Providence Community Pharmacy to open April 15

Providence Medical Center announced Monday that Providence Community Pharmacy is opening on April 15.

"It's the day we've been waiting for," Kim Lueders, director of pharmacy at Providence Medical Center said. "Although the date is a little later than originally planned, the process could not have gone any smoother."

One of the first steps to making the retail pharmacy a reality was to acquire a pharmacy license from the State of Nebraska. Once this was accomplished, application for National Provider Numbers and a DEA license, allowing for sale of controlled substances, were possible.

"Some licenses can take up to six weeks for approval so we'd just hope for the best each time we sent in an application," Becky Barner, retail pharmacy coordinator said.

Once those steps were completed, the last thing to do was work through the contracting process with insurance companies. The pharmacy team has successfully secured contracts with most of the insurance companies. The few left to finalize won't be the pharmacy's ability to process claims for particular insurance companies.

Vakoc Builder's Resource, the PMC IT department and the PMC maintenance team have worked alongside the pharmacy staff to meet the aggressive time line, and were successful in getting the retail pharmacy building ready for the April 15

Mark Evetovich will serve as the Wayne Community Schools' Assistant Elementary Principal and District Assessment Coordinator following action taken at Monday's

Evetovich will replace Tucker Hight, who was recently hired as the high school principal for the district. He is currently employed with the Walthill Schools and has previously served on the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education.

Elementary Principal Russ Plager presented information to the board on the Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) program being implemented at the elementary school.

Plager told the board the program is designed to include a tiered support system so "students don't slip through the cracks." It is based on three areas - literacy, behavior

In new business, board members approved a contract with Trane for spring and fall maintenance of the district's heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) units. The two-year agreement is for \$16,000 per year.

Also approved was an agreement with KSB School Law for legal representation. The agreement allows the school to contact the law firm if the need arises, and allows the district access to services provided by

First reading approval was given to the After School Program Handbook.

Elementary Principal Plager told the board the Wayne program is being modeled after a similar program in Albion and the information in the handbook is based on the information included in the elementary

He told the board he would like to move forward on hiring the staff for the program and begin to take applications for the 2019-2020 school year.

An agenda item regarding the purchase of Chromebooks for the 2019-2020 school year was approved.

Total cost for the Chromebooks, which will be used by eighth and ninth grade students is \$48,194.85.

Dates for graduation, as well as the list of graduates, was approved.

A bid of \$81,665 was awarded to Otte Construction for installation of ceiling tile and LED Lighting for classrooms in the upper level of the high school and the west hallway near the gym.

Assistant Special Education Director Tucker Hight told the board the annual Spring Sprints event has been scheduled for Friday, May 3. The event has grown considerably in recent years and Hight encouraged all to attend.

Wayne Kids Club to offer students structured, supportive environment in new after school program

Parents of Wayne Elementary students should have received information packets from their students about a new, school-led after school program that will be offered at the beginning of the 2019-2020 year. Starting next year, Wayne Kids Club will offer students an opportunity to work on homework and enjoy some extracurricular learn-

The Aspiring Young Authors Festival bingo, poetry, and other hands on projects after school program for some time. Sensing to encourage students to continue writing a need from the students led to the creation of Wayne Kids Club, according to site director and third grade teacher Carrie Wendte.

"We've recognized a need for students who need assistance completing homework and that support, and there are also students who don't have a structured environment after school so it provides an opportunity for a structured, supportive environment during that after school time,"

Wayne Kids Club will help fulfil a need for structured after school time, but it also provides a safe environment to get some physical activity at the end of the day, enjoy a snack and take part in extended learning

Those extended learning opportunities may consist of several-week long projects that are meant to boost problem solving and academic thinking outside the class-

"Those might be STEAM-based projects." Wayne Elementary faculty and adminis- STEAM is Science, Technology, Engineertration have been working on creating an ing, Art and Math," Wendte said. "We envision projects that might be a few weeks long (per project). We've got ideas of possibly doing life skills-type projects like cooking."

With classroom time and resources at a premium, Wendte said extended learning opportunities may also allow kids to learn skills they may miss during the year.







During Mitchell's tenure as an assistant varsity football coach at Yankton High School in Yankton, S. D., Yankton has won 12 Eastern South Dakota Conference football titles (1985, 1990, 1992, 1994, 1995, 1999, 2001, 2002, 2005, 2006, 2011 and 2014) and six State Class 11AA Championship titles (1994, 1995, 1999, 2002, 2014 and 2015) and has had four State Class 11AA Runnerup finishes (1985, 1989, 1996 and 2005). During Mitchell's tenure as assistant varsity wrestling coach, Yankton won a State Team Championship title as well as a State



Mitchell has received numerous awards during his coaching career including being a finalist for the National High School Athletic Coaches Association's Assistant Coach of the Year honor in both 2014 and 2017. He received the first-ever South Dakota High School Professional of the Year Award from the National Strength and Conditioning Association in 2016. He has also received a number of honors from the South Dakota High School Coaches Association including Assistant Coach of the Year (2014) and Max Hawk Award (2015) as well as 25-year (2010) and 30-year (2015) coaching

In addition, Mitchell was named the South Dakota Football Coaches Association's Assistant Coach of the Year in 1999, 2005 and 2013 and received the organization's Keeper of the Game Award in 2016. 



Green Team turns 10, still focused on the issues

In honor of the Wayne Green Team's 10th anniversary and their work to educate the community and promote zero waste through their recycling programs, I would like to invite the community to step up and take it to the next level.

Many of you may be aware that one of the largest importers of plastic recycling, China, has decided to quit taking plastic waste. Speaking to recyclers around the country, this is going to pose a huge problem in the already overburdened recycling

Troubling statistics abound but a few of the most troubling

1. On average, Americans use about 50 billion water bottles every year and only 23 percent of those are recycled. Just in the United States, 1.5 million barrels of oil are used annually in the production of plastic bottles. If that oil was not used to make these bottles, it could be used to fuel 100,000 cars for a whole

2. It has been estimated that on average a school-age child, using a disposable lunch daily. generates 67 pounds of waste per school year. That equates to 18,760 pounds of lunch waste for just one average size elementary school. Just by changing what and how you pack your lunch, can drastically reduce waste.

3. 91 percent of plastic waste isn't recycled. And since most plastics don't biodegrade in any meaningful sense, all that plastic waste could exist for hundreds or even thousands of years.

4. If plastic production isn't curbed, plastic pollution will outweigh fish pound for pound in our oceans by 2050 and the Great Pacific Garbage Patch as seen from space is now three

times the size of France. (https://www.earthday. org/2018/03/07/fact-sheet-endplastic-pollution/)

Next steps are important and many municipalities, states, and even countries are stepping up to ban the use of single use plastics. As a community who understands the importance of caring for God's Creation and all creatures living on it, I hope we are up for the next stage of saying "Not for me, please! I choose to act green."

New budget tool makes sense, deserves support

The Legislature's Planning Committee is promoting a budget tool that makes a lot of sense. As outlined in LB713, the Legislature's fiscal office would be required to create a revenue volatility report and a budget stress test as well as a long-term budget for major programs every four years.

Here's the problem. Budgets are limited by the two years of the term that constitutes a legislative session. That means agencies and other entities which depend on state general funds have to ask the Legislature for the money every two years because the funds can't be obligated beyond those two years.

When I was the head of a statewide non-profit that relied on state matching funds, we had to make our case every two years. Casting a long-range vision beyond that was hampered by not knowing if sustainable funding was possible. Based on that personal experience alone. I am convinced that this proposal to require the Legislature to analyze long-term fiscal sustainability is a good step.

There's nothing wrong with having to make the case. In fact, it can help to hone the focus of agencies and groups. But it makes longrange planning very difficult.

The bill met no opposition during a public hearing by the Executive Board of the Legislative Council and has no added expense to require the Legislative Fiscal Analyst to create additional revenue and budget reports throughout the biennium. These reports include: a revenue volatility report in even-numbered years, a budget stress test in oddnumbered years, and a long-term budget for major programs every

Omaha Sen. Tony Vargas, chairperson of the Planning Committee, said the bill is the result of that committee's work. Research shows that states that engage in long-term budget planning are better able to address economic volatility, he said. "Now that we have the information

implement some of that planning," Vargas said. "In order to meet the needs of future Nebraskans, we have to start [preparing] now."

Executive Board Chairman Sen. Mike Hilgers of Lincoln supported the bill, saying it would provide important tools for lawmakers going forward. "Particularly in light of term limits and the turnover that we've had in this body, I think it's important for us to be thinking about ways that we can take the long-term [view] and structurally set up the [Legislature] for success," he said.

Such an examination of tax trends would also help senators better grasp the need for changes regarding the various tax streams, she said.

The bill also charges the Legislative Fiscal Analyst with preparing a long-term budget. Policymakers often pass budgetary changes in one year, which do not take effect until later years. This can obscure the true impact of legislation and contribute to structural deficits, Fry said. A long-term budgeting process can help clarify the future impact of proposed leg-



Rural broadband, land valuation debated in Unicameral

The Nebraska Department of Transportation announced a new website dedicated to the 2019 flood on April 4. Governor Ricketts signed LB

399, introduced by Senator Slama (LD1), into law last week. LB 399 passed the Legislature on a 44-2-1 vote and updates Nebraska's law on American civics in public schools. The Governor also signed LB 302, introduced by Senator Hughes (LD44), which merges the Department of Environmental Quality and the Nebraska Energy Office into a single agency.



Starting July 1, 2019, the new Department of Environment and Energy will be under the direction of current Department of Environmental Quality director

On April 2, we began full-day debate at the Legislature and advanced multiple priority bills from General File. This week we advanced LB 268 (Friesen, LD34) which would expand broadband access by making it easier for customers to switch telecommunications companies. Under LB 268, customers would only be required to show that he or she is not receiving high-speed broadband service at the time of application to be eligible switch service providers. In passing LB 268 we hope to encourage larger telecommunications companies to invest in new rural broadband service or maintain current infrastructure. Increasing access to rural broadband is extremely important as we grow the communities in our state. I supported LB 268 and the bill advanced to Select File on a 37-0

(Erdman, LD47) which would change farmland value for property tax purposes based on the income it can produce. Beginning in the 2020 tax year, the newly created Agricultural Land Valuation

Board would create an agricultural land valuation manual that county assessors would determine capitalized net earning capacity. Agricultural productivity value would be determined by: dividing agricultural and horticultural land into major use categories described in the bill and then dividing those categories into subclasses based on soil productivity classifications; computing a net revenue based on an eight-year Olympic average of annual net incomes, in which the highest and lowest one-year values are discarded; and dividing the net revenue by a discount rate determined by each county's eight-year Olympic average of annual precipi tation. LB 483 stalled on General File but may come back for a sec-

It shall be the duty of each owner, owner's agent, and occupant of any lot, tract or parcel of land in the city to cut and remove from such lot, tract, or parcel of land, together with half of the abutting streets or alleys, excessive growth of weeds, grasses or worthless vegetation. Such growth shall be cut as close to the ground level as possible and shall be maintained as close to the ground level as possible throughout the period of May 1 to October 15 of each year. Growing or permitting the growing of weeds, grasses, or vegetation in violation of this subsection is a nuisance and is prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any owner, owner's agent or occupant of any premises described in subsection (a) of this section to allow to grow or to maintain any weeds, grasses, or worthless vegetation 12 inches in height or greater.

The City Administrator or his or her designee shall cause to be published in a legal newspaper of general circulation throughout the city for one time at least ten days before May 1, and on any other date designated by resolution of the council, a general notice to owners, owner's agents, or occupants of real estate within the city to cut and remove excessive weeds, grasses and worthless vegetation 12 inches in height or greater from such premises. The notice shall specify that the weeds and other rank growth of vegetation shall be cut as close to the ground level as possible throughout the period of May 1 to October 15.

The City Administrator or his or her designee is authorized and empowered to notify, in writing, the owner, or owner's agent, and occupant of any such lot, place or area within the city to cut, destroy and remove any such weeds, grasses or worthless vegetation 12 inches in height or greater located on such property.

Within five days after receipt of such notice, the owner or occupant of the lot or piece of ground may request a hearing with the City to appeal the decision to abate or remove a nuisance by filing a written appeal with the office of the City Clerk. A hearing on the appeal shall be held within 14 days after the filing of the appeal and shall be conducted by the City Administrator. The City Administrator shall render a decision on the appeal within five business days after the conclusion of the hearing. If the appeal fails, the City may have such work done.

If the owner or occupant of the lot or piece of ground does not request a hearing with the City, or upon the failure of any such owner, owner's agent, or occupant so notified to cut, destroy and remove such weeds, grasses or worthless vegetation 12 inches in height or greater within five days after receipt of notice provided for in subsection (d) of this section, the City may have such work done. The costs and expenses of any such work shall be paid by the owner.







NORFOLK, NE - When the blade ing set and start from scratch." on a small fan breaks, it usually can be repaired, replaced or disposed of. But what happens if the blade happens to be nearly 30 feet in length? That's when you call in the experts and allow students learning to be future industry professionals work side-by-side with them.

A team from RENEW Energy Maintenance, of Sioux Falls, SD, was on the Northeast campus recently to change out the three blades on the College's Micon 108 wind turbine. Originally, one of the blades had some damage on the "root" end that bolts onto the turbine. However, John Liewer, wind en-

ergy technology instructor, said the turbine's blades were replaced because all three need to be balanced. He said it is crucial that each blade's weight is distributed evenly at the "root as well as at the tip."

"We did not have the data on the other blades, so we would have had to take all three down, measure the weight of the other two, adjust the replacement to match, and then replace them. We determined it would be more cost effective to get a match-

Although it stands 80-feet to the hub, the Micon 108 is approximately 170-feet shorter than a standard commercial wind turbine. However, the same risks exist when it comes to maintenance.

"There are still moving parts. There are still fall hazards and drops hazards," said Josh Ackerman, specialty service manager for RENEW Energy Maintenance. "So that's always a challenge no matter what we do, but it's still a little different. It was actually a breath of fresh air to see something a little smaller, because it was like, 'Oh, we don't have to climb all that 250-300 feet.' But the general idea is that it's same as any other tower."

The work took the use of a 45ton boom truck from Pro Crane in Norfolk, which allowed the crew to pull the blade straight up and then down to the ground. The work of changing blades on a larger turbine would require the use of two cranes and each blade would be removed and replaced sideways, according to Ackerman.

Now that the flood waters have receded and the things that needed to be addressed immediately have been taken care of, folks are moving on to what I'd call the secondary concerns.

Understandably, one of those deals with farm leases. The following information regarding leases was taken from an article by Allan Vyhnalek, Agricultural Economics Extension Educator with Nebraska

A common question is, "Should leases be adjusted for flood damaged ground?" The short answer is, 'It depends." Each situation is different. This article will help land owners and tenants sort through the factors to reach a rental rate that is fair for both parties.

One of the first questions is, "How bad is the damage and who is going to fix it?" Flood damage can be categorized into two distinct types... one is the 'hard' work and the other is the 'heavy' work. The 'hard' work probably will not be avoided. This usually includes hand labor and light work with equipment to remove branches, corn stalks, debris and sediment deposited in the field or minor erosion in a field.

The 'heavy' work may or may not need to be done at all, each field will be different. This work includes heavy equipment like bulldozers, scrapers or graders to take care of major erosion or sedimentation problems. It might include moving topsoil, removing sandbars, and fixing holes, gullies, and scouring caused by the flooding.

In both cases, the party primarily responsible for completing this work is the landlord. The landlord bears the responsibility to provide the tenant with the land ready to farm. Desiring a positive long-term landlord/tenant relationship and knowing the work needs to be done in a timely fashion, most tenants will probably provide most if not all, of the 'hard' work described above. When that happens, is it appropriate for the landlord to acknowledge and compensate the tenant for that effort? Most would say yes.

between the landlord and tenant, if received by each party varies based on production. An adjustment in the share received or a payment from the landlord outside the lease might be appropriate if the tenant provided some or all of the hard or heavy work to make the land farmable.

Crop insurance policies contain preventative plant provisions which could lead to an insurance payment, even though nothing was planted. This will only apply to those with an insurance policy and payment size, if any, depends on the rules contained in the preventative plant provisions. We encourage those with crop insurance policies to contact their agent about preventative planting rules.

For cash rents leases, is it appropriate for the landlord to receive a full cash rent payment in 2019 if the land was damaged by flooding? Due to the language in the lease contract, full payment will likely be expected. However, is that equitable to both parties? Good landlord and tenant communications will be key to arrive at an equitable payment for 2019.

Begin that conversation now indoes not specifically address weather-related events prior to planting, the amount paid might vary.

Under contractual law, if an event renders the property unusable for the entire growing season, the tenant may have a case for vacating the premise and not making any lease payments for 2019. However, seeking release from a property under these terms may have a devastating effect on the relationship between the tenant and the

landlord in the future. One suggestion for adjusting cash rents in 2019 is to look at some way to adjust cash rent based on actual productivity. Another possibility is to use some measure of total revenue on a per acre basis. Setting up some type of flexible cash rent that takes into account the date of planting, damage to topsoil, sand deposits, and other aspects that might afment every day. One factor that will enter in this the production varies, the amount discussion is "Do you have crop insurance?" With cash rental leases, the tenant is the holder of the crop insurance policy. If the ground is not farmable and the tenant is not making a cash rent payment in 2019, the tenant may consider personally assisting the landlord with the 'hard' and/or 'heavy' work.

The tenant may also consider contributing a portion of the preventative planting payments to help pay for repairing the flood damaged farmland and/or to cover the landlord's taxes on the land. For crop share leases, both the landlord and tenant could both have crop insurance, which will likely include a prevented planting coverage.

For either type of rental arrangement, have good communications with your insurance agent. In addition, good communications between the landlord and tenant on issues like this will go a long way towards an amicable resolution to the extreme conditions in 2019. Also be sure to visit with the Farm Service Agency to understand any implications on changes to a crop lease agreement.

If you modify your 2019 rental agreement, get it in writing. Stress may be high, you will want to make sure both parties are fully aware of what they are agreeing to. In summary, 2019 may be the year that both parties need to share the pain of the March flooding. Good communications between landlord and tenant is the best practice so both parties are satisfied with the results of



What Now? Flooding & Fertility

For many of you, these last few weeks have been surreal. The devastation and loss that I have seen farm and non-farm families hit within my own county is almost unimaginable. And while those losses are the most devastating, they certainly aren't the only ones that we feel. As agriculture, we all know that the heart of every farm and ranch is the families and the people that are there. They are there to enrich, manage, and nourish our land. And after the human and humanitarian aspect of this flooding is taken care of, we need to shift our focus back to the land.



some aspects and angles that I want to challenge you all to think about when it comes to management. Not only after the flood but after the specific challenges of the winter of 2018/2019. And today, I want to head right into the heart of a popular question

ACS Manager that I'm being asked, "what has happened to the fertilizer that I applied since last fall?"

Truthfully, this question has elicited a lot of conversation between myself and a couple of close friends that I have in the world of agriculture. And after two weeks to ruminate on it, my honest answer is that I have no idea for certain, but I do have some ideas supported by facts and observations that pertain to certain situations. Before I go any further, I want to get something out there very clearly; what we do year in and year out for fertility is part of a system, and you don't throw the baby out with the bathwater because the system breaks down once every twenty times. Our practices of pre-spring application of P-K and other products do not necessarily need to go away because of this event. But at the same time, we have to study the failure (whether perceived or actual) and learn our lessons from it as well.

As far as things I feel good about saying right now is that no-till did its job. As I look across the Northern half of Nebraska, I am amazed at how much ground does not show erosion. And even the ground that is adjacent to small creeks and streams that were raging rivers for a day or two last week showed a ton of resilience. Is the residue gone? Sure it is, but the root balls and crowns are still there holding soil and showing that the erosion was pretty minimal there. And I am going to deduce that if the soil erosion is minimal, the nutrient loss there is minimal as well. The reason why is that if the granular is gone, it should be attached to the soil. And if most of the soil is there, so are most of

For those soils that sit underwater, there are more questions, but history tells us that patience is the better part of virtue. We may see short term swings in fertility, but the long-term trend will hold true.

And so for today, my message may not be definitive, but it is clear. We may need fertilizer yearly for yield, but we soil sample and manage our soil fertility for insurance. The reason we build our Phosphate test into the 20 ppm range is so we can have some leeway when the weather throws us a curveball that is good or bad. You don't have that same leeway when your soil test is 5 ppm Bray1, and we have the application for the year behind us. So for those of you that have good soil tests, the last thing I would do is blindly throw on a little more fertilizer. For those of you that don't have a soil testing program, or don't have your soil test built up, the last thing I would do is go blindly apply some more fertilizer at this point.

Whatever your situation is, I think the best idea instead is to invest in a plan to monitor these affected acres this season. That might mean having a couple of fields with a weekly crop scout and tissue testing plan in place. Or it could mean investing a few dollars per acre into a remote imagery platform that gives several images per year. This imagery is more than just satellite and NDVI, but very easy to understand where and when to monitor and take action. And finally, I would enroll some acres into a Nitrogen Modelling Tool such as Adapt N to have some additional feelers and reassurance out there as our spring progresses
