## Council tables final reading of truck parking ordinance

Following considerable discussion during Tuesday's meeting, Wayne City Council members tabled the third reading of an ordinance that would designate where trucks could be parked in the city of Wayne.

Council members had discussed the ordinance language during the last two meetings and had asked City Attorney Amy Miller to make wording changes before what would have been the third and final

Eric Smith, a truck driver who parks his truck on city streets in a business-zoned area, spoke to the council on the proposed changes to parking regulations.

He asked the council why they were changing the ordinance.

"I have been parking my truck there since 1998. There have been no issues, no traffic complaints. I don't see a problem that needs to be fixed," Smith said.

Several council members expressed their opinions on the matter, noting that since the beginning of the discussion, people have started to make changes in where parking takes place.

Council member Jennifer Sievers told Smith that issues that come before the council are "complaint driven" and the truck parking situation was seen as a safetv issue.

Council member Chris Woehler said that trucks that are parked on city streets are not paying property taxes and property owners, who are paying these taxes, may not want trucks parking adjacent to their

Council member Matt Eischeid said the issue has "taken up a lot of time. Are we going to address this because of one nearmiss? There are safety issues in lots of parts of town."

Following the discussion, council members again asked City Attorney Miller to make additional changes in the ordinance, which will be brought back for third reading at a future council meeting.

Council members passed 2020-47 which moves the "2021 Pine in regular session on Tuesday, Oct. 20 at Heights Road Improvements, 9th to 10th 5:30 p.m. at the Wayne Community Activ-Street Project" forward.

Jon Mooberry, Project Manager with JEO Consulting, spoke to the council and presented a timeline for the project, a brief outline of what the project will include and an estimate of the cost of the project.

Mooberry said the project is set to be sent out for bids later this month with a bid awarded at the Nov. 17 regular meeting of the city council. Work would begin April 1, 2021 and final completion set for Nov. 1, 2021.

It will be done in two phases to allow residents in the area more access to their properties.

In other action, the council approved Resolution 2020-49 which will amend Resolution 1998-22 that established a Problem Resolution Team for the city of Wayne.

The item was discussed during a recent Council Retreat. At that time, Mayor Cale Giese asked council to consider adding a Wayne State Student Senate representative and up to five-at large representatives from the community to be a part of the team. Already named to the team are a representative of the police department, the City Clerk or designate, the City Planner/ Inspector representative, a City Attorney representative, a representative of the Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation and a city council member.

Council members authorized the City Administrator to temporarily pay out police department vacation leave for those officers who have reached the 280 hour limit on the amount of time they can accrue.

Police Chief Marlen Chinn told the council that the department is currently down two police officers, sometimes making it difficult for officers to take vacation time.

The vacation time will be paid out at the current wage rates and City Administrator Blecke said the item will be re-visited in three months.

A pay application in the amount of \$130,337.98 was approved to M&B Quality Concrete for the Restoration of the Wayne Walking Trail Project. Council members did request an update list of costs for various items on the project.

## Bids accepted, tax rates set at Wayne County Commissioners meeting

The Wayne County Commissioners accepted bids for two motor graders, a skid loader and a pickup, as well as officially set 2020-21 tax rates for Wayne County during their first of two October meetings.

The commissioners began with a Board of Equalization meeting, where tax rates were set. Wayne County, the Village of Carroll, City of Wayne, Carroll Fire District 1, Wayne Fire District 2, Wayne School District, Wakefield School District and Winside School District all will have a slightly higher tax rate. The Wayne Ag Society, Village of Hoskins, Wayne Airport Authority, Village of Winside, Hoskins Fire District 3 and Winside Fire District 4 all will have

slightly decreased tax rates. After the rates were approved, the Board of Equalization meeting closed and Board of Commissioners meeting opened.

Highway superintendent Mark Casey opened two bids and presented another to the commissioners. The first bids were for a skid loader. The low bid came in at \$47.041.75 from Siouxland Bobcat.

Next bids for two motor graders, one for District 1 and one for District 3, were opened. The low bid was awarded to Nebraska Machinery for \$272,620 for one and

Casey also told the commissioners he received a bid of \$35,553 for a pickup from Arnie's Ford in Wavne.

Wayne County Emergency Manager Nic Kemnitz, gave the commissioners an update about the insurance settlement for the portable communications tower that sustained damage. Kemnitz said that the insurance company was willing to pay out



## Human cases of West Nile Virus reported

positive for West Nile virus according to the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS). Each of the following health departments have reported one human case - Three Rivers Health Department which covers Dodge, Saunders and Washington counties, Lincoln-Lancaster County Health Department and Douglas County Health Department.

"West Nile virus is a mild illness for most, but can be serious for others so it's good to be in the habit of protecting yourself against mosquitos," said Dr. Tom Safranek, Special Assistant to the CEO. "These are the first human West Nile cases so far this season. Our surveillance da-

circulating widely in the mosquito population, but with Nebraskans to be outdoors basic prevention is still important.'

#### Preventive tips

Use mosquito repellent when spending time outside. Repellents containing DEET, picaridin, IR3535, 2-unecanone, and some lemon eucalyptus and para-menthane-diol products provide longerlasting protection.

Wear long-sleeved shirts, pants and socks when outside.

Limit time outdoors when mosquitoes are most active - at dusk and dawn.

Three people have recently tested ta shows that West Nile virus isn't where mosquitos lay eggs. West Nile virus is transmitted

through mosquito bites. Mosquitaking advantage of mild weather tos acquire it by feeding on infected birds and pass it to people and animals. Last year there were 28 human cases in Nebraska and one

Most people with West Nile virus will have no symptoms or only mild flu-like symptoms such as a fever and headache. Those over 50 and anyone with weakened immune systems are at increased risk for a more severe infection.





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

This natural disaster designation allows FSA to extend much-needed hoo or a statewide youth permit. ing from natural disasters. Emergency loans can be used to meet various recovery needs including the replacement of essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganization of a farming operation or the refinance of certain

> Producers in the contiguous counties listed below are also eligible to apply for emergency loans:

· Nebraska: Box Butte, Burt, Butler, Dakota, Dixon, Douglas, Madison, Pierce, Platte, Saunders, Sheridan, Sioux, Washington and Wayne.

· Iowa: Monona and Woodbury. · South Dakota: Fall River and Ogla-

gency loans is May 11, 2021.



Hope for Today

Pastor and church leader, do you anticipate encouraging your congregation to vote in the general election on November 3rd? I hope every pastor and church leader will help make the Christian vote, the highest turnout among any group.

I understand churches may feel uncomfortable or even resistant to utilizing their church to encourage voting. Perhaps they think it smells of politics and want to get as far away from the odor as possible, especially with political tensions running too high in America right now.

What I am talking about is simply encouraging the act of voting. I do not want the church promoting certain candidates or political parties, nor turning Sunday morning into a political rally. This is just about encouraging followers of Christ to vote, and vote prayerfully and intelligently.

I see voting as an act of loving Christian citizenship when I read the Apostle Peter's letter in the New Testament. His words are not specifically about voting, but about the Christian's relationship to government. 1. Voting is honorable. It is written, "Keep your conduct among the Gentiles honorable . . " (1 Peter 2:12). 2. Voting is good. The Scriptures say, "For this is the will of God, that by doing good you should put to silence the ignorance of foolish people" (vs. 15). 3. Voting is an act of freedom. The Bible says,

"Live as people who are free" (vs. 16). In the United States men and women and people of all races and our fellow citizens, and in a sense. Amen.'

rificial love to them when we take time and go vote.

But what if some candidates are lacking the character or will not support Christian principled policies or legislation? That is a valid concern, but please do not let that keep you or your church out of the voting booth. Participate, but do so with greater attention to prayer, seeking the Scripture for guidance and learning about the candidates. If you lead or are involved in a

church that sees voting as part of the messy political process, consider a different viewpoint. Look at it through the lens of God's Word and Christian citizenship. It is our opportunity to be salt and light in the community when we show up at the polls on election day. And when our votes are joined with prayer and fasting for the candidates along with our city, state and nation election day can truly be a spiritually impactful time. When it comes time to cast our

vote, believers in Christ do so with a theological understanding of sovereign Kingship. Jesus died, rose from the dead and is alive today sitting at the right hand of His Father in heaven, waiting to come again. Christ is King no matter who is on the ballot or in political power. It is in Him whom we ultimately place our trust with the realization that no earthly power can thwart the purposes of our Lord and Savior.

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

vest starts, don't forget about thistles plaguing your pastures. Fall, specifically October and early November, is a key time to chemically control thistles in pastures. This is an ideal time to control biennial and perennial thistles. Proper identification of thistles is key to picking the proper chemical control.

Thistle Species in Nebraska In Nebraska we have several biennial thistles, but we mostly deal

with musk, plumeless, Scotch, and bull thistles in our pastures. Biennials require portions of two growing seasons to flower/reproduce. They develop from seed the first season as a flat rosette. The rosette overwinters and the cold causes the rosette to bolt the next season and produce seed. Once the plant puts on seed it will die and that seed spreads by wind. When trying to control biennial thistles, destruction of rosettes prior to flowering (bolting) is an effective means of preventing seed formation and subsequent spread. Fall is a key time to target these rosettes and to help mitigate seed production the following season.

Another thistle to look out for is Canada thistle. Canada thistle is a creeping perennial that can be controlled with fall spraying, in conjunction with other management options in the spring. When identifying Canada thistle, it will have a more upright growth habit as a rosette, compared to biennial thistles. considerations. that fall spraying of thistles is not a silver bullet and effective control often needs repeated applications. It will take several years of timely control before the soil seed bank is reduced. Choosing the right products for your program is another key step to controlling your thistles.

Picking the Right Product There are many herbicides labeled for thistle control. When choosing an herbicide for spraying thistles, the proximity of thistles to waterways and sensitive plants. grazing and haying restrictions, and the type of thistle are all important effective for all thistles, but some herbicides have higher efficacies depending on the thistle species.

GrazonNext® HL, Milestone® Chaparral®, Graslan® L, Stinger®, Overdrive®, and Tordon 22K® are all products that are labelled for use ba is also an effective option, but should be sprayed when temperatures are warmer for the highest efficacy. When using Tordon 22K® or Graslan® L, both products are redistricted use and contain picloram, use extreme caution around other vegetation, especially trees. Both products will kill woody plants.

Most of the herbicides used for control of thistles also kill desirable forbs, so spot spraying individual plants or patches rather than broadcast spraying the entire pasture can spare valuable forbs.
