

Board moves forward with renovation plans

Council holds final meeting of 2020

Insurance coverage, appointments and the city's wage and salary schedule were on the agenda when the Wayne City Council met in regular session on Tuesday.

In addition, the council spent considerable time as a Committee-of-the-whole discussing items such as the lagoon, the old pool house and shovel ready projects that could be eligible for federal funding in the future.

Cap Peterson with Northeast Nebraska Insurance Agency spoke to the council on the city's property and casualty insurance package. He noted that the city's Workers Compensation experience mod was slightly higher this year than the past several years. This led to a nearly \$6,000 increase in premium for that portion of the package.

In addition, Peterson recommended the council switch from a \$1,000 deductible on property claims to a \$10,000 deductible. This will result in a savings of approximately \$9,000 a year.

Following Peterson's presentation, council members voted to approve the insurance package for the 2021 calendar year at a cost of \$374,266.00.

Street and Planning Director Joel Hansen presented an update to the council on the work done by his department this year.

Hansen told the council his department includes six full-time employees and "they are a quality crew. They get along well."

He talked about projects the department was involved in during the past year, including work at the lagoon and the removal of numerous trees along the route of the new walking trail. Hansen discussed the challenges of the past year with COVID-19 and the fact that he has learned new ways to accomplish a number of tasks.

Plans for the future were discussed and include demolishing the old Street Shop building behind the Power Plant, replacing paving on East 14th Street and overseeing the Pine Heights Road and East 10th Street project.

Council members also voted to authorize the city administrator to continue indefinitely to pay out police department vacation leave for those who have accrued time but are unable to take vacation due to the department being not fully staffed.

Discussion was held on the fact that the police department is currently advertising for the open positions, but have had very few applicants.

In other action, council members approve

These included the possibility of implementing an addition one-half percent city sales tax, annexation of certain portions of land, work that has been, or could be, done in the area of the lagoon in the southeast portion of the city and stub streets that are generally short streets that may need to have some type of parking regulations connected

to them. Also on the list was the possibility of obtaining federal funding for projects that have already been designed and are shovel ready. Listed as possibilities were Fourth Street to Centennial Road: Centennial Road and East the membership of Alexis Heaton to the 21st Street (would also involve the County) and South Sherman Street. The future of the old pool house across the street from the bowling alley was also on the list. City crews will begin gutting the building this winter to determine what can be done with the building and the next steps in the process

Dr. Mark Lenihan, Superintendent of Schools, updated the board on the number of students who have been out of class for COVID-19-related reasons. He said the numbers are at the lowest since the beginning of the year.

"The fact that we have made it through the first semester without having to go to remote learning is a testament to the work of our staff, students and parents," Lenihan said.

He did ask for board approval to continue with the 2 p.m. dismissals on Fridays through the third quarter. The time has been important for students who have been absent and for staff work with those students. In addition, Lenihan requested the board approve Monday, Jan. 4 as a teacher work-day with no students at school.

While the state of Nebraska has relaxed some of the restrictions on gatherings, the Nebraska School Activities Association (NSAA) recommendations for fan attendance at athletic events call for only members of households and grandparents be allowed to attend.

The resignation of Stephanie Reynolds was approved as part of Monday's meeting of the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education. Mrs. Reynolds has taught high school math at the school for 21 years.

Lenihan told the board the Reynolds family is re-locating to Council Bluffs, Iowa and Mrs. Reynolds' resignation is effective at the end of the 2020-2021 school

Approval was given for the district to move forward with a Construction Management at Risk (CM@R) method of construction delivery for a renovation project at the high school.

Lenihan showed drawings of the work that is scheduled to be done on both the lower and upper level restrooms in the east wing of the building.

It was noted that having the project done through the CM@R process is different than other projects that the district has undertaken.

The timeline for moving forward was outlined to board members and involves a pre-bid meeting on Jan. 4, 2021, proposals due by Jan. 20, a recommendation brought to the Feb. 8 board meeting and a contract awarded the week of Feb. 15. Substantial

Farup named Wakefield Community Schools superintendent

Wakefield Community Schools Board of Education met for the fourth time in the last three weeks on Monday. During their regularly scheduled meeting the board named a new superintendent.

The board held a special meeting on Dec. 2 to discuss candidates to replace Dr. Mike Moody as superintendent. On Dec. 9 and 10, the board interviewed five candidates, including Wayne Elementary School principal Russ Plager and Wakefield High School principal Matt Farup for the role.

The board was prepared to offer a contract for services as superintendent of schools for school years 2021-23 to Farup at the Dec. 14 meeting. The board approved his resignation as principal.

"I am extremely excited about the future and I look forward to working with the board of education to continue to grow and improve the educational opportunities for all of our students," Farup said in his resignation letter.

Farup presented his last administrator update as principal, stating that his staff







The Wayne County Commissioners held their final meeting in 2020 on Tuesday morning. The commissioners held off on a request to sign a certificate of substantial completion for the courthouse restoration project and approved a bid for a pickup.

Representatives from Kingery Construction and Berggren Architects attended the meeting in the Public Safety Annex. Berggren representative Doug Elting recommended the commissioners sign the document stating that most of the items on the punch list have been completed.

Wayne County Commissioners told the renovation team that they were not comfortable signing the document as there was still too much work to be done. As soon as the commissioners sign the document, the one-year warranty on the work completed kicks in. The roof in particular was a sticking point for commissioner Terry Sievers. Sievers said he's informed Kingery and Berggren about roof leaks multiple times, but nothing has been ed to purchase a motor grader.



Wayne County Emergency ed the commissioners about the COVID-19 vaccine plan so far. Kemnitz said that the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine has gone out to some areas around the state, but may be an issue for rural areas

"The issue with the Pfizer vaccine is that once that packaging is open, it has a shelf life of five days and that's it," Kemnitz said. "You're getting a large quantity but you have to be prepared to vaccinate a large group."

Kemnitz said the Moderna vaccine, which at the time of press has not been officially approved, will most likely go out in smaller batches, and thus be more appropriate for rural areas with smaller populations. He told the commissioners hospital staff and first responders are likely to be the first in the area to receive the vaccines, but so far, he wasn't sure when that would be happening in Wayne county. He told the commissioners he is working with the appropriate groups to plan before the vaccine arrives, because there will not be much notice given when it will come, so it's better to have a dispersal plan before the call comes.

Casey told the commissioners he was closer to finalizing the agreement between the county and member of the Barelman family to purchase a portion of their property. He also told the commissioners that the Tradewind project was nearing the end of the gravel road hill cuts.

The commissioners approved payments on Highway Allocation Fund Pledge Bonds, series 2014, 2015 and 2019. They also designated fund depository sites for 2021 and authorized the county treasurer to invest and reinvest County funds.



Helping youth cope with holiday stresses **School Lunches**

The year 2020 is delivering more youth's feelings of anxiety, sadness, challenges than many of us have experienced before.

The holiday season is quickly approaching and potentially could be more stressful than previous years given all of the events of the past year.

As individuals and families plan holiday gatherings during a global pandemic, many will be modifying holiday traditions based on ensuring the safety and well-being of families and others. Breaking from rituals can be challenging and upsetting, however, with some planning and creative thinking these changes might help your family develop new traditions.

Children and youth often anxiously await the holidays which often mean a time to gather with family, share gifts, and participate in traditions such as baking favorite holiday foods, decorating one's home, or attending religious celebrations. Changes to holiday

Research shows that the social, emotional, and mental health of our youth have been negatively affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. The mental health impacts of COVID-19 and potential changes to a typical holiday routine can compound the feelings and emotions youth are experiencing.

Below are some strategies to help youth cope through the holidays:


Acknowledge your child's feelings. Simply ask them how they provides a positive example for are feeling. As an adult, check-in with them daily about what feelings they are experiencing that day. As your child is sharing their feelings with you, make sure you are listening and not passing judgment. Try as best as you can to keep the lines of communication open. Talk with your children. Be intentional about taking the time to talk with your children. Simply, ask them about their day or what is bringing them joy, happiness, or what they are finding difficult. Take time to schedule a virtual meeting for children to interact with grandtime to express your own feelings parents, aunts, uncles or other extended family members which they might normally interact with over the holidays. You can even encourage activities such as making a favorite holiday treat or making a craft together in a virtual setting These social interactions can help young people not feel alone and supported.

> Explain why this year is different. Talk to your children about how the holidays may look different this year due to COVID 19. Explain to them that helping people stay safe and healthy, may make familiar holiday traditions be different this year.

Additionally, children and youth may be encountering feelings of grief and sadness because a fam-

Ask vour children for their ideas on how to celebrate the holidays in a manner that helps the family be safe or ways to remember family members who cannot be present during the holidays. These new activities might just create new traditions.

Invest in others. Invite your children to help others in your community. Let them be creative: make holiday cards for military service personnel, help the elderly clean up leaves, make homemade gifts for your neighbors, or make a donation to a local charity.

Learn to say "no". Demonstrate and teach youth to make time to reflect and engage in self-care. Learning to say "no" to activities, social media, or projects can teach children and youth to stop and reflect on their own life and the world in which they live.

Do not abandon healthy habits. Stick to a familiar routine; keep to morning schedules, eat regular meals, and enforce bedtimes. Encourage healthy eating by having healthy snacks available prior to and following holidays meals, avoid overindulging in desserts and sugary treats. Creatively think of ways for youth to remain physically active throughout the day and limit screen time.

Take a breather. Encourage children and youth to engage in some quiet time. Establish a routine where youth spend 15 minutes in the quiet (turn off the TV, and other electronic devices), have them read, write in a journal, or create artwork that allows young people a healthy way to express their feelings.

Seek professional help if needed. Do not be afraid to access professional help for your child if feelings of anxiety and depression persist. Talk with a school counselor, your family physician, or counselors at your local behavioral health center.

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




The remainder of the meeting time was spent developing guidelines to merge the two groups.

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
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




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

Dealing with winter tetany in beef cattle

Grass tetany is considered a problem that usually occurs when cattle or sheep are eating lush, spring grass or annual cereal forages such as rye, wheat or triticale; but, it can also occur when cattle are being fed harvested forages.

Grass tetany, sometimes or called grass staggers hypomagnesaemia, is a metabolic disorder of cattle related to a deficiency of magnesium (Mg). Magnesium is a critical mineral to the nervous system and muscle function. Low levels of magnesium can result in cattle that exhibit hyper-excitability, reduced feed intake, and muscle twitching, especially around the face and ears. Cattle may also appear uncoordinated and walk with a stiff gait.

Grass tetany is most often

especially true if these hays are being fed in a dry lot situation cells, so it is crucial to provide where they are the only source of adequate sodium (salt) to insure feed.

Grass, alfalfa and cereal grains harvested for hay can be low in magnesium. A mineral analysis showing less than 0.15 percent magnesium in hay is considered low. When hay is low in magnesium and also low in potassium, and calcium is calcium (less than 0.4 percent), present. while being simultaneously high in potassium (greater than 2.5 percent), tetany is more likely to occur. Sodium is important in transporting magnesium into proper magnesium utilization.

To prevent winter tetany from harvested forages, consider the following:

Test hay for mineral concentrations to identify if an imbalance of magnesium,

If hay tests low in magnesium (<0.15 percent) and calcium (<0.40 percent) and high in (>2.5percent), magnesium mineral that also contains salt. Because

In instances where cattle are supplemental supplement, magnesium can also be delivered with the feed. If this occurs, make sure access to loose salt is

concentration of potassium in mineral supplements. If feeds are already high in potassium, feeding additional potassium in a mineral only aggravates the problem.

Another option to consider when managing hay that is high in potassium and low in magnesium, is feeding hay that is higher in calcium and magnesium together with it. Alfalfa can be high in potassium as well, so be sure to test it prior to feeding.

Winter tetany can be an unexpected problem as most producers are not looking for it at this time of year. Through forage testing for levels of calcium, potassium, phosphorus and magnesium present, producers can determine if action may be needed to prevent winter tetany from occurring.
