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Wayne State College welcomes largest freshmen class since '95

Wayne State College welcomed 727 new freshmen to campus this fall, which is the largest class of new students since 1995 and the third largest since 1970. The college also saw a 14.83 percent increase in new transfer students with 240 this fall and a 24 percent jump in graduate students to hit 660 this semester. New facilities combined with new graduate, undergraduate, on-line academic programs, and partnerships, along with exciting visit opportunities and a robust scholarship program for students are driving the interest in Wayne State.

"We are tremendously excited about our enrollment numbers for fall 2018," said Wayne State President Marysz Rames. "The increase in freshmen and 10 percent increase in overall enrollment came from excellent and sustained work throughout the college."

One of the highlights of the record year at Wayne State has been the opening of two new facilities and the anticipated opening of a third this winter. The Criminal Justice Crime Scene Investigation Facility opened this fall. The \$350,000 lab facility will pro-

vide a variety of academic experiences connected to law enforcement officers; crime scene investigation; crime scene reporting for future journalists; emergency management exercises; processing a crime scene with DNA evidence; and fluid and arson analyses. The renovated Memorial Stadium Press Box, which opened this fall, will serve as an important laboratory for students as they prepare for careers in broadcasting, journalism and athletics.

The Center for Applied Technology (CAT) will be opening this December. The CAT is projected to serve as a gateway of opportunity for students to experience industrial manufacturing in an environment that cultivates interest and excitement in industrial technology. The Center will serve as a hub for programs of study such as manufacturing management, safety management, and industrial technology education. The CAT will deliver education for industry, provide a career academy for local school districts, and serve as a regional center for innovation and workforce development.

"We have opened a new academic year full of optimism that our enrollment growth reflects a recognition among students, parents, faculty, staff, and friends that Wayne State's programs, partnerships, and facilities combined with the most affordable tuition of any four-year college in the region make us a great choice for an excellent education," said President Rames.

In addition to new facilities, Wayne State added three new programs for graduate students. The new fully online master's degree in special education, designed to help professionals and districts meet the needs of students with exceptionalities and their families, offers four unique pathways, including initial certification, additional certification, advanced study, and supervisor. The Cross-Curricular Education (MSE Curriculum and Instruction - Instructional Leadership focus area) master's program is designed for those seeking an advanced degree in curriculum and instruction with a cross-curricular education emphasis, which may include courses in Reading and Language Arts, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, Health, Physical Education, Visual and Performing Arts, Career Education, World Languages, Technology, Leadership, Cultural Diversity and other content areas.

The Public Administration Management (Master of Science in Organizational Management focus area) degree program is for working professionals who want to serve the public through strong leadership and effective, well-developed policies and services. This convenient, fully online graduate program will help develop the skills and techniques needed for management careers in public service, non-profit organizations, and the private sector.

"The tremendous growth in our graduate programs reflects working professionals' confidence in our rigorous curriculum, the affordability of a Wayne State graduate degree, the excellence of our faculty, and the outstanding vision and leadership of the deans of each of our four schools," said Steven Elliott, Vice President for Academic Affairs.

Alongside the addition of several new graduate programs, Wayne State has added several new undergraduate academic programs during the past year. New paths for students among the college's 130-plus programs of study this year are Forensic Science, which is a double major combining chemistry and criminal justice; Manufacturing Management as a concentration in Industrial Technology; and a Pre-Athletic Training program that puts students on the path toward an athletic training degree.

During the past two years, Wayne State also responded to the needs of the Nebraska workforce with the addition of three fully online undergraduate programs. Wayne State College's online criminal justice degree lets students fit a college education into their busy schedule to advance their career in law enforcement, corrections, probation and parole, court services, asset protection, corporate and private security, and juvenile justice. Wayne State's online business management degree program lays a firm foundation in organizational knowledge, problem-solving, and decision-making, all through coursework, application projects, and case studies while an online human resource management degree from Wayne State will train you to improve efficiency and effectiveness in the management of people within organizations by learning human resource practices that support the organization's business strategy, including training and development, recruitment and

selection, employee compensation and benefits, labor law and employee relations, performance, and motivation.

Several new partnerships also resulted in new academic programs for Wayne State. The college's new Agricultural and Mechanical Engineering programs in partnership with the University of Nebraska-Lincoln will provide a solid foundation for students as they complete their first years of course work at WSC before transferring completed credits to UNL to complete their engineering degrees. The accelerated nursing program, a partnership between WSC and the University of Nebraska Medical Center, will prepare students for a variety of nursing careers: educators and faculty, managers and administrators, mental health and counseling. Through this program, students will obtain their bachelor's degree in the field of choice at Wayne State, then complete a year of classes to receive a nursing degree (BSN) through UNMC.

"Recruiting and retaining students requires a campus-wide commitment to our mission of student success, learning excellence, and regional service. We are quite proud to talk about who we are and the educational opportunities we provide, which is reflected in the excellent campus visit programs led by our admissions team, marketing and recruiting messages, and the stories we hear from our current students," Rames said.

"The increase in new students for fall 2018 is a direct result of very strategic and intentional marketing and recruitment efforts. Yes, it is the Admissions office that serves on the front line to prospective students, but we do not do it alone. It takes a campus to be successful," said Kevin Halle, Director of Admissions at Wayne State. "We appreciate the great support we have received from President Rames, our academic leadership, and all faculty, staff, and current students."

Commissioners discuss health coverage, bridges at Tuesday morning meeting

The Wayne County Commissioners met at the courthouse on Tuesday, Sept. 18. During the meeting the Commissioners heard updates on area bridges and office and insurance changes.

District Court Judge Mark A. Johnson talked about removing district court materials from the Court Services Building. The building housed the office of the District 7 judge, but since taking over, Johnson has kept his office in Madison. One employee is still using the building while creating a court transcript, but Johnson said he expects to have all materials out of the building by November.

Discussion next turned to County employees' health insurance deductibles. Wayne County Clerk, Deb Finn told the commissioners that several employees have prescriptions or medical procedures that would cause them to pay the health plan's \$6,550 deductible up front.

Through the health insurance plan, employees receive a \$4,000 reimbursement from the County. Finn asked the commissioners if they would approve a plan that would allow employees to get an estimate of medical costs from healthcare providers,

then be given the \$4,000 payment made payable to the provider in order to save the high up front cost. The commissioners approved.

Mark Casey, Wayne County Highway Superintendent, and Mark Mainelli, of Mainelli Wagner & Associates talked about road and bridge updates in the county. Casey said Wayne County and the local REA are working on an agreement that will State will accept for moving utilities by the Temme Bridge, southwest of Wayne.

Next, Casey and Mainelli discussed the need to ensure that NextEra was maintaining County roads for the duration of the project.

They also discussed the bridge over Logan Creek on Highway 15. Both stated that the State of Nebraska needs to come in to stabilize the banks of the creek because if there is as much more flooding in the area, the channel will cut further upstream, jeopardizing County bridges. Casey and Mainelli said they hope to set up a meeting soon, before it becomes an issue.

"Nothing is in immediate danger, but we'll have to deal with it eventually," Casey said.

The next Wayne County Commissioners meeting will be held on Oct. 2, at 9 a.m. at the Wayne County Courthouse.

Park closing hours again debated by council

Considerable debate on the topic of park closing hours was again held during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

At the last meeting, council members had tabled the second reading of an ordinance that deals with the hours the parks in the city are open.

City staff presented a number of changes in the ordinance and council members debated whether the ordinance should include all the parks in the city or only a limited number.

Council member Jason Karsky, who lives near Bressler Park, said he had talked to a number of people who live around the park and all were in favor of having closing hours for the park.

Council member Matt Eischied said he felt frustrated because the council doesn't get input from those who would be affected by the ordinance changes.

"This is a major change that affects lots of people. I don't want to take away from those who are enjoying the parks, but want

to protect the public. There is no easy solution," Eischied said.

Discussion was held on whether to close only the parks that the public can drive into. It was noted that the majority of issues the city crews deal with are in the parks that have bathrooms and shelter houses.

Council member Cale Giese said he believes the parks are public property and the public should be allowed to use them whenever they want.

He did introduce a motion to pass the ordinance that would close the Summer Sports Complex/Dog Park/Rugby Field and the baseball field/Hank Overin from 11 p.m. to 5 a.m. each day.

The motion passed on a tie-breaking vote by Mayor Jill Brodersen. Voting in favor of the ordinance were council members Giese, Jon Haase, Terri Buck and Nick Muir. Voting against were council members Matt Eischied, Jason Karsky, Jennifer Sievers and Rod Greve.

The ordinance will be brought back for third reading at a future meeting.

FlexCourt in, verdict on old swimming pool area still out

Wayne residents may have noticed work on what is commonly known as The Old Swimming Pool Park. The former basketball/tennis courts had a face lift with new FlexCourt covering, while the old pool site is being worked on while a committee works with the City to find a new purpose for the area.

On Wednesday, Sept. 12 a FlexCourt covering was placed over the courts next to the old pool. FlexCourt is modular polypropylene tiles made for indoor and outdoor sports courts.

The new FlexCourt at the Old Swimming Pool Park will allow for two full basketball courts, two pickle ball courts, a volleyball court, four square areas and hopscotch grids. The total project cost came in at about \$65,000, but the City got a \$30,000 grant from Nebraska Natural Resources District.

City Administrator, Wes Blecke said by the evening of the 12th, people were already using the courts, something he encourages everyone to do. The City is

still trying to work out what to do about the volleyball and pickle ball nets. Blecke suggests letting the City know when the nets will be in use so they can start to gauge how frequently they'll be out and what storage solutions will work best.

"Anytime you want to play this stuff, we'll make sure that it's up for you, it's just a matter of leaving them up all the time," Blecke said.

With the courts spruced up, half of the work on the Old Swimming Pool Park is complete, but the bigger task will be deciding what to do with the old pool and bathhouse.

Blecke said from the very beginning, one thing everyone in the area agreed on was that no one wanted new apartment buildings to go in where a recreation area once stood.

"With the investment just made on the old basketball and tennis courts, I think that's a pretty good direction. The Council is pretty adamant about keeping that a park area for now," Blecke said.

That's left the future of the area to Wayne's City Council and a committee of about 17 citizens to decide what to do with the space.

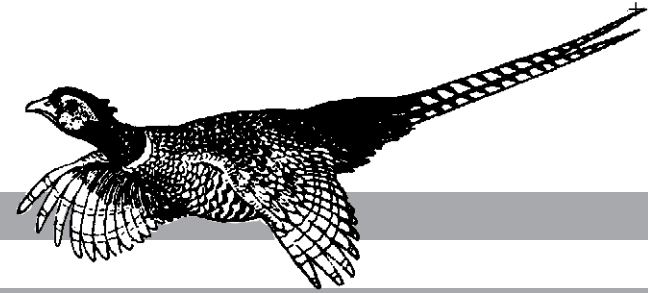
Popular ideas have included a splash pad in the pool area. Some would like to see the pool house turned into a community space that could be used year round with indoor and outdoor restrooms.

While the end goal is uncertain, work has begun. Decking is being removed from the old pool and sand is being removed. Eventually, Blecke said the Council would like to see the pool shell gone so that future generations won't have to worry about settling issues in the area.

The City is also asking for the public's help in naming the park. Suggestions are being solicited so that the area doesn't have to be referred to by an amenity that is no longer there. If you have a suggested name, contact the City at (402) 375-1733 or a Wayne City Council member.

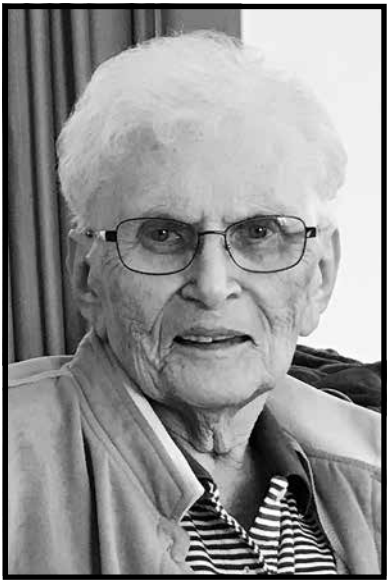

West Nile virus lingering in Nebraska

Human West Nile virus cases continue to be reported in Nebraska above what is expected for this time of year, particularly from the Douglas County and Sarpy/Cass counties health jurisdictions.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's most recent biweekly West Nile virus report, Nebraska was second only to North Dakota in overall human West Nile virus cases and first in the number of severe, neuroinvasive cases. To date, Nebraska has reported 79 cases with 42 of the cases being neuroinvasive. The 10-year median for this time of year is around 40 cases. Additionally, West Nile virus season in Nebraska has also contributed to four deaths, a high nationwide.

"Although we've had a rather dramatic shift into east-central Nebraska, it's important to remember that it's statewide," said Dr. Tom Safraneck, State Epidemiologist for DHHS. "This part of the country is ideal habitat for Culex tarsalis, which is the prime vector for West Nile disease."

West Nile virus is transmitted

through the bite of a mosquito that has picked up the virus by feeding on an infected bird. Only about 20 percent of those infected experience symptoms, which are generally flu-like, such as fever and muscle weakness. Symptoms of the more serious West Nile encephalitis include inflammation of the brain, disorientation, convulsions and paralysis.

The risk of West Nile virus will gradually decrease through September; however, a risk of West Nile virus infection will remain until the first hard frost of the season. Individuals are strongly encouraged to practice proper mosquito prevention anytime mosquitoes are present or likely to be present no matter where they are to decrease their chances of acquiring a mosquito-borne illness.

Preventive tips:

•Wear mosquito repellent when you go outside. .

•Dress in long-sleeved shirts, pants and socks.

•Dusk and dawn are times when mosquitoes are most active.

•Drain standing water around your home.

Northeast Community College Board of Governors approves 2018-19 budget

A decrease in funding from the state and no change in property valuations are among factors that will impact the operating budget for the next fiscal year at Northeast Community College. On Sept. 13 the Board of Governors gave unanimous approval to the College's 2018-19 budget following a public hearing during its monthly meeting in Norfolk.

Dirk Petersen, of Norfolk, chairperson of the board of governors, said he and the board are taxpayers themselves, and therefore, are very mindful of being good stewards of the funds necessary for college operations.

"Student success is our highest priority. Northeast Community College is diligent in achieving this goal and we take our stewardship of public funds very seriously. I am confident that this budget will allow the College to continue to provide a quality education for our students, which prepares them to help address the pressing skilled workforce shortages."

In each of the past four years, the Northeast board has lowered the property tax levy. However, the total levy for all funds in the 2018-19 document of 9.50 cents is up from 9.09 cents in 2017-18, but still below the maximum levy allowed by the state of 11.25 cents per \$100 of valuation.

According to Lynne Koski, vice president of administrative services at the College, the owner of a home in Northeast's 20-county service area with a taxable value of \$100,000 would pay approximately \$4.08 more over the previous year.

During Thursday's public hearings, Koski reviewed the general operating budget of \$49,024,243, \$18,298,860 in the building improvement budget, which is designed to save and prepare for future construction projects while maintaining existing facilities college-wide, and the accessibility barrier removal/hazardous materials budget of \$297,518. The total for these three tax supported budgets is \$67,620,621.

Koski said increases in the 2018-19 general operating budget are attributed to mainly personnel and support services to help students succeed in college.

"Funding for the College's general fund budget comes primarily from student tuition and fees, state aid, and property taxes," she said.

The Board of Governors has also approved a budget lid override as set forth by state statute. Koski said the override permits the College to accept additional state aid or property tax dollars if they would become available.

Dr. Michael Chippis, college president, said the approved budget provides for the continued "forward work" of the College, as well as playing an integral role in meeting Northeast's strategic goals.

"Across our 20-county service area, Northeast Community College provides an exceptional educational experience for our diverse student population. Through the Vision 2020 comprehensive plan, the Board of Governors has been strategic about where the College needs to be in order to best educate a 21st century, highly skilled workforce; and this budget supports the board's direction."

Chippis said Northeast Community College plays a significant role in not only providing a skilled workforce, but it is also a major player in the growth of the service area's economy.

"The College is an investment in the future of our 20-county service area and the more than 100 communities we serve."

Petersen noted that it is important to remember that the College continues to look at reinvesting in the communities throughout the region it represents.

"For example, this is highlighted by the work taking place in West Point where construction of the Donald E. Nielsen Career and Technical Training Facility is currently underway. Northeast is among the partners working to bring in seniors from eight high schools in 16 area communities in order to learn the technical skills that are necessary to help fill the jobs of area businesses and industries. The facility will also serve as a model for other community colleges across the country to emulate in addressing the workforce shortage issue."

"As a board, we take very seriously our role to be responsible custodians of public funds," said Jeff Scherer, of Beemer, chair of the board's finance committee. "This budget keeps the College moving forward, while maintaining the high quality of education for which Northeast Community College is known and valued."

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Council

An ordinance will be created to list rules for those using city parks. No action was taken on a resolution that was brought before the council because council members felt the rules listed need to be enforceable and would prefer to see these in an ordinance.

An ordinance that will amend the city code in regard to the height of fences allowed in the city was tabled until language can be put in it to indicate why such a fence is needed.

City Attorney Amy Miller told the council they need to determine if granting permission to build the fence on a piece of property goes with the property or the property owner, should that owner move.

Also discussed was whether to grant permission to build an eight foot fence to those properties and the neighboring properties abutt agriculturally zoned property.

In other action, a public hearing was held for the acquisition of a 1.43 acre parcel of land from Douglas Pierson and Tracy Pierson. The property is located in the Southview III Addition of the city. City Administrator Wes Blecke told the council that the purchase would give the city access to South

Sherman Street and allow for the creation of a drainage ditch to handle water run-off from that area of the city.

Following the public hearing, a resolution was passed for the purchase of the property.

In a related item, council gave first reading approval to an ordinance that will change the zoning of the parcel from A-1 (Agricultural) to R-2 (Residential).

An update was presented on the Wayne Country and Golf Club Project and approval was given for Pay Application No. 5.

Rusty Parker, representing the Wayne Country & Golf Club, spoke on a request for three change or-

ders for the project. Two of these will not raise the price tag on the project, but the third will increase the total cost by \$17,375. It involves changing the material on the deck from treated wood to a composite material.

Parker updated the council on the pledges that have been received for the project and told the council the board for the Country Club feel they have the finances to make the change in the project.

An application for a liquor license was granted to the Wayne Country & Golf Club to include the newly renovated, larger club house and the entire golf course (approximately 165 acres).

Council members also heard from City Administrator Blecke on the sludge removal plan for the city lagoon.

Blecke said no bids were received for the project, but he had talked to representatives of JEO Consulting on finding someone who would be willing to remove sludge.

Council members talked about possible options, including the sowing of rye in the area to help dry up the sludge.

More information will be brought to the council at a future meeting.

Council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, Oct. 2 at 5:30 p.m. in council chambers.

Traffic fatality in Wayne County Thursday night

According to a pres release from the Wayne County Sheriff's Department, on the evening of Sept. 13, a motorist located a traffic accident approximately three-and-a-half miles east of Wayne on Highway 35. The Wayne County Sheriff's Office was assisted at the scene by the Wayne Fire Department, Providence Medical Center, and the Nebraska State Patrol. The accident remains under investigation.

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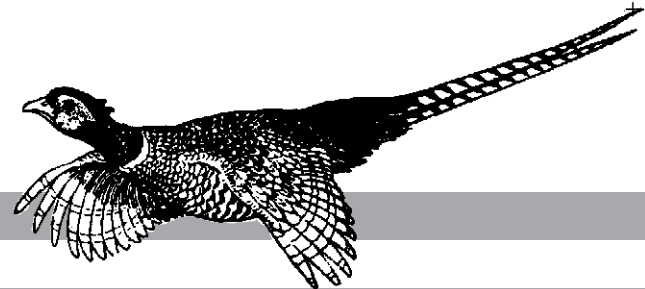

Trojans win a wild one in Norfolk

NORFOLK — Wakefield picked up its first win of the season and made it a memorable, heart-stopping effort.

The Trojans and Lutheran High Northeast combined for more than 1,100 yards in total offense and 136 points, and the visiting Trojans left Memorial Field tired but happy after their 70-66 victory over the Eagles.

And nobody was happier than their coach, Mike Hassler, who said Friday's win will be a game to remember.

"As coach you always hope your players will have that one game during their high school careers that they will talk about 10, 20, even 30 years down the road. Friday night was one of those games," he said. "I could talk about all the things we did right and all the things we did wrong, but when it came down to crunch time we found a way to win."

Both teams moved the ball up and down the field at will in the contest. Wakefield finished with 583 yards in total offense to the Eagles' 553 and got a quick start in the opening period with three touchdowns to take a 22-0 lead.

On the first play from scrimmage, Solomon Peitz broke loose for a 47-yard touchdown to get Wakefield on the board. They scored again on their next possession, with Peitz finding Nick Arenas for a 35-yard touchdown pass, then took advantage of an Eagle turnover with a one-yard run by Dylan Harder to build the big early lead.

Lutheran High Northeast got themselves back in the game, using a 39-yard pass to get on the board and taking advantage of a Wakefield miscue in their own end zone as Sam Jagels recovered a fumble to pull the Eagles within eight at 22-14 after one period.

The two teams continued to move the ball up and down the field with ease. Wakefield scored on the first play of the second period on a two-

yard run by Esgar Godinez, but on their first play of the ensuing drive, the Eagles answered with a 65-yard run to make it 30-22.

Wakefield scored four more touchdowns before the period was over, including runs of 57 and 53 yards by Harder, a 47-yarder by Godinez and a 23-yarder by Peitz to make it 56-38 at intermission.



"We executed our game plan so well," Hassler said. "Going into the week we knew we needed to narrow down our playbook and focus on a group of plays we really thought would give them problems. It really paid off — we were very confident in how we matched up against them and knew that our offense would be hard to stop if we executed. The boys stuck to the plan all night, as a coach you can't do much complaining when you put 70 on the board."

Lutheran High came back to make a game of it in the second half, scoring twice in 70 seconds early in the second half to get within four at 56-52 before Wakefield answered with a 65-yard pass from Peitz to Arenas to get the lead back to 12 at 64-52. On their next drive, Justin Erb scored on a 39-yard run to make it 70-52.

The Eagles scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns to make it a ball game with 5:16 to play, but Wakefield's defense held and the Trojans were able to come away

with the exciting win.

The Trojans racked up 453 yards in rushing on the night. Harder carried the ball 23 times for 191 yards and three scores, while Peitz had 14 carries for 117 yards and two touchdowns. Godinez added 75 yards on seven tries with a pair of touchdowns and Erb carried for 70 yards on 11 tries with a score.

In the passing department, Peitz was 4-of-5 for 130 yards and two scores. Arenas caught two passes for 100 yards and a pair of touchdowns while Godinez had two catches for 30 yards.

Defensively, Erb led with 20 tackles, 15 of them solo hits; Gabe Peitz had 15 tackles and an interception, Charlie Lopez had 13 total tackles, Solomon Peitz added 12 tackles, Harder had an interception and Couy Johnson recovered a fumble.

Wakefield is 1-2 on the season and hosts Omaha Nation Friday in a 7 p.m. matchup at Eaton Field.

Wildcat netters win two of three at home

The Wayne State volleyball team sandwiched a pair of wins around a three-set loss to defending national champion Concordia St. Paul in action at Rice Auditorium last week.

Five players had seven or more kills and 18th ranked Wayne State College trailed just once in the entire match as the Wildcats cruised to a straight set sweep at Augustana Tuesday in Sioux Falls, S.D., winning 25-16, 25-16, 25-17.

Wayne State set the tone early in the first set, taking a 5-0 lead following a Maddie Duffy service ace. After Augustana got within two at 9-7, the Wildcats used a pair of Jaci Brahmer kills and a service ace from Alyssa Ballenger to take a 12-8 lead and force a timeout.

Later in the set, senior setter Megan Gebhardt served five straight points, including a service ace, that gave Wayne State a 18-10 lead. The Wildcats finished the set with 14 kills while holding the Vikings to a .025 attack percentage forcing seven attack errors.

The second set saw the Wildcats take control early and lead 18-10 on back-to-back service aces from Gebhardt and another from Duffy. Jaci Brahmer paced Wayne State in the set with five kills on 10 attacks to give the Wildcats the 2-0 advantage.

Wayne State took a 5-1 lead in the third set and never looked back. Consecutive kills by Brahmer put the Wildcats ahead 15-10, but an Augustana rally got the Vikings within two at 16-14 to force a Wayne State timeout. The Wildcats regained the momentum following the timeout, scoring five of the next six points on three kills from Katie Stephens and a service ace from Haley Kauth and went on to post the three-game sweep.

Brahmer paced a balanced Wayne State attack at the net with 14 kills and a .500 attack percentage. Stephens finished with 10 kills

followed by sophomore Maddie Knobbe with eight kills. Ballenger and Tarrin Beller each had seven kills. Gebhardt handed out 37 set assists and had three service aces. Libero Haley Kauth recorded 20 digs with two service aces while defensive specialist Maddie Duffy produced 11 digs and two service aces.

On Friday, third-ranked and defending Div. II national champion Concordia-St. Paul proved their ranking, sweeping the Wildcats in three sets, 25-21, 25-21, 25-10.

After an early 4-1 deficit, the Wildcats rallied and took a 7-5 lead in the first set. They would hold that lead long into it, extending their advantage as much as 18-15. Five straight points from the Golden Bears shifted the edge in favor of Concordia-St. Paul, but the Wildcats clawed a lead back to 21-20 from the service of Kauth. The momentum wouldn't be enough, as the Golden Bears' 5-1 spurt was enough to take the first set.

Concordia got out to an early lead in the second set, sustaining a lead that increased to as much as 15-9. A 9-2 run behind seven errors from the Golden Bears as well as an Alyssa Ballenger kill and ace gave the Wildcats life, but Concordia-St. Paul regained the lead after a 4-0 run and took a 2-0 lead into intermission.

The third set was all Golden Bears, as the visitors got out to a 14-3 lead and hit .438 in the final set to finish off the three-game sweep.

Katie Stephens led Wayne State with nine kills, while Brahmer ended with five kills and Ballenger had four. Gebhardt and Brahmer shared a game-high four blocks, while Gebhardt provided 24 assists. Ballenger finished as the only Wildcat with double-digit digs at 10.

On Saturday, the Wildcats needed a career-high 20 kills from Stephens to outlast Minnesota State

at Rice Auditorium, winning 25-11, 25-21, 17-25, 21-25, 15-12.

The Wildcats played flawless in the first set, recording 16 kills and no errors in 29 attacks for a .552 percentage to easily take the first set. Wayne State held off a late Maverick rally to win the second set, as WSC held MSU to a .137 attack percentage with six errors. Stephens had five kills followed by Ballenger with four.

Minnesota State erased an early 5-1 deficit in the third set and pounded out 15 kills to gain momentum in the third set, then rallied again in the fourth set, erasing an 18-14 Wildcat lead and turning it into a fourth-set win to force a fifth set.

Tied at 4-4, Wayne State scored three straight points on kills from Ballenger and Maddie Knobbe and an ace serve from Beller to force a Minnesota State timeout with WSC leading 7-4.

Minnesota State rallied to knot the score at 9-9, then Wayne State scored three straight points again on a pair of kills from Stephens and a service ace by Kauth for a 12-9 Wildcat lead and another MSU timeout. The Wildcats finished things off with Stephens' 20th kill of the match to come away with the win.

Stephens led Wayne State with her career-high 20 kills followed by Ballenger and Beller with 14 and 11 kills, respectively. Kauth had a team-high 16 digs with Morgan Alexander adding 12 and Maddie Duffy 10.

Gebhardt was credited with 50 set assists while Beller led Wayne State in blocks with five and had two of Wayne State's four service aces.

The Wildcats (10-3, 3-2 NSIC) will be on the road next weekend, visiting Upper Iowa Friday night at 6 p.m. followed by a 4 p.m. Saturday match at Winona State.

Fourth-quarter rally falls short as Augie edges Wildcats

A furious fourth quarter rally fell just short as Wayne State was denied on fourth and goal at the eight yard line in the final seconds, giving Augustana a 27-21 win Saturday night at Memorial Stadium. The game, witnessed by a crowd of 2,026 on Family Day at Cunningham Field, was scoreless after one quarter, but Wayne State used a tipped pass and interception return for a touchdown of 36 yards by Odessa Clark to take a 7-0 lead at the 11:15 mark of the second quarter. Augustana responded with a touchdown on the ensuing drive to even the score at 7-7 as Rudy Sinforant capped a 58-yard drive on nine plays with a one-yard run with 8:18 to go in the half. The Vikings closed the half with another Sinforant run, this one from two yards out, with 39 seconds to play in the second quarter, giving Augustana a 14-7 lead.

Augustana scored on its opening possession in the third quarter on a 13-yard pass from Kyle Saddler to Chet Peerenboom to put the Vikings ahead 20-7, then controlled the clock for much of the third quarter, holding a commanding 384-97 advantage in total yards entering the fourth quarter. Things looked bleak for the Wildcats when Augustana scored early in the fourth on a Braiden Petersen two-yard run to make it 27-7 with 13:38 to play, but the Wildcats rallied with two scores and were in position to win the game as time ran out. Sophomore running back Marlon Warren capped a 75-yard drive on seven plays with a seven-yard TD run, cutting the Viking advantage to 27-14 with 11:28 to go. Later in the quarter following an Augustana punt, Wayne State marched 62 yards on six plays with the drive capped by an amazing one-handed

grab in the end zone by Nate Rogers from Aaron Bleil on a 20-yard scoring play to cut the Viking lead to 27-21 with 3:41 left. Wayne State forced another Viking punt and got the ball at their own 35 with 2:27 to play. The Wildcats used a pair of Bleil scrambles of 13 and 10 yards to move the ball to the Viking 35. Passes of 11 yards to Willie Walton and 15 to Jamal Albsousafi moved the Wildcats to the Viking 8-yard line. Following three incomplete passes, Wayne State had fourth-and-goal at the 8 and a pass to Rogers in the back of the end zone was out of bounds, allowing the visitors to escape with the win. Warren was Wayne State's top rusher with 45 yards on 13 carries and one score followed by Bleil with 21 yards on nine attempts. Bleil completed 20-of-44 passes for 229 yards with one touchdown. Rogers finished with nine catches

for 100 yards and one TD, followed by Willie Walton with six receptions for 86 yards. Defensively, junior linebacker Tyler Thomsen recorded a game-high 13 tackles. Ian Ailts added eight with one pass breakup. Hunters may enter lottery for deer hunting access on the Central Platte River

Hunters may enter a lottery to gain deer hunting access to Platte River Recreation Access (PRRA) lands in the central Platte River Valley. According to the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, 47 hunters will be chosen from a random drawing in early October and allowed to hunt deer on designated PRRA lands Nov. 16-18. Applications, limited to one person, will be accepted by mail or in person at the Game and Parks service center in Kearney from Sept. 1 through 5 p.m. on Sept. 30. Hunters can apply to hunt three areas but will only receive permission to hunt one area if their name is drawn. Lottery winners will be notified by Oct. 20. Hunters are required to obtain the appropriate deer permit and habitat stamp in

order to hunt. PRRA lands are closed to all access from Oct. 9 to Nov. 15. More information and a map showing the available areas can be obtained at platteaccess.org, by calling 308-865-5338, or emailing ngpc.platteaccess@nebraska.gov. PRRA lands are lands purchased by the Platte River Recovery Implementation Program for the restoration and maintenance of habitat for three threatened and endangered species in the central Platte River Valley - the piping plover, least tern and whooping crane. The PRRA program allows limited access to these properties when access will not disturb these species. SCN...looking back, looking ahead

I recently saw an article from my good friend, Greg Tylka, a nematologist at Iowa State University. He has been a great source of information for me over the years as I've worked with soybean cyst nematodes, the most destructive pest for soybean growers in Nebraska and across the U.S.

So I need to give him credit for about half of this information as I'm taking some of his concepts and writing, adapting them for Nebraska, and adding my own experiences and perspective to the mix.

SCN originated in the Far East and was first discovered in the U.S. in North Carolina in 1954. It was probably introduced to the U.S. in the late 1800's when soil from Asia was imported to supply the nitrogen-fixing bacteria responsible for nodulation on soybeans. It was first identified in Iowa in 1978 and eight years later in Nebraska in 1986.

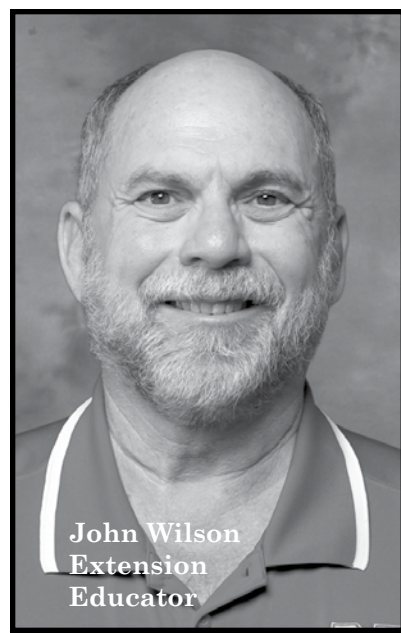
It was probably present in both states earlier than that, but wasn't confirmed until testing was done to identify the cause of soybean yields that leveled off or even started to decline while corn yields increased in the same fields. Yields that fall short of expectations is often the first indication of SCN in a field because yields can be reduced up to 30 percent on perfectly healthy looking plants!

From that first discovery of SCN in Richardson County 32 years ago, SCN has now been confirmed in 59 counties covering almost the entire eastern half of Nebraska. That doesn't mean SCN is in every field in those counties, but it has been confirmed locally. These counties produce over 93 percent of the soybeans grown in the state.

When SCN was first confirmed

in Nebraska, there was a very limited number of soybean varieties that were resistant to SCN. By 2000, there were hundreds of SCN-resistant varieties to choose from. Today the majority of varieties have some genetic resistance to SCN. This resistance is transferred through normal breeding programs, SCN resistance is not a GMO.

Almost all SCN-resistant soybean varieties were developed from the same soybean breeding line, or "source of resistance", named PI 88788. These resistant varieties controlled most, over 90 percent, of SCN reproduction for many years. But researchers throughout the Midwest detected a troubling trend in recent years,

SCN populations were becoming resistant to the resistance.

A recent survey in Nebraska showed almost half (47 percent) of the fields tested had SCN populations that reproduced on PI 88788. In other states where SCN has been present longer, SCN is reproducing on over 90 percent of

the soybean varieties using this source of resistance. The reproduction is not as great as it would be on an SCN-susceptible variety, but it is occurring at a rate that allows SCN egg counts in the soil to build up and increase rather than decrease.

Sometimes this is hard to imagine because most of its life, SCN is not visible to the naked eye. Think of this as managing a weed in your field that has developed resistance to a particular herbicide. Continuing to use that same herbicide will give you more weed control than not using a herbicide, but it does not give you satisfactory control and over time the problem weed will become a greater problem in your field.

The bottom line is, soybean varieties with PI 88788 SCN resistance no longer control SCN well in many fields and farmers are losing yield as a result of increased SCN reproduction on resistant soybean varieties. Our SCN management recommendations 20 years ago, "rotate soybeans with a non-host crop like corn and plant an SCN-resistant variety when planting soybeans," worked great then but not today.

This will require farmers to manage SCN like never before to maintain their yields and profitability in their soybean fields. So what does a farmer need to do?

I recommend soil testing all soybean fields for SCN about every six years. If it wasn't present six years ago and is now, you will catch it before the population gets too high in the soil. But if your field was positive six years ago, sample at the same time of year and following the same crop as your first sample. If you originally sampled in the fall following soybeans, make sure your new sample is taken in the fall following soybeans. This will let

you know if your current management is reducing the SCN population density (egg numbers) over time.

In addition to planting SCN-resistant varieties and rotating with a non-host crop like corn, you may also want to consider using a nematode-protectant seed treatment on your resistant variety. If your SCN egg count is increasing, select SCN-resistant soybean varieties with sources of resistance other than PI 88788. Currently, "Peking" is the most common non-PI 88788 source of SCN resistance available.

The SCN Coalition formed in the 1990's to encourage farmers and agronomic professionals to test for SCN and manage it if it was detected in a field. Their primary focus was on detection. This group recently reorganized to address this problem of SCN reproducing on varieties using the PI 88788 source of resistance. Their new message is "What's your number?" and encourages soybean growers to periodically test to see if the SCN density (egg counts) in their SCN-infested fields is increasing or decreasing.

The SCN Coalition is funded by the soybean checkoff through the North Central Soybean Research Program and the United Soybean Board and by industry partners. Go to www.TheSCNCoalition.com for more information about the SCN Coalition and resources to help you manage SCN.

The Nebraska Soybean Board has a great program that covers the cost of analyzing soil samples for SCN, normally a \$20/sample cost. To get the bags for this free soil analysis or for more information on identifying and managing SCN, contact your local Nebraska Extension office.

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Water Water Everywhere

Today is one of those divisive times where I am speaking to a subset of you instead of the whole group. We have had some major rainfall events in portions of the Midwest over the last few weeks. This rainfall is going to prove to challenge us in many ways over the next few weeks, but also into the next growing season, and potentially even beyond 2019. Being mindful of those challenges now and preparing for them will let us have not just plans in place, but also secondary plans moving forward. And this may well prove to be significant in preserving profits.

So when I look at these rainfall totals for the end of August and beginning of September, I see three major pitfalls that could be coming down the road.

Crop Integrity in the Field: Those fields that have or had standing water in them in late August and September have a visible set of challenges facing them when it comes to their stalks and their stems. Rots, funguses, and molds all present potential problems that could lead to the crop being more difficult or even impossible to harvest. And frankly, there is only one solution, and that is to get after it. Early harvest needs to be an idea we explore every year, but this year, in particular, it may prove to be necessary. Determining the financial viability of it is not as hard as you think either. If grain loss (not getting it in the combine) and grain quality are larger than transportation costs, harvest costs, as well as drying and shrink, you win. And I can tell you when you pencil these considerations out in a good year, it is often in favor of early harvest, so adding grain quality to the equation definitely tips the scales.

Grain Storage: In most areas, grain storage will be at a premium this year. The weather did us a lot of favors and elevators will be busy. So for those of you that store grain on the farm, I see three big things we need to consider, Fungus Development, Moldy Grain, and storage life. Again, these are all things we may deal with in any given year, but the wet conditions again make any, if not all of these a bigger possibility this year. Expect elevators that channel grain to feed mills and ethanol plants to screen early harvest samples for toxins. Field scouting can help identify problems before harvest, and this again goes back to harvesting at risk fields early.

Compaction: Compaction is the silent thief. It will hurt us in a host of ways with these wet soils that we have now. While I just talked about how an early harvest might save our bacon in a couple of manners, the fact remains that if we get out there right away, while it is too wet, we will cause compaction that could hurt us for years to come. And with expected good yields in many areas, it is a good bet we will have full combines, carts, and even trucks out in those fields, squishing our soil. So what can be done about it? The only answer I have is patience. At least for now, we have time. One or two more days of letting the field dry isn't going to put us in a bind or over the edge, but it could be the difference in root penetration, water infiltration, and a host of other factors next year tied to soil structure and soil health.

There is not a single strategy to move forward with; it is going to take you and your trusted advisor making a plan, creating a backup plan, and then being humble enough to throw those out the window adapting to whatever conditions Mother Nature throws at us. When conditions are favorable for storms to develop, a Meteorologist issues a watch. Well as of today as an Agronomist, I am doing the same thing for harvest conditions for specific areas.

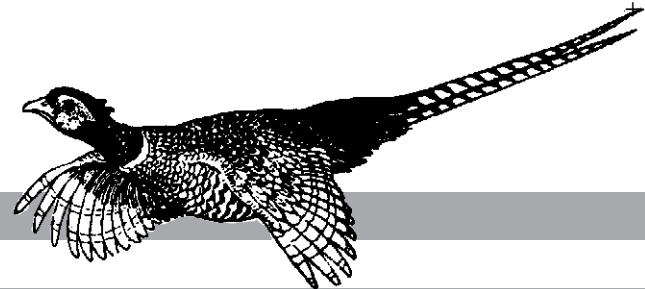

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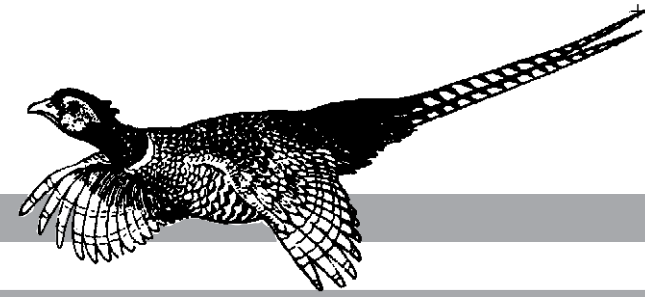

My mood changed that night. I was watching my youngest son mow at my parent's place. He had these adult size headphones on and was just singing as loud as he could. I couldn't help but smile and laugh. I suddenly felt a warmth around me. I truly believe it was God and Jacob telling me to just SEE. They were trying to tell me to SEE the beauty in life in the midst of my pain.

I suddenly remembered a book I read years ago called "Choosing to See" by Mary Beth Chapman. She and her husband Steven Curtis Chapman lost their young daughter Maria in 2008. She wrote about their pain, anger, struggles and faith. The following excerpt is from her book: God has confirmed this truth yet again: I can choose to SEE His story or I can miss it. And I know - in the winter of our grieving and the frozen mourning of my plans that will never be and my dreams that have died - the reality is this: God's warm breath is on the move. New life is budding...and often where I expected it the least, like right inside of me.

I truly wish I knew how to ease the pain of everyone I know who has lost a loved one. I do understand the pain of wanting to talk to, hug and kiss our loved one. All I know right now is that somehow we have to choose to SEE the beauty around us. If I see a butterfly, a rainbow, a cardinal, a dragonfly or a penny on the ground - I feel comfort believing it is a little God kiss from heaven.

My prayer for everyone who has lost someone is that they can find a small amount of comfort knowing that someday we will see them again. I pray that through your tears and pain that somehow you will find joy in watching kids laugh and play, hearing the birds sing or feeling the warmth of the sun. I pray that somehow you can SEE the beauty of God and life through your grief. I also pray that you know that you are not alone. God didn't cause our loved ones to die but He did put people in our lives to help us through the pain. We just have to SEE them.

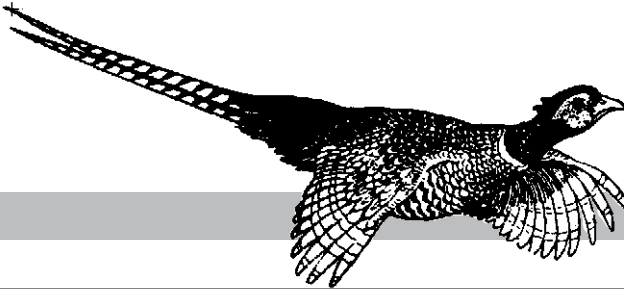

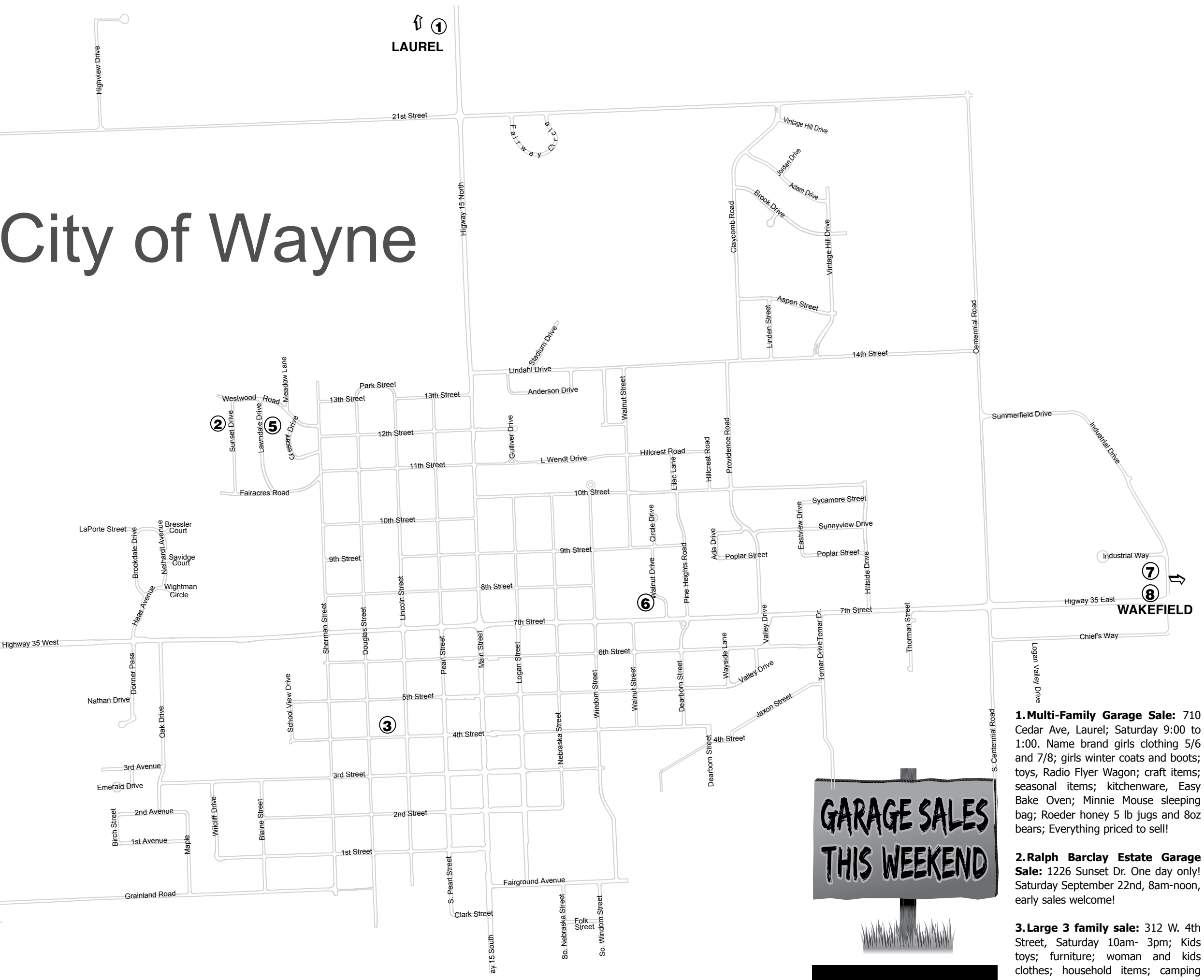
