaluate it WATCHMAN is the right course of treatment for certain patients. It certainly gives us another tool to elevate our already high level of care."

To implant the device, the doctor inserts a small needle in the upper leg, followed by a narrow tube. similar to a standard stent procedure. The doctor then guides the device into the left atrial appendage of the heart. The procedure is done under general anesthesia and takes about an hour. Patients commonly stay in the hospital overnight and leave

as LDL and HDL and triglycerides.

Cardiac rehab is yet another cardiac service offered at Providence. For patients who have undergone a major cardiac event such as surgery or a heart attack, strengthening their heart and educating them on properly caring for themselves is paramount to success after the event. That's where the PMC cardiac rehab unit

Offered three times a week, patients do a combination of exercise and education with a specialized nurse. While exercising, each patient is monitored to ensure their safety. The exercise and education regimen is tailored to each patient, cardiac rehab coordinator Terri Davis said.

While PMC knows scheduling and insurance can play a big part in how many times per week a patient can attend cardiac rehab, patients who are able to make it three days a week are setting themselves up for a bet-

In addition to all of those services, the PMC ambulance service is an advanced cardiac life support service

"We run an ALS service because our nurses ride in the ambulance," Haglund said. "That allows us to provide a higher level of care on scene and during transport versus the basic life support that most EMS offer. In some communities, if they had the need for an ALS transfer, they'd be required to call a different facility to request someone for the transfer where patients here don't have to wait."

But the biggest cardiac service PMC offers comes from the physicians and nursing staff who genuinely care about their patients.

"We have a staff that has a real interest in their patients. We don't want patients to just get better because of what we're doing medically. We want patients who are getting better because of that and because we know them and we care about their wellbeing," Haglund said.

Pregnancy and heart disease

Pregnancy is a happy time for many women, but during the nine months of gestation, conditions can develop that put moms-to-be at risk a higher risk of heart disease and stroke. According to the Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada, preeclampsia and gestational diabetes can develop during pregnancy, potentially putting women's long-term health at risk.

· Preeclampsia: There is no known way to prevent preeclampsia, a condition related to increased blood pressure and protein in expecting mothers' urine. An increase in protein is indicative of a problem with the pregnant woman's kidneys.

· Gestational diabetes: Pregnancy hormones can interfere with the ability a pregnant woman's body has to use insulin efficiently. As a result, women must produce extra insulin while pregnant. If that cannot happen, then blood sugar levels can rise and lead to gestational diabetes. The long-term ramifications of gestation-

al diabetes can be significant, as the condition can raise both mother and baby's risk of developing diabetes later in life.

Stroke: Women can suffer from stroke at any time during their pregnancy, though the Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada notes that their risk is high during childbirth and in the first few months after childbirth. Preexisting conditions, are often the culprits when pregnant women or new mothers suffer strokes.
