Local residents listen to needs of Wayne Community Schools

A group of more than 20 members from throughout the community listened to information on the current status of the facilities and student enrollment at Wayne Community Schools and the possible options for updates in the future.

This information was presented by

Wayne Community Schools Superintendent Dr. Mark Lenihan during a brown bag lunch at the school on Tuesday (Jan.

"Overall, our facilities are in good condition. We need to take care of what we have and this is a continual work in progress,"

Lenihan shared information on the enrollment numbers at the school and recent trends, and told his audience "as education changes, needs change. We want to stay on top of educational trends."

Enrollment statistics show a steady increase in enrollment at Wayne Community Schools. District enrollment has increased by 120 students since 2012 and is at nearly 1,000 students at the present time.

He presented pictures of the current facilities, including the elementary school, which was built in 1908, the high school, which was built in 1965 and the early learning center, which is leased by the school district.

Lenihan discussed current shortcomings with each of these facilities and listed new programs that have been added to the district in recent years.

The list of shortcomings included lack of space for physical education and after school activities in the current high school gym and the use of that gym for concerts due to lack of seating in the current lecture hall. Also on the list was the fact that some of the science labs are outdated and the science department is not located together in the school. Because of growth in the number of students taking classes, the

has limited space for expansion. The school currently leases the building that houses the Early Learning Center. The center is located on Providence Road, approximately one mile from the other district buildings.

Concerns with the Early Learning Center brought up during Tuesday's gathering included the fact that it is not located near the rest of the school campus, the safety and security of those at the center, technology access to the rest of the district's network and rental costs of approximately \$60,000 per year.

A portion of his presentation included the findings from a recent facility study, which was completed by Carlson West Povondra Architects in the fall of 2019.

Included as possible options for the district moving forward were a new early learning center, owned by the district, that could also provide space for kindergarten students, additions to the junior-senior high school and a new high school.

Cost estimates ranged from approximately \$2 million to add four classrooms on the east side of the high school to \$7 - \$8.5 million for construction of an early learning facility to \$40 to \$45 million to purchase land and construct a new high

Lenihan emphasized that the district has made no decision on how to proceed or which, if any, of these options will be pur-

He asked for volunteers from the audience to sign up to be a part of a community group to look at these options closer and

determine priorities for the district. "Wayne is a popular place to live and we need to provide a quality education for those students who live here," Lenihan

Following Lenihan's 45 minute presentation a number of questions from the au-

These included questions on enrollment from when the high school was built to see if any trends could be determined, use of Wayne State College and/or the Wayne City Auditorium and possible mergers with other area schools.

An honest look at marijuana Capitol View

The big marijuana industry grew to \$13.6 billion in 2019, and marijuana lobbyists are eagerly looking to cash in on new markets. They're pouring big money into shaping public opinion on marijuana across the nation. To avoid regulation, the industry wants to persuade people that the drug is not only harmless, but can be safely used as a medicine to relieve pain.

Nebraskans shouldn't be dazed and confused by these well-funded sales tactics. Marijuana is an illegal drug according to federal law. It's illegal because medical experts have determined, on the basis of solid scientific evidence, that the drug is harmful. It's also illegal because public officials have recognized the social costs and dangers of marijuana use.

Don't take my word for it. All you have to do is read the latest data and research coming from states that are expanding marijuana use.

First, states that have legalized marijuana, like Colorado and Oregon, have seen a spike in car accidents due to "drugged drivers." Marijuana makes drivers less alert, slower to react, and poorer judges of their surroundings. Marijuana is the drug most likely to be present in the body of drivers fatally injured in a crash. According to an American Academy of Pediatrics report this month, "more than 9 percent of drivers ages 16-20 admit to having driven under the influence of marijuana." Drugged driving is also extremely difficult to enforce, as there are no simple ways to test drivers for drug-impairment. Approving marijuana use, even for so-called medical purposes, will only make this problem worse.

Second, legalizing marijuana sends the wrong message to young people. It communicates that a dangerous drug is nothing to worry about. However, medical science and the human cost of legalization say otherwise. Studies have shown that using marijuana in adolescence causes long-term damage to important cognitive abilities. This is troubling since 23 percent of 12th grade students (nationally) report having used marijuana within the past month. Marijuana use impairs memory, shortens attention spans, and hinders learning. Marijuana use also increases depression, thoughts of suicide, and suicidal behaviors among young adults.

The data is reflected in real life tories. Levi Pongi, age 19, died after consuming a marijuana cookie and jumping off a balcony. Marc Bullard, age 23, committed suicide after he began using a concentrated form of marijuana. He had no previous history of depression. These stories reflect data from Colorado showing that the number of youth suicides with marijuana present has tripled in 10 years.

Third, marijuana is far more potent and addictive today than it was in previous generations. Prior to the 1990s, marijuana typically had less than 2 percent THC (the chemical causing the psychoactive effect of the drug). However, growers have bred strains of marijuana to enhance THC content, much like tobacco companies increased the nicotine levels of their products to heighten their addictiveness.



While the industry tries to frame pot as a natural remedy akin to Essential Oils, modern weed is bioengineered to pack a potent punch. Popular strains of marijuana sold in Colorado now have between 17-28 percent THC content, or 14 times as potent as marijuana prior to the 1990s. Other marijuanabased products, such as edibles, have THC concentrations as high as 80-90 percent. There's nothing natural about that. As a result of this change, marijuana users are now more likely to experience psychotic episodes or uncontrollable vomiting. These disorders endanger the public, and they also put a strain on healthcare resources like mental health centers and emergency rooms.

Fourth, the nation's top medical professional has gone on the record to remind Americans that there is no such thing as "medical marijuana." U.S. Surgeon General Jerome Adams recently highlighted marijuana's danger to the developing brain and how potent marijuana has become. In a speech last year, he noted that one in five pregnant women in California is using marijuana. He also pointed out that marijuana has over 100 components, and, while some of them may have medical benefits, that they need to be studied just like any other pharmaceutical.

In Nebraska, marijuana proponents have been trying to circumvent the medical research process that has helped our country produce the most safe and effective healthcare in the world. This is the wrong approach. We should stick with the tried-and-true system, which is already doing research on $Legislative\ Update$ with the tried-and-true system, thorough research and extended clinical trials, the FDA has approved four medications that contain specific cannabinoids—chemicals found within the marijuana plant. All of these FDA-approved medicines are already available in all 50 states to patients with a doctor's prescription. They don't need to be legalized.

As Governor, I have a duty to promote public safety. I want Nebraskans to be informed of the dangers of marijuana and to know where I stand on the issue. I firmly oppose legislative legalization and will veto any legislation that attempts to make marijuana use lawful in the Cornhusker State. Open the history books and pencil in -LB974 of 2020, property tax relief proposal

From the folks who brought you LB775 in 1987, LB1059 in 1990 and LB840 in 1991, comes another contender for a household word, LB974.

That's the Nebraska Legislature Revenue Committee's 2020 plan to reduce local property taxes by increasing state aid to schools. Six committee members are sponsoring the bill. Omaha Republican Sen. John McCollister and Bellevue Democrat Sen. Sue Crawford declined. Speaker of the Legislature Jim Scheer of Norfolk wanted the bill on the fast track early in the session, eschewing the practice of saving major proposals until the fi-

Week three at your legislature got even busier, with session until noon and committee hearings all around the Capitol beginning at 1:30.

The final day to introduce bills was Jan. 23. There have been 482 new bills introduced in the 2020 session, bringing the total number of bills introduced in the 106th legislature to

The Legislature heard from Chief Justice Heavican about the State of the Judiciary. He described the many accomplishments the courts have made over the past year to provide everyone in Nebraska greater access to the courts. Part of the Supreme Court's practice, for instance, is to hold oral arguments in each of the law schools in the state. The court now also includes rural Nebraska by holding oral arguments at high schools like South Sioux City High School, where the Supreme Court met on November 1, 2019. The Chief Justice also discussed improvements in the juvenile justice system. I am proud to have taken part in those improvements through LB595 that I introduced in 2019. LB595, provides for an emphasis on restorative justice under the Dispute Resolution Act. The Chief Justice informed the legislature that the law has already helped over 300 youth and their families.

LB768, which I introduced on the first day of the 2020 session, was the first bill heard in the Transportation and Telecommunication Committee on Jan. 21. LB 768 provides for an annual update to harmonize Nebraska law with federal regulations related to commercial motor vehicles and odometer readings, and motor carrier licensure, etc. A 49-page document addressing changes in 33 sections, the committee was provided with a summary of the changes and heard testimony regarding the update and had questions answered by Rhonda Lahm, Director of the Department of Motor Vehicles and Captain Gerald Krolikowski of the Nebraska State Patrol. I anticipate that the bill will be voted out of committee and advance to the floor soon.

On Thursday, I introduced LB1167, which would require that members of



State Senator, District 17 the public be allowed an opportunity to speak at any meeting of a governing body that is subject to the Open Meetings Act. It would still allow governing bodies to make reasonable rules concerning the timing and length of each member of the public's testimony but would require that the public have opportunity to be heard at every meeting. I feel strongly that elected officials at all levels should be accountable to constituents and should be willing, and in fact required, to hear from members of the public who have an interest in policies involving how they are governed and how their tax dollars are being spent.

The big news of the week was the introduction of LB974 addressing Property Tax Relief. LB974, in its current form, provides a 3-year plan that will result in sustainable relief by reducing property taxes without period. adding any new taxes.

The bill:

·No new taxes. Uses \$520 million in the budget to increase State aid to schools and reduce school funding reliance on local property taxes. The \$520 million is already available in the budget based upon projections that consider the revenue growth of the state at the past historical rate of 4.0 to 4.5 percent.

·Per pupil funding. Increases the percentage of school funding provided by the State, reducing the burden of local property owners and provides per pupil funding so that every school district in the State receives State funding for its schools, whether urban or rural.

 Reduces valuation subject to taxation. Reduces the amount of property valuations available to be taxed by school district levies from 75 percent to 55 percent over the three years for agricultural and horticultural properties and from 100 percent to 85 percent for residential and commercial properties during the same period. Since 2008, property valuations have increased nearly 80 percent and property taxes levied have increased approximately 54 percent, while the average income of Nebraskans has risen

· Caps school spending increases at the Consumer Price Index (CPI) plus real growth. 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Commercial/noncommercial pesticide training opportunities continue to grow in 2020

Pesticide safety is at the heart of more than four dozen January-April training sessions throughout Nebraska, offered in multiple formats for commercial/noncommercial pesticide applicators to become certified or recertified.

Awareness and knowledge about pesticides are important, said Clyde Ogg, Nebraska Extension educator who leads training and the Pesticide Safety Education Program (PSEP) at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

"Applicators bear the burden to responsibly use pesticides and document their use," Ogg said. "Knowledge and training help applicators keep current on products, methods and technology.'

Commercial applicators are those using RUPs; and GUPs when making applications in lawn care or structural settings, for hire or compensation. Noncommercial applicators are those applying these same pesticides to sites owned by their employer, or for a governmental agency or political subdivision of

Separate training also is required prior to using paraguat and RUP

"The label is the law," Ogg said. "The label is a legal document so it is the applicator's responsibility to read and comply with ALL label disame product before.'

Labels can change without warning due to updates in formulations or research. The result could be changes such as requiring respirators, longer restricted-entry interval, protecting a new wildlife spe-

cies or a new rate of application. PSEP conducts pesticide safety and RUP dicamba training; the Nebraska Department of Agriculture (NDA) issues three-year licenses for

FieldReveal - Digging Deeper

Variable population seeding has been a hot topic in precision ag circles for several years now. Our planter manufacturers have offered variable rate (VR) drives for quite some time. Ag retailers were not always able to provide prescriptions for VR seeding, which pushed many dealers to bring in their own agronomists to provide this service. At Central Valley Ag, we embraced this technology as soon as it became accepted on the equipment side. We have even offered our own equipment upgrades through third parties like Ag Leader to retrofit older planters for variable-rate seeding.

Building a VR seeding prescription is not something that should be done in a vacuum. An Agronomist should have a good understanding of past yield variation, soil attributes such as soil pH, soil texture, slope of the field area, depth of topsoil, and soil fertility levels. The Agronomist also needs to understand the corn hybrids or soybean varieties being considered by the grower for that field.

The logic that goes into a VR seeding corn prescription is usually quite different than the way we approach variable population soybean prescriptions. In a VR corn prescription, we will look at yield attributes such as actual yield, soil type, and slope and then vary population to better match potential yield. When yield potential is higher, we increase the seeding rate. This allows us to produce more corn ears in an area that can support more corn kernels while maintaining kernel weight and not aborting kernels. When yield potential is lower, we lower the seeding rate to reduce plant competition and stress from neighboring plants. Before building this prescription, we need to consider the hybrid and make sure we understand the ear flex of that hybrid as well as the potential problems with standability when populations increase.

When making variable population soybean prescriptions, the thinking is a little different. In good yielding, highly productive areas of the field soybeans tend to bush out and may produce higher yields at slightly lower populations. In poor yielding, high plant stress areas, you often need to plant more soybeans to make up for smaller plants with more plants per acre. This also helps to hasten crop canopy in poorer areas reducing weed competition later in the season.
