High speed chase involving several agencies leads to arrest

A stolen vehicle led to a high-speed pursuit involving several agencies, ending in Wayne county. The chase led to the apprehension of a South Carolina man and to damage to both Wayne Police Department and Wayne County Sheriff's Office vehicles.

According to a press release from the Nebraska State Patrol, a multi-agency effort led to the apprehension of a suspect in an auto theft investigation in Wayne County on Dec. 5.

Several law enforcement agencies in northeast Nebraska were alerted to be on the lookout for a stolen 2017 Dodge Ram pickup after it had been spotted in the area multiple times on the morning of Dec. 5. At approximately 1:45 p.m., law enforcement received a report that the truck was

on Highway 15 south of Wayne. Multiple agencies pursued the vehicle, which made contact with units from both the Wayne County Sheriff's Office and the Wayne Police Department during the pursuit. The suspect was able to flee south of Wayne.

A short time later, at approximately 2:10 p.m., a State Trooper located the stolen truck on 575th Ave, about five miles south of Wayne. The trooper notified the NSP Aviation Support Division, which tracked the vehicle from the air as it entered a minimum maintenance road. The pickup then became stuck near 851st Road and 575th Ave.

The driver fled on foot and was located a short distance from the vehicle by an NSP K9. Robert Wagle, 35, of Summerville, South Carolina, was arrested for fel-

ony flight to avoid arrest, willful reckless driving, assault, and possession of a stolen vehicle. Additional charges are pending. Wagle was lodged in Antelope County Jail.

This investigation involved the sheriff's offices of Antelope, Madison, Stanton and Wayne counties, the police departments from Neligh, Norfolk, and Wayne, as well as the Nebraska State Patrol. The investigation is ongoing.

This pursuit wasn't Wagle's first run-in with the law this year, Wagle was charged with receiving and possessing a stolen vehicle, failure to stop for blue lights and driving under suspension early in August in South Carolina. Later that month, Wagle and an accomplice were wanted for attempting to hit a Sheriff's deputy during a vehicle pursuit.

Familiar face in a new role as McMenamain takes WSC football reins

There were handshakes aplenty in the Elkhorn Room of the Kantner Student Center Tuesday morning for a familiar face who has accepted a new role.

Former Wayne State offensive coordinator John McMenamain was named the new coach of the Wayne State football team, replacing Dan McLaughlin, who retired last

month after 15 years as the Wildcats' mentor.

McMenamin, who returns to Wayne after serving as offensive coordinator at Central Missouri University, served as McLaughlin's offensive coordinator from 2011-14 and built an offense that was ranked among the best in the country before leaving for Warrensburg, Mo.

McMenamin said it didn't take long to see where Wayne State was going when

he made a return trip before the Thanksgiving holiday when he first began discussions with athletic director Mike Powicki and Wayne State's President, Dr. Marysz Rames.

"After we lost in the second round of the playoffs, that Sunday when we got home I told my wife 'Let's make a trip up there,'" he said. "It's only been five years (since he left), but it's amazing how much has changed (on campus) and it's all going the right way."

In introducing McMenamain, Powicki said the college needed to move quickly to find a replacement for McLaughlin, as the change was coming in the middle of the heart of the recruiting season for football.

"Dr. Rames and I were on the phone constantly over the Thanksgiving break, and she was on the phone with other people to get this moving," he said.

Finding someone who shares Dr. Rames and Powicki's vision was important, and McMenamain "checked all the boxes," Powicki said.

"We wanted someone who shares the vision Dr. Rames and I have, not only for the (football) program but for the athletic department and the institution as a whole," Powicki said. "We want to build a consistent winner that can not only compete in the NSIC, but compete for NSIC championships and an NCAA playoff berth."

"We also need an individual who is committed to creating a positive student-athlete experience for our players, who is dedicated to the academic success of our athletes and can also be a mentor to these young men," Powicki added. "(McMenamin) is a person of high character, has a connection to Div. II as a coach and an athlete and has close

Wildcat Career Closet hopes to help students dress to impress

McLaughlin said she hopes that the Wildcat Career Closet will officially be a sanctioned Service-Learning project next year and she and her class are already planning for more drop off locations.

"We're hoping that we can maybe have some drop off locations within the community but we haven't really reached out to those yet because we're trying to get like the skeletal framework right of how it's going to look," McLaughlin said.

In addition to the retail class, the Business Communication class has also been helping spread the word about the closet.

School board listens to proposal for One World Club

The addition of a club to connect students of all backgrounds, the purchase of replacement boilers in the junior-senior high school and a look at the first draft of the 2020-2021 school calendar were on the agenda when the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education met on Dec. 9.

Board members listened to a presentation by Ashley Marquez and Savannah Leseberg on their desire to start a One World Club at Wayne Community Schools.

The two students explained the mission statement of "fostering positive relationships between nonimmigrant and immigrant students through community-building activities and volunteering."

Information was shared on the plan for activities the group would be involved with, including an introductory advisory meeting, attending activities together and a Cultural Foods Night in which all would share foods from their country or culture.

It was noted that the club plans to have

meetings at consistent times and in a location that is convenient for all students. Meetings are designed to build relationships, but also provide tutorial services to those who need them.

Sponsors for the group would be Mrs. Christa Dutcher and Mrs. Mallorie Koch.

"The plan is to have students meet people who are in our school and interact with them," Mrs. Dutcher said.

Superintendent Dr. Mark Lenihan and High School Principal Tucker Hight will work with the group to determine the best way to proceed with the club.

In other action, the board approved moving forward with a bid to replace two of the five boilers in the junior-senior high school.

Jordan Widner, Head of Maintenance, told the board that at the present time two of the building's five boilers are out of service.

A bid of \$43,440 was accepted from Volkman Plumbing and Heating to replace these two units. Widner said there will be additional expense for re-programming the current boilers with the newly installed units so they can communicate with each other.

Superintendent Lenihan shared information on the first draft of the 2020-2021 school calendar.

It calls for classes to begin on Wednesday, Aug. 19 and graduation to be held Saturday, May 15, 2021.

Dr. Lenihan explained that the first semester would be shorter than the second, which generally includes more snow days. Discus-

sion was held on the number of days that would be taken off for the Christmas holiday.

Board members voted to change the deductible on the district's property insurance.

Raising the deductible from \$1,000 to \$5,000 will result in a savings of \$6,094 for the premium year. This item was brought up during the board's November meeting when the property and casualty insurance coverage was renewed.

During administrative reports, the possibility of implementing

a Personal Finance class as a requirement for graduation was discussed. The class would be offered for dual credit through Wayne State College and offered to seniors. Topics covered would be such things as balancing a check book, the cost of credit and insurance.

Additional details will be obtained and the item brought back to the board at a future meeting.

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education will next meet in regular session on Monday, Jan. 13 at 5 p.m.

ties here in Nebraska.”
McMenamin brings championship-caliber experience back to the Wildcat program. A 2002 graduate of Northwest Missouri State, he played for national championship teams in 1998 and 1999 under legendary coach Mel Tjeerdsmas before beginning his coaching career as an assistant at Omaha Central High School and as a graduate assistant at the now-defunct University of Nebraska-Omaha program.
From there, he was an offensive coordinator at Midland University for two years before being hired by McLaughlin and serving for four years as the Wayne State offensive coordinator. Wayne State was ranked in the top 25 in NCAA Div.

II in seven different offensive categories during McMenamin's final season with the Wildcats.
At Central Missouri, the Mules had the top-ranked offense in NCAA Div. II this season, averaging 547.5 yards per game. They were second in passing offense (346.2) and sixth in scoring offense (44.8 points per game) while going 11-2 this season and reaching the NCAA Div. II quarterfinals.
McMenamin said the system he intends to bring to Wayne can be described in three words: fast, physical and relentless.
“Fast, physical and relentless. Period and amen,” he said. “My daughter is a wrestling junkie and I'm a Ric Flair fan, and we want that style ingrained here. When you plan and operate that way, there's

no fear and you keep coming and keep working at it.”
McMenamin said he is inheriting a good program that was built by McLaughlin, who was 79-88 overall and finished the 2019 season with a 4-7 record.
McMenamin said he is looking forward to starting work with the returning players a month from now when second semester starts.
“We can't be afraid to say it and we want to speak it into experience,” he said. “We want to win championships and we expect to win, and we're going to get there. A lot of things have to happen to get to that point, and we need to have attainable goals to keep climbing and get to that. It won't happen overnight, but it will happen and we're going to do it the right way.”

Nebraska National Guard, Rwanda Defence Force announce new partnership

Leaders of the Nebraska National Guard and the Rwanda Defence Force formalized a new partnership by signing a statement of partnership on Dec. 12. This Agreement formalizes Rwanda and Nebraska as the newest partners in the Department of Defence's State Partnership Program (SPP).
“The Nebraska National Guard is honored to have a new state partnership and build an even stronger relationship between the United States and Rwanda,” said Air Force Maj. Gen. Daryl L. Bohac, Nebraska National Guard adjutant general. “I know that the training opportunities, cultural experiences and professional exchange of ideas that the SPP makes possible will benefit both the Nebraska National Guard and Rwanda for years to come.”
The Nebraska National Guard partnership with the Rwanda Defence Force will lay the foundation

for a long-term relationship by sharing expertise in emergency and disaster response, as well as strengthening cooperation in peacekeeping operations and readiness, Nebraska National Guard officials said. Rwanda is quite familiar with the latter task, contributing more troops each year to United Nations peacekeeping missions than all but a few much larger countries.

NDOT wants motorists to think about 'who's driving home' this holiday season

This holiday season, the Nebraska Department of Transportation-Highway Safety Office (NDOT-HSO) is teaming up with state and local law enforcement to remind all drivers of the dangers of drinking and driving. The organizations will be working together to stress the importance of planning a sober ride home before heading out to enjoy the holiday festivities. They are encouraging drivers to start the conversation, “Who's driving home?”
“The holidays are a special time for every community, and it's more important than ever for us to stress the importance of safe driving habits,” said Sarpy County Sheriff, Jeff Davis. “We know everyone is rushing around, finishing those last-minute errands and attending various holiday parties. Before you ever head out to the festivities, make sure you plan a sober ride home, because driving drunk should never be an option. Help us spread the message: Even one drink can be one drink too many.”
In 2018, 33 percent of Nebras-

ka's fatal crashes were alcohol-involved, an increase from the 30 percent recorded in 2017. During the 2018 December holiday, 54 Nebraska law enforcement agencies participated in the Driver Sober or Get Pulled Over mobilization with 936 officers working nearly 17,000 hours of overtime. During that time, statewide check points were established to look for drunk drivers. Three hundred ninety-nine driving-while-intoxicated arrests were made and over 12,000 contacts with the public were initiated.
“Drinking and driving should never be combined. It's essential to plan a sober ride before getting in a vehicle. Have the conversation, ‘Who's driving home?’” stated Mark Segerstrom, Highway Safety Administrator for the NDOT-HSO. “The alternative could change your life, not to mention the lives of your passengers, of pedestrians, or of other drivers and passengers nearby. This holiday season, NDOT-HSO and Nebraska's law enforcement urge drivers to designate a

sober driver. If you plan on drinking, take responsibility and make a plan to get home.”
Party with a Plan
First and foremost: Plan ahead. Be honest with yourself: You know whether you will be drinking. If you plan to drink, plan for a sober driver to take you home. Is it your turn to be the designated driver? Ask your friends, “Who's driving home?” Take that role seriously.
• Remember that it is never okay to drink and drive. Even if you've had only one alcoholic beverage, designate a sober driver or plan to use public transportation or a ride service to get home safely.
• If available, use your community's AAA “Tow to Go” Service. It is available from Friday, Dec. 20 to 6 a.m. on Thursday, Jan. 2, 2020.
• If you see a drunk driver on the road, contact local law enforcement at 911 or the Nebraska State Patrol at *55.
• Have a friend who is about to drink and drive? Take the keys away and make arrangements to get your friend home safely.

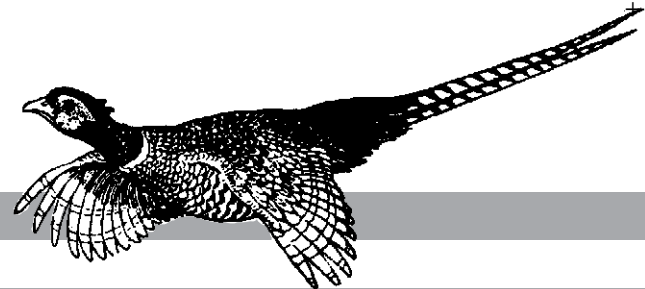

Wayne High junior volleyball standout Lauren Pick was named to the Class C-1 All-State First Team by both the Lincoln Journal Star and Omaha World-Herald.

Protzman earns region honors

Wayne State College senior defensive end Jacob Protzman was voted to the Conference Commissioner's Association All-Super Region 4 Football Second Team.

The team is voted on by the sports information directors in the region from the Great Northwest Athletic Conference, Lone Star Conference, Northern Sun Conference and Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference. It marks the third straight season a Wildcat defender received CCA All-Super Region 4 honors, joining Tyler Thomsen last season and Glenn Harris in 2017.

Protzman, a 6-foot-4, 250-pound senior defensive end from Grimes, Iowa, earned All-NSIC South Division First Team honors this season after leading the NSIC in tackles for loss (22.0-92 yds) and tied for second in sacks with 12.5 for 65 yards, which tied for fifth-most sacks in a single season by a Wildcat player.

He ranked fifth on the team in tackles with 44 and had five quarterback hurries with one forced fumble. Protzman had at least one sack in nine of 11 games this season, highlighted by a season-best 2.5 sacks with seven tackles vs. Minnesota Crookston. Last season, Protzman was an All-NSIC South Division Second Team honoree for the Wildcats.

Bears roll to season-opening win over Crofton

The Laurel-Concord-Coleridge boys basketball team got off to a flying start Friday with a 64-37 blowout of Crofton at LCC High School.

The Bears put four players in double figures and had a great balance in their debut, building a 34-18 halftime advantage and continuing to add to their lead on their way to the 27-point win.

Wildcat ruggers make it four in a row, 11 overall

MARIETTA, Ga. — There were the New York Yankees of the 40's and 50's.

The Boston Celtics of the 1960's.

UCLA men's basketball in the 1970's.

Iowa wrestling in the 1980's.

The NBA's Chicago Bulls in the 1990's.

The New England Patriots in the 2000's.

And now, you can most certainly add Wayne State women's rugby to the list of dynasties that have dominated their sport and put together a seemingly-endless run of championship seasons.

The Wildcat ladies won their 11th National Small College Rugby Organization national title on Sunday, posting their fourth consecutive win and sixth overall in 15-on-15 action with a surprisingly easy 90-12 blowout over Endicott (Mass.) University Sunday afternoon at Lee University's Lupo Family Field.

It was a weekend where the 20-0 Wildcats proved beyond a shadow of a doubt where they stood among the nation's small-college programs, outscoring their opponents 147-26 over the weekend and putting both games out of reach before halftime.

Going into the tournament, coach Darrin Barner was expecting two very tough matchups with Moorhead, who Wayne State beat in the NSCRO Final Four a year ago, and Endicott, a speedy team that had regularly put up huge numbers on the scoreboard this season.

"Endicott had scored between 70 and 90 points all year long and have some really fast ladies on the outside, and we were able to shut them down and force them back to the inside and let our scrum take care of it from there," he said. "I knew Moorhead was much better than they were a year ago and we had to change our defense to an outside-in defense that was high-risk, high-reward and it worked."

The Wildcats struggled to score only in the first 10 minutes of Saturday's 57-14 win over Minnesota Moorhead, but once they got going, the Dragon defense was helpless in stopping the Wildcat freight train.

Kennedy Jones scored three times in the first half and Anna Fleecs added a score to help Wayne State to a 26-0 halftime advantage.

Wayne State led by as many as 40 before Moorhead was finally able to put points on the board, but they weren't able to stop Wayne State's high-powered offense. Scores by Cortney Forbes, Mae Hoelsing, Brook Hoelsing and Fleecs in the second half helped the Wildcats win a physical one-sided battle that put them in the 15's title game for the sixth time in seven tries.

Barner said he wasn't sure if his back line could counter Endicott's speedy back line after two key players were hobbled with injuries prior to Sunday's game.

"We didn't know what our lineup was until about an hour before the game because the physicality of Moorhead really took a toll on us," he said. "We were able to shut (Endicott) down and kept the ball tight with our scrum and did a lot of banging with our short game and they just couldn't stop us."

Australian sophomore Isabelle Robinson, who earned tournament MVP honors, said an early-season matchup against a team from Canada at home showed the younger players what they would need when Sunday rolled around.

Janssen earns second POW honor

For the second time in three weeks, Wayne State College sophomore center Jordan Janssen has been named the Northern Sun Conference Men's Basketball South Division Player of the Week.

A 6-foot-7 sophomore center, Janssen averaged a double-double with 22.5 points and 17.5 rebounds per game over the weekend in Wildcat home wins over Upper Iowa and Winona State. He produced 17 points and grabbed 21 rebounds Friday in a 88-69 win over the Peacocks and followed that performance with 28 points and 14 rebounds in Saturday's 70-63 victory against Winona State.

Janssen's 21 rebounds against Upper Iowa Friday night tied for fifth-most by a Wildcat in a single game and were the most rebounds in a game since David Allen grabbed 21 boards vs. Northwest Missouri State on Feb. 15, 1993.

For the weekend, Janssen shot 60.9 percent (14-23) from the field and 94.4 percent (17-18) at the free throw line while also averaging 4.5 assists and 3.5 blocked shots per game.

This season, Janssen leads Wayne State in scoring (18.7) and rebounding (11.8), leading the NSIC in rebounding while ranking fifth in scoring. He also sits sixth in the NSIC in blocked shots per game (1.5), ninth in assists (3.5) and field goal percentage (.523) and tops the league in made free throws with 70.

Janssen also received the honor on Nov. 24 and is the first Wildcat player since Amry Shelby in November, 2012 to be named NSIC Men's Basketball Player of the Week.

Three sign with Wayne State softball

Wayne State College softball coach Shelli Manson announced three high school student athletes who have signed national letters of intent during the NCAA early signing period to attend Wayne State College and play softball for the Wildcats in the 2020-21 academic year.

They are Katie Humburg of Phoenix, Ariz., Abby Husing from Omaha and Mary Krystofiak of Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

"I am very excited to welcome these student-athletes to our Wayne State softball family," said Manson. "This class brings a great combination of speed, power, athleticism and versatility to the diamond. All three are versatile players which will continue to strengthen our program and add substantial depth. They are not only hard working on the field, but in the classroom as well. We are anxious for them to arrive in Wayne and make an immediate impact."

Humburg is a 5-foot-7 third baseman/utility player from Chaparral High School in Arizona where she is a three-year starter entering her senior season. As a junior last season, she posted a .326 average with six homers, 10 doubles and 25 RBI with 22 runs scored to earn All-Region honorable mention. Humburg collected second-team All-Region honors as a sophomore while helping her team to a fifth-place finish in the Arizona Class 6A State Tournament. She also excels in the classroom, earning Sports 360AZ All-Academic Softball Team honors.

Husing is a 5-foot-2 second baseman/utility player from Platteview High School in Springfield where she was a four-year starter in softball. This season she hit .554 with 36 hits, 39 runs scored and 25 stolen bases to earn first-team All-Nebraska Capitol Conference honors while also receiving Class B All-State honorable mention.

Husing closed her high school career with a .461 batting average, 110 runs scored and 42 walks. She also played on the USA 18-under Class A State Champion team Prime Time last summer. Husing also ran a leg on the Nebraska Gold Medal Class B 400-meter relay team last spring as a junior.

Krystofiak is a 5-foot-10 first baseman/infielder from Cedar Rapids Kennedy High School in Iowa where she has started three years in high school. Last summer, she earned All-Mississippi Valley Conference First Team honors hitting .349 with two homers, 25 RBI and 29 hits on a team that was 37-4 overall and qualified for the Iowa Class 5A State Tournament with a No. 3 ranking in the state. Krystofiak's club team average last summer was .402.

The Wayne State women's basketball team defeated Upper Iowa Friday before losing their first conference game of the season at home Saturday to Winona State.

On Friday night, freshman forward Josey Ryan scored a career-high 21 points and Wayne State outscored Upper Iowa 44-26 in the second half to pull away for a 86-59 win. Northern Sun Conference women's basketball victory Friday night at Rice Auditorium in Wayne.

Wayne State never trailed in the contest although the Peacocks kept the game close much of the first half.

The Wildcats took a 15-4 lead at the 5:32 mark of the first quarter following an Erin Norling basket and WSC finished the opening stanza with a 24-16 advantage. Upper Iowa got as close as five at 28-23, but Wayne State stormed back and pushed the lead back to 12 at 42-30 before finishing the half with a 42-33 lead.

The third quarter saw UIU stay close early as the Peacocks trailed 46-39 with 7:07 to play in the quarter before Wayne State put the game out of reach with a 15-2 run and held a 61-44 lead after three quarters. They outscored Upper Iowa 25-15 in the fourth quarter to finish off the 17-point victory.

Ryan led all scorers with her career-best 21 points on 10-of-13 shooting from the field. Other Wildcats reaching double figures were Halley Busse with 14, Erin Norling with 12 and Brittany Bongartz with 11.

Wayne State held a 40-31 edge in rebounding over Upper Iowa thanks to seven boards from Norling. Busse had six of Wayne State's 24 assists on the night to go with a team-high three steals.

On Saturday, Winona State outscored Wayne State 26-16 in the fourth quarter to rally for a 76-73 win, handing Wayne State (6-2, 2-1 NSIC) its first loss in conference

play.

The Wildcats led for nearly the entire game, taking an early 13-7 lead on the Warriors before they rallied for a 17-15 advantage. Wayne State tied the game at 19-19 after one period, then led by 10 at the half, 41-31.

The Wildcats led by as many as 11 and had a 57-50 lead going to the fourth, but Winona State hit 4-of-6 from 3-point range in the final quarter and took the lead in the final minute to come away with the win.

Bongartz and Busse each scored 18 points to lead Wayne State followed by Norling with 11.

Norling led the team in rebounds with eight and Busse handed out six assists, followed by Norling and Lauren Zacharias with three apiece.

The Wildcats are on the road this weekend with games at Bemidji State on Friday and Minnesota Crookston on Saturday.

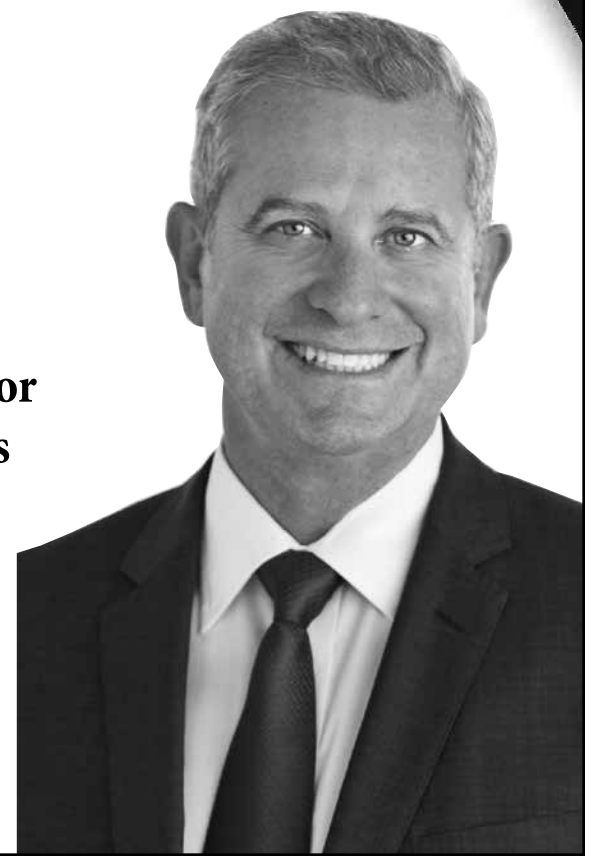

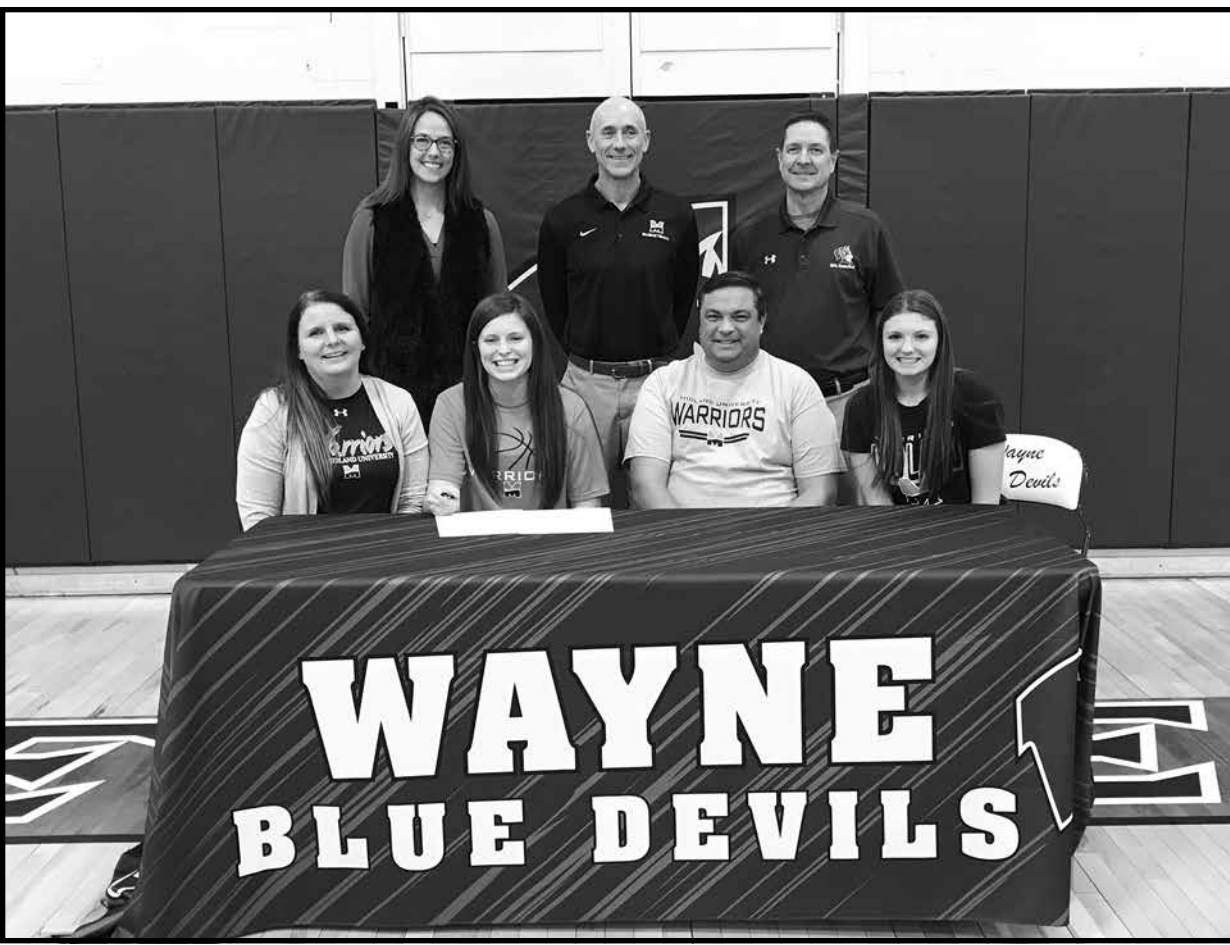

Bellar named to All-Central Region teams

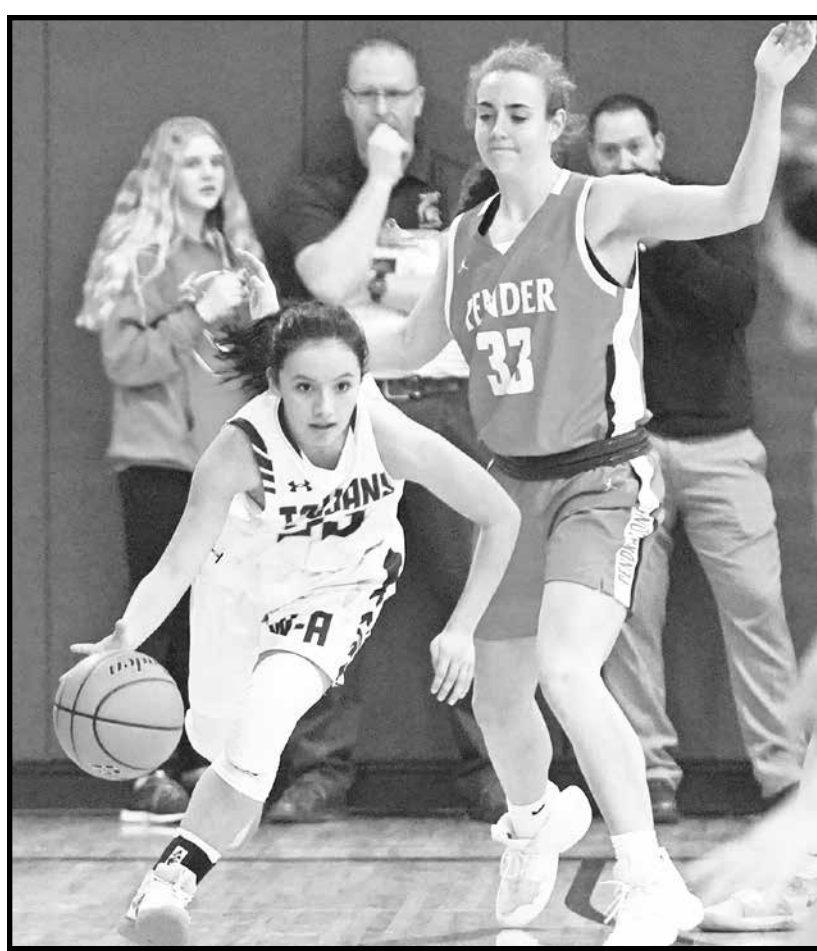

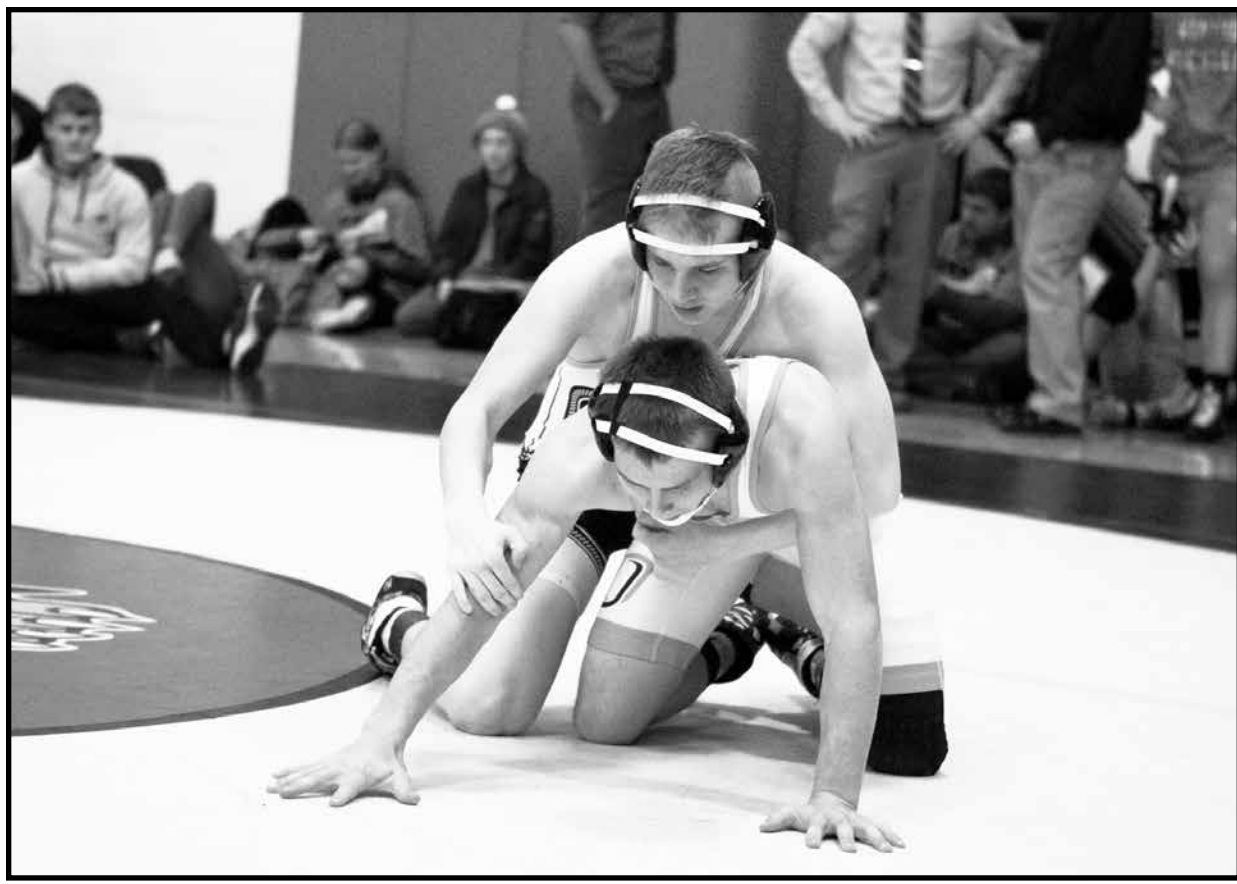
Wakefield boys win, girls fall in season debut

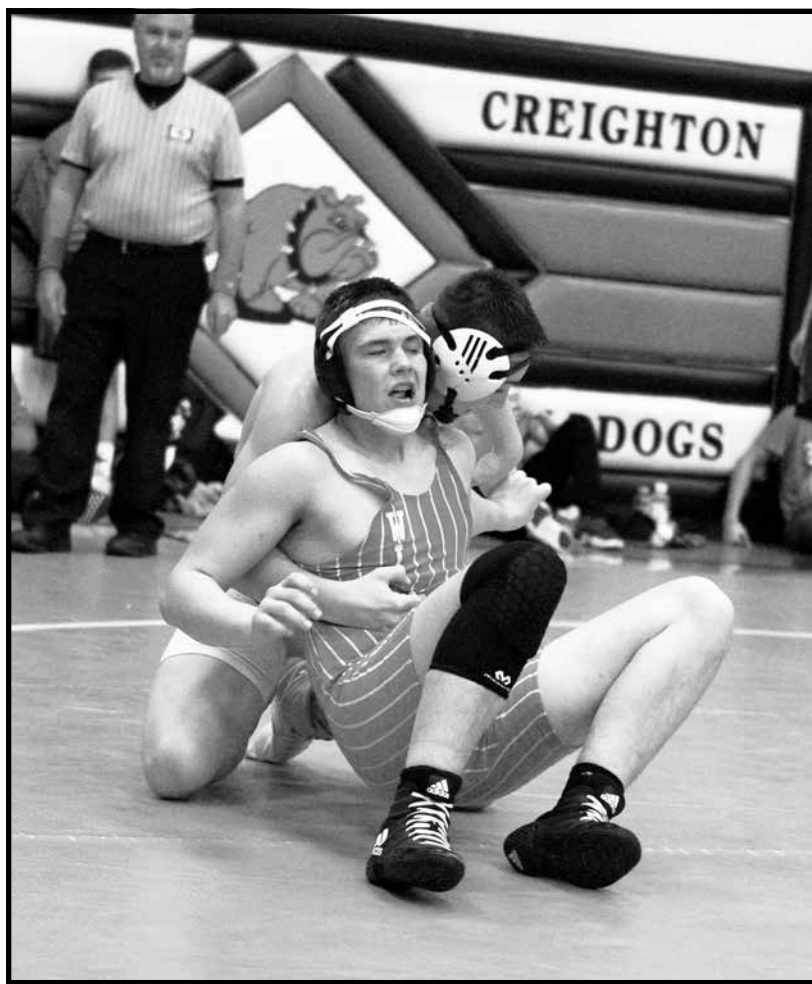

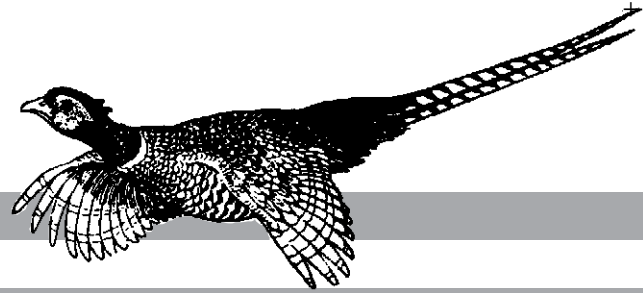

Batteries not needed for educational toys

As a proponent of outdoor and STEM education, I also advocate for toys that provide appropriate and beneficial learning experiences for children while fostering their developing brains.

So, what does that even mean? Well, opposing battery-operated toys can often be an unpopular opinion in our technologically advanced world, but just hear me out. It could potentially save you money and even some sanity.

While giving a two-year old a brand new smart phone or tablet is a great gift idea (sense the sarcasm here), there are better gifts out there. First of all, I encourage you to do your own research. And by research, I mean more than just reading social media articles. Just because a toy claims to be educational does not mean that it actually will provide educational

benefits for your child.

Many toys that talk or make noise claim to promote language development, but this isn't always the case. Research done by npr.org on a variety of talking toys notes that the best way to help children learn language is to encourage authentic adult-child interactions. There is no evidence to support a child learn-

ing language by simply interacting with a talking toy (npr.org/sections/ed/2016/01/11/462264537/the-trouble-with-talking-toys).

So, besides talking toys, what is the problem with toys that require batteries in order to "do something"? In general, toys requiring batteries often only do a few things. They light up, blink and typically annoy parents with a song about the color

purple. What they do not naturally do is encourage creative, imaginative, and engaging play that will actually last.

Karen Stephens, writing for Exchange magazine, emphasizes the benefits of homemade, pretend play toys that are not just fun, but also support the above mentioned types of play (eastern-florida.edu/community-resources/

child-development-centers/parent-resource-library/documents/mind-powered-toys.pdf). Blocks, dramatic play items (i.e. costumes, real-life objects), art materials, recyclables, and books are all great alternatives to battery-operated toys that will probably lose their appeal after a few weeks anyway.

Regardless of what toys you decide to purchase for your chil-

dren, make sure to focus on the interactions you have with them. Talk with them, laugh with them and most importantly, play with them.

Ag seminar serves as thank you to producers

Approximately 50 people were on hand for the annual Ag Appreciation Seminar on Dec. 6 at the Wayne Fire Hall.

Hosted by the Ag Task Force of the Wayne Area Economic Development Office, the event included several speakers, lunch and door prizes.

Among the speakers was Al Dutcher, ag climatologist with Nebraska Extension.

Dutcher has been predicting weather for more than 30 years and said there is "tremendous uncertainty" in regard to this winter's forecast. He explained the differences between El Nino conditions and La Nina weather patterns.

Dutcher told his audience that predicting weather patterns was not an exact science, but concluded with the following statements, "An elevated flood risks exists for much of the corn belt through next spring; the degree of flood risk will ultimately be determined by pre-

cipitation, temperature, frost depth and storm tracks this winter; the atmosphere has shown three modes for storm tracks since the middle of October; moisture is favored much further north than last winter with a lower count of southern stream storms and El Nino neutral conditions through 2020, with cooling favored in the second half of the year.

Pam Miller, Chair of the Board of Directors for Siouxland Ethanol, spoke on the topic "Ethanol - The Best Days are Ahead."

She said in the years since Siouxland Ethanol came into production, there has been increased efficiency, better processing and increased demand for ethanol. She also shared information on the processing of corn oil and the increase in the yields of this product by one pound per bushel.

The goal of the facility is to produce a high octane, low carbon fuel and find a market of distillers grains, a high protein source for

livestock. Miller said at the present time, 99 percent of the ethanol produced at Siouxland Ethanol is shipped to California.

Jim Jansen, an agricultural economist with the University of Nebraska-Lincoln discussed with his audience how major economic forces in the state may be influencing the current market value of ag

land and cash rental rates across the state. Wayne FFA students Meghan Spahr and Emily Eilers demonstrated how to go about artificially inseminating a cow. The speech is part of the FFA Career Leadership Development (CDL) program and the two will present it again during competition in January.

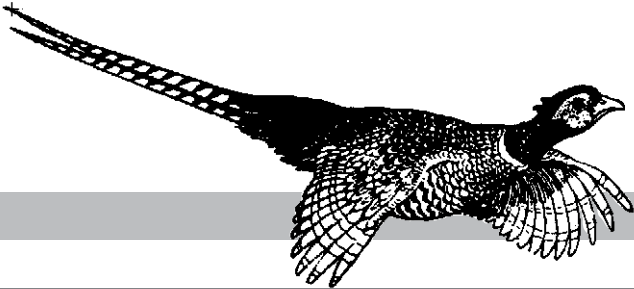

Remembering an old neighbor, putting up the tree

Soil Testing: Phosphorus & Potassium

Where is it that you spend quite a bit of money on fertility? It's with your P & K, or Phosphorus and Potassium. So how do you test these levels and what kind of levels do you want to see?

Phosphorus (P): Phosphorus is tested by different methods, and those methods make a big difference. Midwest Labs tests both P1 Bray and P2 Bray; each test gives us useful information. The P1 test is the primary number used for making a phosphorus application recommendation, while the P2 test helps us refine that recommendation. CVA likes to see P1 levels at approximately 25 ppm. Levels under 20 ppm indicate P is likely to be a limiting factor in corn, wheat, or soybean production. At P1 levels of 20-30 ppm, enough phosphorus fertilizer should be applied to at least replace the P removed by the crop. P1 levels over 30 ppm can receive less P fertilizer than the crop removes and remain productive.

When soil pH levels exceed 7.3, Midwest Laboratories will often run an Olsen Bicarbonate phosphorus test in addition to the P1 and P2 Bray tests. Carbonates and bicarbonates contained in a higher pH soil sample may neutralize the extract solution used in the Bray tests making these extractions less effective.

Some laboratories use the Mehlich 3 phosphorus extraction using colorimetric detection. This analysis method will often have slightly higher results compared to a Midwest Lab's Bray P1 extraction. A good conversion of M3 colorimetric P to a comparable P1 Bray result would be to multiply the Mehlich 3 value by 0.75 or 0.80.

Potassium (K): At CVA, we like to see K levels near 200 ppm to minimize the chances that a lack of K will limit crop production. That number varies slightly with cation exchange capacity because the clay particles in a finer soil (higher CEC) can tie up K, making it unavailable for crop needs. A range of 150 ppm for coarse soils (sand) to 240 ppm for fine-textured soils (clay) should meet a crop's needs under most conditions. Sometimes we focus more of our discussion in high yield environments or sandy soils on how many times should we apply K during the growing season. We know high yielding crops can use as much as 12 lbs of K2O per acre per day. Sometimes it makes sense to supplement a little of the soil's base fertility with an in-season application just before the plant reaches reproductive stages when daily growth is greatest.

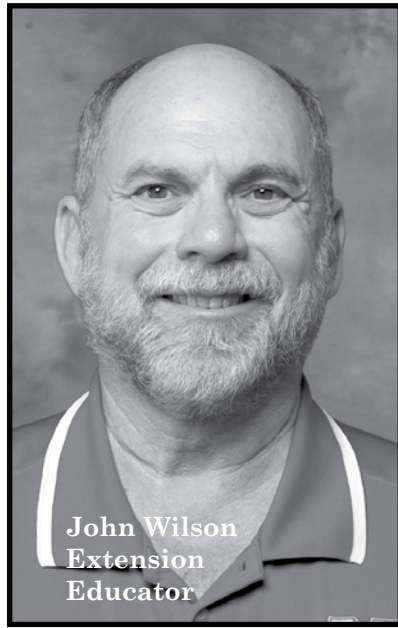
Two important reminders offered for producers

I know we talked about both of these in the past, but I wanted to remind you about a couple meetings next week you might want to attend. The first will be of interest to all farmers, but especially those who have a private pesticide applicator license that expires next spring. The other meeting is especially for those growing soybeans.

Getting the latest information on issues facing crop farmers AND an opportunity to renew your private pesticide applicator license will all take place at a series of meetings next week. This is the fourth year for Confronting Cropping Challenges and responses from previous year's programs have been very positive. This year the program will be offered at five locations in the area.

Each program will begin with registration at 12:30 p.m. and the program from 1 to 4 p.m. The locations and dates for the 2019 Confronting Cropping Challenges will be:

- Neligh, American Legion - Monday, Dec. 16;
- Wayne, Fire Hall - Tuesday,

- Private Pesticide Applicator Recertification Overview.

Anyone that just wants the crops information can attend the first four sessions and leave. If you need to have your private applicator license renewed in 2020, you can stick around for the final session to be recertified. Please note, this is for renewal only, not initial certification. Even though this training is being offered in 2019, you will not lose a year of certification on your license.

The cost for the program is \$10 if you are only attending the first four sessions. If you are being recertified, the cost is \$50. The additional \$40 is the same as you would pay to be recertified at a traditional private pesticide applicator training.

LENRD Board approves applications for irrigated acres

Earlier this fall, landowners within the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) boundaries, had an opportunity to submit applications to expand irrigated acres.

"The board voted to accept applications for standard variances in some portions of the District. We received 123 applications for new irrigated acres during the sign-up period, which was open from Oct. 1 through Oct. 31st," LENRD assistant manager, Brian Bruckner, said.

Eligible applications were processed using the District's scoring and ranking process, which integrates several categories that are each assigned different score values within the subcategory. Each eligible application was given a total score, and subsequently the applications are ranked from highest to lowest score.

The board voted at their Dec. 2 meeting to allow up to 292.24 acre-feet of new peak season streamflow depletions in the LENRD's Hydrologically Connected (10/50 Area), which calculates to 2,795 new irrigated acres. The board also voted to allow for the development of 2509.92 new irrigated acres in the LENRD's Non-Hydrologically Connected (Non 10/50 Area). These approvals were determined from the final rankings as provided by District staff, and a cut-off was established to determine the number of acre-feet of new depletions, and the number of new irrigated acres that would be made available for each respective management area.

"Staff will now go through the process of contacting the landowners in writing, for both approved and non-approved applications," Bruckner said.

After the landowners have been properly notified, the approved list will be made available by submitting a re-

quest for public records to the District. In other action, the board approved the annual groundwater allocations for the Quantity Management Subareas subject to allocations for the 2020 growing season.

"Each year, the board must determine the annual groundwater allocation amounts for the Wayne and Eastern Madison County Quantity Management Subareas for the upcoming crop year," Bruckner said.

The board voted to establish the 2020 allocation amounts at: 18 acre-inches per irrigated acre for gravity/flood irrigation systems, 13 acre-inches per irrigated acre for subsurface drip irrigation systems, and 14 acre-inches per irrigated acre for all other irrigation systems in the Eastern Madison County Quantity Subarea, and 17 acre-inches per irrigated acre for gravity/flood irrigation systems, 12 acre-inches per irrigated acre for subsurface drip irrigation systems, and 13 acre-inches per irrigated acre for all other irrigation systems in the Wayne County Quantity Subarea. These groundwater allocation amounts have remained unchanged since first being imposed for the 2013 pumping season.

In other business, the board approved five Community Forestry In-

centive applications for a total cost of \$13,719.69. The communities receiving grants this year include: the City of Norfolk, Norfolk Public Schools, the Village of Pilger, the City of Wakefield, and the City of West Point.

The board also voted to approve the memorandum of agreement between the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and the LENRD.

"The NRCS and LENRD share a rich history of collaborating to deliver comprehensive technical and financial assistance to landowners and other entities to protect, restore, and enhance natural resources. This agreement reinforces the partnership between both agencies and will be in effect until mutually modified or terminated," LENRD general manager, Mike Sousek, said.

The LENRD board and staff meet each month to develop and implement management plans for the future of our natural resources. The next LENRD board meeting will be Thursday, Dec. 19 at 7:30 p.m. at the LENRD office at 1508 Square Turn Boulevard in Norfolk.
