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## WAED Chamber Banquet 'swings' Wayne into the 20s

Over 250 guests attended the 2020 Wayne Area Economic Development Annual Banquet, held on Jan. 26 at the Beaumont Event and Concert Hall. The Wayne Area Economic Special Events Committee planned a "Swinging into the 20s" theme to celebrate the work of the organization and community prosperity during the past year.

Social Hour entertainment was provided by Wayne State College student-musicians. Guests were escorted to their reserved tables by members of the Wayne Ambassadors. Silent auction items, donated by area businesses, were on display with the auction funding the annual Band Day scholarship and a new Business scholarship to Wayne State College. In total, the silent auction brought in \$2,613 for the two scholarships.

Following the meal of a garden salad, gourmet mac-n-cheese, fingerling potatoes,

savory green beans, roast beef with gravy and chicken cutlets, Randy Bargholz entertained the crowd by auctioning off 24 desserts that were created and donated by talented bakers. Funds from the auction will be used to assist with the new City of Wayne initiative for public art. Bidders were very generous and \$3,945 was raised.

The highlight of the evening was the announcement of the special awards.

The Most Valuable Patron Award is awarded annually to recognize an individual, business or organization that has significantly supported Wayne Area Economic Development throughout the year. The Most Valuable Patron Award went to Northeast Nebraska Public Health Department.

While business retention and recruitment are major tenants of economic development, community development, or offer-

ing/encouraging the highest quality of life for area residents, is equally important. Many organizations, activities and individuals contribute to the high quality of life in Wayne, but one organization that quite literally works towards a higher quality of life for area residents: the Northeast Nebraska Public Health Department.

As the NNPHD website states, "Public Health workers make the whole community healthier by promoting health and wellness and preventing illness and injury through information, education, programs and services to the public." NNPHD has done this by:

- working to stop epidemics and the spread of diseases with West Nile testing and mumps response;

- protecting against health hazards and preventing injuries with Radon test kits;

- supporting and encouraging healthy lifestyles and good mental health and improving the quality and access to health-care services by helping update the Community Health Improvement Plan, which lead to new initiatives tackling behavioral health and obesity;

- responding to disasters and helping communities get back to normal after a disaster with Economic Recovery Workshops, Vigilant Vanguard planning, etcetera;

- housing the Caring Connections Coalition, which provides services and assistance to those with the greatest need;

- serving as a resource connector.

Luke Virgil, WAED executive director,

noted their roles in emergency management, health and safety in the community.

The Business of the Year Award celebrates business success as well as community involvement by the owners/management, the employees and the business itself. The Wayne Area Economic Development Business of the Year Award went to 1st Realty Sales and Management broker/owner Anne Nolte.

1st Realty Sales and Management might be one of the first businesses people see when they move to town. Founded in the late 1990s, this office and its employees have been fixtures of Wayne. Nolte has been a long-time member and was the

## Local residents listen to needs of Wayne Community Schools

A group of more than 20 members from throughout the community listened to information on the current status of the facilities and student enrollment at Wayne Community Schools and the possible options for updates in the future.

This information was presented by Wayne Community Schools Superintendent Dr. Mark Lenihan during a brown bag lunch at the school on Tuesday (Jan. 28).

"Overall, our facilities are in good condition. We need to take care of what we have and this is a continual work in progress," Lenihan said.

Lenihan shared information on the enrollment numbers at the school and recent trends, and told his audience "as education changes, needs change. We want to stay on top of educational trends."

Enrollment statistics show a steady increase in enrollment at Wayne Community Schools. District enrollment has increased by 120 students since 2012 and is at nearly 1,000 students at the present time.

He presented pictures of the current facilities, including the elementary school, which was built in 1908, the high school, which was built in 1965 and the early learning center, which is leased by the school district.

Lenihan discussed current shortcomings with each of these facilities and listed new programs that have been added to the district in recent years.

The list of shortcomings included lack of space for physical education and after school activities in the current high school gym and the use of that gym for concerts due to lack of seating in the current lecture hall. Also on the list was the fact that some of the science labs are outdated and the science department is not located together in the school. Because of growth in the number of students taking classes, the

art room size is insufficient to meet the needs of the students.

The elementary school has been renovated and additions made in 2003 and 2010 and current classroom sizes are good but additional classrooms may be needed if

current enrollment trends continue.

Lenihan told those in attendance that state fire codes require kindergartners and first grade students to be on the lowest level of the building.

Other areas of concern at the elementa-

ry school are parking, lunch room size and the fact that growth of the special education and English language departments has limited space for expansion.

The school currently leases the building that houses the Early Learning Center. The center is located on Providence Road, approximately one mile from the other district buildings.

Concerns with the Early Learning Center brought up during Tuesday's gathering included the fact that it is not located near the rest of the school campus, the safety and security of those at the center, technology access to the rest of the district's network and rental costs of approximately \$60,000 per year.

A portion of his presentation included the findings from a recent facility study, which was completed by Carlson West Povondra Architects in the fall of 2019.

Included as possible options for the district moving forward were a new early learning center, owned by the district, that could also provide space for kindergarten students, additions to the junior-senior high school and a new high school.

Cost estimates ranged from approximately \$2 million to add four classrooms on the east side of the high school to \$7 - \$8.5 million for construction of an early learning facility to \$40 to \$45 million to purchase land and construct a new high school.

Lenihan emphasized that the district has made no decision on how to proceed or which, if any, of these options will be pursued.

He asked for volunteers from the audience to sign up to be a part of a community group to look at these options closer and determine priorities for the district.

"Wayne is a popular place to live and we need to provide a quality education for those students who live here," Lenihan said.

Following Lenihan's 45 minute presentation a number of questions from the au-

dience were answered.

These included questions on enrollment from when the high school was built to see if any trends could be determined, use of Wayne State College and/or the Wayne City Auditorium and possible mergers with other area schools.

professional mentor. Future City is a project-based program for junior high students which provides them with the opportunity to solve future city problems using the engineering design process.

The challenge this year for Future City teams was to create a city at least 100 years in the future that has a resilient, safe drinking water supply. The team researched locations around the world that had unsafe or diminishing drinking water supplies and chose Mexico as the location for their Future City, Ciudad de Oportunidad (City of Opportunity).

The team addressed poor water quality due to contaminants and leaking pipes with new futuris-

tic innovations. As part of their research, the team was given a tour of Wayne's water systems and wastewater systems by Casey Junk in the fall. This helped the team to understand how a city's water system works.

After creating virtual cities on SimCity software and learning about many of the components of running a thriving city, the team wrote a city essay about la Ciudad de Oportunidad and their innovative solutions. Then they built a 50" by 25" by 20" scale model of their city using recyclable materials.

Hanau, Calhoon and Ibarra wrote and performed a skit about la Ciudad de Oportunidad and the model. All elements of the Future City curriculum: virtual city, city essay, model, project plan, and presentation are judged in the

competition. Meeting twice a week after school, the team worked from September to January in preparation for the regional competition.

"This has been a wonderful team to work with. They designed a really nice city that is futuristic, while also designing a city that stayed true to its culture and recognized the importance of family," said Tompkins. "One of the best things about the regional competition was how all of the team members were complimentary of one another and appreciative of each team member's contributions. I think that made an impression on the judges."

The Wayne Junior High Future City team would like to thank their mentors: James Tompkins, Wieseler, Westphal and Brodersen for all of their help in preparing for the competition.

# Area teams battle in Lewis & Clark, Oakland-Craig meets

It was a busy week for the three area Lewis & Clark Conference schools involved in wrestling, as all three teams saw each other in their conference tournament and at Saturday's Oakland-Craig Invitational.

On Thursday, the area teams competed in the Lewis & Clark Conference tournament in Osmond, and Quad County Northeast came away with runner-up honors, finishing a distant second to defending Class D state champion Plainview in the eight-team race.

The Blaze had 10 medalists in the meet, led by runner-up finishes from Colby Wathor (170) and Fischer Carson (285). Thirds went to Tie Hollandsworth (145), Nolan Ohlrich (152), Levi Jackson (182), and

Kolby Casey (195). Fourths were earned by Ajay Gubbels (160) and Israel Vance (182).

Winside finished sixth in the team race and had seven medalists, led by runner-up finishes from Cayden Ellis (113), Art Escalante (132) and Gabe Escalante (138). Matthew Frederick (126), Maddox Magwire (132) and Mason Topp (170) finished third.

Wakefield/Allen was seventh overall and had six top-four finishes. Caleb Chase (120) and Wyatt Verzani (145) were second, Mitchell Fischer was third at 160 and Gabe Reinert (138), Cole Verzani (152) and Austin Gregerson (285) finished fourth.

On Saturday, the three teams competed in the Oakland-Craig Invitational. Winside placed sixth out of 18 teams with the Trojans finishing 13th and the Blaze two points and two spots behind the Trojans.

Winside had two champs and a runner-up at Saturday's meet. Ellis and Art Escalante finished first in their respective weights, while

Gabe Escalante was a runner-up at 138.

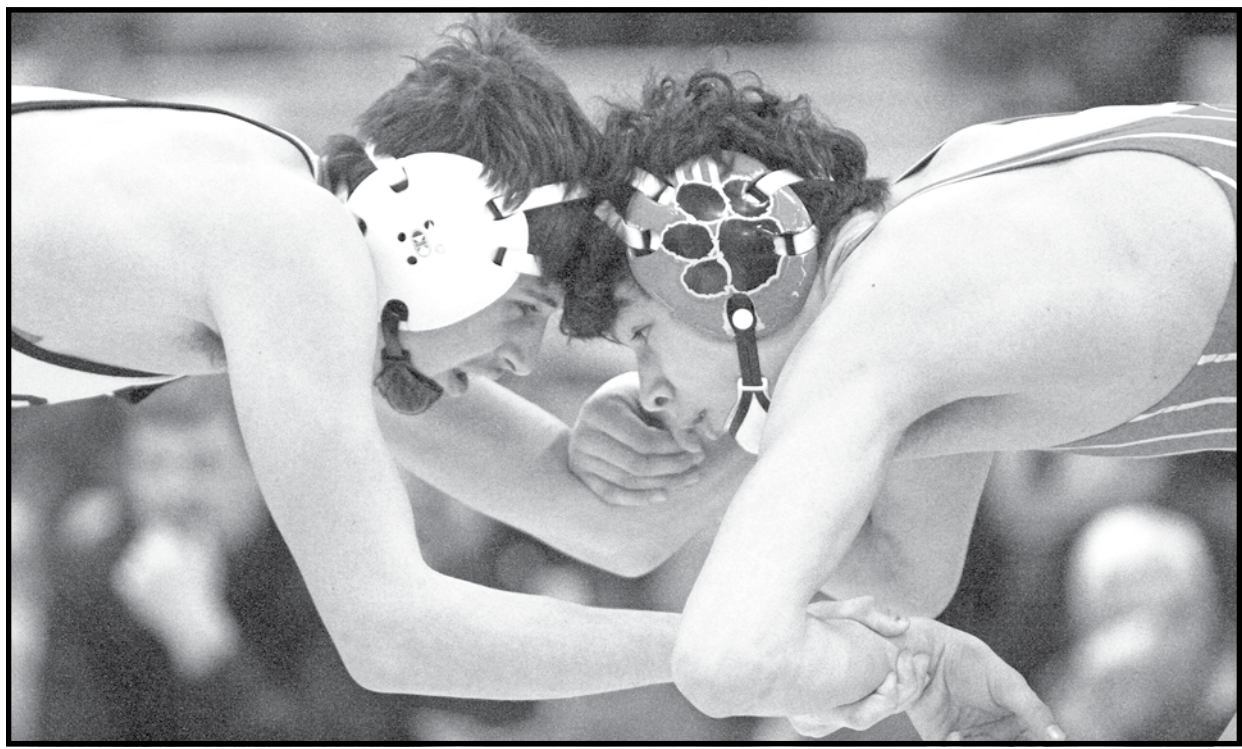
Hollandsworth finished third to lead QCNE, while Chase paced the Trojans with a fourth-place finish.

The Wayne State College softball team was picked 16th in the 2020 NSIC Preseason Softball Coaches Poll.

The Wildcats returns four starters in the field along with two starting pitchers from last year's team that was 15-32 overall and placed 15th in the NSIC with a 6-24 league mark.

Augustana, the defending NCAA Division II National Champion, was listed as the team to beat in the NSIC this season, receiving 223 points and 13 first place votes. Winona State followed in second place

She recorded a 5-14 record with seven complete games, two shutouts and two saves in the circle with a 5.55 ERA and a team high 51 strikeouts.

Wayne State is scheduled to open the 2020 season on Friday, Feb. 14 at the Arkansas Monticello/8-State Classic in Bentonville, Ark., playing Henderson State (Ark.) and Southwest Baptist.

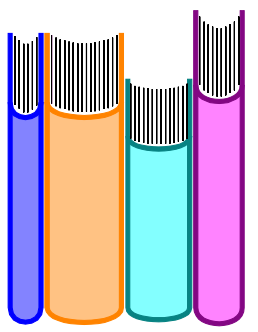
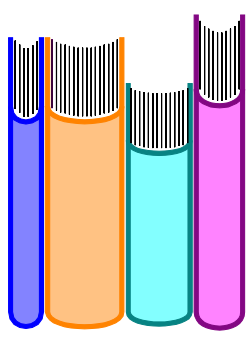

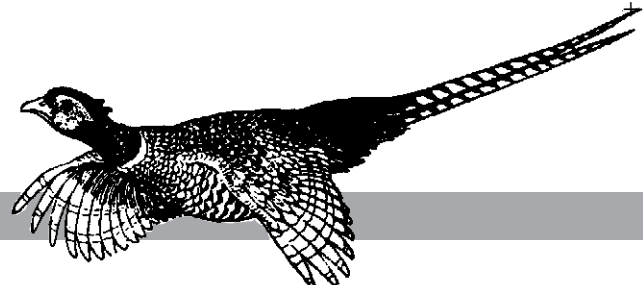

## February is Nebraska 4-H Month School Lunches

February is Nebraska 4-H Month and in Wayne County, Feb. 1 is the initial sign-up for 4-H Club members ages 8-18 years of age as of Dec. 31, 2019 and 4-H Clover Kid members, five to seven years of age by Dec. 31, 2019.

A 4-H Club is an organized group of at least five youth from three different families who meet regularly with adult volunteers or 4-H staff for a long-term, progressive series of educational experiences. The purpose of a 4-H club is to provide positive youth development and foster educational opportunities to meet the needs of young people.

In Wayne County, we have 10 traditional clubs. These clubs are encouraged to recite the 4-H Pledge at meetings, meet at least six times per year, choose/elect youth officers, and have youth serve in leadership roles.

Other things that are encouraged

of the 4-H club is to have one club project that is related to 4-H curriculum in which they do together. 4-H clubs have an adult role model involvement, and are facilitated by organizational and project leaders who have successfully completed the volunteer screening.

4-H clubs are also encouraged to have members who perform a presentation or public speaking opportunity at the club level or above. The also complete one community service project and have members who participate in county, district, or state events. It is also important for clubs to celebrate member and club achievements.

Some 4-Hers are designated as independent members. This is designed for planned learning that occurs independently of a formal group setting. This may be an individual, paired, or family learning effort. For many youths, their expo-

sure to 4-H experiences and learning materials comes through activities conducted either within their family or an independent membership. Independent membership is for youth ages 8-18 as of Dec. 31, 2019.

The 4-H Clover Kid program is designed specifically for youth ages five through seven. The program offers a variety of educational and recreational experiences in non-competitive environments. These opportunities are ideal for developing confidence, creativity, and competence during this stage of youth development.

The 4-H Clover Kid program in Wayne County begins meeting on the first Saturday of the month, beginning in November and December and continuing February through May. They meet at the courthouse and registration is

required so that appropriate supplies are on hand. They then have a day camp in June at the park.

The focus of each of their Clover Kid meetings is to learn about a specific project or theme, and then participate in a variety of activities relating to the topic/project. They are encouraged to explore project areas and can compete in some county 4-H events as they become familiar with the program.

An example of an event that they could participate in, is the 4-H Public Speaking Contest.

The Wayne County Teen Supremes serve as the facilitators of the 4-H Clover Kids. This also allows the teens to strengthen their own leadership skills and explore potential career options.

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# LENRD board learns about the Northeast Nebraska Growing Together Initiative

In 2018, the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) board of directors approved a motion to fund a portion of the riverfront development project to revitalize downtown Norfolk, paving the way for a brighter future for Northeast Nebraska.

At their January meeting, former state senator Mike Flood, and Norfolk mayor Josh Moening updated the LENRD board on their \$1 million investment to the riverfront project. The two also summarized the goals of the Northeast Nebraska Growing Together initiative, explaining the history and future of population loss in the area and how to change the downward trend. The Aksarben Foundation has organized and funded the initiative.

## NDA hemp plan approved by USDA

The Nebraska Department of Agriculture (NDA) has been notified that the state's hemp plan was approved by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA).

"Now that NDA has an approved state hemp plan in place, we can begin issuing licenses for the commercial cultivation, processing, handling and brokering of industrial hemp in Nebraska," said NDA Director Steve Wellman.

The deadline to submit the reports to the LENRD is Dec. 1 of each year. The board also elected officers for 2020.

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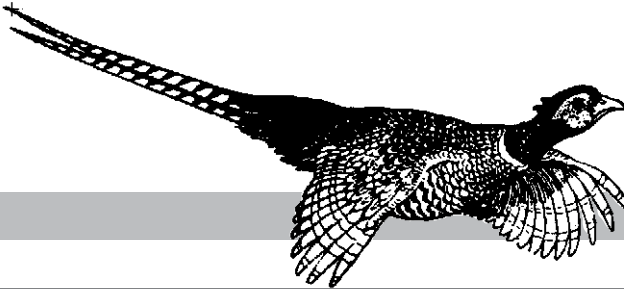
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## Remembering the Holocaust survivors

## Commercial/noncommercial pesticide training opportunities continue to grow in 2020

Pesticide safety is at the heart of more than four dozen January-April training sessions throughout Nebraska, offered in multiple formats for commercial/noncommercial pesticide applicators to become certified or recertified.

Awareness and knowledge about pesticides are important, said Clyde Ogg, Nebraska Extension educator who leads training and the Pesticide Safety Education Program (PSEP) at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

"Applicators bear the burden to responsibly use pesticides and document their use," Ogg said. "Knowledge and training help applicators keep current on products, methods and technology."

Commercial applicators are those using RUPs; and GUPs when making applications in lawn care or structural settings, for hire or compensation. Noncommercial applicators are those applying these same pesticides to sites owned by their employer, or for a governmental agency or political subdivision of the state.

Separate training also is required prior to using paraquat and RUP dicamba.

"The label is the law," Ogg said. "The label is a legal document so it is the applicator's responsibility to read and comply with ALL label directions, even if they've used that same product before."

Labels can change without warning due to updates in formulations or research. The result could be changes such as requiring respirators, longer restricted-entry interval, protecting a new wildlife species or a new rate of application.

PSEP conducts pesticide safety and RUP dicamba training; the Nebraska Department of Agriculture (NDA) issues three-year licenses for

following locations; exams are conducted at the end of sessions.

- Columbus: Platte County Courthouse, 2610 14th Street, Tuesday, Feb. 25;
- Norfolk: Madison County Extension Office, 1305 S. 13th St., Tuesday, Feb. 4, Tuesday, Feb. 25 and Tuesday, March 17;
- O'Neill: Holt County Annex, 128 N. Sixth St., Suite 100, Thursday, April 16.

Once certification is attained in the commercial classification, NDA issues a license for an additional \$90 fee. There is no charge for a noncommercial license.

**Recertification Training**

Commercial/noncommercial applicators whose licenses expire in April 2020 may recertify at an on-site Extension video training session in February-March.

In 2020 approximately 3,500 commercial/noncommercial applicators - such as fumigators, lawn care workers, exterminators and others - need to be recertified. For individual applicator license status, see [kellysolutions.com/](http://kellysolutions.com/) or call NDA at (402) 471-2351. Applicators whose licenses have expired must retest.

### FieldReveal -Digging Deeper

Variable population seeding has been a hot topic in precision ag circles for several years now. Our planter manufacturers have offered variable rate (VR) drives for quite some time. Ag retailers were not always able to provide prescriptions for VR seeding, which pushed many dealers to bring in their own agronomists to provide this service. At Central Valley Ag, we embraced this technology as soon as it became accepted on the equipment side. We have even offered our own equipment upgrades through third parties like Ag Leader to retrofit older planters for variable-rate seeding.



Building a VR seeding prescription is not something that should be done in a vacuum. An Agronomist should have a good understanding of past yield variation, soil attributes such as soil pH, soil texture, slope of the field area, depth of topsoil, and soil fertility levels. The Agronomist also needs to understand the corn hybrids or soybean varieties being considered by the grower for that field.

The logic that goes into a VR seeding corn prescription is usually quite different than the way we approach variable population soybean prescriptions. In a VR corn prescription, we will look at yield attributes such as actual yield, soil type, and slope and then vary population to better match potential yield. When yield potential is higher, we increase the seeding rate. This allows us to produce more corn ears in an area that can support more corn kernels while maintaining kernel weight and not aborting kernels. When yield potential is lower, we lower the seeding rate to reduce plant competition and stress from neighboring plants. Before building this prescription, we need to consider the hybrid and make sure we understand the ear flex of that hybrid as well as the potential problems with standability when populations increase.

When making variable population soybean prescriptions, the thinking is a little different. In good yielding, highly productive areas of the field soybeans tend to bush out and may produce higher yields at slightly lower populations. In poor yielding, high plant stress areas, you often need to plant more soybeans to make up for smaller plants with more plants per acre. This also helps to hasten crop canopy in poorer areas reducing weed competition later in the season.
