Wayne Herald publisher earns NSIAAA honors

Wayne Herald publisher Kevin Peterson was awarded the NSIAAA Outstanding Service Award last week at Wilderness Ridge in Lincoln at the annual banquet for the Nebraska State Athletic Administrators Association. Peterson was the recipient of the award for District III and was nominated by Dr. Chris Loofe, athletic director at Millard West High School in Omaha and a former standout athlete at Wakefield High School.

The recognition was for outstanding service to Nebraska high school athletics. He has been publisher of the Wayne Herald & Morning Shopper since March 21, 2005 but got his start in the newspaper industry following graduation from Kearney State in the late 1980's by becoming the sports editor at the Wayne Herald. He left the Herald on two occasions to work in Central City and Plattsmouth but found his way back to Wayne each time.

"I am very humbled by the award from the NSIAAA," he said. "It's one thing to be honored by your peers in your profession but quite another to be recognized by an entire entity that is not newspaper/media affiliated."

Peterson currently serves as public address announcer for the Blue Devils during football season and does some back up public address for basketball and volleyball when needed. He also serves on the Wayne Community Schools Foundation and is active with the board of directors at Wayne Country Club and Wayne Industries. He is also a board member with the Nebraska Press Association.

During summer months he is a site director for the Nebraska Junior Golf Tour and works with the Nebraska Golf Association in assisting with the girls and boys high school golf championships.

School board approves addition of education course for students

Students at Wayne High School will have the opportunity to take an Introduction to Education course following action taken at Monday's meeting of the Wayne Community School Board of Education

Hannah Smith, who is currently student teaching in the Family and Consumer Science (FCS) department at Wayne Community Schools, and who has been hired to replace Karen Schardt in that department, spoke to the board on the proposed class.

She said the class is designed for juniors and seniors and would introduce them to different parts of being a teacher. It would follow state standards.

The class will replace the Culinary class that is currently being offered. Only four students have signed up for the class at the present time. Smith did note that there is a possibility that the two classes could be offered on a rotating basis.

Board members approved, with regrets, the resignation of Carrie Jensen as an instrumental music teacher. Jensen has been employed with the district for 10 years and has accepted a position at Stanton Public Schools.

Superintendent Mark Lenihan said the

district will work to fill the position with current staff members.

Contracts for the 2018-2019 school year were approved for administrators and directors within the district.

Superintendent Lenihan said that the administrators' contracts include a two percent increase overall. The director contracts include increases also but due to recent changes in employees, the overall percentages are somewhat difficult to de-

Several board policies were discussed at Monday's meeting. They included annual updates on the school's option enrollment, pregnant and parenting students, purchasing policies and early leave incentive.

In administrator reports, Superintendent Lenihan gave the board an update on current bills in the Nebraska Legislature that would impact the school. Among these was a bill that would allow educational service units the opportunity to hire a mental health professional to serve each unit's patrons.

Lenihan said that Wayne Community Schools will receive approximately \$280,000 in state aid for the coming year. The majority of this money will come from

Also discussed was the recent Job Shadow Day. Approximately 40 businesses in the community hosted students and the district has received "very positive feedback and the students represented the school well." Plans call for the district to do another job shadow event in the fall of the 2018-2019 school year.

Superintendent Lenihan also spent a considerable amount of time discussing the district's safety report.

He told the board that the report is divided into three areas - the Threat Assessment team, the Safety Team and the Communications team.

"With all of these areas, our ultimate goal is to keep students and staff safe,' Lenihan said.

Each of the administrators presented information on upcoming events in their respective areas. These include an assembly entitled "Value Up" on March 16, Kindergarten Round-Up on March 16 and Spring Sprints on May 4.

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education will next meet in regular session on Monday, April 9 at 5 p.m. in the Junior-Senior High School Library

Three Wayne State College alumni earn prestigious teaching awards

Wayne State College graduates have earned a number of remarkable teaching awards. Three educators from South Sioux City have added these honors: Jon Pickinpaugh earned the Milken Educator Award; D.J. Smith received the Golden Apple Teaching Award; and Michelle Helt was named the Nebraska 2018 Teacher of the Year.

"It was really neat this year with three people in our district recognized at the district, state, and national level with an award in education. Knowing we all have degrees from Wayne State made it even more special," said Jon Pickinpaugh, who has taught for eight years at South Sioux City. He serves as eighthgrade science teacher, seventh- and eighth-grade wrestling coach and seventh-grade football coach.

Pickinpaugh was surprised with the \$25,000 Milken Educator Award in front of students, administrators, and fellow teachers. Nebraska Lt. Gov. Mike Foley named him as the winner. Pickinpaugh will be included in the National Milken Educator Network, a group of more than 2,700 top teachers, principals and specialists dedicated to strengthening education. He will have an opportunity to attend a Milken Educator Forum in Washington, D.C., March 20-23.

"Normally, I don't like to be surprised, but it was a great surprise," Pickinpaugh stated in a Sioux City Journal feature. Pickinpaugh said he thought he was going to an assembly to hear school officials talk about students' rising test scores on Jan. 11.

"The most valuable thing about my award is that it gives me a voice with our government and I get to represent Nebraska and the other great educators who live in this state," Pickinpaugh said. "The award I received is one of the highest honors you can earn nationally as an educator. This is an award chosen for only the best in the nation.'

Educators cannot apply for the Milken Educator Award and do not even know they are under consideration. A confidential selection process includes blue ribbon panels appointed by state departments of education. Pickinpaugh is the only honoree this year from Siouxland or Nebraska. Teacher magazine called The Milken Educator Awards "the Oscars of Teaching." The 40th Nebraskan to garner the award, Pickenpaugh will complete studies to become a school administrator with a master of science in education Pre K-12th grade administration at Wayne State College in May.

"I earned this award because I show up every day for my students and do whatever I can to make sure they receive the highest quality education. I also make sure my students know that I am here for them if they ever need anything," Pickinpaugh said. "I have a few former students enrolled in becoming educators through Wayne State College who email me or come back to my classroom to ask for advice. I never thought this is where God would take me, but I am humbled and honored to be used to help

Most of Pickinpaugh's life has been in northeast Nebraska as a native of Wayne. He's working on the completion of his third degree from Wayne State College. His first was an undergraduate degree in business administration in 2005.

After a few years, Pickinpaugh said he found he wanted to make more of an impact in the lives of young people. His second career matched his mother's calling as an educator. Pickinpaugh received a teaching degree from Wayne State in 2010, and began and continues to teach in the South Sioux City district. His sister,

Leah Gomez, is also an educator in the district. "I have received all of my college degrees through Wayne State College and feel as though the school of education equipped me



with the knowledge and resources to go out and be a great teacher," Pickinpaugh said. "The Wayne State College School of Education is second to no other. Each faculty member I ever had in all three of my degrees have been exceptional and I have great relationships still with all

"Personally speaking my top role models from Wayne State College have been: Dr. Timothy Sharer, Dr. Joni Irlmeier (even though I played a great prank on her in her class by changing the clock so I could get out early to go hunting.) Dr. Dennis Lichty, Dr. Marilyn Mudge, Sherry Doorman, Dr. Joanna Barnes (a relative), and Mary Hanson who helped me through student teaching, and the list goes on and on. They truly value you as a student and do not look at you as just another student passing through. If you want to be the best, you have to learn from the best and right now the best is Wayne State College."

D.J. Smith, who earned his bachelor's degree in music education in 2013 at Wayne State, is working on his graduate degree at the college, received the Golden Apple Award in South Sioux

"This award has made me not only work harder as a teacher but in everything I do," Smith said. "Not only am I a teacher and a graduate student, but I am also an active musician, a new business owner, and the president of the Ponca Area Community Club. It was a surprise for me. I'm honored to be a part of the PLC process as a district and in my third-grade cohorts. The hard work we have done in the areas of curriculum and assessment has had a profound impact on students."

Helt began teaching in 2002 as a resource and Title I reading teacher at Cardinal Elementary and St. Michael's Catholic School. She served as an ESL and resource teacher for a year at Cardinal Elementary before becoming a third-grade teacher where she has taught since 2004. Helt was a founding member of the South Sioux City District Curriculum Council. She earned a bachelor's degree from Buena Vista University and a master's degree from Wayne State College.

A panel of Nebraska educators selected Helt as the 2018 Nebraska Teacher of the Year. The Teacher of the Year program recognizes the contributions of classroom teachers who are exceptionally dedicated, knowledgeable and skilled and who have the ability to inspire students of all backgrounds and abilities to learn.

"I feel I received this honor because I represent what the teachers in Nebraska do every day. My classroom and style is one of purpose, focus, and fun, all are achieved in classrooms daily, but in very different ways," Held said. "Being named the Nebraska Teacher of the Year has been an incredibly humbling honor. I feel incredibly blessed to represent all Nebraska teachers. As Nebraska Teacher of the Year, it is my hope to become a voice for students and teachers across our

Dendinger gets second runner-up finish, Sullivan finishes 12th

Wayne State senior Michaela Dendinger recorded her second runner-up finish in the NCAA Division II Indoor Track and Field Championships in Pittsburg, Kan., taking second in the shot put.

Dendinger's best throw of the night came on her first throw in prelims with a mark of 53 feet, 1 1/2 inches to take the lead after one attempt. After a foul on her second prelim throw, Dendinger slipped to second place after Sunflower Greene of Millersville posted a throw of 53-4 1/4. Dendinger closed out the prelims with a heave of 53 feet to stay in second place enter-

In the finals, Dendinger recorded a throw of 52-6 3/4 on her first attempt and fouled on her second throw. She closed the finals with a mark of 52-10 1/4 to finish in second place and earn first-team All-American honors. Her 16 team points, which included a runner-up finish in the weight throw on Friday, helped Wayne State finish in 16th place in the women's team

Dendinger set a new school record and claimed runner-up honors in the weight throw Friday.

Dendinger entered the national championship with the second-best mark in NCAA Div. II. In prelims, she had her best throw on her first

attempt with a mark of 65 feet, 1 1/4 inches and qualified for the finals with the second-best throw.

In her first throw of the finals Dendinger bettered her previous best mark of 65-6 at the NSIC Indoor Championships with a new school record throw of 67-0. After fouling on her second throw in finals, Dendinger ended finals with a mark of 65-7.

Southern Connecticut State's Destiny Coward won the event with a throw of 68-2 1/2.

Junior Robert Sullivan finished in 12th place in the men's heptathlon that concluded Saturday afternoon.

The second day of competition in the heptathlon got off to a bad start for Sullivan, as he hit the first hurdle in the 60-meter hurdles and fell to be disqualified, thus not scoring any points in the event. He would record an 11th-place finish in the pole vault (12-5 1/2) and was 12th in the 1,000-meter run with a time of 3:18.21 to close out the seven-event competition with 4,108 points..

On Friday, Sullivan's best finish in an event was tied for third in the high jump clearing 6-7. He was also seventh in the shot put (40-4), 12th in the long jump (22-2 1/2) and 13th in the 60-meter dash with a time of 7.35 seconds in the other events of the heptathlon.

Ballinger named second team All-Central Region

Wayne State senior basketball standout Paige Ballinger was named to the 2017-18 D2CCA All-Central Region Women's Basketball second team as voted on by sports information directors from the NCAA Division II Central Region.

The 6-foot-1 senior center from

Pender was a first-team All-NSIC selection for a third straight season this year. She led the Wildcats in scoring at 12.2 points per game to go with 5.9 rebounds a contest this season. ranking second in the NSIC with 2.4 blocks per game while ranking 10th in field goal percentage (.487) and 12th in free throw percentage (.810).

In NSIC games, Ballinger averaged 12.8 points and 6.0 rebounds per game recording four games of 20 or more points with three doubledoubles. She was second in blocked shots per game (2.2), ninth in field goal percentage (.486), 10th in free throw percentage (.825) and 16th in

Ballinger ended her Wildcat career ranked eighth in career scoring with 1,448 points and is the all-time blocked shot leader with 217.

Wayne State College finished the season with a 25-7 overall record and placed second in the NSIC South Division with an 18-4 league mark.

On Tuesday, the Wildcats went 1-1 for the third straight day in action at the National Training Center Spring Games in Clermont, Fla., defeating Stonehill (Mass.) 3-2 and losing a nine-inning battle with Lewis University

In the opener, Wayne native Abbie Hix went 2-for-3 at the plate with a pair of RBI while freshman pitcher Maddie Moser tossed a complete game with six strikeouts to highlight the Wildcat victory.

Wayne State opened the scoring in the top of the second as Alyx Hagen walked and scored on a Hix single to give the Wildcats a 1-0 lead.

The Skyhawks took a 2-1 lead with a pair of runs in the third inning on three hits and one Wildcat error. The score stayed that way until the sixth, when the Wildcats used three doubles to score a pair of runs to take the lead. Hagen led off the frame with a double to center with pinch-runner Sarah Hunter scoring on a Hix two-bagger to even the score at 2-2. Hix then scored the go-ahead run on a Taylor Menard double, giving Wayne State the lead for good.

Stonehill tried to rally in the bottom of the seventh by putting two runners on base with two outs, but Moser got the final out on a fly ball to right field to end the game and give Wayne State the win.

Hix was 2-for-3 with a single, double and two RBI. Hagen, Annie Grammer and Menard each doubled with Morgan Vasa adding a single. Moser improved to 2-2 on the season with her second complete-game win on the Florida trip. The freshman from Central City allowed two runs on seven hits with six strikeouts and

In the second game of the day, the Wildcats took Lewis University of Illinois to extra in-

nings before losing to fall to 4-7 on the season. The Flyers scored six runs in the first inning and two more in the second for an 8-0 lead, but

Wayne State battled back with a six-run second inning, highlighted by Emily Chandler's three-run homer. Rachel Shumaker also tripled in the inning. The Wildcats added another run in the third to trim the lead to 8-7 as Hix doubled and scored on a single by Ashley

Lewis scored single runs in the fourth and sixth innings to take a 10-7 lead, but the Wildcats came back with two in the bottom of the sixth to make the score 10-9. Baylee Rial's double scored Katelyn Wobken, with Rial scoring on an RBI groundout from Shumaker.

Wayne State tied the game in the bottom of the seventh when Jordyn Breitbarth homered with one out, sending the game into extra innings tied at 10-10.

Both teams scored in the eighth to make the score 11-11. Hagen's single scored Rial for the Wildcat run in the eighth. But the Flyers struck for three runs in the top of the ninth while holding the Wildcats scoreless in the bottom of the frame for the 14-11 victory.

Wobken finished 4-for-5 with four singles and two runs scored. Hagen was 2-for-4 with a pair of singles while Shumaker went 2-for-5 with a triple and RBI. Chandler and Breitbarth each homered, with Chandler recording

Junior starter Riley Vanderveen (1-3) was tagged with the pitching loss, working 5 1/3 innings. Reliever Allison Niemeier worked 3 2/3 innings of the contest in the circle.



inches in the high jump to finish 15th in the national meet. He was a state champion at Wayne High School and owns the school's alltime record in the event with a lap of 7 feet.





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

Erv and I have few rules. In the early days we traveled to games we had a rule to never go the same



Tax on internet sales? Why not?

North Platte Senator Mike Groene perfectly framed the argument for the state collecting sales tax on internet purchases during floor debate on a bill to allow it.

"I'm paying it, but maybe my neighbor isn't," he said. "Yet we both drive on the same streets and use the same government services.' The public wants something done.

Senator Matt Williams of Gothenburg said it's a matter of fairness. Main Street businesses have to remit the sales tax paid by customers. The same should be true for those located in other states but selling to Nebraskans on-line, he said.

The Government Accounting Office said Nebraska is missing out on something between \$67 million and \$95 million in sales tax revenue every year. That, says Senator Dan Watermeier of Syracuse, is why he introduced the bill last session given the current shortfall in state revenue.

But Governor Pete Ricketts and Attorney General Doug Peterson are against the measure because of a legal question pending before the United States Supreme Court in a South Dakota lawsuit against online retail giant Wayfair. At issue in that case is a previous decision in Quill Corporation v. North Dakota, which prohibits states from collecting tax from those internet companies.

Revenue Committee Chairman Senator Jim Smith of Papillion argued against the bill and said he will "fight it to the end because we are holding out hope that this will do things that can't be accomplished."

Senator Mike Hilgers of Lincoln, an attorney, and Ernie Chambers of Omaha, a law school graduate, both argued against the measure from a legal and technical standpoint. But Watermeier and others cited a recent Nebraska Law Review article on the subject, which, they say, answers the legal questions that have been raised.

As introduced, the Watermeier

bill (LB44) raised several potential concerns: privacy issues raised by an information reporting system; whether the state can condition the effectiveness of a state law on an act of the Supreme Court or Congress; and why would the state enact a statute before such action allows it to do so.

University of Nebraska-Lincoln law professor Adam Thimmesch wrote that "The State should be following Wayfair very closely, and the legislature should carefully consider enacting LB44 so that it is poised to act if the Court removes the physical presence limitation (a company must have operations in Nebraska) on its inherent power to tax."

He said the privacy concern is addressed by requiring internet sellers to report on aggregate, not individual, consumer activity. The State Constitution allows the Legislature to make laws conditioned

on outside events. Finally, the current legislative session ends April 18 and that means lawmakers will not be in session when the high court hands down its opinion.

Without LB44 on the books, Thimmesch wrote, the Legislature would have to wait until next session to introduce a bill and any revenue collection could be delayed up to nine months. "The Court's current position has severely limited Nebraska's ability to conform its tax system to the modern economy," he wrote.

Watermeier explained that his amendment to the bill, which was approved before the measure advanced to a final reading, would require sellers to provide detailed notifications to purchasers about the state sales tax that is due for their purchases. The requirement that businesses remit sales tax would go into effect should the U.S. Supreme Court rule to overturn

Quill v. North Dakota, which prevents states from collecting sales

taxes owed from online purchases. It would also: require the aggregate report mentioned earlier; exempt all Nebraska businesses and small businesses from the bill's requirements; and leave the state in position to collect revenue immediately should the court ruling overturn Quill.

Omaha Senator Tony Vargas spoke in favor of the measure and called it a responsible way to move forward to balance the three-legged tax stool, which relies on income, property and sales tax to fund gov-

Balance is good. Let's hope that this is the session to achieve

hearing for Amendment 2191 to LB 822. LB 822 is a bill to clean up language in statute that relates to the Department of Natural Resources. AM 2191, introduced by Senator Hughes, adds language to exempt the public power industry from being required to disclose proprietary or commercial information which if released would give an advantage to business competitors.

Nebraska is in a unique situation because we are the only state in which all electrical producers are publically owned, rather than sold by private companies. Private companies are still able to sell power in Nebraska, meaning public power districts must operate as a business and remain competitive in the market. Because of this, a recent court decision on a public records' request ordered the Nebraska Public Power District (NPPD) to release proprietary cost information that would hurt NPPD's ability to stay competitive against other power companies.

Following the hearing, fellow committee members and I decided on a final amendment, AM 2292, that

sources Committee held a special mation would be eligible for exemption from public records requests. LB 822 with AM 2292 was amended into LB 1008, which is one of Natural Resource's priority bills. I supported both amendments and allowing NPPD and other public power districts to withhold proprietary information.

> This week, the budget was released by the Revenue Committee. This year we will be addressing another budget shortfall, totaling over \$120 million, resulting in acrossthe-board cuts to departments. We will start debate on Tuesday, March 13th, and it is expected to bring disagreements among senators. Some issues to pay attention to are cuts to higher education and Title X provisions that would ensure that abortion providers do not receive federal family-planning funds. I unquestionably support passing provisions in the budget that cut Title X funds to abortion providers and will vote in support of that provision. I am looking forward to hearing debate on the many other provisions of the bill and making the best decision for Nebraskans while maintaining a balanced

As the budget currently stands, the proposal would leave lawmakers with a little over \$500,000 to spend on new proposals, meaning it would be near impossible to pass legisla-

tion this session with a fiscal note. The Legislature may vote to sustain or override any of the Governor's vetoes before the budget is finalized. 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
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Following Jesus is not madness

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Local working group meeting planned

A Local Working Group that provides advice on the priorities for many U.S. Department of Agriculture conservation programs will meet Thursday, March 22 at 5:30 p.m. at the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resource District office in Norfolk.

The public is encouraged to attend and express their natural resource concerns. Ideas generated from the public will help the U.S. Department of Agriculture tailor their natural resource programs to meet the needs identified locally.

There is a Local Working Group in each Natural Resources District (NRD). Membership on the Local Working Group includes Federal, State, county, Tribal or local government representatives according to Robin Sutherland, District Conservationist for the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) whose agency guides the Local Working

"The Local Working Group recommends to the NRCS State Conservationist how conservation programs like the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), Conserva-

ricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP) would be used most effectively in their area. This recommendation can include special target areas, cost share rates on conservation programs, which conservation practices should have cost assistance, or how many dollars could be needed," said Sutherland. This work group allows local input into how federal dollars are spent, she said.

Typically Nebraska NRCS obligates anywhere between \$45 million to over \$75 million dollars to farmers and ranchers statewide through NRCS conservation programs. These programs help landowners and operators make natural resource improvements to their land, water, or wildlife. This funding was allocated according to the priorities set by the Local Working Group.

Wayne State College will host a Service-Learning event with a 20min. video documentary "Upstream Doctors" and round-table talks to learn about health on March 19 from 6 to 8 p.m. in Frey Conference Suite, Kanter Student Center. Registration begins at 5:30 p.m.

This is a Service-Learning Event sponsored by PGH 200 Students and Northeast Nebraska Public Health Department.

The "Healthy Conversations" round-table talks will help individuals to learn more about health disparities with Dr. Rishi Manchanda. The video will have Spanish subtitles. Several Spanish interpreters will be available for Spanish speakers who wish to participate.

For a decade, Manchanda has worked as a doctor in South Central Los Angeles, treating patients who live and work in harsh conditions. He has worked at the Venice Family Clinic, one of the largest free clinics in the United States. He was the first director of social medicine at the St. John's Well Child and Family Center in Compton, where he and his team provided high quality primary care to low-income families in the area.

Today, he is the medical director of a veterans' clinic within the Greater Los Angeles Healthcare System, which he refers to as an "intensive caring unit." He tells the National

Health Corps Services, "The moment when a patient switches from despair to hopefulness is the greatest part of my service.

Manchanda is the author of the TED Book The Upstream Doctors, in which he looks at how health begins at home and in the workplace, with the social and environmental factors of our everyday lives. He shows how the future of our healthcare system depends on "upstreamists," the doctors, nurses and other healthcare practitioners who look for the root cause of illness rather than just treating the symptoms.

Manchanda is the president and founder of Health Begins, a social network that teaches and empowers clinicians to improve health where it begins—in patients' home and work environments. He also founded Rx-Democracy, a nonpartisan coalition created to register voters in healthcare clinics. He serves on the board of the National Physicians Alliance, as well as on the board of Physicians for Social Responsibility in Los Angeles.

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
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Emerald Ash Borer not only shade tree borer

With emerald ash borer (EAB) in the news, homeowners are paying closer attention to their trees for signs of borers. This is great that homeowners are watching their trees closer! But it amazes me that everyone who finds a hole in the bark on their tree is sure they have EAB... even if the holes are in the bark of something other than an

To put your mind at ease, know that EAB has not yet been found in our area (yet) and we do not recommend treating ash trees at this time. Once the EAB is confirmed within 15 miles, we will begin recommending that treatment of healthy ash trees can begin. That is, if you choose to treat your ash. Replacing ash trees with another quality shade tree may be a better long term option.

Back to concerns about finding signs of borers on tree trunks and branches. If holes are found in trees, do not assume the tree is infested with EAB. Identify the tree first if you are not sure what it is. Only ash trees are attacked by EAB; but many trees, especially stressed trees, can be infested by other types



If holes are found on a tree trunk or branches, there are a number of possible culprits. Holes may be the tree and bore into the tree, are caused by one of our common borers. Most borers attack stressed trees that are declining due to another issue. Since only stressed trees are attacked, these borers are not as great of a concern and treatment is not always recommended or

Holes in tree trunks can also be caused by insects like bark beetles, be in serious decline. Treating for bark beetles rarely solves the larger

tree trunks. These holes are typically found in one location in almost perfect horizontal rows; unlike borer holes that are found randomly scattered on the trunk or larger branches.

When borer holes are found, the type of borer that created the hole can sometimes be identified by the size and shape of the hole. Borer holes that are large enough to be seen by us are actually exit holes made by adult borers emerging from the tree once they complete their life cycle. The holes made by larvae, after they hatch from eggs laid on typically so tiny we would not notice

A common borer in Nebraska is the ash-lilac borer that attacks ash, lilac and privet. The adult is a moth that resembles a wasp. Adult emergence holes on tree trunks are round and one-fourth inch in diameter.

Another common borer is the flatheaded apple tree borer. The adult which are not borers. These beetles is a one-half inch long, dark colored also attack stressed trees that may metallic beetle. Emergence holes in trunks are oval-shaped and threesixteenth inch in diameter.

Compare these to holes creat-Woodpeckers also make holes in ed by the EAB. The adult is a onehalf inch long metallic green beetle. Emergence holes in tree trunks are typically found in the upper branches first and then on the trunk. Holes are D-shaped and only one-eighth inch in diameter.

In summary, if you find holes on a tree trunk or branches, identify what made the holes before treating with an insecticide. Remember that emerald ash borer has not yet been found in our area (yet) and treating ash trees is NOT recommended until it has been confirmed within 15 miles of your ash trees.

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Nebraska Regional Poison Center celebrates 56th annual National **Poison Prevention Week**

The Nebraska Regional Poison that they aren't actually doing so. Most poisoning deaths are due to misuse and abuse of drugs but poisoning exposures can involve a vast array of substances such as household cleaning products, personal care products, chemicals, bites and stings, pesticides, plants, gasses

For example, each year more than 2,800 children are treated in emergency rooms after swallowing button batteries. That's one child every three hours.







The City will load and the landowner must haul and apply biosolids to any landowner controlled site complying with federal and state compliance requirements at landowner's cost. The City will complete the site application for NDEQ and the EPA 40 CFR 503 Annual Report requirements for the landowner. The landowner must provide the City the legal description of the site, application rate, comply with federal and state setbacks, and assurance the requirements were met.

The approximate nutrient value of the material is as follows: 8.4 lb/ dry tn Total Kjeldahl Nitrogen (TKN) Ammonia Nitrogen (NH4-N) lb/ dry tn 8.3 lb/ dry tn

In the past, biosolids removal projects have been able to apply at a rate of 6 tons per acre or greater. The City anticipates disposing of 2,000 dry tons. Application rate will vary depending on site conditions and physical properties of the sludge at the time of application. 
