Contested race candidates introduce themselves, answer questions from public at recent forum

Tuesday evening was a busy one for many who opted to sit in on the candidate forum hosted by the Government Affairs Committee of Wayne Area Economic Development and Wayne County Farm Bureau.

Moderated by Bill Dickey and timed by Chele Misenbach, the forum consisted of five minute introduction periods and two minutes to answer each question.

The forum was held for the contested races on the Primary Election ballot to give citizens the opportunity to become more familiar with the local candidates prior to vot-

Sturm was proud to say that the mill levy during his time on council dropped from 0.69 cents per \$1.00 to \$0.45 per \$1.00 and how he wants to hold official office hours if he would be elected.

Mayoral candidate Pat Melena followed Sturm. Melena spoke briefly on his graduating high school and college here in town before discussing what he thinks makes Wayne special, which included the schools and amenities.

He has spent several years on the Planning and Zoning committee, of which he is now chairman.

Terry Sievers followed Henschke in discussing his goals as county commissioner.

Currently Sievers is the foreman for the District 1 roads crew and has been employed by the county for the last 18 vears

He said his goal is to further the relationships he has in the community.

Rounding out the commissioner candidates was David Westerhold, a life long resident of Wayne County.

According to Westerhold, his location in the far reaches



ing on May 15.

Starting with the mayoral candidates, a random order was generated. Cale Giese started off the forum with his introduction.

During those five minutes, Giese discussed his ties to Wayne dating back over a hundred years. Giese is a fifth generation farmer working for the family businesses. He owns Godfather's in Wayne and also has served for two terms on the Wayne City Countil.

His key points included the future of Wayne's infrastructure, future of Wayne's community and the future of Wayne's businesses. How to maintain and prepare for upcoming costs associated with growth and how to capitalize on WSC students were also part of his introduction.

Following Giese, mayoral candidate Doug Sturm discussed his business background in Wayne.

Sturm opened his barber shop in Wayne 38 years ago and served for 20 years on the Wayne City Council.

He discussed some of the major projects the City accomplished during his tenure on council, which included the construction of the fire hall, activity center and waste water treatment plant.

His concerns included attracting and retaining young families and providing affordable housing to them and the workforce.

Wrapping up the candidates for mayor was Jennifer Sievers

Sievers, a full time employee at Sand Creek Post & Beam, currently serves as a council member for Ward 2.

Her key points included getting involved rather than just talking about getting involved. She felt that there should be more marketing happening for Wayne as a city in general to help attract more businesses.

She also discussed retaining current businesses and that she is passionate about Wayne as a community.

Following the mayoral candidates came the candidates for the County Commissioner District 1 seat.

First to speak was candidate Damon Henschke who has been farming on his own in Wayne County since 1981.

He said that because of the time in which he began farming, it's led him to be fiscally conservative.

He said he would like to bring more communication be tween the communities in Wayne County and the commissioners

of the county gives him an advantage roads-wise as he is forced to traverse those gravel roads daily.

He spoke on his experience handling money as the treasurer for his church over the past 12 years and having a business degree.

The next two to speak were the candidates for Wayne County Attorney

First up was Amy Miller, who is the City of Wayne Attorney currently and former Deputy County Attorney for Wayne of 10 years.

She serves currently the Pierce County Deputy Attorney. She also maintains her own family practice, something she said she would no longer do if she were voted in.

Her main points of discussion included her availability and dedication to the job and her qualifications, including having argued a case before the Nebraska Supreme Court.

Mike Pieper followed Miller as a candidate for Wayne County Attorney. Pieper currently serves as the county attorney and has done so for the past 26 years.

He discussed how he put himself through school by working at a packing house and how that teaches you to See Candidate Forum, Page 4A District 17 Senator Joni Albrecht made a surprise visit to the forum to listen to the candidates on Tuesday. She spoke briefly to thank the public for coming out and to stress the importance of voting.

Power Drive team wins state competition

A total of 19 cars from 10 schools competed in three different classes on Saturday during the state competition of Power Drive.

Wayne High School's car E39 completed 143 laps during the 90 minute competition, ahead of Elkhorn's E4, which completed 138 laps, Beatrice's E8, which came in with 81 laps and Friend's E12 with 64 laps around the quarter mile track.

This was Wayne's seventh championship (within the last eight years) and the ninth time the team has won the endurance rally at state (within the last 10 years).

"Fast work in the pits by our pit crew during driver's changes helped us keep the lead during the race. This was a 90 minute rally, requiring two pit stops, where we finished one mile ahead of our competition," said Power Drive Advisor Tony Cantrell.

The second heat of the day was delayed due to a brief rain shower. Just after the halfway point of Heat 2 it rained again. The race continued through the rain, adding a new challenge to the race.

"We typically do not race in the rain, and have only twice before in the last 14 years,' Cantrell said.

The Wayne car completed 33.6 miles on Saturday, and 88.25 miles total this year. Since the E39 car was built, it has completed more than 850 miles in competition, and has driven well over 1,000 miles if you add in

practice distance.

The car uses just under 1KW (960 watts) of energy during a race being propelled by a 1hp motor.

"We use two red top optima batteries for safety (and rule compliance) and have for many years. Truth be told, one of the batteries we raced with this year has been used for the last nine seasons. If the students do not

abuse the batteries during the race, we can get them to last a long time," Cantrell said.

Many things are learned through the program besides electricity and mechanics. Teamwork, communication, and patience are just a few examples.

"Many thanks to everyone in Wayne who made the rally and our season a success," Cantrell said

Providence Medical Center to host open house May 20

Since the construction of Providence Medical Center in 1975, numerous renovation and expansion projects have taken place, but none to the magnitude of the most recently completed project.

Beginning in September of 2015, the large-scale renovation and construction project has covered nearly every surface inside the facility.

While the previous renovation and construction projects at Providence Medical Center had provided value, comfort, the opportunity for upgraded technology, the point had been reached where there could no longer be minor projects and cosmetic upgrades without first renovating the structural side of the hospital. Bringing in the most efficient HVAC and most capable electrical systems possible now will allow for future growth as the need arises.

Providence Medical Center is home to over a dozen specialty clinics, laboratory and radiography services as well as a therapy and wellness center. In addition the hospital now has a dedicated Emergency department with trauma bays, its own nursing station and privacy for those requiring the emergency services provided by Providence Medical Center.

The list of projects tackled during the renovation and construction at PMC is lengthy, but some of those include the labor and delivery suites, kitchen and dining areas, pharmacy, chapel, nurses station, lobby, administration wing, outpatient lobby, central supply and the laboratory.


Patient rooms received upgrades and the welcome desk was installed in the lobby.

"Participation is key to the success of any election," Gale noted. hope Nebraskans take the time to vote since many federal, state and



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voter registration surged, thanks to a reminder sent by Facebook. From Monday, April 23 through Thursday, April 26, 5,780 voter registrations, new and updates, were submitted online through NEReg2Vote and the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV).

"Taking into account the increase in voter registration, the contested nature of the races in the primary, and other factors, like the percentage of people likely to vote early, it is reasonable to expect that voter turnout will hit 28 percent," said Gale.

Gale went on to note that historically, smaller counties have the best participation in statewide elections.

In 2014, 17 counties exceeded 50 percent turnout in the primary. Of those 17, six counties were near or exceeded sixty percent turnout. Seventy-two out of 90 counties had 32 percent turnout or better.

Early voting remains an option for those who are not able to vote on Election Day. So far, more than 6,000 people have voted early, inperson at their county election office. They can continue to do so through May 14.

In addition, around 75,700 ballots have been requested by mail. Of those, nearly 37,800 have been returned or almost 50 percent. "It's important for voters to remember that it can take several days for a ballot to reach the correct county election office in order to arrive by Election Day," said Gale. "Don't delay if you are still holding a ballot, either get it in the mail immediately or be sure to drop it off at your county election office.

By mail ballots can be hand delivered up until the time that polls close on May 15. However, they must be returned to the county election office and not at a polling place.

Polls will be open from 8 a.m. - 8p.m. Central Time (CDT) and 7 a.m. 7 p.m. Mountain Time (MDT). The first results will be available on the Secretary of State's website at www.sos.ne.gov, as soon as the polls close. They will be updated throughout the night

> Recently more than 25 Wayne community members and staff from area mental health agencies participated in a community conversation, aimed at developing community-based solutions that not only attract behavioral health and mental health professionals, but also help them stay and set down roots in the community.

The discussion, hosted by the Northeast Nebraska Behavioral Health Network (NeNEBHN), focused on what communities can do to lay out the proverbial welcome mat by developing plans concerning housing, financial incentives, and community supports for behavioral health and mental health professionals and students.

Also discussed was how communities like Wayne can focus on erasing the stigma of mental and behavioral health and how to integrate mental health and behavioral health into a regular part of the way people look at health care. A wide variety of participants

attended, including representatives from Wayne State College, Wayne schools, public health, local government, economic development, graduate students, mental health care professionals and researchers, and concerned citizens

Why Wayne?

Wayne was chosen to be one of the Network's focus communities within the Networks' 24 county region for a number of reasons, including the presence of Wayne State College and the multiple programs they offer that foster mental health care professional education and development.

"With RHOP (the Rural Health Opportunities Program) and a graduate counseling program at Wayne State College, an active economic development organization, current and retired mental health professionals in the area, a community engaged public health department and so much more, Wayne has much to offer health care professionals seeking to live, work and thrive in a rural community," said Traci Bruckner, NeNEBHN Community Outreach Director.

Aside from the initial meeting, members of the group have already scheduled their next meeting to continue the conversation and identify a work plan that can be implemented and supported by this group and NeNEBHN staff.

During the meeting, the group talked about their vision for a mental health literate commu-

nity, where there is broad awareness and understanding of behavioral and mental health issues and how that could be a catalyst for the support network that not only behavioral and mental health professionals need, but for what creates a healthy rural community in general.

In addition, the group discussed the success of RHOP in bringing students and future rural health care professionals to Wayne State College.

Todd Young, RHOP Representative with Wayne State College noted: "RHOP has been a successful collaboration between WSC and UNMC for over 25 years as it helps students from rural Nebraska achieve their dreams of becoming a healthcare provider so they can go back and serve rural Nebraska. Currently RHOP has nine health career opportunities, including general medicine, pharmacy, dentistry, and physical therapy, with discussions in progress to possibility add occupational therapy and psychiatry to the program.'

The Northeast Nebraska Behavioral Health Network, is a nonprofit organization, whose mission is to improve the general health status of the 24 county region through enhancing access to behavioral health and mental health services.

The Network plans to accomplish this through a variety of strategies, including working with communities across the region, a placement system to recruit more professionals and students to the region, working with schools in the region to provide education and information to students and families about the opportunities for behavioral health and mental health careers, and education across the region on behavioral health and mental health issues. 

Jetensky is a middle distance runner from Tekamah-Herman High School. Last year as a junior, she helped Tekamah-Herman win a district title and was a Class C state qualifier in the 400-meter dash. WSC's Janssen, Rech earn Butch Raymond scholarships

Men's basketball player Vance Janssen and women's soccer player Natalie Rech were announced Thursday as the Wayne State College recipients of the fifth-annual Butch Raymond Scholarship sponsored by Sanford Health. Each student-athlete is awarded a scholarship for \$7,500 for the 2018-19 academic year.

The scholarship is in recognition of Butch Raymond, the NSIC Commissioner from 2004-14. For over a decade, Raymond led the NSIC from an eight-team league to a 16-team super conference. During his tenure, the league won 13 team national championships while achieving a high level of academic success.

Janssen is a 6-foot-2 point guard from Blair that has started every game in his three years on the Wildcat men's basketball team. This season, Janssen averaged 9.4 points and 3.1 rebounds per game while shoot-

ing 45.7 percent from the field and 86.7 percent at the free throw line. He ranked fifth in the NSIC in steals per game (1.5) and has a 3.707 gradepoint average majoring in chemistry health sciences/pre-pharmacy.

Rech, also from Blair, is a 5-foot-4 midfielder who has started three years on the Wildcat women's soccer team. This season, she started 16 of 18 games and recorded four points with one goal and two assists while ranking third on the team in minutes played (1,528). Rech was an All-NSIC honorable mention selection as a sophomore (2016) after leading the Wildcats in scoring with 10 points on four goals and two assists. Rech is majoring in chemistry and health sciences and maintains a 3.75 grade point average.

"Congratulations to the studentathletes who have dedicated themselves to excellence in the classroom and in competition," said Sanford Health President and CEO Kelby Krabbenhoft. "Sanford Health is honored to invest in the next generation of health care professionals through the Butch Raymond Scholarship. Six Central Community College softball players two of them from Wayne — and its head coach have earned 2018 Region IX Division II Softball honors.

Freshman infielder Ashten Gibson, sophomore catcher Danica Schaefer — both of Wayne — along with sophomore shortstop Mackenzie Eller, sophomore pitcher Katelyn Keene and sophomore infielder Jenna Robinson were named to the All-Region IX team. Freshman outfielder Shelby Behnk joined Eller, Keene, Robinson and Schafefer on the Region IX All-Tournament team.

The Raiders fared well in individual honors as Gibson earned Region IX Freshman of the Year honors and Schaefer took Region IX Offensive Player of the Year honors. Eller was named as the Region IX Defensive Player of the Year, while Keene was tabbed as the Region IX Outstanding Pitcher. Additionally, CCC head coach Jack Gutierrez was named as the Region IX Coach of the Year.

For the second consecutive season, Schaefer was the leading hitter for the Raiders with a .488 batting average to go along with 33 RBIs and a team-high 39 runs. She netted two home runs, a team-best 18 doubles and a triple.

Gibson finished the season with a win-loss total of 8-9 with a 4.06 ERA and seven strikeouts in 91.1 innings pitched.

Eller sported a .338 batting average, logged 18 RBIs and scored 35 runs. She also logged a home run

and 15 doubles, while only committing eight errors all season.

Keene logged the lowest earned ERA in the conference at 3.21 to go along with her 12-6 win-loss record. She also totaled 48 strikeouts in 131 innings pitched.

Robinson sported a .381 batting average, a teambest 55 RBIs and 32 runs. She also tallied a teamhigh 13 homers and three doubles.

The Raiders won the Region IX championship on Saturday with a pair of wins over Southeast Community College. CCC defeated the Lady Storm 11-3 in the first game, followed by a 12-4 triumph in the second. Both were five-inning victories. CCC is 20-19 on the season.

Tenth-ranked Augustana held Wayne State to just four runs and nine hits in two games to sweep the Wildcats 12-3 and 9-1 Friday in Sioux Falls, but the Wildcats responded with a sweep of their own the following day to end the regular season.

The opener saw Wayne State limited to just three hits as the Vikings used five-run innings in the second and fifth to take down the Wildcats.

Wayne State scored in the first when Alex Logelin was hit by a pitch and came home on a Travis Miller sacrifice fly. Augustana then scored two runs in the first and five more in the second for a commanding 7-1 lead after two innings.

The Wildcats scored two runs in the third as Logelin blasted a one-out homer over the left field wall, followed by a Bryce Bisenius RBI double that brought home Tanner Simons for the second run. Augustana put the game out of reach with a five-run fifth.

Logelin homered to lead Wayne State at the plate while Bisenius doubled and Garrett Graveline singled for the other hit. Hunter Wienhoff suffered the pitching loss, working four innings. Cedric Moreno worked two innings of relief and gave up two unearned runs on three hits.

The second game saw five Augustana pitchers limit Wayne State to just one run as the Vikings completed the sweep to win their 40th game of the season (40-6).

Similar to the first game. Wavne State scored in the first inning as Logelin opened with a double and scored on a Bisenius sacrifice fly to left field before the Vikings responded with two runs in the bottom of the first to take the lead for good at 2-1.

Augustana added single runs in the second and third for a 4-1 advantage, then added three in the fifth and two more in the seventh to close out the scoring.

The host Vikings held an 8-6 edge in hits over Wayne State. Simons was 3-for-4 with three singles to pace the Wildcats at the plate. Logelin doubled and scored the lone

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Wildcat run while Jake Lorenzini and Miller each singled.

Dalton Smith was the losing pitcher, allowing three runs on three hits in the first two innings. Brady Johnson and Charles Hasty each pitched two innings of relief while Adam Poldberg and Spencer Johnson each worked one inning of relief.

On Saturday, Kyle Thompson had a huge day for Wayne State, as the third baseman went a combined 6-for-10 to help the Wildcats beat Augustana 9-5 and 11-8 in 10 innings.

The opener saw the Wildcats score five runs in the top of the seventh to rally for a win in the opener.

Lawson Zenner, who came on in the sixth with one out in place of starter Aidan Breedlove, held the Vikings scoreless in the seventh to finish the win.

Wayne State had seven hits in the game, led by Thompson going 2-for-4 with a homer and three RBI. Bisenius added a three-run homer with Simons connecting for a two-run shot. Logelin also tripled for the Wildcats.

Zenner was the winning pitcher in relief of Breedlove, working the final 1 2/3 innings and allowing one hit with four strikeouts and one walk. Starter Breedlove lasted 5 1/3 innings and was charged with five runs on seven hits with three walks and three strikeouts.

The second game saw the Wildcats produce a season-high 19 hits as Wayne State outlasted Augustana in a wild 10-inning finale.

Dendinger receives NSIC Field Athlete of the Week





"Both players fill needs on the mound for us," remarked Koch. "We were looking to add depth to the staff – especially with lefthanders. These two young men have had a lot of success at the high school level and we are looking forward to them succeeding in college as well. Both are extremely intelligent and will do a wonderful job in the classroom as well.'

Petersen is a 6-foot-2, 240-pound senior lefthanded pitcher from Papillion-LaVista South High School, where he is a two-year starter in baseball and football. Last season as a junior, Petersen recorded a 6-4 mark on the mound with one save and a 1.76 ERA, notching 48 strikeouts with just nine walks. He also had a .317 batting average and received Class A honorable mention All-State honors from the Omaha World-Herald and Lincoln Journal Star.

Ruskamp is a 6-foot-2, 165-pound senior lefthanded pitcher from Wisner-Pilger High School where he is a three-sport standout in football, basketball and track and field along with American Legion baseball in the summer. Ruskamp earned All-District honors in football, was third-team All-East Husker Conference in basketball after averaging 10.6 points per game and as a junior tied for fourth in the Class C high jump at the 2017 State Track Meet while also being a state qualifier in the 300-meter hurdles. He earned Academic All-State honors in football, basketball and track and field and earned the RHOP scholarship to attend Wayne State College

The two spring signings join five other players in the 2019 recruiting class. Grant Carl of Bennington, Cade Herrmann from Gretna, Ryan Obrecht of Omaha, Nathan Sailors of Ralston and Andrew Staebell from Omaha, who all signed with Wayne State during the NCAA early signing period last November.

Junior first baseman Emily Chandler and senior catcher Katelyn Wobken represent Wayne State College on the 2018 NSIC All-Conference Softball Team.

Chandler received first-team All-NSIC honors for the second time in three years while Wobken was a second-team All-NSIC selection for a second straight year and was also awarded the NSIC Gold Glove at the catcher position.

Chandler, a 5-foot-9 junior first baseman, led Wayne State in batting average this season at .392 while starting all 45 games at first base. She tied Wobken for the team lead in hits with 60 and had seven homers, a team-high 43 RBI and nine doubles at the plate this season. Chandler also posted team-highs of 18 multi-hit games and 10 games with multiple RBI's that included a career-high six RBI going 5 for 5 in a 13-11 win at Minot State April 8.

In NSIC play (26 games), Chandler paced the Wildcats with a .429 batting average, recording four homers and 34 RBI and had 11 multi-hit games with eight multi-RBI contests.

Wobken, a 5-foot-7 senior catcher from Scribner, recorded a .377 batting average this season, starting all 45 games behind the plate. Wayne State College finished the 2018 season with a record of 16-29 overall and placed 11th in the NSIC with a league mark of 10-16.





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


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City Offers Alley Improvement Cost-Share Program

The City of Wayne will offer property owners the opportunity to improve their alleys on a cost-share basis. The warmer weather makes this the ideal time to plan for improvements in alleys that may become soft and difficult to travel this spring.

Property owners wishing to participate in this program should obtain a petition from the City Clerk's office at 306 Pearl Street and circulate it among the other property owners adjacent to the alley. As in the past, the city will share the costs of improvements with property owners signing the petition being responsible for one-half the cost. The cost to be shared by those signing the petition will be \$210 for crushed quartzite red rock for a distance of one block. Improvements will be made after the City Clerk receives the signed petition and as weather permits.

Improvements will be made only on through or open alleys for a full block distance. The city wishes to remind property owners that even though they may not use the alley where improvements are requested, their sewer, garbage collection, telephone, cable television, electricity, natural gas, and other services may be delivered from that alley.



Tree Board Chairman Marcia Rastede welcomed those in attendance with the announcement that 2017 was the 25th year of Allen being named a Tree City USA. With this in mind, the theme of the assembly was a review of the Historic Tree Grove, the beginning of Allen being involved as a Tree City USA.

A power point showed pictures of various stages of the planting and growth of the Allen Historic Tree Grove. Back in 1991, Superintendent Werner brought it to the attention of the seventh grade class (graduating class of 1996) a project of the American Forestry Association entitled Famous and Historic Trees. The association gathered seeds from various sites associated with famous people or historic events, grew them into small seedlings, and then made the seedlings available for purchase. The class decided to pursue this project. They studied the kinds of trees adapted to northeast Nebraska's climate and then the trees available to purchase. Community organizations, individuals, and couples were receptive to the letters written asking for donations.

Donations and number of trees paid for were received from the following: American Legion (2), American Legion Auxiliary (2), Waterbury Homemakers, Golden Rule Lodge, Lucky Lads and Lassies 4-H Club, Rest Awhile Club, Pleasant Hour Club, ELF Extension Club (2), Security National Bank, Duane and Jackie Mitchell, Herman and Marcella Wright, Dixon County Historical Society, Class of 1996, Allen Consolidated School (2), Allen Community Club (3), Casey, Wendy, and Tyler Schroeder in memory of Garry Schroeder, Bud Mitchell Family (2) in memory of Kathryn Mitchell and Mabel Mitchell, Chatter-Sew Club (3) in memory of Belle Warner, Alta Christensen, and Mabel Wheeler, Wallace Olmstead Family (2) in memory of Clarence and Genevieve Larson, Ruth Johnson in memory of Leslie Johnson, Class of 1996 in memory of Danny Puckett, R.W. and Mary Graham in

Many of the slides showed the trees as they were planted in 1992 and as they looked 10 years later. Everyone was encouraged to visit the grove and notice how the trees have grown in 25 years. The original identification signs on each tree were replaced in 2012 and the large identification sign was replaced in 2014. Expenses for these replacements signs was paid for by the Allen Community Club.

The power point ended by showing pictures of the students both in the audience and fourth grade classes involved in the Arbor Day assemblies for the past six years. The students enjoyed picking themselves out in each of the pictures. The assembly ended when the special Tree City USA flag outlining "25 Years" in gold was shown.

The activities for 2018 through 2020 to qualify Allen for Tree City USA status have already begun. Last fall, Rick Chase cut down and chipped out four trees at the Nature Grove that had died from Scotch Pine disease. The fourth grade helped clear away the brush. This spring fourth grade students helped plant seven Colorado Blue Spruce to replace the trees. Dead Scotch Pine trees will be cut down and replaced as needed for the next two years in an effort to maintain the trees in the Nature Grove.

Caring adults who believe that young people are capable of learning and doing great things are the reason 4-H Grows Here in Nebraska. 4-H volunteers can and have made this difference in counties where 4-H youth reported a 51 percent increase in their confidence they can create positive change in their community and a 46 percent increase in their confidence to lead other people.

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


A gift for the graduates

Spring has finally arrived to northeast Nebraska, and while the farmers are busy getting ready for another busy growing season, the youth of our communities are winding down. Soon the last class bell of the season will ring and all the students will rejoice as they head home for another fun-filled summer.

But for those school seniors in our lives, whether high school or college, the end of school for the year doesn't mean what it once was. For all of our graduates, this is both an ending and a beginning, a transition that they have been anticipating eagerly, and yet dreading at the same time. Now is the time for change.

For all adults whose graduation is now a distant and fond memory, we might have forgotten what it was like to suddenly embrace real and momentous change. For most of these graduates, they will have to adapt to new living situations, jobs, new communities, and new relationships. While this prospect can often seem exciting to those younger than 22, they may not realize that stress and anxiety will probably accompany them through this time of transition.

So what is the Church of Christ called to do at such a moment as this? Congregations already do a good job giving gifts to the new graduates and honoring them in



a worship service. Many churches have teams of people who send care packages to college students during the semester. While all of these actions are good, I think the body of Christ can do more.

I think our greatest calling as Christians would be to make a real effort to forge an intergenerational relationship with those graduates, whether they are staying in the community or leaving. Youth and voung adults usually have plenty of friends from their own generation, but I think many would still find it in their hearts to welcome the listening hear and empathetic heart of someone older from their home congregation (or local community for those youth not connected to a faith home).

I only have one word of caution: for an intergenerational friendship to thrive between a graduate and an older congregation member, the adult will most likely need to suspend his or her judgment. Use repellents for additional protection. Apply them to socks, pant legs, and parts of clothing that may brush against vegetation. DEET and permethrin are effective repellents. You can apply DEET to clothing and skin, but permethrin should be applied only to clothing.

Check your clothes and yourself when you've been outdoors in known tick areas. Particularly examine yourself around the waist, under your arms, inner legs, behind your knees, and around your head, including in and around your ears and in your hair. Adults should check their young children for ticks.

Tick numbers around your home are influenced by the amount of favorable habitat found there such as scape modification that creates a less favorable environment for ticks and their animal hosts.

Keep native vegetation short around homes, where it borders lawns, along paths, and in areas where people may contact ticks. It is not necessary to treat your lawn for ticks because ticks rarely infest maintained yards. Remove leaf litter, weeds and brush, especially from buffer areas where the lawn borders grassy, weedy or brushy ar-

It is generally not effective to treat large areas of woods, brush, or grass with insecticides as insec-

eas.

ticides do not always penetrate into areas where ticks are found in the leaf litter. Ticks can also be reintroduced into areas when wildlife carrying ticks move into a previously treated area.

In cases where high numbers of ticks are present in areas adjacent to home yards, treating the edges of wooded or brushy areas and paths can help reduce tick numbers. Use an insecticide labeled for a turf area and contains permethrin, cyfluthrin, or carbaryl as an active ingredient.



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are "waking up" and coming to life as well. Those organisms and the soil have a monumental impact on our crops and the way we manage irrigation, drainage, and especially fertility. With the re-awakening of our soils, I think it is a good time to talk about Nitrogen.

Nitrogen management is something that we all have to be cognitive of, whether we apply manure, commercial fertilizer, use cover crops, or just about any other farming practice. Of course with all of our different sources of nitrogen, we have exposure to many different risks. For

those of you that apply anhydrous ammonia in the spring or fall, you are keenly aware of those risks, and I am glad to say that many of you are using some sort of a nitrogen inhibitor to protect yourselves against the risk. But for those of you that rely on surface applications of nitrogen, whether as Urea or UAN, there are two things that can keep nitrogen from getting into the soil the way we expect it to that are often overlooked.

For those of you that apply Nitrogen as a UAN source like 32-0-0 or 28-0-0, are you considering the effect that residue has on your nitrogen plans? For those of you in this scenario, especially those of you that are no-till, or doing very light tillage like a turbo till, we have most of our residue above or at the soil surface. When deciding to apply your early season nitrogen needs, remember that microbes require a balance of carbon (residue) and nitrogen (fertilizer, manure, etc...) to digest the reside and break it down. It is only after that process is complete that our nitrogen gets to work its way into the soil, down with moisture, and into the root zone. When we apply these same nitrogen sources in season, we don't have the same issues because with fertigation or Y-Drops the product is "funneled" to the base of the plant and doesn't interact with residue in the same manner.

But for all of us that apply nitrogen to the soil surface, regardless of tillage type, we need to be considerate of the risk of volatilization. Volatilization occurs when nitrogen is in the organic form of urea. When this happens, the nitrogen is changed to ammonia gas (NH3) and lost into the atmosphere. It is most likely to take place when soils are warm and moist, and the source of urea is near the surface. I am not saying that soils are necessarily warm yet, but they will continue to warm, and we are one rain away from being moist (again) for those of us north of the Platte River. For those south of the Platte, May is usually one of our wettest months. In season, volatilization is probably our biggest risk for nitrogen loss

There is no way to apply nitrogen and completely eliminate the risk of nitrification, leaching, denitrification, or volatilization. But there are certainly products out there that will add protection to what we do to help prevent nitrogen loss. Just remember that there isn't a one size fits all option. Most nitrification inhibitors are good at preventing one form of loss and so-so with other losses

If you and your trusted advisor think that you have an unacceptable potential for nitrogen loss this spring, especially from volatilization, then I want you to consider using a urease inhibitor as not only an insurance source but a tool. What we all need to remember at all times is that effectively managing our fields, our soils, and our fertility isn't just affecting our farms and bottom lines. It also has the potential to affect the environment and those around us.

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
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



ORDINANCE NO. 2018-15

ORDINANCE AMENDING CIVIL AN SERVICE RULES AND REGULATIONS, SPECIFICALLY PROVISION THE RELATING то DEMOTIONS. DISCHARGE SUSPENSIONS AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Civil Service Commission is given the authority to recommend amendments of the Civil Service Rules and Regulations to the City Council as the governng authority; and

WHEREAS, the Civil Service Commission has presented their recommended changes to the City Council; and

WHEREAS, Nebraska Revised Statutes require the governing body of the municipality shall establish by ordinance procedures for acting upon such written accusations and the manner by which suspensions, demotions, removals, discharges, or other disciplinary actions may be imposed by the appointing authority; and

WHEREAS, both the Civil Service Commission and the City Council have determined that the following language regarding Demotions, Suspensions and Discharge should be amended to improve and facilitate the processes therein

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL of the City of Wayne, Nebraska, that:

Section 1. The following provision of the Civil Service Commission Rules and Regulations shall read as follows:

DEMOTIONS, SUSPENSIONS, AND DISCHARGE

Section A - Tenure of Employment.

The tenure of a person holding a position of employment under the Civil Service Act of the Wayne Code shall be only during good behavior.

Section B - Causes for Disciplinary Action.

Any such person may be removed or discharged, suspended with or without pay, demoted, reduced in rank, or deprived of vacation benefits, or other privileges, except pension retirement pension benefits, for any of the following reasons:

Administrator and employee.

The Police Chief shall recommend in writing to the City Administrator whether the alleged misconduct, charges, or grounds set forth in the written accusation shall be deemed: (1) to be without merit, (2) to not warrant disciplinary action, (3) to warrant disciplinary action less severe than removal. demotion. discharge. or suspension. with or without pay, such as an oral or written reprimand, or (4) to warrant removal, demotion, discharge, or suspension, with or without pay.

In the event that a Police Chief is being accused of a violation, the City Administrator shall follow the same procedures as are followed by the Police Chief in disciplining employees under the act.

Within ten (10) days after receiving a copy of the written accusation, the results of the investigation and the written recommendation of the Police Chief, the City Administrator shall decide to accept the recommendation of the Police Chief, or shall decide that the alleged misconduct, charges, or grounds for investigation against the employee set forth in the written accusation be deemed:

a. to be without merit, b. to not warrant disciplinary action,

c. to warrant disciplinary action less severe than removal, demotion, discharge, or suspension, with or without pay, such as an oral or written reprimand, or

d. to warrant removal, demotion, discharge, or suspension, with or without pay. The employee shall receive the decision of

the City Administrator in writing within the same ten (10) day period.

5. Any employee so removed, suspended demoted or discharged may, within ten (10) calendar days after receiving written notice of the City Administrator's decision, file a written demand for an investigation and public hearing by the Civil Service Commission. The employee shall file the request for the hearing with the Secretary of the Commission and simultaneously send a copy of such a request to the City Administrator. The failure to file such a request with the Secretary of the Commission within ten (10) calendar days of receipt of notice of the action by the City Administrator shall constitute a waiver of the employee's right to review by the Civil Service Commission and the City Administrator's decision shall become final. 6. Within seven (7) calendar days of receip of the employee's notice of appeal, the City Administrator shall cause the following notice to be mailed or delivered to the employee and Secretary of the Commission:

a. A statement of the charge(s);

- b. The names of the witnesses who will be called on behalf of the City Administrator and a general statement of the nature of their testimony; c. Copies of the documents to be offered in support of the charge(s).
- 7. Within nine (9) calendar days of the filing of the written demand for an investigation and public hearing by the Commission, the employee shall mail or deliver the following upon the City Administrator and Secretary of the Commission who shall distribute the same to the individual Commission members:

a. A response to the statement of the

charge(s); b. The names of the witnesses who will be called on behalf of the employee and general statement of the nature of their testimony; and

c. Copies of the documents to be offered in defense of the charge(s).

8. Upon receipt of a written demand for an investigation and public hearing, the Commission shall conduct an investiga 50.00 tion. The Commission may be represented in such investigation and public hearing by the City Attorney if authorized by the City Administrator. If the City Attorney does not represent the Commission, the Commission may be represented by special counsel appointed by the Commission for any such investigation and hearing. The investigation shall consist solely of a review of the written documents and information submitted by the City Administrator and employee. The purpose of the investigation is to determine whether any individuals or documents should be subpoenaed by the Commission for the subsequent public hearing before the Commission to ultimately determine whether the City Administrator acted in good faith for cause. Good faith for cause shall mean that the WAYNE action was not arbitrary or capricious and was not made for political or religious reasons.

shall be provided to every full-time law enforcement officer employed by the City of Wayne, and may be revised and/ or updated from time to time to comply with Nebraska Revised Statutes as the Commission deems necessary. In the event that any of the foregoing rules and regulations are in conflict with Nebraska Statutes, the Statute Nebraska Statutes shall control.

Section 2. The City Council hereby adopts the Civil Service Rules and Regulations, as may be amended from time to time, and a copy of the current Civil Service Rules and Regulations are available upon request from the City Clerk.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby amended and repealed

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage, approval, and publication or posting as required by law

The Police Chief shall explain the basis of the employer's evidence to the employee and provide the employee an opportunity to represent his or her version of the circumstances which resulted in the filing of the written accusation. Within 10 days of completing the investigation, the Police Chief shall file a copy of the written accusation and results of the investigation with the City Administrator.

If the Police Chief's investigation reveals other misconduct, charges, or grounds, the Police Chief shall amend the written accusation to include the other misconduct, charges, or grounds by filing an amendment to the written accusation with the Secretary of the Commission. After the investigation, the Commission shall schedule a public hearing to be held no less than then (10) nor more the twenty (20) calendar days from the date of filing of the employee's written demand for an investigation. The sign in sheet for questions was passed around to the guests and visitors. The Board took questions from the audience.





Presidential elections may grab the national headlines, but local elections also have a big impact on voters' daily lives.

Locally elected officials are typically much more accessible to voters, whose participation in local elections can bring about real change. With that in mind,

Sample Ballots

Election Day, whether you are selecting state, county, town, provincial, labor union, or school officials.

· Solidify your stance. The first step to casting your vote is deciding how you feel about key issues and candidates. Some voters back

here are some tips to prepare for a particular political party, while others spend more time moving across party lines and standing with politicians who have likeminded goals and ideas. Make a list of the issues that you find most important and want addressed in this election. Then research the stance each candidate takes on the issues that most resonate with you.

> · Research the candidates. Conduct some preliminary research into each candidate running for office. Chances are their websites provide background information regarding their qualifications as well as their stances on certain issues. Many times

newspapers will offer their own round-up on local candidates so you can get to know them further. Such information can save you the time and effort of look. ing into candidates on your own. Delve further when needed to see if the facts are correct. Examine public records for policies candidates supported to confirm if their ideals are similar to your own.

· Ignore the polls. If you strongly support a candidate and his or her agenda, then stick with your preferences rather than relving on the polls. Polls may be used to sway indecisive voters. However, even though the polls may be indicating one thing, the real test of a candidate's mettle is the end result come Election Day.

· Attend a town hall meeting. Many local candidates interact with voters at informal town hall meetings. This is a great chance to assess a candidate, and provides voters the opportunity to have their voices heard and ask questions about the issues that concern them. You also may be able to watch candidate forums on television or online.

Stick to the issues. The best candidate is not necessarily the one with the biggest campaign war chest. Resist the temptation to be swayed by the flashiest signs or the best slogan. Pay more attention to the candidates answers on tough questions.

Find your polling place

Voters need to be aware of their voting place to ensure they don't force ballots to be thrown out by voting in the wrong place.

Voters can visit https://www. votercheck.necvr.ne.gov/VoterView to find out what polling place is associated with their address.

Voters can visit the polls from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m. to cast their votes on May 15 for the primary election.


