Gragert also had the opportunity to talk about his priority bill LB243. The bill would create the Healthy Soils Task Force aimed at ensuring Nebraska has the healthiest soil in the country. He said that the aim of the bill is to set up a two-year initiative to promote different conservation practices for both healthy soil and water quality.

"We have an issue of nitrates up in my district and I really want to bring that up more than it has been," Gragert told the

Gragert, who is also on the Natural Resources committee, said that fall out from recent flooding has also been on the minds of state senators. His own counties Boyd and Knox took considerable damage during the flooding.

"Boyd and Knox counties have really had problems as far as the roads, bridges and drinking water," Gragert said.

He told the crowd that working education funding, flood repair and property tax reform were rarely from his mind and that senators are working hard this session to address all of those issues.

Mable Joy Fredrickson Jones was born April 6, 1923 in Carroll to Christian and Averina (Sylvanus) Fredrickson. She graduated from Carroll High School and received her Bachelor of Arts degree in education from Wayne State College. She began her elementary teaching career in a country school in rural Nebraska and then at Tilden Public Schools and Winside Public Schools. Mable later moved to Lincoln, where she was a first grade teacher with

the Lincoln Public School System until her retirement. In 1983, Mable joined her three sisters in wrapping up a total of 146 years in the classroom in Nebraska. The teaching "Fredrickson Sisters" included Mable, Laura Fredrickson, Ethel Malmberg and Ruby Nelson. At that time they were recognized by President Ronald Reagan for their contributions to education. In 1977, Mable married Thomas J. Jones at the Cathedral of the Risen Christ in Lincoln. She was a member of the First Lutheran Church in Lincoln.

Surviors include her sister, Ruby Nelson of Brookdale-Wayne; three step-children, Mike (Marsha) Jones, Lake St. Louis, Mo., Jim Jones of Seattle, Wash. and Bill Jones of Lincoln; grandchildren, Chris (Mary Beth) Jones and Stacy Jone; several nieces and nephews.

She was preceded in death by her parents; husband, Thomas, in 2013; and nine brothers and sisters.



## Wayne State College to host health conference on suicide awareness, April 8-9

Wayne State College organizers will host the second WSC Behavioral Health Conference April 8-9 on the WSC campus. The conference will begin at 2 p.m. in the Frey Conference Suite of the Kanter Student Center with a panel of community and professional stakeholders discussing the behavioral care needs they encounter in their positions and how needs are addressed. Wayne State faculty, students, and regional professional stakeholders are invited to participate in this free conference which is also open to the public.

WSC Task Force for Career Development in Behavioral Health and the Behavioral Health Education Center of Nebraska (BHECN) are coordinating the conference. Mid-America Mental Health Technology Transfer Center Network (MHTTC) is sponsoring the event. After the panel discussion, a

student poster session will take place from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. in the atrium of Gardner Hall. Julia Hebenstreit, JD, Executive Director of The Kim Foundation in Omaha will give the keynote address at 7 p.m. in the Frey Conference Suite of the Kanter Student Center.

Hebenstreit received her J.D. from Creighton University in

2005, and her bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Nebraska Omaha in 2002. She has been with The Kim Foundation since December of 2011, and prior to that worked for local nonprofits doing development, strategic planning, communications and advancement. She serves as the president for the Nebraska Association of Behavioral Health Organizations, as the National Council for Behavioral Health's Hill Day State Captain since 2015, and as an active member of the Nebraska Suicide Prevention Coalition, Metro Area Suicide Coalition,

Connections Advisory Committee, RESPECT Advisory Board, and BHECN's Advisory Committee.

The Task Force was formed to honor Stephen Spelic, who was described as an old-time social worker after his death in May 2018. He spent his professional life in the behavioral health system in Nebraska and Iowa.

He had years of experience in a case-by-case review of the behavioral health system from the point of view of the emergency room and hospital. The Task Force is directly supporting the NE Nebraska Behavioral Health Network in its goal to create and retain a behavioral health workforce in this area of the state to honor the memory of Spelic.

The WSC Task Force for Career Development in Behavioral Health is charged with reviewing and cataloging behavioral health needs in rural northeast Nebraska in order to identify strategies to increase interest in behavioral health careers. The Task Force provides recommendations for initiatives that support students intending to practice in behavioral health care fields in northeast Nebraska.







## Hank Bounds to step down as University of Nebraska president

University of Nebraska President with as little debt as possible. Hank Bounds informed the university community today that after nearly four years leading NU through a period of transformational collaboration and momentum, he is stepping away from administration to transition to other educational and con-

Bounds, a Mississippi native who became NU's seventh president on April 13, 2015, will step down late this summer and return to the South with his family. Bounds said that after more than 20 years in executive roles, he had decided to spend his time differently going forward.

"Growing up, I never dreamed I would even go to college, much less have the opportunity to work with some of the most talented students, faculty and staff in the world," he said. "To have been entrusted with this role by the Board of Regents is the privilege of a lifetime.

"While rewarding, this job has also been personally demanding. I have done everything I could to serve our students and the people of Nebraska effectively. Now it's time to recharge and reconnect with my family.'

Praising the Board, chancellors, the NU and campus leadership teams, and the university's faculty, staff, and 52,000 students, Bounds added: "I will leave knowing that the university is in good hands. When I began this job, I said the University of Nebraska had the power to change the world. With appropriate support from our partners in state government, the University can be even more impactful than ever."

Board of Regents Chairman Tim Clare of Lincoln thanked Bounds for his leadership through times of opportunity and challenge.

"We could not have asked for a better leader than Hank Bounds. He was a tireless leader who always put the university's interests first," Clare said. "Hank was the right person, at the right time, for our university, and we will forever be indebted for his great work.

"Selfishly, we are despondent to see Hank and Susie leave the University, particularly after all the heavy lifting they have done to put NU in a great position. We did everything we could to change their minds, but in the end, we understand and appreciate their decision. As a husband and parent myself, I know how important it is to put fam-

Regent Jim Pillen of Columbus, vice chairman of the Board, added: "I accepted Hank's decision with mixed emotions. I'm happy for him and his family, but his departure is a loss for our university and state. Neverthe- a new STEM building at UNK. less, we, the Board, are full steam ahead with the priorities of collaboration, efficiency and effectiveness that Hank has put in place. Thanks to Hank, the future of our university is strong."

Bounds' tenure has been marked by a focus on student access and success, growth and collaboration, including:

Continued growth in enrollment, including a record high in 2017 of nearly 53,000. Campuses have also set records in diversity as the university works to make the promise of higher education available to more students and address Nebraska's workforce crisis.

Bounds completed implementation of an academic transfer curriculum that makes 24 general education requirements transferrable among all NU campuses, state colleges and community colleges, exfor Nebraska students. Additionally, Bounds in 2016 launched the "Commit to Complete" initiative to help students graduate on time so they can enter the workforce sooner and

A commitment to affordable access highlighted by average annual tuition increases of 3.2 percent. During Bounds' tenure, average student debt on all undergraduate campuses decreased. Unduplicated head count enrollment in University of Nebraska Online courses also has grown by 29 percent over the last four-year period, making an NU education available to more students.

Research records that are expanding the university's reach and impact in Nebraska and around the world in areas like agriculture, national defense, cancer and infectious disease. Research expenditures reached an all-time high of \$489 million in 2017-18.

gether with USSTRATCOM, announced a \$92 million contract renewal with the U.S. Air Force to continue NU's anti-terrorism work through the system-wide National Strategic Research Institute. Bounds in 2015 also announced a new "Collaboration Initiative" to bring together faculty from across campuses to build research expertise and capacity in priority areas like food for health and systems science.

Bounds has called for state leaders to work together on a plan to address the 34,000 job openings in high-skill, high-demand, high-wage fields that Nebraska will have in the years ahead. He testified in support of legislation this year that would provide scholarships to students in those areas.

Greater efficiency and collaboration among the NU campuses, including efficiencies yielded from the Budget Response Team process Bounds launched in 2017 to manage state funding reductions. Through the BRT effort, the university found \$22 million in administrative reductions; unified and streamlined operational areas like human resources, purchasing, energy and facilities across the system; and protected to the greatest extent possible affordability and academic quality.



Before that, he was a high school teacher, principal, superintendent and chief state school officer. Bounds grew up on his family's small farm in rural Mississippi, and panding the pathway to graduation his service in the Army National Guard helped him pay for college.

# **Reasons NOT To Sign a Wind Contract**

- The future of farming is in efficiency and precision.
- Turbine roads and towers decrease efficiency every time a field is worked whether it is planting, harvesting, tillage, spraying or other applications.
- Major seed companies will be less likely to grow seed corn near turbines. They need to be expedient with aerial applications which turbines hinder.
- Turbines can interfere with GPS, drones and any newer technology that requires a consistent signal.

#### They do not offer nearly enough compensation

• A landowner usually receives about 1/2 of the revenue made off the land if a farmer/renter brings the equipment and does the work. Wind companies offer you pennies on the dollars they pocket.

#### They ask too much in return

• Landowners are asked to give up their rights and give the wind company's project precedence over anything else including the farming operation. Land managers are starting to discourage the signing of wind easements.

## They maintain all power and control

Ask yourself, if there ever is a disagreement between you and the wind company, who will win?

#### Nuisance to surrounding community

- Lawsuits against wind companies have been brought by communities and families that are quietly settled out of court but, if you sign a wind contract you will sign a "nuisance clause" that will keep you from complaining about vibration, noise, turbulence, shadow flicker or stray voltage.
- However, making your neighbors put up with it is rude or even dangerous and you may be held liable.

#### Your property value could take a hit

- New turbines may not affect property values immediately but what about in 10-20 years when the turbines are showing their age and not producing as much? Will that turbine still be an asset or become an albatross?
- Homes on acreages decrease in value immediately when an industrial wind installation is built nearby.
- Right now in western lowa the old Enron turbines are being cut off 1 foot above the base and the footings are being left. The turbines that are still standing are now only paying \$200/year.

#### It is NOT what the wind company reps SAY, only what is in the contract is binding

• Seek the advice of a competent property/real estate lawyer; not every lawyer will understand the specific points of wind contracts.

#### Just because they SAY that the project will happen does not mean it will happen

They do not have the easements they "need" - only 100 people have signed in Pal Alto (50 being absentee) and much of the land is not connected making it useless without the land in between. They are only about 35 in Kossuth, 25 in Emmet/Dickinson and three in Clay. A wind company had to move on from Royal, Iowa, for lack of interest.




# Flooded gardens - What's safe to eat?

I hope this is a sign that the worst of the flooding damage has been taken care of. In the last couple of days the questions I've been getting have shifted from flood damaged buildings, cropland, grain and hay, to questions regarding flooded garden areas and something near and dear to my heart, if it would impact the food safety aspects of harvesting morel mushrooms from land that was flooded. Food safety should be a serious

consideration for everyone but is particularly important for those at greatest risk of food-borne illnesses, including young children, the elderly, pregnant women and those with compromised immune systems. Flood waters may be contaminated by any combination of sewage, river or creek water, farm run-off or industrial pollutants. Bacteria, parasites, viruses and chemical contaminants are the biggest concerns to food safety. Often floods are later in the

year and gardens have already been planted and vegetables have emerged. Then the answer to "What fruit or vegetable produce can gardeners safely use following a flood?" is pretty simple. The most conservative answer - one that eliminates all risk - is all produce touched by flood waters should be discarded.

However, when a flood occurs early in the growing season there to ensure food safety. Fresh ma-



son left. Can flooded garden areas be planted and the produce safely used? Below are tips to help you determine what can be harvested and how to handle it to reduce food safety concerns. There isn't a lot of research on this, but the following gives us some guidelines.

The National Organic Program (NOP) outlines requirements for growers using fresh manure as a soil amendment and fertilizer to reduce potential contamination to food crops grown in that soil. It estimates a timeline for microbial die-off, if contamination did occur,

The first consideration is if the edible portion of the crop came in direct contact with flood waters. This is usually the concern when flooding occurs later in the growing season. Then use the following like asparagus, rhubarb, potatoes, • If the edible portion of the crop

did NOT come in direct contact with flood waters, allow a 90-day period of no contact with flood water before harvesting any produce. • If the edible portion of crop DID come in direct contact, through

submersion or splashing, with flood waters, allow a 120-day period of no contact with flood water before harvesting any produce. Since gardens were not planted

and plants were not exposed to the flood waters, you can use the same guidelines if your garden area was flooded. • For vegetables where the edible

portion will not come in contact with the soil that was exposed to flood water, allow a 90-day period between when flood waters receded before harvesting any produce. You can delay planting, plant for green beans, sweet corn, or toma- by the flooding this spring!

Don't even consider grazing untaken. Once pastures dry out, allow plants extra time and growth before initiating grazing. And when animals do graze, be sure to leave taller stubble than usual to both keep plants healthy and to minimize animal consumption of any flood contaminants remaining on surface soil.

It's a lot of work to recover flooded pastures. It can be done if you follow the right steps.
