Elementary Principal Russ Plager talked to the board on the work he and a committee he recruited have done to gauge interest in the program, determine how it would be run and estimate costs of the program.

Plager told the board a number of grants have already been secured and additional funding could be available in coming years. He also said there is considerable interest from Wayne State College to provide college students to work with the elementary students in the program.

Work will be done on the gym floor at Wayne High School this summer.

A bid of \$25,001.60 was accepted from Egan Supply Company to remove the stain, replace a number of boards and apply a sealant. The work will be done this sum-

> "We do ask that you request a time with the machines that you have an idea about how long your project will take," Headley

The cost to make a project is up to the maker according to Headley.

"The cost to utilize the machine is nothing. If you're bringing in your own supplies, you might walk out of here with no cost,' Headley said. "The Nebraska Library Commission has provided consumables that we are able to sell so it's nice because if you want to come in and learn how and try out a project without putting in a bunch of money into getting your own materials right away you can buy a sheet of wood from us for like \$1 to around \$3."

Some of the equipment requires those under the age of 19 to be supervised by a parent and patrons will need to sign an agreement to follow the policies of the Library

Headley said if a class doesn't work for equipment a patron is interested in, contact the library


"If any of the classes do not work for anybody we encourage them to give us their contact info so that as we get our volunteers trained we can set up a one-on-one for them

Dr. Willis (Will) L. Wiseman, M.D., was born Oct. 12, 1942 in Omaha, the only son of Glenn and Audrey (Reinhardt) Wiseman. He grew up in North Platte, working in his parents' three restaurants and delivering the Omaha World Herald. He began his professional education at Stanford University and received his bachelor's degree from Kearney State College. He earned his medical degree from the University of Nebraska Medical School. He also served as a medical officer in the U.S. Army Reserves. He began his medical practice in Torrington, Wyo., and moved it to Wayne in 1975.

He transformed his single-doctor

practice into a five-doctor, two-

physician-assistant clinic with

mann Funeral Home of Wayne.

three satellite offices. The innovative satellite office concept pioneered by Will began with the creation of Wisner Clinic in 1979 with clinics in Laurel and Wakefield following. The concept was recognized as the first-of-itskind in Nebraska and defined an "umbrella" of health care coverage in the region. The success of the concept has become a model for other medical facilities across the state.

Will was further recognized for initiating Wayne's first active doctor recruitment program in 1978. That effort resulted in the recruitment and hiring of several present-day physicians cementing Wayne as a leading center for medical services. He is credited with creating one of the first physical fitness centers to be used in conjunction with physical therapy and wellness programs. Under his direction, the Providence Fitness Center was founded in 1979 and continues to be the prototype for new physical therapy facilities. Will gave freely of his time, serving for many years on the Wayne City Council and was named Citizen of the Year in 1995. He was heavily involved in community organizations serving on the Cornhusker Shrine Club, Wayne Kiwanis Club, former President of Wayne Industries Board of Directors, Providence Medical Center Foundation Board of Directors, Greenwood Cemetery Board, Order of the Eastern Star Masonic Lodge, and many others. He was a member of Our Savior Lutheran Church in Wayne.

Will had many interests and hobbies. Early in his life he earned his pilot's license and hiked Pike's Peak. He had a love of carpentry, woodworking, and especially the outdoors. He was an avid hunter and fisherman throughout his entire life. These passions he thoroughly enjoyed teaching and sharing with his children and grandchildren. He enjoyed horsepacking into the mountains, riding motorcycles, especially with friends, and hosting get-togethers where he was cooking for all. He loved Husker football and watching those games was the only time he would sit still. He loved and cherished his dogs and spending time at his land and cabin by the river (a.k.a. the Deer Garden). After retiring, he also became an accomplished wood carver. His greatest loves were his wife, his large blended family, especially his grandchildren, and his long list of cherished





hours in the water. He received the Purple Heart Medal. Dale married Lois Ruser on Feb. 14, 1948 at Immanuel Lutheran Church northeast of Wayne. The couple farmed near Winside for many years. Dale served on the Winside School Board during the re-consolidation and construction of the new High School, District 95-R, and the Rural Fire Board for 27 years. Dale was life member of V.F.W. Post #1644 in Norfolk, Winside American Legion Post #0252, and Trinity Lutheran Church in Winside. He loved farming and his mother said that as a young boy he would say to his brother Jack, "Let's Talk Farming.



"Wayne State College takes all reports of misconduct seriously," Jay Collier, director of college relations said. "As soon as this single alleged incident was reported to the College on Jan. 26, the College's Title IX Coordinator initiated an investigation of the complaint. The Wayne Police Department was notified and also began its own investigation. The College's investigation process is the cornerstone of our commitment to ensuring that we engage in a prompt, thorough, and fair resolution of any allegations of misconduct.'

"Each and every step of this process has been undertaken with care and sensitivity in order to ensure the continued safety and security of our campus residents. The accuser and the accused have been informed of each step of the process and the College has included in its investigation process attempts to corroborate the account of the incident from witnesses provided by each party to the complaint," Collier said.

"Under the guidelines of Title IX, the College utilized no-contact orders, building restrictions, increased Campus Security foot patrols, and live-in residential staff awareness measures to monitor issues of concern. The Title IX investigation is ongoing at this time as we seek resolution of this com-

plaint," Collier said.



Position breakdown of the class includes 10 offensive linemen, five defensive backs, four defensive linemen, four linebackers, four athletes and two each at quarterback, running back, wide receiver and tight

"Due to the support of President Marysz Rames, Director of Athletics Mike Powicki and our Foundation, our scholarship increase allowed us to compete on a level playing field for the first time throughout the recruiting process," McLaughlin said. "That support enabled us to sign some very highly recruited studentathletes who we think are going to fortify the foundation of a very successful future for Wayne State foot-

McLaughlin added, "Our primary emphasis this year was the offensive line and with 10 commitments we feel that we have addressed that need with some outstanding young prospects. We also strengthened our defense with a strong group of defensive linemen, linebackers and defensive backs. We are very comfortable with the depth and breadth of the class and are excited to work with these young men over the next four or five years of their lives as they grow and learn."

Private pesticide applicators whose licenses expire in 2019 and those seeking first-time certification can find information on pesticide safety education programs at their local University of Nebraska Extension offices. Wayne County training sessions are scheduled

as follows: Thursday, Feb. 21: 1 p.m. AND 6 p.m. at the Fire

Hall, 510 Tomar in Wayne;

Thursday, March 7: 9 a.m. at the American Legion Hall in Winside.

Licensing as a private applicator allows farmers to purchase and use pesticides classified as restricted use by the U.S. Environmental Protection

Agency in their own farming operations.

Extension provides the educational program, while the agriculture department is responsible for licensing. The training fee is \$40.00. An applicator may also certify by self-study a \$60.00 training fee or online training for a \$75.00 training fee.

In 2001, the Nebraska Legislature created a state pesticide license fee of \$25.00 for private applicators. The fee covers a three-year license pe-

Archery paddlefish applications acceptedMarch 1-14

The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission will accept archery paddlefish permit applications

The application period begins at 1 p.m. central time on March 1. Mail applications must be received in Game and Parks' Lincoln office by 5 p.m. and online applications must be received by 11:59 p.m. on



A nonrefundable \$7 fee is due at the time of application. The remaining fee to be paid if a permit is awarded - \$26 for residents or \$50 for nonresidents - is due within 15 days of draw notification. A valid phone number and email address are required.

Permits will be issued in a random drawing based on preference points earned; applicants with the most preference points will receive the greatest priority. Any permits remaining following the drawing will be sold on a first-come basis beginning at 1 p.m. on May 1. An applicant will receive a pref-

erence point if he or she is not awarded a permit in the drawing. An additional preference point will be added each year he or she is unsuccessful in the drawing. Any person who is issued a paddlefish permit and any person who does not apply at least once during five consecutive years will lose all accumulated preference points.

Two people - both residents or both nonresidents - may submit a joint application. That application will be assigned to the applicant with the fewest preference points.

A person may have no more than two archery paddlefish permits per year: one earned via application and one bought over the counter. Permits and their accompanying tags are not transferable. Anyone fishing with an archery paddlefish permit also must have a valid Nebraska fish

The 2019 archery paddlefish season is June 1-30. To apply for a permit, visit a Game and Parks office, OutdoorNebraska.org, or use a form in the 2019 Nebraska Fishing Guide.




This cold weather is 'For the Birds!'

This morning, before I came to work, I was stumbling around in the dark in 8F temperatures and sub-zero wind chills with a flashlight to make sure all of my bird feeders and waterers were well stocked for my feathered friends. I feed the birds year round, just to draw them close to the house because my wife and I like to watch them. We always have a good variety of birds around. It's mornings like this one that I question my sanity... although my wife questions it all the time.

This was a good reminder of one of the most important things you need to do if you feed birds in the winter...if you start, don't stop! Birds become dependent on you and if you stop when the weather turns nasty and you don't really feel like getting out and filling the feeders (like this morning), you can actually starve the birds you were trying to help.

I find I fill the feeders more often in the winter than I do at other times of the year, just because there are fewer alternative food sources available. This is especially



true if there are several inches of snow on the ground that covers other potential food sources for them. When it gets snowy, I take a piece of tin and lean it against a post so the seed I scatter on the ground for ground-feeding birds won't be covered with snow.

Based on our experiences, here

are a few suggestions if you are around the world. Coordinated by feeding our feathered friends. Anyone who feeds birds knows how easy it is for seed to turn moldy in feeders. Moisture from snow or rain can leak into feeders and turn bird seed into potential sources of illness for birds. You should keep feeders clean to help prevent the spread of disease to backyard birds.

Clean and disinfect feeders on a regular basis, taking care to scrape out old moldy seed that collects in corners. Wash feeders in warm water with dish soap, then rinse. Disinfect them with a solution of one part of a liquid chlorine bleach to nine parts warm water. Make sure feeders are completely dry before refilling them with seeds.

Also, if possible, provide water for birds. This is extremely important during the winter because other sources of water may not be available. It seems chilly, but birds regularly use our heated bird baths. Besides water to drink, they use it to help keep their feathers clean which makes them, for lack of a better term, fluffier, which gives them better insulation against bitter cold temperatures.

Anyone who really enjoys bird watching won't want to miss an your own home. The annual Great Backyard Bird Count will be held on Feb. 16-19. Participants are needed to count birds in their yards, neighborhoods, or other locations. Simply on any day of the count, then go to birdcount.org and enter the highest

This program is conducted

the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, Audubon, and Bird Studies Canada, the count provides an instant snapshot of birdlife around the world. Last year, organizers receive over 180,000 checklists during the event and recording almost 6,500 species of birds. Also, you can watch as the tallies come in at birdcount.org.

Whether you observe birds in your backyard, a park, or a wilderness area, the Great Backyard Bird Count is an opportunity to share yiour results at birdcount.org. It doesn't have to be hard, it takes me about one cup of coffee at my dining room table to record the birds I see in 15 minutes. It's fun and rewarding for people of all ages and skill levels--and it gets people outside... or you can do like I do and watch from inside, too!

Information from the Great Backyard Bird Count participants is even more valuable as scientists try to learn how birds are affected by environmental changes. The information you send in can provide the first sign that individual species may be increasing or declining from year to year. It shows how a species' range expands or shrinks over time. A big change, noted consistently event later this month... and you over a period of years, is an indicacan take part from the comfort of tion that something is happening in the environment that is affect. ing the birds and that should be followed up on.



The Big N Application

It has been over two months now since I started the conversation we have had this winter about splitting up our Nitrogen application. And I have heard back from many of you during this series. The conversation that ha sparked the most questions from you all so far has been using our planter for Nitrogen Application. And while that conversation has been largely inquisitive with positive feedback, there was a simple foreshadowing statement I made in that first video/article that a few caught. That statement has caused some to fear, and some to celebrate

For some of you that is fall anhydrous, for others, it's spring anhydrous or spring UAN. But for many of you out there, you have an application of Nitrogen that is 100 lbs. per acre or more at a single application. Now, there are a few basics that we need to cover before we go any further First and foremost, I want to put into black and white that I do not want

to see fall anhydrous go away. The logistics of it are too important for you all as growers and my company as a dealer. I can say with a lot of certainty that the US fertilizer market is not prepared to switch those tons to spring tons because of our delivery systems. And even if they could, it would reset prices in the market, again due to logistics. But, given all of that, I think that we need to consider moving some of those pounds to another time of year.

My rule, well to be fair it isn't my rule, but I live by it, of no more than 10X your CEC at any one time of Nitrogen pounds is accurate, but also needs to have context. Your soils Cation Exchange Capacity gives us a place to store Nitrogen, but realize that doesn't mean that all of your Nitrogen has a safe place to be stored right away. Your soils cation exchange sites have other cations there competing for those spots as well, and it is not a foregone conclusion that just because the rule says it should be safe, it will be safe.

And that is why even if your CEC says it can support twice the amount you are putting on at a time, it might still not be a good idea to do so. I know many of you have CEC levels in the low upper teens and low twenties. But I want you to think about potential loss this way.

When our soils are cold in the fall, Nitrogen is fairly stable, especially after the soil freezes. But from March whatever to June 20th, the growing crop in the field needs very little Nitrogen. So when you put on 150 pounds of N in March, you are basically acknowledging that you are gambling. Your bet is that for the next 110 days you are going to play weather roulette and Mother Nature won't hit 0 or 00 more than a couple of times, because when she does, we get rain that steals a percentage of our Nitrogen. When you put 100 pounds out on April 1st you are making the same bet, but only 80 times. Now if the bet is that you will lose 5% of your Nitrogen every time we hit green, does that seem like a significant difference.

Listen, the reality of this all is that no matter what the system is, we are always betting against Mother Nature. And we know that she always wins in the long run. As my friend Tim Mundorf likes to say, "all Nitrogen management ideas are good until the Corn turns yellow." I can assure you that I don't want to see those yellow corn days because that is yield lost for the year. But I also know that to maintain our license to operate, we have to get better and better every year that goes by. The only thing I can tell you with absolute certainty is that splitting up your Nitrogen applications will cost you more money up front than a single N application. But, when yield, and the long term balance of the environment and feeding the world are all put into perspective, splitting up Nitrogen applications is now, or will soon be everyone's reality.

Daily steps to keep your heart healthy

Heart disease is a formidable foe. According the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, heart disease accounts for nearly 25 percent of all deaths in the United States

both men and women, and an estimated 15 million adults in the U.S. have coronary heart disease, the most common type of heart disease. And heart disease is not exclusive to the United States, as the Heart Research Institute says that every seven minutes in Canada someone dies from heart disease or stroke.

Such statistics are disconcerting but they can serve as a wake-up call that compels people to prioritize heart health. Fortunately, heart disease is often preventable and people can employ various strategies to reduce their risk.

· Stop smoking right now. One of the best things to do to protect the heart is to stop smoking. The Heart Foundation indicates that smoking reduces oxygen in the blood and damages blood vessel walls. It also contributes to atherosclerosis, or a narrowing and clog-

ging of the arteries. · Eat healthy fats.

When eating, choose polyunsaturated and unsaturated fats and avoid trans fats as much as possible. Trans fats increase one's risk of developing heart disease by clogging arteries and raising LDL (bad) cholesterol levels. Read food labels before buying anything at the store.

 Keep your mouth clean. Studies show that bacteria in mouth involved in the development of gum disease can travel to the bloodstream and cause an elevation




