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## Winside couple seeks to keep Wayne 'funky and cool' with drive-through

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For husband and wife, Marcus Janssen and Michelle Roccio going through Miss Molly's drive-through for their daily coffee was their "minute" as Janssen likes to call it.

"We didn't go to the movies or bars or anything like that because we were saving our money, so this was our outing," Roccio said. "We came to this drive-through every day and from there, we didn't want to see that go away."

tainable-minded coffee shop fairly quickly. "What we recognized was that we could get all these options," Roccio said. they'd enjoy getting a coffee before the morning shift at the hospital, a request the couple was more than happy to oblige.

"We're trying extended hours, we're going to be opening at 5:30 a.m. We're going to try it for two weeks just to make sure it's something that fits the community and that they want it and if it is, then we'll do it," Roccio said.

527 Brewhouse will be open seven days a week and will be open either at 5:30 or 6:30 a.m., depending on the outcome of the early opening test, and will close at 6 p.m. Monday through Friday and will be open 7

The desire to keep the coffee shop thriving led the duo to branch out from their sustainable farming consultancy business to purchase the drive-through, renaming it 527 Brewhouse. The business opened early in October.

On the surface it may not seem like there would be a lot of cross-over between an agricultural business and coffee shop, but Janssen and Roccio see 527 Brewhouse as an extension of their farming enterprise.

Janssen and Roccio are making it their mission to make 527 Brewhouse a responsible, sustainable, locally-supplied business. They've been working with area suppliers to get the freshest ingredients and are replacing supplies like cups with packaging that is either recyclable or compostable. Though there are still a few bugs to work out here and there, the couple has been able to make the transition to a more sus-

tainable-minded coffee shop fairly quickly. "What we recognized was that we could get all these options," Roccio said. "We could get farm-to-table food, we could get compostable cups, we could get all that stuff, but not in our own hometown so we decided that, just like our agricultural business, we wanted to make this business a model for other businesses that could look at us and say 'they're still able to keep the doors open and the lights on and sustainability works!'"

Expediency and consistency is also at the forefront of Janssen and Roccio's concerns. In the first week 527 Brewhouse was open, cars were lined up waiting for the drinks they came to expect from the old coffee house. To help get people through the line faster, the couple have come up with ways for people to order faster and providing quality service at both windows. There's also now music playing outside for those who don't want to wait for their drinks in silence.

"People really value that coffee shop experience and having a coffee house that's vibrant and active and open is really important for people driving through to see that Wayne has stuff going on," Roccio said. "We want to keep this place funky and cool," Janssen added.

The drive-through is already taking customer suggestions by extending the hours. Staff at Providence Medical Center mentioned to Janssen and Roccio how much

a.m.-5 p.m. on Saturdays and 8 a.m.-1 p.m. on Sundays.

Roccio and Janssen said they received multiple requests for the same thing-a lunch option.

"We've had a tremendous number of requests for a sandwich and chips at lunch. I'm really excited to see what that's going to bring," Roccio said. "I think people will respond to it."

Starting around Nov. 1, 527 Brewhouse will offer some sort of sandwich that customers can grab and eat on the go. Roccio said their goal is to find something that can fill the hungriest of customers but still be sustainably packaged.

Along with lunch, the menu features a variety of pastries, yogurt and a wide variety of coffee drinks, tea, lemonade and more. Roccio said they also have vegan and keto options for some of their products.

The drink menu is extremely customizable, in no small part thanks to the skills of the baristas. When Janssen and Roccio took over Miss Molly's business, they kept the staff and hope to hire a few more, making the transition easy on regular customers. The couple are grateful for their experienced employees.

"If you need coffee in your business, we have to-go boxes for that. If you want pas-

tries for a meeting or baby shower, we can do stuff like that here now, which is exciting, but really, the big thing is the staff," Janssen said. "They make it all happen."

527 Brewhouse is located on Highway 35 in Wayne, across the street from Shopko. Roccio and Janssen said they are excited to be meeting new regulars and do their part to keep Wayne "funky."

## Food pantry asking public for donations

Several shelves are nearly empty at the Wayne Food Pantry.

Volunteers who help organize and distribute the food to those in need have been extra busy preparing boxes of food to be given to those in need.

groups in the community are conducting food drives and Jenny Hammer, Coordinator of the Food Pantry, can provide a list of items that are put in the boxes of food available for anyone who would like to have one. Volunteers work each morning to pack

"Our cereal supplies are nearly gone and we are very low on canned vegetables of all kinds and condensed soup," said Deb Daehnke, one of several volunteers at the Pantry, located in the basement of First Presbyterian Church at Third and Lincoln Streets.

She said the Food Pantry has been very busy during the month of October and in one week gave out more than 15 boxes of food.

"Generally, we see the use of the Pantry go in cycles, but this fall has been especially busy," Daehnke said.

She noted that the Food Pantry is designed to provide temporary assistance to those in need and can only be used three times per year.

The volunteers at the Food Pantry have had to purchase a number of items in recent weeks to re-stock the shelves.

Among other currently needed items at the Food Pantry are rice, pancake flour, syrup, toilet paper, macaroni & cheese and crackers of any kind.

With the holidays approaching, many

boxes with a variety of staples designed to last two to three weeks. Additionally, those visiting the Pantry are offered the opportunity to have extra items that have been contributed, such as coffee (when available), salad dressing, ketchup or popcorn.

Hammer said that more than 800 people have been served by the Food Pantry this year and there have been approximately 230 visits.

"We have always been busy the last week of each month, but this fall we have been busy for two to three weeks each month," Hammer said.

The Food Pantry is open from 9 a.m. to noon Tuesday through Friday for both those wishing to donate items and those wishing to receive food. Additionally, specially marked boxes for donations are located at Pac-N-Save and Quality Food Center in Wayne.

## Spooky season

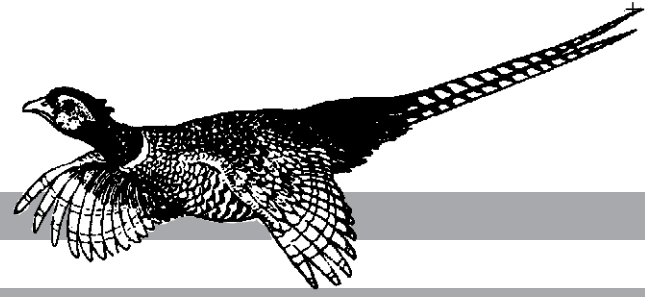
Many houses decorate for Halloween, but this house in Wayne branched out from the traditional pumpkins to a full "cemetery" featuring graves for members of the family in the yard.

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# Retired priest accused of past sexual abuse in Wayne removed from ministry

According to a press release from the Archdiocese of Omaha, Archbishop George Lucas has permanently removed the Rev. Donald Cleary from public ministry. Cleary, who was the pastor at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Wayne from 1986-1998 refused to contest an allegation that he sexually abused a minor in Wayne County in the mid-1980s. The archdiocese received the allegation first from the alleged victim's mother then from the victim himself, in early October. The Archdiocese immediately reported it to the Wayne County Attorney.

## Wayne State Foundation renames alumni house

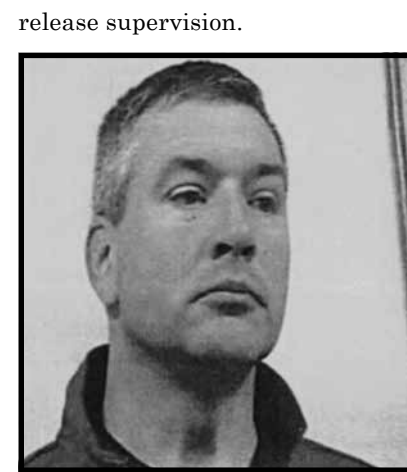

## Criminal theft charges filed against Wakefield accountant

The Dixon County Attorney's Office and Dixon County Sheriff's Office issued a joint press release on Tuesday, Oct. 30 stating that criminal theft charges were filed against Wakefield certified public accountant, Michael Pommer. Pommer, 45, is facing 15 counts of felony theft by unlawful taking from Salem Lutheran Church accounts he had access to through his role as the church's financial secretary/accountant. Pommer was also a member of Salem Lutheran. Twelve of the counts are Class IIA felonies with a maximum penalty of 20 years in prison. The final three counts are Class IV felonies with a maximum punishment of two years in prison, a \$10,000 fine and nine to twelve month of post-

On Oct. 22, an arrest warrant was issued for Pommer. He surrendered himself to authorities that day. On Oct. 23 he appeared

in Dixon County Court for preliminary matters. Pommer waived a preliminary hearing and will be arraigned in the Dixon County District Court at 1 p.m. on Dec. 1. Pommer posted 10 percent of the \$150,000 bond set for him. The Associated Press reported that Pommer took close to \$110,000 from the church but has paid back close to \$115,000. The Dixon County Attorney's Office and Dixon County Sheriff are investigating Pommer's activities regarding other accounts under his supervision. They encourage any individual, business or entity with knowledge or information which may be helpful to an investigation to contact the sheriff's office at (402) 755-2255.

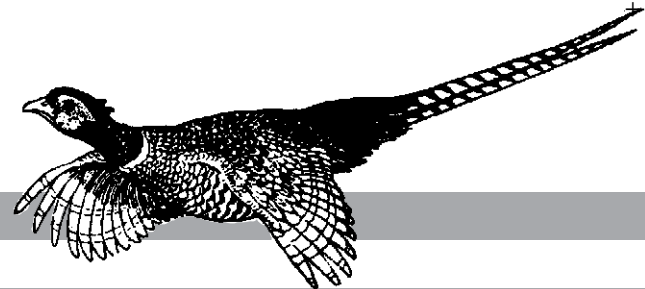

The Blue Devils were able to go at O'Neill after the Eagles needed four tough sets to outlast Pierce in the other semifinal Monday evening.

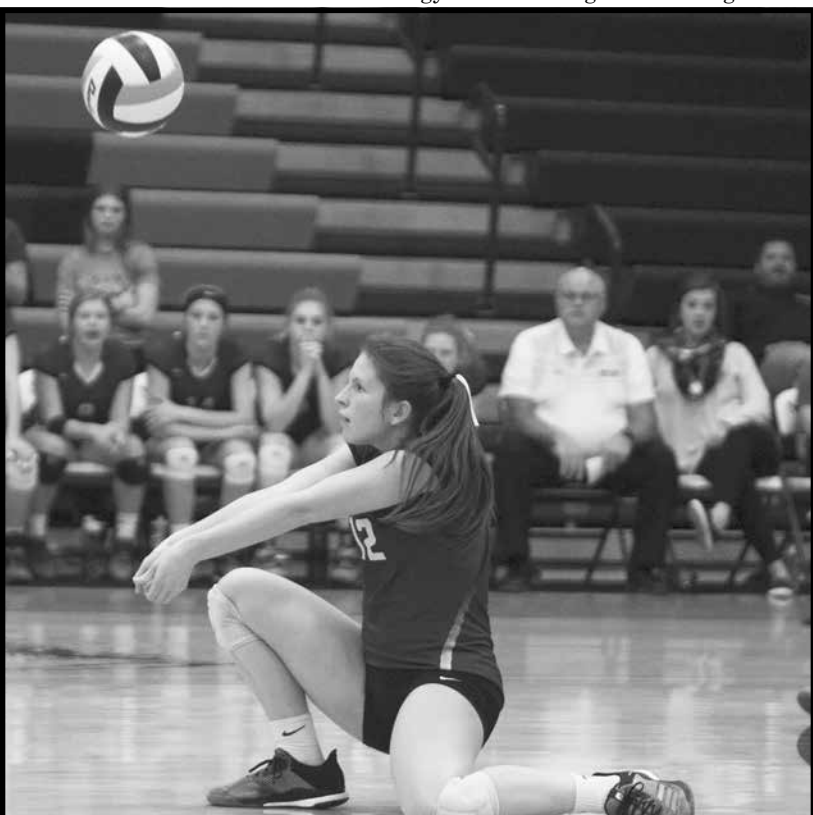

## Allen pulls away in second half for 60-26 playoff win over Pirates

ALLEN — When is a trick play NOT a trick play?

Kyle Smith had already rushed for three touchdowns in the first half and looked to be headed for a fourth on a sweep to the right side when he stopped, turned the other way and found a wide-open Lukas Oswald for a 26-yard touchdown late in the first half that helped propel Allen to a 60-26 win over Emerson-Hubbard in Thursday's opening round of the Class D-2 playoffs at Isom-Hill Field.

The play gave Allen a 34-14 half-time advantage and all the momentum they would need to beat the Pirates for the second time this season.

But was it REALLY a trick play? "When you play Wausa and Wynot every week, that's a standard play," Allen coach Dave Uldrich said. "But they had overrun and chased our sweep and chased our tight end across the field, which left the quarterback alone. We thought 'let's throw it there' and it was wide open."

Smith said the coaches saw the opportunity to run the play, and it worked to perfection.

"We had run it before and coach said it was wide open on the back side, so we tried it again and I was able to chuck it to him," he said.

There was no fooling anybody on Allen's first score, which came on the first play of the game after a good kickoff return by O.T. Roth set the Eagles up at the Pirates' 39-yard line. Smith went around the right side and through the Emerson-Hubbard defense and took off for the end zone to get the Eagles on the board.

"That first play from scrimmage was drawn up and practiced in street clothes for one minute in the gym today," Uldrich said. "I thought it was something we could run and he took it to the house."

On their next possession, Lukas Oswald finished off another short drive with a one-yard run to make it 12-0. After the Pirates cut the deficit to 12-8, Smith scored again on runs of five and 46 yards to make it 26-8.

The Pirates stayed close with another score with 2:41 to go in the first half, but the Smith-to-Oswald connection in the final minute put Allen back up by 20 and the Pirates would not threaten again.

Smith led the Allen attack with 196 yards on 27 carries and was happy to get the Eagles' first playoff win since the 2009 season, when they beat Falls City Sacred Heart 46-8.

"It's been a long time since we've made the second round of the playoffs, so this was a good win," he said.

Oswald finished with 121 yards on 17 carries and Anthony Isom added 48 yards on eight tries and caught two passes for 25 yards as the Eagles racked up 458 yards in total offense.

Brogan Jones led the defense

with 18 total tackles, while Isom added 13 and Devin Twohig, Devin Hoising and Josh Grone each had 10.

The 6-3 Eagles were on the road Wednesday facing a high-scoring Johnson-Brock team that advanced with an 82-3 win over Pender in the opening round, and Uldrich is looking forward to the opportunity to go on the road against one of the top teams in Class D-2.

"It's exciting," he said. "A few years ago we played a No. 1 seed and took them to the last few minutes, so we'll embrace this as an opportunity and if something good happens, we'll keep playing."

On Friday, Wayne State was held to a .103 attack percentage as Winona State registered a 25-17, 25-21, 25-22 win.

Winona State jumped out to an early 4-0 lead on the Wildcats to force a quick Wildcat timeout. The Wildcats, who never led in the set, got as close as 15-13 following a Maddie Knobbe kill. But following a Winona State timeout, the Warriors scored the next four points to go back in front 19-13 and Winona State used 16 kills and a .351 attack percentage to eliminate any Wildcat comeback.

Tied at 13-13, Winona State took the lead for good with four straight points at 17-13. Back-to-back kills from Jaci Brahmer and Stephens got WSC within 19-17. After Winona State went in front 21-17, Wayne State rallied one last time and got within 23-22 to force a Warrior timeout. But WSU used a block and service ace to close out the match.

Winona State finished the match with a .194 attack percentage while holding Wayne State to .103. WSU held a 48-28 advantage in kills and 66-57 edge in digs while recording nine blocks to eight for Wayne State.

Stephens led the Wildcats in hitting with nine kills. Alyssa Ballenger had six while Knobbe

**Top-ranked Mustangs roll to 55-2 Egg Bowl win**

Top-ranked Minnesota State erupted for 28 points in the third quarter and the Mavericks used a balanced offensive attack to gain 485 yards in a 55-2 blowout over Wayne State in the 30th annual Egg Bowl Game played Saturday at Bob Cunningham Field in Wayne.

Minnesota State took the opening kickoff and scored on a 28-yard pass from Ryan Schlichte to Shane Zylstra to put the Mavericks in front 7-0.

Wayne State's first drive was the longest of the game, covering 49 yards, as the Wildcats moved from their own 25 to the MSU 26 until the drive ended on downs.

The Wildcats then stopped the Mavericks on the next two drives with a blocked field goal followed by an interception on the next drive with freshman Donte Brooks intercepting a Ryan Schlichte pass at the Wildcat 44.

Wayne State drove from their own 44 to the MSU 28 when the drive again ended on downs.

Minnesota State scored twice in the second quarter to give the Mavericks a 21-0 lead at intermission. JD Ekowa fired a 59-yard scoring strike to Vance Barnes for the first score with running back Nate Gunn adding a five-yard touchdown.

The Mavericks put the game out of reach with a 28-point third quarter.

Gunn started the second half with a two-yard run. Jack Curtis then interception an Aaron Bleil pass and ran 47 yards for another score. Justin Taormina scored on an eight-yard run with Schlichte throwing a three-yard TD pass to Tyler Schmidt for the final score of the quarter putting the Mavericks in front 49-0.

Both teams scored at the same time in the fourth quarter as quarterback Brevin Kaiser threw a 12-yard touchdown pass to Parker Gloudemans. On the PAT kick, Wayne State's Kevin Ransom blocked the attempt and Donte Brooks grabbed the loose ball and ran to the end zone for the two-point conversion making the final score 55-2.

Minnesota State outgained Wayne State in the game 485-189. Wayne State was held to just 24 yards rushing and gained 165 yards through the air while the Mavericks recorded 229 yards rushing and 256 passing.

Maliki Wilson led the Wildcats on the ground with 34 yards on 18 attempts. Aaron Bleil completed 9-of-27 passes for 139 yards with three interceptions. Alex Thramer was 4-of-10 for 26 yards. Nate Rogers hauled in four catches for 73 yards while sophomore tight end Conner Paxton had three receptions for 44 yards. Wayne native Mason Lee added three catches for 36 yards.

Defensively, linebacker Tyler Thomsen recorded a game-high nine tackles with one blocked kick to earn Egg Bowl MVP honors for Wayne State. Ben Elznic added seven tackles with Aaron Wright and Kevin Ransom each accounting for six. Donte Brooks had two stops with one interception and a blocked PAT kick return for two points.

Minnesota State's Egg Bowl MVP was wide receiver Shane Zylstra, who recorded six catches for 113 yards and one touchdown.

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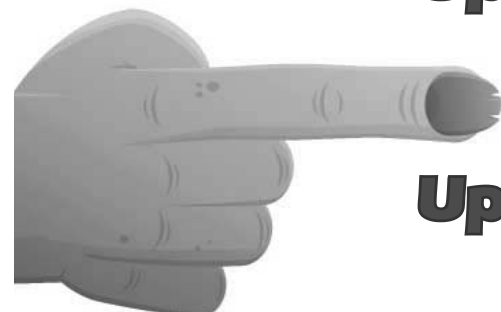

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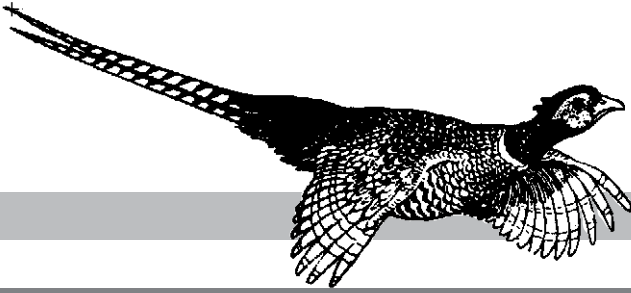
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## Chuckling over old newspaper columns

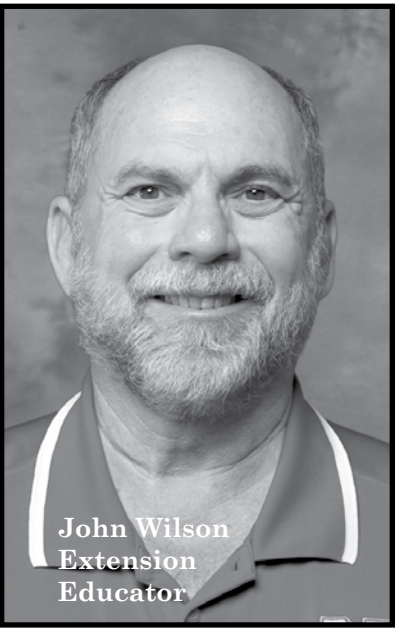
## How to deal with lady bug swarms

It happens every year and last week was no exception. A day or two after my neighbors harvest their soybeans, our house is inundated by Multicolored Asian Ladybird Beetles, commonly referred to as ladybugs. Soybean fields are their most common summer home where they provide a great service to farmers by feeding on soybean aphids. They have prevented the need for millions of dollars in insecticide applications by feeding on this pest!

It surprises me a little that they must continue to hang out in soybean fields after they have dropped their leaves, but apparently they do based on when they move to gathering on houses. They start to congregate on the south and west sides of homes after soybean harvest and as temperatures drop this time of year.

This odd trait goes back to Asia, the original home of this ladybug. They migrate to overwinter in the cracks and crevices of cliffs in its native habitat. Since cliffs are few and far between in northeast Nebraska, the next best thing it can find are the vertical walls of buildings, your home and mine!

Outside, this ladybug doesn't really cause problems other than large masses of the beetles emit a foul odor. What makes it hard to remember they really are a beneficial insect, feeding on aphids, is when they look for sheltered places to overwinter and find their way indoors. Once inside, they do present several problems to

owners including:

- They secrete a foul-tasting chemical from their legs, which makes them unpalatable to their enemies. This secretion can stain fabric and wallpaper.
- Large infestations have a definite unpleasant odor.
- They have been reported to be an asthma trigger in sensitive individuals, and
- They will bite. It isn't particularly painful, but it is annoying!
- My wife reminds me of a couple other problems they create including walking across the television screen in the evening when other lights are off and they are drawn to the light of the TV. A bigger problem was landing in her cup of coffee when she wasn't

looking. It wasn't pretty when she took a swallow of "crunchy coffee." I thought we were never going to get the coffee stains out of the carpet!

The best method to control ladybird beetles inside the home is to keep them outside. Locate possible entry points and use caulking to seal cracks and crevices. Use weather stripping to insure a tight seal around doors and windows, and make sure screens are in good repair. Spraying them with an insecticide where they congregate on the south and west sides of the home has limited effects because others will migrate in, replacing the ones you might have killed.

Once beetles are inside, the following suggestions may be helpful:

- Do not swat or smash lady beetles. Their body fluids can stain whatever they are on.
- Using insecticides inside the home will not prevent other beetles from coming inside and has limited effectiveness unless sprayed directly on the beetles.
- Vacuuming ladybird beetles is as effective as insecticides and is the recommended strategy.

Here's a helpful tip when using a vacuum cleaner. If large numbers of ladybugs are sucked into the vacuum cleaner, their secretions cause it to smell like ladybugs every time it is used. Also, they can crawl out if they are not killed when sucked into the vacuum cleaner.

To prevent this, insert a knee-

high nylon stocking in a connection joint in the hose wand and fold it over the outside of the wand to secure it when it is put back together. This will capture the beetles before they are sucked into the vacuum cleaner body. After sucking up the beetles, remove the stocking and dispose of the beetles.

As I mentioned earlier, Multicolored Asian Ladybird Beetles will bite, but they are not the only thing biting this time of year. Another small insect known as the minute pirate bug causes painful bites that seem out of proportion with their size. The minute pirate bug is much smaller than a ladybug, about 1/8-inch long, oval to triangular in shape, flattened, and black with whitish markings on the back.

Minute pirate bugs are found throughout the summer in fields, woodlands, gardens and landscapes. In late summer, they begin the unpleasant behavior of biting humans. Control of minute pirate bugs is not practical. Repellents generally are not effective, although some people find liberally applying baby oil or suntan oil to the skin may prevent some bites. Other options to reduce their biting is to wear jeans rather than shorts and a long sleeve shirt. Also, do things outdoors when it is cooler and they are less active.

## Hunters take to the field on pheasant opener

Hunters from around the country returned to rural Nebraska on Oct. 27-28 to partake in a coveted outdoor tradition – upland bird hunting during the 2018 season opener.

Nebraska Game and Parks Commission staff contacted 1,040 hunters across the state while making bag checks. Hunters harvested 418 pheasants and 89 quail. An additional 781 hunters were encountered on pheasant-release sites on 13 wildlife management areas (WMAs). These hunters bagged 517 pheasants. More than 80 percent of roosters harvested on release sites were pen-released birds.

Based on field reports, hunter success on pheasants was highest in southwest and northeast regions of the state. Good quail numbers were reported throughout the southern half of the state but very few hunters were specifically targeting bobwhites. Compared to 2017, hunter success on the opening weekend was slightly higher for pheasants and similar for bobwhites. Hunting pressure was relatively low across the state.

Cooler weather in the coming weeks also will aid hunter success. Portions of Nebraska had daytime highs in the high 70s and low 80s on opening day, and reports indicate hunting activity decreased substantially by early afternoon both days.

Northeast hunting report – Public lands in Antelope and Knox counties

were popular and hunters reported seeing good numbers of birds. Cool morning temperatures provided good hunting conditions, but the abundance of standing crops appeared to hamper hunter success. Contact was made with 155 hunters, who harvested 59 pheasants. Law enforcement contacted an additional 180 hunters on pheasant-release sites at Oak Valley, George Syas and Wilkinson WMAs, where 98 pheasants were harvested. Hunters observed fewer quail compared to recent years.

Pheasant, quail and prairie grouse seasons continue through Jan. 31. Permits can be purchased at OutdoorNebraska.org.

### Solutions and Problems: Which Came First?

It seems to me all too often in life, as consumers we are presented with solutions or products that are in search of a problem. This, of course, is counter-intuitive to what we should have, which is a problem in search of a solution. On the surface, these two things seem closely related, but the fact is they are on complete opposite ends of the spectrum. Don't believe me? This winter walk around a farm show and see how many products are there that you just shake your head at and wonder "who would buy that?" At the same time, count the products that you see that make you go "it is so simple, why didn't I think of that!"

In the grand scheme of things, what separates the two ends of the spectrum more than anything else is facts. In our case, it is agronomics and facts. What I mean is, can I prove that there is a problem in just a few minutes? Then, and this is the important part to me, can I verify a proposed solution would work in a few minutes? If the answer to both of those questions is no, then move along. I am willing to bet cash money that there is lower hanging fruit to be picked to improve your operation. If it is a split decision, one yes, and one no, then I suggest filing it away for later. There is probably something there, but perhaps this isn't the right time. But, if both tests come back as yes, then I believe we are on to something.

Today, I want to apply this test to kernel loss at harvest. Over the last year and a half, I have talked a lot about a product called YieldSaver. These replacement gathering chains seemed to me like a solution in search of a problem when I first saw them. But as I applied the principals above out in the field, I found out I was wrong. They are in fact a solution to a real problem. What makes them a solution is that we can quickly verify what they do.

For those of you that saw my video a couple months ago on the YieldSaver's or joined us at the Innovation events this summer in Bellwood or Norfolk, you saw us do a demonstration of dry, shelled corn going through the head. It was a great demonstration, but it wasn't a real-world situation. So today, I wanted to walk you through how to do this on your own. As you are going through the field, pull back on the hydro and stop the head. Then back the combine up so that the head is where the tailings were. Then I want you to get out with some gloves on and pick the inside two rows, as they will have the least head loss in theory. Measure off ten foot of row, and carefully remove all the leaves and stalks between the two rows. For those of you in 30" corn, this represents 25 square foot. Two kernels per square foot is roughly one bushel. So if you are losing more than four kernels per square foot, you have a problem. This, of course, means we are looking for 100 kernels in that 25 square foot area. More than that and the solution will pay for itself in yield. Less than that and we need to evaluate other factors like volunteer corn population potential to determine if it is a solution for your farm.

I know that none of you want to take the time to do this sort of evaluation now that the weather has turned for the better, but I promise that it is worth it. Our ACS equipment team is happy to count kernels with you before or after you put on a set of YieldSaver chains to try on your corn head.

And that is honestly it. Working with a trusted advisor that can help you out on the numbers side to determine the economic viability of a solution is a key piece of this equation. Having the people that bring the solutions to you be Agronomists first is another great indicator. While we talked about yield loss today, the process is the same to evaluate stands for planter performance. Just make sure we keep our eyes open, and our minds clear to look for these opportunities regardless of time of year.

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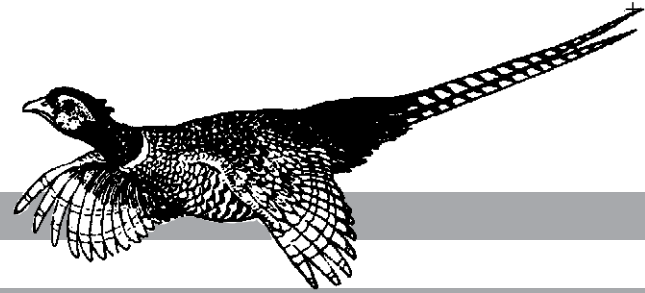

## Legislative Update

we use in the Legislature to craft and amend the budget in order to ensure our budget stayed balanced. The board is expecting the shortage of workers and effects of agricultural tariffs to continue to slow economic growth. In the next few months we will learn more about the state's economic forecast; in mid-November the state tax commissioner will present the Legislature with projections of state spending growth and the

Forecasting Advisory Board will review and revise revenue projections in February and April.

The new revenue forecasts show a clear need to the Legislature to continue to be cautious with spending. Frivolous and uncertain financial mandates on the budget could seriously hurt Nebraska taxpayers and make property tax relief nearly impossible. Just as last year, it is expected that any bills that are introduced in the 2019 Legislative Session that have fiscal notes (spend taxpayers' money) are very unlikely to pass. I hope the glum revenue forecast cautions voters when heading to the polls this year. Initiative 427, Medicaid expansion, is an unfunded, unsustainable, and uncertain mandate on Nebraska taxpayers. The revenue forecast reinforces that the state does not have the funds to pay for Medicaid expansion costs, and I fear this will lead to funds being cut from essential services such as K-12 education, roads, current Medicaid recipients, and the University of Nebraska system. I urge my constituents to consider the consequences of Initiative 427.

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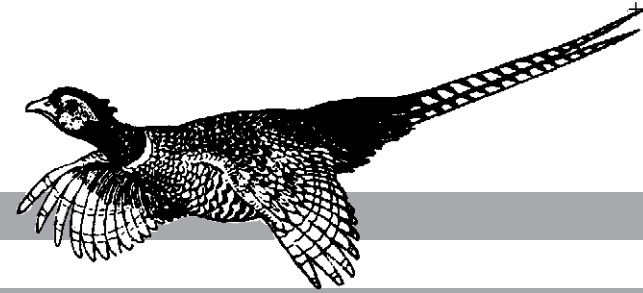

## Service learning valuable for all

Most of us have done some type of a community service project. Maybe picking up trash along a roadway, donating resources for a food drive, or visiting residents at a nursing home.

Youth are able to examine the issues in the community and develop a plan to achieve the project. They are able to apply knowledge, skills, and critical thinking to the problem. There are four types of service learning. They include the following:

1. Direct: the project directly meets a need in the community (trail building, mentoring, visiting the elderly).
2. Indirect: the project supports direct service that meets a need in the community (organizing volunteers, mailings, raising funds).
3. Raising Awareness: the project outcome is designed to enlighten and educate a group on an issue or problem (community health campaign, texting and driving, etc.).
4. Advocacy: the project selects one side of an issue and advocates for or promotes it (writing letters to the editor, researching and testifying for legislation, creating a protest or rally).

There are three components to a service learning project: youth involvement, meaningful service, and reflection. Youth will be able to learn valuable skills as they plan, organize, and implement the

project. They may see a need in a community that adults have not addressed before, and adults play a critical role in helping youth prioritize the community needs. A key component of service learning is reflection which occurs before, during, and following the project. They are able to reflect on the experience to discuss the "What", "So What", and "Now What". Youth are able to make the connections of the service project and how it will influence lifelong learning. Here are the five steps to implement a service learning project:

- Assess and identify the need;
- Plan and prepare;
- Experience meaningful service;
- Analysis and evaluation;
- Celebration.

Service learning ties in well with citizenship and leadership development for youth audiences. What does citizenship mean to you? The definition of citizenship is the character of an individual viewed as a member of society. This definition happens to follow the mission of the National 4-H program to empower young people to be well-informed citizens who are actively engaged in their communities and the world.

4-H is a valuable program to teach all youth about using positive character traits to help within the community.

The service learning projects that youth are able to address can fall into the 150 different 4-H projects offered in Nebraska 4-H. The youth in 4-H can challenge themselves to try new service activities within their projects to develop a sense of volunteerism for their community.

Learning about service learning, citizenship and leadership happens all the time within 4-H activities. Youth might serve as an officer of a club to learn about parliamentary procedure, join a committee to plan out an event for the club, or be a part of the service learning project. One of the capstone events familiar to many is the 4-H CWF (Citizenship Washington Focus) trip that youth attend during their high school career. 4-H teens learn about citizenship and how they are a contributing member of society; travel to Washington, D.C., to see the United States government in action and learn about the past through historical sites; and plan a service learning project that they could complete after the project.

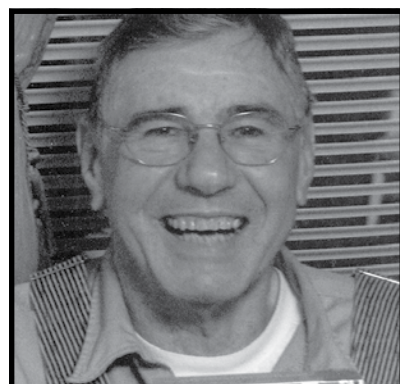

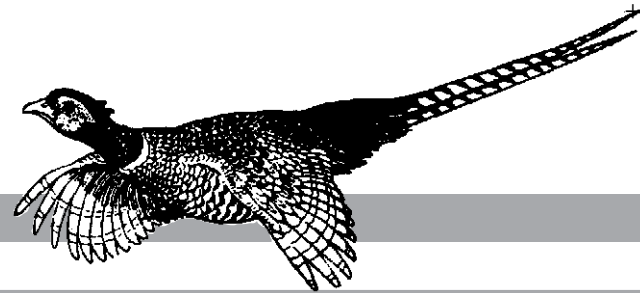

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# Set a tee time to find church, God

The older I get I seem to lose things so easily. I lose my phone, my keys and I've found myself searching for my car when I walk out of Wal-Mart. I can't remember where I parked. Sometimes in life we may lose something more precious than our phone or keys, we can lose our way in life.

Luke 15:8-10 "What woman, having 10 silver coins, if she loses one coin, does not light a lamp, sweep the house, and search carefully until she finds it? And when she has found it, she calls her friends and neighbors together, saying, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found the piece which I lost!'"

I have tried to watch golf on TV. You have the professionals in their nice clothes, the large crowds standing around the outer edge of the greens. An announcer gives the play by play in a very calm and low voice. The camera is focused on the ball whether it is sailing through the sky or rolling across the greens. Everyone seems to hit the perfect ball. I have never seen them biff the ball or swing the club for the ball only to roll 30 feet in front of

them. They have caddies who carry the clubs, wipe off any dirt that may cling to the club or ball.

as good as those professional golfers I seen on TV. I believed that he always hit the ball perfectly

you have your life all put together. And once they get involved and see people on a personal level, their eyes are opened. They see that the people who attend are not perfect and, yes, there are hypocrites in the pews. This is such a shock that many don't know what to do so they leave.

The early Church too had issues; they had people who struggled with sin just like we do today, they had situations arise that caused them to stop, pray and figure out the best way to deal with their problems.

Second, it's all about finding the ball. I quickly learned that that little ball is hard to keep track of. It didn't matter if I hit a bright orange ball or a florescent green ball, a pretty blue ball or a plain white ball - it's like they are playing hide and seek. Once you hit them and they leave the little tee in the ground they magically form tiny wings to fly where ever they please.

Luke 15:4-6 "What man of you, having a hundred sheep, if he loses one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness, and go after the one which is lost until he finds it? And when he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders, rejoicing. And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep which was lost!'"

God diligently looks and searches for us. I didn't realize how much time we would spend looking for that little ball. We sometimes search in the tall weeds, in the sand pit, in the water or in the grass. But every time we find the ball, it is like a mini celebration. We put our hands up so others know we found it and we are all so excited to find that silly little ball. Without the ball there is no game.

Third, try not to do damage along the way. There will be times that you hit the ball and it will go in a direction you didn't want it to go. It may hit a house, a tree, another golfer or a car that is driving by the golf course.

In the early church there were strong leaders and sometime those leaders didn't always see eye to eye. Many of us have experienced what it is like to see two strong leaders be on opposite sides of the issues. It can quickly divide not only them, but the people around them. We see this play out in families, at work and in the church. If handled in a selfish and immature way, there are always casualties but we do have a godly example of how it can work out.

When Paul and Barnabas prepared to undertake a second journey together, they disagreed over whether to take John Mark. Barnabas wanted him to go, but Paul, remembered how he had quit and gone home on the first journey.

Acts 15:39 "Then the contention became so sharp that they parted from one another..."

How did Paul and Barnabas disagree and yet remain godly in their conduct and in their spiritual life? They were emotionally and spiritually mature. They didn't see each other as their competitors but as partners.

Fourth, I had to make a tee time. I was nervous thinking I wasn't good enough to be on the golf course. But I soon realized the others on the course are just like me. They too have some good strokes, some bad strokes and sometimes taking a mulligan is the best decision to move forward with your game.

So go ahead and set a Tee Time, set a time to find a church where you can grow spiritually, emotionally and socially. Stop running from God, He is right there waiting for you with His arms wide open.

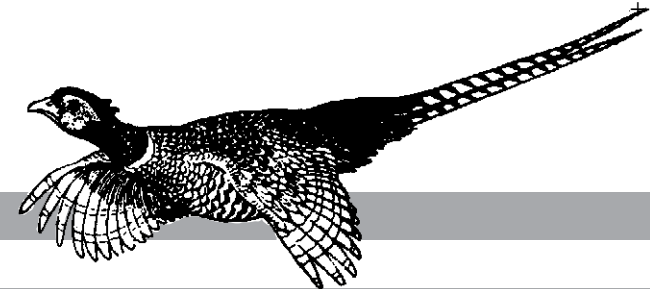

Stat. § 46-744*, notice is hereby given that the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources (Department) on October 25, 2018, issued an order adopting the voluntary Integrated Management Plan (IMP) jointly developed by the Department and Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (District) along with the associated surface water control contained within the IMP. The IMP will be effective November 23, 2018.

The surface water controls are as follows:

1. Establish a limit on the expansion of surface water irrigation.

a. Basin-wise Plan Development Limits: The Department will limit new surface water uses to 50 percent of the annually available stream depletion over the Basin Plan's first five-year increment which concludes on December 31, 2021.

b. Moratorium Areas: Additionally,

in areas where the District has established a moratorium on new groundwater uses, the Department will coordinate with the District regarding the purpose of those areas and will determine when a moratorium on new surface water uses would assist in achieving a mutually beneficial water quantity goal.

c. Evaluation System: For the approval of new surface water rights, the Department will continue to implement existing evaluation criteria to determine whether or not a permit will be issued.

2. Establish methods of measuring surface water use

a. Require a measuring device.  
i. On new surface water permits for irrigation, industrial, or commercial uses pumping more than 50 gallons per minute.

ii. On existing and new surface water permits where the use is commingled with groundwater use and the District has established a rule or regulation on groundwater quantity where measuring the quantity of surface water will assist in achieving a mutually beneficial water quantity goal.

b. Establish a voluntary reporting program for other existing surface water uses in the District. The Department will implement a voluntary reporting program for unmetered surface water irrigation diversions that pump more than 50 gallons per minute. The reports will include information about the quantity of water pumped, the acres, irrigated, and the type of irrigation system (gravity, pivot, etc.) used. The Department will continue to evaluate the necessity for mandatory installation of water flow meters on all surface water pumps for irrigation, industrial, and municipal uses.

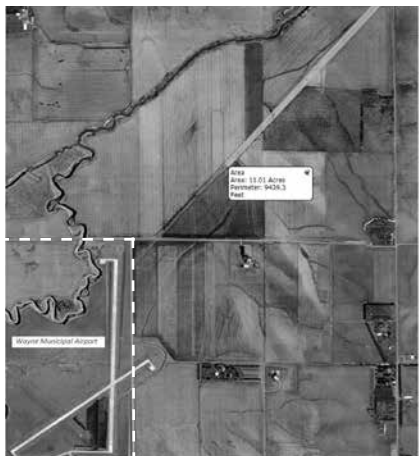

FOR AN ACT relating to the Medical Assistance Act; to amend section 68-915, Revised Statutes Cumulative Supplement, 2016, and section 68-901, Revised Statutes Supplement, 2017; to change provisions relating to eligibility for medical; to harmonize provisions; to provide severability; and to repeal the original sections.

Be It Enacted By The People Of The State Of Nebraska,

Section 1. Section 68-901, Revised Statutes Supplement, 2017, is amended to read:

68-901 Sections 68-901 to 68-991 and Section 2 of this act shall be known and may be cited as the Medical Assistance Act.

Sec. 2. (1) Eligibility for medical assistance shall be expanded to include certain adults ages nineteen through sixty-four whose income is equal to or less than one hundred thirty-eight percent of the federal poverty level, as authorized and using the income methodology defined by 42 U.S.C. 1396a(10)(A)(i)(VIII) and related federal regulations and guidance, as such statute, regulations, and guidance existed on January 1, 2018.

(2) On or before April 1, 2019, in order to ensure that eligibility for medical assistance is expanded as required by this section, the Department of Health and Human Services shall submit a state plan amendment and all other necessary documents seeking required approvals or waivers to the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

(3) The Department of Health and Human Services shall take all actions necessary to maximize federal financial participation in funding medical assistance pursuant to this section.

(4) No greater or additional burdens or restrictions on eligibility, enrollment, benefits, or access to health care services shall be imposed on persons eligible for medical assistance pursuant to this section than on any other population eligible for medical assistance.

(5) This section shall apply notwithstanding any other provision
