Wayne crafters, community comes together to make masks

With COVID-19 numbers in the United States on the rise, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) suggested wearing cloth face masks in public settings. Since then, area citizens have been doing what they do best – working to help their neighbors. Several groups and individuals have been busy cutting, sewing and donating masks for those who need them.

"I had been on social media somewhere and I saw this article about how this one particular hospital was asking people to make masks, and they had made a video on how to do it and they had directions, and I thought,' what a great idea," said Melissa Derechailo, organizer of the Wayne Million Mask Challenge Face-

The purpose of the Wayne Million Mask Challenge is to encourage members of the community to do what they can to make as many masks as possible. Derechailo went to both Brookdale Wayne and Wayne Countryview, as well as Providence Medical Center before anvone started sewing, to see if some of Wayne's most vulnerable groups needed masks. Derechailo said PMC requested 200 and Brookdale asked for 100. With the goal in mind, Wayne's crafters got to work quickly.

"We got started and earlier this week I made my final drops to the hospital, so they have their 200 and now we're giving them to Brookdale and Countryview," she said.

Derechailo said participating doesn't have to include strictly sewing. The group is in need of donations of fabric, elastic and other materials. They've also been aided by Sandra Wriedt and Just Sew. A bin that contains materials and finished masks is located at Just Sew and members can pick up and drop off as needed. The group has even gotten requests to branch out into making scrub hats for hospitals. No matter what the group is making, Derechailo said she's been very impressed with the re-

First confirmed case Of COVID-19 in Wayne County reported

The first case of COVID-19 has been reported in Wayne County, according to Northeast Nebraska Public Health Department (NNPHD) health director Julie

In a release from NNPHD, it's reported that a man in his 70s, and a resident of Wayne County, tested positive for COVID-19 on April 11.

The man has been isolating at home since he began experiencing symptoms. NNPHD's nursing team is currently investigating the situation to identify any close contacts who may need to also isolate and follow quarantine guidelines. According to the release, NNPD is also investigating how the man became exposed

"We all need to take our role seriously in slowing the spread of the virus," Rother said. "There are many people in our communities who are at a higher risk of severe disease from the virus such as people over 65 and those with underlying health conditions. Wakefield council meets virtually

Wakefield's city council met virtually on April 8. Up for discussion were results from a water study, CRA and park board membership ordinances and more.

Craig Reinsch, with Olsson, presented the council with results from a study of the City's filter plant. Reinsch said the plant is adequate for the community's use, but may need upgrades if Wakefield would like to continue using the plant.

The council voted to move ahead. Discussion was held about tubing the ditch from the retention pond on South Main Street. A homeowner in the area said he'd be interested in tubing the area, but the council talked about possibly paving the area or installing tubing. No

action was taken at the meeting. Hiring a manager for the Civic Center manager position was on the agenda, but council member and Civic Center committee member Val Bard told the council they

wanted to table the hire. "We've had four good applicants and four good interviews, but we want to take time to find a good employee," Bard said. The City will make contributions to employees to recover some of the lost retirement funds that they missed out on while



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
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

Police chief Marlin Chinn said during a recent meeting of the Wayne Board of Health, mayor Cale Giese said that the city doesn't want to close parks in the city, as they provide a place to exercise and get outdoors.

Chinn said the concern is "there is no way to keep them clean at all times and sanitized. Parents need to make sure they have some type of sanitizer with them when children are in the parks. If the public doesn't comply with the directives that are in place, the city will consider doing something more drastic."

The police chief said there have not been lot of parties in the city of Wayne in recent weeks, but his department has responded to several reports. He said the majority of these have been reported by neighbors who are concerned with gatherings in their neighborhoods.

"We have not seen any large gatherings, and for the most part, people are following directives," Chinn said.

He added that while there can be no service in bars or restaurants, alcohol can be carried out as long as it

"With the regulations on this being relaxed, the public is reminded that they can not consume alcohol in public areas or in vehicles," he said.

While the number of vehicles on city streets has been reduced in recent weeks, Chinn said there have been several reports of numerous occupants in the same car that are not related to each other.


In terms of social distancing, Chinn reminds the public that when they are in areas such as convenience stores or grocery stores where more



The message is staring you in the face

In a recent national survey, 26.9 million American adults age 18 and older reported experiencing vision loss. Of course, vision loss means blindness or the inability to see at all, but the definition also includes those having trouble seeing, even when wearing glasses or contact lenses. While not everything is preventable or reversible, early detection and intervention are among our most effective tools to prevent

vision loss.

Mrs. E who lived well into her 90s, would come into my office, never complaining about her eyesight. However, the diagnosis of age-related macular degeneration (AMD) was obvious to me because, when she and I had a face to face conversation, she would look a foot to the left of my nose. The AMD had destroyed her central vision and she used her peripheral vision to see. AMD is the most common cause of blindness in the elderly. Risk factors include a family history of AMD, aging, smoking, obesity and hypertension. 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
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

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Now is the time to check pastures

While Mother Nature has been giving us small tastes of spring, then pulling right back, the reminder that pasture green up is just around the corner shouldn't be

One of the earliest species we see greening up is cheatgrass (also called Downy brome, Bromus tectorum). This invasive species is found throughout Nebraska but is most prevalent on rangelands in the western portion of the state. Early spring is a good time to begin planning for cheatgrass management.

Winter annuals like cheatgrass germinated and grew last fall. The seedling was dormant all winter but energy reserves from the fall allow for growth right away this spring. This mechanism allows cheatgrass to invade into several different plant communities and compete with native cool-season perennials. With warm spring temperatures, plants grow rapidly and mature quickly. Cheatgrass usually reaches reproductive maturity by May or early June.

Cheatgrass grows from 6-24 inches in height and will be a bright green until seeds set. Upon maturity, plants turn red brown in color. Leaves are covered with fine, soft hairs. Each plant produces a distinctive brome seed head that is 2-6 inches in length and droops to one side. The seed head gets a more fluffy appearance as awns dry. Dried seed heads stick to animal hair and fur, or human clothing as a method of seed dispersal. They are also really good at burrowing into socks and shoes. Due to the seed being so easily transported, care should be taken to reduce spread from one location to areas without cheatgrass. This could include moving cattle away from cheatgrass prone pastures before seed maturity to reduce transport.

countries. This was a full-time research position where Lutt had the opportunity to work in the Internal Medicine Division under Rheuma-



Starting Young Pigs Right

nursery operations. Newley weaned pigs require several days to adjust to their surroundings. These pigs should be in an environment of 85 degrees to 89 degrees F, depending on weight and health status. As pigs grow, the temperature will slowly decrease. Ideal temperatures are established by research and models. Many modern barns are equipped with computer-controlled systems that



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can be adjusted to the stage of growth. Comfortable pigs will lay next to each other and this indicates they are not too cold or hot. Pigs that are hot will be spread apart; and if piled deep on each other, pigs are cold. Computer controlled programs are useful but having owners or staff who can identify these indicators are important to the health and growth of pigs.

Feed intake is important during this weaning transition phase as you don't want a pig to back off feed. Factors causing a pig to back off feed could be transportation, maternal separation, diet change from milk to dry pellets, and vaccinations. High quality starter feeds with increased nutrient value made in quality assurance programs are a great investment to a nursery operation. After purchasing a quality starter feed for a newly weaned pig to thrive, the feeder must be easily accessed. During the first couple weeks post weaning, 2/3 of the feeder pan should be covered with feed to attract pigs to the feeder. Once the pigs are eating, to reduce waste, work for a feeder target of ½ of the feeder pan covered. Our swine nutrition team has a starter feed promotion running through 2020 and I encourage you to reach out to them or myself for more information.

Pen walking is an important daily task when it comes to animal care. Feeders should be checked for cleanliness and proper feed flow. Floors should be evaluated for moisture. Wet floors, manure accumulation, and signs of diarrhea should be noted. Any sick pigs or fall-behinds should be identified, pulled, and treated. Stand out early symptoms of illness could be a dirty hair coat, coughing, breathing heavily, loss of body condition, or red color appearance due to lack of food and water are just a few. Nursery pigs provided with a good start will gain and finish well. A poor start will affect pigs throughout their lifetime.

Water, a highly important nutrient, is often taken for granted, yet is essential for health and performance. Pigs that aren't drinking enough water aren't consuming enough feed. A good indicator of pig health is water consumption. Tracking water usages can identify a health challenge quickly and allow time for a treatment plan. At Central Valley Ag we have a trained team of nutritionists and consultants who can help with services such as ration balancing, walk throughs, and feed plan options. Targeted grazing differs from typical grazing management because it is the application of grazing at a defined season, intensity, and duration for a defined vegetation management objective. Dense patches of cheatgrass can provide high quality forage before maturing. This is usually within a window from late-April to late-May. However, cheatgrass growth patterns can be highly variable based on temperature and precipitation. Once plants begin to turn from green to purple, selectivity usually ends. Forage quality of cheatgrass is typically high with crude protein percentages being observed at 10 to 15 percent. Cheatgrass may provide a graz-

ing opportunity well before the rest of a pasture has greened up. However, with such fast maturity, the window of opportunity from high quality forage to unpalatable forage may only be a few weeks. Early season targeted grazing of cheatgrass patches should be done quickly, a strategy often referred to as flash Flash grazing allows quick move-

ment, taking advantage of this early flush before it becomes unusable. Confine animals to cheatgrass patches as much as possible and graze heavily for a short period and then move. Cattle will typically consume native perennial cool-season species along with the cheatgrass. The key is to set back cheatgrass at a critical stage (i.e., right before seed set) and then remove grazing to allow desired species the opportunity to fill in and establish. Critical to the success of targeted grazing is providing adequate time for regrowth of desired species before subjecting them to the stress of regrazing later in the year. Planning now on how targeted

grazing on cheatgrass may fit into your system is critical to being able to implement it over the next few months. Knowing where your

patches are, developing a grazing window of opportunity. plan, and setting up infrastructure (e.g., water and fences) now can help with the success of managing cheatgrass when the timing is right. Being able to pull the trigger fast can be the difference between successful utilization or missing the
