Council holds short meeting, budget work session

A brief council meeting preceded the annual budget work session for the Wayne City Council on Tuesday.

The ordinances regarding annexing real estate to the city of Wayne in the Southview III Addition of the city, near Grainland Road, and a transmission substation service agreement between Nebraska Public Power District and the city of Wayne were approved and will be finally passed at the next meeting.

Wayne Police Chief Marlen Chinn and Wayne County Emergency Manager Nic Kemnitz spoke to the council on the city of Wayne's Operation Plan for Disaster Response and Recovery.

Chinn told the council the plan needs to be approved every five years and can be updated as needed.

Kemnitz said there were only minor changes to the plan, including the addition of the Wayne Fire Hall as an Emergency Operations Center.

The plan was unanimously approved by the council.

Pay applications for the West Inner and East Inner Conversion Electric Distribution Project and the Wayne Golf & Country Clubhouse Improvement Project were approved.

Following the council meeting, council members, department heads and City Finance Director Beth Porter gathered for a budget work session.

Porter first went through the revenue side of the budget, explaining where the city received money and projections for the coming year. Revenue from the Community Activity Center, swimming pool, city auditorium and Senior Center were among the areas discussed.

Expenditures for the various departments were also discussed.

These included the possibility of how the city attorney was paid and the fact that all

budgets include a two percent cost of living increase for employees.

The upcoming police department budget includes money for an additional dispatcher and two officers. The hiring process for the officers will begin within the next month as the money was also allocated in the current fiscal year's budget.

Representatives from Wayne Area Economic Development (WAED) Office were on hand at the work session to ask for a five percent increase in funding. It was noted that the WAED membership was also asked for additional contributions. WAED had not asked for an increase in funding in several years and council was assured that future increases would be less than the

present asking.

Considerable time was spent discussing the fire department's budget, which includes payments for ambulance services. Additional money will also be set aside for the purchase of a city engine truck within the next five to seven years.

Changes in the city's Parks budget include the cost of installation of the trail and the possibility of purchasing a tractor for mowing certain areas of the city.

The city's fiscal year runs from Oct. 1, 2018 to Sept. 30, 2019.

The Wayne City Council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, Aug. 21 at 5:30 p.m. in council chambers.

"This album is a project and I like to be busy with 'stuff.' I am fortunate to have two things that I love doing. This is a very up and down industry and I have learned not to be dependent on success. I have seen that the happiest actors are those who have other endeavors for when they are not acting," Kinney said.

Because she spends a great deal of time traveling, in her spare time, Kinney enjoys being home. She said she has enjoyed running since she was in junior high and loves to swim, hang out with friends, go to small places to see music. She also noted she has a "great boyfriend who is a musician."

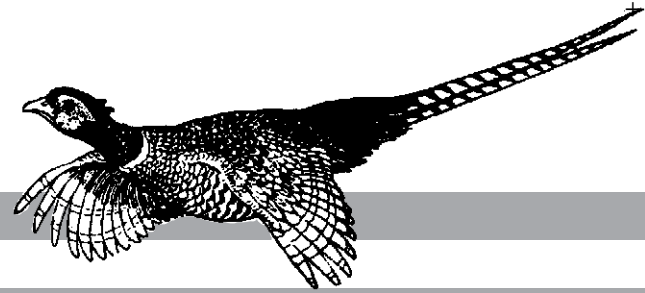

Budget Workshop

The Mayor and City Council held its annual budget work session on Tuesday, Aug. 7 after the regular 5:30 p.m. meeting in the Council Chambers.

The highlights of the proposed budget has the general tax levy set slightly lower this year with an anticipated nominal growth in real property valuation (the County does not verify tax valuation for 2018 until Aug. 20 so taxing entities have to estimate this number until that time).

Much discussion was held on the future of the City Hall building. Does the City renovate the existing space, does it add on more usable space, or does it find new property to build and/or renovate?

Rate increases for electric and water/wastewater were also discussed with more discussion to be held during Council meetings in September.

The budget documents, once passed in September, will be available on the City's website.

Old Swimming Pool Park upgrades

A townhall style meeting was held at the old swimming pool house on July 30 with about 25 people attending.

The purpose of the meeting was to get public input on potential

upgrades to this area. The City Council will hold a public hearing on Aug. 21 during its regular meeting to take additional input from the public on improvements to this area and then determine whether the City is in the right position to apply for grant funding this fall or if it waits with the application.

The Council will have to determine if the City has a clear enough vision for improvements at this time and if it can make the match requirements the grant mandates. If you have questions regarding this grant or the proposed improvement to the park area please contact me!

Wayne County Commissioners hear preliminary tax dollar requests during first August meeting

Wayne County began the new fiscal year on July 1 and the Wayne County Commissioners heard budget requests for the new year Tuesday morning at their meeting.

Kevin Davis, Jared Heithold and Amy Topp, representing the Wayne County Ag Society and Heather Headley and Lara Lanphear, representing the Wayne County Library Association made reports to the commissioners ahead of preliminary tax dollar requests.

Wayne County Ag Society requested an additional \$19,960.99 in funding, bringing their total request to \$110,000. Davis and Heithold said the increase was to cover repairs to the fairgrounds grandstands and surrounding concrete. They also discussed wanting

to build a new 4H building on the grounds.

The Commissioners told the Ag Society that they support improvements at the fairgrounds, but would have liked to see more specific information like an engineering report to go along with the request. The Commissioners unanimously voted to approve a \$10,000 increase for the Ag Society bringing their total to \$100,039.01.

Wayne County Library Association requested the same amount as last year, \$13,000. Both the Carroll Fire District #1 and Wakefield Fire District #9 requested less money than they had the year previous. The commissioners approved \$78,700.14 for Carroll Fire District #1, \$82,220.16 for Wayne Fire Dis-

trict #2, \$65,500 for Hoskins Fire District #3, \$47,960 for Winside Fire District #4 and \$110,000 for Wakefield Fire District #9.

Mark Casey, highway superintendent, made a report to the commissioners about road updates including fixing signage on 562 Road. Casey also discussed dam inspection results for the Dangberg dam and a litter reduction grant. Casey and the commissioners also agreed that the DMV's overweight/oversize vehicles permit will be added to the county's website.

Berggren Architects updated the commissioners on the progress of the courthouse exterior project. The team presented a stack of plans that included spec photos, plans for joints, masonry and carpentry.

The project will bring the courthouse close to the look of the original 1890's design of the building. Berggren representatives are in the process of planning a pre-bid conference that will be required for masons bidding on the project to ensure that the Wayne County courthouse will have the most skilled workers as possible working on it.

David Levy, from Baird Holm, LLP presented the commissioners with a \$2.5 million performance bond for NextEra. The bond is to cover road repairs should NextEra not fix damaged county roads or not fix them to the county's liking.

Emergency manager Nic Kemnitz brought the 2018 Wayne County Local Emergency Operation Plan before the commissioners. The plan is renewed every five years.

The next Wayne County commissioners meeting will be held Tuesday, Aug. 21 at 9 a.m. in the county courthouse.

Kevin J. Murray fishing tournament brings money to Wayne schools

In 2005, Sherry Murray and her three daughters worked through grief from the then recent loss of Sherry's husband Kevin by organizing a fishing tournament in his memory. After 14 years, the Kevin J. Murray Memorial Fishing Tournament is still going strong and registration for 2018's event is open.

Murray donates the proceeds from the tournament to the Wayne Community Schools Foundation — a place with significance to her and Kevin's early life.

"My husband and I both graduated from Wayne High. He got the start of his career at shop class and worked his way up the ladder at Kiewit (Construction)," Murray said.

Though the direction of where the money is spent has changed over the years, the fishing tournament has brought in a whopping \$116,000 to the foundation.

"In the beginning we were raising money just to do a scholarship for kids going into the construction trade and from there it snowballed into what we do today, giving the money to the foundation," Murray

said.

Through funds generated by the fishing tournament, Wayne Community Schools has been able to purchase items like welders for the industrial tech program, rubber matting for the weight room and a treadmill. Money has also gone to the Summer Sports Complex, and, of course, to scholarships.

The tournament will be held on Saturday, Aug. 25. Two-person teams fish at Lewis and Clark Lake from 7 a.m. until 4 p.m. After all the fish have been weighed there will be a banquet, raffle and award presentation at CJ's at the Lake. The banquet and raffle is open to those who don't fish as well.

Prizes for walleye include \$500 for first place, \$250 for second place, \$150 for third place. Biggest walleye will receive \$100, as will largest non-walleye caught.

The cost per team is \$120 and covers both team members' meal tickets.

Murray said she's enjoyed seeing the tournament grow from participants who knew Kevin to avid fishermen and women from the area

who might not know the family but love the sport.

"I'm surprised we're still doing this 14 years later," Murray said. "I

guess we're doing it until it's not fun anymore or people stop coming, but it keeps growing. I'm in awe."

Those interested in fishing in the

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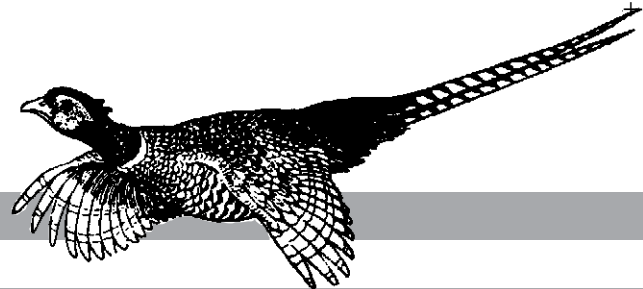

Joining the Wildcat Track and Field program for the 2018-19 academic year are Payton Birkel of

O'Neill, Brooklynn Chipps of Elgin, Taylor Gilsdorf of Madison, Brodi Hansen from Phillips and Dylan Kessler of Apache Junction, Arizona.

Birkel is a middle-distance runner from O'Neill Public High School where she was a four-year starter in volleyball, basketball and track and field. Birkel helped the Eagles win the Mid-States Conference girls' team title as a senior and was a Class B State Qualifier in two events as a junior (800-meter run and 3200-meter relay). She excels in the classroom, earning Academic All-State Honors in three sports as a junior and senior. Birkel was All-Conference in volleyball and honorable mention All-Conference in basketball during her senior season.

"Payton will help to strengthen our long sprints/mid-distance

group," remarked Brink. "She comes from a very successful program at O'Neill Public High School, so she has a good foundation to build on. She is a very successful student and in the RHOP program at WSC, so will be a great asset to the team academically as well."

Chipps is a thrower from Clearwater High School. During her senior season, Chipps placed fourth in the Class D shot put (37-5 1/2) and was 10th in the discus (103-1). Chipps earned Academic All-State and All-Niobrara Valley Conference honors while helping her team win the Niobrara Valley Conference girls' title as a junior.

"Brooklyn is a very athletic thrower, who we feel has a lot of untapped potential to improve at the collegiate level," said Brink. "She

has had a taste of success in high school and hopefully with the other great group of throwers she will be training with will achieve even more success as a WSC Wildcat."

Gilsdorf is a sprinter from Norfolk Catholic High School where she was a four-year letter-winner/runner in track and field. She was a Class C state qualifier in three events during her senior season (200 and 400 meter dashes, 1600-meter relay). Gilsdorf qualified as a junior in the 400-meter dash and helped Norfolk Catholic to a third-place finish in the 1600-meter relay.

"Taylor is a good sprinter who is versatile enough to run events from the 100 meters through the 400 meters effectively," stated Brink. She will give our young sprints crew additional depth and strength."

Hansen is a sprinter/pole vaulter from Giltner High School where he was a multisport standout in football, basketball, track and field and baseball. As a senior, Hansen was the Class D runner-up in the pole vault (14-4), anchored the state champion 400-meter relay team and was a state qualifier in the 100-meter dash. He was third in the pole vault as a junior and anchored the 400-meter relay team that took first place. In football, Hansen was All-District wide receiver and safety and Second Team All-Conference in basketball as a senior while helping Giltner to a fourth place finish at the state tournament.

"Brodi is a very athletic individual who has excelled in all sports," commented Brink. "He has a great build for a pole vaulter/decathlete.

We believe he has a great potential in the multi events to be successful at the college level and can give us strength in an event we have had much recent success with."

Kessler is a distance runner who will have two years of eligibility at Wayne State and will compete in both cross country and track and field. At Mesa Community College, he was a two-time national qualifier in cross country and was Third Team All-Conference while earning the Most Improved Runner award.

"Dylan will give our distance/cross country team depth and experience coming from Mesa Community College," Brink said. "Making it to the NJCAA National Championships, Dylan will specialize in the longer distance races for the Wildcats."



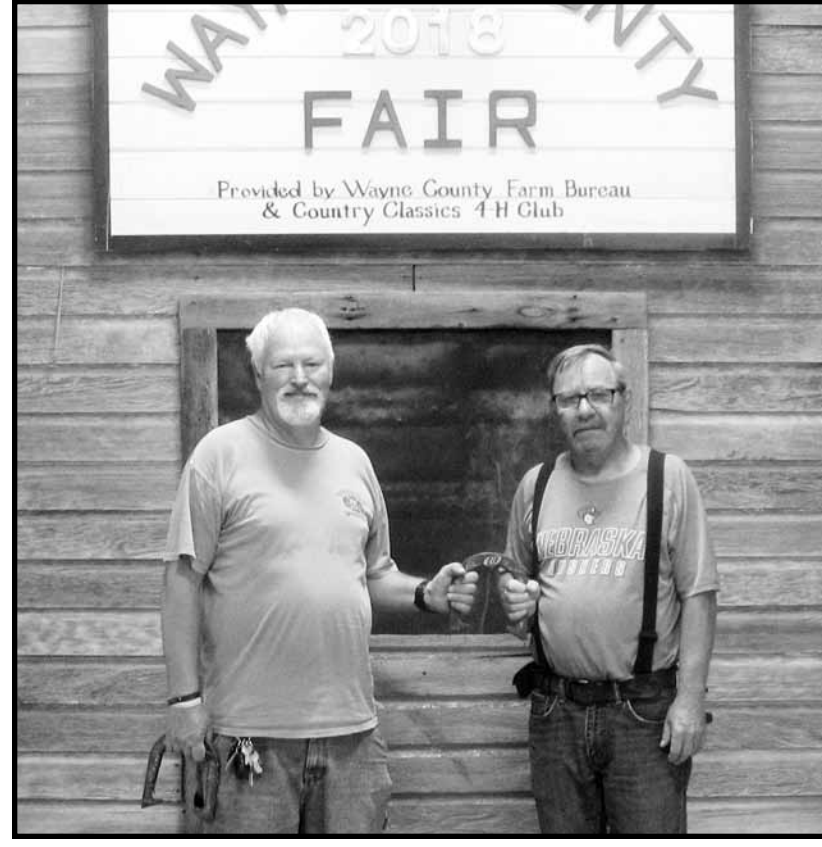
Wildcat women's hoops in top 10 academically

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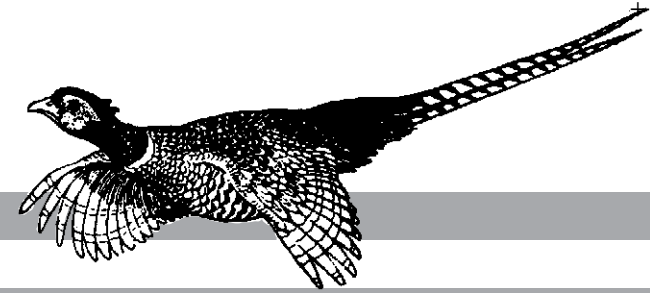

Capitol View

Could this be the session for school finance updates?

I have only known four people who could adequately and understandably explain the state's school finance system to me, and three of them are dead.

That pretty much says it all. To most of us, school finance is a bunch of numbers and schemes that are differentiated by acronyms. So, grab your notepad and start writing this down because a group of senators has been deep diving into proposed changes in school aid in Nebraska.

They're looking at TEEOSA - the Tax Equity and Educational Opportunities Support Act -- and other acronym combinations. Some have been on the books for years, some are flawed and others may just be a dream -- or a nightmare. Some will say there is no equity and too little support.

Sure, there are others out there who understand the system and can help senators wade through the benefits and deficiencies. But I could never wrap my journalist brain around a lot of that. I understood paying each school a certain amount of money per student, but when they started talking about equity to school funding between land-rich districts and schools with a wealthy tax base, my mind turned to those great chocolate chip ice cream cookie sandwiches they served in the Capitol Cafeteria.

Besides, that all sounded like property tax relief which has been another one of those oft discussed and sometimes cussed systems over the years. Guess what? The two are still inseparable. That's why Education Committee Chairman Sen. Mike Groene of North Platte called together a working group to come up with something to put before their colleagues in January.

Groene says the squeeze felt by taxpayers now is no different than the squeeze felt decades ago when lack of adequate state funding forced school districts to raise property taxes to pay up to 70 percent of school's operations in some cases. Efforts to relieve the prop-



erty tax burden with other sources of revenue have never really caught on. Groene calls it "promises unfulfilled."

The working group, some legislative staffers and folks from the Legislative Fiscal Office have started out with a look at the history dating back to the state's revenue crisis of 1967 when new Governor Norbert Tiemann was faced with empty coffers because voters had dismantled the existing tax system. His decisions on a new state sales and income tax cost him a second term, but he and many others believed it was the right thing.

The history gets better. In 1985, lawmakers pushed for school consolidation and forced elementary-only districts to merge with K-12 or high school-only districts, while also setting a 45 percent ceiling on property taxes to support schools. Years of debate on the issue culminated in one of the largest Education Committee public hearings in history with attendees filling the East

(Warner) Chamber and spilling out into the rotunda as the Education Committee screened a four-minute Dr. Seuss video of "The Xax."

A subsequent petition drive led to the repeal of the ceiling and three years later the Legislature created the School Finance Review Commission to study ways to lessen that 70 percent property tax burden when folks in other states were only paying 43 percent. State support for Nebraska schools at that time was about 25 percent, while the national average was 50 percent.

The commission came up with the current state aid formula -- TEEOSA -- which was enacted in 1990 as LB1059. That's one of those infamous bill numbers that still strikes fear and terror into the hearts of legislative observers. It ranks right up there with LB775 -- the Employment and Investment Growth Act passed during the Kay Orr administration (1987-1991) to keep ConAgra in Nebraska.

As reported in a recent Lincoln

Journal-Star article, TEEOSA calculates the difference between the money schools need to educate every child and what resources are available to each district through a property tax levy in order to determine how much state aid districts should receive.

Groene said the goal of TEEOSA was to increase state funding to each school while also loosening the dependence upon locally assessed and collected property taxes. But lawmakers haven't always made good on that promise. As a result, school administrators are scared of relying on state funding. And taxpayers don't trust anybody, he said.

A bill to provide property tax relief and adequate state funding for schools is the goal of Groene and his colleagues. Right.

Good luck with that!

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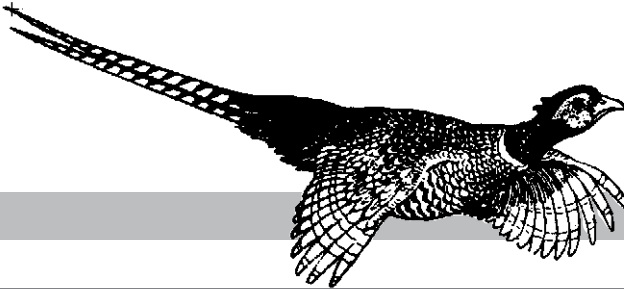

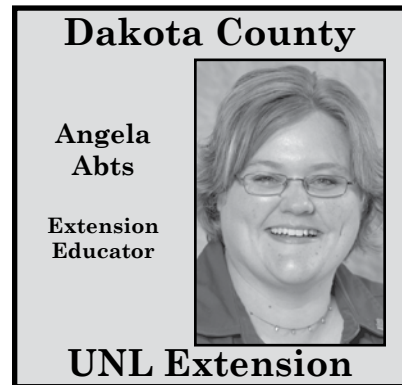
Makerspaces offer opportunities for all ages

Take a moment and imagine this happening in your local library. A young student explores electronics and circuits using a Lego Mindstorm robot. A young family with an idea for starting a local business solve manufacturing, packaging, and marketing problems. A youth group makes embroidered textiles to raise money for a school trip. A senior citizen builds a prototype birdhouse and uses computer software to complete the project.

This is a makerspace. I have been collaborating with the South Sioux City Library with the Innovation Library Studio project for the past five months. They have a temporary makerspace inside the library for the public to create, design, and imagine new ideas from a grant through the Nebraska Library Commission.

What is a makerspace? A Makerspace is community center with tools. Makerspaces combine manu-

facturing equipment, community, and education for the purposes of enabling community members to design, prototype and create manufactured works that would not be possible to create with the resources available to individuals working alone.



Schools are starting to add makerspace areas for students to apply STEM (science, technology, engi-

neering, and math) concepts with hands-on activities during school and afterschool hours.

Makerspaces can take the form of loosely-organized individuals sharing space and tools or several organizations affiliated with or hosted within schools, universities or libraries. All are united in the purpose of providing access to equipment, community, and education. Every makerspace is unique in exactly how it is arranged to fit the purposes of its particular community.

According to the New Media Consortium, youth can benefit from the makerspace experience. Here are some examples.

1. Be responsible for their own self-directed learning. Youth are able to explore topics that are of interest to them.
2. Get creative. Youth can problem solve using innovative solutions.

3. Explore new ideas in a safe space. They can feel more comfortable asking questions as they are designing and testing their prototypes.

4. Learn how to fail and try again. Youth can test a hypothesis and use problem-solving skills to solve their idea or problem.

5. Learn how to focus on an idea.

6. Express themselves and collaborate with others. Youth are able to share their ideas and get feedback.

The South Sioux City Library has been providing educational programs, workshops, and clubs for youth to explore the contents of the Innovation Library Studio from Circuits, Robotics, Photography, Coding, and Sewing through 4-H and Nebraska Extension. A few pieces of equipment available in the space are the following: 3D printer, laser

cutter, vinyl cutter, CNC router, embroidery/sewing machines, digital cameras, robotics, and much more. This space will be leaving South Sioux City soon and moving to another location.

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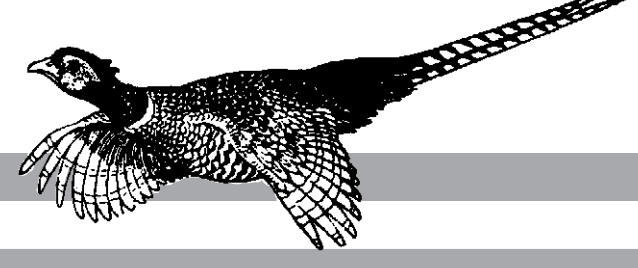

Worship in the great outdoors

Recently members of First United Methodist Church in Wayne enjoyed a church service at Bressler Park.

NET follows the water and two storytellers on a Platte River adventure

The North American Great Plains is an arid expanse of grasslands and rivers where the flow of Platte River water shows no respect for state boundaries. What do you learn if you try to follow that water?

NET's new documentary "Follow the Water" is a story about connections between the environment and people, and a river that shaped the land itself. It premieres on NET, Nebraska's PBS & NPR Stations, at 7:30 and 10:30 p.m. CT, Saturday, Aug. 18.

Nebraska photographer and author Mike Forsberg and filmmaker Pete Stegen set out on an adventure to follow a mythical drop of water 1,300 miles through three different states.

Through iPhone interviews, photography from the Platte Basin Timelapse Project, journals and drawings - and with a backdrop of spectacular landscapes - "Follow the Water" tells a beautiful story about water as it flows from the mountains to the plains.

"If you want to find where the power lies, follow the money. If you want to find where life is, just go follow the water," said Forsberg, about his journey through the Platte Basin Watershed.

For almost two months, Forsberg and Stegen pushed themselves to

the limit - biking, hiking and canoeing from the headwaters of the North Platte River in Wyoming to the mouth of the Platte where it flows into the Missouri.

The two men scale rocks and scramble up hills, hunker down in a summer thunderstorm, climb in total darkness, survey land near a wildlife refuge that will become a housing development and view a lone windmill on Colorado's Eastern plains as it pulls up water from the Ogallala Aquifer.

As part of their mission, Forsberg and Stegen capture water from three sources - melted water from a snowfield, rainwater from the sky and water bubbling up from the ground near Oshkosh, Neb. Eventually, the adventurers pour the water they collected back into the Platte River.

On their 55-day quest to "Follow the Water," friends joined them and guided them, and even rescued them when they got into trouble. Sunrises and sunsets colored the skies as the travelers moved from the solitude of alpine wilderness and the razor's edge of the Continental Divide, to the sprawling suburbs of Denver, to the peace of Nebraska's prairie, past Kingsley Dam and Lake McConaughy and finally on to the braided Platte River itself.

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Luhr is new hire at Haskell Ag Lab

My name is Nicole Luhr and this summer is my second year working at the Haskell Ag Lab (HAL) as an Entomology Research Technologist under Tom Hunt.



Originally, I am from a dairy farm in central Minnesota and graduated with a Bachelor's degree from South Dakota State University in Agri-

Business. Over the past several years, I worked at HAL as a summer hourly in various departments, including entomology. My husband and I also manage a row crop operation with corn and soybeans.

I started working here in April of 2017 right at the beginning of prime planting time, and learned a lot by simply doing what had to be done. Protocols from companies for different insecticide trials were all sent to me, and I quickly learned how to determine what the company wanted done, and how the projects were to be completed.

During my first year, I learned most of the basics of how things had to be done and I am now able to further my knowledge with more research and inquiry, and hope to use more technology in the future. This spring semester I was able to take seven credits of online courses

through the University of Nebraska-Lincoln towards an Entomology Masters degree. I will continue with more classes this fall.

We have a busy work schedule during the summer, I hire hourly workers to help with the duties associated with entomology research. This summer I had the honor of hiring Lyndsey McCoy, Allison Echtenkamp, and Jenessa Kardell. Allison and Jenessa both worked in the entomology department last year and Lyndsey's first year at HAL consisted of an internship through Northeast Community College. With the school season approaching, they will be heading back to continue their education.

Even though the hourly workers will be gone for the summer, it doesn't mean work is done. Trials and studies still need to be tended to before harvest. Some of the work includes infesting and spraying for a European corn borer, bean leaf beetle, and a soybean looper, along with monitoring a soybean aphid trial and sweeping fields for stink

bugs. After spraying, the work still is not over. Each trial needs to be evaluated a specific way as prescribed in the protocols. Later on, when the crops are ready for harvest, each plot is harvested individually to record the yield. The above studies are not the only ones being conducted this year; they are in addition to corn rootworm and western bean cutworm research.

If anyone is interested in learning more about the research that is done at the HAL, the Climate and Crops Family Field Day is on Tuesday, Aug. 14 at the Haskell Ag Lab located at 57905 866 Road just east of Concord.

The day runs from 9 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. with something for everyone of all ages. Included are speakers, vendors, tours, educational booths and more! 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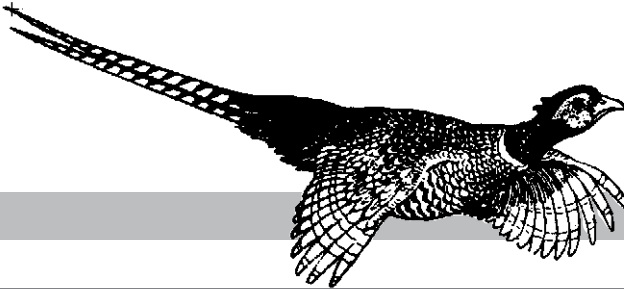
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New things helps with attitude

Anyway, I'm going to look around for more new things; it does wonders for the attitude!!

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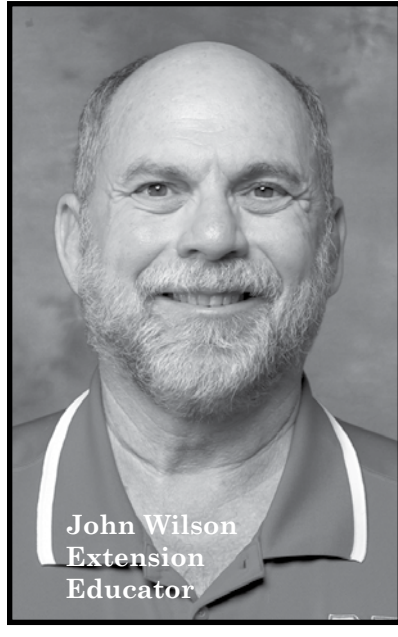
Soybean Management Field Days planned

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Soybean Roots - 2018 Lessons

Every single growing season, there are lessons to be learned from our crops if we are just patient and humble enough to set aside the things that we are sure that we know. Each and every year, if we are willing to look and listen to our crops as if we know nothing, we will learn something that flies in the face of conventional wisdom. This is perhaps even truer when it comes to soybeans than any other crop. I am convinced I know less about soybeans today than I did 15 years ago, but at the same time, I know far more interesting nuances they have.

Every year when it comes to moisture probes, I have growers ask me if those probes should be placed in corn or soybeans. My standard answer for many years is that you will have more opportunities to take action throughout the course of a growing season watching and managing corn, but you have the potential for a greater impact on profitability with soybeans. The reason soybeans aren't particularly exciting to manage with a probe is that there really aren't many opportunities to take action until about the 25th of July in most years. This makes sense when you understand how soybean roots develop. Between V2 and V6, soybeans can develop roots that can reach 30". Then the plant begins its rapid root growth until the R2 stage (full bloom) and develops most of its root mass in the top foot if moisture is adequate, but deeper if it is in short supply. All of this coordinates with what we "know" about soybeans, if they aren't short on moisture before they are V2, then we don't want to irrigate them until late July.

In most years, we have some dry, hot spells, and especially in early July, we develop a good deep root mass. Normally this time of year, our soybeans will pull about 65% of their moisture from the first foot, 25% from the second, and 10% from the third. But this year has been different for many of us. The moisture that we have had in many areas from June 18th through the first half of July has meant that we have deep penetrating root that was developed in early June, and a mass of roots that grew during a wet period that dominate the top foot. So when we look at a moisture probe, we have a condition going on where the plant is using 80% of its water in the top foot, 5% of its water in the second foot, and 15% of its water from the third foot.

Unlike corn that ends its vegetative growth when it starts silking, soybeans continue to grow roots (progressively slower) even up to the time that they begin to turn yellow. This means that this condition of what I am going to call hourglass roots could be over with by the 15th of August and the plant has grown out of it, or it could persist the entire remainder of the growing year. And with our soybeans still needing around 9" of water to make it to maturity, for those of you that are irrigators, this could have a significant impact on how we manage irrigations for the next few weeks.

And so today's take home is really two different things. Certainly, we see some fields and some varieties that have this hourglass root zone happening this July that is worth monitoring from an irrigation management standpoint. But the bigger picture here is that we see a somewhat extreme weather pattern triggering an out of the ordinary growing pattern. I seriously doubt that this is the only case of something out of the ordinary that we will see in our beans or our corn for the rest of the growing season. The real question is going to be, are we willing to keep our senses and our minds open identify, assess, and potentially accept the other oddities and opportunities that present themselves the remainder of our growing season?

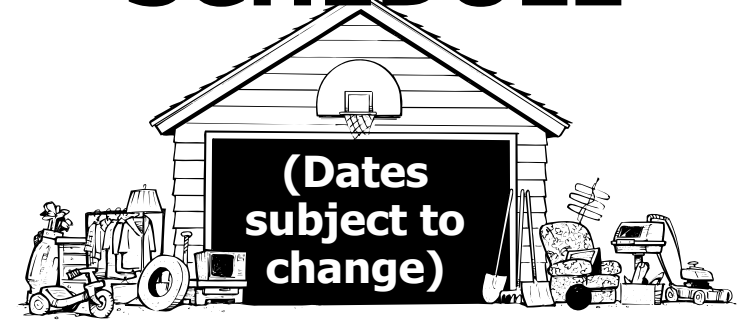

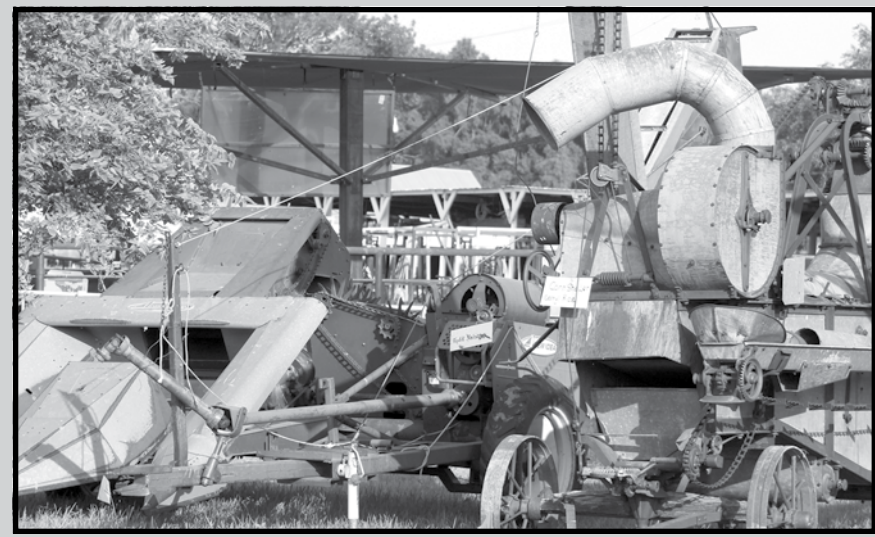

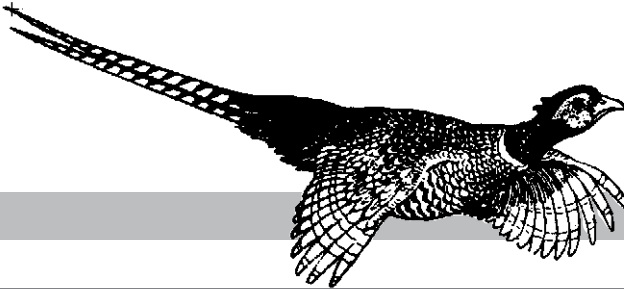

The groundwater controls apply to a geographic sub-area of District, a map of which can be accessed in Chapter 5.

The surface water controls apply to the Elkhorn River Basin portion of the District, a map of which can also be accessed in Chapter 5.

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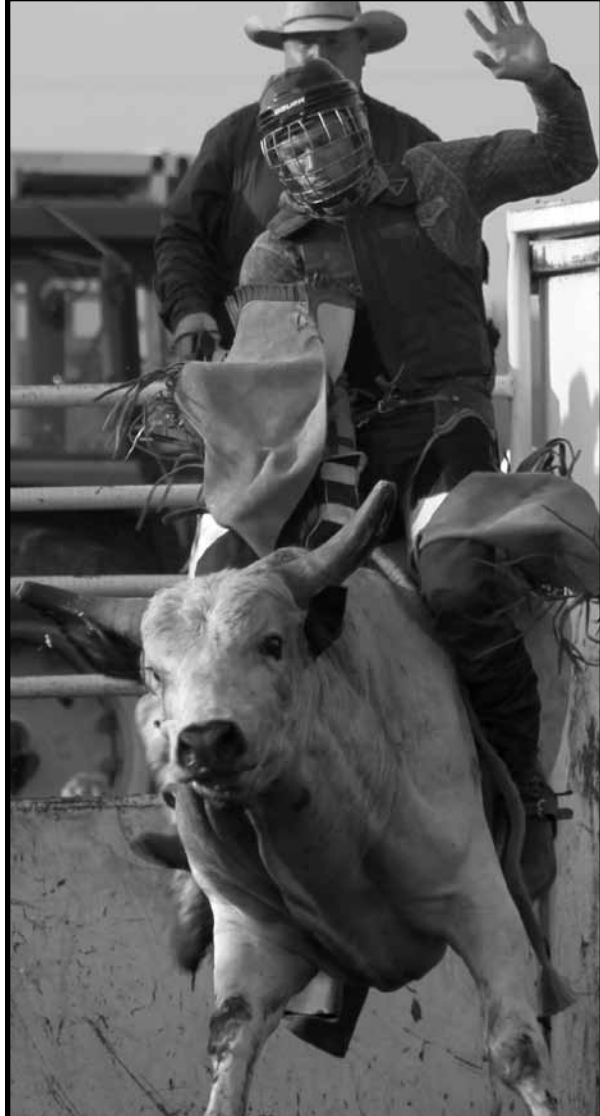
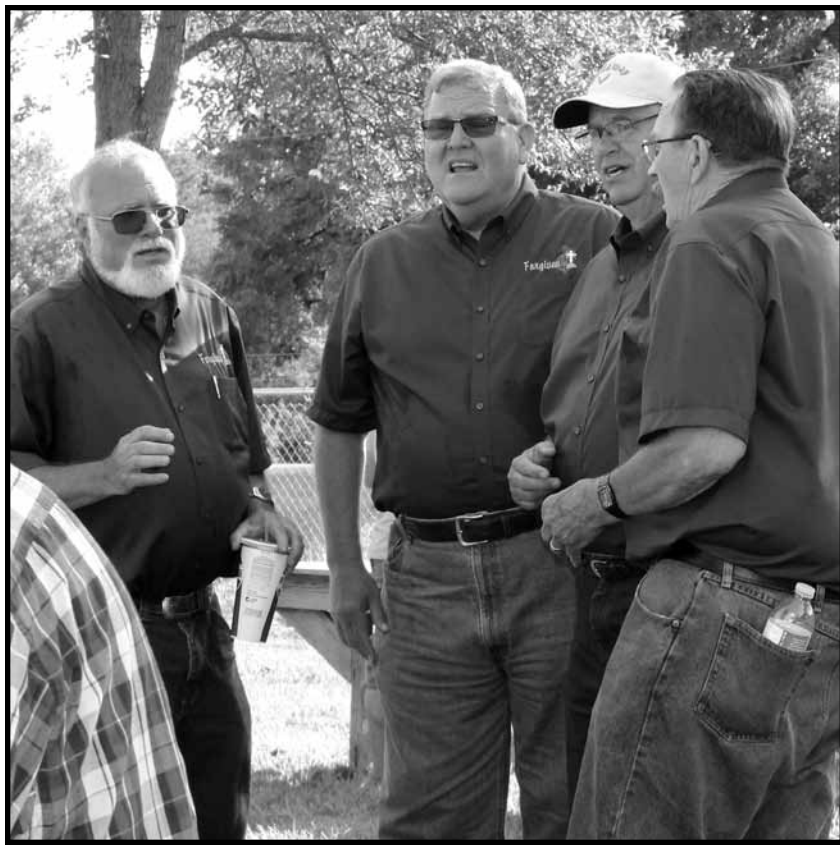
