Wayne school board meets on back to school night, foundation donation made

The Wayne Community Schools District Board of Education met on Monday night, at a later 7 p.m. to accommodate the back to school event allowing students to meet their teachers ahead of school resuming on Wednesday. During the meeting, the board discussed a facility study and HVAC improvements, new staff and budgeting.

Tracy, Morgan and Zach Keating and other family members presented a \$9,700 check to the Wayne Community Schools Foundation for a Bob Keating Scholarship. Money came from the proceeds from the first annual Bob Keating Memorial Golf Tournament. Bob Keating was very involved in raising money for the Wayne Community and supporting the Blue Devils before he passed away. Morgan, Bob and Tracy Keating's daughter said her father would approve of the scholarship fund.

"We're glad to give it to some students who need it. My dad would be very proud of that," Morgan said.

New staff, including Lindsey Knutson, new 7-12 counselor; Annette Chase, new 6th grade teacher and Mark Evetovich new Wayne Elementary assistant principal.

Wavne Elementary's HVAC situation was discussed during the meeting. Carlson, West, Provonda Architects were approved to do a facility study and structural analysis for the cost of \$7,100. The structural analysis will help in repairing the elementary's HVAC system. As discussed at previous meetings, the current system is not handling the needs of the building.

A quote for \$407,893 from Rasmussen HVAC was accepted. The overall project will help fix HVAC plumbing, wiring and held in room 202 of the Jr./Sr. High School make-up air units for the building. The at 5 p.m. on Sept. 9.

project will also require a crane to place new HVAC systems on the building. Superintendant Mark Lenihan told the board that would mean coordinating a day that's not windy and would require diverting traffic around the building. Director of Maintenance and Grounds, Jordan Widner said he didn't expect these repairs to fix the overall HVAC problems at the school. The board approved the bid knowing more work may need to be done.


"This is a lot of money, but possibly phase one of this (project)," board member Lynn Junck said.

The board also approved a first reading for the Board/Superintendent Goals and Policy 8001, Mission, Vision and Core Value Statement.

An annual addendum was approved with Mid States School Bus Inc. The agreement states the company will charge the school \$36,492.28 monthly for a period of nine months and there will be extra charges for field trips. The fee is increased three percent every year.

Lenihan said he will know his budget request once valuations come in on Aug. 20, however, as the preliminary budget request stands now, the tax request is \$0.76 less than last year's.

Second readings were approved for the tobacco policy, procurement plans for school food and school funds, wage information policy, admission requirements, military recruiters, student discipline, extracurricular activities, drug substance use and prevention, curriculum, Parent and Family Engagement Policy, standing committees and standing committee on American Civ-

Northeast Community College and Wayne State College (WSC) have strengthened their working relationship with the gning of a new memorandum of agree



The two colleges have had a long-standing working and transfer relationship to serve students since 1986. Over the years, various institutional and programmatic agreements have been signed to create a seamless transfer of pathways for students between Northeast and Wayne State College

On Aug. 7, Dr. Marysz Rames, president of Wayne State, Dr. Paul Turman, chancellor of the Nebraska State College System, and Mary Honke, co-interim president of Northeast, signed an MOA that is intended to cultivate student transfer and advising efforts that are designed to create clear pathways to success from Northeast to Wayne State College degree completion.

"This replaces all other Memorandums of Understanding by creating a single institutional transfer agreement that also has 28 programmatic articulated pathways for students to be able to plan their four years of college between Northeast and Wayne State," Honke said. "Programmatic transfer articulation agreements are included in the areas of business, accounting, information technology, education, human services and criminal justice."

"Wayne State College stands proudly behind this updated agreement, which will strengthen our relationship and provide students with a seamless experience in earning their associate and bachelor's degree," said Dr. Marysz Rames, president of Wayne State College. "These types of agreements enhance our ability to effectively serve students by helping them reach their goal of earning degrees in Northeast Nebraska."

Much of the MOA centers around Northeast students who will complete a Northeast associate degree and transfer to Wayne State College. This includes development of program articulations, collaboration on recruitment, advising and retention efforts that will be mutually beneficial to both institutions. Wayne State College will host on-campus visit days at Northeast's extended campus at the College Center in South Sioux City and on Northeast's main campus in Norfolk for all interested Northeast students and faculty once per year.

In addition, Northeast students who transfer to Wayne State are eligible for the Nebraska Access Program, which is designed to increase admittance to out-ofstate students.

students also have the opportunity for a tuition discount at Wayne State where they would be charged the same rate as other WSC students for tuition, on-campus housing and food services. They also have the opportunity to apply for WSC transfer student scholarships.

The agreement also provides opportunities for Northeast students to be recognized for honors after 12 credit hours earned at Wayne State College.

"The state colleges have been long-standing partners with the state's community colleges and look for opportunities to create seamless pathways for students to achieve their goals in the most efficient and effective ways possible," said Dr. Paul Turman, chancellor of the Nebraska State College System (NSCS). "The NSCS is excited to South Sioux City.

partner with Northeast on this collaborative effort and looks forward to future initiatives to provide the best opportunities for students.

The MOA is designed to build on the collaboration between Northeast Community College and Wayne State College and the ten-year joint partnership through the College Center in South Sioux City. Both institutions offer classes in the 39,600 square foot building at 1001 College Way. Through the partnership, students from Northeast may take their freshman and sophomore level courses in business, elementary education and human services, followed by junior and senior level or graduate courses through Wayne State College, all in the same location at the College Center in

Gov. Ricketts announces launch Work begin on US-275 near Wisner of addiction medicine fellowship

Pete Ricketts Governor announced the launch of the state's first addiction medicine fellowship program. The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), the Attorney General's office and the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) teamed up to create the program and will partner to oversee it.

"By working together to combat drug addiction, we can come together and build a healthier Nebraska," said Gov. Ricketts. "The addiction fellowship will address substance use disorders, not only illicit drug addiction, but also the even larger public health issues of nicotine dependence, alcohol use, and binge drinking. Thanks to the collaboration of numerous partners, this opportunity will allow Nebraska to train our own specialists, as well as increase visibility for UNMC's excellence in clinical training, scholarship, research, and advocacy.'

An addiction medicine fellowship provides fellows with experience in the prevention, clinical evaluation, treatment, and long-term monitoring of substance-related disorders. The training emphasizes the management of medical and psychiatric conditions in the comprehensive care of these patients and is informed by a wide range of evidence-based interventions.

"The fellowship provides an opportunity to normalize the healthcare conversation and healthcare service integration related to substance use disorders," said Sheri Dawson, DHHS Director of the Division of Behavioral Health. "Substance use constitutes the largest and most costly preventable health Dr. Jeffrey P. Gold, Chancellor problem—accounting for almost a quarter of Nebraska's annual deaths. Substance use disorders are preventable—more than 90 percent of individuals are exposed to alcohol or substance use before the age of 21. One in every four deaths in our country is attributable to alcohol, nicotine, opioids and other drugs, including nonopioid prescription medications." "To provide an integrated approach to fighting the opioid crisis, it is imperative that we address the importance of treatment," said Attorney General Doug Peterson. "This fellowship is a vital part of addressing treatment needs in Nebraska." This fellowship model provides fellows with experience in the prevention, clinical evaluation, treatment, and long-term monitoring of substance-related disorders. The training emphasizes the management of medical, psychiatric, and social conditions in the comprehensive care of these patients and is informed by a wide range of evidence-based interventions. The

educational program in addiction medicine must be 12 months in length and must be completed in no more than a two-year period.

Ken Zoucha, M.D., Assistant Professor of Psychiatry and Addiction Division Director at UNMC, will direct the fellowship program. Most recently, Dr. Zoucha oversaw the juvenile chemical dependency unit at the Hastings Regional Center. The first year will be spent building the infrastructure for the fellowship in partnership with the academic institutions, such as UNMC and Creighton University. The first fellow will start in September 2019 and graduate in August 2020. Initial funding is provided through a DHHS Division of Behavioral Health grant. Sustained funding is being sought beyond the initiative's start-up phase.

"UNMC has an opportunity to lead and educate a new generation of physicians that will address the opioid epidemic and other substance use disorders," said of UNMC. "UNMC educates the workforce to serve individuals with organ system disease, trauma, cancer and more. It works as well to continue as a national leader in addressing the prevention and treatment of substance use and addiction. We need healthcare providers who are comfortable and competent with addiction-related care and serve as change agents to transform our healthcare system." Dr. Gold noted that primary care, internal medicine providers and specialists who see and treat patients every day are all a natural entry into healthcare for many Nebraskans with underlying substance use disorders. As of July, the American College of Academic Addiction Medicine (ACGME) stated that there are 67 addiction medicine fellowship training programs in the United States, 52 of which are accredited by ACGME. They are committed to establishing a total of 125 ACGME accredited addiction medicine fellowship programs by 2025.





The annual men's and women's club golf championships were held at Wayne Country Club last Sunday and like the saying goes "the more things change, the more they stay the same" was evident once again as the modern era version of Wayne's power golf couple laid claim to yet another championship.

Joey and Kari Baldwin claimed top honors with Joey posting win number nine while Kari topped the women's field for title number eight.

In men's play Joey carded an 8-under par score of 100 over 27 holes with rounds of 34-34-32. "It obviously was great to win a ninth time," Baldwin said. "I don't take anything for granted out here because there are a lot of great players at our club. To be in the hunt you have to be right around par for 27 holes.³

Baldwin said his extreme competitiveness to win was evident but he wasn't necessarily convinced he was the guy to beat.

"I haven't played as much golf this summer as in past years between coaching two baseball teams and preparing for a new job," he said. "As far as the round on Sunday, I wasn't pleased with how poorly I hit my driver throughout the day, including an out-of-bounds tee shot on hole 11. I did hit my irons pretty well and I putted decent though I didn't make any long putts, but made some good 6-8 footers to keep my round in check."

An 8-time winner before he hit his first shot of the day Joey said he tried to keep things simple. "I basically relied on competitive nature and past experience which meant staying patient, limiting mistakes and when I made a mistake, to forget about it and move on. Overall, I thought I did that and was happy with the overall performance and outcome."

Joey birdied holes 2-5-13 and 15 on the first round of 18 holes and threw in an eagle on hole 16 to help offset the sting of bogey's on holes 11 (with that out-ofbounds) and 14. His 4-under par round of 68 put him in a comfortable spot, leading by four shots over Mike Varley heading to the final nine holes. In fact, the final pairing for the final nine holes had Baldwin paired with Varley and Doug Rose, another familiar name in the winner's circle multiple times in the past. Rose is the last person to beat Baldwin in a club championship setting

Baldwin birdied hole two and followed up with a birdie on five before closing out the round with an eagle on hole nine to finish at 4-under par 32. Varley cut into Joey's lead heading to the 16th hole, trailing by two. "I was trying to close the gap but each time I thought

I had a chance he would answer," Varley chuckled. "I birdied 16 only to watch him eagle it and that put me back down 3 shots and then I bogeyed 17 and he parred it and there it was, four strokes.²

Varley shot a final round of 36 to finish at 108 and runner-up honors. Rose also shot an even par round of 36 over the last nine holes but ended up tying for third overall with Alex Salmon and Adam Severson. Salmon won the tie-breaker with a birdie on the first hole of the day to claim third place while Rose settled for fourth and Severson, fifth. Severson, however, had the gallery talking after he went 4-under par through the first five holes of the final nine as he eagled holes two and five. Both he and Salmon carded 2-under par 34 over the final nine holes.

In flight action Dave Hix won the first flight with a 73 including a pair of birdies while Matt Eischeid placed second with a 78. Ryan Dahl was third with an 80 and Adam Diediker, fourth at 81. Second flight champ was Kelly Hansen with a 76 while Randy Gamble placed runner-up with an 80. Chuck Parker was third with an 83 and Mike Bentjen, fourth at 84.

Craig Walling did start his round in the third flight like he finished as he opened with a triple bogey, only to bounce back with a 79 to win by two over runner-up Jerry Dorcey. Walling carded five birdies in his round. Mike Powicki placed third with an 81, falling to Dorcey in a tie-breaker on the second hole while Joel Ankeny was fourth at 83. Kevin Peterson claimed the fourth flight with an 81, followed by Brad Jones at 89. Jim Curtiss was third with a 91 followed by Dustin Stegemann at 92.

Dennis Murray was the fifth flight champ with an 84 while Rob Burrows was second, edging AJ Longe in a tie-breaker on the first hole. Each carded 86. Mark Putnam's 89 was good for fourth place. As impressive as Joey Baldwin's championship was, it was second in dominance to sixth flight champ Dave Ley who won by 10 strokes and carded a net score of 55.8. His gross score was 83. Don Endicott was second with a 93 while Dallas Hansen netted out third place with Brian Gibson placing fourth with a 95.









Wildcats listed fourth in NSIC Preseason Volleyball Coaches Poll



Sharing memories of bus drivers


By now, you are well aware that I'm a sucker for a good human interest story!




They're back - painted lady butterflies abundant

That sounds like a good title for some horror movie sequel, but that's not where I'm going with it today. As I'm sure many of you noticed, we're getting an abundance of butterflies... AGAIN! These are Painted Lady Butterflies... although I've heard them called many things... some I can't repeat. These are the adults of the caterpillars that were devouring many soybean fields, and lots of other plants, a few weeks ago.

Fortunately, the adults do not injure crops as they only feed on the nectar of flowers. They are a bright, colorful, addition to our summer landscape and really don't do any damage unless you consider smearing up your windshield as you drive down the road. However, the larvae of the painted lady butterfly, sometimes called the thistle caterpillar, can be another story.

To understand when and how these defoliating insects impact soybeans, one of their favorite food sources, you need to understand a little about their life cycle. Painted lady butterflies do not overwinter in Nebraska. They migrated and moved with wind currents from the southern U.S. and Mexico earlier this summer, arriving in Nebraska in June. Where they are concentrated depends a lot on weather patterns, so just because we had a lot of them this year does not mean



Unlike some insects that lay large masses of eggs, Painted Ladies will lay individual eggs on the leaves of thistles, soybeans, and over 100 other species of plants that serve as a food source to the larvae once they hatch. In five to seven days, the eggs hatch and the larva begin feeding. Because the eggs are laid over several days up to a week or more, it is common to have different sized caterpillars on a single plant.

Mature caterpillars are usually 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 inch long and can vary in color, but are covered with numerous branching spines. Once they mature, they form a pupa or chrysalis which hangs from the underside of a leaf and can be blue, brown, or green in color. In seven to 17 days, a new adult Painted Lady butterfly emerges and starts the life cycle over again.

So the butterflies we are seeing now are the adults of the thistle caterpillars that were feeding on soybean fields a couple weeks ago. Knowing the life cycle, we know we can expect to see more larvae feeding in about four to five weeks and can plan our scouting accordingly.

Knowing how to scout is just as important as knowing when to scout. I won't go into the full explanation on how to scout your fields for defoliating insects, but I can tell you most people will overestimate the amount of defoliation because thistle caterpillar feed at the top of Nebraska Extension office.

Are your calves ready for Accuration?

In the past two weeks, creep feed has been moving out of our CVA mills in Northeast Nebraska at a steady pace. I've also been getting a lot of calls asking when to transition to the intake modifier, Accuration. Lots of windshield time north, south, and west in Nebraska has allowed me to body condition score cattle and evaluate pasture conditions all over the state. From my view, I believe that creep feeding, then transitioning into Accuration, as well as a supplement, such as a high-fat or protein tub, for cows, could prove to be beneficial. Quality mineral programs and protein are going to help our cows going into fall.

A large number of cattle producers in my territory started creep feeding the beginning of June. Calves took to the creep right away, but not in large amounts. Once the hot spell kicked in, I found that our calves at home have increased to that 5-6 lbs. per head per day intake. Before making the transition to Accuration, it is recommended that each calf consumers at least 120 lbs. of creep. To start the transition, fill feeders 1/3 to ½ full of creep feed with an 80/20 mix (80% rolled/ground corn split and 20% Accuration Range Supplement) placed on top of the creep feed. The Purina creep feed is a pellet, and the Accuration meal and corn can work its way down through the pellets making for a slow transition that's safe and easy on the calf.

Some producers hesitate or decline when I bring up Accuration because they have heard that it makes calves to "fleshy" when they get to the sale barn as there is often a fish smell associated with the modifier. To prevent this issue, it's important to track intakes and work through the steps. Besides 80/20 choice, we have options such as 70/30, or even 60/40, to help keep calves consuming 1% of their body weight.

Keep in mind this method of self-feeding requires the calves to have a source of roughage such as hay or pasture. If there is a hay shortage and a producer still wants to self-feed, there are complete feed options available. A high-quality mineral program is going to be essential this year for getting cows rebred. Take time to drive through your cow herd and evaluate their body condition as fall harvest will be here before we know it and it's hard to get cows caught up prior to snowfall. 


