Council approves street project bid, street closings for Chicken Show

A single bid for the 2019 Nebraska Street Improvement Project was received and accepted at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Jon Mooberry with JEO Consulting was at the meeting and informed the mayor and council that while the bid was over his estimate for the project, due to this spring's flooding and the need to repair many roads throughout the state, "taking everything into consideration, I don't see a chance for a significantly lower bid if you reject the bid and re-bid it in the fall."

Jan Merrill with the Northeast Nebraska Economic Development Office told the council that the city has received a \$430,000 grant for the street portion of the project and if the project were delayed for a year, the city would have to ask for an extension on the grant. She also noted that all contractors are busy and didn't feel lower bids would be received if the city waited.

B.J. Woehler, representing Robert Woehler Construction, the lone bidder for the project, told the council he had "worked hard to get the bid numbers."

Carl Jenness

Carl Jenness, 61, of Lincoln, formerly of Wayne, died Thursday, April 11, 2019 at a Lincoln hospital. Services were held Tuesday, April 16 at St. Mary's Catholic Church

in Wayne. Burial was in Greenwood Cemetery in Wayne.

Memorials may be directed to the Jenness family for later designation. Arrangements were with Hase-

mann Funeral Home of Wayne. Carl Jenness was born in Wayne on April 28, 1957. Carl spent his early childhood in Ida Grove, Iowa, and returned to Wayne at age six. He was active in Boy Scouts as an Eagle Scout, in neighborhood games and shenanigans, and in manning the fryers at the Fat Kat (his fam-

ily's restaurant). He graduated from Wayne High in 1975 and from Mount Marty College in 1980, with a degree in Business. After graduation, Carl became an insurance adjuster in Yankton, S.D., and later operated his own independent adjuster business, BWA Claims, in Bloomfield, serving north central Nebraska and

working several US natural disasters until 2001. In 1986, Carl married Georgia Gayle Schmeckpeper and was overjoyed to adopt her children, Brandon, Wade, and Ann. Carl and Georgia divorced in 1996. As an active dad and business owner, Carl served his community of Bloomfield as a Boy Scout leader, president of the Board of Directors of St. Andrew's Catholic Church, and organizer of a popular fundraising project for the Knights of Columbus. Beginning with two Transient Ischemic Attacks (TIAs) or mini-strokes

in 2001 and 2002, Carl's underlying condition, a viral cardiomyopathy, was discovered. Carl's very active life filled with bowling, softball, Husker football, life at Lewis & Clark Lake, fishing in Canada, traveling with family and friends, camping, and so many other adventures began to slowly diminish as his heart failure progressed, and his ability to climb ladders and assess roof damage disappeared.

In July 2010, the annual Chicken Show festival in Wayne caused Carl to cross paths with high school friend, Brenda Gaunt, and their love grew until this day. After surviving a cardiac arrest at a golf outing with Brenda in 2012, Carl received his third and more powerful pacemaker with an internal defibrillator. Stable only for a few more years, Carl underwent surgery in 2016 to implant a mechanical pump - a Left Ventricular Assist Device (LVAD) - to help his heart and keep him alive while awaiting a donor heart transplant. Sadly, suddenly, and unexpectedly last Thursday, Carl suffered a massive brain bleed and stroke, causing damage beyond repair. In death, Carl's last generous act was to donate his corneas, tissue, and long bones to benefit others.

Survivors include Brenda Gaunt of Lincoln; his parents, Miron and Louise Jenness of Wayne; his children, Brandon (Lidia) Jenness of San Diego, Calif., Wade (Lyndsy) Jenness of Bloomfield and Ann Jenness of Arlington; grandchildren, Lillian, Josiah, Brayden, Lauren, Sienna, and Jaysen; brother, Vince (Cindy) Jenness of Waterloo, Iowa; sister, Ann (Bryan) Ruwe of Wayne; and, Brenda's family, Natalie and Greg of Denver, Colo.; and, Drew and Jessi, with Magnolia, Heidi, Eloise, and Serra



mones, that surge through the body, increasing your heartbeat and the circulation of blood, mobilizing fat and sugar for fast energy, focusing attention, preparing muscles for action, and more.

It takes some time for the body to calm down after the stress response has been triggered. Very brief periods of this response are important and helpful and known as "good" stress; however, prolonged or repeated arousal of the stress response, a characteristic of modern life, can have harmful physical and psychological effects, including heart disease and depression.

How do we perceive stress?

The human brain and body have a highly sophisticated system of communication. When an event that is often perceived as stressful occurs, it sets off an automatic response system, known as the fight, flight, or freeze response, to prepare for survival. Unfortunately, this system responds in the same manner whether the event is external (e.g., the sudden appearance of a barking, growling dog), or internal (e.g., not enough money to pay the bills this month). Our past experiences strengthen these communication pathways, inadvertently causing us to continue to perceive stress (also referred to as "perceived threat"), where none exists.

Over the last few decades, studies have demonstrated the value of regularly engaging in activities that calm the stress response.

or — it triggers the perception of stress, researcha cascade of horers are now looking into what may be a most basic, and effective, way to defuse stress - simply changing your perception of certain types of situations so they are not seen as stressful in the first place. A key to mitigating the effects of

stress in your life is to first identify the events, both internal and external, that you perceive as stressful. Second, use strategies that will help you (both in body and brain) relax in these moments. Examples of such strategies include positive self-talk; calming, deep breaths; and focused muscle relaxation. Once you understand what

stress is and how it affects you personally, you can work on cultivating resiliency within yourself and family. Again, the key is to look for something positive so your perception of the situation is not as stressful as you initially thought. When difficult times arise, be

sure to use the strategies referenced in this article. Strong families starts with you. Be a role model for your family and others by taking care of yourself.


What the heck is a bomb cyclone?

This term has been used a lot lately, but if you're like me, you didn't have a clue exactly what it meant... other than it wasn't good. I thought it was a term meteorologists (remember when they used to be weather men or weather women?) made up to make their reporting on a storm sound more dramatic than the next meteorologist... kind of like the names they use to describe their "Super Duper, Almighty, My-Doppler-Is-Bigger-Than-Your-Doppler" weather ra-

Actually, bomb cyclone is a real term used to describe a real weather event! It occurs when the barometric pressure drops 24 millibars or more in 24 hours or less. (No I'm not going to explain a millibar!) It is caused when a region of warm air and a region of cold air collide, creating a counterclockwise movement (or cyclone) in the air resulting in high wind speeds, often exceeding 80 miles per hour which is comparable to the winds in a category 1 hurricane. They may or may not be accompanied with major precipita-

Bomb cyclones do have more official sounding names, explosive cyclogenesis, meteorological bomb, and bombogenesis are just a few. While bomb cyclones are a relatively rare event in this part of the country, there are other severe weather events that are more com-

A severe thunderstorm watch means that the potential exists for the development of thunderstorms which may produce large hail or damaging winds. When a watch is issued, you can go about your normal activities, but keep an eye to the sky and an ear to a weather radio or your local radio and television stations for further updates and possible warnings.

A severe thunderstorm warning, on the other hand, means that a severe thunderstorm is occurring or is imminent, based on doppler radar or weather spotter information. You should move indoors to a place of safety. The term severe refers to hail that is quarter size, 1.0 inch in diameter, or larger and/or wind gusts of 58 mph or more. If golf ball size hail, about 1.6 inches in diameter, or larger is falling, it indicates that a storm is very well organized and likely has a rotating updraft. Any storm producing hail this large should be closely monitored for the



> A tornado watch, like a severe thunderstorm watch, means that conditions are favorable for a tornado to form. A tornado warning is the ultimate in severe warnings, it means that a tornado is either occurring or imminent based on radar or a weather observer. You should take cover immediately.

> A flash flood watch is issued when conditions are favorable for flash flooding in flood-prone areas, usually when the soil is already saturated from recent rains or snow melt, or when upcoming heavy rains will have the potential to cause a flash

> A flash flood warning is issued when a flash flood is imminent or occurring in the warned area. A flash flood is a sudden, violent flood after a heavy rain, especially when runoff is channeled through narrow valleys or ditches. Rainfall intensity and duration, topography, soil conditions, and ground cover all contribute to flash flooding.

Organic Crop Production

Sometimes people are surprised when I tell them I am working with organic growers. They will ask: "Doesn't CVA sell chemicals and fertilizer?" Of course, the answer is yes. We sell a lot of inputs our growers need to produce their crops including seed, fertilizer, herbicides, insecticides, and fungicides. We also purchase and market our growers grains, mill their feed, and supply fuels and other energy products. We take pride in providing expertise in all these areas as well.

It often surprises people how closely related organic and conventional crop production are. In both cases, we need to do a good job with soil fertility and pH. We need to select the correct seed traits for our area and

production goals. In both systems, we need to do a proper job planting, as well as controlling weeds and other pests. Both conventional and organic production, we need to do a great job harvesting to minimize crop loss, and we need to store the crop to ensure good quality as it goes to market.

I work on the Agronomy side. In the Agronomy division, we have a lot of expertise in seed selection, weed identification, and control. Also with insect and disease identification and control, as well as soil fertility. We provide many precision ag tools to help our growers with their agronomic decisions and application of inputs. Organic production regulations restrict our ability to use synthetic fertilizers and pest control. They do not restrict our ability to use our knowledge of pests, crops, seed, and soil fertility to make good decisions that maximize organic or conventionally produced crop yields while minimizing unnecessary costs.

The restrictions in place for certified organic production do not restrict our use of technology to make better input decisions and maximize our profitability on each acre. We can grid sample organically certified fields to understand pH and nutrient variation. We can apply inputs using variable rate technology such as variable rate manure, variable rate liming, and variable rate seeding. We can use moisture probes and create variable rate irrigation prescriptions to maximize our water use efficiency while maximizing our yields. We can outfit planters used in organic production with variable hybrid technology or variable down pressure systems. We can use Precision Planting

and other equipment to optimize seed spacing and placement. Central Valley Ag has carried several OMRI (Organic Materials Review Institute) listed products for years such as our pelletized lime and gypsum provided by Calcium Products, our ag lime, and several of our micronutrient sources. We recently started working with Settje Agri-services. Settje works with livestock producers to best utilize their livestock manure including selling unneeded manure to other operations. This relationship with Settje gives CVA organic growers access to a great source of organic fertilizer. We are also working with some organic input suppliers who can supply organic starter and foliar fertilizers as well as a few organic pest control options.

In 2020 Central Valley Ag will be able to offer organic grain contracts allowing organic producers to market their grain through CVA. All of these changes are allowing organic growers to take advantage of some of CVA's vast logistical advantages.

Just as consumers can choose to buy organic or conventionally produced food products, CVA's growers can choose to produce their crops using organic or conventional productions methods. Central Valley Ag will continue to meet the needs of our grower/producer members regardless of the way they choose to run their operation.
