



Northeast partners with State of Nebraska to train, retrain workers impacted by COVID-19

through their work have an opportunity to be trained or retrained with skillsets that will allow them to pursue employment in high-demand careers and industries.

Northeast Community College is partnering with the state Department of Economic Development and Department of Labor (DOL) on a Nebraska Workforce Retraining Initiative (WRI), which will, in part, provide scholarship dollars to cover tuition and examination fees to eligible individuals who enroll in designated training programs. The average scholarship will be approxi-

mately \$1,100. "The initiative will facilitate collaboration among Nebraska economic and labor research organizations, business and industry leaders, chambers of commerce, and Nebraska's community colleges to identify ongoing high-demand jobs and projected workforce skillsets for emerging industries," said Dr. Cyndi Hanson, dean of workforce development at Northeast and executive director of the college's extended campus in South Sioux City. "This training initiative will utilize the Nebraska Community College System's training infrastructure and connection to businesses to assist workers that have been negatively impacted by COVID-19."

Eligible students must meet one of the following guidelines - be unemployed on or after March 13, 2020, as a result of COVID-19; unemployed between January 1, 2020, and March 13, 2020, and are now unable to find employment as a result of COVID-19; employed for less than 40 hours a week at a job which provides the majority of

A number of existing programs offered through Northeast Community College are eligible to students who wish to utilize the WRI scholarship. This includes Basic Nurse Aide and Medication Aide, Community Health Worker (certificate program), Professional Truck Driver (non-credit), Crops Chemical Applicator, Drafting (certificate program), Machining and Manufacturing Automation (certificate program), CompTIA A+ Certification (non-credit), CompTIA Networking+ Certification (non-credit), CompTIA Security+ Certification (non-credit), LPI Linux Essentials Certification (non-credit), and Forklift Certification (noncredit).

New programs and classes at Northeast include Contact Tracer (credit skills award), Short-Term Welding (noncredit), Fiber Optic Installer (noncredit), Manufacturing Maintenance Electrical & Instrumentation (noncredit), Manufacturing Maintenance Mechanical (noncredit), Control Systems (noncredit), and Digital Controller Systems, Level 1 (noncredit).



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NSIC delays start of fall sports competition

With the health and safety of its member institutions' communities, the importance of successful institutional campus re-opening and the overall well-being of its studentathletes as its top priorities, the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference Board of Directors unanimously supported a delay to the start of NSIC fall athletic competition announced Monday afternoon.

For the sports of football and men's and women's cross country, the first permissible practice will be Wednesday, Sept. 2 with the first date of competition scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 26. For volleyball and soccer, the first permissible practice will be Tuesday, Sept. 8 with the first date of competition scheduled for Friday, Oct. 2.

With the delay of the fall sports season announced Monday by the NSIC, the WSC football schedule is reduced from 10-games to eight, losing a road contest at Bemidji State and a home game with a Minot State. The Wildcats will now open the 2020 season at Minnesota Duluth on Saturday, Sept. 26.

The Wildcat volleyball team will now see an original 20-game schedule reduced to 15, losing road games at Minnesota Duluth and St. Cloud State and home matches against Sioux Falls, Minnesota Crookston and Bemidji State. WSC will open the season on the road at the University of Mary on Friday, Oct. 2. The WSC soccer teams' original

15-game schedule has been cut to 11 games and will now start on Friday, Oct. 2 with a home match against Minnesota Crookston. The Wildcats lost four matches against Minnesota State, Concordia-St. Paul, Northern State and MSU The WSC Cross Country sched-

ule will see at least two meets canceled – Sept. 5 at Dordt and Sept. 12 at Dakota State. An updated schedule for Wildcat cross country will be announced at a later date. An amended schedule for Wayne State College women's golf will be released at a later date.

We are optimistic that remedies to manage the virus and minimize spread will improve over time which would provide a more consistent season and positive experience for our studentathletes. Although we are not able to guarantee this given the uncertain nature of the virus, we are committed to exploring all options," Lind said.



Tips for coping in changing times

How can someone like me cope ing with others with something so unexpected? As I searched for this answer, I read recommendations for different groups of people: individuals living alone, families, children with special needs, empty nesters, and seniors. I found suggestions that can help all

Create a Routine

Consistency and structure may be calming during times of stress. This is true whether we are creating a work and learning schedule for the whole family, or creating routines for ourselves when we are home alone. Use routine to create reasonable expectations for yourself

Build off familiar routines from school or work. Create cues for the start and end of each day. For example, take a quick walk around the block or in the backyard before starting work.

Healthy routines include adequate sleep, healthy meals, exercise, and time for social interac-

Plan to work or learn in bursts. Children need learning bursts of 15 to 45 minutes. Adults can focus longer, but still need regular breaks. Stretch for 5 minutes every 20 minutes if sitting or get up and walk around for 10 minutes.

Check-In with Yourself and Others

It is important to take time to

follow these tips.

Acknowl feelings. For young children use a feeling chart to help express them themselves. Also,

remember to acknowledge your own co-workers can help you cope. Make feelings. Avoid passing judgment plans to celebrate birthdays, holon yourself and others. There is no right or wrong way to feel.

Treat yourself with as much gentleness as you treat others.

Resist the need to solve other's problems. Ask, "How can we work together to make this experience more bearable?" Then be quiet and

Encourage yourself and others to be mindful of the present. Avoid worrying about "what ifs."

Try Something New

With so many events we can't control, it is important to focus on what we can control. Trying new activities can give a sense of accomplishment. You may discover new coping strategies that you can use for the rest of your life.

Don't try to do everything, but do try new things. For example, start a new arts or crafts project, make a new recipe, or read a book for enjoy-

Try yoga or a new exercise video with a spirit of adventure and fun.

Try new ways to connect with check in with yourself and with friends and family like connecting friends and family. When connect- through video calls, virtual play

dates, or writing daily tips and a collection of reletters.

Use Your Network

Remember to use your so-Friends, family. neighbors,

idays, and other special events in new ways.

Use your network to find opportunities for learning, traveling, or playing online.

Use your network for support. Would your child be more motivated to do his homework on a video chat with a friend? Would a virtual storytime with grandparents at 5:00 help you get supper ready?

During this time of unexpected and unprecedented events, remember it is okay not to be the perfect parent or family member, employee, or person. Simply, don't expect perfection from yourself or others. Healthy coping skills will help you and your family navigate this experience. Life lessons learned through experience

The Prairie Doc

Sometimes, life has lessons for us that we don't truly appreciate until much later.

Many years ago, when I was a very wet behind the ears new doctor, I had the privilege of being part of the care team for an elderly Native American woman. She had been transferred from somewhere in rural South Dakota to our hospital in the city in hopes of identifying her disease and ascertaining how best to help her. Her daughter accompanied her. The medical team was convinced we knew "best," while her daughter was determined that we were not going to take a single step that might conflict with her mother's values. The stage was set for conflict.

As an intern on one of my first rotations. Liust could not understand why someone would come to us for help, and then not be willing to follow our recommendations for testing and procedures that we felt would give us information we needed. We were frustrated. I didn't recognize it at the time, but I learned a lot from that fierce patient advocate.

In retrospect, the most obvious lesson was the importance of acknowledging that people have dif-

While it may be true that some values are shared across cultures, it is a mistake to assume that we can understand another person's values and priorities through the prism of our own, or based upon what we think we know about them.

This is especially true when it comes to end of life care, but it also applies to situations such as acceptance of medical testing, preferences regarding prescription drugs versus non-pharmaceutical alternatives and culture-based healing prac-

valuable for both the patient and the care team to have someone else present with the patient. This is a person the patient trusts to help clarify their concerns, to remember information, and to pass that information along to the patient's loved ones. Prior to the covid-19 pandemic, few patients utilized an advocate, except in the gravest of circumstances. Now. procedures in place to protect patients, staff, and family from this dreadful virus, limit the opportunity for patients to have an advocate physically present. However, most facilities support connection to patient advocates via phone call or video call.

In the end, a wise chaplain arroom. I was not present for the ceremony, but the senior physicians and the daughter agreed on a plan of action. We didn't cure the patient, but we were able to offer her physical comfort in her final days, and I believe that by blending her culture and traditions with our medical ethos, we helped both the patient and her daughter find spiritual comfort as

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Understanding Medicaid expansion

Nebraska voters passed Initiative 427 to expand eligibility for Medicaid services from the State. The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) has been working hard to implement the expanded coverage, which will be called Heritage Health Adult. Thanks to the team's focus and effective management, enrollment will open as planned on Aug. 1 and services will begin on Oct. 1.

Reaching this point has taken a tremendous amount of work. As directed by the ballot initiative, DHHS filed the required state plan amendments with the federal government on April 1, 2019. Along the way, DHHS has been working to secure federal approvals for the new program, building the technology platforms required to manage the program, and pulling together the network of providers and doctors needed to deliver services. DHHS estimates that about 90,000

Nebraskans will sign up for the expanded Medicaid program. Nebraskans with an annual income under 138 percent of the federal poverty level are eligible to apply. For individuals, the income threshold is about \$17,600 and for a family of four it is around \$36,000. People in this income bracket, ages 19 to 64, qualify for coverage through Heritage Health Adult.

Under our plan that meets federal requirements, folks who sign up will receive a robust and comprehensive package similar to private insurance that includes physical health coverage, behavioral health coverage, and prescription drugs. Nebraskans who are 19-20 years old, pregnant, or medically frail will receive the comprehensive package noted above, plus dental, vision, and over-the-counter drug coverage. The State of Nebraska has sub-

mitted a waiver application to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). CMS communicated earlier this year that the waiver review is taking longer than originally expected due to their ongoing pandemic response. Once the waiver is approved, all Nebraskans participating in Heritage Health Adult can qualify for dental, vision, and overthe-counter drug benefits.

The majority of Nebraska's Medicaid benefits and services are provided through managed care organizations, also called Heritage Health plans, including for newly eligible expansion participants. Heritage Health plans assist participants with accessing services, providing reminders about appointments, and paying providers for their services.

To make expansion possible, DHHS has completed the significant technology buildout required to manage the new program. A great deal of computer coding was needed to prepare the DHHS legacy (1977) computer system for the new Heritage Health Adult population. These complex system modifications took lots of time to

coordination between the DHHS programming and IT teams. DHHS has been working with Medicaid providers to test systems to make sure they continue to work properly. Pulling together an expanded and

robust provider network has also been a big part of Medicaid expansion. It's important that the Medicaid provider network has the capacity to handle the 90,000 newly-eligible Nebraskans. Historically, women and children have accounted for 73 percent of Medicaid recipients. However, many of the individuals joining the Heritage Health Adult Plan will be adults who did not qualify for Medicaid prior to expansion. This means we have needed to recruit more general practitioners and other specialists to serve this new population. DHHS has worked with health plans to expand provider networks in order to meet the particular health care needs of this new population of Medicaid re-

Nebraskans can enroll online for Medicaid expansion starting Aug. 1 at ACCESSNebraska.ne.gov. The website will be the easiest and most efficient way for Nebraskans to sign up. Applicants can create an online account with ACCESSNebraska to sign up and check their application status. Nebraskans can also call 855-632-7633 to enroll.

As the enrollment period begins, we ask everyone to be patient. We expect there to be a lot of interest. To provide additional enrollment capacity, DHHS has hired and trained 68 additional eligibility staff to help with applications. The agency is also working with two vendors to provide additional assistance to maintain our high quality of customer service. With the potential for 90,000 people to sign up for Heritage Health Adult in the coming weeks, our team is going to be very busy. We will monitor performance and make adjustments to overcome any challenges that may arise.

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USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service **APHIS Seeks Public Comment on Transition to RFID Official Identification Tags**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) is seeking public comment on a proposal where APHIS would only approve Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) as the official eartag for use in interstate movement of cattle that are required to be identified by the traceability regulations.


An official eartag is defined as an identification tag approved by APHIS that bears an official identification number for individual animals. Regulations allow APHIS to approve tags that can be used as official identification, and both metal and RFID tags are current

A transition to RFID tags would support APHIS' ongoing efforts to increase animal disease traceability by more accurately and rapidly allowing animal health officials to know where affected and at-risk animals are located. While this would not prevent disease outbreaks, it would allow animal health officials to more quickly contain outbreaks early before they can do substantial damage to the U.S. cattle industry.

APHIS is also seeking comment on a proposed timeline for implementation, which the agency would use if this transition occurs. The timeline would make RFID tags the only option for use in cattle and bison requiring official identification on January 1, 2023. APHIS would "grandfather in" animals that have metal tags already in place on that date - their metal tags would serve as official identification for the remainder of their lifespan.

This transition timeline would not alter the existing regulations. The cattle and bison that must be identified will not change, nor will the option for animal health officials in shipping and receiving states to agree to accept alternate forms of identification, including brands and tattoos, in lieu of official identification.

Public comments will be accepted through October 5, 2020 at the following site: https://www.federalregister.gov/d/2020-14463. After reviewing all comments, APHIS will publish a follow up Federal Register notice. This notice will respond to any such comments, announce our decision whether to only approve RFID tags as the only official identification devices for cattle, and, if so, provide the timeline for such a transition.

Reducing dusty conditions and providing protection against sunlight also aids in control. Cattle often have grass or weed seeds in their eyes, and these materials can irritate the eye and contribute to the development of pinkeye. Cattle with pinkeye can be helped

by prompt treatment which usually includes an antibiotic and often includes eyepatches to limit further irritation. Since the cornea heals slowly, any ulceration is likely to require several weeks for complete recovery. Vaccinations for pinkeye have met with variable results.

There are other infections that look like pinkeye so it is recommended that you consult with your veterinarian to assist you in the diagnosis, treatment and control of

Pinkeye in cattle should not be overlooked

Driving or riding through a pen or pasture of cattle is a favorite chore for many producers.

Making sure our cattle have plenty of clean water, access to feed or forage and monitoring herd health are important aspects of daily care.

When examining cattle, one im-

portant disease not to overlook is pinkeye. Pinkeye is a highly contagious infectious disease that not only affects cattle in Nebraska but worldwide. The incidence and severity of this common disease can vary widely from year to year. Although pinkeye rarely causes the death of affected cattle, it can cause substantial losses to the cattle industry through decreased weight gain, lowered milk production and treatment costs.

Pinkeye is primarily caused by Moraxella bovis (M. bovis); how-

Efforts to prevent pinkeye are directed at reducing transmission and minimizing irritation. Fly control can minimize both transmission and irritation; however, it is not a guarantee for prevention. Face flies can remain infected with M. bovis up to three days following feeding on infected material. Under experimental conditions, disease transmission is uncommon without the presence of face flies and is common with flies present. Fly control does have the added benefit of


