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Roads issues discussed at Wayne county commissioners meeting

Ahead of a budget work session, the Wayne County Commissioners met for the final August meeting. After approval of minutes and claims, highway superintendent Mark Casey gave a report and Wayne County citizens addressed the commissioners.

Mark Casey reported to the commis-

sioners about a couple of issues. First was a meeting with Tradewind Energy. The company will begin construction of its 300 megawatt project in 2020. Tradewind will

have most of this project located in Pierce County, though some of it will be in Wayne County. The company hasn't released details about where towers will be and they haven't sold any power yet.

Casey also stated that road crews have had to do some maintenance work on county roads in the last week due to rains and NextEra traffic. Recently most of NextEra's work has been concentrated in two areas so wear and tear have been more significant. However, going forward, the scope of traffic should be spread over a larger area. The company is contractually-obligated to keep the roads maintained and they have dedicated graders and maintainers to do so. There's still a lot of work to do on the project, but the road traffic should be better.

"They still have got a lot of equipment to move in, all of the concrete to go in the holes and all of the steel to go in," Casey said.

Roger Brandt and Tom Wittler came before the county commissioners about road maintenance and to voice concerns about the wind energy project.

Brandt and Wittler requested the County address a high crown on 857 Road between 563 and 564 Avenue. Right now, the crown is about 18 inches high and the pair would like it fixed before harvest time as it's hard on truck tires and trailers. Commissioner Dean Burbach agreed to address the road before that time.

Brandt then took the opportunity to voice his concern about road budgets and taxes increasing for Wayne County residents due to wind farm costs. Brandt stated that he wished the county would have held a town hall meeting about the possibility of wind farms in the county years ago. The commissioners and Casey stated that the landowners involved knew of the project before the county.

Brandt also warned the commissioners that if the county has to spend money because of the project, citizens may vote to find others to fill their jobs and claimed that Next Era has changed plans after an agreement was made between the company and county. Commissioners Randy Larson and Jim Rabe assured the pair that nothing has changed since the final agreement.

NextEra both has to maintain roads as they work, and once work is over, must restore roads to their original condition. Last Wayne County Commissioners meeting, NextEra provided a \$2.5 million bond for road work after the project is completed. Casey said the county is trying to be mindful about spending.

"I'm not going to say that it's not going to cost anything. We already have to update things like signs on roads, but some of that is things we would have to do eventually for public safety, this has just sped it up," Casey said.

Wes Blecke asked the commissioners to adopt a resolution amending the Tuffen Blue Estates Subdivision Agreement to permit private wells. When the agreement was originally approved by the Wayne City Council and Wayne County Commissioners private wells were prohibited. The commissioners agreed to pass the resolution subject to what the city council passes.

A three year agreement with Election Systems & Software, LLC for ballot layout, coding, printing and voice file service was approved and signed and a resolution authorizing Wayne County Attorney to foreclose on a delinquent tax lien on certificates of tax sales numbers 66 and 67 was adopted.

The next Wayne County Commissioners meeting will be Sept. 3 at 9 a.m. at the Wayne County Courthouse.

Wayne State College debuts new crime scene investigation house for fall semester

Wayne State College has a new facility to teach in this semester. The Crime Scene Investigation House is brand new this fall and the college is hosting an open house on Thursday, Aug. 23 to celebrate.

Dr. Jason Karsky, criminal justice professor will be utilizing the CSI House in his classes, and said the new facility was much needed.

"Criminal justice has become a little more scientific than in the past, and we were doing scenarios and scenes and things like that but we didn't have a facility for it," Karsky said.

Before the fall 2018 semester, criminal justice majors were relegated to practicing crime scene investigation in empty classrooms and conference rooms and back stairwells.

The new facility offers a little more class-

room control, and not just because students aren't allowed to have their phones or take photos.

"This is going to allow us to set up a scene," Karsky said. "Sometimes scenes take weeks to process, sometimes months if they're big enough and now we'll be able to set things up and when the class is over, lock the door."

The fully customizable classroom house where they can get training that will benefit them long after graduation.

"I hope it's going to give our students the upper-hand in the hiring process in regards to their experiences because they came from a program that has a crime scene investigation house," Karsky said. "It's all about the student learning and their experience."

With roughly 220 students majoring in criminal justice, many students will go through the house and gain important hands on experience. Classes like Forensic Crime Scene Investigation, Criminal Invest-

igation and Emergency Management will heavily use the building. Karsky is also hoping to get other students in on the action as well.

"We're going to collaborate with some other courses to hopefully do a scenario that starts with the crime, the investigation and carry it through to mock trial," Karsky said.

He also hopes to reach out to hard science majors like chemistry, communications and to the theatre department. Karsky also said it's the college's goal to use the facility as an outreach opportunity. It could be used for things like police training and hostage negotiation training.

In addition, Criminal Justice Club members will be able to participate in regional and national crime scene investigation competitions in association with Delta Upsilon, a criminal justice club, according to a press release from the college.

The Crime Scene Investigation House cost about \$350,000 and can be made to

represent just about any scene or scenario. Currently, the house features bedrooms to represent a home scene, but is completely changeable.

Ground broke on the project in the spring of 2018 and concluded in July. The same month it was completed, the Crime Scene Investigation house hosted a CSI camp for middle school and high school students.

Karsky is grateful for a solution that has taken students out of stairwells and into a state-of-the-art building.

"I can't say enough about our donors," Karsky said. "Without donors who believed

in our program and what we're doing, it couldn't have happened and we're really excited. It was an expensive project but it's really going to benefit our students."

The public is invited to a ribbon-cutting and open house from 2-6 p.m. Wayne State president Marysz Rames will deliver brief remarks at the start of the event. After that, the public can walk through the facility and demonstrations will be going on and faculty, including Karsky will be on hand to answer questions. Council debates hours parks are open

Council members took two votes on whether or not to amend the city code in regard to hours city parks are open throughout the community during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Wayne Police Chief Marlen Chinn told the council that in 2013 the council had voted to set hours at three of the parks in the city that were having the most issues at night, the Softball Complex, the Rugby Park and the old swimming pool park. However, the new language was not officially put in the code.

The ordinance language would close the parks at 11 p.m., giving the police authority to deal with those who may be in the parks breaking the law. Also discussed was the vandalism to bathrooms in city parks.

Debate centered on whether walking through the park to a friend's house was breaking the law.

Council member Cale Giese asked the council "Do we want to live in a police state?"

Council member Matt Eischied told the council he felt the council had the obligation to "protect all those who call Wayne home. This is for the safety of the community."

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

Signature verification ongoing for Medicaid expansion petition

Secretary of State John Gale has announced that county election officials are continuing to complete their task of processing over 135,000 petition signatures submitted as part of the petition drive to expand Medicaid.

At least 84,269 valid signatures are required to add the initiative to the 2018 General Election ballot. In addition, signatures of more than 5 percent of registered voters in 38 counties must be gathered.

Gale noted, "As of Aug. 17, my office has received certified numbers

from 79 of 93 counties accounting for 56,288 valid signatures. Of the 79 counties reporting, 42 counties have accepted signatures above the 5 percent threshold."

Secretary Gale anticipates that the certification process will be complete in the next week and will report final certified numbers at that time.

Grant application for street improvements

The Mayor and Council have authorized another grant application for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) - Phase II Year 2 funds. This is a follow up application to the ADA Pedestrian Curb Ramp project the City was awarded in 2017.

These grant funds would be used to help assist with the cost of making street improvements to Nebraska Street between Seventh

and Second Streets. This stretch of city street has an asphalt overlay that has created issues with storm water drainage. The improvements would include a new concrete street with enhanced drainage and ADA compliant ramps at each intersecting curb. We hope to be notified of grant award later this fall/early winter.

Parks

At their last meeting the Mayor and Council had a lengthy discussion regarding City parks and the hours they should be open to the public.

In 2013 the Council chose to establish park hours for three park areas: Summer Sports Complex, Rugby Fields, and the old swimming pool park. This time the Council discussed expanding the regulated areas. The trail system was a point of contention as some residents choose to use the trail at all hours of the day and night. The first reading of this ordinance to close all parks from 11 p.m. to 5 a.m. (besides the ones with camping allowed) passed; the following readings will take place at the next meetings.

Budget Public Hearing

The budget process is a long process that City staff work on starting in mid-Spring each year. The formal process ends with the Council passing a budget in September.

At the next Council meeting on Sept. 4, the City Council will consider adopting the annual budget. This will come after a public hearing so the public has a chance to voice comments and concerns about the budget. Once the budget is passed it will be posted on the City's website for all to read and enjoy!

Construction on the clubhouse at the Wayne Golf Course is still ongoing. Rusty Parker, current president of the Wayne Country Club Board of Directors, said the clubhouse may be open before the end of the year.

About 95 Wayne Country Club members have raised \$378,357 in pledges for renovating the existing clubhouse and adding an addition. The current clubhouse was built in 1968 and hasn't had any major updates since that time. Parker and other country club members decided it was time for a change.

"The membership and the City recognize the value of having an 18-hole golf course and it got to the point where the clubhouse didn't match the course," Parker said. "It was time for the current generation to do something for the future generation."

From there, board members began work raising funds and getting the members to buy into the idea of a new clubhouse. When it's all said and done, accounting for construction, furnishing and landscaping the project is estimated to cost about \$545,000.

The pledges were key for the project to begin, but even with the pledges coming, Parker appeared before the Wayne City Council to secure \$210,000 in LB840 Sales Tax funding from the City. Parker said the country club has been very mindful of cost throughout the whole project and did as much work with pledged funds as they could before actually accepting LB840 money.

By doing their own work like roofing and shingling, and eventually painting, the country club was able to work from January through August solely from pledged funds. Parker said it's possible that the renovated and improved clubhouse


could be open as early as the beginning of November.

Parker said there have been some bumps in the road, but the golf club members and the City have come together to get the project up and running.

"The most challenging was getting a process in place and trying to figure out how to finance it — figuring it out with co-mingled membership and interests," Parker said. "It took the city council, mayor and the last two city administrators to help us find that path, and the member buy-in has been great."

Wayne has had a golf course since 1917 and Parker sees the importance of having a successful golf course in the community.

"It's an added value for people's quality of life. We have a lot of things in Wayne (to increase quality of life) and it makes Wayne a more desirable place to live," Parker said. "Not a lot of communities our size can say they have an 18-hole golf course that's a good, playable, challenging golf course."

It was also suggested that city staff survey towns of similar size and see how they handle parks. Joel Hansen, City Planner, told the council that Wayne is unique because the community has a number of small parks rather than one large park as is common in other towns. After a vote to include only three of the parks in the ordinance with time constraints failed on a vote of 2-6, with Council members Giese and Jon Haase voting in favor, a second vote was taken to include all the parks in the community. This passed on a vote of 7-1 with Council member Giese voting against.

The ordinance will be brought up at the next council meeting for a second vote.

Council members also took action on two items in regard to domestic wells in the Tuffern Blue Estates Subdivision.

The first, a resolution to amend the subdivision's agreement to allow for private wells, received unanimous approval.

City Administrator Wes Blecke said he and Todd Luedeke have had a number of conversations in regard to having the area hook into the city's water and the costs associated

with this plan.

On a related topic, the council approved an application for a well permit of up to 50 gallons per minute for Paradox LLC to put in a private well in this subdivision.

Mark McCorkindale plans to put in a well in the subdivision and was present to answer questions from the council. It was noted that studies have been completed in regard to a private well's impact on a well the city has in the area and there is no negative impact.

Considerable discussion was held on the possibility of applying for a Land and Conservation Fund Grant for improvements to the old swimming pool park.

Members of the pool committee, and the general public, have voiced their desire to have the area turned into a splash park and the old bath house remodeled into an area that could be used by the community for gatherings, as well as possibly a meeting area for Girl Scouts.

However, council members felt they were not in a position to move forward with a plan at this time because they do not know how much it will cost to demolish the old pool, or what costs associated with the renovations would be.

"We have to have the entire plan ready before we can apply for assistance. In the mean time, we need to get rid of the old pool, it is an eyesore," Council member Jason Karsky said.

In other action, the council accepted a check from the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District for \$25,000.

Joel Hansen, an at-large representative for the Lower Elkhorn NRD, explained some of the work NRDs do and projects they fund, including urban conservation and flood control.

The money will be used for the Bank Stabilization Project on the Logan Creek near the walking trail.

Mayor Jill Brodersen read a proclamation at the meeting which will make Friday, Aug. 24 "Be Kind Day" and encourage all to do something kind for someone.

City Clerk Betty McGuire was recognized with an award from the International Institute of Municipal Clerk's designating her as a Master Municipal Clerk.

The Wayne City Council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, Sept. 4 at 5:30 p.m. in Council Chambers.



In the opener, Wayne dominated Ponca 12-0 in a game that ended in three innings with a three-run bomb by Sidney Biggerstaff, capping a seven-run third inning to give Wayne the win.

Annie Kniesche doubled and tripled, scoring three and driving in three runs. Ankeny added a double and drove in two, and Josie Thompson and Kayla Fleming each scored two runs.

Tori Kniesche struck out eight of the nine batters she faced, throwing 30 of her 45 pitches for strikes.

In the semifinals, Wayne got a run in the second and a two-run double by Masyn Dorey in the fourth for insurance in a 3-0 win over Twin River.

Kniesche was nearly flawless in the semifinal matchup, striking out 14 of the 18 outs and allowing only

two hits and one hit batter to move Wayne to the finals.

In the championship game, Wayne won an exciting pitcher's battle with a 3-0 win over Arlington as Kniesche finished the day with her first perfect game of the season.

Young, hungry Wildcats look to make some noise

Last year didn't end well for the Wayne State volleyball team.

Playing in the toughest conference and toughest region in the country, the Wildcats were three

points short of knocking off the eventual national champions from Concordia-St. Paul in the Northern Sun Conference tournament. That loss ultimately cost them a chance

to compete at regionals, marking only the second time in 13 seasons that a Scott Kneif-coached Wayne State volleyball team failed to reach the NCAA tournament.

With six starters back from last year's 19-12 season, Kneif said the team is looking to get back among the top teams in the NSIC and the country and be in contention for a national title during the 2018 season.

"We're extremely excited about this season," he said in a preseason interview. "We basically have everybody back with a lot of NSIC experience, we have a veteran setter with Meghan who's done a phenomenal job of leading this group, and we only have two seniors on the roster, so we're still young but we have young players who got a lot of good experience and that should bode well for us."

Leading the returning starters is senior setter Megan Gebhardt, who recorded 1,133 assists last year and will be the quarterback of this year's Wildcats squad.

Four solid hitters are also back from last year, led by NSIC All-Conference second-team selection Jaci Brahmmer, who broke out with a fantastic freshman year by recording 292 kills and a team-leading 120 blocks last season. Fellow sophomore Alyssa Ballenger (181 kills, 249 digs), and juniors Tarrin Beller (147 kills, 91 blocks) and Katie Stephens (273 kills, 344 digs) are back, as is libero Haley Kauth, who will anchor the back row after picking up 476 digs last season and recording 18 service aces.

Seven letterwinners are also back for the team, with Maria Wortmann the lone senior in the group. Junior Morgan Alexander and sophomores Hope Carter, Maddie Duffy, Maddie Knobbe, Allison Timmermans and Jacee Weber back in the lineup.

The Wildcats also picked up some local talent among its newcomers. Wisner native Lauren Jacobsen comes in as a true freshman, while Allen native Gabby Sullivan joins the team after an All-American campaign in her sophomore year at Iowa Central Community College. Lincoln Southwest graduate Rachel Walker also joins the team as a true freshman.

Knief said the 19-win campaign of a year ago might be looked at as a successful season at other schools, but not at Wayne State.

"Nineteen wins was a down year for us and the standards are set very high, and that's what we want," he said. "We want to compete for a national championship and that's what you have to do in this conference. It's basically Murderer's Row from start to end."

Once again, the Northern Sun Conference is loaded from top to bottom, with five teams ranked in the AVCA Coaches preseason poll. For the first time since 2009, Wayne State is not included among the top 25 teams in the country.

"If you're in the top five (in the NSIC), you're in the top 15 in the country," he said. "We're receiving votes in the poll, but we want to prove to everybody we're a top 25 team and I feel we're capable of proving that."

It won't be easy doing so in what is unquestionably the toughest conference and the toughest region in Division II.

"Out of our region, you'll see 12 or 13 teams ranked and only eight get bids to regionals," he said. "It's a gauntlet and a grind and we'll do the best we can to go out and compete. I think this team can compete for a national championship, but it's going to take a lot of hard work. Our goal is to get to the NCAA tournament, and once that happens then anything can happen. A lot of people say you can't win a national title here, and we want to prove them wrong."

The Wildcats open the season this weekend in Daytona Beach, Fla., taking part in the Embry-Riddle Tournament. They face Westminster (Utah) and Lynn (Fla.) on Friday, with games against Valdosta state (Ga.) and host Embry-Riddle on Saturday.

The Wildcats will also play in the Southeastern Oklahoma Tournament Aug. 31-Sept. 1 in Durant, Okla., facing Southern Nazarene, East Central, Southeastern Oklahoma State and Central Oklahoma, before opening NSIC play at Sioux Falls on Sept. 6. Their home opener is Sept. 8 against Southwest Minnesota State.

Playing volleyball with Wayne State College volleyball players can sometimes give you a real headache.

The 2016 Allen graduate and junior college transfer who earned All-American honors at Iowa Central Community College last year, was on the receiving end of a Jaci Brahmmer attack during practice last week and ended up blocking the ball with her head, causing a concussion.

"I was playing defense and Jaci got outside the block and my hands weren't quite ready," she said with a smile during Media Day Monday at Rice Auditorium. "It was a solid hit."

It's not exactly the welcome you'd expect, but Sullivan said she has enjoyed stepping up from the junior college level to NCAA Div. II after playing two years in Fort Dodge, Iowa and leading ICCO to a 10th place finish at nationals last year.

That she is playing at Wayne State is something that was nothing more than a far-fetched dream for her when she was in high school. "It was always more like a hope and I didn't think it would ever happen," she said.

It's a hope that has become something more, thanks to two good years in Iowa and a recommendation from her coach, Sara Horn,

who once served as an assistant for Knief at Wayne State.

"We knew about Gabby in high school, but it was one of those situations where we were loaded at that position at the time," Knief said. "She found a good fit at Iowa Central and played for Sara and had a phenomenal experience there and performed really well."

Knief said he likes Sullivan's high-energy style and added that she has transitioned well from middle hitter to outside hitter.

"She's dynamic and played middle hitter most of her life before she moved to outside hitter, and the thing about her is that she's a point scorer," he said. "She finds ways to score points and she's adapting really well."

While the concussion was something of a setback, Sullivan said she passed her impact test and will be able to travel with the team when they head to Daytona Beach, Fla., for this weekend's Embry-Riddle Tournament.

"It's going to be a lot of fun," she said. "We'll get to see a lot of good competition these next two weeks and it will help us see where we're at."

Whether her concussion alters the team's practice habits, though, remains to be seen. "She's something like the third player who's been hit in the head by one of Jaci's attacks," Knief said. "We're either going to have to ask her to take it easy in practice or make our defenders wear bicycle helmets. Gabi took one off the snoot, and I'm sure it didn't feel good."

Five returning stagers are back for the LCC cross country teams as they get ready for the 2018 season. Alex Glabius is in his first year with the team, and he is looking forward to seeing what his runners can do this fall.

"We've got a good group of runners this year with a good mixture of experienced and new runners," he said. Three LCC boys are back this season, including Ryan Bathke, Landen Boysen and Trace Naeve. The Lady Bears have two runners returning, as Kayli Naeve and Vanessa Vance are back this season. Three freshmen boys will help

give LCC a team for varsity competition, as Trevin Boysen, Dillon Olson and Lenny Schumer will be new additions to the lineup. LCC starts the 2018 cross country season with the Wisner-Pilger Invitational on Thursday, Aug. 30 at Indian Trails Golf Club south of Beemer.

Experience Eagles expect to improve on 5-4 finish

After back-to-back 5-4 finishes and first-round playoff defeats, the Allen football team is looking for a little bit more in 2018. The Eagles return six starters on both sides of the ball as part of their 24-man roster after losing four players to graduation, and with several young players getting time last year, the Eagles should have an experienced group that is ready to take on a tough schedule this season.

"We look to get better with each practice," coach Dave Uldrich said. "Without a doubt we are a work in progress, even with the experience we bring back, and will need to get things to get done in camp. Hopefully, we will gel quickly, play hard and smart, and have a very enjoyable season." Seniors Kyle Smith and Isaac Verzani lead the Eagles this season. Smith racked up more than 1,900 yards in total offense last year and is a three-year starter, while Verzani was also an all-district performer who will lead the Eagles up front on both sides of the ball.

Also back this year are seniors Devin Twohig, the team's leading receiver and an all-district honoree; as well as Oscar Roth (FL/DB) and Wyatt Keil (OL/DL) as seniors who will also be expected to lead the team this year. Allen has several juniors who saw

They have non-district matchups with Emerson-Hubbard and Winside before diving into a tough district agenda that includes Bloomfield, Hartington-Newcastle, Randolph, Wausa and Wynot. "We have the ability to be a highly competitive squad, but what we do with those opportunities will be up to the team to accomplish," Uldrich said. "The old saying, 'You are as good as your seniors' will be the challenge to our squad leadership. We had a very positive summer football camp experience and hope to keep that momentum alive. If we play hard, we could be a darn good squad, and if we do not, it will be frustrating and not be pretty to watch. We hope to be playing as a confident team in November as a goal."

After 'disappointing' 6-5 season, Wildcats looking forward to 2018

Sometimes a winning season is cause for celebration, but for Wayne State football coach Dan McLaughlin, last year's 6-5 season was something of a disappointment.

With a senior-dominated squad last season, the Wildcats were oh-so-close to having an outstanding year, but a couple of late losses took some of the shine off the team's first winning season since 2012.

"We were 6-5 last year and really were disappointed with that," McLaughlin said during the team's media day last week. "We gave away a couple of games at the end. Sometimes you're 6-5 and thrilled and last year it was a disappointment because we felt we could have done better."

How this year's team will do is going to be interesting to watch, as 21 seniors graduated from last year and the Wildcats come into

the 2018 campaign with an experienced defense and an offense that will have a number of new faces this season.

The Wildcats lost a three-year starter at quarterback last year, but do have some experience returning with junior Aaron Bleil, who started two games last year and played in six contests, completing 49-of-106 passes for 674 yards with eight touchdowns and two interceptions. He and redshirt freshman Brady Brandsfield will be the top two signal-callers heading into the season.

McLaughlin likes Bleil's work behind center and said he has enough experience to take over the job.

"He's a good player and he's played before and we'll see what he can do," McLaughlin said. "He played against Winona last year, so he's faced the fire and we're confident he can do so again."

The Wildcats also have some returning talent at the skilled positions. Sophomore Maliki Wilson was a backup to the graduated Rashad Trimble and averaged 3.8 yards per carry last year, and Ronald Carter is also looking like a potential candidate at the running back slot after having a good fall campaign.

Senior Nate Rogers gives the Wildcats some much-needed experience at the skilled positions and he's looking to improve on a great season last year where he earned first-team All-NSIC South Division honors after hauling in 44 passes for 577 yards and 12 touchdowns. He is currently tied with Jim Strahan for the career record for touchdown catches, as Strahan caught 27 balls between 1947-49.

Also back at wide receiver is junior Willie Walton, who caught 44 passes for 614 yards and five scores.

The entire front line will be full of new faces as the Wildcats graduated their entire front line last year.

Defensively, the Wildcats should be very tough as they return eight of 11 starters from last year, led by senior defensive lineman Xavier Graham, who led the team with 3.5 sacks last season.

"Xavier was great last year and really better now, and we're looking forward to seeing what he can do," McLaughlin said. "We've got some experience back (on defense) and some kids who've done it and we're counting on them to do it again."

Junior linebacker Tyler Thomsen was the Wildcats' leading tackler before suffering a season-ending injury in the seventh game of the year, and he will be back to anchor the Wayne State middle on defense.

In the backfield, the Wildcats will

have plenty of experience. Senior Emile Hope and juniors Ian Ailts, Shaq Paddy and Aaron Wright are all back this season. Ailts led the team in tackles with 92 last year, Paddy and Hope tied for the team lead in pass breakups with nine and Wright had 41 tackles, four interceptions and four pass breakups, and Wright also will help out on special teams where he ranked seventh in the league in kickoff returns and had a 100-yard touchdown return against Mary last year, the first for Wayne State since 2011.

McLaughlin said that depth is always a concern, particularly at the Div. II level, and staying healthy will be important for the Wildcats if they want to improve on last year's record.

"In D-2 you don't always have a lot of scholarships to work with and depth becomes an issue if you run

into injuries and that's what we had last year," he said. "It's always a concern with every team, but we can put a front line out there as good as anybody and if everybody stays healthy, maybe it's our turn to get through a year and stay healthy."

The Wildcats will get an early test right out of the gate as they host Winona State in the season opener Thursday, Aug. 30 at 7 p.m. on Cunningham Field at Memorial Stadium. The Warriors come in fresh off a playoff appearance last year, and McLaughlin said it will be a good first test for his team to start the season.

"We open with Winona, who is a playoff team with a lot of returners, so we've got our work cut out for us, but I'm excited for the challenge," he said.

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
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Wayne State's new tradition

Commission approves 2019 bighorn sheep season

The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission approved a bighorn sheep season for 2019. It authorized one auction and one lottery permit for the season at its meeting Aug. 16 in Valentine.

In addition, the drawing for the 2018 bighorn sheep lottery permit was held, with David Hunter of Auburn the winner. There were 2,279 applications in the lottery. The 2018 season is Nov. 27 to Dec. 22.

The other business, the Commission:

- took public input regarding the potential listing and delisting of state threatened and endangered species within District 6 (north-central Nebraska). Staff presented information for delisting the North American river otter and listing the flathead chub, plains minnow, and western silvery minnow.
- approved a plan for future releases of the Salt Creek tiger beetle

on its properties in the Little Salt Creek and Rock Creek drainages of southeastern Nebraska in order to advance the recovery and delisting of the species. The beetle is listed as endangered by Game and Parks, as well as the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

- accepted the Thomas C. Matter tract in Richardson County as a gift from the Nebraska Game and Parks Foundation. The 153.11 acres in two tracts will be designated the Thomas C. Matter Wildlife Management Area.
- approved a permanent easement request from the City of Norfolk to place a sewer line across Game and Parks' northeast district office land.
- approved hunting seasons in Niobrara, Indian Cave, Platte River, Ponca and Eugene T. Mahoney state parks and Fort Atkinson, Ash Hollow and Rock Creek Station state historical parks.

-- approved the proposed budget request for fiscal years 2019-2020 and 2020-2021.

In addition, a presentation was provided about the Sandhills Task Force, including its history and a review of some of its ongoing projects.

Staff also reported on fisheries projects ongoing on the Valentine National Wildlife Refuge. The objectives are to improve water quality and conditions for all fish and wildlife, remove carp, install barriers to prevent re-entry of carp and improve water management tools.

The Commission also heard a staff preview of fall upland game hunting. As part of the 2018 upland game forecast, staff provided preliminary results from the July Rural Mail Carrier Survey.

Additionally, a presentation was made about the potential use of falcons for abatement.




Moore was killed with a four-drug protocol never before used in executions. The State Department of Corrections' Director Scott Frakes, Attorney General Doug Peterson and Governor Pete Ricketts all refused to disclose details behind the protocol or where they obtained the drugs. They were apparently in a hurry to get this done because one of the drugs expires at the end of the month. Of course, Ricketts and Peterson are both up for re-election. But, (rolling eyes) that couldn't be the reason.

Ricketts, a practicing Catholic, defied the anti-death penalty stand of Pope Francis and the Nebraska Catholic Bishops. He again defaulted to the will of the people. Stop for a minute and remember that the issue has been debated for 27 years. Lawmakers voted to repeal it in 2015. Ricketts vetoed that bill and

For Release Wednesday, August 22, lawmakers overrode the veto in a move that cost three of them re-election after Ricketts contributed money to their challenger's campaigns. Then came the big cash donation to the pro-death penalty group.

As I have said before, there is apparently nothing illegal about Governor Deep Pockets putting his money where he wants to. But there IS a disturbing pattern here. If he doesn't get his way, he throws money at it. Apparently, money is power.

But, let's get back to the death penalty. Drug companies have filed



suit in at least 14 states seeking to stop lethal injections on the grounds that they make pharmaceuticals to help people, not to kill them. Since electrocution has been ruled cruel and unusual punishment, that pretty much leaves firing squad or hanging as the only options. Never forget that the state hanged an innocent man, William Marion, back in 1887. We know he was innocent because the alleged victim was seen alive in 1891.

Of course, there's mandatory life in prison. Moore was a good example of how that can work out. Lawmakers seemed to think it was a good idea back in 1979 and 1999 and 2007 and 2015. I can't understand why it isn't still a good idea.

Recently, 14 former prison administrators from other states, many with firsthand experience in carrying out the death penalty, asked to intervene in a U.S. Supreme Court appeal by a death-row inmate in Missouri. They cited the emotional toll it takes on prison workers involved in the "face-to-face" duty as another reason to end capital punishment.

"Such executions do not serve the state's interests in finality or justice," their legal brief read. "Instead they make public servants parties

to barbarism."

I do NOT want to diminish the murder victims in all this, be it the two people Moore killed or the three Robert E. Williams killed or the two that John Joubert killed or the one that Harold Lamont Otey killed. That loss of life was senseless and has taken a toll on the families that most of us will likely never understand. The fact that more attention seems to be paid to the accused than the victims is also a matter of concern and distress.

I used to be a death penalty supporter. Yes, I understand the public safety argument because I received a death threat after I wrote the crime story about Williams' two murders in Lincoln. The threat came from a "friend" of Williams. But, it was unnerving and one probably couldn't have blamed me for feeling better when he was behind bars.

That was early in a career that saw me spend lengthy time in courts and prisons, covering stories and starting to understand what has become a very, very flawed system. Just look at the resistance to disclose the drug protocol in the Moore case. I am not comfortable thinking that this was something concocted by reading Wikipedia or drawn on

a napkin by a couple of Corporals visiting with Director Frakes. The origin of the drugs is also troubling.

One last thing, the lack of transparency is unacceptable. Always will be. That's why I drastically changed my stand on the death penalty, which I now oppose.

Moore and Williams both became Christians. Williams wrote a letter forgiving Governor Ben Nelson for voting for his execution as part of the Pardon Board. As he was led to the electric chair, he reportedly said, "I'm going home." Moore's pastor said he was ready as well.

Former Associate Warden Larry Wayne put it in perspective.


"Spiritually, as a Christian, I just don't believe in capital punishment – even Carey Dean Moore," Wayne said. "He was brought into the world as part of God's plan. When he goes out, it ought to be God's doing, not man's."

Carey Dean Moore was killed by the State of Nebraska. Are we any better for it?

Biofuels Grow Nebraska

In our ag economy, biofuels are playing an increasingly important role in growing more opportunity for the next generation of farm families. With economic uncertainty and low commodity prices, ethanol not only helps build reliable demand for our corn, but it also helps our country achieve greater energy

independence. Nebraska now has the capacity to produce over 2.5 billion gallons of ethanol. The ethanol industry directly employs over 1,300 Nebraskans and indirectly supports many more jobs. Because of this, we have been spurring investment in ethanol by increasing flex fuel infrastructure, expanding trade opportunities, and advocating for biofuels at the federal level.

Over the summer, I have been traveling the state to highlight the availability of new flex fuel infrastructure. In the past couple of years, my team and the Nebraska Energy Office has been working with the Nebraska Corn Board and Nebraska Ethanol Board to install more flex fuel pumps in communities across the state. Recently, I visited Grant where Aurora Cooperative has launched a new flex fuel pump. In May, I attended a ribbon cutting event for new flex fuel pumps at the Bosselman Travel Center in Grand Island. As new fuel choices are offered at more retail locations, consumers become better

acquainted with these options and the lower prices. These new pumps will distribute thousands of gallons of biofuels to the many travelers crossing our state.

International trade is another important key to growing biofuels. Last September, Todd Sneller of the Nebraska Ethanol Board and Duane Kristensen of Chief Ethanol in Grand Island joined my trade mission to Japan. There they visited with the U.S. Grains Council about the Japanese market, which has since opened to American ethanol. The U.S. Grains Council, which the Nebraska Department of Agriculture and Nebraska Corn Board are members of, has been undertaking a major effort to expand exports into Japan. In 2015, I led another trade delegation to Denmark to visit the headquarters of Novozymes, a company that produces enzymes used in ethanol production. During the visit, we urged the company to continue to expand their investment in Nebraska. Since that visit, Novozymes has invested about \$50 million more into Nebraska. These stories illustrate why it is so important that our global partners hear

directly from Nebraskans on trade missions, so we can continue to open up more markets and attract new investments.

We have also been advocating with the federal government in Washington, D.C. to cut red tape and allow more freedom to market and use higher ethanol blends. Higher ethanol blends create more demand for our fuels and commodity inputs. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is the key regulator of biofuels at the federal level. Over the last year, we have been one of the voices calling for year-round sales of E-15. Right now, E-15 cannot be sold during the summer months, limiting our ability to market more of our ethanol product. I recently met with acting EPA Administrator Andrew Wheeler to underscore the urgency behind approving E-15 sales all year long. I also have a request into the EPA for a pilot program to test high ethanol blends like E-25 and E-30 in the Nebraska state government fleet. I have already directed state agencies to order flex fuel vehicles when possible and other vehicles must be compatible with E-15. The state has also switched over one of our main fuel pumps from E-10 to E-15, and we also have E-85 available. We want the opportunity to consume more of the great fuel produced right here in Nebraska.

This month, I submitted testimony on the latest round of biofuels production levels being set by the EPA. My administration will continue to urge the EPA to maintain a robust commitment to biofuels, so the next generation of farm families has the predictability they need to grow agriculture and grow Nebraska. 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

Tips offered for reading food labels

As children go back to school, it is a good time to start making small changes to eat healthier. One of the easiest changes you can make is reading the nutrition labels on foods and beverages.

1. Pay attention to the serving size. Is the serving size enough for

your meal or snack, or will you have to eat multiple servings? To help estimate, one cup is about the size of

a baseball and 3-4 ounces is about the size of a deck of cards. You may need to use a measuring cup until you can eyeball the serving size. If you eat more than the serving size listed, you will have to multiply the information on the food label by how many servings you eat.

2. Look at the servings per container. This is especially tricky on foods that we consider to be a single serving but it's actually more, like a can of soup, a 20 ounce drink or a frozen dinner. If the servings per container are more than one and you eat the entire container, you will have to multiply the information on the food label by how many servings you are eating. Some things we think are a single serving are actually two or more.

3. Look at the amount of sodium. Older adults should limit their so-

dium intake to 1,500 mg a day. So if your food has 750 mg of sodium, that is half of the sodium you need in one day. Divide the amount of sodium by 1,500 to determine the percentage for that day.

4. Make sure to look at the trans fat and saturated fat. Experts recommend that you keep these numbers as low as possible because they negatively impact heart health.

5. Don't forget fiber. It is recommended that we consume 25-35 grams of fiber per day. Whole grains (such as brown rice, oatmeal and 100 percent whole grain bread/pasta/cereal), fruits and vegetables are the best sources of fiber so choose more of these foods.

6. Get enough vitamin A, vitamin C, calcium and iron. Those are the required vitamins and minerals on a label, but there also may be addi-

tional ones listed. The closer those percentages are to 20 percent, the better. Higher than 20 percent is even healthier.

7. Only certain populations should pay attention to cholesterol and carbohydrates. If your physician has told you to limit cholesterol, you should look at that number. Those with diabetes should pay attention to the total carbohydrate number. Others do not need to worry too much about those numbers.

8. Look in two places for the amount of sugar. You can look both on the nutrition facts panel and the ingredient list. For a more visual representation, divide the grams of sugar by four to get the amount in teaspoons. Look in the ingredient list for corn syrup, anything with the word "sugar" or things that end in "ose" as those indicate sugar. The

closer to the top of the list, the more sugar that food has.

9. Protein needs are based on gender, weight and activity levels. Generally speaking, about 20 grams or so of protein per meal is appropriate. Use the labels to see how much protein you are getting.

10. When deciding between two similar foods, compare the nutrition labels. For instance, when deciding between skim milk and 2 percent milk, compare the nutrients listed such as total fat, calories, sugar, fiber, protein and vitamins/minerals.

Food labels provide a wealth of information for consumers — use them to choose healthy foods at the store.

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


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The importance of prayer stressed

Corn, soybean pests need to be identified


There are a couple crop pests I'd like to ask farmers, field scouts, crop consultants, or anyone else that is out in corn and soybean fields to help me identify. These are both relatively new in Nebraska and we are just learning more about them. Let's take soybeans first.

The orange gall midge is not a new insect in soybeans. It was first identified in a few isolated fields late in the season in Nebraska in 2011. However, we have not seen much of it since then until this year. It was first observed much earlier, late June and early July, and has been found in more fields at various locations in Eastern Nebraska.

The first symptom people will notice are dead or dying soybean plants. These soybean plants typically have dark discolorations near the soil surface that can extend up to the unifoliate node. The symptomatic plants easily snap off near the soil surface and small orange to white maggots are often found feeding in the stem, within the darkened area of the plant.

Little is known about the orange gall midge - we're not even sure what species of insect is causing this. Growers and consultants are asking how to manage this pest. As of now, we don't recommend applying any pesticides to fields due to the following factors. First, it's unclear whether orange gall midge is responsible for the damage observed in soybean plants or if it's a secondary pest. Mounting evidence is suggesting that orange gall midge may have a role in causing the damage.

Second, pesticides are not likely to control the maggots that are feeding inside the stem. Lastly, it's not known when adult orange gall midge adults emerge or the dura-

tion of emergence in soybean fields. Such factors are critical for determining if any economic returns will occur from a pesticide application.

If you suspect you have orange gall midge damage in your field, please report it to us. It is hard to keep the plant in one piece because they often break where the maggots are feeding. If you find this in your field, please put the upper part of the root system and the lower six

inches of the stem, even if it is in two pieces, in a sealable plastic bag and take it to your local Nebraska Extension office.

Now for our problem in corn. We have talked about bacterial leaf streak of corn for a couple years. It was first identified in the United States in a Nebraska corn field in 2016. Since then it has been confirmed in 70 counties in Nebraska, many more counties in surrounding states, and as far south as Oklahoma and Texas. It has been found in all counties in northeast Nebraska EXCEPT Burt County and Dakota County.

I've been looking for it and I'm sure it's out there, but I haven't been in the right field at the right time. Again I'm calling on anyone who hangs out in corn fields to help me confirm this relatively new disease. The initial infection usually starts on the lower to mid-canopy leaves and then moves up the plant. Infection can start early in the season, having been observed on V7 corn in June.

It forms lesions that run between the veins on a corn leaf and can be brown, tan or yellow. The lesions are very similar in appearance to

another common fungal corn disease, gray leaf spot. One way to distinguish this disease is to hold a leaf with lesions up to the sun or a bright light. Bacterial leaf spot lesions are strikingly yellow when backlit. The other way is to take a close look at the lesion itself.

Gray leaf spot lesions are typically very rectangular in shape with smooth edges and flat ends. Bacterial leaf streak lesions, although rectangular and about the same size as gray leaf spot lesions, tend to have wavy or jagged margins along the sides and the ends of the lesions are not as square as gray leaf spot.

Avoid a costly mistake of applying a fungicide to a field infected with bacterial leaf streak. Being a bacterial disease, fungicides will not control it. If you think you have bacterial leaf streak in your field, please bring a dozen leaves with lesions to your local Nebraska Extension office. We will confirm which disease it is or send it in for confirmation. The Nebraska Corn Board is covering the cost for these analysis.

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Volunteer Corn Trouble

This year we had more problems with volunteer corn than I ever remember before. Why, what is the reason for this? First, we had the integrity of the stalk and ear shank problems last year. Those problems, caused by weather conditions and plant health and genetics. We could rehash that event, but it's almost a full year in our rearview mirror, and the truth of the matter is, once it happened, there was nothing we could do about it. On the other hand, the other factor that led to this volunteer corn issue we could manage and do something about, so let's talk about that instead.

The best way to control volunteer corn is to prevent it from ever growing. That happens by making sure that the seed never makes it to the ground. Last year had some of the more challenging conditions for corn harvest that we have had for a while in operating the combine as well. Ears and grain were dry, and as those ears came down, we saw a tremendous amount of ear bounce and shatter. For many of us, the only option that we had was to shut the deck plates down and try to use residue to cushion the blow. However, that tactic was only marginally effective, and it does take more fuel and time to harvest an acre that way.

So last year we were out installing 360 Yield Saver on combines to capture the kernels and ears that get lost during harvest. With the conditions that we saw in 2017, not only did they pay for themselves, but they also made money in the first year. Will this harvest bring the same conditions? Probably not. We may have wetter corn, but at this point, all signs point to corn being dry this harvest. Will we have stalk and shank conditions that lead to ear bounce? I hope not. But, perhaps the greatest benefit was not realized by using the Yield Saver units last fall, because it wasn't wholly evident until this summer. Fields that had Yield Saver units ran on them last year were considerably cleaner when it came to volunteer corn pressure.

Now, is it reasonable to think that using Yield Saver will eliminate the need for adding a product to the tank to kill the volunteer corn? Probably not entirely, but it can make a huge difference. We have done kernel counts where the difference was 80-90% less corn on the ground. That is a great visual when you are talking about looking across a bean field in June, but what about those Corn on Corn acres? I am a firm believer that if you have any Corn on Corn acres, that Yield Saver is a must for your operation!

A portion of what is lost for yield when we plant corn on corn is because of the competition from those volunteer plants early in the season. Volunteer corn doesn't have the same vigor as the new seed we plant, but robbing sunlight, water, and nutrients early before it falls back is all it needs to do to hurt our yield. I believe that volunteer corn robs yield by stealing rows around at V5, not ear length or kernel depth.

So back to controlling the seed before it hits the ground. If you are losing 0.5 bu. per acre at harvest (that is about one kernel/sq ft), that is 45,000 kernels of corn on the ground to grow next spring. If you think that sounds high, I challenge you to get out and pull residue back at harvest and measure one-thousandth of an acre; it is pretty realistic. If 25% of those grow, that is 11,000 extra plants growing that could steal water, nutrients, and sunlight from the crop you are trying to grow. That hurts yield. If you cut that back 80% with Yield Saver, that number is much more manageable.

Now, I want you to think about some of the secondary costs hidden around your operation, to be a bit more specific, the secondary costs of some of our decisions. There are many ways to justify investing in tools that make your operation more efficient. A set of yield savers has a cost of around 2 bushels per acre. If 1/4 of your acres are Corn on Corn, that would be 8 bushels per acre if you associated all of the cost to those acres. How many of you can confidently say that volunteer corn in your corn costs you less than that? So, think about how much volunteer corn costs you each year, and then add that cost to the yield savings that you can see with Yield Saver. I believe this investment is a pretty easy decision to make.

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Iron Chlorosis can damage trees

Pin oak and river birch are trees that can suffer from iron chlorosis, a condition of yellow leaves due to a lack of sufficient iron in the plant.

Iron is necessary for good plant health and soils in this area have sufficient iron in the soil. The glitch comes in when the soil's pH (the measure of a soil's acidity or alkalinity) is high. Iron becomes limited at a pH of 7.5 and higher because the soil is "holding on" to the iron, making it unavailable for uptake by tree roots.

A quick plant physiology lesson is necessary here to understand why trees decline from iron chlorosis. (I promise the lesson will be painless.) Chlorotic leaves are less photosynthetically efficient. These leaves make less carbohydrates than their green counterparts. Because leaves are the photosynthetic factory of a tree, each leaf must make enough sugars for its own functions AND enough to pass along to the twig, then the branch, then the trunk and finally to the roots. Each plant part partakes of the sugars to complete their own functions then passes along the surplus. A tree is well aware when a leaf isn't photosynthesizing enough to complete this pathway. The tree will withhold sending water and nutrients to these leaves because they are using more energy than they are producing. Leaves die and, as iron chlorosis continues unabated, branches die. Eventually the whole tree can succumb.

Fortunately there are treatments that are highly effective. Iron Injections are a good rescue measure for trees with 25 percent or more of the canopy made up of chlorotic leaves. This can be done in the spring. There is no advantage to injecting trees with iron now because much of that iron will be lost when the leaves are shed this fall. The better long-term fix is one that does not entail injury to the trunk.

Yet this year, begin the process to lower the soil's pH by applying granular sulfur to the soil. By lowering pH, iron is released into the soil solution so roots will have access. A soil test by a soil testing lab is necessary to determine your soil type (whether it is sandy or clay) and the soil's present pH. This will dictate how much granular sulfur to apply.

After this information is known, you can check out application rates by accessing the Nebraska Forest Service website at nfs.unl.edu. <https://nfs.unl.edu/documents/foresthealth/chlorosis%20brochure%20west%202010%20Sep.pdf>.

It's been my experience that once a tree exhibits symptoms of iron chlorosis, it will ALWAYS need to be monitored for further issues of chlorosis. It does not go away on its own and one treatment is not a forever treatment. Again, while injections are a stopgap measure, the best fix is the noninvasive granular sulfur application to the soil. Because our bedrock is limestone, which pushes pH upward, consider applying some granular sulfur every other year to stay on top of this.
