Wayne State College re-makes natatorium into Kirk Gardner Indoor Athletic Complex

When Mike Powicki became Wayne State College's Athletic Director eight years ago, one change he knew he wanted to make was to the Carlson Natatorium, the 25-yard long pool facility that connected the Rec Center to Rice Auditorium. While the pool, initially poured in 1964, was getting some use from community members, it also had leaking issues and wasn't getting lots of student use. After some inspection and repairs in the meantime, the natatorium's fate was sealed.

"We invested \$50,000 in a liner for the pool (and) that didn't fix it, so they identified that it most likely was some kind of issue way down into the drainage system where we'd have to tear the whole thing up and basically build a brand new pool," Powicki said.

Facing a huge problem with a leaky pool and serious need for more multi-use space on campus, the decision was made to begin fundraising efforts to create what is now named the Kirk Gardner Indoor Athletic Complex.

The over \$1 million project was nearly 100 percent funded through fundraising, something Powicki was proud of. A donation of \$300.000 from the Gardner Foundation also helped make the

Construction began on the space in January. Mechanics for the pool were removed, and a specialty construction company filled the pool and surrounding area with high-density foam to fill and level the space with rock and sand. After the level floor was set. two types of turf was installed to make the space useful to multi-

"We have two different kinds of turf there," Powicki said. "We have some taller-ply turf that would be more applicable to baseball, softball, football, and around the edges we put some lower-ply turf. We actually put some golf holes in there so our golfers can putt and do some different things like that.'

With sand volleyball added as an official sport. Powicki said the complex can give the team another surface to use and hone skills. Speed and agility drills for all sports can be done in the space and it could be used in classes and for intramural sports.

"The idea is that, that space can be changed (and) shift around and used for all sorts of activities, whether it's the general student population or club sports or our college athletes," Powicki said.

Above, three dividing nets were installed so the space can serve multi-purposes at one time and can be used as batting cages. The natatorium had space above that previously served that purpose, but in the Gardner Indoor Athletics Complex, the upper space has been converted into five new offices.

"You never think of 'oh great, you get to add office space,' but for us over here, as we've been trying to increase the number of sports and do some of those kind of things, we literally ran out of office space," Powicki said.

Final touches are just finishing up in the space and Powicki said he hopes to have the space finished and coaches in their new offices by the time the new semester starts next week. All in all, Powicki said having the new space is a benefit to campus life.

"Just to have another space to kind of alleviate the Rec Center and just provide an alternative surface for our students to do some things, I think, is a pretty big win," he said.

Wakefield school board meets ahead of new year starting

Most Wakefield Community Schools students will have their first day of the new school year on Thursday, Aug. 20. Some plans for re-opening with COVID-19 restrictions were still being discussed at Wakefield's Board of Education meeting on Monday night.

Wakefield Community Schools is requiring all students and staff to wear masks while in the building. Visitors will not be admitted at this time. If parents or guardians have not done so vet, the school asks they provide a current email address so

that communication can be sent via email. During the meeting, a resolution for the 2020-2021 School Re-opening was discussed. One item of discussion was whether superintendent Dr. Mike Moody wanted to specify a set number of days teachers could use as COVID-19 related sick days. Moody told the board he did not want to set a limit at this time and wanted instructors to get well and work from home if that's what they needed to recover.

It was also re-affirmed that students will need to be engaged online if they are home sick on doctor's orders. Wakefield Community Schools will be utilizing Google Classroom if they need online learning

Moody informed the board that the school's Wellness Committee had a successful year. The committee won a Healthy Schools award and received a grant, free hand sanitizer stations, hand sanitizer refills, handwashing kits to show younger

children the importance of handwashing, a face recognition temperature scanner, 10 infrared thermometers and more

A new iPad policy was adopted. This year, all Wakefield students will receive an iPad at the beginning of the year in the event that they will have to move to online learning. In the past, students with iPads had to pay the school \$50 for usage. High School principal Matt Farup said he was uncomfortable with the practice as it didn't fall within the school's obligation to provide a free education.

The next Wakefield Community Schools Board of Education meeting will be held on Monday, Sept. 14 with a budget hearing beginning at 5:20 p.m. in the Media

The plan for beginning the 2020-2021 school year and the district's budget for the coming year were discussed at length during Monday's regular meeting of the Wayne Community Schools' Board of Edu-

Superintendent Dr. Mark Lenihan presented detailed information on the re-opening plan for the new school year.

Lenihan shared information from the Northeast Public Health Department on the recommended procedures for students who

may be exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19. He said the health department "really stresses the importance of wearing masks" and that the first question to be asked in a situation where someone tests positive for the virus is "were they wearing a mask?" If those around the person testing positive were wearing masks, they will be allowed trict's budget for the coming fiscal year.

The district has been working throughout the summer to develop a plan for building time in the schedule when students will not have to wear masks. Also being stressed are good hand hygiene and social distancing.

"We are hopeful things will go well and are looking forward to starting school this week," Lenihan said.

He said the number of students for the coming year may be slightly different than originally projected due to several parents choosing to delay the start of school for their kindergarten students and other factors.

budget is based on last year's property valuation. The levy for the coming year will not be set until the new valuations are an-

nounced on Aug. 20. The 2020-2021 fiscal year includes a \$350,00 increase in the General Fund budget. This is an increase of less than two percent in this portion of the budget. The ma-

jority of the increase is staff salaries. Lenihan explained some of the items in budget that are seeing changes, both increases and decreases.

Board discussion included the amount needed in the district's cash reserve. The general recommendation is to have three months' worth of expenses in reserve. The proposed budget would result in \$2.4 million in the fund, which is nearly that






Wakefield Community Schools holds diploma ceremony for class of 2020

FFA members compete in virtual state competitions

Aug. 4, Wayne FFA members com- Trevor DeBoer, and Faith Junck peted in eight different Career Development Events.

These state-level competitions were supposed to be held during the State FFA Convention in early April. However, due to COVID-19, the convention was canceled and all components went online. This included sessions, awards, recognition, and competitions. Many agricultural educators across the state stepped up to host, proctor, or coordinate these competitions and awards. Chapters across the schools or their homes.

In order for a member to compete in State CDEs, they first had to qualify at the district level. For some higher interest competitions, members had to take a test at the chapter level in order to earn a spot on the district team. Students are selected for a CDE team based on their test performance (if applicable), their previous experience, and their future career interest.

The first place winner in each CDE wins a \$500 scholarship to UNL if they declare a College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources (CASNR) major. Members also earn a ribbon if they place in the top-half (purple, blue, red, or white). The top 10 competitors in each competition are recognized "on-stage" as well as the top five

On July 16 members of the Wayne FFA competed in Farm and Agribusiness Management. This contest consisted of terms, definitions, current events, management scenarios, outcomes, and courses of action related to Farm Business Management.

Trevor DeBoer earned first in this competition and a purple ribbon. Josh Lutt and Amara Hurlbert earned red ribbons and Emily Armstrong helped the team earn a sixth place finish and a blue ribbon.

Wayne FFA members competed in Agricultural Communications on July 20. Each member competes in a different component of communications and then their scores are added together for a team score.

Noah Lutt competed in video production and earned eighth place and a red ribbon. Madison Kaup competed in website design and earned ninth place and a white ribbon. Faith Junck earned second place in opinion writing and earned a purple ribbon. Josh Lutt's score in journalistic writing assisted the team in securing a seventh place finish and a red.

Food Science was held on July 21. In this competition, teams go through a product development scenario. They also are tested on food borne illnesses, correct food preparation, and correct safety measures. The team earned a fourth place fin-

These are challenging days, we may feel hopeful, hopeless, angry, fearful, tired, resigned, and exhausted and that might be in just

COVID 19 interrupted the lives of millions of people in this country and around the world. The impact of COVID is not just health-related, but includes short and long-term economic concerns for individuals, communities, and the world.

In addition, there is climate change, the resumption of federal executions and violence toward men and women of color. These are just a few of the pressing issues of our society. It can be challenging to remain hopeful when so much anxi-

Recently on a friend's Facebook post I came across an excerpt of a book written by C.S. Lewis, a British theologian. Lewis is one of my favorite theologians and authors. Lewis was an adult in the late 1940's, a time when there was a near-constant fear of atomic warfare. Lewis' essay, "On Living in an Atomic Age" from a book entitled "Present Concerns: Journalistic Essays," offers valuable insight to past and present days when darkness, whether from COVID or other concerns threaten to overwhelm us.

Lewis wrote: "In one way we think a great deal too much of the atomic bomb. 'How are we to live in an atomic age?' I am tempted to reply: 'Why, as you would have lived in the sixteenth century when the plague visited London almost every year, or as you would have lived in a Viking age when raiders from

your throat any night; or indeed, as you are already living in an age of cancer, an age of syphilis, an age of paralysis, an age of air raids, an age of railway accidents, an age of motor accidents.

"In other words, do not let us begin by exaggerating the novelty of our situation. Believe me, dear sir or madam, you and all whom you love were already sentenced to death before the atomic bomb was invented: and quite a high percentage of us were going to die in unpleasant ways. We had, indeed, one very great advantage over our ancestors—anesthetics; but we have that still. It is perfectly ridiculous to go about whimpering and drawing long faces because the scientists have added one more chance of painful and premature death to a world which already bristled with such chances and in which death itself was not a chance at all, but

"This is the first point to be made: and the first action to be taken is to pull ourselves together. If we are all going to be destroyed by an

atomic bomb, let that bomb when it comes find us doing sensible and human things — praying, working, teaching, reading, listening to music, bathing the children, playing tennis, chatting to our friends over a pint and a game of darts - not huddled together like frightened sheep and thinking about bombs. They may break our bodies (a microbe can do that) but they need not dominate our minds." Lewis's words translate into our

current situation reminding us that we must not fail to have hope, we must not to give into fear whether driven by an atomic bomb, a pandemic, or any other darkness. We must pull ourselves together as individuals and a society. Lewis' words encourage us to continue to do sensible and human things like praying, teaching and working, things that help us revive body and spirit. During this pandemic, each of us must do our best to keep ourselves and our families safe, wash your hands, wear a mask and social distance, let us continue to "...do sensible and human things...." as

we care for each other.

Even during hard things, consider your blessings and give thanks. You can still visit with family and friends via phone or video conference, take a walk on a moonlight night filled with stars.

The Apostle Paul reminds us that hope originates with God, hope is not rooted in perfect circumstances or our ideals. Hope is rooted in Christ, His sacrifice for us, and the promise of being united with Him one day when all hard things cease.

Christians have the assurance of knowing who holds their future no matter what comes our way in this life. The Apostle Paul wrote in Romans 8:39-39: "And I am convinced that nothing can ever separate us from God's love. Neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither our fears for today nor our worries about tomorrownot even the powers of hell can separate us from God's love. No power in the sky above or in the earth below-indeed, nothing in all creation will ever be able to separate us from the love of God that is revealed in Christ Jesus our Lord."

On those hard days when the world seems a scary place, remember to do those things which revive your body and soul and that no matter how dark the world may seem, remember there is no calamity, whether bomb or pandemic, that can separate us from the love and grace of God.

Within days of Jesus' death and resurrection, He was spending time with His disciples teaching them, preparing them for what was to come. He stressed the importance of obedience to Him four times, saying, "If you love me, you will keep my commandments . . .", "Whoever has my commandments and keeps them, he it is who loves me.", "If anyone loves me, he will keep my word . . . " Whoever does not love me does not keep my words" (John 14:15,21,23-

Jesus, the Master Teacher, was emphasizing an absolutely essential truth in the Christian life - obedience to God matters. Notice the kind of obedience Jesus talked about was not mere rule keeping. It was an obedience that springs from a heart of love for Christ. Not a romantic love that is just feeling, but a love that is rational, deliberate, sacrificial and zilling to lav down its life in suffer ing and death for Him if necessary,

In addition to the obedience question, another one is, "You say Jesus is your Savior and Lord . . ., but do you love Him?"

The lyrics in our modern worship music extols the love of God, but where are the lyrics that also sings about our obedience to Him? Our evangelism proclaims the love of God in Christ inviting people to pray and make professions, rather than calling them to take up their cross and obey the gospel's challenging call of repentance from sin. Nebraska LEAD programming postponed through August 2021

Members of the Nebraska Leadership Education/Action Development (LEAD) classes 38 and 39, will pause their programming and resume in the fall of 2021.

The Nebraska Agriculture Leadership Council (NALC) Board of Directors unanimously decided to postpone seminars and other programming for members who are involved in production agriculture and agribusiness for the 2020-2021 year.

"To suspend regular programming from September 2020 through August 2021 was not an easy decision, but one the board felt was in the best interests of all people involved with the program," said Ed Woeppel NALC Board

"Our discussions centered on two major issues; the safety of participants, staff, and others involved in programming; and secondly, the quality of the program."

Given continued uncertainties about the spread of COVID-19, the board was unable to see how programming could occur in a way that would safeguard the health of everyone involved without compromising participants experiences.

"The foundation of the Nebraska LEAD program is not only the content, but also includes the experiences that participants have while in the program that allows them to truly develop

as leaders," said Richard Bischoff, associate vice chancellor for the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln

The program is Nebraska's premier two-year agricultural leadership development program, built over 39

"While we will be pausing for this year, we will not be sitting still. We will have some new activities for the LEAD 39 fellows in order to keep them connected. We will use the year to conduct a 'deep dive' into all aspects of the program. We will ensure that we are providing the highest quality programming possible," Woeppel said "Our goal is to come back even stronger when this pandemic is behind us."

The Nebraska LEAD Program is Nebraska's two-vear premier agricultural development program. Nebraska LEAD is sponsored by the nonprofit Nebraska Agricultural Leadership Council in cooperation with the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and 11 other institutions of higher education throughout Ne-

Nebraska Resource Conservation and Development Council Inc. receives grant from Nebraska $Environmental\ Trust$

Northeast Nebraska Resource Conservation & Development Council Inc. announced recently that it will receive \$13,471 from the Nebraska Environmental Trust for the "Household Hazardous Waste Collections" project. The Trust Board announced funding for the project at its meeting on June 11 in Lincoln. The project is one of the 118 projects receiving \$20,000,000 in grant awards from the Nebraska Environmental Trust this year. Of these, 73 were new applications and 45 are carryover projects.

This project will properly dispose of and/or recycle approximately 12 ton of household hazardous waste (HHW) over a three-year period and provide citizen education on how to safely manage HHW in the home through recycling, sharing, proper storage and reuse. They'll also learn what is appropriate to bring to the collections.

Citizens continue to ask for help with disposal HHW materials that they or their families have accumulated over the years because they know throwing them in the trash or pouring them down the drain isn't proper. The benefits of proper disposal of HHW are

· Conserves resources and energy thatwould be used to produce more

Reuse of hazardous household products saves money and reduces the need for hazardous substances to be kept around individual homes and

· Proper disposal prevents pollution Two collection events will be held annually within the Northeast Nebraska Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Council's area. Monthly educational information will be on the RC&D's website, Facebook page, sent to radios and newspapers. Targeted groups are individual citizens, tribal members, and general households within the region. Communities will serve as local host sites.

The Nebraska Legislature created the Nebraska Environmental Trust in 1992. Using revenue from the Nebraska Lottery, the Trust has provided over \$328 million in grants to over 2,300 projects across the state. Any one- citizens, organizations, communities, farmers and businesses- can apply for funding to protect habitat, improve water quality and establish recycling programs in Nebraska. The Nebraska Environmental Trust works to preserve, protect and restore our natural resources for future generations.

Mineral Balance and Bioavailability

Every season I read about the new, big item on the market that's a cure-all for any issues within your herd. Unfortunately, the truth is that the majority of the "added value" ingredients very rarely have any data to prove the so-called cure truly works. The good thing is that we have all been trained to read feed tags. But has the tag reading war caused us to forget about balanced nutrition?

Costs increase with bioavailable mineral sources, but serve an important purpose when it comes to immunity, reproduction,

Studies from South Dakota State Extension show inorganics such as sulfates and chlorides are more available than oxides or carbonates, except for zinc oxide and magnesium oxide. Organic minerals are bonded to an amino acid, and bioavailability exceeds 100. These minerals provide an added benefit during times of stress, like weaning. Hydroxy minerals use covalent bonds that allow trace minerals to by-pass rumen digestion, further increasing the bioavailability. A balance of these minerals is very important. If levels are increased in some minerals, they may tie up the balance and reduce the bioavailability of another, thus decreasing the benefit on the mineral program.

When selecting a mineral program for your herd, always work closely with your nutritionist to determine what program is best for your operation. Transforming manure from 'Waste' to 'Worth' in rural Nebraska

The misconception about manure being just a waste and harmful biproduct of the cattle and livestock industry is still a big concern.

A group of researchers and extension educators have joined efforts with farmers across Nebraska to find the value of manure as a source of nutrients in crop fields in the Sandhills and reduce the environmental impacts caused by this industry. At the same time, they are trying to incorporate residues from red cedar trees that are currently threatening the Nebraskan wildlife pansion

Animal feeding operations in generate significant Nebraska amounts of manure that can provide essential plant nutrients, organic matter, and active microbes to cropland. Additionally, Eastern red cedar tree (Juniperus virginiana) encroachment in grazing land has become an economic and ecological threat. Some farmers believe that, together, manure and woody biomass (created from tree management activities) could benefit soil

Finding manure and woodchips benefits to the soils of Nebraska

Their interest in testing this idea helped launch a three-year study to test the impacts of these treatments in small field plots at two farms in

the Sandhills. Results of those studies showed



that woody biomass combined with manure amendments have a positive impact on soil physical properties, as it increases sorptivitiy, improves soil organic matter and decreases bulk density More information regarding the benefits of manure on crop fields can be found at https://water.unl.edu/article/manure-nutrient-management/howcan-animal-manure-help-my-soilsbe-healthier-and-more.

In late 2018, this project was expanded to include on-farm research using large plots (approximately 40' wide and 350' long) at four locations across the state of Nebraska - near Saint Paul, Pierce, Ainsworth and Brule. Two more study sites have been added this year – near Julian and Overton.

The primary goal is to evaluate potential short- and long-term impacts on soil quality and crop productivity of utilizing manure and red cedar woodchips as soil amendments on cropland that has not received manure for several years. Plots were established at the initial four sites prior to the 2019 growing seasons to accommodate at least three different treatments (manure, manure+woody biomass, and control plots that received only inorganic fertilizer) with each treat- biochar or similar materials, so adment replicated four times. Manure ditional research is warranted besources for these sites included beef feedlot manure at two sites and bedded beef barn manure or beef slurry manure at the other two sites.

At the site near Brule, woody biomass was replaced by coal char from a Colorado sugar beet processing plant since wood chips were not readily available. Preplant nitrogen was the same among all plots within a single site, whether supplied by manure, fertilizer, or a combination

Soil samples were collected before treatment applications at all research sites to determine initial near Julian and Overton that were soil chemical, physical and biologi- added prior to the 2020 growing cal properties. Subsequent samples were collected at the end of the 2019 cropping season and corn yield was determined for all research sites.

Soil and crop improvements after the first year of treatments

Results from the sites studied during 2019 indicate that applications of beef manure make significant contributions of nitrogen (N), phosphorus (P) and potassium (K) in crop fields without compromising yield, indicating that manure is a reliable source to replace preplant nitrogen normally delivered in inorganic fertilizers. There is no evidence that woody biomass contributed to soil acidification or niapplication. Further applications over additional growing seasons are expected to generate measurable changes in soil physical and chemical properties.

Sugar beet coal char application produced an increase in soil organic matter, pH, and sulfate sulfur in the top two inches of the soil; howcoal char application. Other studies following cropland application of nitrogen-credit.

fore making definitive conclusions about the use of coal char as a soil amendment. Crop yields were not negatively impacted by any of the remaining treatments.

A second year of applications for all treatments except coal char (at the four original research sites) is expected to reveal further changes in soil composition and nutrient availability following the 2020 crop Residual impacts of a single ap-

plication of coal char will be studied at the site near Brule. The sites season were laid out like the other sites and received swine slurry and beef feedlot manure, respectively, along with woody biomass, manure+woody biomass, and inorganic fertilizer as a control. Additional data collection to assess the potential of woody biomass to retain moisture will be evaluated in the plots near Julian where no irrigation is applied to the crops. Moisture sensors will be installed in each plot and data will be compared

among treatments. While it can take multiple years before changes in some soil properties can be measured, the immediate impacts from a single manure trogen immobilization with surface application include addition of organic matter and microbes that support the soil biological community, increased pH and increased electrical conductivity.

Likewise, the use of manure to meet pre-plant crop nitrogen needs can have immediate positive impacts on crop growth. 
