Ekeko Blends will offer more than just juice. Kufner, a former educator, can teach customers about the holistic value of tea, and will offer teas made from natural fruits and herbs. In addition to the juice and tea, coffee hounds can get their fix with black coffee and espresso offered at Ekeko. The shop will offer soups, sandwiches and salads with a Peruvian twist

The Peruvian style food goes to further Kufner's objective — offering healthier options in Wavne America.

## Courthouse restoration project continues to vex commissioners

stretched their regularly scheduled Tuesday, Nov. 20 meeting into Wednesday so that they could meet with Berggren Architects, the firm handling the planning of the Wayne County Courthouse exterior renovation project. In October's meeting, bids came in well over Berggren's estimate so the commissioners tasked Jake Geisert and Jerry Berggren with finding ways to bring the cost down. The duo suggested a few things, but ultimately more work is needed.

Geisert and Berggren told the commissioners that after their last meeting they re-evaluated where they were at in the project. Berggren said he then determined that the courthouse oriels and roof were items that needed the most attention at the time being. Previously, Berggren and Geisert were told by the State Historical Society that copper-clad oriels, as planned in the project, would prohibit the county from receiving tax credits on the project. Initially, Berggren told the commissioners to think about holding off on that aspect of the project for five years, which would clear the project from the Historical Society's jurisdiction.

Wednesday morning, however, Berggren and Geisert suggested the commissioners withdraw the current application to the Historical Society, move forward on a \$316,000 bid to do oriel and roof work, re-submit an application once the roof and oriel work is finished, and host a masonry workshop in the tuck-pointing technique that is causing bids to be high.

"We've negotiated as best we could," Geisert said. "It boils down to an uncertainty (of the technique and mortar) for

The uncertainty comes from Berg-house.

Wayne County Commissioners old-fashioned mortar unused in the U.S. and the requirement that masons do much of the brickwork by hand.

"They're (the bidders) plugging in about half of a million dollars of uncertainty," Berggren added.

Berggren told the commissioners he had been in touch with the Nebraska Masonry Alliance, who would be interested in supporting a workshop of that nature, both by suggesting their members attend and financially. Berggren told the commissioners that he hoped a workshop in the technique would allay masons fears and uncertainty.

The Wayne County Commissioners voiced their own uncertainties. The commissioners were concerned about breaking the projects into smaller pieces, but were even more concerned that there was no indication of what the realistic cost

"I understand doing things in stages," commissioner Randy Larson said. "What I don't like is doing things in stages when we don't know an end number. What you're saying is 'let's get started and see where we end up."

The commissioners asked Berggren and Geisert to go back and get a firm estimate for the oriel and roof work to be presented in December.

They also approved a motion to work with the Nebraska Masonry Alliance to set up a workshop. The commissioners stressed that they did not want the County to fund the endeavor unless it was for materials for work to be done on the courthouse as part of the workshop.



Burbach was concerned that by the time they reached his district there would be frost and road packing issues, in addition to the wind farm traffic. NPPD representatives stated this project would start at the north end and move south. A motion was made by Larson and seconded by Burbach to approve the NPPD application. The first commissioner meeting for 2019 falls on New Year's Day. This meeting was rescheduled for Monday, December 31st at 9:00 a.m. in the courtroom.

The meeting was recessed until Wednesday, November 21st at 9:30 a.m.

The reconvened meeting was called to order by Chairman James Rabe at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday, November 21, 2018, in the courtroom of the Wayne County Courthouse. Chairman James Rabe, Members Dean Burbach and Randy Larson, Sheriff Jason Dwinell and Clerk Debra Finn were present.

Jerry Berggren and Jake Geisert of Berggren Architects said they have been working with Kingery Construction and the masonry company to bring the courthouse renovation bids closer to the estimates. The repointing of the brick is the problem. The masonry contractors are unfamiliar with the process they are being asked to use.

Rather than using a grinder, the mason is to remove the loose mortar by hand. They can tell what is deficient by what comes out easily, and they won't remove more mortar than necessary. The mason is to repoint with a hot mix that breathes, similar to what was used when the courthouse was built. Past repointing projects used a hard mixture that is not lasting Berggren proposed the county take the following steps:

Withdraw the Historical Tax Credit Application

- Approve the \$316,000.00 bid for the orioles (high bay windows). That work would be done by April-May.
- Apply for tax credits for the roof portion of the project. When the project is complete, collect those tax credits and apply that money to the repointing stage. Apply for tax credits for the repointing, stone work, drainage, etc. Host a training
- workshop on the requested repointing process. Rebid the project. Collect the tax credits when the project is complete. Consider using a 501c3 non-profit organization so donated money could be tax
- deductible. Berggren stated these steps would move the project forward; it would just take a little longer than originally anticipated. The tax credit from the roofing stage could be used to offset the cost of

the repointing, and the repointing work will be done to the highest standards. The board was encouraged to work with the Nebraska Masonry Alliance and host a two-day training workshop. Nigel Copsey will be in the United States and could conduct the workshop. Potential attendance and funding details were discussed. The county's only financial obligation

would be the cost of materials used on the courthouse. Upon completion, there would be trained contractors able to bid the courthouse project competitively. A motion was made by Larson and seconded by Burbach to approve working with the Nebraska Masonry Alliance and Berggren Architects to host a repointing workshop under the guidance of Nigel Copsey, and to explore partial project funding using a 501c3 non-profit

organization. Roll call vote: Larson, Burbach, Rabe - aye; motion carried. The remaining portions of the project bid were discussed. Berggren is to find out what the cost would be for just the roof, and to find out why the orioles came in at \$316,000.00 when the estimate was \$80,000.00 plus railings. Responses to these questions will be presented at the

December 4th meeting. BJ Woehler commended the board on trying to save money. The bidders bid the project as a lump sum, possibly putting a lot of money in the first phase in case that is the only part the board

approves. Some of the work, such as the roof, needs to be done. The board has to decide if they have better control doing the project in stages or just getting it done The following claims were approved on a motion by Burbach and second by Larson. Roll call vote: Burbach, Larson, Rabe - aye; motion carried.

person, business, association, corporation or organization of any kind, who owns, occupies, leases or controls any property within the corporate city limits upon which a sidewalk has been constructed to allow an accumulation of snow, or ice, dirt, or rock or gravel on said sidewalk abutting said property at any time. In the event of a snow or ice storm said sidewalks shall be cleaned of snow and ice 24 hours after the city completes snow removal of the street adjacent to said sidewalk. Placing snow removed from sidewalks onto the paved portion of any municipal street is prohibited. (B) Exceptions.

(1) In locations where the street surface between the curbs exceeds 40 feet and where the improvements on any such abutting property are located so as to leave the owner nowhere else to place the removed snow: in this exception, the snow or ice needs to be removed within 12 hours of any snowfall necessitating the City Street Department to remove said snow from the public streets, and such snow or ice will be placed on the paved street not less more than one foot from the curb line. In such locations, any area between the sidewalk and the street which has been improved with pavement or pavers and that is not used for parking, shall be considered to be part of the sidewalk.

(2) (a) If, after proper notice is given. the tenant or property owner, whichever is applicable, fails to remove said snow, or ice, dirt, or rock, or gravel, the city shall cause the removal of said snow, or ice, dirt, or rock or gravel within three days of the property being posted, or the tenant or owner being personally served, or within five days of such notice being mailed by first class mail. The tenant or property owner will be billed for the costs incurred to remove said snow, or ice, dirt, or rock, or gravel. (b) If the costs are not paid within two

months, the City Clerk shall cause a lien to be placed upon the property in the form of a special assessment. (2002 Code, § 70-44) (Ord. 2001-31, passed

## What is in a Stover Bale?

It is an inevitable question that we as Agronomist answer every fall; "What am I doing when I remove crop residue?" It is an incredibly strait forward question that has more layers to it than an onion. There are the soil health aspects, nutrient removal pieces, planting effects for the next season, as well the need to possibly balance all of those factors with your need for livestock feed. And while we have this discussion every year, as commodity and input prices ebb and flow, the economics of this change every year. And the truth of the matter is, I will probably never change your mind one way or the other when it comes to stover removal. I also know that for most accounts that what done is done for this year. But, I can make sure that you are fully informed about both the short term and

long term costs that go along with this. So let's look at each aspect of stover removal, starting with the livestock aspect. This is the best reason on the positive side to remove residue. I honestly can't begin to talk intelligently about roughage and DDG's and things of that nature, but I know that the reasons are real and that stover fulfills an important roughage need. On the other side of the positive column for stover removal is planter issue remediation. I fully acknowledge that when we are in a corn on corn environment that we have to have a plan to deal with residue. Residue doesn't break down like it used to. When we have to deal with the plantability issue on top of nutrient tie up, especially

Nitrogen, there are definitely reason to remove residue. However, on the other side of this conversations are the reasons why stover removal may not be a good idea, and first and foremost is soil health. Residue is a vital component in the protection of the soil surface. Impact from precipitation and wreathing are both factors that not only affect our best top soil, but also water infiltration and other factors. When residue is in place, it protects the top soil from many of those bad things by serving as a buffer between the weather and the soil. When we take more than 40% of our residue off, we really open up the soil to future problems.

And then last, but not least is the cost of the residue removal. For those of you on Medium and Heavy textured soils where Magnesium is in adequate to excessive supply, the cost of nutrient removal this season is around \$6.50 per ton. While that isn't a tremendous cost, remember that it compounds with the other factors it can quickly add up to more than what you receive in benefits, especially if you are selling the stover. However, if you are a light texture soil, or sandy ground farmer, I will make the argument that you cannot afford to ever remove stover. This year, the cost to replace the Magnesium from stover removal with KMAG is over \$47 per acre. When Mag is already a limiting factor to your production and providing pressure to your crop input budget, tripling the amount that you need due to stover removal is crippling.

So my take home for today is simply this. I understand that even if I could change your mind on stover removal, it is too late for this fall. But, there are so many more factors that go into determining the cost to benefits when it comes to stover removal that it is seldom a simple addition/subtraction proposition. Complex issues like this are where having a trusted advisor proves valuable. What is right for you operation in the long term might be the decision that makes the least sense from a financial position right now, or vice versa. But for my money, I know that unless manure is going back on the spot where stover was removed, there are very real challenges that we need to make a plan now for in addressing needs and challenges for the


