Food pantry asking public for donations

Several shelves are nearly empty at the groups in the community are conducting Wayne Food Pantry.

Volunteers who help organize and distribute the food to those in need have been extra busy preparing boxes of food to be giv-

food drives and Jenny Hammer, Coordinator of the Food Pantry, can provide a list of items that are put in the boxes of food available for anyone who would like to have one.

Volunteers work each morning to pack

"Our cereal supplies are nearly gone and we are very low on canned vegetables of all kinds and condensed soup," said Deb Daehnke, one of several volunteers at the Pantry, located in the basement of First Presbyterian Church at Third and Lincoln Streets.

She said the Food Pantry has been very busy during the month of October and in one week gave out more than 15 boxes of

"Generally, we see the use of the Pantry go in cycles, but this fall has been especially busy," Daehnke said. She noted that the Food Pantry is de-

signed to provide temporary assistance to those in need and can only be used three times per year. The volunteers at the Food Pantry have

had to purchase a number of items in recent weeks to re-stock the shelves.

Among other currently needed items at the Food Pantry are rice, pancake flour, syrup, toilet paper, macaroni & cheese and crackers of any kind.

boxes with a variety of staples designed to last two to three weeks. Additionally, those visiting the Pantry are offered the opportunity to have extra items that have been contributed, such as coffee (when available). salad dressing, ketchup or popcorn.

Hammer said that more than 800 people have been served by the Food Pantry this year and there have been approximately 230 visits.

"We have always been busy the last week of each month, but this fall we have been busy for two to three weeks each month,' Hammer said.

The Food Pantry is open from 9 am. to noon Tuesday through Friday for both those wishing to donate items and those wishing to receive food. Additionally, specially marked boxes for donations are located at Pac-N-Save and Quality Food Center







Allen pulls away in second half for 60-26 playoff win over Pirates

ALLEN — When is a trick play NOT a trick play?

Kyle Smith had already rushed for three touchdowns in the first half and looked to be headed for a fourth on a sweep to the right side when he stopped, turned the other way and found a wide-open Lukas Oswald for a 26-yard touchdown late in the first half that helped propel Allen to a 60-26 win over Emerson-Hubbard in Thursday's opening round of the Class D-2 playoffs at Isom-Hill Field.

The play gave Allen a 34-14 halftime advantage and all the momentum they would need to beat the Pirates for the second time this

But was it REALLY a trick play? "When you play Wausa and Wynot every week, that's a standard play," Allen coach Dave Uldrich said. "But they had overrun and chased our sweep and chased our tight end across the field, which left the quarterback alone. We thought 'let's throw it there' and it was wide

Smith said the coaches saw the opportunity to run the play, and it worked to perfection.

"We had run it before and coach said it was wide open on the back side, so we tried it again and I was able to chuck it to him," he said.

There was no fooling anybody on Allen's first score, which came on the first play of the game after a good kickoff return by O.T. Roth set the Eagles up at the Pirates 39-yard line. Smith went around the right side and through the Emerson-Hubbard defense and took off for the end zone to get the Eagles on the board.

"That first play from scrimmage was drawn up and practiced in street clothes for one minute in the gym today," Uldrich said. "I thought it was something we could run and he took it to the house."

On their next possession, Lukas Oswald finished off another short drive with a one-yard run to make it 12-0. After the Pirates cut the deficit to 12-8, Smith scored again on runs of five and 46 yards to make it 26-8.

The Pirates stayed close with another score with 2:41 to go in the first half, but the Smith-to-Oswald connection in the final minute put Allen back up by 20 and the Pirates would not threaten again.

Smith led the Allen attack with 196 yards on 27 carries and was happy to get the Eagles' first playoff win since the 2009 season, when they beat Falls City Sacred Heart

"It's been a long time since we've made the second round of the playoffs, so this was a good win," he

Oswald finished with 121 yards on 17 carries and Anthony Isom added 48 yards on eight tries and caught two passes for 25 yards as the Eagles racked up 458 yards in

Wildcat soccer team ends season with two losses

cer team saw their season come to an end with two losses in the final weekend of Northern Sun Conference play.

On Friday, a late goal from Concordia-St. Paul helped the visiting Golden Bears escape with a 1-0 win in the Wildcats' final home game of the season at the WSC Soccer Pitch.

With no breakthrough in the first 25 minutes, the battle of the midfield and occasional Wildcat set pieces highlighted the action. All three of the Wildcat shots were created off of a set piece, forcing the Golden Bear keeper into two early saves to keep the score level.

The rest of the first half continued how it began, with few and far between opportunities for both sides. The Wayne State women's soccer team saw their season come to an end Sunday afternoon with a 3-1 setback at No. 21 Minnesota State in Mankato, Minn.

Minnesota State held a commanding 18-1 advantage in shots during the first period, but Wayne State found themselves only trailing 2-1 after 45 minutes of play.

The Mavericks opened the scoring in the 14th minute as Morgan Cottew converted on a penalty kick, then doubled their lead at the 29:11 mark when Dakota Wendell scored on an assist from Molly Sarafolean.

Wayne State made the most of

"Much like our record, the score today doesn't reflect this group's effort and fight," commented Wildcat head coach Joe Cleary. "Minnesota State has a good squad and we battled with them and were very unlucky to not have it be a closer contest. I'm proud of how we finished out the season."

Minnesota State finished the match with a 23-4 advantage in shots over Wayne State including 13-2 in shots on goal. The Mavericks held a 7-1 edge in corner kicks.





How to deal with lady bug swarms


It happens every year and last week was no exception. A day or two after my neighbors harvest their soybeans, our house is inundated by Multicolored Asian Ladybird Beetles, commonly referred to as ladybugs. Soybean fields are their most common summer home where they provide a great service to farmers by feeding on soybean aphids. They have prevented the need for millions of dollars in insecticide applications by feeding on this pest!

It surprises me a little that they must continue to hang out in soybean fields after they have dropped their leaves, but apparently they do based on when they move to gathering on houses. They start to congregate on the south and west sides of homes after soybean harvest and as temperatures drop this time of year.

This odd trait goes back to Asia, the original home of this ladybug. They migrate to overwinter in the cracks and crevices of cliffs in its native habitat. Since cliffs are few and far between in northeast Nebraska, the next best thing it can find are the vertical walls of buildings, your home and mine!

Outside, this ladybug doesn't really cause problems other than large masses of the beetles emit a foul odor. What makes it hard to remember they really are a beneficial insect, feeding on aphids, is when they look for sheltered places to overwinter and find their way indoors. Once inside, they do

The best method to control ladybird beetles inside the home is to into the vacuum cleaner body. Afkeep them outside. Locate possible entry points and use caulking to seal cracks and crevices. Use weather stripping to insure a tight seal around doors and windows, and make sure screens are in good repair. Spraying them with an insecticide where they congregate on the south and west sides of the home has limited effects because others will migrate in, replacing the ones you might have killed.

Once beetles are inside, the following suggestions may be help-

- Do not swat or smash lady beetles. Their body fluids can stain whatever they are on.
- Using insecticides inside the home will not prevent other beetles from coming inside and has limited effectiveness unless sprayed directly on the beetles.
- Vacuuming ladybird beetles is as effective as insecticides and is the recommended strategy.

Here's a helpful tip when using a vacuum cleaner. If large numbers of ladybugs are sucked into the vacuum cleaner, their secretions cause it to smell like lady- so, do things outdoors when it is bugs every time it is used. Also, cooler and they are less active. they can crawl out if they are not

As I mentioned earlier, Multicolored Asian Ladybird Beetles will bite, but they are not the only thing biting this time of year. Another small insect known as the minute pirate bug causes painful bites that seem out of proportion with their size. The minute pirate bug is much smaller than a ladybug, about 1/8-inch long, oval to triangular in shape, flattened, and black with whitish markings on the back.

Minute pirate bugs are found throughout the summer in fields, woodlands, gardens and landscapes. In late summer, they begin the unpleasant behavior of biting humans. Control of minute pirate bugs is not practical. Repellents generally are not effective, although some people find liberally applying baby oil or suntan oil to the skin may prevent some bites. Other options to reduce their biting is to wear jeans rather than shorts and a long sleeve shirt. Al-

Solutions and Problems: Which Came First?

It seems to me all too often in life, as consumers we are presented with solutions or products that are in search of a problem. This, of course, is counter-intuitive to what we should have, which is a problem in search of a solution. Or the surface, these two things seem closely related, but the fact is they are on complete opposite ends of the spectrum. Don't believe me? This winter walk around a farm show and see how many products are there that you just shake your head at and wonder "who would buy that?" At the same time, count the products that you see that make you go "It is so simple, why didn't I think of that!"



In the grand scheme of things, what separates the two ends of the spectrum more than anything else is facts. In

our case, it is agronomics and facts. What I mean is, can I prove that there is a problem in just a few minutes? Then, and this is the important part to me, can I verify a proposed solution would work in a few minutes? If the answer to both of those questions is no, then move along. I am willing to bet cash money that there is lower hanging fruit to be picked to improve your operation. If it is a split decision, one yes, and one no, then I suggest filing it away for later. There is probably something there, but perhaps this isn't the right time. But, if both tests come back as yes, then I believe we are on to something.

Today, I want to apply this test to kernel loss at harvest. Over the last year and a half, I have talked a lot about a product called YieldSaver. These replacement gathering chains seemed to me like a solution in search of a problem when I first saw them. But as I applied the principals above out in the field, I found out I was wrong. They are in fact a solution to a real problem. What makes them a solution is that we can quickly verify what they do.

For those of you that saw my video a couple months ago on the YieldSaver's or joined us at the Innovation events this summer in Bellwood or Norfolk, you saw us do a demonstration of dry, shelled corn going through the head. It was a great demonstration, but it wasn't a real-world situation. So today, I wanted to walk you through how to do this on your own. As you are going through the field, pull back on the hydro and stop the head. Then back the combine up so that the head is where the tailings were. Then I want you to get out with some gloves on and pick the inside two rows, as they will have the least head loss in theory. Measure off ten foot of row, and carefully remove all the leaves and stalks between the two rows. For those of you in 30" corn, this represents 25 square foot. Two kernels per square foot is roughly one bushel. So if you are losing more than four kernels per square foot, you have a problem. This, of course, means we are looking for 100 kernels in that 25 square foot area. More than that and the solution will pay for itself in yield. Less than that and we need to evaluate other factors like volunteer corn population potential to determine if it is a solution for your farm.

I know that none of you want to take the time to do this sort of evaluation now that the weather has turned for the better, but I promise that it is worth it. Our ACS equipment team is happy to count kernels with you before or after you put on a set of YieldSaver chains to try on your corn head.

And that is honestly it. Working with a trusted advisor that can help you out on the numbers side to determine the economic viability of a solution is a key piece of this equation. Having the people that bring the solutions to you be Agronomists first is another great indicator. While we talked about yield loss today, the process is the same to evaluate stands for planter performance. Just make sure we keep our eyes open, and our minds clear to look for these opportunities regardless of time of year.

returned to rural Nebraska on Oct. 27-28 to partake in a coveted outdoor tradition – upland bird hunting during the 2018 season opener.

Nebraska Game and Parks Commission staff contacted 1.040 hunters across the state while making bag checks. Hunters harvested 418 pheasants and 89 quail. An additional 781 hunters were encountered on pheasant-release sites on 13 wildlife management areas (WMAs). These hunters bagged 517 pheasants. More than 80 percent of roosters harvested on release sites were pen-released

Based on field reports, hunter success on pheasants was highest in southwest and northeast regions of the state. Good quail numbers were reported throughout the southern half of the state but very few hunters were specifically targeting bobwhites. Compared to 2017, hunter success on the opening weekend was slightly higher for pheasants and similar for bobwhites. Hunting pressure was relatively low across the state.

Cooler weather in the coming weeks also will aid hunter success. Portions of Nebraska had daytime highs in the high 70s and low 80s on opening day, and reports indicate hunting activity decreased substantially by early afternoon both days.

Hunters from around the country were popular and hunters reported seeing good numbers of birds. Cool morning temperatures provided good hunting conditions, but the abundance of standing crops appeared to hamper hunter success. Contact was made with 155 hunters, who harvested 59 pheasants. Law enforcement contacted an additional 180 hunters on pheasant-release sites at Oak Valley, George Syas and Wilkinson WMAs, where 98 pheasants were harvested. Hunters observed fewer quail compared to recent years.

people on a personal level, their eyes are opened. They see that the people who attend are not perfect and, yes, there are hypocrites in the pews. This is such a shock that many don't know what to do so they leave. The early Church too had issues;

they had people who struggled with sin just like we do today, they had situations arise that caused them to stop, pray and figure out the best way to deal with their problems.

Second, it's all about finding the ball. I quickly learned that that little ball is hard to keep track of. It didn't matter if I hit a bright orange ball or a florescent green ball, a pretty blue ball or a plain white ball - it's like they are playing hide and seek. Once you hit them and they leave the little tee in the ground they magically form tiny wings to fly where ever they please.

Luke 15:4-6 "What man of you, having a hundred sheep, if he loses one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness, and go after the one which is lost until he finds it? And when he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders, rejoicing. And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep which was lost!"

God diligently looks and searches for us. I didn't realize how much time we would spend looking for that little ball. We sometimes search in the tall weeds, in the sand pit, in the water or in the grass. But every time we find the ball, it is like a mini celebration. We put our hands up so others know we found it and we are all so excited to find that silly little ball. Without the ball there is no game.

Third, try not to do damage along the way. There will be times that you hit the ball and it will go in a direction you didn't want it to go. It may hit a house, a tree, another golfer or a car that is driving by the golf course.

In the early church there were strong leaders and sometime those leaders didn't always see eye to eye. Many of us have experienced what it is like to see two strong leaders be on opposite sides of the issues. It can quickly divide not only them, but the people around them. We see this play out in families, at work and in the church. If handled in a selfish and immature way, there are always casualties but we do have a godly example of how it can work out.

When Paul and Barnabas prepared to undertake a second journey together, they disagreed over whether to take John Mark. Barnabas wanted him to go, but Paul, remembered how he had guit and gone home on the first journey.

Acts 15:39 "Then the contention became so sharp that they parted from one another...

How did Paul and Barnabas disagree and yet remain godly in their conduct and in their spiritual life? They were emotionally and spiritually mature. They didn't see each other as their competitors but as

Section 1. Section 68-901, Revised Statutes Supplement, 2017,

is amended to read:

68-901 Sections 68-901 to 68-991 and section 2 of this act shall be known and may be cited as the Medical Assistance Act.

Sec. 2. (1) Eligibility for medical assistance shall be expanded to include certain adults ages <u>nineteen through sixty-four whose</u> <u>income</u> is equal to or less than one hundred thirty-eight percent of the federal poverty level, as authorized and using the income methodology defined by 42 U.S.C. 1396a(a)(10)(A) (i)(VIII) and related federal regulations and guidance, as such statute, regulations, and guidance existed on January 1, 2018.

(2) On or before April 1, 2019, in order to ensure that eligibility for medical assistance is expanded as required by this section, the Department of Health and Human <u>Services shall submit a state plan</u> amendment and all other necessary documents seeking required approvals or waivers to the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

(3) The Department of Health and Human Services shall take all actions necessary to maxi-<u>mize federal financial participation</u> in funding medical assistance pursuant to this section. (4) No greater or additional

burdens or restrictions on eligibility, enrollment, benefits, or access to health care services shall be imposed on persons eligible for medical assistance pursuant to this section than on any other population eligible for medical assistance. (5) This section shall apply notwithstanding any other provision of law or federal waiver.

(8) As allowed under 42 U.S.C. 1396a(a)(10)(A)(ii), disabled persons as defined in section 68-1005 with a family income of less than two hundred fifty percent of the Office of Management and Budget income poverty guideline and who, but for earnings in excess of the limit established under 42 U.S.C. 1396d(q)(2)(B), would be considered to be receiving federal Supplemental Security Income. The department shall apply for a waiver to disregard any unearned income that is contingent upon a trial work period in applying the Supplemental Security Income standard. Such disabled persons shall be subject to payment of premiums as a percentage of family income beginning at not less than two hundred percent of the Office of Management and Budget income poverty guideline. Such premiums shall be graduated based on family income and shall not be less than two percent or more than ten percent of family income;

(9) As allowed under 42 1396a(a)(10)(A)(ii), persons

(a) Have been screened for breast and cervical cancer under the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention breast and cervical cancer early detection program established under Title XV of the federal Public Health Service Act, 42 U.S.C. 300k et seq., in accordance with the requirements of section 1504 of such act, 42 U.S.C. 300n, and who need treatment for breast or cervical cancer, including precancerous and cancerous conditions of the breast

or cervix;

defined in section 2701(c) of the federal Public Health Service Act, 42 U.S.C. 300gg(c); (c) Have not attained sixty-

ered under creditable coverage as

five years of age; and

(d) Are not eligible for medical assistance under any mandatory categorically needy eligibility group;

(10) Persons eligible for services described in subsection (3) of section 68-972; and

(11) Persons eligible pursuant to section 2 of this act.

Except as provided in section 68-972, eligibility shall be determined under this section using an income budgetary methodology that determines children's eligibility at no greater than two hundred percent of the Office of Management and Budget income poverty guideline and adult eligibility using adult income standards no greater than the applicable categorical eligibility standards established pursuant to state or federal law. The department shall determine eligibility under this section pursuant to such income budgetary methodology and subdivision (1)(q) of section 68-1713.

Sec. 4. If any section in this act or any part of any section is declared invalid or unconstitutional, the declaration shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of the remaining portions.

Sec. 5. Original section 68-915, Revised Statutes Cumulative Supplement, 2016, and section 68-901, Revised Statutes Supplement, 2017, are repealed.
