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## One hundred years after the Great War

"News of the signing of the armistice by representatives of Germany, amounting to the unconditional surrender of that nation, flashed everywhere shortly after 3 o'clock Monday morning. The welcomed word reached Wayne at 3:30, and but a few moments elapsed before whistles were blowing, bells were ringing, and guns, big and little, with anvils, were piercing the air with loud explosion. Bonfires on Main Street illuminated the heavens and were kept up all day. Long before daybreak, the business district presented the joyous throng."

One hundred years and one day ago, the above was the opening of the front page story in The Wayne Herald. Wayne, America and the world had a lot to celebrate after the announcement that the armistice to end "The Great War," was signed.

Wayne State College Library acquisitions and archivist, Marcus Schlichter has done quite a bit of research regarding not just Wayne State College, but the City of Wayne and Wayne County. Recently, he zeroed in on the World War I era for the Chautauqua in June.

"I went back to The Golden Rod, which was The Wayne Stater back then, and also articles in The Wayne Herald," Schlichter said.

Both sources were a great insight into the Wayne of 100 years ago and beyond. America participated in WWI in 1917 and 1918, but in that short time, citizens, including those in Northeast Nebraska, mobilized to help with the war effort.

"The Red Cross was very active in mainly two areas; making surgical dressings and knitting clothes, like sweaters and socks and scarves and wristlets," Schlichter said. Wayne State Normal College faculty and students even worked "victory gardens" during the war, according to Schlichter.

"Unlike World War II where there was rationing, they didn't have mandated rationing, but in World War I there was an effort to produce food for the troops and the allies in Europe," Schlichter said. "There was a garden here on campus, about where the Willow Bowl is now, and they had students and faculty divided up into groups and each

group had a plot of land they worked on." The U.S. government worked with colleges throughout the country to establish the Student Army Training Corps (SATC). Wayne was one such college that offered an opportunity for training before the war ended.

"The college would provide room and board, paid for by the U.S. government, for enrolled soldiers and they'd get a college education and prepare for service," Schlichter said.

The program was popular in Wayne, with 114 young men participating. Though for young men made Wayne's SATC program the second largest in the state, the timing made the program fade into history.

"It was a big deal but had trouble getting off the ground," Schlichter said. "It started Oct. 18, then the flu came and campus was closed for three weeks. They started again Nov. 4 and the war ended Nov. 11."

While SATC members may have avoided WWI service, over 300 former and enrolled students did fight. The class of 1919, who no doubt took part in the celebrations mentioned in the 1918 Wayne Herald, commemorated those men who served.

"Originally by the Willow Bowl, there was the main entrance," Schlichter said. "The class of 1919 constructed columns and these bronze plaques on either side. One was dedicated to the 300 plus Wayne stu-

dents who fought in the war, either present or former and the other side listed the members of the class of 1919."

The Arbor Day following the armistice, six trees were planted on Wayne's campus, memorializing the six former Wayne Normal students who died in service during the war.

This week, schools all over northeast Nebraska honored those who have served with Veterans Day programs, something the 1918 Wayne Herald predicted.

"It will no doubt be celebrated as an international holiday, marking the last stand and final overthrow of cruel autocracy."

One hundred years after Wayne celebrated the end of "the war to end all wars" we still thank all veterans for serving in both conflict and peace. Echoes and sentiments from the Nov. 14, 1918 Wayne Herald still hold true, even after all this time.

"Peace on Earth, Good will to men. That is a welcome realization. That is what we were fighting for, sacrificing for. That—now won—should be sustained, lived, breathed. Providence has given America unsurpassed power, and that power has been justly used. Let the high purpose and excellent achievement of the late conflict make us, in our unified and intensified pride and love for our country, more unselfish in dealing with one another."

## Board approves property, casualty insurance package

Wayne Community Schools Board of Education members received some good news during a presentation at Monday's meeting of the Board.

Cap Peterson with Northeast Nebraska Insurance, was present to discuss the district's property and casualty insurance package.

Peterson said that in large part due to a decrease in the district's Workers Compensation costs, the total premium to be paid by the district for the 2018-2019 year will be \$95,901. This is down from the \$109,606 paid last year.

The district's Workers Compensation experience mod went from 1.04 (four percent more than average) to .73 (27 percent less than average) and the premium for this portion of the district's coverage went from \$38,744 last year to \$22,214 this year.

Peterson praised the district for the work done to increase safety in all areas and said this was a major factor in the lower experience mod.

Peterson also told the board he had sent information to five different insurance companies seeking bids for the district's casualty insurance. He said the quote from Employers' Mutual Company (EMC) was the lowest. This is the company the district has been with for a number of years.

Board members also discussed the Superintendent's appraisal.

Board President Wendy Consoli listed the superintendent's responsibilities and talked about goals set by Superintendent Lenihan.

These include providing the best education for all students and working to have all students have at least one advocate; keeping the school in a good financial posi-

tion and communicating with students and the board.

The board also received the Wayne Community Schools District Audit. Superintendent Lenihan told the board the audit had already been sent to the state auditor and explained the information included in it, including student attendance throughout the district.

Superintendent Lenihan explained to the board and those in attendance at the meeting what will happen during the district's School Improvement Engagement Review, which will take place Tuesday through Thursday, Dec. 4-6. Lenihan said the team that will come in to do the evaluation will meet with board members, staff members, parents and others within the district.

During the committee reports portion of the meeting, Superintendent Lenihan spoke on the Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning Project and said he was advised by Rex Schultze, an attorney with the Perry Law Firm, not to move forward with a letter of intent on the project with CTS Group. Schultze instead recommended that the district go out for competitive bidding on the project.

Jaime Manz, a member of the Foundation and Community Relations Committee, told the board that the Rec and Performing Arts Committee had met and looked at facilities already in town. She said the committee, which is made up of members from the Wayne Community Schools, City of Wayne, Wayne State College and Wayne County, is working on a needs assessment and is still in the information gathering stage of the process.

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education will next meet in regular session on Monday, Dec. 10 at 5 p.m. in the junior-senior high school library.

## Markers Market gives space to crafters, artisans

The Beaumont Event & Concert Hall is giving a storefront to over 30 crafters and artisans on Black Friday and Small Business Saturday with their Makers Market.

Shoppers can take a break from Thanksgiving activities and a jump on holiday shopping by browsing the wide variety of hand-crafted, boutique items at the Beaumont on Friday from 5-9 p.m. and from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. on Saturday.

Beaumont owner Josie Broders did a deep dive to find vendors for the Makers Market.

"We scoured through Etsy and we tried to find people who were within the Tri-State area and we contacted them about it," Broders said. "It's a hard weekend, but they truly need a store front and what better way to do it?"

Shoppers can see items like hand-crafted furniture, custom metal signs, wood work, specialty make-up, vintage clothing, crafts for kids kits and more. If diners of the Birch Room like the handmade copper mugs the restaurant uses, they'll have an opportunity to buy similar mugs at Makers Market.

"We're trying to stay away from a lot

of the direct sales and have more people who are making something themselves," Broders said.

This is the first year the Beaumont has been open during a holiday season, but with over 30 sellers willing to set up shop with the Beaumont, the first Makers Market is proving to be a hit. Broders said the location has much to do with that success.

"I think it's done so well because of our (Wayne's) downtown area," Broders said. "People kind of know shoppers are going to come here on that Saturday to shop."

Makers Market will also feature live music, wine tastings and beer and appetizers. Football fans can congregate in the Beaumont's meeting room turned "man cave" to watch games while others shop.

If there are any crafters interested in setting up shop at Makers Market, there is still space available according to Broders. There is an application on the Beaumont's website and it can be emailed or dropped off anytime before Nov. 20.

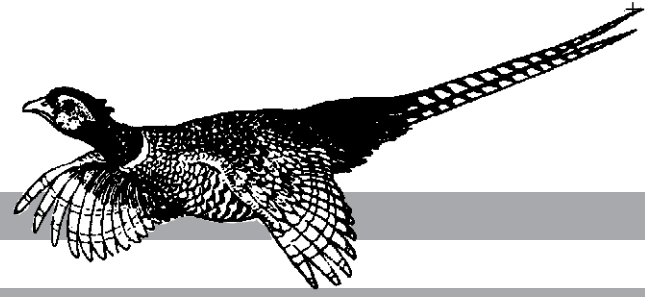

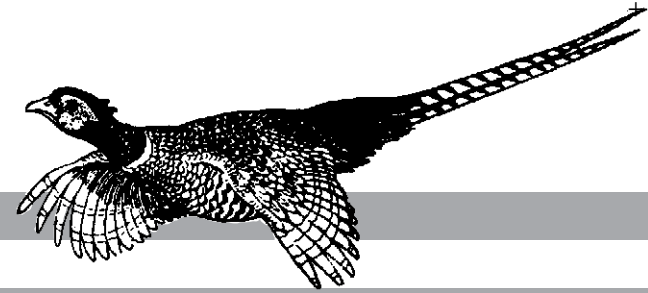

## Blue Devils fall to defending champs in straight sets

LINCOLN — Going up against the defending state champions is always a tall order, and was one the Wayne High volleyball team was unable to handle.

The Wayne High volleyball team dropped a three-set match to defending Class C-1 champion Wahoo Thursday, losing 25-12, 25-11, 25-16 in the opening round of the Nebraska State Volleyball Championships at Lincoln North Star High School.

Coach Traci Krusemark said her team was simply outmatched by a team that featured a pair of NCAA Div. I recruits and a Wayne State recruit, along with a very talented freshman who was named to the all-tournament team.

"I just told the girls that sometimes you're outmatched and I think our net play was simply outmatched," she said after the game. "Before game three, I told them we can still pass and attack at them and I was proud of them

because we got into a little rhythm and played some good volleyball."

First-match jitters seemed to

slow the Wayne girls down early on as the Warriors controlled action in each of the first two sets and made quick work of the Blue Devils to take the 2-0 lead.

"These girls are a great group of girls, but I'm sure there were some nerves there," Krusemark said. "None of them have been to a state tournament before, so I knew when they walked in with all the people they were going and ahing and that's fine. Now they know what it's like and hopefully the underclassmen will want it for the next few years."

Wahoo got off to a 5-0 start early in the match, thanks to back-to-back ace serves by Kendal Brigham and a Kyla Swanson kill. Wayne was only able to put one multiple-point run together in the opening set, using a serving error and an Ashton Boyer ace to get as close as 20-10 before Wahoo finished off the opening set.

Wahoo used another five-point run to take control of the second set early. As it was in the first set, Wayne had just one two-point rally to account for, with both points coming off of Wahoo miscues.

Wayne battled the Warriors in the third set and used a five-point run to take a 6-3 advan-

tage. Lauren Pick put down a Kiara Krusemark set and Erin O'Reilly had an ace serve to get the run started. Pick had a block and Boyer put down a set by Allyson Avery to give Wayne the early lead.

Wahoo came back to take a 9-7 advantage, but Wayne tied it with a Wahoo error and an ace serve by Pick to make it 9-9 before Wahoo took control of the final set with a five-point rally to break the tie and an eight-point run after Wayne pulled to within 15-13 on a Boyer kill and a Wahoo hitting error.

Wayne put one final two-point run together with a Wahoo error and a Pick block, but Wahoo's Elly Larson knocked home the winner to end Wayne's 25-10 season.

The three-set loss allowed Krusemark to get each player in the lineup some game experience, something that she hopes will be an inspiration to all the players coming back next season.

"I wanted to give everybody a shot so they know what it feels like, and hopefully the underclassmen had a good feeling from it and will want to do it again next year," she said.

Pick led the Wayne attack with six kills while Boyer added five

and Katelyn Grone and Frankie Klausen each had two. Krusemark had eight assists and Avery added seven. Boyer, Pick and O'Reilly each had ace serves and Boyer and Pick both had a block. Pick paced the Wayne defense with six digs, Boyer and Hailey Backer each had five, Krusemark had four and Emily Armstrong had three.

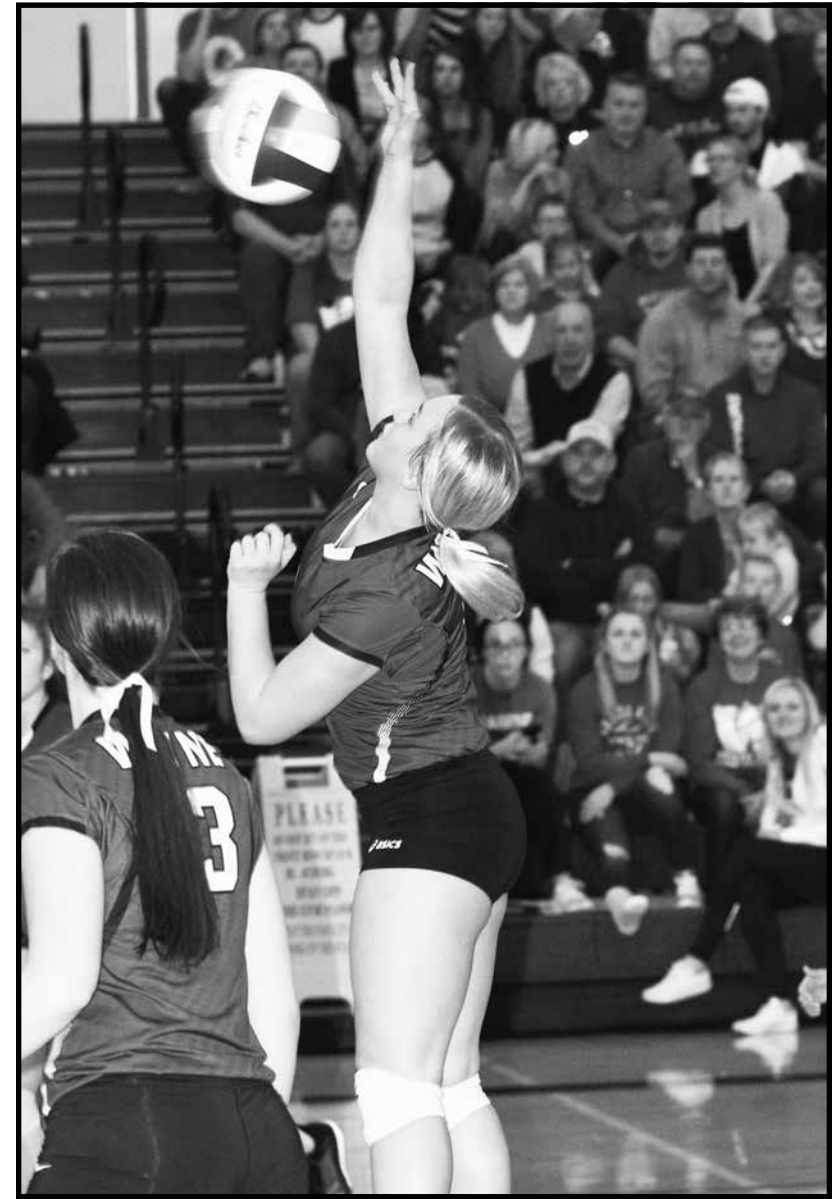
It was the final match for Wayne's two seniors, Boyer and Grone, both of whom developed into outstanding players and leaders for the team, Krusemark said.

"They were not only great vol-

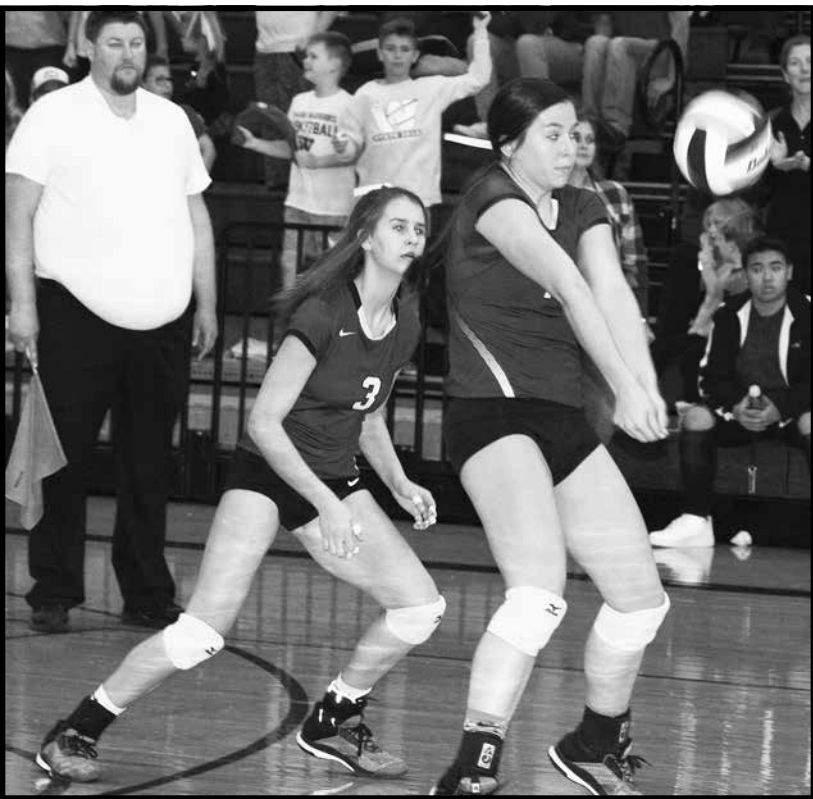

## Women's rugby back to Final Four, men on to Elite Eight

On what was a cold and snowy weekend, the Wayne State women's and men's rugby teams braved the freezing conditions to advance in the National Small College Rugby Organization national playoffs after hosting regional action over the weekend.

The Wayne State women are set to defend their national title from a year ago after winning the West Region championship Sunday afternoon at the Wayne Rugby Park, beating Mira Costa College of California 53-10 to advance to the NSCRO Final Four Dec. 1-2 in Atlanta, Ga.

The Wildcat women staked themselves to a 31-0 halftime advantage as five different players found the try zone. Anna Fleecs scored about 14 minutes in, with May Hoelsing scoring again five minutes later. Tries by Brook Hoelsing, Kennedy Jones and Lauren Nelson came late in the first half.

Wayne State continued to dominate into the second half. Jones scored her second try about 10 minutes into the second half and Cassie Pickerl added another one nine minutes later to make it 41-0.

Fleecs scored two more times in the final 20 minutes to help the 11-0 Wildcats punch their ticket to the NSCRO semifinals, where they will face Minnesota-Moorhead, winners of the Central Region.

The Wayne State women advanced to Sunday's regional championship with a 55-10 win over Northern Michigan, building a 20-5 halftime advantage on the strength of two tries by Isabelle Robinson and scores by Nelson and Jones. Wayne State put it out of reach in the second half as Brook Hoelsing sandwiched scores around Robinson's third try of the game. Jones and Holly Schupbach also scored for Wayne State.

The Wayne State men reached the Elite Eight in their region with two wins, capped by a physical 30-12 win over Nebraska-Omaha on Sunday afternoon.

It was a very physical matchup between the two teams, with Zack DeTaegnese's score 7 1/2 minutes into the contest the only mark on the scoreboard in the first half.

Wayne State put up two tries in 15 minutes early in the second half with scores by Cole Eaton and Joe

Bauer. After UNO got on the board in the 70th minute, Wayne State scored a penalty kick by Joe Edie to make it 18-5.

UNO would get within one score with four minutes to play, but Eaton found the end zone in the final seconds and Deionia Williams scored in injury time to close out the win for the 11-1-1 Wildcats, who will play their regional final on the final weekend of March 2019 against the survivor of the Texas/Louisiana/New Mexico sub-regional, scheduled for the second weekend in March.

Wayne State advanced to Sunday's game with a forfeit on Saturday, as Creighton forfeited the game due to the cold conditions. The forfeit came after UNO defeated John Brown 47-17 in the first game of the day Saturday, and Creighton also forfeited their consolation game Sunday to John Brown.

In other women's action, Mira Costa defeated Colorado College 37-27 to advance to Sunday's final. Northern Michigan defeated Colorado College 36-19 in the women's consolation game.

## Four score in double figures as Wildcat women open with win

The Brett Pollari era got off to a good start for the Wayne State women's basketball team, as the Wildcats came up with a pair of wins in the MIAA/NSIC Crossover at Rice Auditorium.

On Friday, Wayne State had four players score in double figures, led by sophomore Erin Norling's career-high 21 points, to post a 75-58 win over Northwest Missouri State.

The first quarter featured seven lead changes and one tie between the two clubs. A Halley Busse 3-pointer gave the Wildcats the lead for good at 13-12 with 3:54 to go first quarter. Norling had nine of the 17 points for Wayne State in the first quarter.

With the Wildcats leading 28-22

with 4:04 to play in the half, Wayne State used back-to-back layups from senior forward Taylor Reiner to take their first double-digit lead of the night at 32-22. Haley Vesey drained four free throws and baskets by Andrea Larson and Halley Busse to end the half gave Wayne State a 40-26 lead at intermission.

Wayne State maintained a double figure lead in the second half, pushing the lead to 21 a couple times in the third quarter before ending the quarter with a 61-44 advantage. The Wildcats used baskets from Vesey to take their biggest leads of the night at 22 points, 68-46 and 70-48 with nearly 7:00 left in the game, on their way to the easy victory.

Norling led Wayne State in scoring with her career-high 21-point effort, going 10-of-20 from the field and 1-for-2 at the charity stripe. Vesey came off the bench to score 14 followed by Busse with 11 and Larson 10. Wayne High alum Kylie Hammer scored six points in her first game in a Wildcat uniform.

Wayne State ended the game making 29-of-65 shots for 44.6 percent, going 5-of-16 behind the arc and 12-for-19 (63.2 percent) at the free throw line.

For Northwest Missouri State, Kende Eaton scored 17 points with Jaelyn Haggard and Mallory McConkey reaching double figures

The Wildcats had 14 steals, led by Larson and Norling with four thefts apiece. Norling also had a team-high five assists. Reiner had three blocked shots. On Saturday, Wayne State out-scored Nebraska-Kearney 41-25 in the second half, holding the Lopers to just 8-of-28 shooting as the Wildcats posted a 69-52 win. With the score tied at 6-6 with just over 3:00 to play in the first quarter, Wayne State went on a 10-2 run that was fueled by eight straight points from Vesey off the bench to put the Wildcats in front 16-9 before finishing the first quarter with a 16-12 lead. UNK opened the second quarter with a 8-2 run and took the lead at

20-18, but the Wildcats came back with a scoring surge of their own and led 28-24 following a Hammer layup before ending the half with a 28-27 lead. ## Wildcat season ends in loss at Southwest

Seventh-ranked Southwest Minnesota State defeated Wayne State 25-17, 28-26 and 25-21 Tuesday evening in the opening round of the Northern Sun Conference Volleyball Tournament played at the PE Gym in Marshall, Minn.

The first set was close early until the Mustangs scored seven straight points late in the set to finish off the Wildcats. Trailing 7-5, Wayne State scored three straight points for an 8-7 lead that included a Maddie Knobbe kill.

With Southwest leading 13-12, the Mustangs reeled off seven straight points to take a commanding 20-12 lead and go on to win the opening set.

The second set saw 13 ties and five lead changes exchanged between the two clubs in a set that featured many scoring runs by both teams.

Wayne State led 9-8, but the Mustangs rattled off five straight points for a 13-9 lead forcing a Wildcat timeout. The Wildcats returned the favor with their own 5-0 run and regained the lead at 14-13 following a Jaci Brahmer kill.

Later in the set with Wayne State leading 20-19, the Mustangs scored five straight again and had set point at 24-20. Three Mustang attack errors, a kill from Alyssa Ballenger and a block by Brahmer and Knobbe gave Wayne State set point at 25-24. With the score tied at 26-26, the Mustangs used a Wildcat service error and a kill from Angela Young to outlast the Wildcats and take the 2-0 match

advantage. Wayne State stayed close early with the Mustangs in the third set, but could not overcome nine attack errors as Southwest completed the sweep.

The Wildcats' final lead of the set came at 10-9 following a Tarrin Beller kill. The set was still tied at 13-13 until the Mustangs scored six of the next seven points for a 19-14 lead. Wayne State got as close as 19-18 followed a Knobbe kill, but Southwest put together a 5-0 run to end the Wildcats' hopes for a comeback.

Southwest hit .205 in the match while holding Wayne State to a .095 attack percentage. The Mustangs had 52 kills with 20 errors on 156 attacks while the Wildcats had 31 kills, 17 errors and 147 attacks. The Mustangs ended with an 89-68 advantage in digs and had one more block than Wayne State 9-8. Southwest had three service aces to one for the Wildcats.

Ballenger ended with 11 kills to lead Wayne State followed by Knobbe with six. Haley Kauth recorded 20 digs with sophomore Hope Carter adding 10.

Senior setter Megan Gebhardt closed out her Wildcat career with a double-double, recording 19 assists and 12 digs. Knobbe led Wayne State with four blocks followed by Tarrin Beller and Jaci Brahmer with three apiece.

Wayne State ends the season with a 22-9 record.

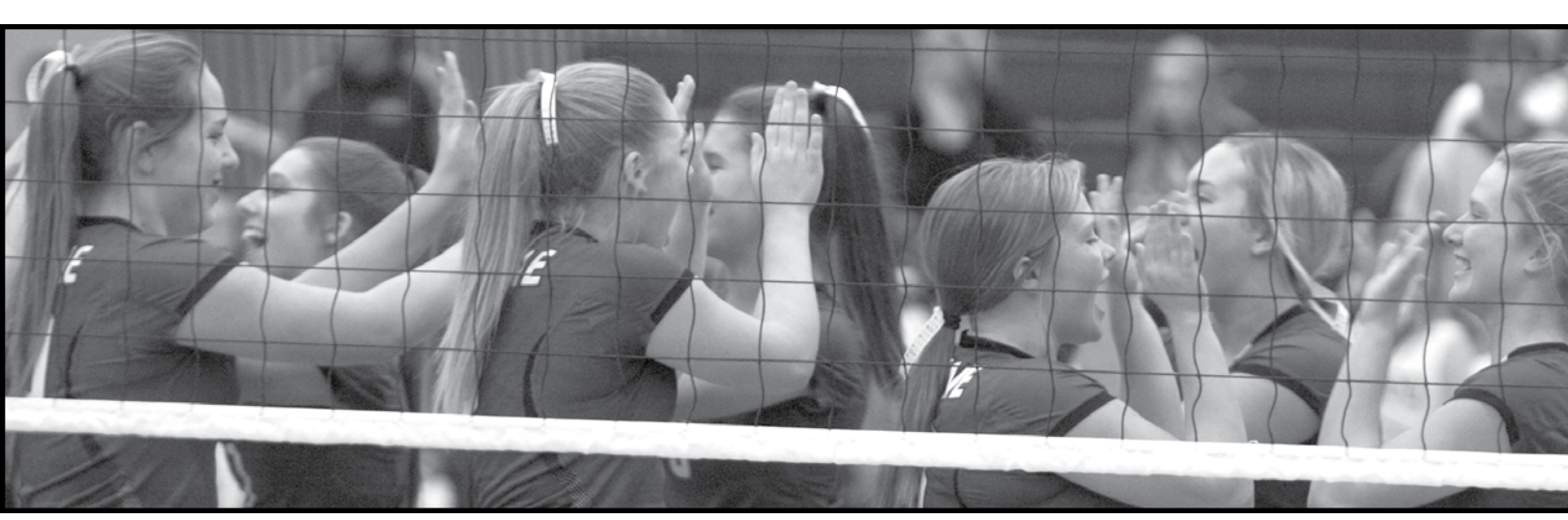

honorees advance to the Google Cloud Academic All-America ballot with Academic All-Americans to be announced in early December.

Stasi, a senior forward, carries a 4.00 grade-point average majoring in sociology and psychology.

On the field this season, Stasi collected her third All-NSIC honor in four years with All-NSIC second-team honors after being named All-NSIC Honorable Mention as a freshman and junior. She led Wayne State in scoring this season

with 10 points on four goals and two assists while playing in 17 games with 14 starts.

Stasi tied for the team lead in shots (26) and shots on goal (13) and had one game-winning goal this season. She recorded one goal with one assist in a 4-3 loss at Northern State and also scored goals against Minnesota Duluth, Minnesota Crookston and Minnesota State. Stasi ended her Wildcat career with 12 goals and four assists and was Wayne State's leading scorer the last two seasons.

## Wildcats end season with 26-7 loss at Sioux Falls

SIoux FALLS, S.D. — Sioux Falls used a balanced attack to take down Wayne State 26-7 in the final game of the season Saturday at Bob Young Field.

The Wildcats (3-8) stopped Sioux Falls on their first drive and blocked a Cougar punt at the USF 35, with Jacob Protzman returning the ball 21 yards to set up the Wildcats at the USF 14 for their first series.

Following a three and out, Wayne State could not cash in on the great field position as Blake Kaiser was wide right on a 23-yard field goal to keep the contest scoreless.

Later in the first quarter, Sioux Falls got on the scoreboard first as Gabriel Watson found the end zone on a 33-yard run, putting the Cougars in front 6-0 with 2:09 to play first quarter following a failed PAT kick.

Early in the second quarter after being pinned at their own five-yard line, Wayne State marched down the field and capped a nine play, 95-yard drive with a 13-yard touchdown pass from Brady Brandsfield to Willie Walton putting the Wildcats ahead 7-6 with 7:00 to play in the second quarter. The big play during the drive was a 42-yard pass from Brandsfield to senior Nate Rogers, pushing Rogers over the 1,000-yard receiving mark for the season. He is the first Wildcat receiver since Frederick Bruno in 2009 to have a 1,000-yard receiving season.

Sioux Falls regained the lead late in the second quarter as Caden Walters tossed a 30-yard scoring strike to Ty Smith with a two-point pass conversion giving the Cougars a 14-7 lead at intermission.

With eight minutes left in the third, Sioux Falls forced the Wildcats into a safety off a punt attempt, increasing their lead to 16-7. On the ensuing kickoff, Parker Gregston returned the punt 56 yards for the Cougars to cap off a nine-point swing in less than 15 seconds. After tacking on a field goal to their lead, Sioux Falls forced a fumble with under eight minutes left in the ball game and used a 7:18 drive to run the clock out.

Brandsfield threw the ball for 75 yards on 5-of-10 throwing with one touchdown and one interception. Rogers ends his Wildcat career with two receptions for 48 yards. Rogers fell eight yards short of equalling Tavarus Johnson's 2,464 career receiving yards, ending with 2,456. Walton also caught two passes totaling 14 yards and a touchdown, while Maliki Wilson led the Wildcats with 59 yards on 15 carries.

Junior linebacker Tyler Thomsen finished with a game-high 13 tackles along with the lone sack for the Wildcats. Ian Ailts added eight tackles of his own while Kolbie Foster led Wayne State with three tackles for a loss.

## Wildcat men open season with 1-1 effort

The Wayne State men's basketball team got the season off to a good start, getting a big win and nearly making it a 2-for-2 weekend at the Central Region Tipoff Classic in Warrensburg, Mo.

On Friday, Wayne State's well balanced and high-powered offense helped hold off Pittsburg State 95-92 to get the Wildcats off to a 1-0 start.

The Wildcats got off to a quick start from the hands of Vance Janssen, scoring the first three points of the 2018-19 season in the opening possession. Four points from freshman Jordan Janssen, sandwiching a Vance Janssen jumper and Trevin Joseph trey gave the Wildcats an early 12-5 lead.

The Gorillas took their first lead with 13:03 left in the first half before the Wildcats went on a scoring run of 25-8 in a 7:06 span. Wayne State shot 66.7 from the field in that span, including 3-of-4 from behind the arc. Tony Bonner provided eight of those points while Joseph's six helped increase the lead to 41-25.

Pittsburg State slowly chipped at the lead to close on the half, willing their way to a 13-2 run to close the gap within five. Trading buckets, the two sides went into the break with Wayne State leading 51-45.

Despite the hot shooting of Pittsburg State, Wayne State answered and kept a lead of two possessions until the 8:20 mark. Five straight points from senior Kendall Jacks increased their lead to 76-69 before the Gorillas scored seven straight to tie the game at 76-76 with 6:26 remaining.

Wayne State didn't trail or remain tied the rest of the way, using a 10-1 run to increase their advantage to 86-77 with 4:00 left. Pittsburg State used a late surge to get within one possession, but fell short as the Wildcats free throws down the stretch proved enough.

Joseph scored a team-high 23 points in the contest, one of five players for Wayne State to end the night in double digits. Vance Janssen added 19 points along with Jacks (12), Luke Ferrarini (10) and Bonner (10). Joseph also paced the Wildcats with four assists while AT'avius Jackson recorded nine rebounds.

Wayne State shot 35-of-60 (58.3

percent) from the field and 11-of-21 (52.4) from beyond the arc. The Wildcats dominated the glass with a 38-27 advantage in rebounds. Wayne State's bench outscored Pittsburg State 30-12.

On Saturday night, Central Missouri outscored Wayne State 42-31 in the second half to come away with a 73-67 victory.

The Wildcats used 60 percent shooting in the first half to take the lead on the host Mules, using an 11-0 run to take a 23-8 lead after a pair of Nick Ferrarini free throws at the 12:27 mark.

Central Missouri cut the Wildcat lead to 25-16, but Wayne State scored eight of the next 10 points and took another 15-point lead at 33-18 on a Ferrarini jumper with 5:01 to play before halftime. The Mules closed the first half on a 13-3 run, reducing Wayne State's lead to 36-31 at intermission.

Wayne State got off to a strong start in the second half, taking a 43-32 lead on a Jacks jumper with 17:05 to play, but Central Missouri countered with a 15-2 run over the next six minutes and turned an 11-point deficit into a 47-45 lead.

The two teams traded several leads, with Wayne State taking their final lead at 52-51 on a Bonner free throw with 7:51 to play. The Mules took the lead for good, scoring the next five points for a 56-52 advantage, and led by as many as six before the Wildcats used a pair of Janssen free throws and a 3-pointer to cut the deficit to one at 62-61 with 4:04 left. Central Missouri held the Wildcats to just one field goal over the next 3:30 and went on to claim the six-point win.

Joseph led Wayne State in scoring with a game-high 20 points on 7-of-12 shooting. Jacks contributed 17 points on 7-of-13 shooting with Janssen also hitting double figures with 10.

Central Missouri held a 28-26 advantage in rebounds over Wayne State, with Janssen grabbing seven boards to lead the Wildcats. Janssen also had five of Wayne State's 12 assists.

Wayne State (1-1) played their home opener on Tuesday with Waldorf University. They host Nebraska Christian on Thursday and will be back home Saturday, Nov. 24 to host Mount Marty.

### STATE OF NEBRASKA DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES NOTICE OF ORDER ADOPTING LOWER ELKHORN NATURAL RESOURCES DISTRICT AND DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES JOINTLY DEVELOPED VOLUNTARY INTEGRATED MANAGEMENT PLAN AND ASSOCIATED SURFACE WATER CONTROLS

In accordance with Neb. Rev. Stat. § 46-744, notice is hereby given that the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources (Department) on October 25, 2018, issued an order adopting the voluntary Integrated Management Plan (IMP) jointly developed by the Department and Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (District) along with the associated surface water control contained within the IMP. The IMP will be effective November 23, 2018.

The surface water controls are as follows:

1. Establish a limit on the expansion of surface water irrigation.
  - a. Basin-wide Plan Development Limits: The Department will limit new surface water uses to 50 percent of the annually available stream depletion over the Basin Plan's first five-year increment which concludes on December 31, 2021.
  - b. Moratorium Areas: Additionally, in areas where the District has established a moratorium on new groundwater uses, the Department

will coordinate with the District regarding the purpose of those areas and will determine when a moratorium on new surface water uses would assist in achieving a mutually beneficial water quantity goal.

- c. Evaluation System: For the approval of new surface water rights, the Department will continue to implement existing evaluation criteria to determine whether or not a permit will be issued.
2. Establish methods of measuring surface water use
  - a. Require a measuring device.
    - i. On new surface water permits for irrigation, industrial, or commercial uses pumping more than 50 gallons per minute.
    - ii. On existing and new surface water permits where the use is commingled with groundwater use and the District has established a rule or regulation on groundwater quantity where measuring the quantity of surface water will assist in achieving a mutually beneficial water quantity goal.
  - b. Establish a voluntary reporting program for other existing surface water uses in the District. The Department will implement a voluntary reporting program for unmetered surface water irrigation diversions that pump more than 50 gallons per minute. The reports will include information about the quantity of water pumped, the acres, irrigated, and the type of irrigation system (gravity, pivot, etc.) used. The Department will continue to evaluate the necessity for mandatory installation of water flow meters on all surface water pumps for irrigation, industrial, and municipal uses.

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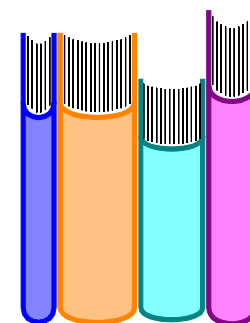
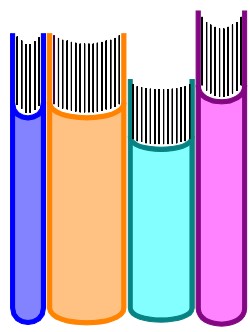

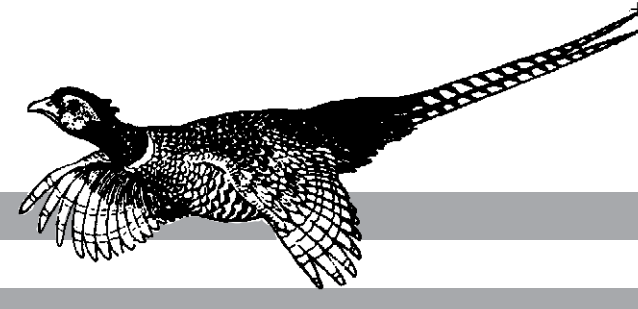

## Acme Club learns about Buffalo Bill

Acme Club met for the Nov 5 meeting following a lunch at the Wayne Senior Center.

President Bonnadell Koch called the meeting to order, and asked Betty Wittig to give the thought for the day - "If you are dog tired at night, maybe it's because you growled all day!"

Roll call pennies were collected and each member responded with a one or two-word description of Buffalo Bill Cody.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved; the financial report was given, and all were filed for later review or audit.

Joann Temme and Bonnadell reported on the patriotic and unusual little pillow favors they had prepared to be used at the hospital for Veteran's Day. The club y sang a birthday song for Bonnadell's birthday this month. Those who did not already have a copy were given a copy of Poetic Voices of the Acme Club that contains a number of poems from the past as well as from the current members of ACME Club. Some of these were written prior to 1946.

A "no host" meeting will be held Monday, Nov. 19. Members were asked to bring a special cup and saucer at that time.

At the close of the meeting Virginia Backstrom presented the group with information on Buffalo

Bill Ranch State Historical Park. Also known as Scout's Rest Ranch, this ranch started with an initial purchase of 160 acres, but grew to an amazing 4,000-7,000+ acre cattle and purebred horse ranch. Most of the ranch was sold in 1911 for \$100,000.

Among the amazing things done by Buffalo Bill to make it one of Nebraska's most improved farms in the state in the late 1800's was to build a 12-mile irrigation ditch that was capable of watering 6,000 acres of crops. Cody also introduced trees to a treeless prairie when he figured out that Cottonwoods and Box-elder trees were suited to the area. When these trees grew, the southern portion of the ranch turned into a wooded park with deer, several young buffalo, and a large lake. He had the words "Scout's Rest Ranch" painted on the roof of the large barn he used for his many thoroughbred horses.

In 1885, Cody's ranch also included high-grade livestock, over 1200 acres of corn, 100 acres of alfalfa, 50 acres of broomcorn and wheat fields. This was down from the 2,500 acres of alfalfa and 2,500 acres of corn of earlier years. The name painted on the roof could be seen from the Union Pacific railroad tracks a mile away and helped to advertise the ranch, which had become famous for the many events happening there. He built a thoroughly modern home for his family and kept the 18-room house full of family and guests when he was home between his many traveling shows and events. The house is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. In 1964 the Second Empire style house and surrounding buildings were purchased by the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission and turned into a state historical park for visitors.

Buffalo Bill Cody, William F. Cody, Pony Express rider, scout for the army, buffalo hunter, showman, entrepreneur, rancher, guide, courier for the army and for businessmen, father, husband, founder of Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show, extraordinary horseman, cowboy, hero of many dime novels, performer, entertainer, founder of the rodeo, businessman, one of the first superstars, legend—these all describe Buffalo Bill.

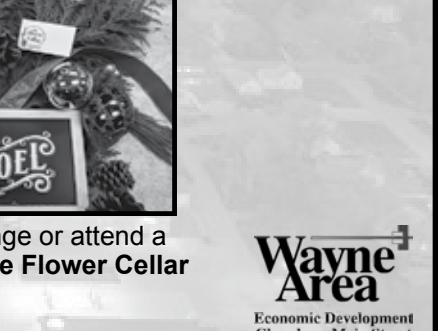

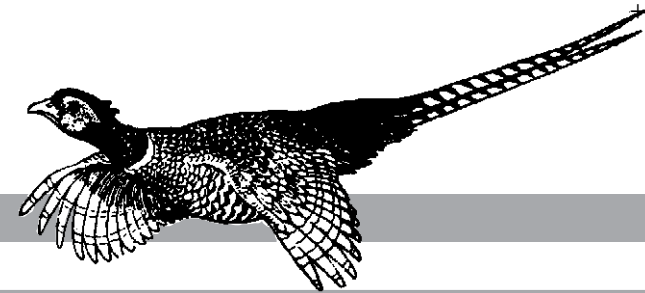

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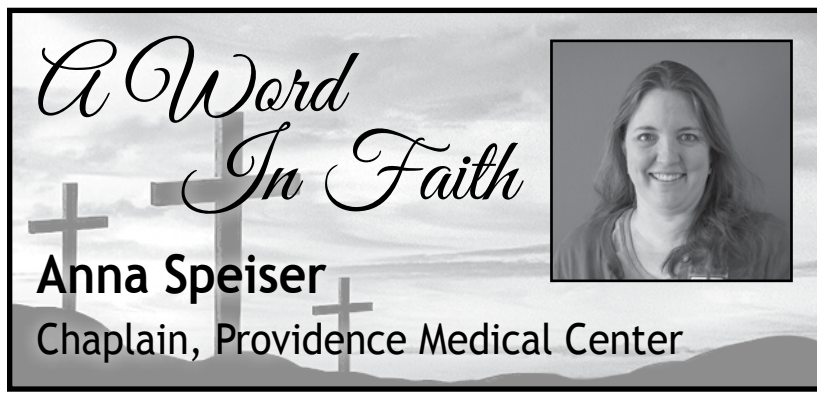
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# Sing the songs in your heart with abandon

## Early checked deer numbers down

Preliminary deer check-in numbers indicate that statewide harvest numbers are down approximately 10 percent compared to the 2017 opening weekend of Nebraska's firearm season.

During this year's Nov. 10-11 opening weekend, the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission's northeast district check stations recorded 11 percent fewer deer than last year. The number of checked deer were down 9 percent in the southeast and northwest districts and down 11 percent in the southwest district.

"Many factors can be related to the lower numbers of checked deer," said Pat Molini, a wildlife assistant administrator for Game and Parks. "There is still corn standing in the fields, and the frigid temperatures and single-digit wind chills made it easier for some to stay home and watch football on Saturday."


Molini added that colder temperatures allow hunters to hang their deer carcasses longer without the worry of spoilage, delaying check-in until later in the week.

Another factor in the lower numbers of checked deer, Molini said, is that management units such as the Pine Ridge, Blue Northwest and Wahoo had fewer permits available this year.

Some reminders to hunters still in the field until the season closes Nov. 18:

- Make safety your highest priority. Know what your target is and what is behind your target and be aware of where your weapon's muzzle is pointed at all times.
- It is illegal to duplicate permits. Only hard copy permits are allowed.
- All deer harvested during the nine-day firearm season must be checked at a big game check station. This includes deer harvested on archery permits during this time as well. Be sure to notch the carcass tag on your permit immediately upon harvesting a deer.
- Many check-in stations in the northwest and north central are collecting lymph nodes for chronic wasting disease testing. Hunters whose deer test positive for CWD will be notified directly by the Game and Parks. Additionally, test results are posted weekly at OutdoorNebraska.org/CWD.
- In Nebraska, a person must have permission to enter private property.
- "Many hunters report high rut activity along with fewer hunters in the field, so those hunters who decided to wait for warmer temperatures may be in luck later in the week," Molini said.
- Many management unit permits are available, as well as some statewide permits. Permits can be purchased at OutdoorNebraska.org.

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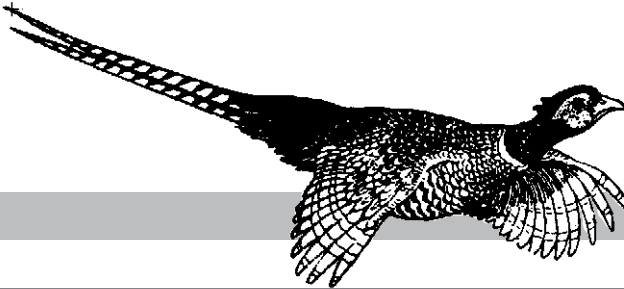


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## Remembering the war... and the plaque

Our book club this month read *As Bright As Heaven*, about a family who ran a mortuary in Philadelphia, and as was customary, lived upstairs in the building. The author researched by reading several books about that pandemic and brings it to life by telling the story of this one family and what happened to them.

Statistics show that in eleven days, seven thousand people died in Phila-

delphia alone. The morgues, hospitals, and mortuaries were full, carpenters could not keep up making caskets, and burials were hasty affairs.

I did some research of my own and it turns out one professor wrote her dissertation on the flu in Nebraska, picking out several rural towns, including Wayne. The virus seemed to especially hit young, healthy individuals and was highly contagious, often killing several members of one family.

When we met to discuss the book, the leader remarked that all of us probably knew someone who knew someone who had died of that flu. I said I did not. It turns out that my great uncle Henry Stuhr's first wife had it and died within three days. I had known of her death, but had nev-

er been told what she had died of.

The book also explored the subject of "resiliency" since there were so many losses in such a short period of time, and wondered how the survivors were able to carry on. I had often thought about this when I worked at the Norfolk Regional Center; it often seemed to me that some of the techs that worked there had had harder lives than some of the patients. It's interesting, and I don't think anyone yet has come up with the answer.

The author has her heroine saying, "I guess all of us are just doing the best we can with what life hands us." Amen to that. I highly recommend the book to anyone interested in historical fiction. I think we all are still doing the best we can with what life hands us.

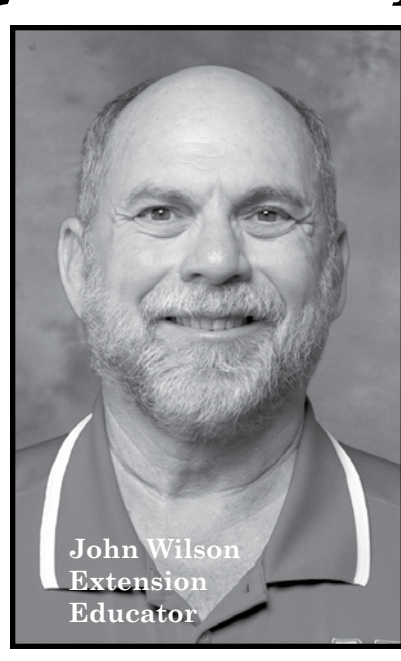
## Sampling for SCN... part art, part science

I frequently talk about WHY we need to sample for soybean cyst nematodes or SCN. It causes more yield losses than all other soybean diseases combined. As harvest wraps up, and I realize there are a lot of you out there that are running behind on harvest, this is the time of year when the most samples are taken. This is an excellent time because hopefully things have slowed down a bit, the ground isn't frozen yet, and you remember or you can look at your yield maps and identify those areas or fields where yields did not meet expectations.

Many things can cause lower yields, but if you can't explain them because of differences in soil type, weed or insect pressure, herbicide injury, flooding, past cropping history, or any other factor that might influence yield, it would be a great idea to check for SCN. SCN can cause yield losses up to 30 percent with no visible signs on the plant. Every year, farmers just like you are surprised to find SCN in their fields when they take a soil sample to detect if it is present. There is both science and art in collecting good soil samples.

The science part is pretty easy... Your sample should be from an area no larger than 40 acres... and less is better. Be sure to clean your soil probe and the bucket used to collect the soil cores between fields to avoid contaminating other samples from one SCN-positive field. You should take a minimum of 20 to 25 soil cores taken randomly across the area being tested.

If sampling a field that has stand-

ing soybean stubble, take soil cores 6 to 8 inches deep, just a couple inches to the side of the old soybean row so you'll be probing through the root system and more likely to detect SCN if it is there. If sampling a field that wasn't in soybeans this year, randomly collect samples across the area to be tested. Samples from these fields that will be planted to soybeans next year can be very important as you place your seed order for next year. You will know if you do or do not need to order SCN-resistant varieties.

Thoroughly mix the cores you collected and submit the soil sample in bags available at your local Nebraska Extension office for a free SCN analy-

sis. The cost of the analysis (normally \$20/sample) has been covered for you by the Nebraska Soybean Board, your checkoff dollars at work for you! Submit your sample to the Plant and Pest Diagnostic Clinic, the address is on the bag.

That's pretty straight forward and easy to follow, now here's the art part... When you select those areas in a field you want to sample, it's important to remember, anything that will move soil will also move SCN. It doesn't take a dirt scraper to move soil in your field... it could be wind, water or wildlife as well as humans and the equipment they take through the field.

The "art" is knowing where to take soil samples for SCN. Remember SCN moves with soil, so think about areas in your field where soil may have moved. These are places that SCN is likely to first get established and you'll want to be sure to take a couple cores in these areas where it is more likely to be found.

Along a stream that periodically floods. Someone upstream might have had SCN in their field and it washed down to your field. Low areas where water drains after a heavy rain. Light infestations throughout the field may be concentrated in these low areas where water stands. Along fence lines. In the past when fall tillage was more common, fences would act like a trip for the blowing soil and SCN could be deposited along old fence rows. By field entryways or driveways. This is the most likely place for soil from another (SCN-in-

fest) field that stuck to equipment to be shaken loose in the new field.

There are two other areas that I encourage farmers to sample. The first is areas in a field that had a higher incidence of sudden death syndrome or brown stem rot. You can have either of these diseases without having SCN, or you can have SCN without having either of these diseases. BUT, if you have SCN in a field or even part of a field, you are more likely to have SDS or BSR in those areas where SCN is present.

Now the final area to collect a soil sample for SCN is the most common area that I recommend farmers to sample, but it's so obvious, it's easy to overlook. Sample where your observations or your yield maps show that soybean yields are not meeting your expectations. This might be a whole field, but more commonly it is an area in the field.

In either of these last two situations, higher sudden death syndrome or brown stem rot, or where yields didn't meet expectations, I recommend farmers take a sample where either of these conditions existed and another sample close by where disease pressure was lower or yields met expectations. This can help you confirm or eliminate SCN as the culprit causing the disease pressure or lower yields.



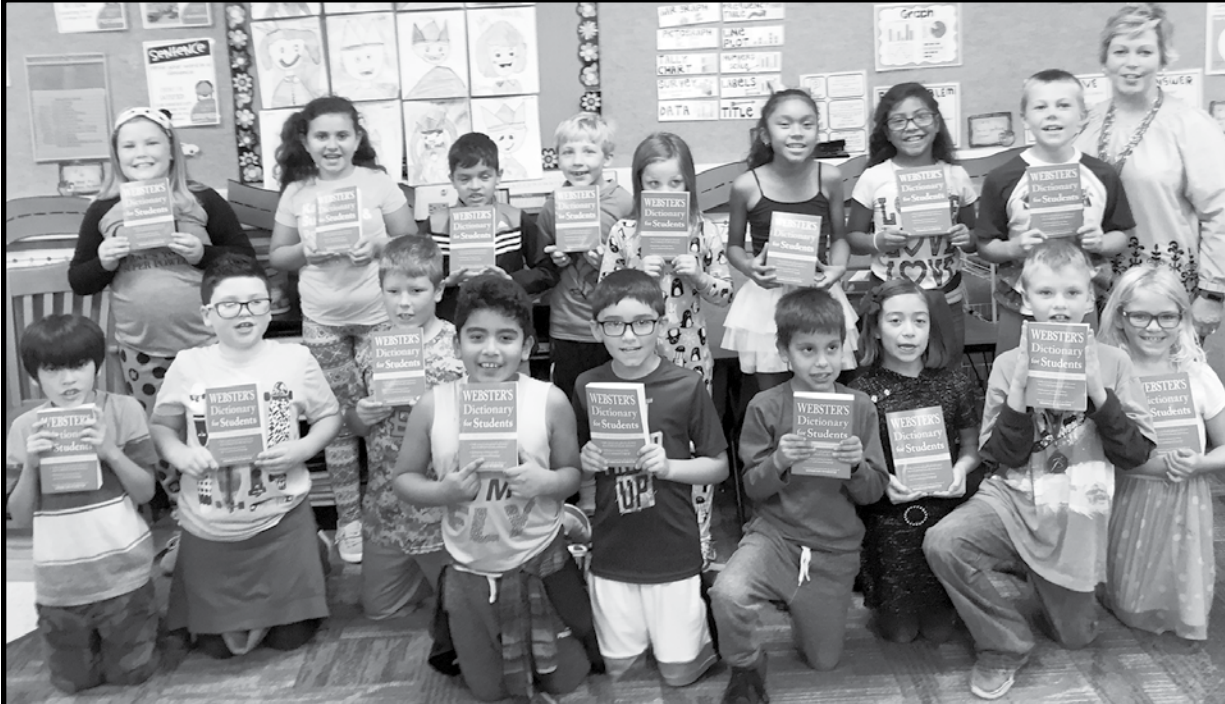
