Assistant principal hired for Wayne Elementary

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Mark Evetovich will serve as the Wayne Community Schools' Assistant Elementary Principal and District Assessment Coordinator following action taken at Monday's Board of Education meeting.

Evetovich will replace Tucker Hight, who was recently hired as the high school principal for the district. He is currently employed with the Walthill Schools and has previously served on the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education.

Elementary Principal Russ Plager presented information to the board on the Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) program being implemented at the elementary school.

Plager told the board the program is designed to include a tiered support system so "students don't slip through the cracks." It is based on three areas - literacy, behavior and math.

In new business, board members approved a contract with Trane for spring and fall maintenance of the district's heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) units. The two-year agreement is for \$16,000 per year.

Also approved was an agreement with KSB School Law for legal representation. The agreement allows the school to contact the law firm if the need arises, and allows the district access to services provided by the firm.

First reading approval was given to the After School Program Handbook.

Elementary Principal Plager told the board the Wayne program is being modeled after a similar program in Albion and the information in the handbook is based on the information included in the elementary

school handbook.

He told the board he would like to move forward on hiring the staff for the program and begin to take applications for the 2019-2020 school year.

An agenda item regarding the purchase of Chromebooks for the 2019-2020 school year was approved.

Total cost for the Chromebooks, which will be used by eighth and ninth grade students is \$48,194.85.

Dates for graduation, as well as the list of graduates, was approved.

Graduation for Wayne High seniors will be Saturday, May 11 at 2 p.m. at Rice Auditorium and graduation for Early Learning Center students will be Monday, May 13 at 7 p.m.

The last day of school for Wayne Community Schools' students will be Tuesday, May 21 at noon.

A bid of \$81,665 was awarded to Otte Construction for installation of ceiling tile and LED Lighting for classrooms in the upper level of the high school and the west hallway near the gym.

Assistant Special Education Director Tucker Hight told the board the annual Spring Sprints event has been scheduled for Friday, May 3. The event has grown considerably in recent years and Hight encouraged all to attend.

During committee updates, it was announced that the annual Alumni Tournament, involving both volleyball and basketball teams, will be held Friday and Saturday, April 19 and 20. Additional volunteers are needed to help with the event.

Wayne Community Schools Board of Education will next meet in regular session on Monday, May 13 at 5 p.m. in the junior-senior high school library.

Wayne Kids Club to offer students structured, supportive environment in new after school program

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Parents of Wayne Elementary students should have received information packets from their students about a new, school-led after school program that will be offered at the beginning of the 2019-2020 year. Starting next year, Wayne Kids Club will offer students an opportunity to work on homework and enjoy some extracurricular learning.

Wayne Elementary faculty and administration have been working on creating an after school program for some time. Sensing a need from the students led to the creation of Wayne Kids Club, according to site director and third grade teacher Carrie Wendte.

"We've recognized a need for students who need assistance completing homework and that support, and there are also students who don't have a structured environment after school so it provides an opportunity for a structured, supportive environment during that after school time," Wendte said.

Wayne Kids Club will help fulfill a need for structured after school time, but it also provides a safe environment to get some physical activity at the end of the day, enjoy a snack and take part in extended learning opportunities.

Those extended learning opportunities may consist of several-week long projects that are meant to boost problem solving and academic thinking outside the classroom.

"Those might be STEAM-based projects. STEAM is Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math," Wendte said. "We envision projects that might be a few weeks long (per project). We've got ideas of possibly doing life skills-type projects like cooking."

With classroom time and resources at a premium, Wendte said extended learning opportunities may also allow kids to learn skills they may miss during the year.

"We see that as a benefit of the program, that some of those things we don't have time for during the regular school day,

Providence Community Pharmacy to open April 15

Providence Medical Center announced Monday that Providence Community Pharmacy is opening on April 15.

"It's the day we've been waiting for," Kim Lueders, director of pharmacy at Providence Medical Center said. "Although the date is a little later than originally planned, the process could not have gone any smoother."

One of the first steps to making the retail pharmacy a reality was to acquire a pharmacy license from the State of Nebraska. Once this was accomplished, application for National Provider Numbers and a DEA license, allowing for sale of controlled substances, were possible.

"Some licenses can take up to six weeks for approval so we'd just hope for the best each time we sent in an application," Becky Barner, retail pharmacy coordinator said.

Once those steps were completed, the last thing to do was work through the contracting process with insurance companies. The pharmacy team has successfully secured contracts with most of the insurance companies. The few left to finalize won't be ready until after April 15, so it is important to call ahead if there are questions about the pharmacy's ability to process claims for particular insurance companies.

Vakoc Builder's Resource, the PMC IT department and the PMC maintenance team have worked alongside the pharmacy staff to meet the aggressive time line, and were successful in getting the retail pharmacy building ready for the April 15 opening.

The Aspiring Young Authors Festival was held April 6 at Wayne State College.

Fifty-seven students attended from 11 schools. Schools in attendance were Ewing, Laurel-Concord-Coleridge, Lincoln Montessori in Norfolk, Norfolk Catholic, Orchard, Randolph, Verdigre, Wayne, Winside, St. Mary's in Wayne and Woodland Park in Norfolk.

Nine students from Wayne Elementary, six from St. Mary's Elementary School in Wayne and three from Winside were among those in attendance.

Joni Oeltjenbruns and Alexandra McClanahan were the featured authors. All students met the authors and participated in break-out sessions with the authors as well as sharing a manuscript they had written themselves.

This year Wayne State College Service Learning students, under the direction of Dr. ChrisTee Weixelman, presented a lesson they had planned for each small group of students. The lesson was completed after students read their own manuscripts. Some of the students used creative dramatics, illustrations, literary

bingo, poetry, and other hands on projects to encourage students to continue writing and illustrating.

In Oeltjenbruns' session, students and their guests were taught how to draw expressions on a cartoon figure and to really pay attention and look for details when writing.

In McClanahan's session, students were encouraged to write about what they know. Each person has a story to tell. Students talked about recent flooding and the experiences in their communities. They were able to begin a story and hopefully will continue writing it later as fiction, nonfiction, or other genre that suits their writing style.

At the closing ceremony all students were recognized for their writing talent with a special certificate.

This was the 27th annual Aspiring Young Authors Festival. The goal is to "continue bringing nationally known authors and Nebraska authors to our corner of Nebraska to encourage our youth to continue write for their entire life."

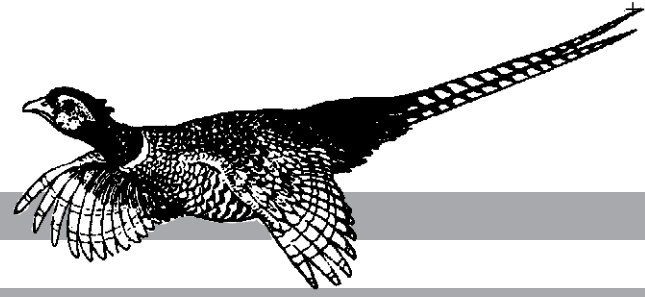

Wayne Kids Club's staff will be on hand to ensure students get the help they need. Wendte thinks that

"It's also a really big benefit to parents because when you've got everything else you have to do as a parent, helping with the homework and getting your kids to complete the homework can be taxing," Wendte said. "I think it can be a benefit to know when their kid comes home, that's done and done correctly."

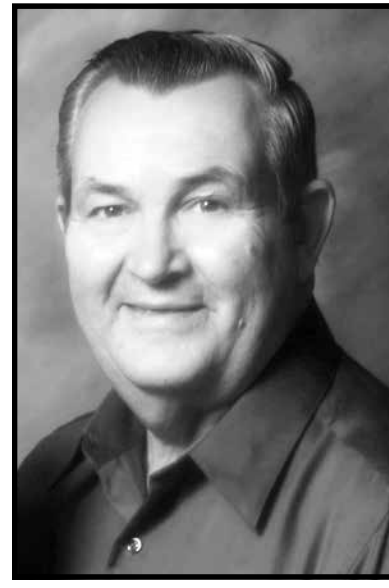

SBA disaster assistance available to Nebraska private nonprofits

Low-interest federal disaster loans are now available to certain private nonprofit organizations in Nebraska following President Trump's federal disaster declaration for Public Assistance as a result of severe winter storm, straight-line winds and flooding that began March 9, 2019, announced Administrator Linda McMahon of the U.S. Small Business Administration. Private nonprofits that provide essential services of a governmental nature are eligible for assistance.

These low-interest federal disaster loans are available in Adams, Antelope, Blaine, Boone, Box Butte, Boyd, Buffalo, Burt, Butler, Cass, Cedar, Colfax, Cuming, Custer, Dakota, Dixon, Dodge, Douglas, Fillmore, Frontier, Furnas, Gage, Garfield, Gosper, Greeley, Hall, Holt, Howard, Jefferson, Johnson, Knox, Lancaster, Logan, Loup, Madison, Morrill, Nance, Nemaha, Otoe, Pawnee, Pierce, Platte, Richardson, Saline, Sarpy, Sherman, Valley, Washington, Wayne and Wheeler counties.

"Private nonprofit organizations should contact Public Information Officer Jodie Fawl of the Nebraska Emergency Management Agency by calling (407) 471-7428, emailing Jodie.Fawl@nebraska.gov or visiting nema.nebraska.gov/ to obtain information about applicant briefings," director Tanya N. Garfield of SBA's Disaster Field Operations Center-West said. "At the briefings, private nonprofit representatives will need to provide information about their organization."

The Federal Emergency Management Agency will use that information to determine if the private nonprofit provides an "essential governmental service" and is a "critical facility" as defined by law. If so, FEMA may

provide the private nonprofit with a Public Assistance grant for their eligible costs. If not, FEMA may refer the private nonprofit to SBA for disaster loan assistance.

SBA may lend private nonprofits up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory and other business assets. SBA can also lend additional funds to help with the cost of improvements to protect, prevent or minimize the same type of disaster damage from occurring in the future.

For certain private nonprofit organizations of any size, SBA offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans to help with meeting working capital needs caused by the disaster. Economic Injury Disaster Loans may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable and other bills that cannot be paid because of the disaster's impact. Economic injury assistance is available regardless of whether the nonprofit suffered any property damage.

The interest rate is 2.75 percent with terms up to 30 years. The deadline to apply for property damage is June 4, 2019. The deadline to apply for economic injury is Jan. 6, 2020.

Applicants may apply online, receive additional disaster assistance information and download applications at disasterloan.sba.gov/ela. Applicants may also call SBA's Customer Service Center at (800) 659-2955 or email disastercustomerservice@sba.gov for more information on SBA disaster assistance. Individuals who are deaf or hard-of-hearing may call (800) 877-8339. 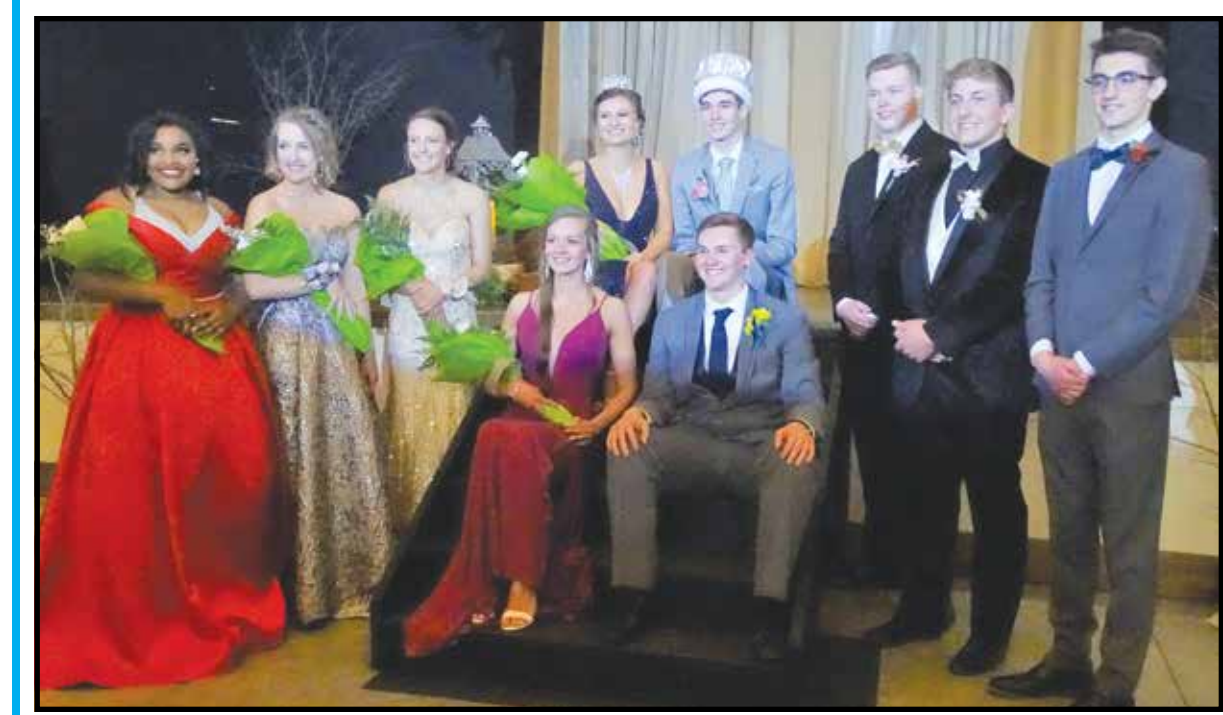

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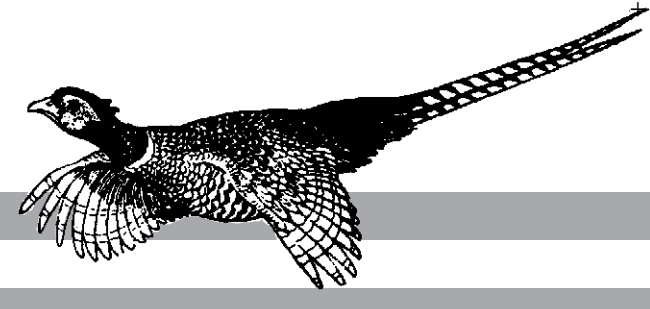

Wayne native inducted into South Dakota Coaches Hall of Fame

Wayne native Dan Mitchell was inducted into the South Dakota Football Coaches Hall of Fame on March 23 at Dykhouse Stadium in Brookings, S. D.

The presentation was made during the South Dakota Football Coaches Association's Annual Clinic.

During Mitchell's tenure as an assistant varsity football coach at Yankton High School in Yankton, S. D., Yankton has won 12 Eastern South Dakota Conference football titles (1985, 1990, 1992, 1994, 1995, 1999, 2001, 2002, 2005, 2006, 2011 and 2014) and six State Class 11AA Championship titles (1994, 1995, 1999, 2002, 2014 and 2015) and has had four State Class 11AA Runner-up finishes (1985, 1989, 1996 and 2005). During Mitchell's tenure as assistant varsity wrestling coach, Yankton won a State Team Championship title as well as a State Team Runner-up title.



Mitchell has received numerous awards during his coaching career including being a finalist for the National High School Athletic Coaches Association's Assistant Coach of the Year honor in both 2014 and 2017. He received the first-ever South Dakota High School Professional of the Year Award from the National Strength and Conditioning Association in 2016. He has also received a number of honors from the South Dakota High School Coaches Association including Assistant Coach of the Year (2014) and Max Hawk Award (2015) as well as 25-year (2010) and 30-year (2015) coaching awards.

In addition, Mitchell was named the South Dakota Football Coaches Association's Assistant Coach of the Year in 1999, 2005 and 2013 and received the organization's Keeper of the Game Award in 2016. He was named the South Dakota Wrestling Coaches Association's Assistant Coach of the Year in 1995 and received the Don Baker Award from Yankton High School in 2006.

Mitchell has also served in his professional organizations as National High School Athletic Coaches Association Region Director, National Strength and Conditioning Association Advisory Board Member, South Dakota High School Coaches Association President, South Dakota Football Coaches Association President as well as Web Designer for both the South Dakota High School Coaches Association and the South Dakota Football Coaches Association.

Mitchell has spent his entire 34-year teaching and coaching career at Yankton High School. He is a 1980 graduate of Wayne High School and 1984 Wayne State College. Mitchell has also been inducted into the Wayne High School Athletic Hall of Fame. He is the son of Gene and Joyce Mitchell of Wayne.

Wildcats sweep Southwest, improve 14-4 in NSIC

Wayne State's home field has become its home away from home after sweeping a three-game series from Southwest Minnesota State in games moved from Marshall, Minn. to the Chapman Complex.

On Saturday, Brendan Madsen hit his first home run of the season and was 2-for-3 with three RBI to lead Wayne State in a 6-2 win in the first game of a scheduled doubleheader.

Wayne State opened the scoring in the third with Madsen delivering an RBI double that scored Jake Lorenzini, followed by a sacrifice fly from Kyle Thompson for a 2-0 lead.

The Wildcats went in front 4-0 in the top of the sixth on a Bryce Bisenius RBI single that scored Thomp-

son, while Andrew Hanson reached on a fielder's choice and scored on a passed ball.

Southwest hit a two-run homer in the bottom of the sixth to cut the Wildcat advantage to 4-2, but Wayne State closed out the scoring in the top of the seventh with a two-run homer from Madsen to finish off the win.

Madsen led Wayne State's seventh hit attack, going 2-for-3 with three RBI and two runs scored. Thompson ended 2-for-3 with a double while Bisenius, Hanson and Lorenzini each singled, with Lorenzini scoring twice. Aidan Breedlove improved to 6-2 on the year with 5 2/3 innings of work, allowing

just two runs on four hits with five strikeouts and two walks. Andrew Staebell and Lawson Zenner both worked in relief.

The second game of the doubleheader was suspended with two outs in the bottom of the ninth due to lightning and rain, but finished Sunday with Wayne State posting a 10-2 win. They finished the sweep with a 12-2 win Sunday afternoon.

Wayne State had four players hit home runs in the suspended game, and Hunter Wienhoff had a shut-out heading into the ninth inning before two Wildcat errors and two walks allowed SMSU to avoid the shutout.

Jake Lorenzini finished 3-for-

4 with a homer and three runs scored to pace Wayne state at the plate. Colin Chick went 2-for-4 with a homer and three RBI while Kyle Thompson and Logelin also homered.

In the finale, the Wildcats took a 9-0 lead through 2 1/2 innings and had no problems finishing off the three-game sweep of the Mustangs.

Bisenius got Wayne State off to a quick start with a three-run homer in the first inning. He added an RBI single in the second that scored Brendan Madsen for a 4-0 Wildcat advantage.

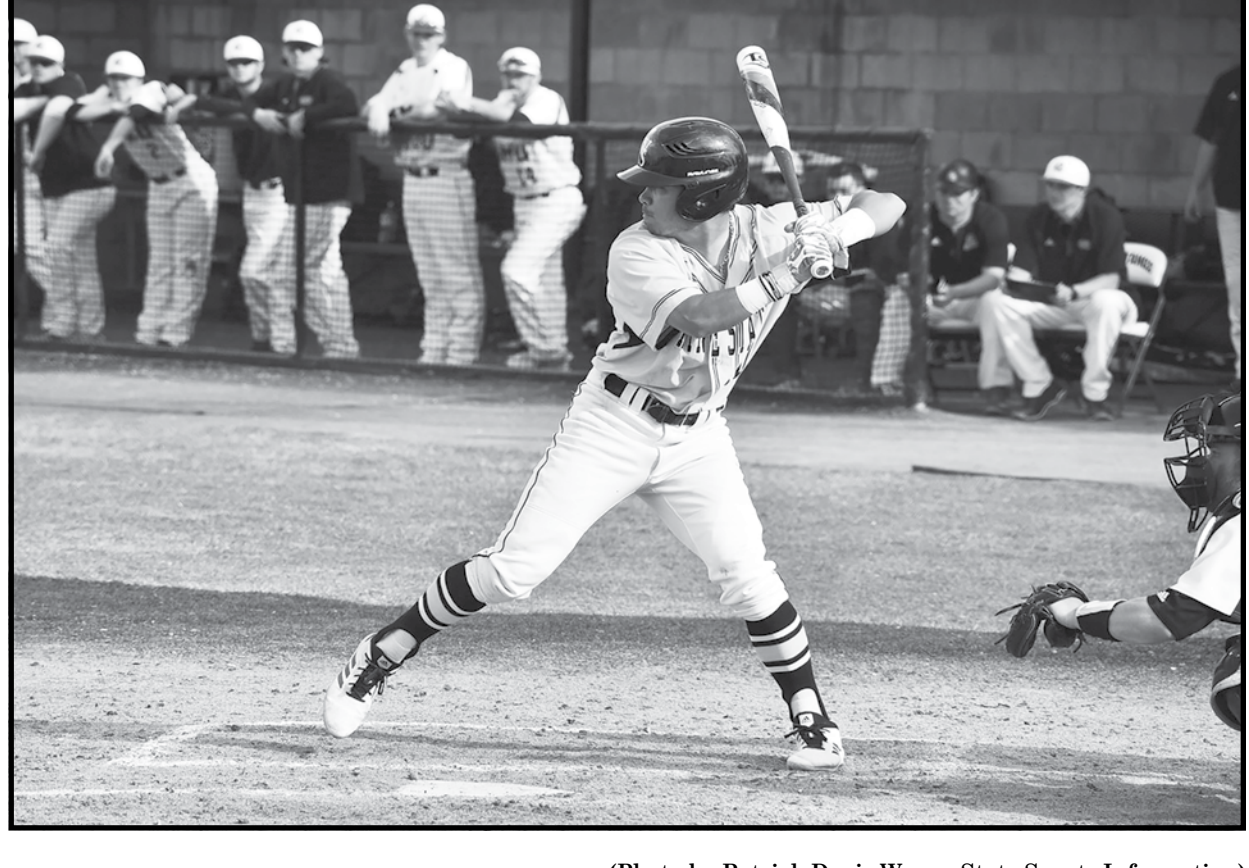
A five-run third inning for the Wildcats made the score 9-0 as Thompson had a two-run double along with an RBI triple from Chick and a run-scoring double by Madsen.

Wayne State's throwers highlighted the weekend's effort for the Wildcats in the Concordia Invitational held over the weekend in Seward.

In women's action, the 1,600-meter relay of Joan Jelimo, Mollie Vasa, Marin Jetensky and Jordyn Pester crossed the line first in a time of 3:59.19 to account for the Wildcats' only win of the day.

McKenzie Scheil posted a top mark of 182 feet, 6 inches to place second overall in the hammer throw. Her throw was an NCAA provisional mark and currently ranks sixth in NCAA Division II. She also posted a sixth-place mark in the shot put at 43-4 1/4.

Tia Jones also reached an NCAA provisional mark in the hammer throw taking seventh

place at 172-0 and is now 19th nationally. She also finished fifth in the shot put at 44-10 3/4.

Riana Noelle placed seventh in the triple jump (35-0 1/4), Cassidy Connell was ninth in the shot put (42-0 3/4), Andrea Torres took 10th in the 1,500-meter run (5:17.49) and Mollie Vasa took 10th in the 400-meter hurdles (1:09.30).

In men's action, Clay Krampfer won the 200-meter dash and placed second in the 100-meter dash while throwers Cade Kalkowski and Dylan Kaup each hit NCAA provisional marks.

Kramper was the winner in the 200-meter dash in 21.90 seconds and placed second in the finals of the 100-meter dash at 10.81 seconds.

Mikhail Sands took third place in the long jump (23-0) with Ben Allen fourth in the shot put (53-0) and Jayle Hinkle fifth at 51-5 3/4.

In the 800-meter dash, Nathan Pearson was fifth in 1:57.57 followed by teammate Bryce Holcomb sixth (1:58.46) and Brock Hegarty 10th (2:00.21). Jack Doughty collected a fifth place finish in the 5,000-meter run (16:30.12) with Aaron English taking fifth in the high jump (6-1 1/2).

The Wildcat 1,600-meter relay team of Jacob Ladage, Bryce Holcomb, Pearson and Davis came in fifth place at 3:26.39.

Wayne State will compete in a pair of meets next weekend, with the Sioux City Relays on Friday and Saturday and the UNK Loper Invite in Kearney on Saturday.

She decided it was time to bring bowling back. Wayne's Special Olympics bowling team was able to draw in 12 members this year: Taylor Brown, John McQuistian, Eric Boeckenhauer, Mitchell Dunn, Kevin Haglund, Jerrad Martin, Brian Mizner, Troy Volwiler, Cody Roberts, Jeremy Bauermeister, Rodney Bauermeister and Rodney

Garwood. While the team was forming last fall, Harris reached out for donors.

"I reached out to my employer (Elkhorn Valley Bank) and asked for their support both financially and giving of my time and they were totally on board," Harris said. "They were the main donors that helped pay for league fees, uniforms, travel expenses and meals."

Through Harris' work finding donors and applying for grants, no athlete paid anything for team participation this year. After finding her potential bowlers and a very supportive donor, Harris reached out to Wayne State College for coaching help.

"I sent a message out on Cat Tracks and within an hour, Midge (Simmons) reached out to me and several students," Harris said.

Harris and Simmons were joined by three WSC students, volunteering as "coaches," not that many of her bowlers needed it, according to Harris.

"They're better than I am," Harris said. "A lot of them knew (what they were doing)."

With coaches lined up and athletes ready to hit the bowling alley,

the Wayne Flame Throwers started bowling every Thursday from the beginning of October to the end of March. In January, the team ventured to Omaha for district bowling where 10 ended up qualifying for the state competition on March 29 and March 31. From the 10 Wayne Flame Throwers who competed, the team was able to bring home seven golds, one silver and two fourth-place blue ribbons. The team was rightfully happy with their success.

"It was absolutely awesome," Harris said. "They were extremely happy to be down there."

Though the bowling season is over, Harris said the Flame Throwers will be back in action next year. Starting in July, those in the Wayne area can be on the look out for fundraisers like the Big Red Raffle.

"We sell raffle tickets and all the proceeds from the raffle that our team sells, goes to our team," Harris said.

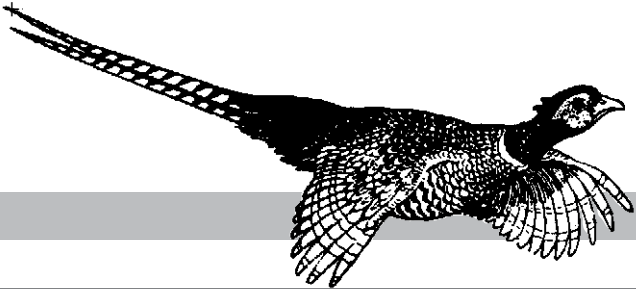

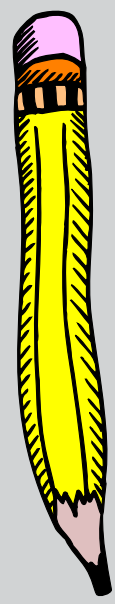

New budget tool makes sense, deserves support

The Legislature's Planning Committee is promoting a budget tool that makes a lot of sense. As outlined in LB713, the Legislature's fiscal office would be required to create a revenue volatility report and a budget stress test as well as a long-term budget for major programs every four years.

Here's the problem. Budgets are limited by the two years of the term that constitutes a legislative session. That means agencies and other entities which depend on state general funds have to ask the Legislature for the money every two years because the funds can't be obligated beyond those two years.

When I was the head of a state-wide non-profit that relied on state matching funds, we had to make our case every two years. Casting a long-range vision beyond that was hampered by not knowing if sustainable funding was possible. Based on that personal experience alone, I am convinced that this proposal to require the Legislature to analyze long-term fiscal sustainability is a good step.

There's nothing wrong with having to make the case. In fact, it can help to hone the focus of agencies and groups. But it makes long-range planning very difficult.

The bill met no opposition during a public hearing by the Executive Board of the Legislative Council and has no added expense to require the Legislative Fiscal Analyst to create additional revenue and budget reports throughout the biennium. These reports include: a revenue volatility report in even-numbered years, a budget stress test in odd-numbered years, and a long-term budget for major programs every four years.

Omaha Sen. Tony Vargas, chairperson of the Planning Committee, said the bill is the result of that committee's work. Research shows that states that engage in long-term budget planning are better able to address economic volatility, he said. "Now that we have the information and data, the next step for us is to

Green Team turns 10, still focused on the issues

In honor of the Wayne Green Team's 10th anniversary and their work to educate the community and promote zero waste through their recycling programs, I would like to invite the community to step up and take it to the next level.

Many of you may be aware that one of the largest importers of plastic recycling, China, has decided to quit taking plastic waste. Speaking to recyclers around the country, this is going to pose a huge problem in the already overburdened recycling stream.

Troubling statistics abound but a few of the most troubling to me are:

1. On average, Americans use about 50 billion water bottles every year and only 23 percent of those are recycled. Just in the United States, 1.5 million barrels of oil are used annually in the production of plastic bottles. If that oil was not used to make these bottles, it could be used to fuel 100,000 cars for a whole year.

2. It has been estimated that on average a school-age child, using a disposable lunch daily, generates 67 pounds of waste per school year. That equates to 18,760 pounds of lunch waste for just one average size elementary school. Just by changing what and how you pack your lunch, can drastically reduce waste.

3. 91 percent of plastic waste isn't recycled. And since most plastics don't biodegrade in any meaningful sense, all that plastic waste could exist for hundreds or even thousands of years.

4. If plastic production isn't curbed, plastic pollution will outweigh fish pound for pound in our oceans by 2050 and the Great Pacific Garbage Patch as seen from space is now three times the size of France.

Next steps are important and many municipalities, states, and even countries are stepping up to ban the use of single use plastics. As a community who understands the importance of caring for God's Creation and all creatures living on it, I hope we are up for the next stage of saying "Not for me, please! I choose to act green."

Think about ways you can change your habits at home, write to retailers to encourage

them to consider changing their practices and use of single use plastic bags, ask your favorite restaurants to consider compostable take out containers or encourage individuals to bring their own containers, thank businesses and give them shout outs when they use something besides single use plastic, ask your grocers to look for products that have less plastic packaging and don't forget to thank them when they do. Write to your congress persons and encourage them to consider legislation that supports these initiatives at municipal, state, and national levels.

What ways can you reduce your use of plastic (particularly single use plastic)? Could you even eliminate it from your everyday life?

Legislative Update

Rural broadband, land valuation debated in Unicameral

The Nebraska Department of Transportation announced a new website dedicated to the 2019 flood on April 4. Nebraskans will be able to view updates on the progress on repairs to State highways and bridges as connectivity is restored by going online at: <https://dot.nebraska.gov/news-media/nebraska-flood-2019/>.

Governor Ricketts signed LB

399, introduced by Senator Slama (LD1), into law last week. LB 399 passed the Legislature on a 44-2-1 vote and updates Nebraska's law on American civics in public schools. The Governor also signed LB 302, introduced by Senator Hughes (LD44), which merges the Department of Environmental Quality and the Nebraska Energy Office into a single agency.

Starting July 1, 2019, the new Department of Environment and Energy will be under the direction of current Department of Environmental Quality director Jim Macy.

On April 2, we began full-day debate at the Legislature and advanced multiple priority bills from General File. This week we advanced LB 268 (Friesen, LD34) which would expand broadband access by making it easier for customers to switch telecommunications companies. Under LB 268, customers would only be required to show that he or she is not receiving high-speed broadband service at the time of application to be eligible switch service providers. In passing LB 268 we hope to encourage larger telecommunications companies to invest in new rural broadband service or maintain current infrastructure. Increasing access to rural broadband is extremely important as we grow the communities in our state. I supported LB 268 and the bill advanced to Select File on a 37-0 vote.

We also debated LB 483

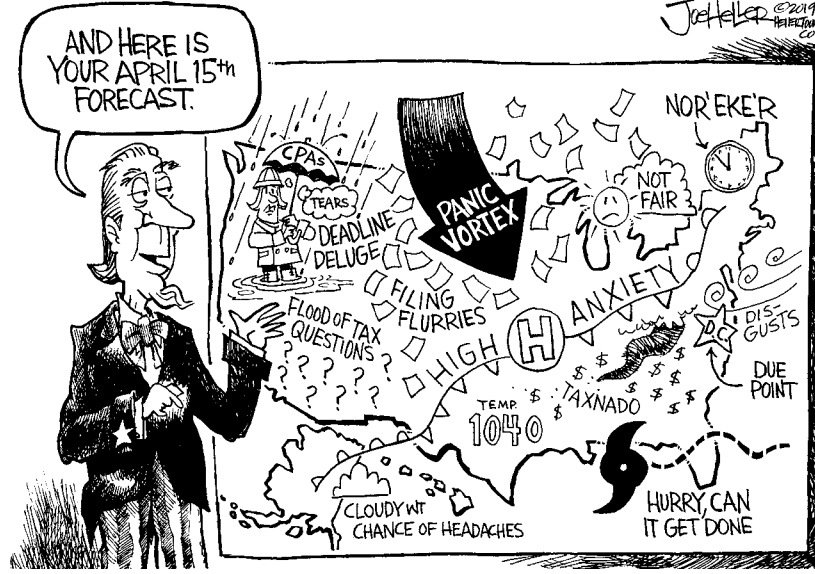

Board would create an agricultural land valuation manual that county assessors would determine capitalized net earning capacity. Agricultural productivity value would be determined by: dividing agricultural and horticultural land into major use categories described in the bill and then dividing those categories into subclasses based on soil productivity classifications; computing a net revenue based on an eight-year Olympic average of annual net incomes, in which the highest and lowest one-year values are discarded; and dividing the net revenue by a discount rate determined by each county's eight-year Olympic average of annual precipitation. LB 483 stalled on General File but may come back for a second round of debate.

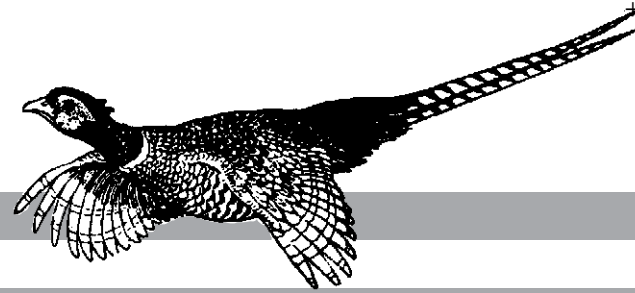

The group will be in Dominican Republic from June 24 through July 6 and Burhoop is excited for the opportunity to be a team leader.

"I'm looking forward to learning how to be a leader," Burhoop said. "It's very important for me to see growth not just for myself, but for the rest of the team members and to make sure we get something out of this trip that's positive and that can translate back into our lives stateside."

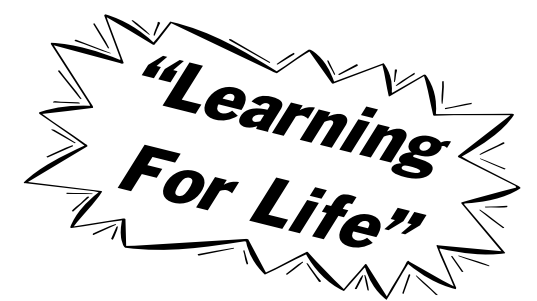

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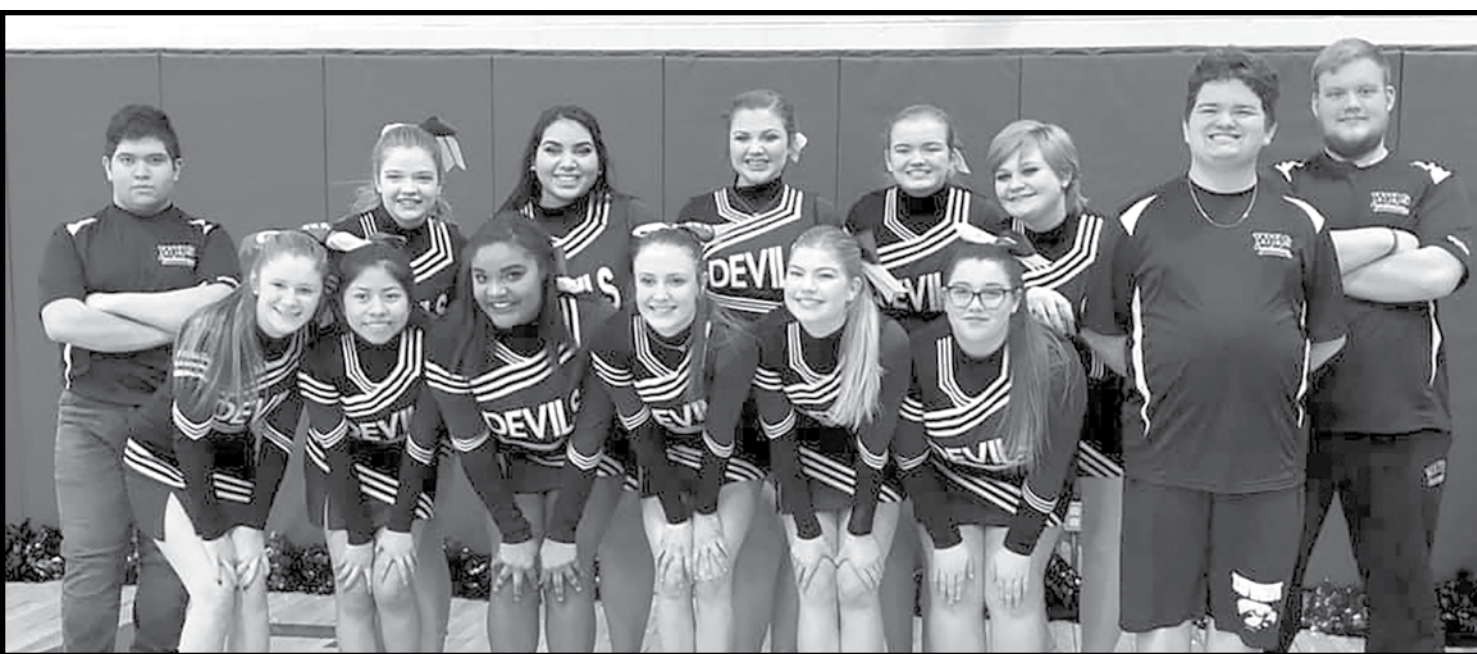
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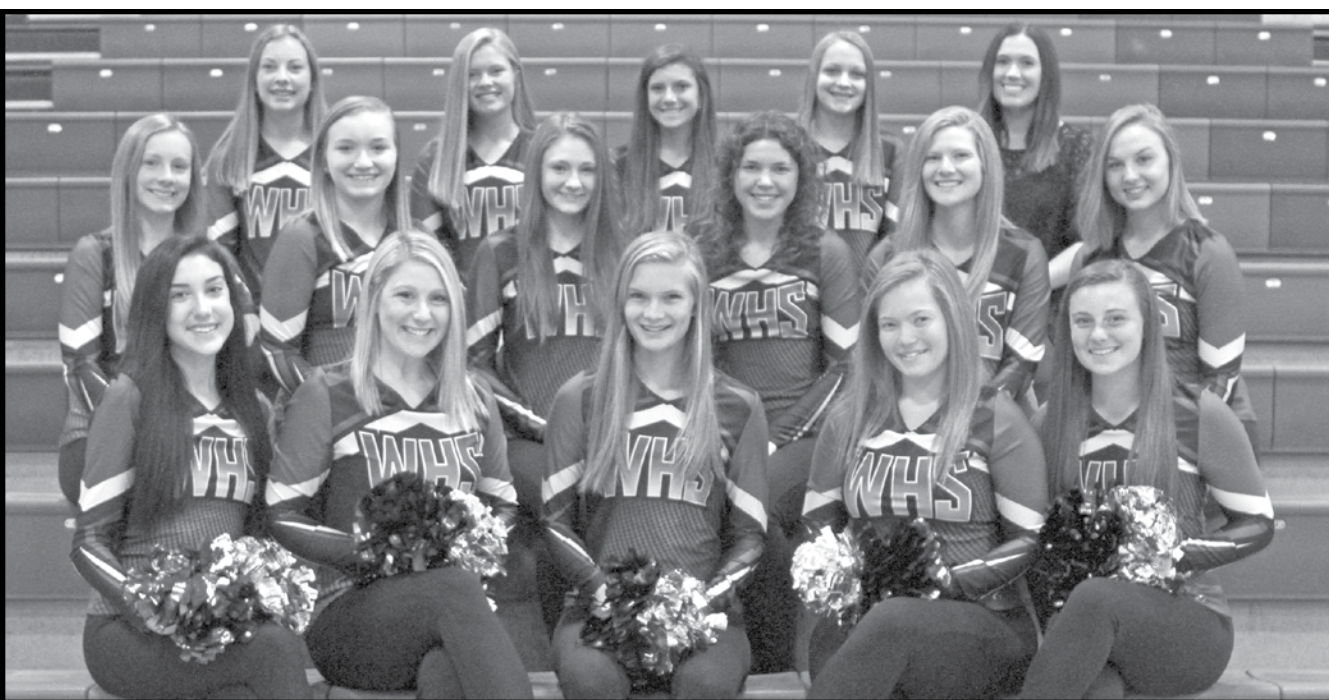
