Wayne's 1912 Emporium makes Nebraska Passport destination list

Seventy stops have been selected for the Nebraska Tourism Commission's popular Nebraska Passport program this year.

The program, designed to encourage tourism by both Nebraskans as well as those from out of state, offers prizes to those who collect stamps at each location they visit. Participants have from May 1 until Sept. 30 to garner as many stamps as possible to be turned in for prizes

For those who collect 10 stamps, they will receive a passport car decal and \$15 in Nebraska lottery coupons. Those who collect 25 stamps will receive a Nebraska Tourism calendar. 45 stamps gets visitors a Nebraska poster booklet and all 70 stamps earn "Passport Champion" apparel.

Chautauqua coming to Wayne

Plans are underway to bring a historical event to Wayne that hasn't happened since the early 1990s.

Humanities Nebraska is bringing The Nebraska Chautauqua to Wayne June 7-10. Presentations each night will take place in Ramsey Theatre on the campus of Wayne State College.

The theme for this year's event is World War I: Legacies of a Forgotten War and is part of a multi-year Chautauqua series presented by Humanities Nebraska (HN) throughout the state. A similar event will take place in Sidney June 14-17.

The event offers the public an opportunity to come together to develop a better understanding of the lasting influences of the Great

Five scholars will explore and discuss with the community the lasting impacts of the Great War and how those events affect Americans today. Each evening Woodrow Wilson will moderate one of four presentations of the following historical figures: author Edith Wharton, activist W.E. B. Du Bois, politician William Jennings Bryan and social reformer Jane Addams.

In addition to HN scholars, the event includes an opportunity for local youth to research local historical figures.

Ride Into History, a historical performance touring troupe of Ann

Birney and Joyce Thierer of Admire, Kan. will work with youth to research and make presentations featuring members of the community who had an impact on local history.

These youth will begin meeting on Monday, June 4 at WSC and meet each day from 1 to 5 p.m. prior to their performance on Friday, June 8 before the scholars' presentation.

Flyers for those youth interested in taking part in the event will be distributed in coming weeks with pre-registration information. The Wayne Public Library will serve as the headquarters for the

"The Chautauqua is an immersive experience. Those attending will learn about historical topics related to World War I such as weapons, literature and relief efforts," said Kristi Hayek Carley, Program

Manager of Humanities Nebraska. Carley said that HN choses a Chautauqua theme and sticks with t for three-four years and holds events across the state of Nebraska. The World War I theme coincides with the 100th anniversary of the

end of "The Great War.' The event is co-sponsored by the National Endowment for the Humanities, Nebraska Cultural Endowment and The United States World War One Centennial Commission.

When disaster struck the east end of Wayne on October 4, 2013, the community and surrounding towns came together to handle the destruction left by the mile-wide tornado. Meetings like the one above, allowed emergency personnel and agencies to communicate a plan. Severe weather plans are imperative to safety, which is why the City of Wayne enacts certain regulations during inclement weather.

Severe weather prep important for all

As one season's severe weather comes to a close (hopefully) and another's begins, it's important to

realize the value of a plan. When the City of Wayne was hit in 2013 by a mile-wide tornado, it helped to make everyone aware of how important having emergency plans

The City of Wayne has numerous ordinances for this very reason -- whether it's a tornado or a bliz-

City of Wayne street and planning director Joel Hansen discussed the importance of people adhering to the ordinances in the event of inclement weather, such as a snow emergency.

"People don't realize how difficult it is to stop a snow plow or get it turned. When cars are parked in the road, the street crews have to try and get around them. Those plows jerk to the side because of the pressure of the snow and it can be a real hazard."

When the City of Wayne enacts a snow emergency, notice is given on all the social media accounts for the city, in addition to contacting the Wayne Herald, KTCH and various other entities to get the word out.

The emergency doesn't go into effect until three hours after the alert has been declared to allow residents to remove vehicles from the roads.

The restricted parking remains in effect until lifted by the city. It's not as simple as when the snow or ice stops accumulating. The city takes into account clearing the snow or ice and how much time that will require to allow residents safe passage of the streets.

One thing both Hansen and City of Wayne police chief Marlen Chinn stressed about weather emergencies like the one described is a simple way to ensure you don't get caught in bad weather.

From the emergency stand point, Chinn pointed out that if a snow emergency has been declared, it's likely that it's not safe for road crews to be out. Which, in turn, means it's not safe for rescue crews to be out.

"We can't get people out to you quickly in these situations.'

Hansen brought up vehicles stalled or stuck in the street during such an emergency.

"We will remove them, but some times the tow company can't even get to them to hook up right away," he said.

Chinn added, "this last big blizzard we had that very thing happened where we had to dig out around it for the tow truck to be able to hook on."

Emergency snow routes are cleared first for access to the hospital, fire department, city buildings and in each neighborhood to ensure that if there was a need for emergency personnel to get to a home, they could.

With the coming of spring and summer storm season, it's extremely important for families to put a plan in place in reacting to a tornado threat.

The City of Wayne installed new sirens after the tornado in 2013, but Chinn stressed that the sirens aren't meant to be heard indoors.

"We've had people complain that they can't hear them inside. It's not designed to be heard inside. You should have a weather radio on indoors. It's meant for the people outside to warn them.'

The sirens are sounded when the National Weather Service alerts of a tornado or if trained spotters call one in, so it's not a joke.

Another misconception Hansen and Chinn want cleared up with the sirens is the all-clear signal. And that is to say that there isn't one. When engaged, the siren will sound for three minutes steadily. That same tone will be reactivated every five minutes for continuing danger.

"There is never an all-clear given," Chinn said. "If it sounds again, it's because there is still danger of a tornado.'

Families should make a clear, simple plan for children to follow during severe weather, starting with getting indoors. Most injuries associated with storms come from debris flying through the air.

Schools, businesses and other buildings should have a clearly marked tornado shelter for employees and customers to take refuge in.

For those in a residence, head to the basement. If there isn't a basement, find the most interior room without windows and as few doors as pos-

Get under a table, desk or other sturdy piece of furniture and cover your neck and head as much as possible using pillows, blankets and other ma-

Having a plan and knowing the city's procedures can make the difference for your family this

Announcement system major part of safety plan at Wayne State

Wayne State College utilizes a wide variety of notification means to alert students of inclement weather plans and procedures.

According to College Relations director Jay Collier, not only is social media used but the college has invested in a notification system that sends directly to the cell phones of those on campus.


"I can log in from my computer or my phone and send out an alert in 30 seconds," Collier said. "We reach a lot of students through our Twitter and Facebook but we also send alerts over the campus-wide P.A. system, through the student's e-mail and we can put alerts on our website."

Each building on campus has a designated tornado shelter for students and staff to access.

In addition to tornadoes, WSC utilizes those same means to make students aware of late or cancelled classes and closed campus alerts when snow and ice make it too treacherous for staff and students to safely meet for classes.

"Our number one priority is the safety of our students and staff."

current with business and current events.



Wayne State College men's rugby advance to NSCRO semifinals in Pittsburgh

The Wayne State men's rugby team defeated Texas University Le-Tourneau Saturday, 46-24, in a National Small College Rugby Organization national quarterfinal game that sends the Wildcats to the semifi nals in Pittsburgh in late April.

LeTourneau went on the scoreboard first with a quick scoring play in the first six minutes of the game on a scoring run by Quincy Adams, but it was all Wayne State after that.

Three touchdown scores from Wayne State in the middle of the first half by Taylor Rowles, Brandon Jensen and Brock Reeves put the wildcats up 15-5 just before the end of the first half. Letourneau scored again early in the second half to get within 20-10, but Wayne State responded and scored twice on tries by Hunter Boetcher and Jered Lemkau within the next six minutes to make it 25-10 with 18 minutes left in the game.

Another score by Letourneau crossed the goal line and cut the Wildcat lead to eight and with 16 minutes left, and the fans were on the edge of their seats as a momentum swing was felt across the Wayne Rugby Park. LeTourneau was on the 20 yard line and looking to score again, when freshman Hunter Boetcher intercepted a pass and ran it back for an 80-yard score to put the Wildcats up 32-17.

With LeTourneau now in desperation mode in the final 14 minutes, they worked the ball downfield again inside the Wayne State when Boetcher returned a second interception 80 yards for a score to put the Wildcats up 39-17 and put the game out of reach.

Cole Eaton added another score with five minutes remaining, and a safety prevent defense held out LeTourneau until the last play of the game with a late score to advance the Wildcat Rugby men to the national semifinals, set for April 21-22 in Pittsburgh, Pa.

With the WSC rugby women and men's programs going after their eighth national championship, coach Darrin Barner acknowledged the big boost in talent and national playoff advancement to one thing — the freshman recruiting class that came last year.



Hard work, persistence pays off for Blue Devil alumni Anderson at UNL

One day during Grant Anderson's freshman year in high school, he left a track meet in

Anderson competed in the hurdles at Wayne High School and was consistently finishing near the back of the pack.

"I was just fed up with getting my butt kicked," he said during a phone interview as he was preparing for his senior outdoor season as a high jumper for the University of Nebraska. "It was after a meet and I was trying as hard as I could, but I wasn't strong enough yet. I was walking back to the car with my mom and was crying because I was frustrated that I couldn't compete."

Anderson's parents, Steve and Peg, kept encouraging him and telling him to be patient and that his time would come - not the kind of thing he wanted to hear at the time.

"I remember mom gave me a hug and said 'your time would come' and 'be patient" and I was thinking to myself 'oh shut up.' I didn't want to hear it," he said.

As it turns out, mom knows best.

After playing baseball during his sophomore and junior seasons, he returned to the track in 2013 after earning all-state honors in basketball and helping the Blue Devils make it to the state tour-

Anderson was planning on possibly playing basketball at an NAIA school, but he started having some success in the high jump and drawing some interest for potential scholarship opportunities in the sport.

"I wasn't really serious about (high jumping) and was kind of looking at playing basketball," he said. "I'd had some decent jumps but nothing earth shattering."

And then came the day he rocked his world — and the school record book — by clearing 7 feet at the Mid State Conference meet in Madison.

"When I jumped 7 feet I thought now I have to pursue this, because you don't just go and jump 7 feet and I had no choice but to pursue this further," he said. The UNL coaching staff had

made some initial inquiries to Anderson's interest before that jump, but not long after he cleared it, the Huskers REALLY became interested in the Blue Devils' record-holding senior leaper.

"You get so few athletes of this caliber in Nebraska because of the population, but when you get somebody (like Anderson) who comes out like that right in front of your eyes, you hate to lose people like that," Husker jumps coach Dusty Jonas said in a telephone interview. "It's special for these Nebraska kids to go to the University and not only be on the team, but be successful while they're there. It was a win-win for

Anderson won the state title, but only cleared 6 feet, 6 inches to take the Class B gold medal that

"I thought that once you jumped (7 feet) you did it every time out, so when I won state and was six inches below my personal best, I didn't know why," Anderson said. "I had jumped 7 feet and didn't know, technically, how I did it and wasn't able to replicate it at

Anderson redshirted as a freshman at UNL and slowly improved as he learned more of the technical adjustments he needed to make to go higher more consis-

"For a lot of freshmen, they're going to struggle in an event where they aren't doing some things well technically, and that takes some time," Jonas said. "He started coming around and has gotten a little better every year since.

Anderson didn't see the 7-foot mark again until his redshirt freshman year two years later. He cleared 7 feet, one-half inch during the indoor season and went 7-1 1/2 in the NCAA West Preliminaries. The following year, he hit a personal best mark of 7-1 3/4 and won the Husker Spring Invite title, then made his first trip to nationals where he earned second-team All-American honors with a 13th place finish. His senior indoor season was highlighted by a 7-3 effort that helped him qualify for the recent indoor national meet in College Station,

Looking back, Anderson said he wished he'd have stayed with the sport, rather than play baseball during his sophomore and junior years in high school.

"I kind of wish I'd done this earlier so I could have gone to more national meets and been a bit more polished when I went to college," he said. "My redshirt year I was so far behind technically and was late to the party and wish that I could have polished it up."

Once he got to Nebraska, though, he has worked hard to make up for lost time. He spent

the Christmas break working out to prepare for the indoor season, and was in between workouts during spring break when he took

"I have a teammate who has jumped 7-3 3/4 and another who's gone 7-2 1/2 and others who have jumped as high as 7-5, so being around people who are really, really good is fantastic," he said. "Nebraska has one of the best high jumping groups in the nation, and being around people who

push me has helped out a lot." It's not only helped him as an athlete, Jonas said, but as a per-

son as well. "He's done a really nice job of maturing as a human being, even more than as an athlete," he said. "I've learned a lot from coaching Grant and the other guys he's working with, and being able to watch how he's matured and handled his successes and failures

has been really impressive." Anderson will compete at home two times during his senior year, and he's hoping he can end his college career with an All-American

finish at nationals this summer. "My dream was always to compete on a big stage and be in that big-time moment," he said. "I tried to train for that in high school, but I wasn't good at anything until my senior year when l got really good at basketball and could just jump better than before. Now I'm sitting her as one of the top 100 high jumpers in the world. I wasn't what I wanted to

be and that really pushed me." It wasn't what he wanted to hear at the time, but it turns out mom's prediction that his time would come was spot on.

"I think back to what she said and I wish I could have told myself that in high school," he said. "My time definitely came."

On the men's side, Wayne State was picked sixth in the coaches poll. Minnesota State was a unanimous selection to lead the men's race, with University of Mary, Augustana, Sioux Falls and Minnesota Duluth rounding out the top five.

Junior Robert Sullivan and sophomore Clay Kramper were listed as Wildcat Athletes to Watch this season.

Sullivan, a junior from Bennington, scored points in three events in last year's outdoor season with a pair of All-NSIC finishes (third) in the long jump and decathlon. 

Abigail Rosenthal will present "Hannah Arendt and the Holocaust' on April 9 at 3:30 p.m. in Connell Hall 131 on the Wayne State College Arendt was one of the leading intellectuals in the second half of the

20th century. Her book, Eichmann in Jerusalem, originally published in 1963 and still in print, coined the phrase "the banality of evil" to explain how average and unthinking people could be guilty of atrocities. Arendt's phrase may be an important philosophical and psychological construct, yet few have appreciated that events in her personal life played a significant role in developing this construct. This presentation will include information to help others understand Arendt's motiva-Rosenthal is Professor Emerita of Philosophy, Brooklyn College of

The City University of New York. She is the author of A Good Look at Evil, a Pulitzer Prize nominee, soon to appear in a revised second edition. Its thesis is that good people try to live out their stories while evil people try to mess up good people's stories. Her next book, Confessions of a Young Philosopher, forthcoming, provides multiple illustrations from her own life. She writes a weekly column for her blog, "Dear Abbie: The Non-Advice Column" (www.dearabbie-nonadvice.com) where she explains why women's lives are highly interesting. She's the editor of the posthumously published Consolations of Philosophy: Hobbes's Secret; Spinoza's Way by her father, Henry M. Rosenthal. Her next book will be Conversations with My Father. Alfalfa - The forgotten crop

Too often alfalfa is the forgotten farm crop... farmers take care of alfalfa when they're caught up on everything else. I'd like to suggest you move alfalfa higher on your priority list... and one of the first things you need to do with your alfalfa fields should be done in the next few weeks when it gets a little dryer.

With warmer temperatures and plenty of moisture, your alfalfa will be greening up soon. Before that happens, you should control weeds if they are a problem. Weeds like pennycress, downy brome, mustards, cheatgrass, and shepherd's purse are common in first cutting alfalfa. They lower yields, reduce quality, lessen palatability, and slow hay drydown. Now that the snow is gone, you should be able to see their small, green, over-wintering growth if they are present in your fields.

Once alfalfa starts growing, you can't control these weeds very well without injuring your alfalfa. However during this spring-like weather, if you treat your alfalfa as soon as it dries out enough you can drive in your alfalfa field without tearing it up, you can have cleaner, healthier alfalfa at your first cutting.

Several herbicides can help control winter annual grasses and weeds in alfalfa. They include AIM, Metribuzin, Velpar, Sinbar, Purcontrol mustards and pennycress



Another consideration is if you are planning to plant alfalfa this spring. Should you use oats or another companion crop? There are the advantages and disadvantages to both options. Alfalfa often is seeded with a companion crop like oats to control weeds and prevent

In contrast, clear seeding alfalfa alone, without a companion crop also works well. A preplant herbicide like Balan, Eptam, or Trust often is pre-plant incorporated to control weeds in a clear seeding, but herbicides aren't always necessary.

Your own situation will determine whether a companion crop or a clear seeding is better for you. Where erosion isn't a problem, clear seeding has the advantage because alfalfa production begins much sooner, with 2 to 4 tons possible the seeding year. Companion crops lower alfalfa yield the first year, and they often cause thinner stands which can lower yields in following

LWML Spring Rally held in Winside

The LWML Spring Workshop was held at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Winside on March 8.

The theme of the workshop was "When we forget, God remembers" based on Isaiah 49: 15-16, "...See, I have engraved you on the palms of my hands." The event began with a welcome from Connie Schutte, followed by a hymn sing led by Pastor Harrison Goodman. Pastor Goodman gave the opening devotion based on Psalm 27 and Isaiah 49: 15-16 which would lead into the Bible study later.

Zone President Bev Ruwe welcomed those in attendance and opened the meeting with the LWML Pledge. She announced the deadline as Palm Sunday to submit information and pictures of each society to the district office to be included in a book commemorating the 75th anniversary of the LWML.

Cathy Schable volunteered to make the banner. Mrs. Ruwe stated that several societies hadn't sent in their reports. The district report wasn't available yet, so the report will be given at the next meeting. She also announced that at least two names were needed for nomination at the fall rally for President and Treasurer.

Pastor Goodman from Winside presented the Bible study based on Isaiah 49: 15-16. "Can a mother forget the baby at

her breast and have no compassion on the child she has borne? Though she may forget, I will not

forget you! 16 See, I have engraved you on the palms of my hands; your walls are ever before me.

Alzheimer's is a dreadful disease that robs people of their memory and personality. Even when a person has "lost himself/herself," God remembers. At times we have trouble remembering that the person stricken with Alzheimer's is still our mother, father, husband, wife, etc. Pastor Goodman noted that the blank stare of an Alzheimer's patient disappears when someone begins to recite the Lord's Prayer or sing familiar hymns. Oftentimes the patient will join in the recitation and/or singing.

A skit was performed by the Christian Growth Committee, Rose Mason, Connie Schutte and Pat Janke entitled "Cast All Your Care." We tend to "wear" our troubles, stress and sin instead of releasing those things to the Lord.

Louise Green introduced the speaker, Rev. Andrew Schlund, his wife Kelsey and their daughter Charlotte. Rev. Schlund and his wife are missionaries in Mexico City. He currently serves as pastor at La Iglesia Luterana del Buen Pastor (Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd.) Rev. Schlund also works with other missionaries in the theological education ture pastors.

He and his wife discussed the differences of everyday life, customs and food between our two cultures. Rev. Schlund's congregation works to feed many homeless by taking meals to the local hospital to distribute to the homeless twice a month. While serving in Mexico, the family experienced two earthquakes. While they were back in the United States, Mexico City suffered a third quake. Lutheran Disaster Response and the Lutheran Hour are helping farmers rebuild their homes that were destroyed in the quake.

The ingathering was a monetary gift of \$1170 for the ministry of the Schlund family. The Zone offering was \$237. Total attendance for the workshop was 40, which included five pastors and two guests.


Pastor Raab led us in a prayer of thanksgiving before a salad luncheon was served.

Jesus is our 'Whipping Boy' "Whipping Boy!" — Matthew

9:35-38

Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and healing every disease and sickness. 36 When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. 37 Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. 38 Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." In the 17th century, Britain's

King James the First, invented a name and a custom among royalty, which is both ludicrous and despicable. The name was "Whipping Boy" and the custom was as follows: The king's son, Charles, was way more than a stinker - he was a thoroughly spoiled brat. No one, however, was allowed to touch him. The king appointed another boy, William Mayer, to be Charles' playmate and whipping boy. Whenever Charles misbehaved, William was punished. I'm searching for a better word for this custom than "stupid," but none comes to my mind. I cannot imagine



that William's stripes did anything to either heal or teach Charles. It would be altogether different if one boy were to commit a wrong and another boy would voluntarily step in to take the blame and the punishment for his friend.

It is a rare thing to find a truly compassionate person, but it is another thing to see compassion in a crowd. The Scripture passage in Matthew is about One who had compassion on a crowd. True compassion is precious in our day of violence overdose. "Jesus saw the crowds (it's even plural) and had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like

sheep without a shepherd." Some of us do have compassion on individuals, even in a crowd. But compassion on the entire crowd?

In the Scriptures, we are taught again and again of the King Who reversed roles and became so much more than an appointed "whipping

Paul marvels at Jesus' love for us — that it was "While we were still sinners. Christ died for us." That was more than angels' work, below or above. It was God's work, God's compassion, God's love. Paul saw the power of God's reconciling work extending beyond our salvation. We were not only freed from sin, death,

for service in the plentiful harvest field of God.

We sometimes talk about a person today who becomes a "whipping boy," taking all the punishment for a family or carrying the blame for things that go wrong at work. This never makes for a good situation. There is no appreciation for what has been done for others, and, sadly, the "whipping boy" almost always builds up great resentment for having been punished or suffering for something he was not responsible for. The situation is quite different with Jesus. He is voluntarily a "whipping boy" for us. In the language of the Old Testament, He is a scapegoat. The scapegoat carried the sin of Israel away from the camp on the Day of Atonement.

While the use of a "whipping boy" or a "scapegoat" in our human condition indicates a dysfunctional situation, in the case of our salvation, Jesus - the scapegoat, the substitute - is the way through which we are saved before God. This is what we call GRACE. And, grace it is, pure and simple. Thank God for His grace to us in Jesus.

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners meeting was called to order by Chairman James Rabe at 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday, March 20, 2018, in the upstairs conference room of the Courthouse. Chairman Rabe, Members Dean Burbach and Randy Larson, Attorney Michae Pieper, Sheriff Jason Dwinell and Clerk Debra Finn were present. Notice of this meeting was published in the Wayne Herald, a legal newspaper, on March 8, 2018. A current copy of the Oper Meetings Act was posted and accessible to the public.

Rabe presented the following consent agenda items:

Gordon Bethune on March 16, 2018 A motion to approve the consent agenda was made by Larson and seconded by Burbach Roll call vote: Larson, Burbach, Rabe - aye; motion carried.

A motion to approve the regular agenda was made by Burbach and seconded by Larson Roll call vote: Burbach, Larson, Rabe - aye; motion carried.

A motion to approve the claims was made by Larson and seconded by Burbach. Roll cal vote: Larson, Burbach, Rabe - ave: motion carried.

UNL Extension Educator Amy Topp reported the office was planning to purchase a 14-inch Dell Latitude, a 24-inch monitor, and a docking station. The county cost for equipment and installation is \$2,390.00, UNL cost share is \$389.00. Topp also reported another EV3 robot would

Domina Law offered to represent the county in nationwide litigation efforts against

pharmaceutical manufacturers and distributors of opioids to recover costs and damages associated with abuse and addiction. As part of a Consortium, Domina Law would investigate claims for potential county losses and prosecute on the county's behalf. Attorney fees would be based upon recovery, expenses would be deducted from the gross recovery, and unless the cour or the rule of law requires it, the county would not pay expenses if there was no recovery. County Attorney Pieper said if the county has a lot of costs associated with opioids then the county would want to be part of it. If the county does not have a lot to recover than the costs of joining may exceed any benefits. Pieper will try to get a clear understanding of the agreement details including baseline costs and limits.

Highway Superintendent Mark Casey reported the county received \$80,533.08 in STP Funds and \$132,095.18 in Highway Bridge Buyback Funds. Version 3 of the County Roads Agreement with Sholes Wind, LLC "Sholes" was reviewed

The following changes were made: All electrical lines (including fiber optic cable) shall be buried a minimum of 8-fee

below the surface of the entire width of right of way;

"Sholes" will have ten days to temporarily move lines when the county needs to work under the county road and in the road right of way;

"Sholes" shall pay a one-time Permit Fee of \$1,500.00 for each tower constructed during the project for an access road entrance and permitting

overweight or oversize vehicles; "Sholes" shall reimburse the county for project engineering bills, not to exceed

\$20,000.00 without a supplemental agreement A motion was made by Larson and seconded by Burbach to approve the changes to the

Road Haul Agreement and to send the amended agreement to "Sholes". Roll call vote: Larson Burbach, Rabe - aye; motion carried. Jerry Berggren and Doug Elting of Berggren Architects presented an update on the courthouse exterior renovation project. The scope of the project increased as a result of the

pictures taken by the drone. The condition of the roof with emphasis on flashing and the impact of site drainage on the sandstone at the base of the building need to be addressed before tuckpointing. The condition of the wood construction at the bay windows was also a concern.

Drainage could be improved with a gutter adjacent to the building and a perforated pipe under the steps. Berggren reported he found a quarry in Wyoming that can match the stone for repairs. The concrete steps on the south will be returned to granite to prevent moisture wicking.

The original courthouse drawings for the bay window areas could be replicated. Berggrer recommended covering the wood with 16 oz construction copper that would patina rather than painting it. Pictures taken by the drone showed unfinished flashing work from when the asphalt roof was

installed. Options for replacing the roof were asphalt, synthetic slate, and natural slate. Asphalt

has a life expectancy of 25-35 years, synthetic slate 50-65 years, and natural slate at least 100 The project cost with an asphalt roof was estimated at \$1,695,675.00; with synthetic slate \$1,778,499.00; with natural slate \$2,086,675.00. Berggren recommended adding a contingency

If needed for financing purposes, the restoration project could be broken down over a 2-3

year period; Berggren thought the tax credits could also be extended. Berggren would star prequalifying bidders while a decision was being made on roofing material.

Upon discussion, a motion was made by Larson and seconded by Burbach to recess the meeting until Thursday, March 22nd at 10:00 a.m. to further discuss the courthouse restoration project. Roll call vote: Larson, Berggren, Rabe - aye; motion carried.

The meeting reconvened on March 22nd at 10:00 a.m.

The board noted that the decision to keep the building had been made years ago by a vote of the people. Their job was to preserve the building, and that would require the roof and drainage

be their first priorities. The cost difference between synthetic and natural slate was over \$300,000.00, which the board agreed could go a long way towards infrastructure. With the \$1.5 million on hand for the restoration project, it was determined that the cost would be manageable if synthetic slate shingles

were chosen. A motion was made by Larson and seconded by Burbach to approve Option 2, the installation of new synthetic slate shingles together with proper lead coated flashing. Roll call vote Larson, Burbach, Rabe - aye; motion carried. Fee Reports: Debra Finn, County Clerk, \$8,061.22 (Feb Fees); Jason Dwinell, County

Sheriff, \$1,025.47 (Feb Fees). Abbreviations: PS - Personal Services, OE - Operating Expenses, SU - Supplies, MA - Materials ER - Equipment Rental, CO - Capital Outlays, RP - Repairs, RE - Reimburse-ment.
