

Wakefield City Council meets

Wakefield's city council met to discus rezoning, street projects and more on Feb. 12. A public hearing was held for rezoning

City-owned real estate, specifically lots 1, 2 and 3 in the Industrial Tract, from I1 Industrial to C2-General Commercial. The change to C2 would allow both residential housing and commercial properties on

"Since we can't find any other ground and there seems to be a need for apartments. we'll vote to change that," Wakefield mayor Paul Eaton said.

One of those lots is in discussion for a small apartment complex that would alleviate some of the town's housing shortage. There was some discussion from council members about whether it was worth green-lighting two apartment buildings instead of one in the area.

"We're having trouble finding property in City Limits. I think that's our only place to put an apartment out there, and since we're doing one lot out there we might as well," council member Larry Soderberg said.

Council member Ross Hansen was in favor of waiting to see how one apartment project would go. After discussion, the council voted to pass an ordinance to rezone and waived the three readings.

Steve Harris Construction, out of Homer, was awarded a \$426,669.28 bid for the Michener Street Paving Project. The bids came in well under estimates. Harris Construction will add sidewalks to the east side between Michener and 7th and 8th Streets. While there had been no pre-construction meeting at the time of the city council meeting, a representative said an April start

The council voted unanimously to approve the hiring of a manager at Wakefield's Civic Center. Currently, the plan is to hire a manager to work roughly 10 hours per week at a rate around \$15 per hour. Their responsibility would be to help with booking, upkeep and organization.

"We as a (Civic Center) board feel like we need to have someone in charge of the Civic Center," council member Val Bard said.

After long discussion, ordinances to amend the number of CRA and Park Board members was tabled. Eaton also voiced a desire to appoint different members of the Park Board and change the board's responsibilities, in addition to updating city ordinances involving boards and committees. Those topics will be discussed at a later

The Wakefield Community School Board met on Wednesday Feb 12 to discuss upcoming projects as well as recent changes.

The board approved a budget of spending no more than \$20,000 for professional services related to the completion of the track and football complex to begin the process of pre-planning. The district would like to add restrooms, concession stand, a press box and more to be able to play football games on the school's campus. The school is also looking into the possibility of having a turn field. At the January meeting, the board approved applying for grant funding for the project. The \$20,000 would go towards

planning expenses. An administrative request for 2 p.m. dis-

Council learns of city's financial audit

Although there are steps that can be taken to make it better, the city of Wayne is overall in good financial health."

This is what Kyle Overturf with Almquist, Maltzahm, Galloway & Luth, PC. told the Wayne City Council as he shared information on the city's financial situation.

Overturf went through a number of categories and discussed where Wayne sits in comparison to other cities of similar size.

He noted that the city has seen less sales

tax revenue than its peer groups and noted one-year plan. These are the construction that focusing on economic growth to bring

in revenue would be beneficial. The city's cash reserves are nearly at the targeted level, but may need to be increased for future projects.

"There needs to be a balancing act between what present taxpayers are paying and what future taxpayers will need to be

paying," Overturf said. The city also approved the one and sixyear street improvement plan as presented



24. She was 19 at the time and took over the care of her three younger siblings for a year prior to the family splitting up the children. She had worked for different families doing housekeeping and caring for people. The last and longest was with John and Winfred Carhart following the death of her parents. She attended grade school at District 51 west of Wayne and graduated from the eighth grade on June 7, 1934. In 1964 she took her GED test and graduated from Lincoln High School and through the Manpower Training Act, attended Business College in Lincoln and earned a degree in Business

Eveline married Harold E. Thompson on May 8, 1944 at Shreveport, La., where they lived until he went overseas serving in the United States Air Force. At that time, Eveline returned to Wayne. She worked at the Ben Franklin Store as a clerk starting in 1944, the Gamble Store from 1953-1959, until the clothing department discontinued, Marra Home Improvement Store 1959-1960, Jack & Jill Grocery Store, Safeway Grocery Store in Wayne, both from 1960-1961 part time, Wayne Hospital 1962-1963 and last as a bookkeeper at Wayne State College from 1964 until her retirement in 1980.

Eveline was a member of the Theophilus Church and was baptized in 1918. She was confirmed Aug. 14, 1932 and started teaching Sunday school soon afterward. She was a member of Our Savior Lutheran Church and was a member of the Lutheran Women of the Church and served as President from 1953-1956. During her term, the original building (northern section) of the current St. Paul Lutheran Church was built. Going to District meetings and Department Conventions each year for the three main auxiliary branches was always a highlight for Eveline.

Eveline dedicated her life to honor the veterans of our nation: She was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary Llewellyn B. Whitmore Post #5291, since 1946 and was a Charter member. She served as President, Secretary and then was Treasurer for 30 years of Unit 5291. She served as District Eight President from 1950 to 1952 and again from 1956 to 1958. Eveline was District Three Treasurer for 25 years. Eveline was a member of The American Legion Auxiliary starting in

1949 with the Irwin L. Sears Unit 43 and served as President, Secretary, and was Treasurer for 46 years, of the Wayne unit. She was District Three President from 1977 to 1979, and served as Department Historian for two years, and was on County Government committee for eight year;

Eveline was adopted as "Mom" for the Sons of The American Legion in June 27, 2015, for the Detachment of Nebraska and the Official Mom for the National Officers on Sept. 22, 2018, for the Sons of The American

Eveline was a past President of S.W.A.Y., which means "Service men, we appreciate you." Eveline was a member of 8/40 Madison County La-Petit Salon 410 since 1981 and served as LaPetit Chapeau 1988 to 1990. Eveline was a member of Gold Star Wives of America, North Central Region at Large, and Life member. She was a member of the Disabled American Veterans Auxiliary Wayne County Unit #28 starting in 1985 and became a Life member. She was Commander from 1990 to present. She also has served on the Department financial committee and many other committees. Eveline was a representative for some of the organizations at the Norfolk Veterans home for many years. She was recognized as the Volunteer of the year on April 16, 2000.

future, including the work on Pine Heights and 10th Street which is scheduled to be completed in 2021 with grant funding.

He explained that projects can be moved around on the plan with council approval, and projects added or deleted as necessary, but a plan is required to be in place for the city to receive state funding.

Wayne Public Library Director Heather Headley presented an update to the council on library events taking place in the last fiscal year. Headley said the library has

seen "lots of good growth and an increase in the number of people we are serving. There have been major increases in the number of downloadable resources." She told council members the

library completed a community needs assessment study as a requirement for accreditation. The accreditation was received in December and is good for five years.

Among the needs listed on the survey was need for physical and mental health resources. In conjunction with this need, the library has implemented a time for students to come to the library to color and relax.

A request for stop signs at several locations on Sixth Street was presented to council members during Tuesday's meeting.

Robbie Gamble, who lives in the area, and Council member Terri Buck, asked the council to consider putting stop signs at Sixth and Windom Streets and Sixth and Nebraska Street.

Both Gamble and Buck said they have witnessed a number of "close calls" and Gamble said his family was involved in an accident when another driver did not obey the yield sign.

"This is a daily thing on this street. People are going to get hurt," Gamble said.

Discussion was held on the amount of traffic on Sixth Street and the need to re-route these drivers to Fourth Street.

Council members agreed to bring an ordinance forward which would put stop signs on Sixth

Street at Windom Street. Agreement among the council was that the city wait until the Nebraska Street construction project is completed before re-visiting the issues of stop signs at Sixth and Nebraska Streets.

The issue will be discussed at a future council meeting.

Approval was given for the renewal of an inter-local agreement with Wayne County and the Wayne County Library Association. This involves the libraries in Wayne, Winside and Carroll.

Council members voted to authorize the city administrator to apply for Nebraska Public Transportation Act funds for the operation of the Wayne Public Transportation system.




Tracksters see solid marks at Concordia





The Wayne State men's basketball team were unable to take advantage of the friendly confines of Rice Auditorium for the final time this season, dropping a pair of games in NSIC action.

On Friday, Concordia-St. Paul shot 55 percent from the field and avenged a loss from earlier int he season with a 93-89 overtime win over the Wildcats.

Similar to the first meeting three weeks ago in St. Paul where neither team led by more than five points, Friday's game saw neither team hold a lead bigger than six points while changing the lead 12 times with nine ties.

Wayne State took their biggest lead of the game at the 6:18 mark of the first half, 23-18, following a Ben Dentlinger basket. The Wildcats led again by five at 31-26 with 2:07 to play in the first half before finishing with a 34-32 lead at halftime.

After Wayne State opened the first half with a basket for a 36-32 lead, Concordia-St. Paul scored eight straight points and grabbed a 40-36 lead and held that lead for much of the second half, save for a 55-54 Wayne State advantage on a Henry Penner 3-pointer with 11:01

The Golden Bears held a 75-69 lead with 2:24 remaining when Wayne State rallied and took a 79-77 lead on a Al'Tavius Jackson layup with :51 to play, but Cody Carlson tied the score with a jumper on the Golden Bears' next possession.

Wayne State had a chance to go in front, but had a shot clock violation and Concordia-St. Paul's shot to win the game in the final six seconds was too strong, sending the game into overtime tied at 79-79.

The Wildcats held the lead early in the extra session and was in front 86-83 following a Dentlinger dunk before the Golden Bears took control of the game, scoring six straight points for an 89-86 lead. Wayne State got as close as one at 89-88 with :06 left but Concordia made three of four free throws late to seal the win.

Jackson paced Wayne State in scoring with a career-high 22 points on 9-of-16 shooting. Ferrarini also scored 22 points. Jordan Janssen accounted for his 14th double-double of the season with 16 points and 13 rebounds (along with five assists and three blocks) while Dentlinger and Nate Mohr each scored 10 points.

On Saturday, the Wildcats shot a season-low 29.6 percent, yet took Minnesota State into overtime before dropping a 72-70 decision to fall to 10-19 overall (7-13 NSIC).

Wayne State made just 8-of-34 shots in the first half, but still managed to hold a five point lead at 19-14 with 8:19 to play in the first half before Minnesota State rallied to take a 30-23 lead at the half.

The Wildcats trailed by 11 at 47-36 with 9:12 remaining before making a comeback with an 11-0 run that was capped by back-to-back 3-pointers from Jackson and Ferrarini to tie the score at 47-47 with 6:48 to play.

Property tax relief

There seems to be some mis-17, and throughout the state, be given accurate information about how LB974 is designed to reduce the property tax burden with no new taxes and replace it with state aid to schools throughout the state.

First, the primary goal is to lower the property taxes for landowners throughout the state and to lower them with NO INCREASE IN TAXES. This is accomplished by lowering the percentage of property valuations that can be taxed by local school districts over a three-year period. School districts currently levy the largest percentage of property taxes in both urban and rural areas.

Contrary to some naysayers, LB974 is designed to replace the decrease in property taxes schools collect by increasing state aid to schools in order to make them whole, while protecting the Property Tax Credit Relief Fund that pays a portion of your property tax bill each vear. This includes a per stu-

school reliance on property taxes. Remember, the state does NOT collect or spend property taxes. Naturally, local school districts are resistant to losing some of their taxing authority, but for the property tax relief plan to work, it is essential that each local government entity do its part by controlling spending, just like every family and business does, in accordance with its reasonable growth.

As you can see in the chart below, figures from the Fiscal Office addressing state aid to schools in District 17 when LB974 was voted out of the Revenue Committee show some increases to make schools whole. There are also provisions in place to draw from other funds should the impact on a school district be greater than antici-

The bill and formula are somewhat complex but the goals are simple and the structure is designed to provide property tax relief and to provide our children with quality education, all without raising taxes.

While there may be changes to the complex formulas, the framework is reasonable and workable. This is one reason I support LB974 in its current form and look forward to continuing to be a part of any work needed to make it even better.

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
Matthew 5:14-16

14. "You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. 15. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. 16. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven.'

Whether you are watching the news or looking out the window, things may seem pretty dark and dreary at this time of year, but let us not miss the spark of God's divine light that is alive in all of us.



Not too early to get ready for the grazing season

The start of the growing season may be a couple of months away, but it is not too early to start thinking about grazing and forage plans for the upcoming year.

Grazing plans should include projected cattle numbers (or stocking rates), turn out dates, and a pasture use sequence for multiple pasture rotations.

In the spring, there is always anticipation about when and how much it will rain. Rain, as well as temperature, are the two primary factors that might affect pasture turn out date. April precipitation supports the initial growth of coolseason pasture grasses, but these species have the majority of their growth during the month of May. Warm-season grasses generally



initiate growth in May with rapid accumulation of growth in June and early July.

For those livestock producers who use various types of rotational grazing strategies, it is important to review grazing records from the previous years when planning the rotation sequence for 2020. Consideration should be given to when the

Calving Season Checklist

The time is here for calving season! I've already been enjoying watching the calves that have already been born running and playing in the dry lots or out on stalks. Our CVA feed locations are ready to serve your needs with colostrum and milk replacers. If you are in a bind and can't make it to town, don't worry. Help is just a call away with our sales team out on the road to assist.

Colostrum, often referred to as first milk, contains antibodies to protect a calf from disease. Calves should receive colostrum within an hour of birth and no later than 6 hours. Studies have shown that

by 24 hours, only 10% of the immunoglobins are absorbed. Please remember the first feeding must be colostrum and not milk replacer. Many colostrums can be used as a replacer and supplement. 1 packet of colostrum serves as a replacer, while a ½ packet is sufficient to use as a supplement. Shelf life is 12 months and once it has been mixed with water, colostrum needs to be used immediately.

Besides colostrum, which in my opinion is the most important packet to have on hand, is milk replacer. Milk replacer is a formula used in place of a cow's milk. There are many reasons to need milk replacer such as a poor milking mother, a twin situation, or orphan calf, just to name a few. Calves can't digest ingredients easily under 4 weeks of age, so milk replacers are used as a primary feed source. Protein, fat, carbohydrates, vitamins, and minerals are all in milk replacer and help to get a calf off to a good start. Most bottle calves need to be fed a few times during the day, along with available fresh water.

Take the time prior to calving to find the calving chains/straps, calf jack, gloves, tags and tagger, bands, navel spray, CVA calving book, and colostrum. It's also important to have your vet's phone number handy for any emergencies. Check to make sure your working facility is ready to go for quick and easy access if there is a problem. A dry, warm area for calves will decrease the chance of sickness. Plus, keep in mind we have tubs available that can be of some assistance to help avoid scours.
